Salary: \$17,500.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 1, Constitution of 1863.)

The Governor is vested with the chief executive powers of the State, recommends to the Legislature, by message at the commencement of such session thereof, the passage of such measures as he deems expedient; appoints, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, certain officers of the State Government, who may be removed by him for cause; may remit fines and penalties, grant reprieves, commutes punishment and pardon and parole after conviction; is Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State and, as such, may call out the National Guard to enforce laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

DANIEL PITT O'BRIEN, (D), of Buckhannon, Secretary of State, was born at Buckhannon, Upshur County, August 31, 1900, son of William S. and Emma (White) O'Brien; educated in the public schools, graduating from the Buckhannon High School 1919 and West Virginia Wesleyan College, with B. S. Degree 1923; married September 5, 1942, to Mildred Elizabeth Smith of Weston, daughter of DaCosta and Mattie J. (Callison) Smith; one daughter, Patricia, born April 21, 1944; high school teacher and coach for eight years; Chief Clerk in the office of the Secretary of State from September 1, 1933 to August 10, 1948, excepting service in the armed forces; served in World War I and World War II; Methodist; Mason; American Legionnaire; Elk; received Democratic nomination for Secretary of State, primary election, May 11, 1948; upon the death of his father, Secretary of State William S. O'Brien, August 10, 1948, was appointed by Governor Clarence W. Meadows to fill the unexpired term; elected Secretary of State in 1948; 1952, and reelected in 1956.

Salary: \$11,000.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 7, Constitution of 1863.)

Issues certificates of charters of incorporation for the creation of all domestic corporations, and certificates of authority to foreign corporations to transact business in West Virginia; is keeper of the executive journal and records state documents therein, is the custodian of the Great and Less Seals of the State, being the only official authorized to attach these seals to official papers; and is a member of and *ex officio* secretary of the Board of Public Works, and a member of and secretary of the State Sinking Fund Commission. Under the Voters Permanent Registration Law, he is made and designated as the chief registration official of the State and is an *ex officio* member of the State Election Commission. He supervises elections of all state and federal public officials.

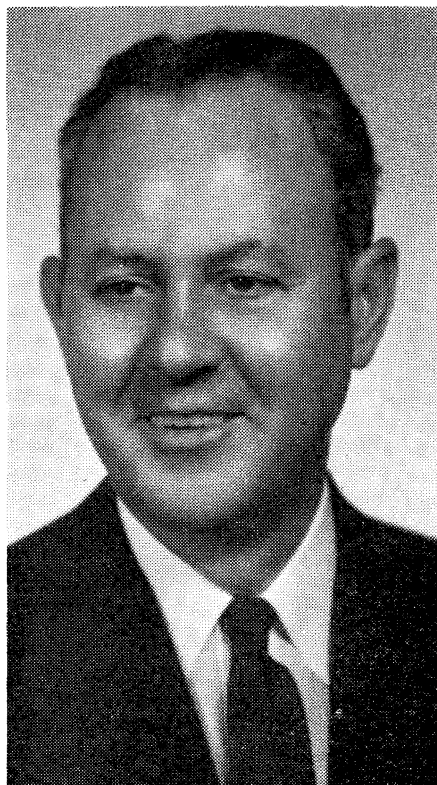

R. VIRGIL ROHRBOUGH, (R), of Grafton, Taylor County, was born December 14, 1901, in Lewis County; son of George Oren and Ida Gertrude (Pletcher) Rohrbough; received A. B. Degree at Fairmont State College and M. A. Degree from West Virginia University; married Mildred Stafford, August 20, 1930; one daughter — (Mrs. William D. Thompson); Methodist; Mason; Kiwanian; member, WVEA, West Virginia Superintendents' Association and American Association of School Administrators; taught one-room school three years; served as elementary principal ten years; assistant superintendent of Taylor County eight years; superintendent of Taylor County Schools for thirteen years; elected State Superintendent of Schools in 1956.



Salary: Superintendent of Schools, \$12,000.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created under Chapter 137. Acts 1863.)

The Superintendent of Schools is the head of the Department of Education and, as such, has supervision of the free schools of the State, serving as chief executive officer of the West Virginia Board of Education. The Superintendent has power to institute proper proceedings for removal of school officials, arranges for conferences with local superintendents relating to conditions, needs and improvements of schools; causes to be prepared and published courses of study, school laws, library book lists, and other pamphlets which promote interest in schools; serves as chairman of the State Board of School Finance, which controls the distribution of state aid to local school systems; and interprets school laws and rules of the State Board of Education. He is a member of the Board of Public Works; a member of the State Teachers' Retirement Board. Term expires January 15, 1961.

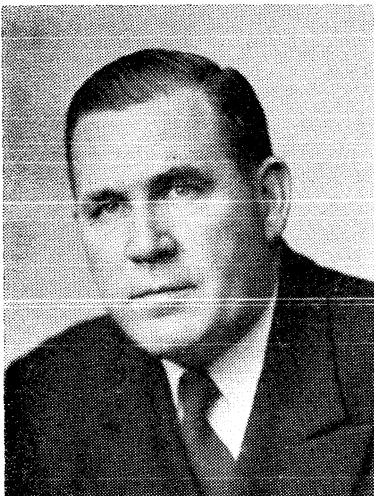

The West Virginia Board of Education consists of ten members including the State Superintendent of Schools, *ex officio*, who is not entitled to vote. The other nine members must be citizens of the State appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate for overlapping terms of nine years. No more than five of the appointed members may belong to the same political party. No person shall be eligible for appointment to membership who is a member of any political party executive committee or holds any other public office or public employment under the federal government or under the government of the State or any of the political subdivisions. No member of the board may be removed from office except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty or gross immorality and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the Governor of State elective officers. At least six meetings shall be held each year upon its own resolution or at the call of the president. Members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for actual expenses incident to the performance of their duties. The secretary who is appointed by the board keeps a record of its proceedings and performs such other duties as the board may prescribe.

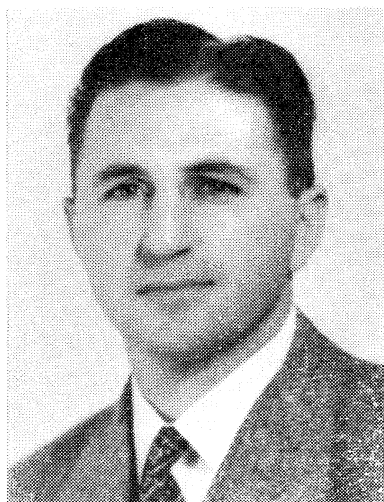
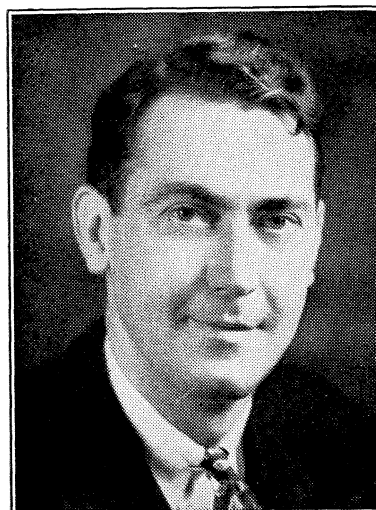
Subject to and in conformity with the constitution and laws of West Virginia, the Board of Education determines the educational policies of the State, except as to the West Virginia University and Potomac State College, and makes rules for carrying into effect laws and policies of the State relating to education. The State Board shall have general control, supervision and management of the business and educational affairs of all state colleges and the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind.

Acting as the State Board of Vocational Education, the State Board of Education administers and controls the state plans for vocational rehabilitation.



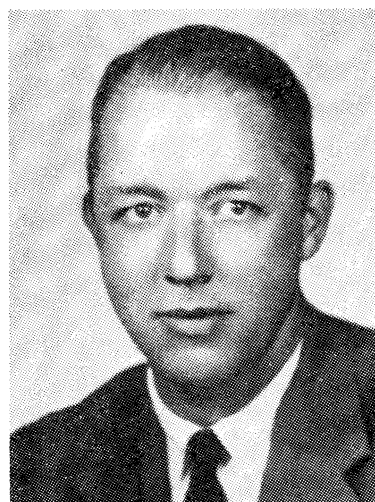

Board of Review: \$7,000.00 per year each. Three members appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. Term: six years. Nonpartisan. Governor designates chairman.

Purpose is to promote social and economic security by reducing, as far as possible, the hazards of unemployment. Through compulsory system of unemployment reserves, it provides measures of security to families of unemployed persons and guards against menace to health, morals and welfare arising from unemployment. To fulfill these purposes the Department pays weekly unemployment benefits to workers who are unemployed due to lack of work and who are in the labor market. The funds for payment of benefits are derived from a pay roll tax paid by West Virginia employers under the terms of the Social Security Act.

Council serves as advisory body to Director. Board of Review hears and determines disputed claims, appoints examiners, organizes appeal tribunals and exercises such additional powers as may be necessary for the proper conduct of a system of administrative review of disputed claims.

WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF HEALTH



NEWMAN HOUGHTON DYER, (D), of Bartley, McDowell County, State Director of Health, was born at Bolair, Webster County, August 17, 1894; son of Cyrus Newman and Sarah Ann (Dodrill) Dyer; educated in public schools, West Virginia Wesleyan College, West Virginia University, University of Maryland, and University of Michigan School of Public Health; married to Canary Lucile Hylton, July 23, 1917; four children—Elva, Ruby, Allen, and Dorothy; Methodist, Mason; member of I. O. O. F.; State Medical Association, Vice-President, Section of Public Health, Southern Medical Association 1950-51; Fellow, American Public Health Association; Fellow of American Medical Association; Kanawha County Medical Society; McDowell County Board of Education 1933-1950; medical director and plant physician, Pond Creek Pocahontas Company, Bartley, 1926-1946; appointed State Health Commissioner September 1, 1946; appointed Director of Health July 1, 1949; Commissioned Medical Director, Reserve Corps, United States Public Health Service, June 1950; Member, American Board of Preventive Medicine and Public Health, October 1950; Master of Public Health Degree, School of Public Health, University of Michigan, June 1951; Member, Consulting Staff of Charleston Memorial Hospital, 1951; Member, Royal Society of Health of London.

The West Virginia Board of Health was created by the 1949 Legislature, and consists of nine members, who are appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate. The members are appointed for a term of nine years, except the initial appointments. Three members of the board are physicians or surgeons holding the degree of doctor of medicine; one dentist; one osteopathic physician; one pharmacist; one hospital representative; and two representative citizens. Members of the board do not receive compensation for services, but are reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

The State Board of Health assumes all the duties, rights, powers, and obligations and liabilities formerly assumed by the state department of health, the public health council, and the commissioner of health. The board appoints the State Director of Health, determines his salary, and the director serves at the will and pleasure of the board. The board has supervision and control of the business, fiscal, administrative and medical affairs of the department of health, and has advisory medical supervision of all the state institutions. The board is charged with the responsibility of licensing hospitals and related institutions, and the construction of hospitals and health centers under Public Law 725. The board is authorized to make rules and regulations and to approve plans and appointments of qualified local health authorities; promulgate regulations under the public health laws to approve the plans of cooperation for the formation of combined local health departments; maintains division of vital statistics; promotes immunization and sanitation, supervises sewage disposal and public water supplies.

THE MEDICAL LICENSING BOARD OF WEST VIRGINIA

Created under Chapter 30, Acts 1949; consists of State Director of Health, *ex officio*, and ten members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate; six of which shall be doctors of medicine, two shall be chiropodists, and two shall be chiropractors; to serve terms of five years with the exception of the original appointments; members shall receive ten dollars per diem while in session and actual expenses incurred in performance of duties; authorized to examine applicants and issue certificates of licensure to those qualified to practice as doctors of medicine, chiropractors and chiropodists and to revoke such certificates for cause; elects own chairman; State Director of Health shall act as secretary; chiropody and chiropractic members shall vote only in matters pertaining to their respective profession; replaces Public Health Council and Chiropractic Board of Examiners in matters pertaining to licensure.

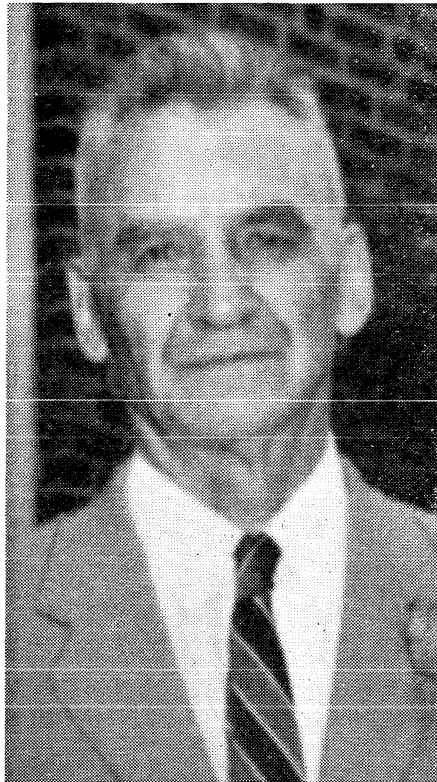

West Virginia Board of Probation and Parole, created by an Act of the Legislature passed by the Regular Session of 1953. The Board adopts rules and regulations, with the approval of the Governor, governing procedure for granting of probation and parole. The Rules and Regulations of the Board are filed with the Secretary of State. The Board has the sole authority to release on parole. It shall hold hearings and consider cases of eligible prison inmates annually. The Board shall have general supervisory control over all Court and County probation officers, and shall supervise all probationers and parolees.

S. Army overseas; Supervisor of Rehabilitation Division, State Board of Education, before appointment as Director of Public Assistance, August 5, 1957, for term ending June 30, 1960.

Board studies and considers legislation and administration concerning public assistance and serves as advisory board to State Director.

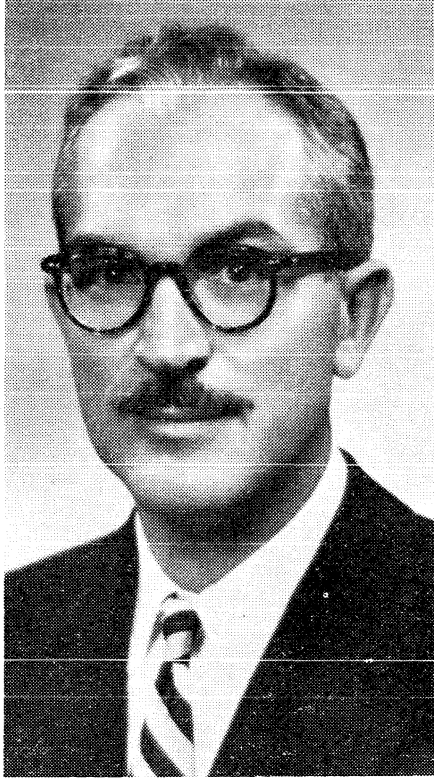

Salary of Superintendent: \$8,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of the Senate.

Board of Commissioners: \$10 per diem for days actually served in discharge of duties and expenses, consists of two members, bipartisan, appointed by the Governor, by and with consent of the Senate for a term of two years.

Retirement Board: Consists of the Attorney General, the State Treasurer, the Superintendent, and two members in active service of the department, elected by vote of members, who serve without compensation.

The Department of Public Safety is a state police department with state-wide general police power, created in 1919 to preserve the peace, protect life and property, prevent crime and apprehend criminals. With at least one detachment in each county and a fleet of two-way radio equipped vehicles, the state police handle a large share of the investigation of major crime and apprehension of dangerous criminals, and take primary responsibility for patrolling the highways, enforcing the traffic laws and preventing motor vehicle accidents, besides many miscellaneous services in the public interest, including duty at the scene of emergencies, riots or disaster.

The Board of Commissioners hears charges filed against any officer or member of the department, including the Superintendent, or appeals of charges filed against officers or members with the Superintendent if the Superintendent fails to suspend or dismiss any officer or member after such charges are filed.

The Retirement Board has power to make, revise and terminate awards from the Department Death, Disability and Retirement Fund to retired or disabled members, or to beneficiaries of deceased members.

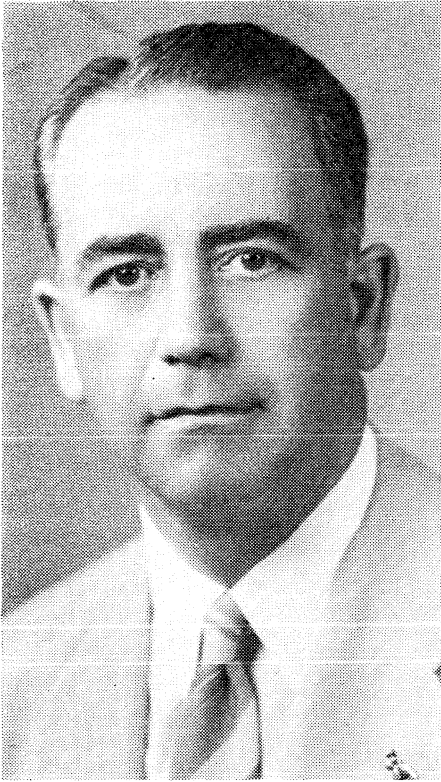

Salaries of Commissioners: \$10,000 per year. Three Commissioners appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years. Governor selects chairman annually.

Commission supervises and regulates rates, charges, services, and facilities of all public utilities, including municipalities, and of all common and contract carriers of passengers and property by railroads, highways, and street, water, and air; hears and acts upon complaints against utilities and common carriers, and passes upon applications for increases in rates and for discontinuances of service of facilities, and upon applications for the privilege of installing plants and facilities; prescribes systems of accounts to be used by utilities and carriers; and fixes valuations of properties of and requires the submission of reports by utilities and carriers.



MYRON R. "RUSTY" RENICK, (R), of Fayetteville, was born at Lewiston, Kanawha County, April 16, 1912; son of the late A. C. Salary of Commissioner: \$14,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. Can be removed only for cause. Term: Four years.

Members of Advisory Board to State Road Commission: \$25 per day for days actually in session; compensation not to exceed \$300 per year. Commission composed of seven members, one from each congressional district, and one member at-large. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Bi-partisan. Term: Seven years after basic appointments.

State Road Commission's jurisdiction extends to the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of 4,526.02 miles of designated primary roads, and 26,326.88 miles of designated secondary roads, and the State Road Commissioner is empowered by law to supervise the fiscal affairs of the Commission to provide for such construction, reconstruction and maintenance. In addition, the Commission regulates traffic on state roads, and outdoor advertising contiguous to its roads, operates state-owned toll bridges, engages in roadside development and maintains a department to supply highway information.

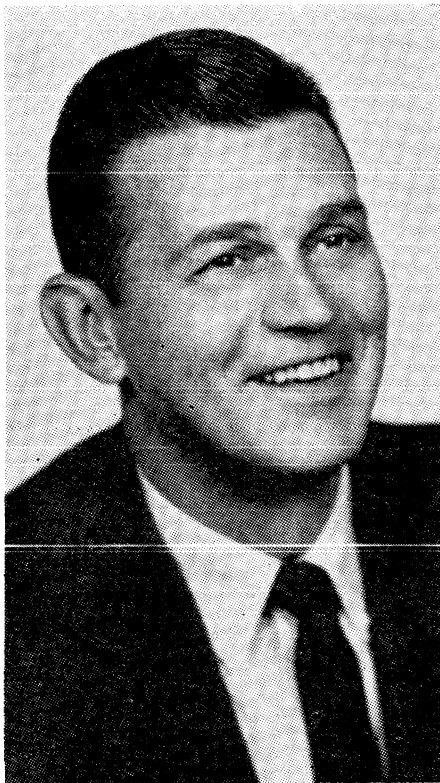
STATE TAX COMMISSIONER

JOHN A. FIELD, JR.

Salary of Commissioner: \$10,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years.

The Tax Commissioner is charged with the collection of state taxes on licenses and privileges, consumers sales and use taxes, cigarette and soft drinks taxes, inheritance and transfer taxes and tax forfeiture, etc., enforces laws relating to assessment and collection of all state, county, district, and municipal property taxes; assists the Board of Public Works in matters of assessment and revenue; and supervises, inspects, and audits the accounts and records of all public offices in the State.



JOHN A. FIELD, JR., (R), of Charleston, was born March 22, 1910; son of John A. and Mayme (Butler) Field; education received in the Kanawha County public schools; A. B. degree, Hampden-Sydney College, 1932; LL.B. degree, University of Virginia, 1935; married Elaine C. Goode of Rocky Mount, North Carolina, in 1933; two children, John A., III, and William C.; lawyer; Presbyterian; elected member of Order of Coif in 1935; member of Charleston Bar Association, West Virginia Bar Association, American Bar Association, American Law Institute and Charleston Exchange Club; admitted to the Bar of West Virginia, 1935; practiced with law firm of Brown, Jackson & Knight, 1935-43, leaving to take a commission in the U. S. Naval Reserve; served as armed guard gunnery officer with rank of Lieutenant with sea duty in both European and Pacific theatres; returned to practice law in Charleston, 1946; elected councilman-at-large, City of Charleston, 1947 and re-elected, 1951; president, City Council and Chairman of Finance Committee, 1951-55; appointed State Tax Commissioner, January 26, 1957.

I. office for that district, comprising Western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Eastern Ohio; served as special counsel of Republican National Committee, chief investigator for Queens Sewer Investigation in New York City; chief investigator, Detroit Crime Survey; member of the National Republican Club.

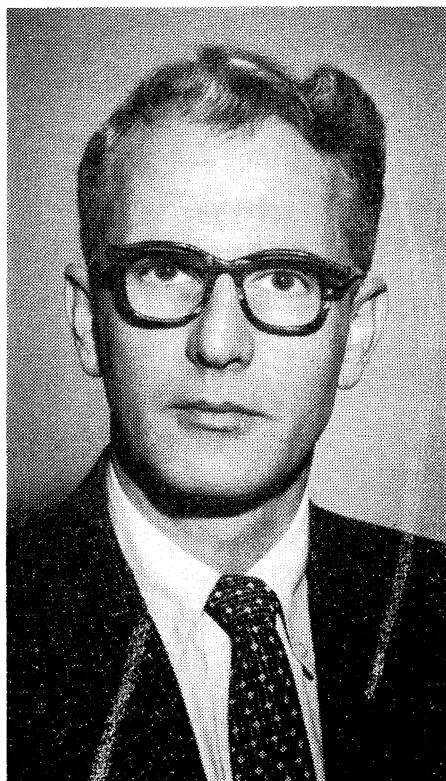

B. and LL.B.); married Vivienne Worl, April 1, 1946; four children; Attorney; Methodist; member, Beta Theta Pi, Phi Delta Phi (legal), American Bar Association, West Virginia State Bar and West Virginia Bar Association; member, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, having served with U. S. Marines, 1942-46 and now holding rank as Major; mayor of Marlinton, 1950-52; prosecuting attorney, Pocahontas County, 1952-56; appointed Workmen's Compensation Commissioner, July 1, 1957 for term ending May 31, 1959.

Salary of Commissioner: \$8,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years.

Appeal Board: Three members appointed by Governor, each receiving a salary of \$300 per month. Term: Six years, Bi-partisan, Chairman designated by Governor. Meets first Tuesday in February, April, June, August, October and December; sessions not to exceed 20 days each.

Silicosis Medical Board: Compensation per diem fixed by Commissioner. Three members, licensed physicians, appointed by Commissioner. Term: Six years. Commissioner selects chairman annually.

Occupational Diseases Medical Board: Compensation per diem fixed by Commissioner. Three members, licensed physicians. appointed by Commissioner. Term: Six years. Commissioner selects chairman annually.

The Act provides workmen with hospitalization and medical care for injuries sustained in the course of and growing out of their employment in industry, fixes compensation during their disability, and, in case of death, provides for their dependents. Workmen's Compensation Appeal Board reviews action of Commissioner upon appeal of any employer, employee or dependent. Silicosis Medical Board determines the presence of silicosis, stage and degree of resultant disability. The function of the Occupational Diseases Medical Board is to determine all medical questions relating to cases of compensation for occupational diseases other than silicosis, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner.

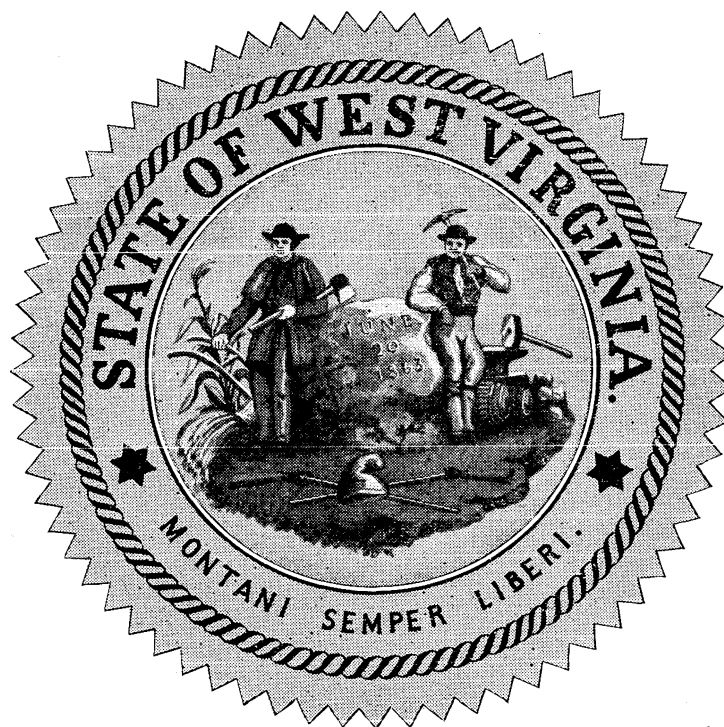

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, Article 1, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year. Each board is also given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers are authorized to administer oaths.

Each applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of \$20, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge \$5 for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof. All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board, and each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues. An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked has the right of appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Unless otherwise specified, members of boards are allowed \$10 per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and are entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January, and the secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE AERONAUTICS COMMISSION

Created under Chapter 12, Acts of the Legislature 1947. Consists of five members appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the Senate, one of whom shall be the State Road Commissioner *ex officio*, bi-partisan. Serves without compensation, but paid actual expenses. Commission to have general supervision and control over all airports and landing fields used for commercial purposes, schools of aviation and all other phases of aerial activities.

PUBLIC LAND CORPORATION OF WEST VIRGINIA

STATE LICENSING BOARD

Created under authority of Chapter 19, Acts of the 1945 Legislature. Consists of five members, one of whom shall be the Director of the State Department of Public Assistance, and one of whom shall be the State Health Commissioner, and three other persons to be appointed by the Governor. The Director of the Department of Public Assistance shall be President of the Board. Of the three persons first to be appointed by the Governor, one shall serve for a period of two years and one for a period of four years and one for a period of six years; thereafter terms of appointment to be for six years. Meetings on the third Thursday of October of each year for the purpose of passing on applications for licensing and revoking the license of Child Welfare Agencies not conforming to the laws of this State relating to child welfare. The Board shall be paid actual traveling expenses in traveling to and from said annual meetings, and the three persons appointed by the Governor shall receive a per diem not exceeding \$10 per diem for time actually spent attending said meetings. No more than three members of said Board shall be members of the same political party.

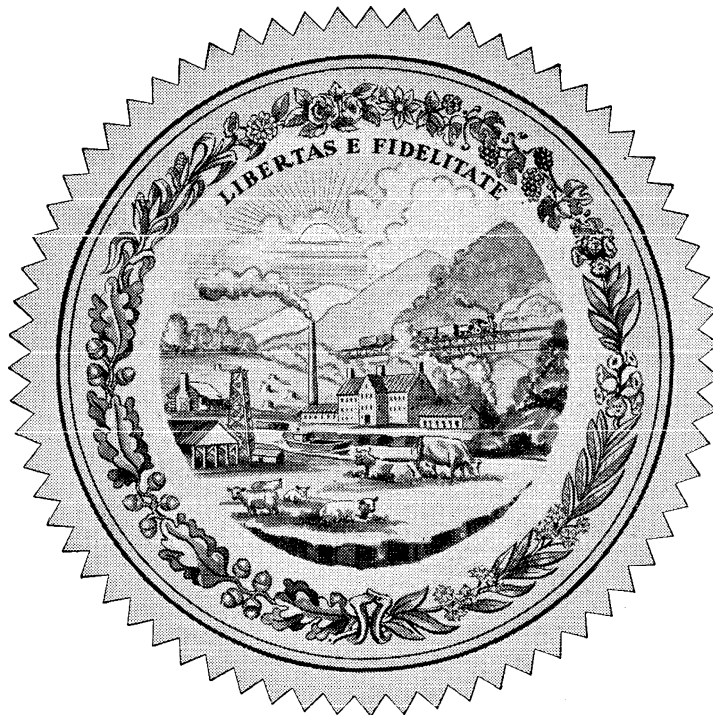

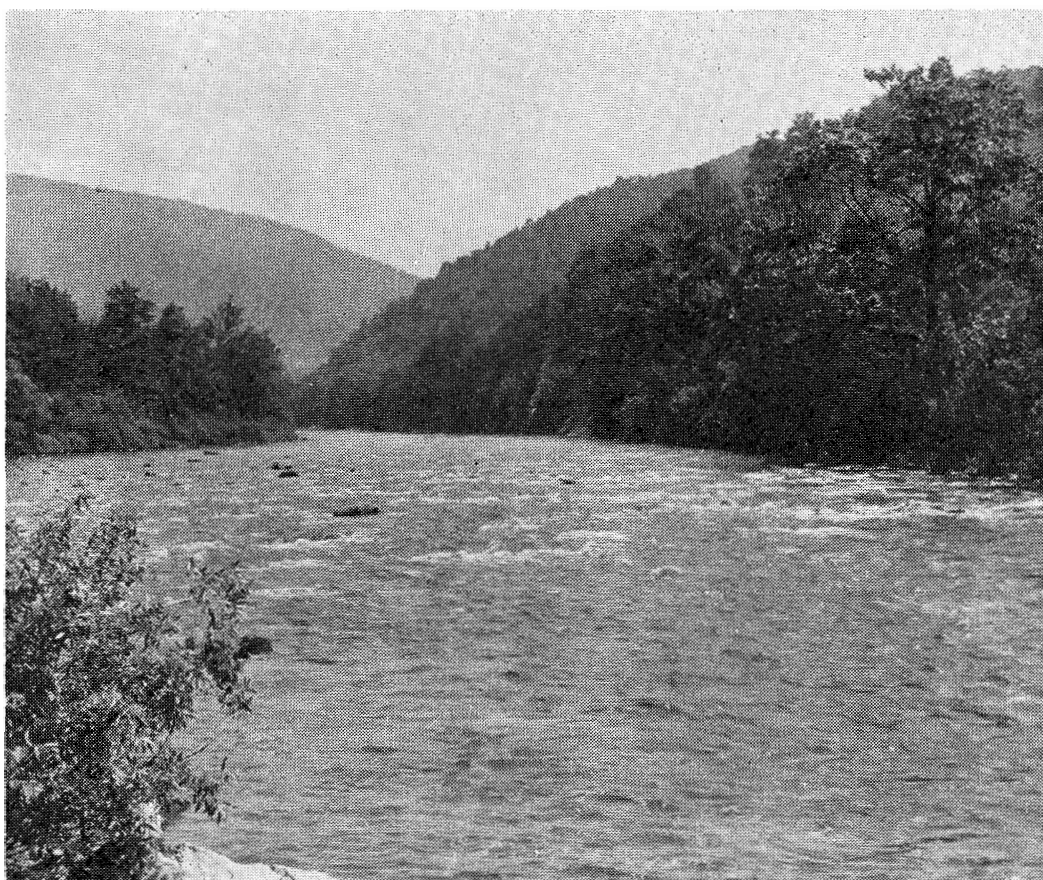

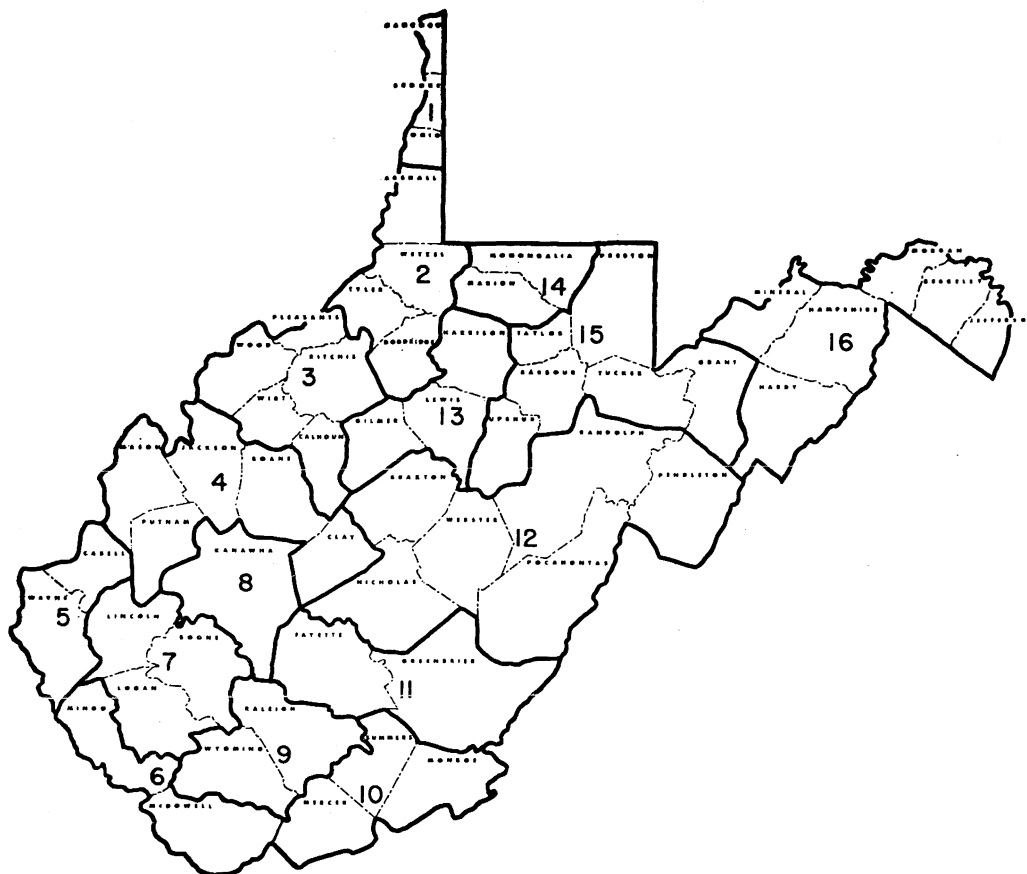

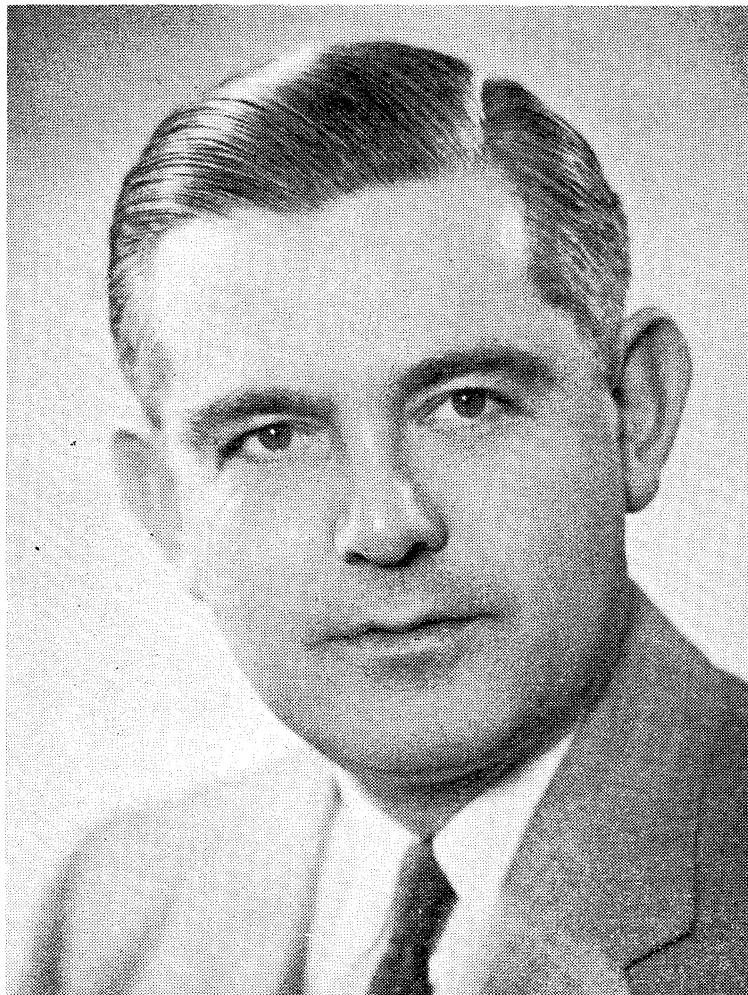
Dry Fork of Cheat River in Tucker County

LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR**CLARENCE H. KOONTZ, Auditor****Main Unit, State Capitol**

CLARENCE HAVEN KOONTZ, Mullens, was born at North Coalburg, Kanawha County, December 17, 1881; son of James M. and Ocea V. Koontz; attended public schools at St. Albans and Huntington, and studied at Alexander Hamilton Business College; married Etta Grace Robison of Huntington, August 20, 1903, (now deceased); five daughters; married Hazel Jackson Mitchell February 9, 1950; Methodist; salesman; real estate; contracting and manufacturing; past master Blue Lodge; member Chapter Commandery and Shrine, Masonry; Moose Lodge; past senior counsellor United Commercial Travelers; member Sons of American Revolution; member Tax Institute; member Kiwanis Club; past president Rotary Club; city recorder of Mullens, 1923; Inspector and Supervisor Public Offices under State Tax Commissioner, 1933; appointed Director of the State Budget, January 15, 1945 by Governor Meadows; appointed State Tax Commissioner, March 4, 1947, for term ending February 28, 1953; appointed Legislative Auditor by Joint Committee on Government and Finance during the 1953 Session of the Legislature.

Created by an Act of the Legislature in the Session of 1953, for the purpose of providing more expeditious management and efficient study of the financial problems which confront each Session of the Legislature, and to provide a more economical control by the Legislature over the revenues and expenditures of the State.

The Legislative Auditor is appointed by the Joint Committee of Government and Finance, and serves at its will and pleasure. His duty shall be to compile fiscal information for the use of the Senate and House of Delegates, and to make a continuous audit and analysis of the revenues and expenditures of the State during and between sessions of the Legislature.

He shall be solely responsible to the Legislature, and shall prepare an appropriate budget for each spending unit, for each annum for which appropriations are sought and shall submit his report to the Committee at least thirty days prior to any Legislative Session with appropriate recommendations, together with such other findings and reports as are deemed necessary. His compensation is fixed by the Joint Committee on Government and Finance, and he shall receive in addition, necessary traveling expenses incident to the performance of his duties. The Legislative Auditor may also appoint and employ such assistants which may be necessary in the discharge of his duties and the salaries of such employees shall be fixed by the Committee.

The West Virginia State Law Library, consisting of law books and legal periodicals only, is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the Capitol Building. The library is in the charge of the State Law Librarian, appointed by the Supreme Court of Appeals.

The books of the library consist of textbooks purchased, and reports and laws of other states as well as many foreign countries, all except textbooks and codes coming in by exchange for West Virginia reports provided by the State Law Librarian, as consecutive volumes of the reports of West Virginia and elsewhere are published.

The State Law Librarian, from West Virginia reports furnished him by the superintendent of public printing, supplies all judges of courts, West Virginia State officers and State Law libraries of other states with copies of these reports.

The law governing the State Law Library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the Supreme Court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers, and members and officers of the Legislature during the session of the body. It is also provided that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the place where the library is kept, but that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library at the place where it is kept."

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE BAR (Integrated)**Offices: State Capitol—Telephone DI 6-8414**

Created by the Supreme Court of Appeals under its inherent rule-making power as authorized by Chapter 44, Acts of the Legislature, 1945. The court adopted and promulgated a definition of the practice of law; a code of professional ethics, a code of judicial ethics and a constitution and by-laws for the government of the State Bar, effective May 1, 1947. Its membership consists of all persons lawfully admitted to the practice of law in West Virginia. No person can practice law in the State of West Virginia unless he is a member in good standing of The West Virginia State Bar. There are two classes of membership—active and inactive. The annual active membership fee is \$10.00.

The objects of the State Bar are to protect the interests of the public; to advance the administration of justice and the science of jurisprudence; to improve the relations between the public and the Bench and the Bar; to uphold and elevate the standards of honor, integrity, competency and courtesy in the legal profession; and to encourage cordial relations among its members. It is its declared purpose to give effect to pertinent rules of the Supreme Court of Appeals, and to perform the functions expressed in its Constitution and By-Laws. A principal duty of the State Bar is to uphold the standards of professional ethics and to diligently and vigilantly investigate and prosecute violations of these standards.

The State Bar is governed by a Board of Governors, consisting of all officers, except the secretary-treasurer, as *ex officio* members, and sixteen Governors, one Governor being elected by the members of the Bar by a secret mail ballot in each of the sixteen State Bar Districts. Officers are a president, chairman of the board, first vice president, second vice president and secretary-treasurer.

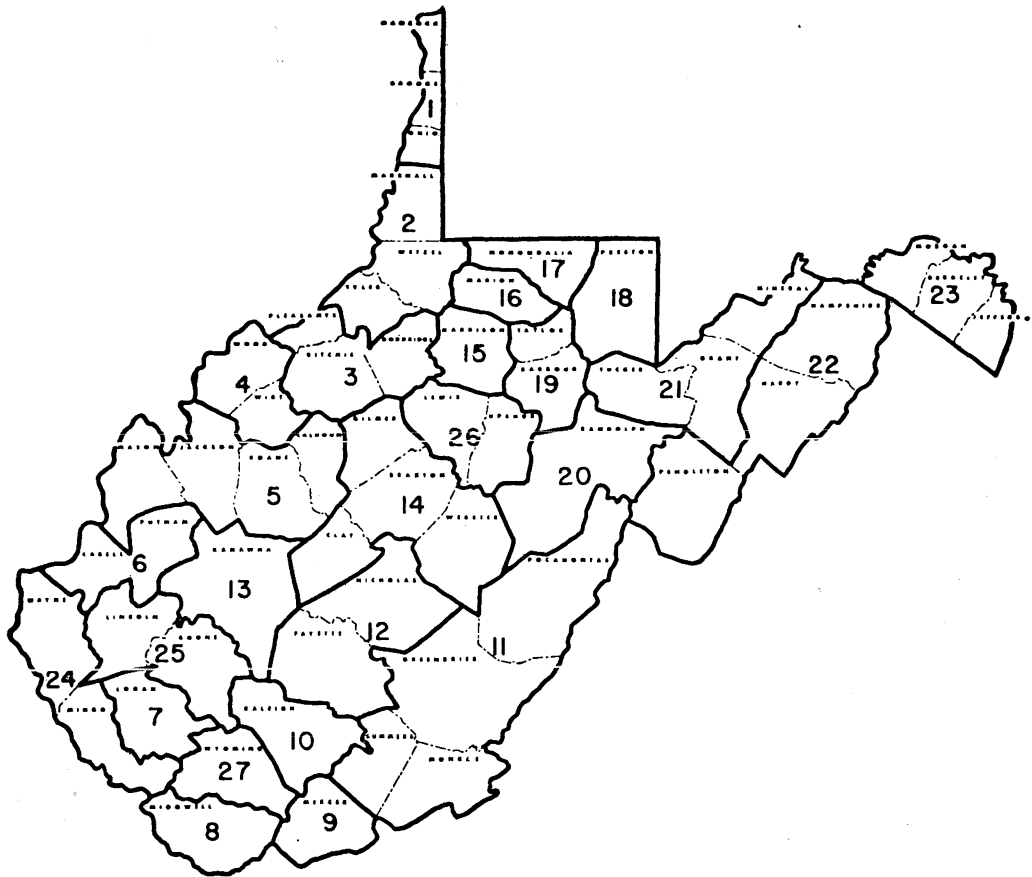

ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

2. The Government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved by the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in time of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation, thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

Representatives to Congress

4. For the election of representatives to congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled, which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Mingo, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; in all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became a part of the State.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the Legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871; and Mingo County, from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto shall, as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes—Penalty

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt

act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

“Montani Semper Liberi”—State Seal

7. The present seal of the State, with its motto, “*Montani Semper Liberi*,” shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds—Indictments

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State shall run in the name of, and official bond shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, “Against the peace and dignity of the State.”

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms, that is the best which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

4. The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, *ex-post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail Not Required

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offense. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

Unreasonable Searches and Seizure Prohibited

6. The right of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendants.

Private Property, How Taken

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporations, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: *Provided*, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law of any right or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, and was adopted at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,482; against ratification, 34,073; majority, 22,409. Acts 1879, Page 182.]

Trial of Crimes—Provisions in Interest of Accused

14. Trials of crimes, and of misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men,* public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

Religious Freedom Guaranteed

15. No person shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contract as he shall please.

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolable

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceful manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

Courts Open to All—Justice Administered Speedily

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, Etc., Provided Against

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

Jury Service for Women

Section 21. Regardless of sex all persons, who are otherwise qualified, shall be eligible to serve as petit jurors, in both civil and criminal cases, as grand jurors and as coronor's jurors.

*See Section Twenty-one of this Article making women eligible for jury service. [This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts, Regular Session 1955, p. 571, and ratified at the General Election, November 6, 1956. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 327,113; Against ratification, 202,002; Majority, 125,111.]

ARTICLE IV

Elections and Officers

1. The *male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States, shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

Mode of Voting by Ballot

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads or except in time of war or public danger to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office—Age Requirements

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any State, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provisions for Removal of Officials

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general law, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

General Elections, When Held—Terms of Officials

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on

*The woman suffrage amendment to the Constitution of the United States, declared in force August 26, 1920, provides that "the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The original section provided, that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of State officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. The original section also provided that the terms of office of members of the legislature should begin on the first day of November next succeeding their election, but this amendment provided that the term should begin on the first day of December.

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, and ratified at the general election in 1884. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 68,181; against ratification, 25,422; majority, 40,759. Acts 1883, p. 137.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this Constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in, or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapon, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

Safeguards for Ballots

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections, and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot.

Registration Laws Provided For

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters of this State.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election because his name is not or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."

The amendment was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 55,196; against ratification, 25,379; majority, 29,817. Acts 1901, p. 472.]

ARTICLE V**Division of Powers**

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI**Legislature**

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty-two, and the House of Delegates of one hundred members.]

Senators and Delegates—Terms of Office

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one-half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial districts which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

[There are now sixteen senatorial districts, as provided by Acts of 1937, Ch. 128.]

Senatorial Districts Designated

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1937 (Acts 1937, Ch. 128) the number of senatorial districts was increased to sixteen, the number of senators to thirty-two, and the counties rearranged in the various districts.]

Provisions for Delegate Representation

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three-fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a Delegate District.

[By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, Ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. From 1916 to 1952, the House of Delegates consisted of ninety-four members. The House of Delegates now consists of one hundred members. See ch. 166, p. 666, Acts of the Legislature, 1951, Regular Session.]

Delegate Apportionment After Census

7. After every census the Delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every Delegate District, and of every county not included in a Delegate District, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District and county not included in a Delegate District shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now no delegate districts, each county having at least one member.]

Further Apportionments

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such districts, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three Delegates.

To Ohio County, four Delegates.

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment. Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has eleven Delegates. For the present apportionment, see Ch. 166. Acts of the Legislature 1951, Regular Session.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted Into State

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Senators and Delegates Required to be Residents of District

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or County from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crime, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office for Profit

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election of the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

16. Members of the Legislature before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, to-wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution, or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged from Civil Arrest

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

***Time of Assembly of Legislature**

18. The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Constitution, the board of public works shall, on and after the effective date hereof, submit to the Legislature an annual budget prepared as otherwise required by the Constitution.

[*This section originally read as follows: "The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government, biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted March 11, 1953 (Acts 1953, p. 612), and ratified at the general election in November, 1954, the section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; Against ratification, 137,624; Majority, 53,253.]

Convening of Legislature by Governor

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three-fifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Other Than at the Seat of Government

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

***Length of Legislative Session**

22. The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-five and every second year thereafter shall not exceed sixty days, and the regular session held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-six and every second year thereafter shall not exceed thirty days. During any thirty day session the Legislature shall consider no other business than the annual budget bill, except such as may be stated in a proclamation issued by the Governor at least ten days prior to the convening of the session, or such business as may be stated by the Legislature on its own motion in a concurrent resolution adopted by two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house. All regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

[*This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House."]

Concerning Adjournment

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each House may provide. Each House shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each House shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and have taken his seat.

Authority to Punish Members

25. Each House may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

26. Each House shall have power to provide for its own safety and the undisturbed transaction of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duty, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

Accounting for State Monies

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is or shall be to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal cor-

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919, (Acts 1919, p. 498), and ratified at the general election in November, 1920, it was amended to read: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period of not exceeding fifteen days, from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular sessions shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house." Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 9, (Acts 1927, p. 350), adopted by the general election in November, 1928, this section was amended to read as follows: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 275,374; against ratification, 85,123; majority, 190,251.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted March 11, 1953, (Acts 1953, p. 612), and ratified at the general election in November, 1954, the section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; against ratification, 137,624; majority, 53,253.]

poration, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirement for Reading of Bills

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each House, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule may be dispensed with: *Provided*, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each House.

Acts to Embrace But One Object—Time of Effect

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under this Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one House, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journal; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

"Majority" Defined

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either House of the Legislature," or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

*Compensation of Members

33. Each member of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars a year, and expenses for one round

[*The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919 (Acts 1919, p. 456), and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. trip in connection with any session, at the rate of ten cents a mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route: *Provided*, That if party caucuses are held in advance of the date of the assembly of the Legislature in odd-numbered years for the purpose of selecting candidates for officers of the two houses, expenses for travel at the rate herein fixed shall be allowed each member for one round trip in connection with attending such caucus. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate shall each receive an additional compensation of five dollars a day for each day served as presiding officer. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the compensation herein provided for shall be paid to each member of the Legislature on and after the adoption of this amendment.

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided for—Contracts for Printing

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

State Not to be Made Defendant in Any Court, Except in Garnishment Or Attachment Proceedings

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

[This section originally read as follows: "The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity."

Under House Joint Resolution No. 3 (Acts, Regular Session, 1935, p. 662), ratified November 3, 1936, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 161,386; against ratification, 61,472; majority, 99,914.]

Lotteries Prohibited

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

Terms of Office Not to Be Extended After Election

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Cannot Be Increased During Official Term

38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority by law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due to the State: *Provided*, The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not to Be Passed in Enumerated Cases

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

- Granting divorces;
- Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;
- Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;
- Locating, or changing county seats;
- Regulating or changing county and district affairs;
- Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;
- Regulating the practice in courts of justice;
- Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;
- Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;
- The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting;
- The sale or mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;
- Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;
- Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;
- Changing the law of descent;
- Regulating the rate of interest;
- Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;
- Releasing taxes;
- Releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

Home Rule for Municipalities

39-(a). No local or special law shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The Legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns, and villages to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs: *Provided*. That any such charter or amendment thereto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted, shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this Constitution, or the general laws of the State then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

[This section (39-a), added to Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted March 9, 1935, Acts 1935, p. 706, and was ratified at the general election in 1936.]

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

Each House to Keep Journal of Proceedings

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one-tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills to Be Specific

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

Board or Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

Election of Legislative, County and Municipal Officers

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be *viva voce*, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe—Punishment

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses; *Provided*, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Liquors

46. The Legislature shall, by appropriate legislation, regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: *Provided, however*, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, securities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section."

The amendment as set forth above, which became effective March 1, 1935, was proposed by Senate Committee Substitute for Engrossed House Joint Resolution No. 1, adopted March 9, 1933, Acts Regular Session, 1933, p. 532, and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 276,978; against ratification, 237,559; majority, 39,419.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

Homestead Exemption

48. Any husband or parent residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and *Provided, further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

Property of Married Women

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

Plan of Proportional Representation

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

*The Budget System

51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

Sub-Section A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

*Sub-Section B

First: Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the session at which the budget is to be submitted, the Board of Public Works, which shall consist of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Free Schools and Commissioner of Agriculture, shall submit to the Legislature two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years. Each budget shall contain a complete plan for proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) the revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the Board of Public Works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

Second: Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations: (1) for the Legislature as certified to the Board of Public Works in the manner hereinafter provided; (2) for the Executive De-

partment; (3) for the judicial department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the Auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of the public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

Third: The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations," and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The Board of Public Works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each House the budgets and a bill for all proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each House shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The Board of Public Works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct an oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officers of both Houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiciary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein: *Provided, however,* That the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both Houses shall be a law immediately without further action by the Governor.

Fourth: The governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the Board of Public Works for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either House of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Sub-Section C—Supplementary Appropriation Bills

Neither House shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each House by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall be presented to the Governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of section ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

Sub-Section D—General Provisions

First: If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the Governor

may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such bill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

Second: The Board of Public Works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each House, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the Auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the Board of Public Works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The Board of Public Works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings, it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

Third: The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

Fourth: In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratified by the people, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the Governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

Revenues Applicable to Roads

52. Revenue from gasoline and other motor fuel excise and license taxation, motor vehicle registration and license taxes, and all other revenue derived from motor vehicles or motor fuels shall, after the deduction of statutory refunds and cost of administration and collection authorized by legislative appropriation, be appropriated and used solely for construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways, and also the payment of the interest and principal on all road bonds heretofore issued or which may be hereafter issued for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of public highways, and the payment of obligations incurred in the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways.

[This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, (Acts, Regular Session, 1941, p. 589) and ratified at the General Election November 3, 1942. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 228,828; Against ratification, 38,651; Majority, 190,177.]

Forestry

53. The Legislature may by general law define and classify forest lands and provide for cooperation by contract between the State and the owner in the planting, protection, and harvesting thereof. Forest lands embraced in any such contract may be exempted from all taxation or be taxed in such manner, including the imposition of a severance tax or charge as trees are harvested, as

the Legislature may from time to time provide. But any tax measure by valuation shall not exceed the aggregate rates authorized by section one of article ten of this Constitution.

[This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, (Acts, Regular Session, 1945, p. 640) and ratified at the General Election November 5, 1946. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 179,150; Against ratification, 148,104; Majority, 31,046.]

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

1. The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture and Attorney General, who shall be, *ex officio*, reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices, and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be *ex officio* Reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office, respectively shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, adopted June 3, 1933, Acts First Extraordinary Session 1933, p. 506; and was adopted at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 251,965; against ratification, 145,787; majority, 106,178.]

Election

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901, (Acts 1901, p. 459) and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 59,509; against ratification, 22,022; majority, 37,487.]

Certification of Election Returns—Contests

3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed to "the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each House of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both Houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed." For the vote on the adopting of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Eligibility

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected." For the vote of the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Chief Executive—Powers

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for, and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies—How Filled

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Executive May Remit Fines and Forfeitures

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital

punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprove or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-Chief of Military Forces

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called into the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Official Bond of State Officers

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

How Bills Become Laws

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the House in which it originated, which House shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that House agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that House, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each House shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

Respecting Appropriations of Monies

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor; if he disapproves the bill or any item of appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the House in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of a law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each House according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies in Other Executive Departments

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[The amendment to this section was proposed by Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line and by substitution of the word "prescribed" for the word "provided." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2 of this article.]

Executive Heads to Make Reports

18. The subordinate officers of the Executive Department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office, or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred; the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand; and the Attorney General, thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."]

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by Joint Resolution adopted February 13, 1901 (Act 1901, p. 459) and was ratified at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,280; against ratification, 23,513; majority, 32,767.]

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Department

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by Joint Resolution of March 6, 1879 (Acts 1879, p. 175) and ratified at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 57,941; against ratification, 34,270; majority, 23,671.]

Supreme Court of Appeals

2. The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of *four judges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

*The Supreme Court of Appeals now consists of five judges, under the provisions of the "Judicial Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution, and Acts 1903, ch. 19, amending and reenacting section 1 of chapter 113 of Warth's Code of 1899.

Scope of Jurisdiction

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, and prohibition. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment or qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator; or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy tolls or taxes; and, also in cases of *quo warranto*, *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *certiorari*, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has been a conviction for felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

Binding Authority of Decisions

4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

Reversal or Affirmance of Judgments

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal

6. A writ of error, *supersedeas*, or appeal shall be allowed only by the Supreme Court of Appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

Provisions for Filling Supreme Court Vacancies

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the Supreme Court of Appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Officers of Supreme Court

8. The officers of the Supreme Court of Appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges, thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

Terms of Supreme Court

9. There shall be at least two terms of the Supreme Court of Appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

Circuit Courts

10. The State shall be divided into *thirteen circuits. For the circuit hereinafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuit in which they may respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportioned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

Terms of Circuit Court

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

Circuit Court Jurisdiction

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by *mandamus*, prohibition and *certiorari*. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *quo warranto* and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or *supersedeas* may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whether supervisory, original, appellate or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

Division of State Into Circuits

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marion and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth; the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and

*Now twenty-seven.

Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth.

[By various acts of the Legislature authorized by section 14 following, the division of the State into circuits has been changed and the number increased to twenty-seven.]

Rearrangement of State Into Circuits

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any such session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

Special Terms and Judges of Circuit Courts

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit courts, where from any cause the judge shall fail to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

Provisions for Special Court Terms

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The *salary of a judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: *Provided*, That Ohio county may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowance shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession of law or hold any other office, appointment or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

How Judges May Be Removed

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both Houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodily infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two-thirds of all the members elected to each House must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each House. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

General Provisions—Clerk of Circuit Courts

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

*The "Judicial Amendment" proposed by Joint Resolution No. 6, adopted by the Legislature in 1901, providing that the Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges, who shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, was ratified at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; majority, 29,966.

Courts of Limited Jurisdiction

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly to the supreme court of appeals.

Regarding Participation in Civil War

20. No citizen of this State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable in any proceeding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgments or decrees heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

Parts of Common Law Effective

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of this State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

County Courts

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, except at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

Powers of County Courts

24. The county courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating

to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: *Provided*, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall in all cases of contest judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the regular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature under, and by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

Removal of Causes

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect, together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in, tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

Clerk of County Court

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Districting of County—Election of Justices of the Peace

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, and as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside

in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

Jurisdiction of Justice of the Peace

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpsit, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest, does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend throughout their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgment of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Courts

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such case all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

Incompatible Offices

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

2. There shall also be elected in each district, of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be for four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout the county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor, and surveyors of roads shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs—Consecutive Terms Prohibited

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff,

nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

Malfeasance and Misfeasance in Office

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided for in Constitution

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

7. The president of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand; nor shall any county from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county and voting on the question.

ARTICLE X

Taxation and Finance

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including live stock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the Legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property

by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty per cent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty per cent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the Legislature among the levying units of the State in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including live stock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the Legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the state now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property, may, by law, be exempt from taxation. The Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations.

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 6, 1932 (Acts Ex. Sess., 1932, Ch. 9, p. 16) and was ratified at the general election in 1932. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 335,482; against ratification, 43,931; majority, 291,551.]

Capitation Tax

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from the tax.

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Monies

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State; to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State, but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not to Be Granted in Certain Cases

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

Duties of County Authorities in Assessing Taxes

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per hundred dollars valuation except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, Etc.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax on all taxable property therein, in the ratio, as between the several classes or types of such taxable property, specified in section one of this Article, separate and apart from and in addition to all other taxes for all other purposes, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years. Such tax, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal on bonds issued by any school district not exceeding in the aggregate three per centum of such assessed value, may be levied outside the limits fixed by section one of this Article. *Provided*, that no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: *Provided*, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same."

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts, Regular Session, 1949, p. 716, ratified at the general election on November 7, 1950, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 340,054; Against ratification, 150,251; Majority, 189,803.]

Municipal Taxes to Be Uniform

9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

Corporate Liability for Indebtedness

2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any *bona fide* contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this state.

Rights of Stockholders

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

Street Railroads

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

6. The Legislature may provide by general law for the creation, organization and regulation of banking institutions.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 16, 1937, (Acts 1937, p. 581), and was ratified at the general election in 1938. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 139,985; against ratification, 62,241; majority, 77,744.]

Railroads

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor

of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads, Public Highways

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charge for the transportation of passengers and freights, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discrimination between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations to Be Established

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of the trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines—Legislative Permission

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

State Superintendent of Free Schools

2. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor: *Provided*: The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.

County Superintendents

3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the State of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir; and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporation; all monies that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund"; *Provided*, That all the taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

Support of Free Schools

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

School Districts

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

Levies for School Purposes

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlements with the county court, which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

Certain Acts Prohibited

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvement; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provision for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said States at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during the possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all

States taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865; and have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned, be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

Former Owner's Privilege

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale within two years thereafter.

Land Books—Taxes

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with State, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfeited and the title vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with State, county, and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, That such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with State tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with State tax on any part of the land, such part thereof shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the

expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted January 22, 1934 (Acts Second Ex. Sess. 1933, p. 583) and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 257,090; against ratification, 177,796; majority, 79,294.]

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention until at least one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either House of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each House be agreed to on its third reading, by two-thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the Journal, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting upon the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as a part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Judicial Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1901, p. 462). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; majority, 29,966.]

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit court shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 28 (Acts 1901, p. 465). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,694; against ratification, 24,763; majority, 31,931.]

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest of said fund, shall be used for the support of the free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1919, p. 502). Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689, against ratification, 130,569; majority, 118,120.]

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the State, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17 (Acts 1927, p. 361). Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; against ratification, 92,885; majority, 267,712.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Secondary Road Bonds Amendment of 1948

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 5. (Acts 1947, p. 727.) Ratified November 2, 1948. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 475,272; against ratification, 163,579; majority, 311,693.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate fifty million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February fifteenth, one thousand nine hundred nineteen, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, and Senate Joint Resolution No. 17, adopted by the Legislature at

the regular session, one thousand nine hundred twenty-seven, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction, or for assisting in building and construction a system of state secondary roads and highways.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Veterans' Bonus Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, (Acts 1949, p. 686). Ratified November 7, 1950. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 431,979; against ratification, 139,445; majority, 292,534.]

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, not to exceed in the aggregate ninety million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated solely for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of World War I and World War II. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States in World War I between the sixth day of April, one thousand nine hundred seventeen, and the eleventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred eighteen, both dates inclusive, or in World War II between the seventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred forty-one, and the second day of September, one thousand nine hundred forty-five, both dates inclusive, or in both such wars, who were *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such forces, and who within the periods specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unremarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of the amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on non-intoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Legislative Amendment

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, (Acts 1953, p. 612), Ratified November 2, 1954. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; against ratification, 137,624; majority, 53,253.]

The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Notwith-

standing any other provisions of the Constitution, the board of public works shall, on and after the effective date hereof, submit to the Legislature an annual budget prepared as otherwise required by the Constitution.

The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-five and every second year thereafter shall not exceed sixty days, and the regular session held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-six and every second year thereafter shall not exceed thirty days. During any thirty-day session the Legislature shall consider no other business than the annual budget bill, except such as may be stated in a proclamation issued by the Governor at least ten days prior to the convening of the session, or such business as may be stated by the Legislature on its own motion in a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house. All regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

Each member of the Legislature shall receive for his services the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars a year, and expenses for one round trip in connection with any session, at the rate of ten cents a mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route: *Provided*, That if party caucuses are held in advance of the date of the assembly of the Legislature in odd-numbered years for the purpose of selecting candidates for officers of the two houses, expenses for travel at the rate herein fixed shall be allowed each member for one round trip in connection with attending such caucus. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate shall each receive an additional compensation of five dollars a day for each day served as presiding officer. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the compensation herein provided for shall be paid to each member of the Legislature on and after the adoption of this amendment.

Korean Veterans' Bonus Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, Acts, Regular Session, 1955, p. 572 and ratified at the General Election, November 6, 1956. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 476,936; Against ratification, 88,968; Majority, 387,968.]

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, for the following purposes:

(1) The paying of a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who served during the Korean conflict. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand nine hundred fifty, and the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred fifty-three, both dates inclusive, who were *bona fide* residents of the state of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such service, and who within the

period specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this state when application for payment is made: Any unmarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

The principal amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose provided in paragraph (1) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the ninety million dollars bonds authorized by the veterans bonus amendment submitted by chapter nineteen of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia of one thousand nine hundred forty-nine, regular session, and ratified by the people of West Virginia at the general election held on the seventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred fifty (hereinafter referred to as "Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty"), which shall not have been issued on the date of the ratification of this amendment by the people of West Virginia: *Provided, however,* That such bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (1) above may be funded or refunded at any time in the manner provided in paragraph (2) below.

(2) The funding or refunding of all or any part of the bonds heretofore issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty. Said bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty may be so funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty mature or are callable prior to maturity.

The principal amount of bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (2) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

Such bonds for the purposes authorized in paragraphs (1) and (2) above may be issued from time to time as separate issues for such purposes or as combined issues for such purposes.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal and interest on such bonds until such principal and interest on such bonds is finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds. The additional taxes on cigarettes and nonintoxicating

beer and additional charges on the sale of each bottle of alcoholic liquor, provided for in chapter six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, shall continue to be pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or bonds issued pursuant to this amendment to fund or refund such bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty: *Provided, however,* That upon the funding or refunding of all outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or the deposit in trust of sufficient funds to pay all the principal of and interest on such outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty to their respective dates of maturity or to the first date upon which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, the taxes and charges provided for in said chapter six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, may be pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on any bonds issued under any of the provisions of this amendment.

Property qualification amendment, providing for collection of taxes on money, notes, accounts receivable, and bonds, at a rate not to exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars actual value. Rejected. Vote for, 111,927; against, 159,653.

1928

Good roads amendment, providing for a bond issue of thirty-five million dollars for the construction of good roads. Adopted. Vote for 360,597; against, 92,885.

Legislative amendment, providing for a legislative session of sixty days. adopted. Vote for, 275,374; against, 85,123.

1930

Lieutenant-governor amendment, providing for the election of a lieutenant-governor. Rejected. Vote for, 48,781; against, 172,703 .

Probate commissioner amendment, providing for the appointment of a probate commissioner in each county. Rejected. Vote for, 50,674; against, 173,447.

Budget amendment, providing for an amendment to section 51. Article VI. Rejected. Vote for, 50,226; against, 171,464.

Circuit Court amendment, providing for the division of the State into circuits by the Legislature. Rejected. Vote for, 49,902; against, 170,220.

Tax limitation amendment, providing for the classification of property for taxation purposes. Adopted. Vote for, 335,482; against 43,931.

1934

Prohibition amendment, providing for the repeal of the prohibition amendment. Adopted. Vote for, 276,978; against, 237,559.

Capitation tax amendment, providing that the payment of capitation tax may be made a qualification for voting in elections. Rejected. Vote for, 124,232; against, 313,330.

Lame duck amendment, providing that terms of the Governor and other members of the Executive Department shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. Adopted. Vote for, 251,965, against, 145,787.

Land book assessment amendment, providing for the separate assessment of individual interests in lands. Adopted. Vote for, 257,090; against, 177,796.

1936

Garnishee amendment, providing for the garnishment of wages of officers, agents, or employees of the State, including any subdivision thereof and municipality therein. Adopted. Vote for, 161,386; against, 61,472.

Municipal home rule amendment, providing uniform law for incorporation of municipalities with population in excess of two thousand, and for amendment of existing charters by municipal corporations. Adopted. Vote for, 150,370; against, 59,580.

1938

Banking institutions amendment, providing for the creation, organization and regulation of banking institutions. Adopted. Vote for, 139,985; against, 62,241.

1940

Judiciary amendment, providing for the establishment by the Legislature of a summary court in each county in the State. Rejected. Vote for, 133,256, against, 300,979.

Elective Officers amendment, providing for the election of Governor, Auditor and Attorney General and for appointment by the Governor of the heads of such executive departments as may be established by law. Rejected. Vote for, 86,402; against, 311,096.

Budget bill amendment, relating to the biennial budget bill. Rejected. Vote for, 95,094; against, 298,333.

1942

Good Roads amendment, limiting the use of all revenue derived from motor vehicles and motor fuels to road purposes. Adopted. Vote for, 228,828; against, 38,651.

1946

School amendment, removing State Superintendent of Schools from Board of Public Works. Rejected. Vote for, 174,156; against, 181,606.

Forestry amendment, providing classification and contract between State and owner in the planting, protection and harvesting of forest lands. Ratified. Vote for, 179,150; against, 148,104.

1948

Road bond amendment, providing for the issuance and sale of \$50,000,000.00 of bonds for the construction of secondary roads. Ratified. Vote for, 475,272; against, 163,579.

1950

Veterans' Bonus amendment, providing for the issuance and sale of state bonds, not to exceed in the aggregate ninety million dollars. Ratified. Vote for, 431,979; against, 139,445.

School Bond amendment, providing for the issuance of bonds by school districts, not exceeding in the aggregate three percent of the assessed valuation, for school buildings and other school purposes. Ratified. Vote for, 340,054; against, 150,251.

Compensation of Members of the Legislature Amendment, providing increase for their services. Rejected: Vote for, 169,647; against, 234,938.

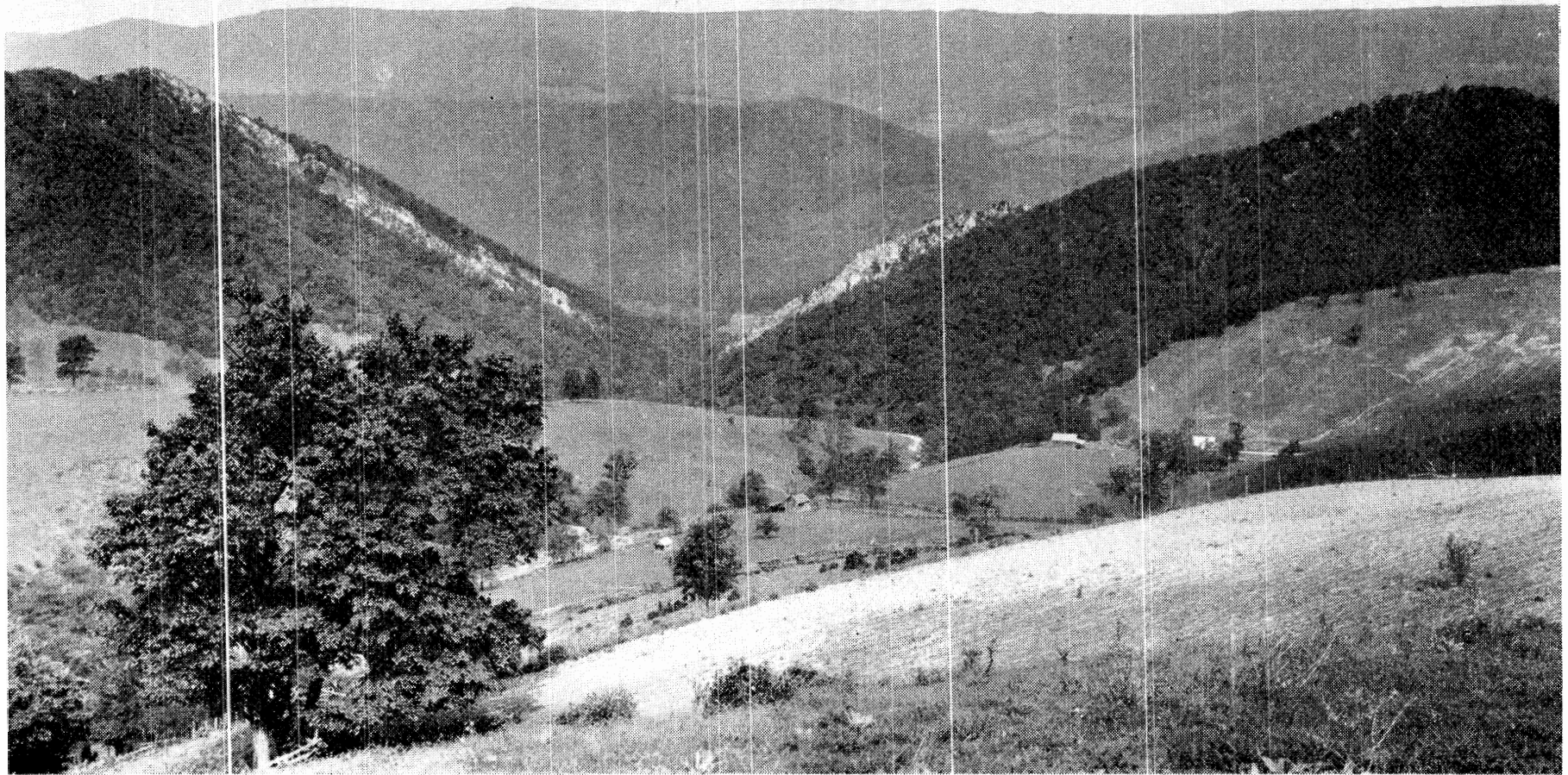

DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER
President of the United States

DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, (R), of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, was born in Denison, Texas, October 14, 1890; son of David J. and Ida Elizabeth (Stover) Eisenhower; attended public schools in Abilene, Kansas; B. S. United States Military Academy, 1915; graduated Infantry Tank School, 1922; honor graduate Command and General Staff School, 1926; Army War College, 1928; Army Industrial College, 1933; married Mamie Geneva Doud, July 1, 1916; children: Dwight Doud (deceased), John Sheldon Doud; on receiving commission as second lieutenant of Infantry at West Point in 1915, assigned to 19th Infantry; advanced through the grades to lieutenant general, 1942; general, February 1943; and General of the Army (temporary), December 20, 1944; and permanent in 1946; served as lieutenant colonel, Tank Corps, during World War I; assistant executive officer, Office of Assistant Secretary of War, 1929-33; Office of Chief of Staff, 1933-35; Assistant to General Douglas MacArthur in Philippines, 1935-40; Chief of Staff 3d Division and, later, IX Corps, 1940-41; Chief of Staff, Third Army, 1941; and following Louisiana maneuvers, named Chief of War Plans Division, War Department General Staff; then Assistant Chief of Staff, in charge of Operations Division; commanded Allied forces landing in North Africa November 8, 1942, becoming Commander-in-Chief, all Allied forces in Northwest Africa following February; named Supreme Commander, Allied Expeditionary Forces, December 31, 1943, and planned and coordinated land, sea, and air invasion of Normandy which occurred June 6, 1944; May 8, 1945, accepted unconditional surrender of Germany; Commander United States occupation forces in Germany; Chief of Staff, United States Army, November 19, 1945, to February 7, 1948; President of Columbia University, June 7, 1948, to January 19, 1953; took leave from Columbia from December 16, 1950, to serve as Supreme Allied Commander, Europe; concerned with the integration of the defense forces of the North Atlantic Treaty nations; nominated for President on first ballot of Republican National Convention at Chicago, July 11, 1952; resigned from Army same day; elected President November 4, 1952; reelected President November 6, 1956; member Presbyterian Church.

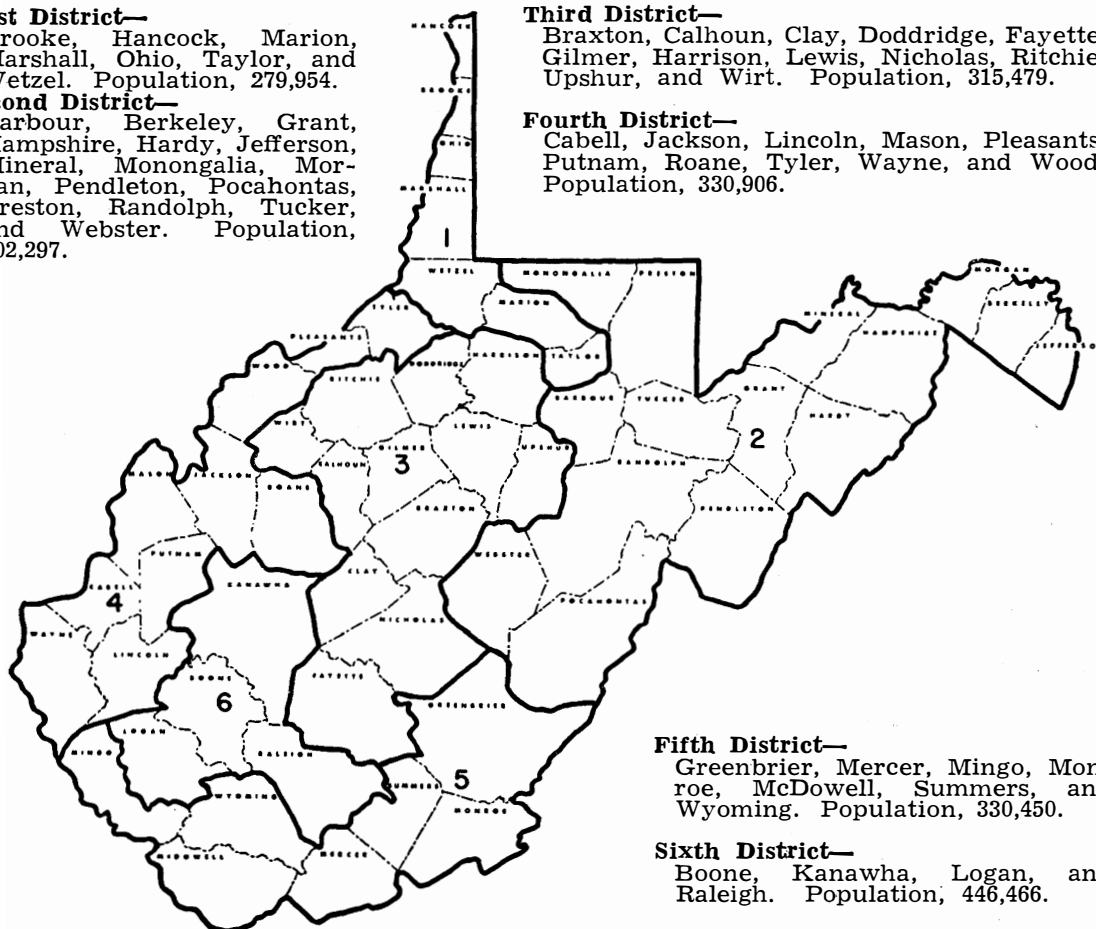

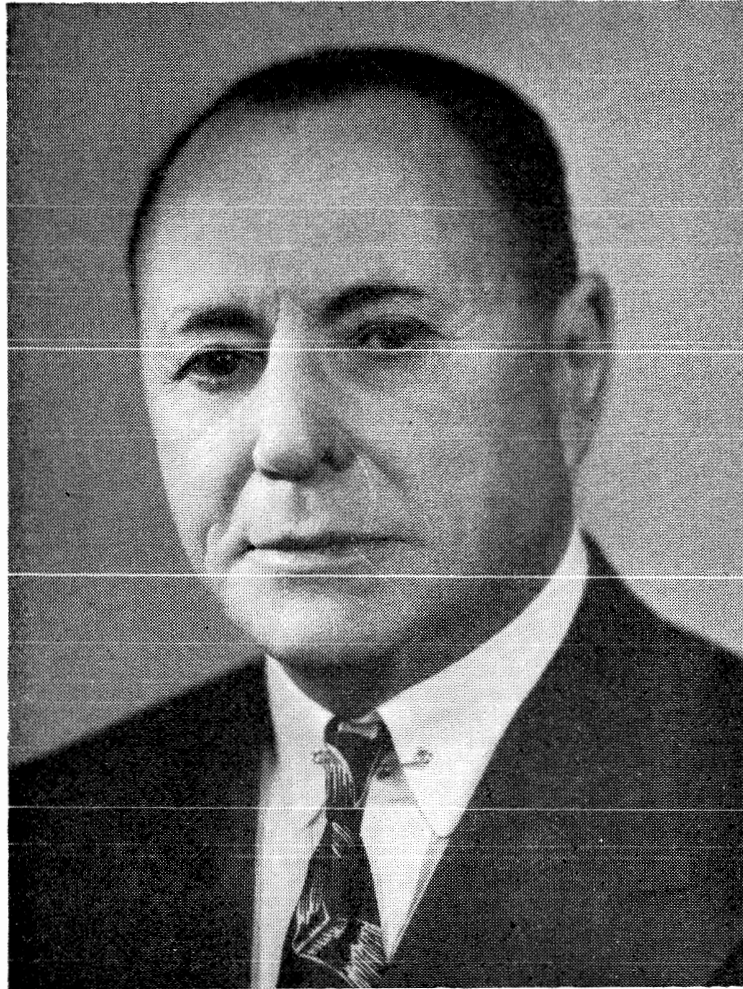

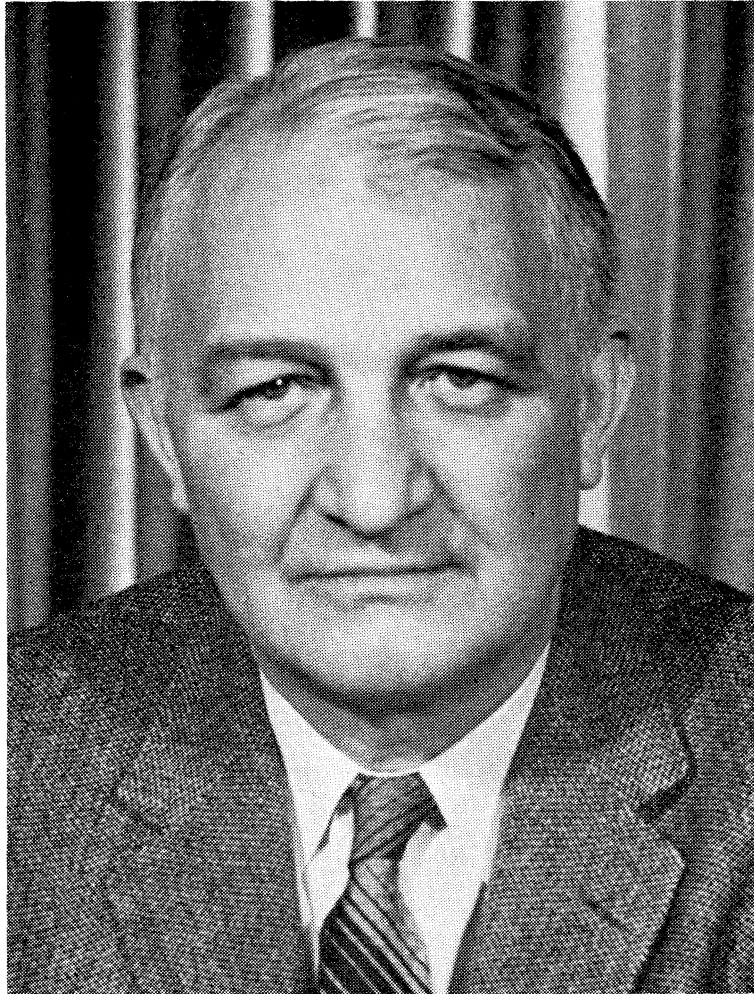

MATTHEW MANSFIELD NEELY, (D), of Fairmont, twenty-first governor of West Virginia, was born at Grove, Doddridge County; son of Alfred and Mary (Morris) Neely; graduate of West Virginia University; admitted to Marion County Bar in 1902 and since that time has been engaged in the practice of law in Fairmont; married October 21, 1903, to Miss Alberta Ramage, of Fairmont; three children—Alfred R., John Champ Neely and Mrs. Harold S. Pettit; served as enlisted man in the 1st West Virginia Volunteer Infantry throughout the Spanish-American War; mayor of Fairmont, 1908-1910; clerk of the House of Delegates, 1911-1913; elected to Sixty-third Congress, October 14, 1913, to fill an unexpired term; reelected to Sixty-fourth, Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth Congresses; elected United States Senator in 1922; defeated for reelection in Hoover landslide in 1928; elected to the United States Senate in 1930 by a majority of more than 133,000, the greatest to that date ever cast for any candidate on any ticket in West Virginia; reelected to the Senate in 1936 by a still greater majority. He resigned from the Senate January 12, 1941, to become the Governor of the State. In 1944 he was again elected to Congress and returned to duty in the House of Representatives January 16, 1945—the day after the completion of his gubernatorial term; elected United States Senator for the term beginning January 3, 1949; reelected United States Senator for the term beginning January 3, 1955.



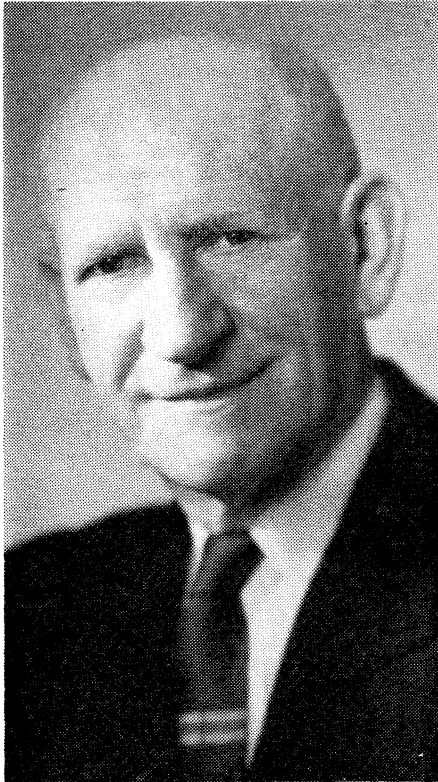
CHAPMAN REVERCOMB, (R), of Charleston, was born July 20, 1895, at Covington, Virginia; son of George Anderson and Elizabeth (Chapman) Revercomb; educated in the public schools, Washington and Lee University and University of Virginia; graduated from the University of Virginia with the degree of LL.B.; married, 1925, to Sara Hughes, of Ashland, Virginia; four children, William, George, Ann, and James; Presbyterian; engaged in the practice of law; enlisted in United States Army in 1917 and served for the duration of the first World War; member American Bar Association, West Virginia Bar Association, Charleston Bar Association, American Legion, Elks and Moose; former President of the Young Republican League of West Virginia; former member of the Republican State Committee; Chairman of the State Judicial Convention of 1936; elected to the United States Senate on November 3, 1942, for the term ending January 3, 1949; re-elected to the United States Senate on November 6, 1956, for unexpired term ending January 3, 1959; member Senate Public Works Committee, Government Operations Committee, and Permanent Senate Investigations Sub-Committee.



ARCH A. MOORE, JR., (R), of Glen Dale, Marshall County, born in Moundsville, April 16, 1923, son of Arch A. and Genevieve (Jones) Moore; educated in the public schools of Moundsville; attended Lafayette College, Easton, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia University, graduate of the latter institution in 1948, A.B. degree in Political Science and in 1951 the L.L.B. in Law from the College of Law, West Virginia University; since 1951 actively engaged in the practice of law in Moundsville; a junior member of the law firm of Moore & Moore; married to Shelley S. Riley, August 11, 1949; three children, Arch A., III, Shelley Wellons, and Lucy St. Clair; served in the United States Army as an infantryman from 1943 to 1946; seriously wounded in action in Germany, 1944; holder of the Purple Heart Medal; active in American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations; elected to West Virginia Legislature in 1952; past vice president of the West Virginia Bar Association; member of West Virginia State Bar and American Bar Associations; member of Phi Delta Phi, International Legal Fraternity, and Beta Theta Pi social fraternity; active in civic and fraternal organizations in Moundsville; past chairman, Mohawk District Boy Scouts of America; member of Moundsville Rotary Club, Eagles, Elks, Moose fraternal organizations; member of the Board of Stewards of Simpson Methodist Church, Moundsville; elected Congressman from the First Congressional District of West Virginia on November 6, 1956; member of the House Judiciary Committee Eighty-fifth Congress.

HARLEY O. STAGGERS, (D), of Keyser, Mineral County, was born August 3, 1907, son of Jacob and Frances (Cumberledge) Staggers, attended public schools of Mineral County, graduated with an A.B. degree from Emory and Henry College in 1931; and received honorary Doctor of Laws 1953; graduate work at Duke University; high school coach and teacher for two years; head coach at Potomac State College, Keyser, for two years; sheriff of Mineral County from 1937 to 1941; served nearly four years in United States Naval Air Corps as a navigator; member of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, Amvets, Elks, and Knights of Pythias; West Virginia Farm Bureau, Loyal Order of Moose, and Lions; past president of the West Virginia State Moose Association; former district governor of West Virginia Lions Clubs; married Mary V. Casey, of Keyser; father of six children, Margaret Ann, Mary Katherine, Frances Susan, Elizabeth Ellen, Harley O., Jr., and Daniel Casey; elected to the Eighty-first Congress on November 2, 1948; reelected to Eighty-second Congress November 7, 1950; reelected to Eighty-third Congress November 4, 1952; reelected to Eighty-fourth Congress November 2, 1954; and reelected to Eighty-fifth Congress November 6, 1956.





CLEVELAND M. BAILEY, (D), of Clarksburg; was born on a farm near St. Marys, Pleasants County, July 15, 1886; attended West Liberty College; graduated from Geneva College, Geneva, Pennsylvania; married and is the father of six children. Member of Barnes Memorial Baptist Church; Elks Lodge; Knights of Pythias, and Kiwanis Club; District Supervisor of Harrison County Schools; Associated Press Editor of the Clarksburg Exponent; Assistant State Auditor of West Virginia March 4, 1933 to May 1941. Serving as Budget Director of West Virginia when elected to the 79th Congress, November 7, 1944; elected to 81st Congress, November 2, 1948; reelected to 82nd Congress, November 7, 1950; reelected to 83rd Congress, November 4, 1952; reelected to 84th Congress, November 2, 1954. Member of the Committee on Education and Labor. Reelected to 85th Congress November 6, 1956. Chairman of the subcommittee on Education.

DR. WILL E. NEAL, (R), of Huntington, was born in Lawrence County, Ohio, October 14, 1875; son of Thomas J. and Alice G. U. S. ARMY ENGINEER DISTRICT, HUNTINGTON CORPS OF ENGINEERS

The U. S. Army Engineer District, Huntington, West Virginia, Corps of Engineers, has a two-fold mission in the State of West Virginia, including civil works and military construction responsibility.

The area encompassed under the Civil Works Program is defined on the basis of watershed drainage, being that stretch between mile 109.0, Ohio River, located downstream from Moundsville, W. Va., to mile 409.3, Ohio River, located near Aberdeen, Ohio.

Congress has delegated to the Corps of Engineers responsibility for the development, construction, operation and maintenance of navigation facilities, flood control structures, and related improvements.

Nineteen of the forty-six navigation dams on the Ohio River border the State of West Virginia, and include three high lift dams on the Kanawha River and six navigation structures on the Monongahela River.

Improvement of the navigation facilities include construction of modern high lift structures to replace existing obsolete dams. West Virginia will benefit by the construction of the first three of such structures to be started on the Ohio River, one at Greenup, Kentucky, the pool of which will extend to Gallipolis Locks and Dam, New Cumberland Locks and Dam, which will replace existing Locks 7, 8, and 9 on the Ohio River, and Markland Locks and Dam, which will replace existing Locks 35, 36, 37, 38 and 39, Ohio River. Construction of Hilderbrand Locks and Dam on the Monongahela River was initiated in April 1956.

Flood control reservoirs within the State constructed by the Corps of Engineers are Bluestone Reservoir on New River near Hinton, and Tygart Reservoir on Tygart River near Grafton, W. Va. Sutton Dam and Reservoir on the Elk River near Sutton, W. Va., is presently under construction.

Floodwalls completed by the Corps of Engineers are located at Parkersburg, Point Pleasant, Huntington and Ceredo-Kenova, West Virginia. An additional floodwall is under construction at the present for the protection of Ridgeley, W. Va. and Cumberland, Md., on the North Branch of the Potomac River. In addition, several completed channel improvement projects have reduced or alleviated flood damage along the smaller tributaries of the main rivers within the State.

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

United States Marine Corps activities in West Virginia include five organized reserve companies with a total authorized strength of 899 officers and men, and a regular Marine Corps recruiting station in South Charleston with sub-offices located in nine major West Virginia cities.

All of the state's present Marine reserve units were organized during and after the Korean conflict. There were two Marine Reserve companies in the state prior to Korea. Both were activated after hostilities broke out there in June, 1950.

Each reserve unit has a staff of regular Marine officers and enlisted men to instruct, support, and advise. This staff is called the Inspector-Instructor staff.

Marine reserve units are an active part in any community. They are always ready for parades, color guards, funeral details, and other civic functions where military personnel can be of service.

The annual "Toys for Tots" campaign is one of the proudest achievements of each Reserve unit. The Marine reserves collect, repair and distribute toys to thousands of children in West Virginia each Christmas. Over 100,000 toys were thus distributed last year in West Virginia, and the total for the nation was in excess of 5,000,000 toys.

The Federal Reformatory for Women is situated in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains in Summers and Monroe Counties. It was established by Act of Congress June 7, 1924, and the buildings and grounds have a value in excess of \$2,000,000. It was designed to take care of all women Federal sentenced prisoners in the United States and the insular possessions and has a capacity of 500. There are fifteen buildings housing inmates, a hospital, administration building, a garment shop, laundry, dressmaking and arts, school building and auditorium, home economics department, crafts, cannery, storehouse, shops and

an extensive farm with modern dairy and truck gardens. The Enabling Act specified that each inmate should be given training that would fit her to be self-supporting on her return to society, and the entire program of the institution is based upon this plan for rehabilitation. An intelligent and sincere attempt is made to supplant the old-time theory of punishment with a program of cleanliness, industry and education in citizenship. Classification and casework are highly developed to provide for adequate training within the institution and proper placement in jobs after release.

The Newton D. Baker General Hospital of the United States Army was taken over by the Veterans Administration and opened for patients on November 15, 1946. The hospital is now known as the Veterans Administration Center.

The reservation comprises approximately 187 acres of land, 100 buildings, its own water and sewage systems. It has spur trackage from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for freight deliveries and passenger transportation is available by bus from many of the surrounding communities.

Veterans Administration Center has an authorized capacity of 900 hospital beds and 500 domiciliary beds. The hospital beds are proportioned as follows: 350 for Tuberculosis Service, 350 for General Medical and Surgical Service, and 200 for Intermediate Service.

The majority of the buildings comprising the hospital plant are connected by enclosed corridors. This group includes the administrative offices, all of the clinics, the operating suite, twenty-one wards, domiciliary barracks, mess halls, recreation halls, canteen, library, and warehouse.

The Veterans Employment Representative is attached to the staff of the public employment service in the State. He is administratively responsible to the Secretary of Labor through the Chief of the Veterans Employment Service for the execution of the Secretary's veterans' placement policies through the public employment service in the State. In cooperation with the public employment service staff in the State, he shall—

“(a) be functionally responsible for the supervision of the registration of veterans in local employment offices for suitable types of employment and for placement of veterans in employment;

“(c) promote the interest of employers in employing veterans;

The Governor’s Committee is affiliated with the President’s Committee on Employment of the Physically Handicapped, and promotes programs in the interest of handicapped persons seeking employment opportunities within the state.

Federal, State and private agencies, whose activities are coordinated in serving handicapped persons and disabled veterans, cooperate fully in effecting programs such as “National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week”, High School Essay Contests (pertaining to the handicapped); Awards of Merit and Outstanding Service; Physicians’ Awards; Handicapped Employer Awards; high school poster contests; and community planning for handicapped groups.

Participating actively are the following agencies; Veterans Administration, Department of Veterans Affairs, organized labor, Division Vocational Rehabilitation, Department Employment Security, State Executive Department, veterans organizations, and the Veterans Employment Service.

The Committee Chairman serves at the will and pleasure of the Governor. Individual members recommended by local community committees are either reappointed or newly appointed each year by the Chief Executive.

West Virginia has one of the largest state committees in the nation and its members are representative of Federal, State and municipal government, industry, labor, civic, veterans, fraternal, medical, ministerial, women, and other groups throughout the state.

The committee is a non-dues paying organization and at times when finances are necessary for contest prizes the required amounts are secured from generous employers who have been responsible for so many successful programs.

The Governor’s Committee attempts to secure an outstanding and well known speaker for its annual meeting, usually held in September, and prior to NEPH Week, at which time all members are notified and invited to attend.

Congress has determined that the first full week in each October shall be observed as “National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week” throughout the Nation. This week’s observance is intended to be a reminder to those employers who remain reluctant in employing handicapped workers. National, state and local media of press, radio and television have carried the message of the handicapped in an excellent coverage of the various programs.

The West Virginia National Guard is authorized and governed by Article I, Chapter 15, of the West Virginia Code and is constituted as both State and Federal force by authority of the National Defense Act approved June 3, 1916, as amended to January 1, 1945, inclusive. The National Guard is a reserve component of the Army of the United States and is composed of officers and enlisted men who volunteer for duty and are qualified in accordance with Federal and State regulations governing same. In time of peace, the National Guard is a State force, controlled by the Adjutant General as a principal military representative of the Commander-in-Chief. The Adjutant General issues, in the name of the Governor, all orders to the National Guard, disburses funds appropriated by the State Legislature for this purpose and acts as Chief of Staff for the Commander-in-Chief. In the event of war, insurrection, rebellion, invasion, tumult or a case of imminent danger of said events, or in the event of public disaster, the Governor has the power to order the West Virginia National Guard or any part thereof, into the active service of the State and to cause them to perform such duty as he shall deem proper. The National Guard is equipped and paid by the Federal Government, but must meet certain organizational and training standards to qualify for Federal recognition. When Congress declares a national emergency and authorizes the use of armed forces requiring troops in excess of those in the Regular Army, the President of the United States may order the National Guard into the active military service of the United States. Initial enlistments in the National Guard are for a period of three years with reenlistments authorized for either one or three years.

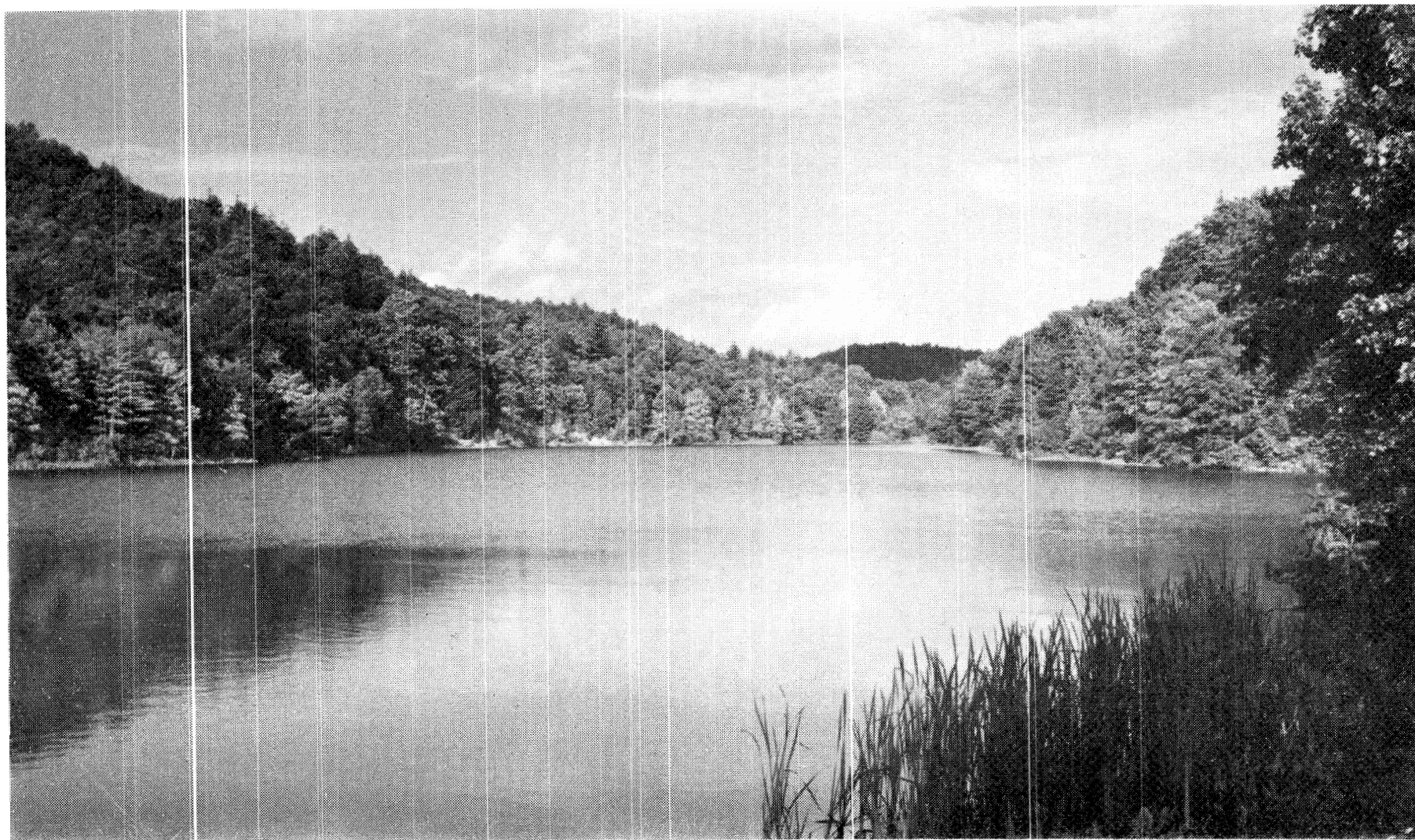

WEST VIRGINIA CHILDREN'S HOME

Elkins

Superintendent: Guy H. Bambrick. Financial Secretary: Betty Lou Bambrick. Children: 69.

The West Virginia Children's Home, located in Elkins, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1899 and formally opened in 1911. In 1935 an additional unit was built to the two-story brick structure located on the 20-acre tract of land. The purpose of the Home is to provide for orphaned and neglected children between the ages of six to twenty-one years and such other children of like age who may be surrendered by the Department of Public Assistance or court order to be kept, maintained, educated and trained until they can be placed in foster homes, returned to their homes or released at the proper age to adequately care for themselves. In addition to the original 20 acres, the institution now owns 10 acres of farm land located on Leading Creek, and 117 acres, known as the Darby Memorial Farm, situated at the head of Woolwine Hollow. This acreage furnishes vegetables and grazing for stock cattle. At the present time a two-room school is operated on the county unit plan, under the supervision of the Randolph County Board of Education. A close cooperation between the Department of Education of Davis and Elkins College and the faculty of our Elementary school to provide every educational advantage for the curriculum. Religious training is provided by the local churches and the children are transported to Sunday School and Church services each Sunday morning. An open air swimming pool with a beautiful concrete basin with circulatory chlorinating system and an electric lift pump, attracts every child to its waters during the months of operation. The 1956 Legislature enacted a bill, moving and integrating institutions which come under the supervision of the Board of Control. At the present time there are eight colored children in the home, and no problems have resulted from this integration. The sanitary conditions of the Home are excellent and the health of the children very good.

THE WEST VIRGINIA HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED MEN AND WOMEN

Huntington

Superintendent: H. D. Hazelwood. Financial Secretary: Frances Joyce.

The West Virginia Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Men and Women, Huntington, was until recently located at McKendree, Fayette County, and was established by an act of the Legislature in 1923. The home was first located in Charleston, Kanawha County, and in 1929 was moved to Huntington for the first time. In September of 1941 the institution was moved to McKendree, Fayette County, where it remained until July of this year.

The institution is now being housed in the buildings formerly occupied by the West Virginia Colored Children's Home and the West Virginia Industrial Home for Colored Girls. Although the two groups of buildings are widely separated half of the population will be housed in each group.

A large farm will be maintained in an effort to produce some of the food necessary for consumption at the institution.

WEST VIRGINIA TRAINING SCHOOL

St. Marys

Superintendent: Leopoldo Hernandez, M.D.. Resident Children: 400.

The West Virginia Training School is located three miles north of St. Marys on State Route 2. It was established in 1921 by an act of the Legislature. The

property consists of 694 acres part of which is under cultivation. The School is operated for the purpose of providing complete care for the mentally deficient and retarded child. Medical and psychiatric care is offered along with training in the school room. It is recognized that some children will continue to need the protection of a structured environment indefinitely. This is true not because they are "hopeless" or "useless", but because their potential abilities can be utilized and recognized only by those specially trained to understand their problems. Located on these grounds are: an Administration Building, a Children's Cottage Ward, one large Dormitory Building and a Staff Apartment Building of twenty-seven rooms. It has a staff of 120 people. A complete new water system was completed last year.

CORRECTIONAL

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR GIRLS

Industrial

Superintendent: Emma Houchins. Business Manager: (Vacancy)
Capacity: 200. Enrollment: 145.

West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls is located one mile west of Salem, on U. S. Route 50. It was established by an act of the Legislature on February 18, 1897 and formally opened May 5, 1899. It is built on a 72-acre tract of which 38 acres were donated by the citizens of Salem.

From Jones Cottage, the first building, the plant has grown to include the following: McCullough Cottage in 1905; Silver Hall Cottage in 1914; Sutton Cottage in 1928; and Ava Stanard Cottage in 1942. The Administration Building also built in 1942, includes offices and visiting rooms on the first floor. Living quarters for the Superintendent and Business Manager, together with guest suite comprise the second floor. The plant also includes the school building erected in 1915, which is called the Johnston School, with a very modern gymnasium completed in 1951. A large four-temperature storage building was completed in 1953. The Home also has its own clinic.

The girls receive standard elementary and accredited first class high school training in the very fine and well planned school program. Classes are offered from the first grade through the twelfth grade. The school is under the close supervision of the State Department of Education, Harrison County School officials and Salem College. The high school has operated as a first class high school since 1937 and has been used by Salem College as a laboratory school for their high school student teachers since 1950. Some of the courses offered are food, clothing, nutrition, home planning, English, journalism, library training, algebra, mathematics, business training, art, music, physical education, history, civics, sociology, biology and geography. To date 266 girls have been graduated from high school and 625 from eighth grade. Besides the new modern gymnasium the school building includes a well equipped practice kitchen, well stocked library with good selection of magazines, newspapers, fiction and reference books, auditorium with seating capacity of 270, and a movie projector for showing 16 MM films, film strip projector and screen. Money has been appropriated by the Legislature to build and equip two new modern cottages to house 25 girls each. These will take the place of one of the older cottages which is classed unsafe.

The girls receive domestic training by actual practice in the cottages where they live. They also receive religious training with chapel services conducted by a minister each Sunday. A program of rehabilitation is being carried out through the carefully planned work of the school, the dormitories in which the girls live, and the administration of the institution.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR BOYS**Grafton**

Superintendent: William Rollins. Business Manager: Rufus L. Yost. Enrollment: 280.

West Virginia Industrial School for Boys is located at Pruntytown, two miles west of Grafton, on U. S. Route 50. It was established by an act of Legislature in 1889 and was formally opened July 21, 1891. In addition to the principal school buildings which are located on the main campus, consisting of approximately 50 acres, the school owns and operates a farm of approximately 1,900 acres, on which there are located numerous modern farm buildings. The boys who work on the farm are taught the most modern methods of farming with the use of motorized up-to-date equipment. Fifty registered Brown Swiss dairy cows afford an opportunity to a limited number of boys to learn first hand the management of a dairy. The school also has an approved herd of Hereford cattle for beef, as well as turkeys, chickens and Berkshire hogs.

In the field of vocational trades the following are offered: Painting, plumbing, barbering, tailoring, printing, laundering, wood-working, canning, auto mechanics and carpentry. An elementary and junior high school are maintained on approved State standards for the benefit of all the boys. Those under sixteen years of age are required to attend the Academic School for a term of nine months each year. A well-planned recreation and physical education program operates under the supervision of qualified men. A new physical education building with provision for an inside swimming pool has now been completed. A social service department classifies each boy upon his reception, presents him for parole, and maintains liaison between County and State authorities. As much as possible the boys are segregated in cottages according to age and seriousness of the offense for which committed. An honor system has been set up for the benefit of the boys and it is working well. There is an active Boy Scout Troop and two 4-H clubs. A Drum and Bugle Corps consisting of 40 boys has been organized. The Little Mirror, a monthly publication, is published by the class in printing. A full-time Chaplain trained for his work offers religious instruction in the Academic School and holds a weekly religious service for the boys. He also performs work in the field of counseling.

PENAL**WEST VIRGINIA PENITENTIARY****Moundsville**

Warden: E. H. Tucker. Business Manager: Harry L. Chapman. Inmates: 1,313. Prisoners assigned to Camp Fairchance and other institutions: 185. Total: 1498.

West Virginia Penitentiary, located in the City of Moundsville, just off State Route 2, was established in 1866 by an act of the Legislature. The Penitentiary itself is a six-acre enclosure on a ten-acre tract of land surrounded by a solid wall of hand-cut sandstone, 675 x 395 feet, 24 feet high, 7 feet wide at base, tapering to 28 inches at top, on which is a stone walk-way 42 inches wide. Aimed at reducing the hazards of involuntary idleness, several prison industries have been developed through authority of the 1939 Legislature. These shops are now making commodities for which there is a constant demand in the prison and other state institutions. None of the products manufactured are being sold on the open market. Also contributing greatly to relief of idleness is utilization of prisoners on road construction projects. The 1947 Legislature authorized separate management and control of the West Virginia Medium Security Prison at Huttonsville. The West Virginia State Prison for Women has been established at Pence Springs; therefore, all female inmates have been transferred to the new institution.

A new prison honor camp has been established outside the prison walls, with facilities for housing 200 trusty inmates, thus relieving overcrowded conditions.

In recent years a vocational and educational program has been established. Prison inmates may now acquire a High School Equivalency Diploma, and receive training in a number of vocations.

A section of the new cell block which has been under construction for several years, will house 320 men. The entire cell block, when completed, will house 640 men and will help alleviate the crowded conditions of the old prison.

The West Virginia State Industries make several articles which are of vital use to other institutions. These articles are of high grade and are for sale to state, county and city officials throughout the state.

MEDIUM SECURITY PRISON

Huttonsville

Warden: Howard Perine. Business Manager: James L. English. Inmates: 500.

The Medium Security Prison is located on a farm near Huttonsville and is 18 miles south of Elkins on U. S. Routes 219 and 250. It was established by an act of the Legislature in 1937 and was designed to relieve over-crowding at the West Virginia Penitentiary and at the same time aid in the rehabilitation of prisoners. The majority of the inmates are employed in general farm work but many are employed in other vocational trades. They are quartered in modernly equipped dormitories in which there are no cells. The farm consists of 5,000 acres of which approximately 2,000 acres are suitable for cultivation and pasture. The farm products produced are in excess of the needs of the institution and are sold to other state institutions. The 1947 session of the Legislature separated the Medium Security Prison Farm from the West Virginia Penitentiary and established it as a separate institution. All provisions of the law applicable to the Penitentiary are in effect, except that criminal proceedings against inmates of this institution are brought in the Circuit Court of Randolph County.

WEST VIRGINIA STATE PRISON FOR WOMEN

Pence Springs

Superintendent: Mrs. Evelyn J. Smithson. Financial Secretary: Mrs. Margaret R. Boone. Capacity: 130 Inmates. Present population: 43.

Established by an act of the Legislature in 1947, the West Virginia State Prison for Women is located at Pence Springs, Summers County, near the City of Hinton. It is situated on a 203.6-acre tract (119 acres, which is mostly mountainous land, and was acquired in 1954).

The physical plant consists of the prison proper, which includes one large main building housing the inmates, women employees, offices, infirmary, security unit of solitary, recreation room, freezing and cooler lockers and class rooms; one smaller building containing the cannery in the basement with modern fixtures for the mass production of canned and frozen foods. On the main floor is an auditorium with a seating capacity of one hundred and movie projector equipment for the showing of 16 mm films each week and on all holidays. Also, on the main floor are the sewing machines and looms for weaving. Garments are made for the use of the institution and on a contract basis for other state institutions. Classes in weaving are taught and articles sold to keep this craft in progress.

In addition to these two buildings, there is a cottage for the superintendent, a duplex to house guests of the institution and an apartment for the financial secretary; a chicken house and a sewage disposal plant unit. A percentage of the land is taken up in river bottom land, where farming is done on a large scale, supplying the institution with produce in the summer and canned goods as well as frozen vegetables and fruits for the winter months. The crafts are utilized for the relief of idleness in addition to giving those vocational training where it is necessary. Tennis and badminton equipment are available in addition to softball and baseball.

A complete program of rehabilitation is carried out in this institution and all inmates are on their honor from the day of admission. As a means of public

relations our inmates started serving civic and church dinners to nearby organizations through the use of their commissary funds, which has paid good dividends. The inmate choir and sextette are now much in demand and make public appearances which has become one of the best means of acquainting the average citizen of West Virginia with our modern work in penology.

HOSPITALS AND SANITARIUMS

ANDREW S. ROWAN MEMORIAL HOME

Sweet Springs

Superintendent: John N. Rich, M.D. Business Manager: H. D. Copeland.

The Andrew S. Rowan Memorial Home for aged men and women was established by an act of the Legislature in 1945 and opened for guests July 1, of the same year. At the present time this Home has a capacity of 375 beds. Guests are admitted through the Department of Public Assistance or by transfer from other State institutions and must have attained the age of 65 years. The grounds consist of 690 acres, 225 of which are suitable for farming and pasture. This institution is located at Sweet Springs, in Monroe County, being in the heart of the Blue Grass section, on State Route No. 3—midway between Union and White Sulphur Springs. There are many historical facts and traditions connected with the buildings and grounds. The oldest and largest building, which was completed in 1833, was designed by Thomas Jefferson and so named in his honor.

BARBOURSVILLE STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Barboursville

Superintendent: Wm. S. Sadler, M.D. Physicians: Raymond H. Curry, M.D. and W. D. Bourn, M.D. Business Manager: John Queen. Number of Patients: 397.

The Barboursville State Hospital, located at Barboursville, Cabell County, and reached by U. S. Route 60, was opened January 20, 1942. The hospital was originally called Barboursville Unit of Weston State Hospital. The 1947 Legislature changed the name to Barboursville Unit of Huntington State Hospital, and the 1949 Legislature, established it as Barboursville State Hospital. The State in 1941 purchased 23.76 acres of land and the two buildings which were formerly used as dormitories for Morris Harvey College, and patients were moved into the hospital as soon as each section was reconditioned and equipped. On August 1, 1942, the hospital had a population of 270 patients, its capacity at that time. Additional space has been provided through renovation of one of the buildings until the hospital had facilities for 315 patients. The 1947 Legislature made an appropriation for an Administration Building and a Storage Building. These two buildings have been completed and are now in use. The 1949 Legislature made an additional appropriation for construction of a modern laundry building and for renovation of the old buildings, and upon completion of the renovation and the additional space provided by the removal of the administrative offices from one of the dormitories to the new Administration Building, it has a capacity of 402 beds.

BERKELEY SPRINGS SANITARIUM

Berkeley Springs

Superintendent: Eston D. Vanosdale.

Berkeley Springs Sanitarium is located in the City of Berkeley Springs. It offers baths and swimming pools which utilize the warm and medicinal waters of Berkeley Springs. Histories of colonists mentioned the qualities of the water as early as 1736. The 1939 Legislature authorized the Board of Control to lease

this institution and grounds to private interests to encourage restoration of the spa to the position of national importance that it held from the time of President Washington until the Civil War. The temperature of the spring water is 74.3 degrees and is invariable, and is said to be helpful in the treatment of rheumatism, gout, diabetes, and skin diseases. The springs have been expanded to include a modern open air swimming pool with modern dressing facilities and sunbathing, and an additional new bath house which has Roman Baths and all other types of baths for year-round use. The new bath house also has a solarium or sun deck, which is modern and meets present day requirements. The sanitarium has no facilities for housing patients, but for those who visit Berkeley Springs for baths, there are adequate hotel and boarding house facilities.

DENMAR STATE HOSPITAL

Beard

Superintendent: H. T. Elliott, M.D. Business Manager: Thomas M. Moore. Patients: 72; Female 26, Male 46.

Denmar State Hospital, located approximately 15 miles south of Marlinton, 5 miles off U. S. Route 219 in Pocahontas County, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1957. Care and treatment is available to any person, a resident of the State of West Virginia, who first is a patient in any state institution other than a penal institution, and second, any person having been approved by the commissioner of state institutions.

The hospital is healthfully situated on an 185-acre tract of land at about 2,200 feet above sea level on an eminence overlooking the Greenbrier River in the Allegheny Mountains. Present hospital building has a bed capacity of 212 with a possible addition of 16 beds making a total of 228 beds.

FAIRMONT EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

(Surgical)

Fairmont

Superintendent: Carl John Carter, M.D., F.A.C.S. Financial Secretary: Belma Keiser. Patients: 68.

Fairmont Emergency Hospital was established in 1899 for the purpose of treating persons injured at their usual occupations. The hospital accepts surgical and maternity pay cases and is the surgical clinic for the Industrial School for Boys at Pruntytown, the Industrial School for Girls at Salem, the West Virginia Training School at St. Marys and the Children's Home at Elkins, as well as all other cases from the various State Institutions needing hospitalization and surgery. No charge whatever is made for these cases. The work of the current year at regular hospital prices represents more than the total cost of the operation of the institution. The purpose of the institution at present, as outlined by the West Virginia Board of Control, is rapid service surgical rehabilitation. The hospital is fully approved by the American College of Surgeons.

HOPEMONT SANITARIUM

(Tuberculosis)

Hopemont

Hopemont Sanitarium is located at Hopemont, near Terra Alta, in Preston County and was founded in 1913. It accepts all stages of tuberculosis in any form in adults and children and admits all chronic pulmonary and pleural diseases for diagnosis. The institution consists of four hospital buildings, laundry, main dining hall, post office, nurses home, residences, and a 600-acre tract of

land with dairy. The hospital is fully equipped for complete diagnosis and treatment of pulmonary disease including surgery. It is affiliated with the School of Medicine of the West Virginia University. It is approved by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

HUNTINGTON STATE HOSPITAL
(Mental)

Huntington

Huntington State Hospital, located in the City of Huntington, was established in 1897 by an act of the Legislature as a Home for Incurables. The name of the institution was changed in 1901 to the West Virginia Asylum and in 1916 to Huntington State Hospital.

The hospital is devoted to the treatment of the mental illnesses of children and adults. The hospital receives both voluntary patients and legally committed patients. The prevailing types of treatment for the mentally ill are administered.

The physical plant includes six ward buildings for patients, an administration building, quarters for employees, residence for the superintendent, three residences for physicians, main kitchen, shops, power house, laundry, and a building for occupational therapy and recreation. An infirmary building designed for the treatment of the physically ill patients is equipped with operating rooms, laboratory, X-ray, physiotherapy, and dental equipment. The grounds, 35 acres in extent, are well shaded by several hundred virgin trees with numerous shrubs and recent plantings.

The hospital farm, consisting of 698 acres, is located on the Guyandotte River, a mile southeast of Barboursville and is served by State Route No. 10. The farm is devoted to the purposes of providing poultry, eggs, pork, and milk for the patients at Huntington State Hospital. A registered herd of Holstein milk cows is maintained.

LAKIN STATE HOSPITAL
(Mental)

Lakin

Superintendent: S. O. Johnson, M.D. Business Manager: G. E. Chamberlain, Jr.
Number of patients: 502.

This institution is located in Mason County, nine miles north of Point Pleasant on State Route 62. It was founded by an act of the Legislature in 1923 and was opened in 1926 for the reception and treatment of Negroes suffering from mental and nervous disorders.

There are two main buildings of three stories each, one housing male and the other female patients. Other fireproof structures include a two-story office building, former hospital cannery, now a storeroom, two recently constructed modern dormitories, one for female and the other for male employees, heating plant, duplex for physicians and a new medical center which is presently being used for short term in-hospital study diagnosis and treatment and also for out-patient services. In addition, there are on the immediate hospital grounds, six frame reconditioned structures in which certain allied functions of the hospital such as laundry, canteen, recreational hall and work shops are conducted.

The hospital is a member of the Mental Hospital Institute of the American Psychiatric Association and in 1952, received the Hospital of the Year Award, a national recognition by the American Psychiatric Association, and for seven years, 1951, 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956 and 1957, a psychiatric aide of our hospital has been cited for excellency in the care of mentally handicapped patients.

Significant strides along the lines of reorganization and reform have been made. This has resulted from the interest and coordinated efforts of higher

calibre workers and has been reflected in more scientific treatment and general rehabilitation programs, reduced mortality and a large and consistent release of improved patients to their homes and occupations.

Persistent attempts have been and are still being followed through to secure and maintain community understanding, support and interest. Our out-patient services, mental hygiene clinic services, hospital auxiliaries and our participation in community civic activities have proved most effective in morale building and have tended to enhance more wholesome hospital-community relations.

Most of the accepted methods of treatment including psychosurgery, electro-convulsive therapies, insulin shock therapy, recreational therapy and music therapy in addition to indicated drug therapies, are utilized to advantage in an effort to make the institution a treatment hospital rather than an institution of custodial care.

PINECREST SANITARIUM (Tuberculosis)

Beckley

Pinecrest Sanitarium, located in Raleigh County at Beckley, was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1927 and formally opened March 18, 1930. At that time the sanitarium was known as Rutherford Sanitarium but at the session of the 1934 Legislature was changed to Pinecrest Sanitarium.

Pinecrest Sanitarium is located just outside the city limits of Beckley on Federal Routes 19-21 and State Highways 3-41 with thirty minute bus service connecting with the city and the Atlantic Greyhound bus lines, also with the C. & O. Railway in Beckley and Prince.

The sanitarium has a fifty-acre campus, and a 250-acre farm, which is modernly equipped for farming, and a dairy herd of 120 Guernsey and Holstein cows supplying milk for the institution, also a large number of hogs supply pork and pork products, all consumed by the institution. Pinecrest Sanitarium is composed of four modern fireproof units all connected under one roof, with 650 beds for patients, a modern fireproof nurses' home, four modern dwellings for staff physicians, seven cottages for employees, a central heating plant, dairy barn, hog barn, laundry and numerous outside buildings.

The hospital is approved by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Various departments of the hospital fulfill the standard requirements of this organization.

Patients admitted to Pinecrest Sanitarium are assigned to individual physicians who carry out therapeutic procedures that are recommended by the entire staff. In this manner, the patient is given the benefit of consultation by the entire medical staff. The Pinecrest Staff is composed of a Superintendent, Medical Director, two Thoracic Surgeons, six full-time physicians, two X-ray technicians and two laboratory technicians, with ample office employees.

The ambulatory patients have the privilege of being entertained in the modern auditorium, by moving pictures and plays produced by local talent. They also take their meals cafeteria in a spacious dining room. The Sanitarium is modern in every respect, with the most modern equipment available for the treatment of tuberculosis, both surgical and medical. A full-time recreational director and trained medical social workers are employed full-time. The Sanitarium has the services of a full-time Chaplain and assistant.

SPENCER STATE HOSPITAL (Mental)

Spencer

Patients: 1,034.

The Spencer State Hospital property consists of 475 acres located in Roane County, one-fourth mile from the City of Spencer, and the hospital itself is lo-

cated on a 180-acre tract. The remainder of the land, 295 acres recently purchased, is located two miles from the hospital and serves primarily as a watershed for a dam that impounds approximately 25 million gallons of water. The hospital, originally designated as the Second Hospital for Insane was established to relieve the overcrowding at the Weston State Hospital.

This hospital is maintained for the treatment of mental and nervous disorders, including epilepsy, mental deficiency, alcoholism and drug addiction.

Volunteer patients may be received in the main hospital and in the Clinic division by signing an application form for admission at the hospital and by payment of prescribed fees. Most of the modern methods of treatment are available, including electro-convulsive therapy, individual and group psychotherapy, occupational therapy, recreational therapy, hydrotherapy and psychosurgery.

An 87-bed Clinic building, one of the finest of its type in the country, was opened in 1952. The utilization of the three wards in the old Clinic building as a Men's Reception Ward, a Women's Reception Ward and an Infirmary Ward has greatly improved the treatment facilities. The hospital maintains a well equipped Clinical Laboratory and X-ray Department.

Volunteer groups from the City of Spencer have added tremendously to the Occupational Therapy and Recreational Therapy program. This hospital is most grateful for the help rendered to many patients by these fine citizens who have done so much to improve our community relations.

The Women's Division of the hospital has been remodeled and fireproofed recently.* The hospital is a member of the West Virginia Hospital Association and the American Hospital Association.

*The remodeling and fireproofing of the Men's Division is in process.

WELCH EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

(Surgical)

Welch Emergency Hospital, located in the City of Welch, was established in 1899, on a three-acre tract given to the State by J. J. Sperry for this purpose. Its particular service was to the miners in that region, but now takes care of a large part of the charity cases of Southern West Virginia. The patient load has increased, the average daily census now being 106 patients. An accredited training school for nurses had been maintained in connection with the hospital since 1914, but was discontinued January 1, 1944.

WESTON STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Weston

The Weston State Hospital is located in the City of Weston. It is the oldest state institution in West Virginia, authorized on March 22, 1858, by an act of the Virginia Assembly. There was considerable delay in the construction of the hospital due to the Civil War, and the first patients were received on October 22, 1864. The hospital has grown from an initial capacity of 35 patients to 2,300.

The hospital is maintained and equipped to provide adequate treatment for all types of mental and nervous illness, both voluntary and court committed; in addition, all mentally ill tubercular patients in the entire state are cared for in a specially constructed building which now houses 279 patients. A surgical section has been added whereby all types of tubercular surgery are provided. In addition, a modern specially constructed building has been erected to take care of all criminally insane in the State. A 106-bed neuropsychiatric clinic building is in operation and the hospital is equipped to provide all types of treatment, including psychotherapy, hydrotherapy, occupational and recreational

therapies, electro-shock therapy and psychosurgery. The facilities consist of laboratory, general surgery, X-ray, social services and psychology departments, and an active out-patient clinic. A new personnel building has recently been opened and two new constructions to house patients replace old buildings which have outlived their usefulness. Plans are underway for the construction of an auditorium and recreation hall and a new medical treatment building. A beautician and a chiropodist have been added to the staff. The medical staff is augmented by a group of medical and surgical consultants in the various specialties. On May 20, 1955 a section of the male wards was designated as the West Virginia Soldiers' Home and is administered by the Veterans Administration and the medical hospital staff, all war veterans being admitted here for treatment.

A registered herd of Holstein and Guernsey cows is maintained, thus providing the hospital with an adequate supply of high grade milk, processed in the modern pasteurizing plant fully approved by the State Board of Health.

The building and outlying farms occupy some 600 acres of land in Lewis County. The hospital grounds are large and spacious with many shade trees and provide excellent recreational facilities for the patients.

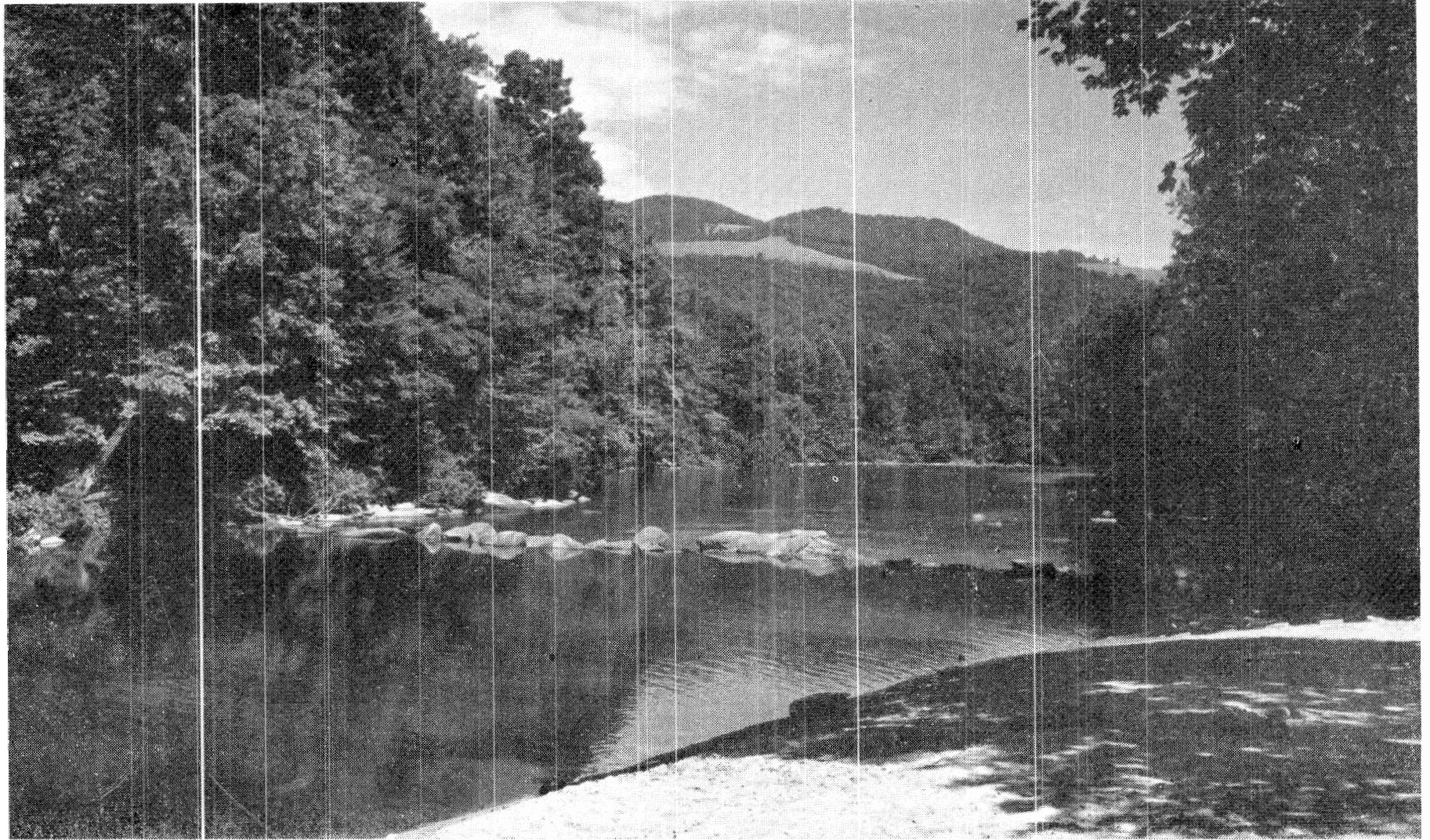

Starting salaries of all postmasters appointed from outside the service are at the first step of the salary range shown for the level applicable to the office. After 1 year's service, the postmaster is advanced to step 2, and a year later to step 3, etc., until he reaches the maximum step for his position level, except that advancement of postmasters in level 10 and above, beyond step 4, is based on superior performance.

Western Virginia. In commemoration of this event, the State of West Virginia has erected a monument in Bunker Hill State Park, and has placed a marker at the grave of Morgan Morgan, which is in a cemetery near the park.

The first Episcopal Church (Christ Church) in what is now West Virginia was erected at Bunker Hill by Morgan Morgan in 1740. Three years later (about 1743), the first Baptist Church (Mill Creek Church) was organized at Gerrardstown.

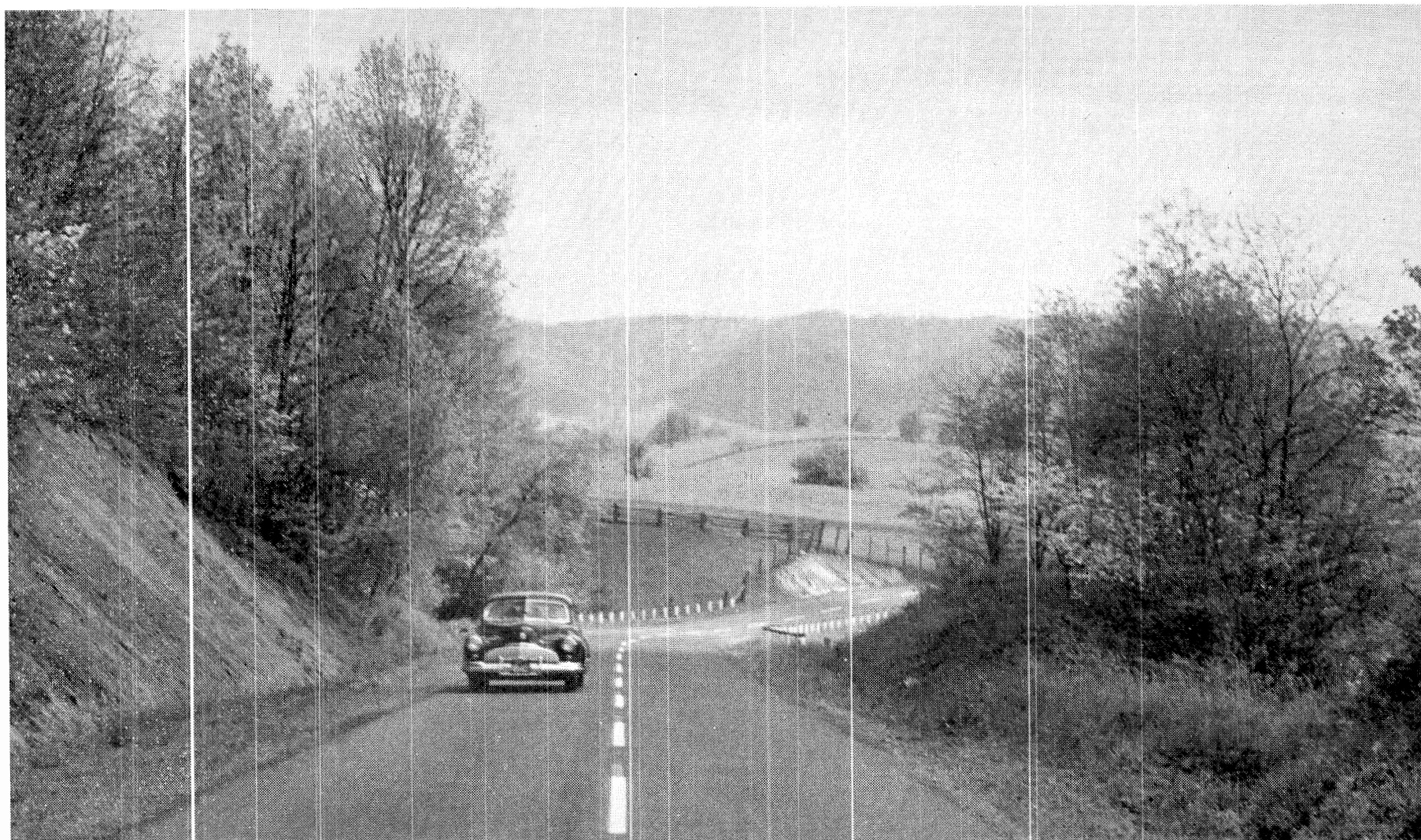

OFFICIAL MUNICIPAL REGISTER

(Corrected to October 1, 1957)

CLASS I, II AND III CITIES

Under the provisions of Chapter 56, Acts of the Legislature, regular session, 1939, municipal corporations are classified by population as follows: (1); Population in excess of 50,000, Class I city; population more than 10,000 and not more than 50,000, Class II; and population more than 2,000 and not more than 10,000, Class III city. Municipal corporations not included in these classifications are known as towns or villages.

Transition from one to another class of municipal corporation occurs automatically when the requisite population qualification has been met. Population is determined on the basis of the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States or the Legislature of West Virginia. Census of 1950 is used as basis in determining class of cities listed in Register.

Salem—Harrison County

The first civilized habitation on the land now occupied by the City of Salem was a hunter's camp established by Nicholas Carpenter in 1785 who used it for a hunting and trapping center. He also used it for a sort of crude hotel for himself and his men who drove cattle from Clarksburg to the Ohio River at Marietta which was the nearest market.

Samuel Fitz Randolph purchased the property on which the village was founded in 1790. Mr. Randolph had started with a caravan of pioneer settlers from Salem, New Jersey, who crossed the mountains in 1789 and made their first stop at Woodbridgetown, Pennsylvania. Mr. Randolph, a number of Davises, some Maxsons, and others came on to what is now Salem, after a two and one-half year trek from the sea coast.

Salem was the first settlement of Seventh Day Baptists west of the mountains. It is now the home of Salem College, founded in 1888, and the Industrial Home for Girls established in 1898. Glass has been a major industry. The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the George Washington highway and state highway Route No. 23 pass through it. It is the birthplace of Congressman Jennings Randolph and the great writer, Granville Davison Hall, author of *Daughter of the Elm*, *The Rending of Virginia*, and many other historical books.

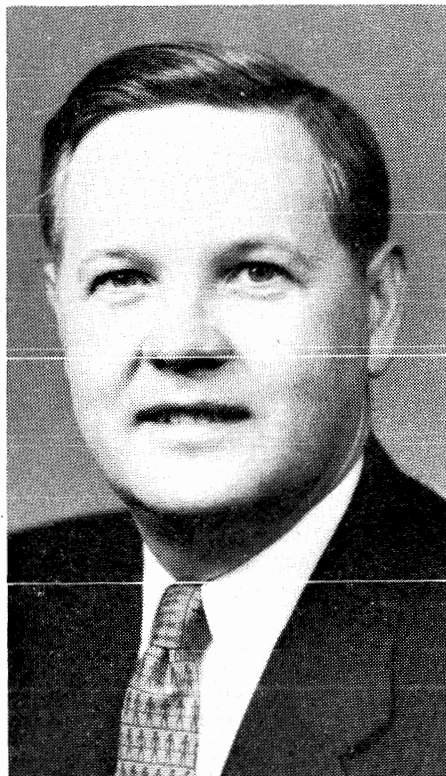

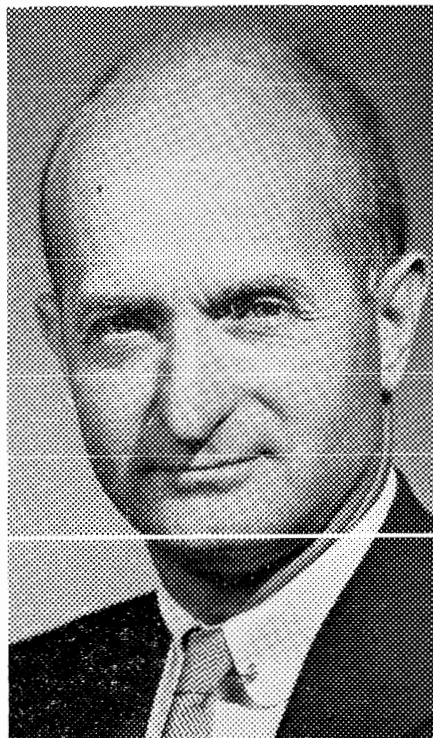

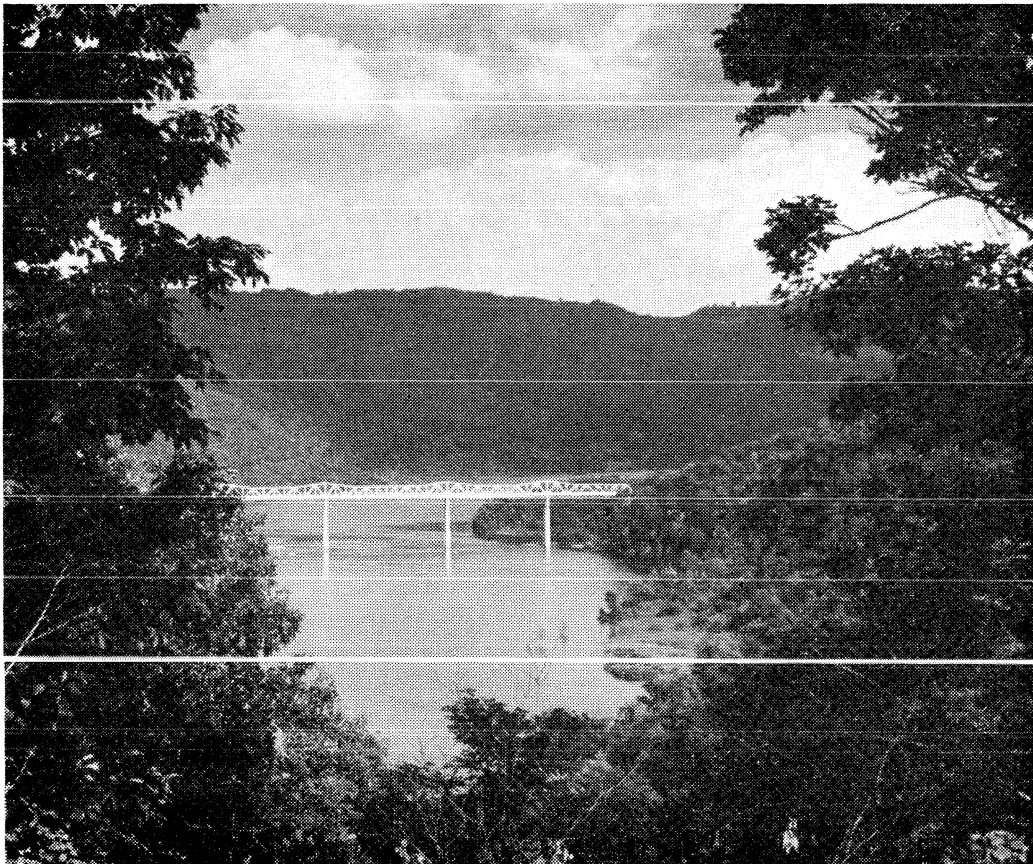

THE AMERICAN FLAG

DESCRIPTION OF THE FLAG

The Flag of the United States of America has 13 horizontal stripes—7 red and 6 white—the red and white stripes alternating, and a union which consists of white stars of five points on a blue field placed in the upper quarter next the staff and extending to the lower edge of the fourth red stripe from the top. The number of stars is the same as the number of States in the Union. The canton or union now contains 48 stars arranged in six horizontal and eight vertical rows, each star with one point upward. On the admission of a State into the Union a star will be added to the union of the Flag, and such addition will take effect on the 4th day of July next succeeding such admission. The proportions of the Flag as prescribed by Executive Order of President Taft, October 29, 1912, are as follows:

Hoist (width) of flag.....	1.
Fly (length) of flag.....	1.9
Hoist (width) of union.....	7/13
Fly (length) of union.....	0.76
Width of each stripe.....	1/13
Diameter of star.....	0.0616

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE CAPITOL

West Virginia's Capitol Building, one of the world's beautiful examples of Italian Renaissance architecture, stands on the north bank of the historic Great Kanawha River in the capital city of Charleston. Its golden dome, rising 300 feet, is a landmark visible both day and night from a number of distant points in the city.

Completed in 1932 at a cost of nearly \$10,000,000, the building was designed by Cass Gilbert, an architect of international prominence.

The huge U-shaped structure consists of a main unit and two wings which are situated on 16 acres of ground. There are 333 rooms and a total floor space of 535,000 square feet. Unlike the exterior of Indiana buff limestone, the interior is laid with Imperial Danby Vermont marble.

In the rotunda is a two-ton crystal chandelier which has 15,000 candle power. It is suspended 180 feet above the floor by a gold chain 54 feet long. Sparkling chandeliers in the House and Senate chambers are made of 10,000 separate pieces of rock crystal.

A specially-prepared paint, "Governor's Blue," covers the walls of the outer reception room of the governor's suite, the show room of the Capitol. A tan rug, 26x60 feet and weighing 1,800 pounds, carpets the floor and is said to be the third largest seamless rug in the world.

Directly beneath the executive suite is the State Museum containing numerous exhibits to illustrate the history, science and social conditions of early West Virginia.

STATE FLOWER

Rhododendron maximum, West Virginia's floral emblem, was designated the State Flower by joint resolution of the Legislature on January 23, 1903. This was during the administration of Governor Albert Blakeslee White.

Sometimes called "big laurel," rhododendron maximum is a shrub of the heath family, noted for big beautiful blossoms and evergreen foliage. It has large dark green leaves and clusters of pale pink or white blossoms delicately spotted with red or yellow. At all proper times and places it is displayed as the State Flower.

STATE BIRD AND TREE

The brilliantly costumed cardinal and the majestic sugar maple are the state bird and tree of West Virginia.

These were officially declared state emblems by a legislative committee of five on June 18, 1949, after tabulating votes cast by public school children, college students and representatives of civic, sportsmen and bird study groups. Both the bird and the tree are found in virtually all parts of the State.

COAL PRODUCTION IN WEST VIRGINIA

AND ITS EFFECT

UPON THE GENERAL ECONOMY OF THE STATE

For many years the mining and shipping of bituminous coal has been and continues to be the principal industry in West Virginia. Of the fifty-five counties in the state 45 are underlaid with mineable coal and presently it is produced in 36 of them.

Two-thirds of the total land area of the 24,497 square miles of West Virginia is underlaid with coal. The 17,280 square miles of coal to be found in this state far exceeds that of any other state. Pennsylvania has 15,800 square miles and Ohio 12,000 while Kentucky has a little more than ten thousand.

Geologists inform us that there are 102 seams of coal in this state, more than half of which are mineable with present methods. The reserves of recoverable coal in West Virginia have been estimated to exceed seventy billion tons.

Coal is shipped from our mines to every state in the Union east of the Mississippi River and to some farther west. It is exported north to Canada and south to Mexico, and in recent years there have developed many foreign markets. In fact at the present time (1957) more than one-third of the coal mined in West Virginia is shipped to foreign countries—some sixty million tons being the estimate for this year including shipments to Canada. Ninety per cent of the coal exported overseas from this country is produced in West Virginia, and about one-half the coal shipped to Canada is also mined in this State.

The reason for the selection of West Virginia coal by foreign customers may be summarized as follows:

1. It is high in B. T. U. (heat value as measured by British Thermal Units). This is an important factor to all consumers but is especially important when coal is shipped long distances with high freight rates.
2. Our coal is especially suited to metallurgical and by-product purposes which are the principal uses abroad.
3. The coal mines in West Virginia are adjacent to the splendid railroad systems which have access to the best deep water harbor (Hampton Roads) on the Eastern Seaboard. This harbor has the most modern dumping facilities. It has a dumping capacity of approximately seventy million tons annually.
4. Most West Virginia mines are equipped with modern mining and preparation facilities. This enables them to meet the most rigid requirements of the customers regardless of their needs. It is recognized today that consumers of coal demand three things:
 - a. Service and regular supply.
 - b. Coal that has been properly cleaned up to a high standard of purity.
 - c. Proper sizing to meet the needs of the customer.

What is all this worth to West Virginia? How does it effect our economy?

1. The coal that is shipped to markets, both foreign and domestic, produces a return of more than \$700,000,000 annually. This huge sum of money distributed down through the channels of trade means at least two billion dollars to the state's economy.

2. There are at least 80,000 men who work in and about the mines in West Virginia. This does not include many others who are engaged in the distribution of coal to the consumers. The average annual earnings of the employees exceeds \$5,000 which represents an aggregate annual income to miners of \$400,000,000.
3. The land owner who leases his property to a producing company receives royalty of ten cents or more per ton. This aggregates some \$500 to \$1,000 per acre.
4. The principal income of railroads operating in West Virginia is derived from the transportation of coal. As an illustration, one-half of the total gross income of the Chesapeake and Ohio is derived from this source; sixty per cent of the income of the Norfolk and Western and more than seventy-five per cent of that of the Virginian comes from the shipment of coal. The Baltimore and Ohio, New York Central and Western Maryland also have much income from carrying coal. In this way, coal gives employment to many thousands of people who work for the vast network of railroads serving this state.
5. There are many other industries and business concerns that derive a large percentage of their income from the mining and shipping of coal. To name a few—wholesale houses, automobile concerns, trucking industry, and mining machinery manufacturers. Farmers enjoy a large income from the sale of their products to those engaged in the mining industry. In fact, a careful study indicates that more than one-half of West Virginia's population of two million people depend either wholly or to a substantial extent upon the production and sale of its greatest natural resource . . . coal.
6. Coal provides more in taxes for the operation of state and county governments than does any other single industry. It pays 22% of all gross sales taxes collected by the state which is the main source of the state's income, and approximately 12% of the property taxes in the various counties.
7. Coal is the heaviest contributor to the state's workmen's compensation fund and to the unemployment fund. It pays more than \$10 million per year to the compensation fund alone. The annual distribution of these funds is made to disabled employees and to unemployed workmen. These unfortunate people are thus cared for and what they receive moves quickly into the state's economy.

With the government's program of deepening the channels of waterways in this state, the coal producers are, year by year being able to better their competitive relationship in markets hitherto not easily available. The shipment of coal by water is the most economical method of reaching the consumer. The improvements of the rivers are not only a benefit to the producers of coal but to all of the citizenry.

One of the determining factors in the location of large industrial plants is to place them near the source of a continuous coal supply. This is especially true of the chemical industry.

The future of the coal industry in West Virginia with its almost limitless supply of some of the best grades of bituminous coal to be found in the world is indeed brighter than for many years. No longer must we look to a war in order to make the coal industry and thereby West Virginia, prosperous. The plants that manufacture nuclear materials require millions of tons of coal per year and with the increased use of electricity the demand for coal has substantially increased and West Virginia has been able to produce and market a large proportion of the National production than ever before. With a united effort it will not only continue to be first among all the states in annual production but will strengthen such position year by year.

Three cabins. Facilities: Picnic area, trails, scenic overlooks. Elevation, 3,000 to 3,100 feet. Acreage, 269. Post office, Beard.

HAWKS NEST

G. ROBERT KYLER, Superintendent

(Fayette County) From east or west along U. S. 60, park is located along highway 1½ miles west of Ansted. Day use facilities only. Picnic area with fireplaces and tables. Toilets, picnic shelter, museum, trails, and scenic overlook. The latter, a very splendid view of New River. Elevation, 1,120 to 1,530 feet. Acreage, 94. Post office, Ansted.

TOMLINSON RUN

N. T. HOLBROOK, Superintendent

(Hancock County) from north leave U. S. 30 at junction 2 miles east of Chester driving south on W. Va. 2 approximately 5 miles to park. From south on W. Va. 2, park entrance lies one mile northeast of Pughtown on highway. Facilities include picnic tables, fireplaces, modern sanitary facilities. A group camp, 30-acre lake, swimming pool and bathhouse are available at this park. Swimming, boating, and fishing. Elevation, 750 to 1,270 feet. Acreage, 1,387. Post office, New Cumberland.

RESERVATION OF CABINS IN STATE PARKS AND FORESTS

Official blanks for rental of cabins in parks and forests may be obtained by written or personal application to the Conservation Commission, Division of State Parks, State Office Building, Charleston, West Virginia. These blanks must be returned to the Division properly filled in before applications can be processed. Check or Money Order in the full amount of the rental, plus tax, must be enclosed with the application.

Applications are listed strictly in order of their receipt, regardless of identities of the applicants—in other words; cabins are rented upon a "first come first served" basis. No applications are accepted until January 15th and no out-of-state applications are processed until February 15th.

Overnight lodging is obtainable upon request to Cacapon Lodge at Cacapon State Park, Berkeley Springs, Blackwater Lodge, Blackwater Falls State Park, Davis, and limited lodging is available at Babcock and Watoga State Parks by contacting the park superintendent at either of these parks. Over-night lodging is available for men in the Fishermen's Lodge, at Bluestone State Park, Hinton.

FISHING: Six lakes, and a number of streams within state forests or state park boundaries, or in the vicinity, offer fishing for trout, bass, and panfish. The lakes in Watoga, Tomlinson Run and Cacapon state parks and in Seneca state forest are open throughout the summer for fishing. Year-round fishing is permitted in Bluestone and Tygart Reservoirs, adjoining Bluestone and Tygart Lake state parks respectively. The trout streams in Babcock and Holly River State parks are as outlined in the current "West Virginia Fishing Regulations." Fishing in Cedar Creek and North Bend State Parks and Kumbrabow, Cabwaylingo, and Cooper's Rock state forests is subject to the statewide open seasons and regulations for the species found in the streams on these areas.

Monongahela National Forest was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on April 28, 1920, under the Weeks Law. This law of 1911 provides for the cooperation by states with the United States, and the protection of watersheds of navigable streams. (a) In West Virginia, the national forest was established for flood protection in the Ohio and Potomac River valleys. It is one of a system of nearly 150 national forests and the only national forest wholly in West Virginia.

The public forest is dedicated to the protection, development, and management of all its resources for the greatest good to the greatest number.

Within the proclaimed boundary there are 1,641,981 acres of which 806,139 acres are owned by the United States. Directly in charge of the national forest is the Forest Supervisor. In the national forest are five ranger districts, each in charge of a district ranger.

The public forest is administered in cooperation with several conservation agencies, including the West Virginia Conservation Commission. By law, twenty-five per cent of receipts from the sale of timber and other products and use fees is returned to the nine national forest counties for roads and schools.

At Parsons is one of the largest forest tree nurseries east of the Mississippi River. It is used by the West Virginia Conservation Commission.

THE DURABLE GOODS INDUSTRIES OF WEST VIRGINIA

Prepared by the Research Staff, West Virginia Chamber of Commerce
August, 1957

One hundred and thirty thousand West Virginians, more than one-fifth of the State's 617,000 gainfully employed are on the payrolls of State manufacturing plants which will turn out products in 1957 with an estimated value of two billion two hundred million dollars. Seventy-eight thousand, or sixty per cent of the State's manufacturing workers are engaged in the production of so-called durable goods, namely items made from iron, steel, aluminum, nickel, wood, glass, stone, clay, sand and other durable materials. A further breakdown shows in round figures that 41,000 of the producers of durable goods are engaged in the production of primary and fabricated metals, transportation equipment and machinery; that 24,000 work in the glass, stone and clay industries; that 10,000 are employed in the production of lumber, furniture and fixtures, and other wood products; and that the remaining 3,000 are employed in the manufacture of miscellaneous durable goods items.

Metals and Metal Products

The primary metals industry, particularly its steel producing units, is concentrated in the State's Northern Panhandle but there are smaller centers of metals production at Parkersburg, Huntington, Ravenswood and in Fayette County. Specialized metal fabricating plants are located in a number of other industrial communities. Several Northern Panhandle producers of basic forms of steel and iron specialize in the production of castings, corrugated sheets, tinsplate, stamped and pressed metals, nails, garbage cans and many other finished steel products. Possibly the most diversified metals fabricating district is found in Kanawha County where such finished items as axes, hoes, hand tools, enamelware and garden tractors are produced. A well established group of metalworking firms also produce automobile bumpers and other stamped metal specialties in Cabell and Wayne counties; while fluorescent lamps are produced in quantity at Fairmont, and a completely new integrated industry is being developed at Ravenswood in Jackson County, for the manufacture and processing of aluminum bars, sheets, foil, wire, and other products. Scattered throughout the State are many small manufacturing plants, employing from 25 to 200 workers each and producing such useful fabricated metal products as electrical apparatus, oilfield equipment, farm machinery, furniture, plumbers' supplies, armatures, mining machinery, electronic devices, and a variety of hardware items.

West Virginia's metal products industries now produce durable goods with a current annual value of \$735,000,000, distributed as follows: primary metals, \$535,000,000; machinery, \$110,000,000, and fabricated metals, \$90,000,000.

Glass, Clay and Stone Products

The glass, clay and stone products industries are only slightly less important than metals manufacturing in West Virginia's economic picture. In fact, more than 4 per cent of all U. S. workers in such industries are credited to West Virginia whereas only 3 per cent of all U. S. chemical workers and approximately 2

per cent of the nation's workers engaged in the primary metals industries are employed in West Virginia. The glass, clay and stone products industries now employ more than 24,000 West Virginia workers, i.e.: 15,000 in glass manufacturing; 5,000 in making pottery and clay products; and more than 4,000 in miscellaneous related industries. The estimated value of West Virginia's glass, clay and stone products for 1957 is \$350,000,000.

The West Virginia Glass Industry

Glass making is one of the oldest of the industrial arts. It is known that the Egyptians produced blown glass 4,000 years ago and that something was known about the manufacture of plate glass at the time of the destruction of Pompeii because windows in homes lately excavated are made of thick or plate glass.

The first glass factory established in the area which is now West Virginia was built at Wellsburg in 1813. Factories for the manufacture of window glass and bottles were erected at Wheeling in 1820 and 1821. Many plants were subsequently started in other parts of the State, where suitable materials and fuel were found. The glass industry has followed closely the discovery and exploitation of natural gas throughout the United States and the early discovery of this fuel in West Virginia in close proximity to other glass making raw materials, i.e., silica, sand and limestone accounts for the long continued importance of the glass industry in West Virginia. The extraordinarily pure quartz sand mined in the West Virginia hills is the base for the silica so extensively used in the manufacture of the finest tableware and cut glass.

In 1923, one hundred and ten years after the Wellsburg plant was built, glass was manufactured in 17 of West Virginia's 55 counties and the value of the annual production of approximately 100 operating plants had grown to \$50,000,000. At that time West Virginia ranked second only to Pennsylvania in the manufacture of glass and retain that position among the states at the present time. In 1957 West Virginia plants employed nearly 15% of all U. S. workers engaged in the production of glass products. From 1923 to 1957, however, the number of plants operating in West Virginia declined from approximately 100 to less than 50. The decrease in number of manufacturing units has fortunately not caused the expected reduction in either volume or the value of glass produced. The actual physical output of glass has been greatly increased during the past 25 years and the 1957 value of West Virginia glass products was more than \$225,000,000

Mass Production Processes Increase Output

Reduction in the prices of glass products has been brought about through use of machines adapted to mass production methods. Invention of the continuous melting tank in 1872 first made possible the introduction of glass making machinery and the subsequent invention of the Owens automatic machine for the production of jars and bottles gave further impetus to mass production. Incidentally this invention is credited to a conspicuous figure in the West Virginia glass industry in the early years of this century and his work probably accounts for the fact that West Virginia now has some of the largest and most modern glass plants in the world.

Until comparatively recent times window glass was made by blowing the molten glass into a long cylinder which after cooling was cut and the glass reheated and flattened into sheets. It was practically impossible to remove all of the curvature by this method, but the problem was solved by the invention of a machine which produces a continuous sheet from the molten glass by pressing it between rollers to the proper thickness. As the glass moves along it is gradually cooled.

Glass cutting has withstood mechanical inroads longer than any other phase of the glass making process, but the highly skilled glass cutter is nevertheless now being replaced by a machine specially designed for the purpose. Many West Virginia plants still specialize, however, in cut glass tableware and other items requiring the finest craftsmanship.

The Clay Industry in West Virginia

On the basis of value of the product and total number persons employed, the manufacture of pottery is the most important of the West Virginia industries which utilize clay as raw material, but deposits of clay or shale suitable for making brick and tile are found in all parts of West Virginia hence such products are produced widely throughout the State. The principal pottery manufacturing plants are located in the Northern West Virginia Panhandle. Portland cement plants also use large quantities of clay or shale. Fire clay is characterized by its high softening temperature; by its resistance to erosion and is used in making fire-brick, also for lining stoves and furnaces and for like purposes in steel mills and foundries. It may be noted that West Virginia ranks second among the states in the production of grindstones and pulpstones.

Lumber, Wood Products, Furniture and Fixtures

Although the verdant forest cover is now gone which abounded in West Virginia at the time Columbus discovered America, reforestation of the slopes, hills and mountains has been furthered by the ample normal rainfall, consequently about half of the State's 24,000 square miles is now covered by trees. The State is traditionally a large producer of wood and it is generally agreed that if the forests are properly protected against fire this valuable renewable natural resource will increase through natural growth faster than it will be depleted by cutting. Consequently, West Virginia sawmill operations may be expected to increase although woodworking is presently the fourth largest manufacturing industry in the State, employing nearly 10 per cent of the total manufacturing labor force with annual output valued at more than \$75,000,000. Unfortunately some 80 per cent of the lumber produced in West Virginia is currently being exported to other states for final processing or upgrading into finished products. More than 500 West Virginia plants are nevertheless turning out flooring, dimension stock, millwork, pallets, containers, veneer, plywood, furniture and miscellaneous woodenware novelties.

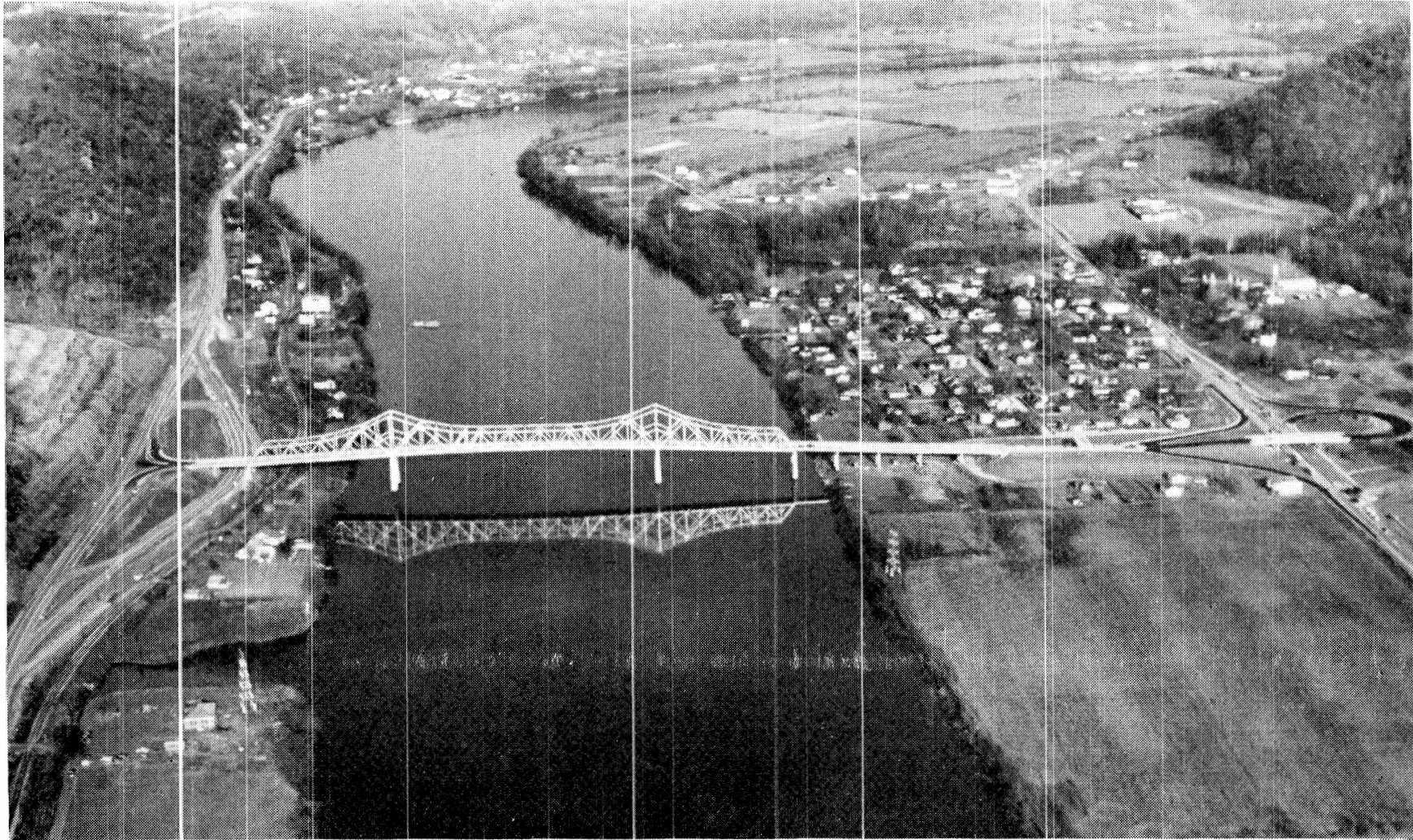

ANALYSIS OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES

Department of Finance and Administration

PART I—SUMMARY

Income

Revenues collected for the operation of state government are deposited into various funds as provided by statute and the constitution. Many of these funds are dedicated for specific purposes and are carried in separate accounts and expended only for the purposes authorized by law. These include the General School Fund, State Road Fund, Federal Funds, and various others designated as Special Revenue funds. Approximately 50% of all revenue is within this group of dedicated funds. All revenues not dedicated for specific purposes are deposited into the General Revenue Fund, from which the Legislature makes appropriations for the operation of the various departments, schools and institutions.

Total revenues for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957 amounted to 203 Million Dollars as compared to 197 Million for the previous year, an increase of some 6 Million Dollars. This increase is reflected in the collection of Gross Sales Tax and Consumers Sales Tax and can be attributed to improved economic conditions.

Expenditures

The expenditure summary presented herein is itemized to show total expenditures by function of government without regard to the fund from which paid. Inter-fund transfers are eliminated so as to reflect actual operating costs.

From an expenditure viewpoint, education is the major function of government. Approximately 36% of the state dollar was expended for education, the major portion of which was distributed to the counties in the form of state aid to schools. Highway expenditures are second, accounting for 29% and these are followed closely by expenditures in the field of health and welfare, which accounted for 21% of the state dollar. The remaining 14% covers all other costs of state government including capital outlay, veterans' bonus bonds, and operations of the legislative, judicial and executive branches.

COLLECTION OF REVENUE, BUSINESS AND OCCUPATION TAX AND TRANSPORTATION PRIVILEGE TAX

West Virginia has imposed since 1921 a Business and Occupation Tax in some form. This tax has been known erroneously as the "Gross Sales Tax," a designation which has included the privilege tax imposed on certain carrier corporations by the terms of Article 12-A, Chapter XI of the Code of West Virginia, as well as the Business and Occupation Tax imposed by the terms of Article 13 of said Chapter XI. Collections by virtue of these two tax laws are deposited to the credit of the general revenue fund of the State, and constitute the largest single source of the State's general revenue raised by so-called "indirect" taxation.

These taxes are license taxes imposed for the privilege of engaging in business in West Virginia. The amount of tax to be paid is usually measured by the amount of gross income received before the deduction of any expense whatsoever. Under the production and manufacturing classifications of the Business and Occupation Tax Law the measure of the tax is the value of the article produced or manufactured as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof, provided, the proceeds of sale are indicative of the true value of the article. Every person in business is subject to the tax and if more than one person engages in a single activity or transaction, as in the case of the contractor and subcontractor, each must pay the tax on his entire income regardless of the tax paid by the other.

Business activities under Article 13 are classed and taxed as follows:

A. Production of Coal and Other Natural Resource Products. The tax is measured by the value of the articles mined or produced as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the producer, the rates being applied against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

Coal	On each \$100.00 value, \$1.30
Sand, gravel, or other mineral products not quarried or mined; oil, blast furnace slag.....	On each 100.00 value, 3.90

B. Manufacturing. The tax is measured by the value of the articles manufactured, compounded or prepared for sale in West Virginia, as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the manufacturer or person compounding or preparing the same. The rate, 39 cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of the sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

C. (1) Business of Selling Tangible Property, Other Than at Wholesale. The rate, 50 cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the gross income of the business, without any deduction on account of the cost of the goods sold, operating or other expenses, or losses.

C. (2) Business of Selling Tangible Property at Wholesale. The rate, 19½ cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the gross income of the business, without any deduction on account of the cost of the goods sold, operating, or other expenses, or losses.

D. Public Service or Utility Business. The rates set out below apply against the gross income of the business without deduction of cost of operation, expenses or losses of any kind.

Electric Light and Power Companies (sales and demand charges, domestic purposes and commercial lighting)	On each 100.00 value, 5.20

E. Contracting Business. The rate, \$2.00 on each \$100.00 value, applies against the gross income of the business. The term "gross income" is defined as meaning total receipts of the business without deduction for the cost of labor or material, operating, or other expenses, or losses.

G. Amusement Business. The rate, 65 cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the gross income of the business, "gross income" being defined as including the total receipts without any deduction on account of the cost of operation, or other expenses, or losses.

H. Service Business or Calling Not Otherwise Specifically Taxed. The rate, \$1.00 on each \$100.00 value, applies against the entire gross income of the business, with no deduction on account of cost of operation, taxes, losses or other expenses.

I. Business of Furnishing Property for Hire. The rate, \$1.00 on each \$100.00 value, applies against the entire gross income of the business, with no deduction on account of cost of operation, taxes, losses or other expenses.

J. Small Loan Business. The rate, \$1.00 on each \$100.00 value, applies against the entire gross income of the business, with no deduction on account of cost of operation, taxes, losses or other expenses.

Business activities under Article 12-A are classed and taxed as follows:

A. Motor Vehicle Carriers, Railroad Car Corporations, Express Corporations or Companies. \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of gross intra-state income, and \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

B. (1) Telephone Corporations. \$2.75 on each \$100.00 of gross intra-state income and \$2.75 on each \$100.00 or pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

(2) Telegraph Corporations. \$5.00 on each \$100.00 of gross intra-state income and \$3.50 on each \$100.00 pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

C. Pipe Line Corporations. \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of gross intra-state income (effective July 1, 1953—prior to that date \$3.50) and \$3.50 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

D. Persons or Corporations, Operating Steamboats or Other Floating Property. \$2.50 on each \$100.00 of gross intra-state income.

E. Railroad Corporations. 50 cents on each \$100.00 of assessed value of all property within the State of West Virginia, and \$4.00 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

To the normal rates imposed by Article 12-A there is added, in all cases, a surtax of 30 percent of the normal tax.

Annual exemption of \$50.00 and an additional credit of 5% (prior to July 1, 1955, 10%) of the tax due after deduction of said exemption is provided under both the Business and Occupation and Transportation Privilege Tax Statutes.

Authorized agents of municipalities having a Gross Sales Tax Ordinance are permitted to inspect and make copies of returns filed with the State Tax Commissioner upon the written request of the Mayors of such municipalities,

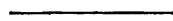

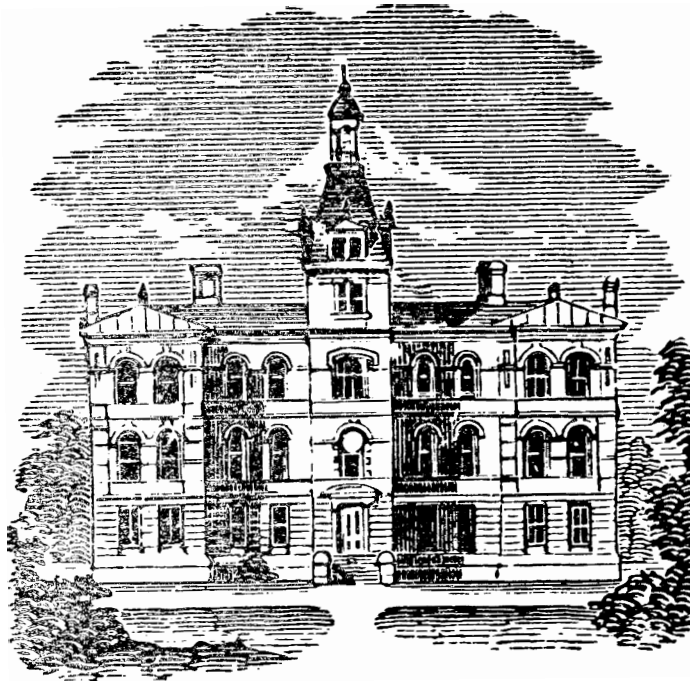
