MEMBERS

Term, four years; Salary, \$20,000 per annum; President receives additional \$150 for each day served during Regular or extraordinary session or interim committee meetings, and \$150 for attending to legislative business during the interim. The Majority and Minority Leaders receive additional \$50 per diem compensation during sessions. The chairs of the committees on Finance and Judiciary and up to six additional persons to be named by the President shall each receive, for up to a maximum of thirty days, an additional \$150 per day for attending to legislative business in their offices in the capitol building when the Legislature is not in regular, extended or extraordinary session and interim committees are not meeting. Mileage and any other provisions for expenses are governed by Article 2A, Chapter 4 of the Code of West Virginia.

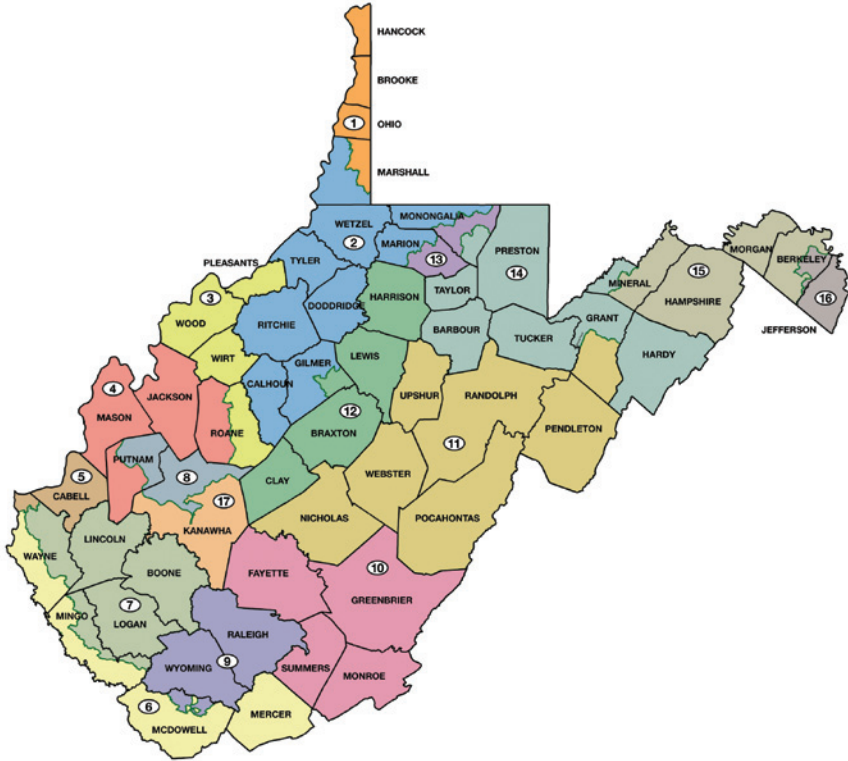

PRESIDENT AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

Senate President William P. Cole III (R - Mercer, 6th District) is an automobile dealer and owner of Cole Automotive Group in Bluefield and Bill Cole Automall in Ashland, Kentucky. He was born on May 16, 1956, in Boston, Massachusetts, the son of William P. Cole, Jr and Carol McHugh Cole. Cole earned an associates degree in Automotive Marketing, a Bachelor's of Business Administration and a minor in Accounting from Northwood University Midland Michigan. He is a Certified Automotive Merchandiser and a member of NADA. He is married to Brownie Elizabeth and has four children: Jason Paul, Lee William, Elizabeth Stuart and MaryEllen Taylor. Cole has served as Chairman of The Development Authority of the Greater Bluefield Area. He is a past board member of the I-73/I-74 Corridor Association, has served with the Greater Bluefield Chamber of Commerce, the Council of Fleet Specialists and is a past president of the Bluefield Sales Executives Club. He was awarded Outstanding Alumnus Northwood University in 1994. He also has an ATP (airline transport pilot) rating with over 3,000 hours total time. Cole is a Lutheran.



Senator Bob Ashley (R - Roane, 11th District) is an insurance agent. He was born on July 4, 1953, son of former House of Delegates member Gene M. Ashley and Kathleen Harris Ashley. 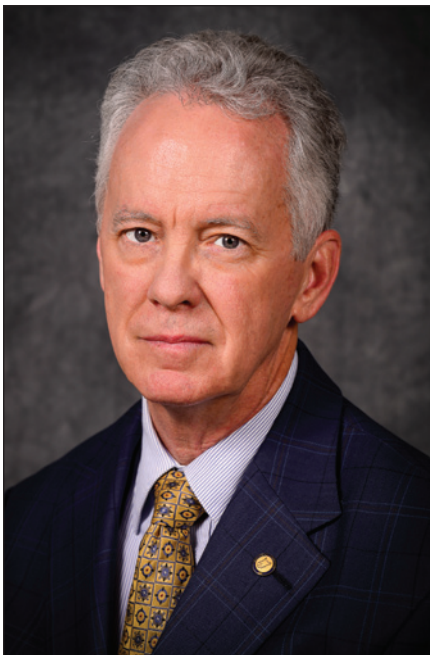

Bipartisan; term, six years; Per Diem, \$160 for each day actually served, not to exceed one hundred days in any fiscal year (excluding Crime Victims Compensation Fund time), plus expenses based upon legislative reimbursement.

The Court of Claims hears claims against the state for money damages. Awards made are subject to final approval by the Legislature. Upon request, it issues advisory opinions to state agencies. It also investigates and hears claims, made by victims of criminally injurious conduct, for awards from a crime victims compensation fund created by the Legislature in 1981 and funded by additional court costs being imposed upon every person pleading guilty or found guilty of a felony or misdemeanor other than a non-moving traffic offense.
