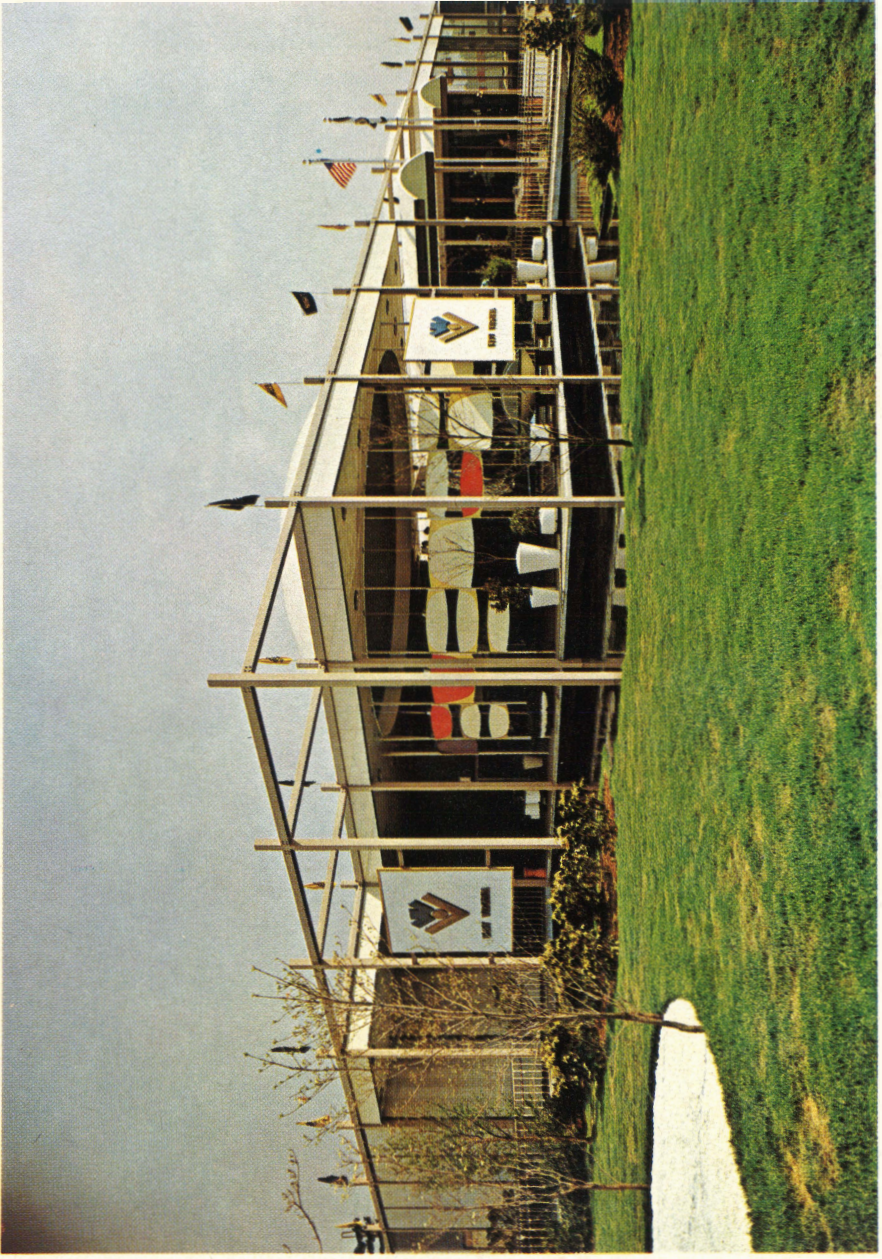

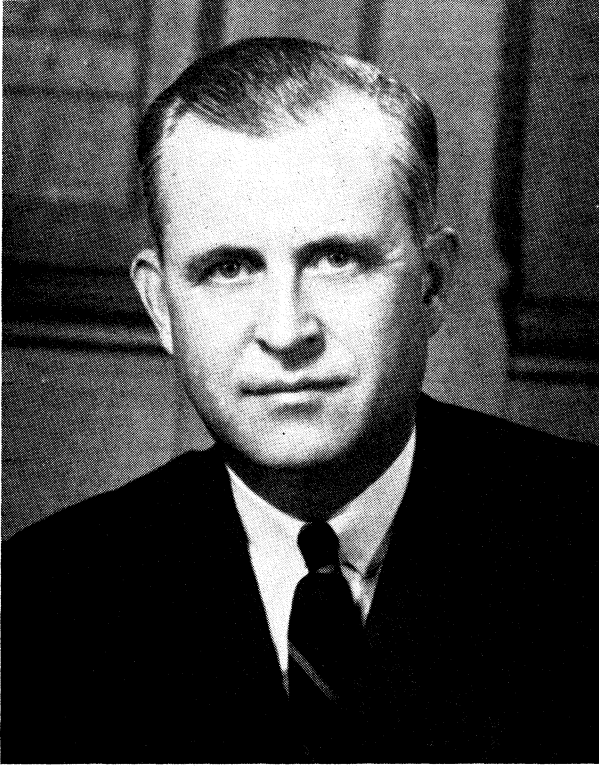

WILLIAM WALLACE BARRON, Democrat, of Elkins, was born December 8, 1911, at Elkins; son of the Rev. Frederick H. and Mary Butler Barron; educated in the public schools of West Virginia, Washington and Lee University (AB degree) and the West Virginia University College of Law (LL.B. degree); Honorary Degrees (Doctor of Laws), from West Virginia State College, West Virginia University, Marshall University, Concord College; married to Opal M. Wilcox, of Elkins, February 15, 1936; three children, Mary C. (Mrs. Terry Penn), Nancy B. (Mrs. Joseph Davis) and Jane Fair; two grandchildren; lawyer; member, the Presbyterian Church, the Masonic Lodge, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, Sons of the American Revolution, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, Loyal Order of Moose, Civitan Club, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Randolph County Bar Association, West Virginia Bar Association, American Bar Association, American Judicature Society, H. W. Daniels Post No. 29 of the American Legion (past commander) and the Forty and Eight; served with U. S. Army in World War II for three years; served as Mayor of Elkins, deputy land commissioner, commissioner of accounts, and commissioner in chancery, Randolph County; elected to the House of Delegates from Randolph County, 1950 and 1952, serving as assistant floor leader, member and vice chairman of the Committee on Finance, and chairman of the Committee on Insurance; served as chairman and member of the West Virginia Liquor Control Commission, 1953-55; elected to a four-year term as Attorney General in 1956 and, by virtue of that office, was a member of the Public Land Corporation, Industrial and Publicity Commission, Committee on Finance and Administration, Joint Committee on Interstate Cooperation and Finance, and the Board of Public Works; elected the 26th Governor of West Virginia on November 8, 1960; inaugurated January 16, 1961; member Executive Committee, National Governors' Conference, 1963-64.

Salary: \$17,500.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 1, Constitution of 1863.)

The Governor is vested with the chief executive powers of the State, recommends to the Legislature, by message at the commencement of such session thereof, the passage of such measures as he deems expedient; appoints, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, certain officers of the State Government, who may be removed by him for cause; may remit fines and penalties, grant reprieves, commutes punishment and pardon and parole after conviction; is Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State and, as such, may call out the National Guard to enforce laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Salary: \$11,000.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 7, Constitution of 1863.)

Issues Certificates of Incorporation for the creation of all domestic corporations and Certificates of Authority to foreign corporations to transact business in West Virginia; authorizes and issues Certificates of License to engage in the business of Private Detectives and Investigators; is keeper of the executive journal and records state documents therein; keeper of rules and regulations of all State agencies; the official administrator of the Uniform Commercial Code; is the custodian of the Great and Less Seals of the State, being the only official authorized to attach these seals to official papers; is a member of and ex officio Secretary of the Board of Public Works; member of and Secretary of the State Sinking Fund Commission; is Secretary of the State Auditing Board of Travel Expense and a member and ex officio Secretary of the State Armory Board. Under the Voters Permanent Registration Law, he is made and designated as the chief registration official of the State and is an ex officio member of the State Election Commission. He supervises elections of all state and federal public officials.

Salary: \$11,000.00 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article VIII, Section 7, Constitution of 1863.)

The Auditor, the State's official bookkeeper, audits all claims presented to the State for payment and if found legal and correct, issues warrants therefor drawn on the Treasury; collects corporation license taxes and as attorney-in-fact, accepts service of process directed to all corporations; accepts garnishments against and administers Savings Bonds for State employees; administers Judges' Retirement and Social Security for employees of State and political subdivisions; receives capitation taxes collected by assessors, taxes due the State collected by sheriffs, and collects and distributes public utility taxes for State and counties. As Securities Commissioner ex officio, approves, rejects, issues licenses for, and supervises sale of securities in West Virginia. As Commissioner of Forfeited and Delinquent Land ex officio, keeps records of lands forfeited to State, sold for delinquent taxes, and redeemed. Member of Board of Public Works, Board of School Fund, Armory Board and Board of Trustees, Public Employees' Retirement System.

WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF EDUCATION

The West Virginia Board of Education consists of nine members who must be citizens of the State; appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate for overlapping terms of nine years. No more than five of the appointed members may belong to the same political party. No person shall be eligible for appointment to membership who is a member of any political party executive committee or holds any other public office or public employment under the federal government or under the government of the State or any of the political subdivisions. No member of the board may be removed from office except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty or gross immorality and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the Governor of State elective officers. At least six meetings shall be held each year upon its own resolution or at the call of the president. Members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for actual expenses incident to the performance of their duties. The secretary who is appointed by the board keeps a record of its proceedings and performs such other duties as the board may prescribe.

Subject to and in conformity with the constitution and laws of West Virginia, the Board of Education determines the educational policies of the State except as to the West Virginia University and Potomac State College, selects the State Superintendent of Free Schools, and makes rules for carrying in effect laws and policies of the State relating to education. The State Board shall have general control, supervision and management of the business and educational affairs of all State colleges and the West Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind.

Acting as the State Board of Vocational Education, the State Board of Education administers and controls the state plans for vocational rehabilitation.

By ratification of an amendment to the Constitution of West Virginia in the General Election on November 4, 1958, the office of State Superintendent of Free Schools was changed from an elective position to appointment by the West Virginia Board of Education. The West Virginia Board of Education shall, in the manner prescribed by law, select the State Superintendent of Free Schools who shall serve at its will and pleasure. He shall be the chief school officer of the State and shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as prescribed by law. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall be a member of the Board of Public Works as prescribed by Sub-Section B, Section 51, Article 6 of the Constitution. In accordance with the newly adopted constitutional amendment, the West Virginia Board of Education appointed the State Superintendent of Free Schools on December 10, 1958.

CIVIL SERVICE SYSTEM

Commission

Composed of three members appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate; terms of six years. Serves in a supervisory capacity in relation to uniform personnel practices as set forth in the Civil Service Law within the following agencies: Department of Civil and Defense Mobilization; Department of Employment Security; Department of Health; Department of Mental Health; Department of Natural Resources; Public Service Commission; Tax Department; State Road Commission; Office of Emergency Planning; Division of Vocational Rehabilitation; and Department of Welfare. Commission elects own chairman and members receive \$25.00 per diem not to exceed \$600.00 per year and necessary traveling expenses for each day spent in attending meetings. Commission to establish general policies for the administration of examinations and the hearing of personnel appeals; to make necessary recommendations to the Governor; to advise with the Director in formulating procedures and the conduct of examinations and to inspect and review his activities for the purpose of assuring conformity with this rule and the policies of the Commission; to review classification and compensation plans and make recommendations to the state agencies relative to their internal personnel practices; to approve a budget as prepared by the Director for the administration of this article before submission to the Director of the Budget; and to promote public understanding of the purposes, policies, and practices of the Civil Service Commission. WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF HEALTH

The West Virginia Board of Health was created by the 1949 Legislature, and consists of nine members, who are appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate. The members are appointed for a term of nine years, except the initial appointments. Three members of the board are physicians or surgeons holding the degree of doctor of medicine; one dentist; one osteopathic physician; one pharmacist; one hospital representative; and two representative citizens. Members of the board do not receive compensation for services, but are reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

The State Board of Health assumes all the duties, rights, powers, and obligations and liabilities formerly assumed by the State department of health, the public health council, and the commissioner of health. The board appoints the State Director of Health, determines his salary, and the director serves at the will and pleasure of the board. The board has supervision and control of the business, physical administrative and medical affairs of the department of health, and has advisory medical supervision of all the state institutions. The board is charged with the responsibility of licensing hospitals and related institutions, and the construction of hospitals and health centers under Public Law 725. The board is authorized to make rules and regulations and to approve plans and appointments of qualified local health authorities; promulgate regulations under the public health laws to approve the plans of cooperation for the formation of combined local health departments; maintains division of vital statistics; promotes immunization and sanitation, supervises sewage disposal and public water supplies.

Salaries of Members: \$8,200 per year, plus necessary expenses. Three members appointed by the Governor, with advice and consent of the Senate, bi-partisan. Terms: Members shall be appointed for overlapping terms of six years.

West Virginia Board of Probation and Parole, created by an Act of the Legislature passed by the Regular Session of 1953. The Board adopts rules and regulations, with the approval of the Governor, governing procedure for granting of probation and parole. The Rules and Regulations of the Board are filed with the Secretary of State. The Board has the sole authority to release on parole. It shall hold hearings and consider cases of eligible prison inmates annually. The Board shall have general supervisory control over all Court and County probation officers, and shall supervise all probationers and parolees.

Salary of Superintendent: \$8,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of the Senate.

Board of Commissioners: \$10 per diem for days actually served in discharge of duties and expenses, consists of two members, bi-partisan, appointed by the Governor, by and with consent of Senate for a term of two years.

Retirement Board: Consists of the Attorney General, the State Treasurer, the Superintendent, and two members in active service of the department, elected by vote of members, who serve without compensation.

The Department of Public Safety is a state police department with state-wide general police power, created in 1919 to preserve the peace, protect life and property, prevent crime and apprehend criminals. With at least one detachment in each county and a fleet of two-way radio equipped vehicles, the state police handle a large share of the investigation of major crime and apprehension of dangerous criminals, and take primary responsibility for patrolling the highways, enforcing the traffic laws and preventing motor vehicle accidents, besides many miscellaneous services in the public interest, including duty at the scene of emergencies, riots or disaster.

The Board of Commissioners hears charges filed against any officer or member of the department, including the Superintendent, or appeals of charges filed against officers or members with the Superintendent if the Superintendent fails to suspend or dismiss any officer or member after such charges are filed.

The Retirement Board has power to make, revise and terminate awards from the Department Death, Disability and Retirement Fund to retired or disabled members, or to beneficiaries of deceased members.

The Tax Commissioner is charged with the responsibility for the enforcement of the statutes relating to certain state taxes, and the collection thereof, including the business and occupation, transportation privilege, consumers sales and use, personal income, inheritance and transfer, forfeiture, gasoline, cigarette, soft drinks and license taxes. He prepares tentative assessments for all public utilities operating within the State; assists the Board of Public Works in matters of assessments and revenue; enforces statutes relating to the assessment and collection of all state, county, district and municipal property taxes; administers and enforces statutes relating to the property appraisal and property evaluation programs. The Tax Commissioner is an ex-officio member and chairman of the State Sinking Fund Commission, ex-officio member of the State Board of School Finance, and ex-officio member of the West Virginia Industrial Development Authority. As ex-officio Chief Inspector of Public Offices he is responsible for the supervision, inspection and auditing of the accounts and records of public officials as designated by the statutes.

Salary of Director: \$10,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Six years.

Appeal Board: Three Members appointed by Governor, each receiving a salary of \$300 per month. Term: Six years, Bi-partisan, Chairman designated by Governor. Meets first Tuesday in February, April, June, August, October and December; sessions not to exceed 20 days each.

Silicosis Medical Board: Compensation per diem fixed by Commissioner. Three members, licensed physicians, appointed by Commissioner. Term: Six years. Commissioner selects chairman annually.

Occupational Disease Medical Board: Compensation per diem fixed by Commissioner. Three members, licensed physicians, appointed by Commissioner. Term: Six years. Commissioner selects chairman annually.

The Acts provides workmen with hospitalization and medical care for injuries sustained in the course of and growing out of their employment in industry, fixes compensation during their disability, and, in case of death, provides for their dependents. Workmen's Compensation Appeal Board reviews action of Director upon appeal of any employer, employee or dependent. Silicosis Medical Board determines the presence of silicosis, stage and degree of resultant disability. The function of the Occupational Diseases Medical Board is to determine all medical questions relating to cases of compensation for occupational diseases other than silicosis, under the direction and supervision of the Director.

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, Article 1, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year. Each board is also given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers are authorized to administer oaths.

Each applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of \$20, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge \$5 for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof. All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board, and each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues. An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked has the right to appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Unless otherwise specified, members of boards are allowed \$10 per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January, and the secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

STATE BOARD OF ACCOUNTANCY

Created under Chapter 128, Acts of the Legislature 1959; non-partisan; composed of six members, at least three to be certified public accountants, all to have been in practice in West Virginia for at least five years; appointed by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate; term, three years; members eligible for reappointment; board elects own officers; self-sustaining; members receive \$25 per diem while in session, and actual expenses, duties, to regulate the practice of public accounting, provide for the certification and registration of persons engaged in accounting and the issuance of certificates and registration cards to such persons. (Code, 30-9)

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE AERONAUTICS COMMISSION

STATE LICENSING BOARD

(Welfare)

Created under authority of Chapter 19, Acts of the 1945 Legislature. Consists of five members, one of whom shall be the Director of the State Department of Welfare, and one of whom shall be the State Health Commissioner, and three other persons to be appointed by the Governor. The Director of the Department of Welfare shall be President of the Board. Of the three persons first to be appointed by the Governor, one shall serve for a period of two years and one for a period of four years and one for a period of six years; thereafter terms of appointment to be for six years. Meetings on the third Thursday of October of each year for the purpose of passing on applications for licensing and revoking the license of Child Welfare Agencies not conforming to the laws of this State relating to child welfare. The Board shall be paid actual traveling expenses in traveling to and from said annual meetings, and the three persons appointed by the Governor shall receive a per diem not exceeding \$10 per diem for time actually spent attending said meetings. No more than three members of said Board shall be members of the same political party.

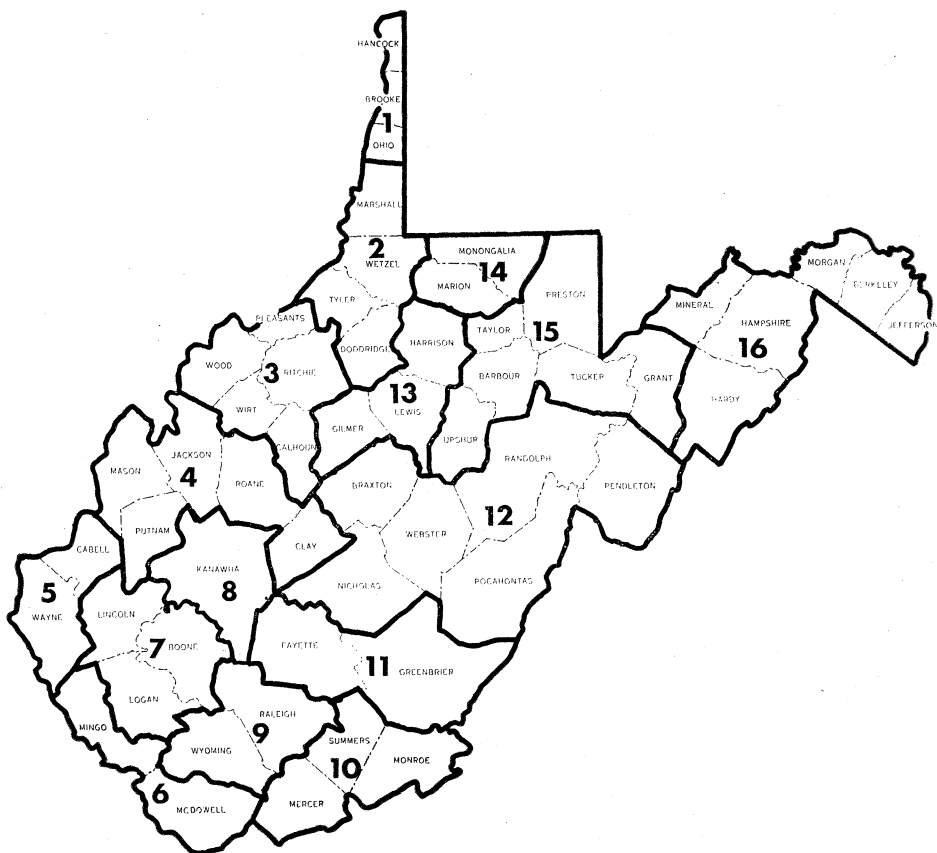

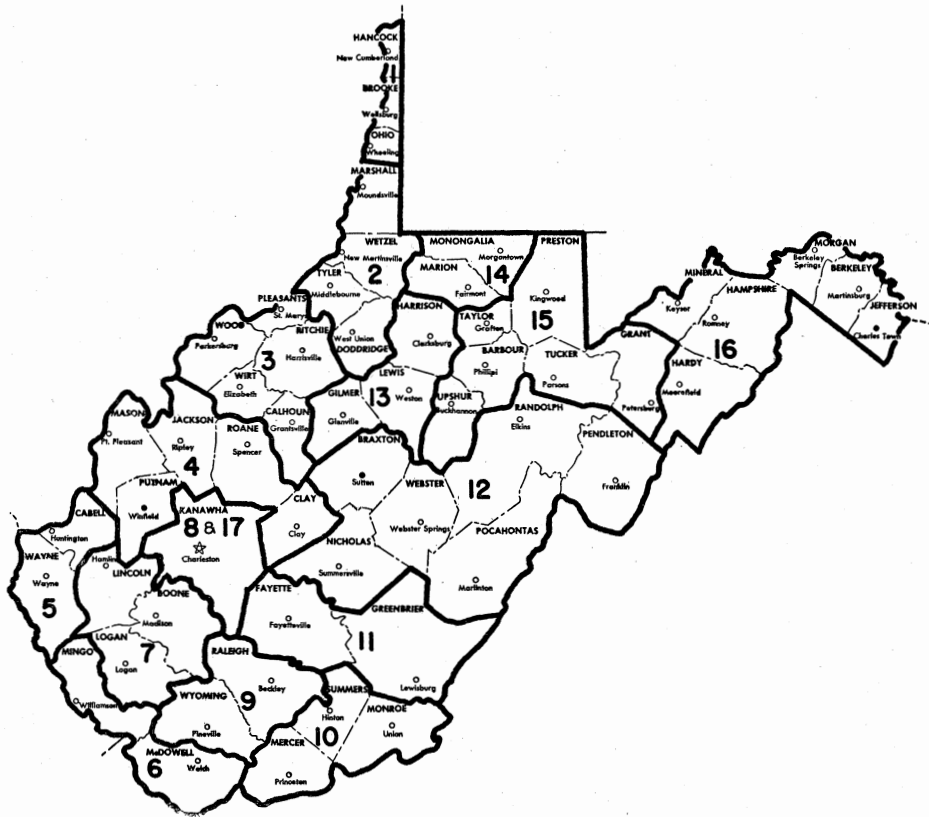

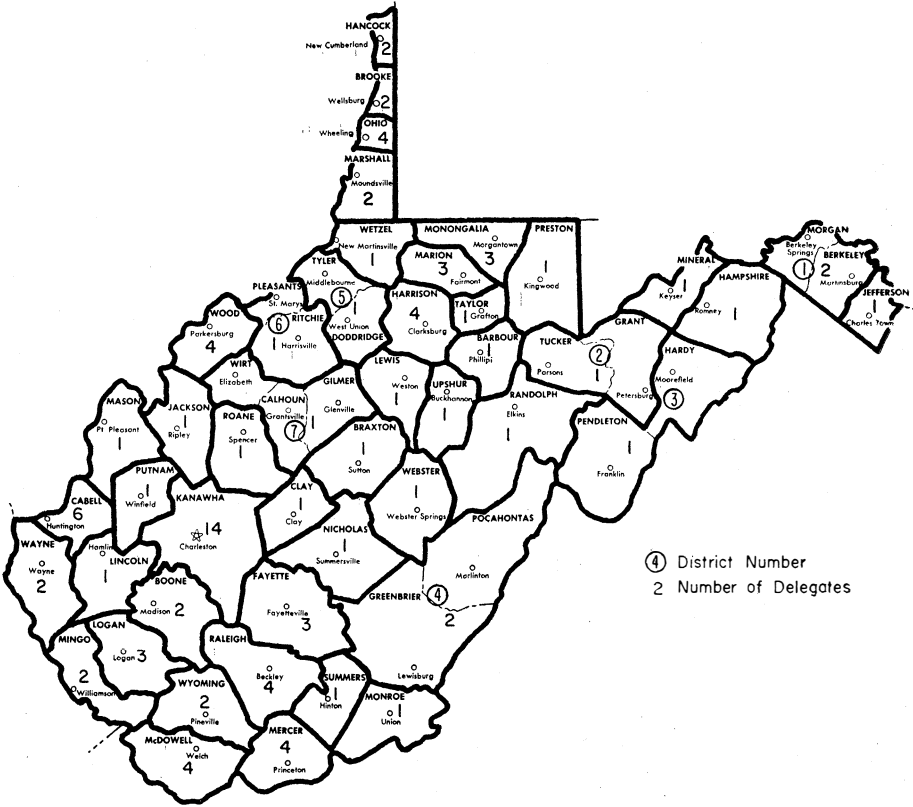

LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

CLARENCE H. KOONTZ, Auditor

Main Unit, State Capitol

Created by an Act of the Legislature in the Session of 1953, for the purpose of providing more expeditious management and efficient study of the financial problems which confront each session of the Legislature, and to provide a more economical control by the Legislature over the revenues and expenditures of the State.

The Legislative Auditor is appointed by the Joint Committee of Government and Finance, and serves at its will and pleasure. His duty shall be to compile fiscal information for the use of the Senate and House of Delegates, and to make a continuous audit and analysis of the revenues and expenditures of the State during and between sessions of the Legislature.

He shall be solely responsible to the Legislature, and shall prepare an appropriate budget for each spending unit, for each annum for which appropriations are sought and shall submit his report to the Committee at least thirty days prior to any Legislative Session with appropriate recommendations, together with such other findings and reports as are deemed necessary. His compensation is fixed by the Joint Committee on Government and Finance, and he shall receive in addition, necessary traveling expenses incident to the performance of his duties. The Legislative Auditor may also appoint and employ such assistants which may be necessary in the discharge of his duties and the salaries of such employees shall be fixed by the Committee.

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RULES OF THE SENATE

(Fifty-sixth Legislature)

Presiding Officer

1. The President of the Senate may appoint a *President pro Tempore*, who during the absence of the President, shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. The President having taken the chair and a quorum being present, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end that any mistake may be corrected that may have been made in the entries.

2. The presiding officer of the Senate may call a member to the chair who shall exercise his functions for the time being, but no member by virtue of such appointment, shall preside for a longer period than three days.

3. The presiding officer of the Senate shall have the regulation of such parts of the Capitol and of its passage as are, or may be, set apart for the use of the Senate, its officers and committees.

Admittance to Senate Chamber

4. No person except members of the House of Delegates, former members of the West Virginia Legislature, duly accredited representatives of the press, radio and television, and legislative attaches engaged in the proper discharge of their duties, shall be admitted within the Senate chamber while the Senate is in session. All introduction of guests shall be made in recess of the Senate. The rear or east balcony of the Senate chamber shall be reserved for guests of the members of the Senate, and admission thereto shall be by pass signed by the President of the Senate and the member seeking admission of said guest. No person, not a member of the Senate, shall, while within the chamber when the Senate is in session, seek in any manner whatsoever to influence the vote or opinion of any senator on any subject of legislative consideration, under penalty of disbarment from the chamber for the remainder of the legislative session. No *attache* of the Senate shall, at any time, engage in such activity, under penalty of immediate dismissal by the Committee on Rules.

Duties of the Clerk—Official Journal

5. The Journal of the Senate shall be daily drawn up by the Clerk and shall be read the succeeding day. It shall be printed under the supervision of the Clerk and delivered to the members without delay. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for corrections, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith, and from the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto ten copies shall be printed on 6 x 9 heavy weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof signed by the President and Clerk of the Senate certifying that the same is the official Journal of the Senate. They shall be bound in flexible binding and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the Senate of West Virginia", with designation of regular or extra session and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the House of Delegates.

6. The Clerk of the Senate shall not suffer any records or papers to be taken from the table, or out of his custody, by any person except a chairman of a committee; but he may deliver any bill or paper, directed to be printed, to the printer of the Senate, or to any member of the Senate, on taking his receipt for the same.

7. The Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates may interchange messages between the hours of adjournment and that of meeting on the following day, so that said message may be read immediately after the usual order of the day.

Powers of the Senate Over Its Members

8. A majority of the Senators shall be necessary to proceed to business; two members may adjourn, and three members may order a call of the Senate, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the Senate, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been twice called.

9. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund. And this rule shall apply, as well to the first convention of the Senate at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session, after the hour has arrived to which the Senate stood adjourned.

10. No Senator shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, and reported to the Senate, unless by order of the President of the Senate.

11. The Senate may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)

12. The Senate may punish by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 26.)

Privileges of Members

13. Every member, when speaking, shall stand in his own place, and address the President; and when he has finished, take his seat.

14. Every member within the Senate chamber, when a question is put, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the Senate excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting must be made before the Senate divides or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.

15. If a member be called to order, for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the Senate for words spoken in debate, if any member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exceptions to them have been taken.

Roll Calls

16. No member of the Senate, or other person except the Clerk and his assistants, shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called or counted.

17. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject, without leave of the Senate; nor more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

18. While the President is reporting or putting a question, none shall entertain private discourse, read, stand up, walk into, out of, or across the Senate Chamber.

19. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Chair, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his views, in preference to any other member.

20. While the President is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

21. During any debate, any Senator, though he has spoken to the matter, may arise and speak to the orders of the Senate, if they be transgressed, in case the President does not; but if the President stands up at any time, he is first to be heard.

Absence Without Leave

22. If any member of the Senate absent himself from the service thereof without leave, except in case of his sickness or other unavoidable cause which may prevent his attendance, the Senate may by order or resolution, direct his absence to be entered on the Journal.

Absence With Leave

23. No member of the Senate shall absent himself from its service without leave first obtained.

Standing Committees

24. At the commencement of each session the following standing committees shall be appointed, to consist of not less than five nor more than nine members, except the Committee on Interstate Cooperation, which shall consist of five members; the Committees on Education, on Forestry and Conservation, and on Public Buildings and Humane Institutions, which shall each consist of not less than eleven, and not more than fifteen members; the Committee on Roads and Navigation, which shall consist of seventeen members, and the Committees on Judiciary and on Finance, which shall each consist of eighteen members.

25. All standing committees shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and he shall designate the chairman of each committee and may also designate a vice chairman of any standing committee when he may deem it advisable.

Record of Meetings

The chairman of each standing committee of the Senate shall cause to be kept for the purpose, a record of every meeting of such committee, wherein shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each committee meeting, and every hearing had before the committee.
- (b) The attendance of members of the committee at each meeting thereof.
- (c) The name of any person appearing before the committee, and the interest represented by him.

Any member of such standing committee may cause a notation to be made upon the record aforesaid of the reason for his absence at any former meeting of the committee; and in the absence of any such explanatory note, the presumption shall be that his absence was without reasonable cause.

Meetings to Be Open

All meetings of the committees, other than executive sessions, shall be open to the public.

Reports to Committees

The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill, resolution, or otherwise, any proposed legislation originating therein, in conformity with Senate Rule No. 35 and Joint Rule No. 21 of the Senate and House of Delegates; as well as to report back a committee substitute for a Senate bill or resolution, a Senate committee substitute for a House bill or resolution, or otherwise. Reports of committees shall be advisory only. All committees shall submit their reports to the Senate in writing, and the same shall be printed in the Journal.

Preservation of Records

On the adjournment of each session of the Legislature, the chairman of the respective committees shall deliver to the Clerk of the Senate the record book herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of such Clerk to preserve the same among the archives of his office.

Select Committees

26. Select committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members unless the Senate shall direct otherwise.

Committee on Privileges and Elections

27. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall report in all cases of privileges and contested elections, the principles and reasons on which their resolutions are founded.

28. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall examine the oaths taken by each member, and the evidence of their election, and report to the Senate.

Committee to Examine Clerk's Office

29. The Committee to Examine the Clerk's Office shall see that all papers belonging thereto are properly filed, labeled and put away in the presses, and the books belonging to the office are chronologically arranged, and shall make report thereof to the Senate at each session.

Committee of the Whole

30. When the Senate shall resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the chair and appoint a chairman to preside in the committee.

31. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the Senate. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except

the rule limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in the Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the Senate, except so far as reported to the Senate by the chairman of the committee.

Order of Business

32. The order of business of the Senate shall be:
- I. To read the Journal.
 - II. To dispose of communications from the House of Delegates and the Executive.
 - III. To receive reports from Standing Committees.
 - IV. To receive reports from Select Committees.
 - V. To receive bills, resolutions, motions and petitions.
 - VI. To act upon unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, and no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
 - VII. Senate and House bills on third reading.
 - VIII. Senate and House bills on second reading.
 - IX. Senate and House bills on first reading.
 - X. Miscellaneous business.

Introduction of Bills and Resolutions

33. Each bill or resolution shall be prepared in triplicate, signed by the member or members (not to exceed two) by whom it is to be introduced and be filed with the Clerk not later than two o'clock p. m. of the legislative day next preceding its introduction. The original copy shall be the official bill or resolution for the use of the Clerk, committees and for the permanent files; the second for printing or copying; and the third for the use of the press and the public.

Each bill or resolution shall be numbered, edited and corrected as to form by the Clerk and reported by him to the Senate on the next legislative day, under the fifth order of business. In case of urgency, on motion for leave agreed to by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, a member may introduce a bill or resolution from the floor.

Bills and Joint Resolutions to Be Read on Three Separate Days

34. All bills and joint resolutions originating in the Senate shall be read on three separate days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays, on each bill or joint resolution, this rule may be dispensed with.

Title of Bills

35. In the title of all bills to amend chapters or sections of the Code, or acts passed since the Code was adopted, the several committees to whom they are referred, or by whom they originated, shall insert the subject matter of the chapter.

36. All engrossed bills shall be fully and distinctly read when put upon their passage.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Consideration of Bills

37. All bills or business originating in the Senate, shall be considered in the order in which they are introduced and all bills and resolutions received from the House of Delegates shall be introduced in the order in which they are received, unless in either case the Senate otherwise directs.

Concurrent and Simple Resolutions to Lie on the Table

38. All concurrent and simple resolutions, when introduced, shall lie on the table at least one day and then be referred to the appropriate committee unless the Senate by a vote of the majority of the members present otherwise directs.

Appropriation Bills

39. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 42.)

Reference of Bills and Resolutions to Committees

40. All bills and resolutions passed or adopted by and reported from the House of Delegates shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committees unless the Senate otherwise directs. They shall then be proceeded with in the same manner as Senate bills or resolutions. All bills introduced on leave shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry, and if the committee report a bill different from the one introduced such bill shall be received and treated by the Senate as the original bill, and shall be read a first time and printed, unless in any of the aforesaid cases the Senate shall direct otherwise.

41. On each reading of the bill the Clerk shall state whether it is the first, second or third reading of such bill.

42. On the demand of any two members when a bill is being read for amendment, it shall be read section by section, and when the amendments which may be moved shall be disposed of, the question, unless the Senate otherwise order, shall be taken on ordering the bill to be engrossed and read the third time. If a bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments thereto have been made, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform to the amendments. The bill shall then be re-printed, and shall be the engrossed bill. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill. All Senate bills so ordered shall be jacketed, endorsed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the House and returned to the Senate without amendments, or if amended, and the amendments should be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a House bill on second reading if the same be amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full in typewriting on slips of paper, and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the House, and all amendments shall appear in the Senate Journal.

43. When a bill or resolution of the House of Delegates is passed or rejected by the Senate, the fact of its passage or rejection, with the bill or resolution, shall be communicated to the House of Delegates.

Messages

44. Messages may be introduced in any stage of business except when a question is being put by the presiding officer, while the yeas and nays are being called by the Clerk, or while the ballots are being counted.

Passage of Bills and Joint Resolutions

45. When a bill or joint resolution is put upon its passage, the President shall propound the question, "Shall the bill (or joint resolution, as the case may be) pass?" On the passage of every bill or joint resolution the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and be entered on the Journal. When the bill is on the second reading, and the question is upon striking out, the President shall propound the question: "Shall these words be stricken out?"

Motions

46. When a question is pending, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone the question to a different day, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.

47. On the first reading of a bill, a motion to reject the bill shall be in order.

Adverse Report by Committee

48. If a committee shall have reported adversely to a bill, the President, immediately after the report of said committee is read shall put the question: "Shall the bill be rejected?", which question shall have precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn.

Reconsideration of Vote

49. The question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the Senate, and cannot during the session be drawn again into debate unless reconsidered, and it shall be in order to reconsider any vote only within two legislative days next after the one upon which such vote was taken. A motion to reconsider shall be in order only when made by a Senator who voted with the prevailing side, and when the vote was not taken by yeas and nays all Senators will be conclusively presumed to have voted with the prevailing side.

50. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question in reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

Division of the Question

51. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided; but on motion to strike out and insert, it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question, but the rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition; nor prevent a subsequent motion to simply strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

52. In filling the blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put.

Previous Question

53. There shall be a motion for the previous question, which being ordered by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been asked and ordered. The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions, or may be made to embrace and authorize motions and amendments and include the bill to its engrossment and third reading and then, on renewal and second of said motion, to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order pending a motion for or after the previous question shall have been ordered on its passage, for the President to entertain and submit a motion to commit with or without instructions to a standing or select committee; and a motion to lay upon the table shall be in order on the second and third reading of a bill.

A call of the Senate shall not be in order after the previous question is ordered, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a quorum is not present.

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

Yeas and Nays

54. When the yeas and nays are ordered, or a call of the Senate is directed, the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order, excepting, however, the name of the President, which shall be called last.

55. The yeas and nays on any question shall, at the desire of one tenth of the members present, be entered on the Journal and any member may enter any protest on the Journal upon the determination of any question. After the yeas and nays shall have been taken, and before they are counted or entered on the Journal, the Clerk shall read over the names of those who voted in the affirmative and those who voted in the negative, at which time any member shall have the right to correct any mistake committed in enrolling his name.

56. When a bill or joint resolution passed by the Senate shall be amended by the House of Delegates, the question of agreeing to the bill or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on by yeas and nays in the Senate, and the result entered upon its Journal. In all such cases the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 31.)

57. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.

58. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote shall be *viva voce*, and be entered upon the Journal.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 44.)

Executive Session

59. When nominations shall be made in writing by the Governor to the Senate a future day shall be assigned, unless the Senate unanimously direct otherwise, for taking them into consideration.

60. When acting on the nominations of the Governor, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Clerk, his assistants, the Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper, and all such officers shall be sworn to secrecy.

61. All confidential communications made by the Governor to the Senate and all proceedings thereon, shall be by the members thereof kept secret until the Senate shall, by unanimous affirmative vote of the members present, remove the injunction of secrecy. When an executive session of the Senate has been dissolved, the result of its action upon any executive nomination considered therein shall be forthwith certified to the Governor in a formal communication signed by the President and attested by the Clerk.

62. All information and remarks touching the character or qualification of any person nominated by the Governor to office shall be kept secret. The legislative proceedings and the executive proceedings of the Senate shall be kept and recorded in separate books.

Constitutional Amendment

63. When an amendment to be proposed to the Constitution is under consideration, the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to the Senate shall not be requisite to decide any question for amendments, or extending to the merits, being short of the final question.

Adjournment

64. When the Senate adjourns each day, it shall stand adjourned to 2 o'clock P. M., the next day, unless the Senate otherwise direct.

65. When the Senate adjourns each day, every member shall keep his seat until the President leaves the Chair.

Parliamentary Practice

66. In all cases not provided for by the Rules of the Senate or with Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Delegates, the Senate shall be governed by Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.

Suspension of Rule

67. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of two thirds of all the members of the Senate present.

Withdrawal of Bills from Committee

68. Any bill, resolution or business may, by a vote of the majority of the members present, be withdrawn from the committee to which it had been referred or be taken from the table, and placed upon the regular or special calendar of the Senate in such order of business as the Senate may direct.

RULES OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

INTRODUCTORY

Membership of the House

By an act of the Legislature (Ch. 166, Regular Session, 1951) the House of Delegates shall consist of one hundred members. The membership is apportioned to the counties according to the population, but giving each county one delegate. Delegates are elected for a term of two years.

Qualifications

No person shall be a Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the district or county from which he is elected, and if a Delegate remove from the district or county for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 12.)

No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 13.)

No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 14.)

No Senator or Delegate, during the time for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 15.)

Oaths

Members of the House of Delegates, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe to the following oaths or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Delegate according to the best of my ability, and that I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person, for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Delegate, on any bill, resolution or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Delegate." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall receive and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 16.)

Under authority of Ch. 4, Art. 1, Sec. 6, of the code of West Virginia, the presiding officer or Clerk of either house may administer the oaths of office to any member or officer of such house.

Privileged from Civil Arrest

Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 17.)

Compensation

The members of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars per year and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate shall each receive an additional compensation of five dollars per day for each day they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatsoever. (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 33.)

Members' salaries are paid on the third Wednesday in January of each year.

Resignation and Filling of Vacancies

Resignations of members of the House should be made to the Speaker, Governor and chairman of the executive committee of the party of which the member belongs in the county from which he was elected.

Vacancies in the House are filled by an appointment by the Governor, in each instance from a list of three qualified persons submitted by the county party executive committee. (Ch. 3, Art. 10, Sec. 6 of the Code.)

Organization of the House

The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government on the second Wednesday of January in each year. At the sessions held in odd-numbered years officers are elected for two-year terms. While neither the Constitution nor statute sets the hour for convening, the custom has been for each house to convene at twelve o'clock noon. The Constitution says, "The oldest Delegate present shall call the House to Order at the beginning of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and taken his seat." (Const., Art. VI, Sec. 24.) Custom has made it the duty of the Clerk of the previous House to call the House to order and call the oldest Delegate present to the chair to preside until a Speaker is elected.

The session is then opened with prayer, following which the Clerk reads a list of the members as certified by the Secretary of State, and all notices of contested elections. The roll is then called to ascertain those present. The next step in the organization is the administering of the oath of office to the members.

With the conclusion of the above formalities the House is ready to proceed to the election of a Speaker. After this election, the election of other officers, i. e., Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper shall be the next order of business. The election of all officers shall be by *viva voce* vote.

It is then in order to provide by resolution for the adoption of rules to govern the procedure of the House and for informing the Senate that the House is organized. Upon being likewise informed of the organization of the Senate, both houses, by resolution, shall raise a joint committee to visit upon the Governor to inform him that they are organized and that they are in readiness to receive any message or communication he may desire to present.

However, at the session of the Legislature following each general election at which a governor, and other state officials are elected, immediately following the organization of the two houses, they shall meet in joint assembly in the hall of the House of Delegates, when the speaker, before proceeding to any other bus-

iness, shall open and publish the election returns in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature. (Const., Art. VII, Sec. 3.)

The message of the Governor is usually delivered in person by the Governor before both houses of the Legislature, assembled in joint assembly. When the Governor desires to deliver his message to the joint assembly, it shall be proper to provide by resolution for the convening of a joint session of the two houses.

ELECTION AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Officers and Their Compensation

1. The House, at the commencement of each Legislature, shall elect a Speaker, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Doorkeeper. All officers, except the Speaker, shall receive such compensation as the House may determine.

Vote to be Viva Voce

2. In the election of officers by the House, the vote shall be given *viva voce*, and a majority of the whole number of votes given, a quorum being present, shall be necessary to elect. If, upon any vote, there be no election, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped, and any votes thereafter given to such person shall not be taken into the counting to affect the result in any way. But if two or more have the lowest and equal number of votes, they may be voted for again. No question before the House, or in committee of the whole, shall be voted on by ballot.

DUTIES AND RIGHTS OF THE SPEAKER

Call to Order

3. The Speaker shall take the chair on each legislative day precisely at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order and, after prayer, if a quorum is present, proceed to the order of business.

Preservation of Order

4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum while the House is in session; enforce the rules and orders of the House; prescribe the order in which business shall come up for consideration, subject to the rules and orders of the House; announce the question of business before the House when properly requested by any member; receive all messages and communications; put to vote all questions which are properly moved; announce the result of all votes and authenticate, when necessary, the acts and proceedings of the House.

Decorum in Debate

5. In debate, the Speaker shall prevent personal reflections and confine members to the question under discussion, but he shall not engage in any debate, or propose his opinion on any question without first calling some other member to the chair. When two or more members arise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

Questions of Order

6. The Speaker shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House when demanded by any ten members. He may speak to questions of order in preference to other members, and may make the concluding speech on any appeal from his decision, notwithstanding, he may have before spoken on the question; but no other members shall speak more than once on such appeal without leave of the House.

When properly requested by a member, the Speaker shall inform the House upon any point of order or practice pertinent to the business before it.

Preserving Order in Galleries

7. The Speaker shall have general control of the House Chamber, lobbies, and rooms and of the corridors and passages in that part of the Capitol assigned to the use of the House. In case of any disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries, corridors or passages, he shall have the power to order the same to be cleared, and may cause any person guilty of such disturbance or disorderly conduct to be brought before the bar of the House. In all such cases the members present may take such measures to prevent a repetition of such misconduct, either by the infliction of censure or such other penalty, as may be authorized by law, on the parties thus offending, as the House may deem best.

Presiding Officer in Absence of Speaker

8. The Speaker may designate by an appointment in writing entered upon the Journal of the House, any member to perform the duties of the chair for a period not exceeding three consecutive legislative days, but for no longer period, except by special consent of the House, and the member so designated shall be during the time for which he is designated, vested with all the powers and duties conferred by these rules, or by law, upon the Speaker. The Speaker shall have the right to call any member to the chair to perform the duties of Speaker but such substitution shall not exceed beyond an adjournment.

If the Speaker be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the House, it shall be called to order by the Clerk, and a Speaker pro tempore selected by the House. The Speaker pro tempore shall preside over the House until such time as the Speaker shall be present.

Appointment of Attaches

9. The Speaker shall as soon as practicable after being authorized, appoint for the House such committee clerks, stenographers, pages and other attaches and employees as the House may by resolution direct, and may, at his discretion, remove any person so appointed and appoint another in his stead. He may also appoint, without resolution, a private secretary and a stenographer to himself. He shall appoint an official Chaplain whose duty it shall be to be present at the convening of each day's session for the purpose of opening the session with prayer.

Appointment of Committees

10. The Speaker shall appoint all committees, except where the House shall otherwise order. In appointing standing committees he shall designate the chairman and vice chairman of same. In the absence of the chairman of a committee the vice chairman shall preside. When the House authorizes the appointment of a committee the Speaker may wait until the next legislative day to make the appointment.

Chairman of Committee on Rules

11. The Speaker shall be *ex officio* member and chairman of the Committee on Rules.

Acts and Writs Signed by the Speaker

12. All acts shall be signed by the Speaker, and all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the House or any committee having authority to issue same, shall be under his hand and attested by the Clerk.

Putting Questions

13. The Speaker shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

Vote of the Speaker

14. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the Speaker shall vote, unless excused; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the House is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost. When the yeas and nays are taken the Speaker's name shall be called last.

Examination of Journal

15. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to examine the Journal of the House, daily, before it is read and cause all errors and omissions therein to be corrected.

CLERK**Clerk to Have Charge of Clerical Business of House**

16. The Clerk shall have charge and supervision of all the clerical business of the House. He shall perform the duties imposed on him by law and the rules of the House. He shall have charge of the Clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him.

Duties of Clerk

17. It shall be the Clerk's duty to read to the House all papers ordered to be read; to call the roll and note and report the absentees, when a call of the House is ordered; to call the roll and note the answers of members, when a question is taken by yeas and nays; to assist, under the direction of the Speaker, in taking the count when any vote of the House is taken; to notify committees of their appointment and the business referred to them; to superintend the execution of all printing ordered by the House, and to report to the Speaker, to be submitted to the House, every failure of the printer to execute the same properly and promptly. He shall attest all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House and shall certify to the passage of all bills, and to the adoption of all joint and concurrent resolutions by the Legislature. In addition to his other duties the Clerk shall keep the accounts for pay and mileage of members, officers and attaches, and for printing and other contingent expenses of the House, and prepare and sign warrants or requisitions for the same.

The Clerk shall superintend the recording of the Journal of the proceedings, the engrossing and enrolling of bills, and shall cause to be kept and prepared for the printer the Daily Journal of the proceedings of the House.

Clerk to Have Custody of All Records

18. The Clerk shall have the custody of all records and papers of the House, and shall not allow them to be taken from the table or out of his possession without the leave of the House, unless to be delivered to the chairman of a committee to which they may have been referred and then he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall endorse on bills and papers brief notes of proceedings had thereon by the House and preserve the same in convenient files for reference.

Clerk to Appoint Assistants

19. The Clerk shall appoint such assistants as are authorized by law or by resolution of the House and shall have power to suspend or remove any of his appointees and appoint others in their stead. He may also appoint without resolution a secretary to himself and a stenographer who shall be the official stenographer for the House. The per diem of the assistants and employees of the Clerk shall be fixed by the Committee on Rules.

Clerk to Have Charge of All Printing

20. The Clerk shall have supervision and charge of all printing done for the House and the public printer shall print only such documents and other matter as the Clerk authorizes.

Payment for Printing

21. The public printer shall have all bills for printing approved by the supervisor of public printing and then present the same to the Clerk who shall draw his warrant or requisition for same upon the Auditor payable from the Legislative Printing Fund. The supervisor of public printing shall see that all bills are in accordance with the state contract for legislative printing before he approves their payment. A copy of all bills for printing shall be furnished the Clerk by the public printer.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

Duties

22. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the House and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings and to maintain order under the direction of the Speaker. He shall execute the commands of the House from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the Speaker.

Under the direction of the Speaker, he shall superintend the distribution of all documents and papers to be distributed to the members. He shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat.

He shall have charge under the Speaker for the purpose of maintaining order, of the Hall of the House, its lobby, galleries and other rooms in the Capitol assigned for its use, and shall exclude from the floor all persons not entitled to the privilege of the same. He shall attend to seating visitors, and shall see that the janitors and cloak-room attendants perform their duties, and see that the House chamber is properly ventilated, heated, and lighted.

DOORKEEPER

Duties

23. It shall be the duty of the Doorkeeper to attend the House during its sessions, and to announce all messages. He shall have charge of the main door of the Chamber during the sittings of the House, and shall see that the other doors are properly attended; have general charge and oversight of the assistant doorkeepers; detail such assistant doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the Sergeant-at-Arms may deem proper; assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in seeing that the rules relating to admission to the floor are strictly enforced, and shall perform such other duties as the Speaker or the House may order.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS

Absence From the House

24. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend, but any member who conscientiously believes that the seventh day of the week ought to be observed as the Sabbath shall be excused from attending upon the House on that day.

Every Member to Vote

25. Every member present when a question is put, or when his name is called, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the House excuses him. A motion to excuse a member from voting must be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason therefor.

Members Shall Be in Places When Voting

26. While the yeas and nays are being taken every member shall be in his seat, and during the session of the House no person other than a member shall occupy the chair of a member.

Quorum

27. A majority of all the members elected to the House shall be necessary to proceed to business; seven members may adjourn, and ten members may order a call of the House, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the House, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been called twice.

When Less Than Quorum Present

28. In case a number less than a quorum of the House shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for nonattendance shall be made as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund of the House. This rule shall apply to the first meeting of the House, at the legal time of meeting, as well as to each day of the session after the hour has arrived to which the House stood adjourned.

Taking Members Into Custody

29. No member of the House shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Elections and Privileges, and reported to the House of Delegates, unless by order of the Speaker of the House of Delegates.

Punishment of Members

30. The House of Delegates may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense. (Const., Art. 6, Sec. 25.)

Providing for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

31. The House of Delegates may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session. (Const., Art. 6, Sec. 26.)

ORDER AND DECORUM IN DEBATE

Recognition and Decorum

32. When a member is about to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the House, he shall rise in his place and respectfully address the presiding officer as "MR. SPEAKER," and, upon being recognized, shall proceed, confining himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities and indecorous or disrespectful language.

When a member arises and addresses the Chair, the Speaker may recognize him by name; but no member in debate shall designate another by name.

Recognition by the Chair

33. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the one who is to speak first, and his decision shall be final and not open to debate or appeal. However, in all other cases the member who shall rise first and address the Chair shall be first recognized.

Mover of Question to Have Preference in Debate

34. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Speaker, and then the mover of the question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon.

Member Out of Order

35. When any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted, with leave of the House, to explain; and the House shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair

shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed; if the decision be against him, and the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House, or such other punishment as the House may properly impose.

Calling to Order for Words Spoken in Debate

36. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to and they shall be taken down at the Clerk's table. And no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the exception to them was taken.

Decorum During Debate

37. While the Speaker is putting a question, ascertaining the result, or addressing the House, no one shall walk out of or across the House; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the Speaker.

Limitation on Debate

38. No member shall speak except in his place, and not more than twice on a question, except by leave of the House. And if a question be pending at the time of an adjournment and is renewed on the succeeding day, no member who shall have spoken twice on the preceding day shall be permitted again to speak without leave of the House. The House by majority vote may limit debate on any question.

Members Not to Be Disturbed While Speaking

39. No one shall disturb or interrupt a member who is speaking, without his permission, except to call to order if he be transgressing the rules.

Speaking Before Negative Is Put

40. When the Speaker is putting the question any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

PUTTING QUESTIONS AND VOTING

Putting Questions; Division

41. All questions shall be put distinctly in this form, to-wit: "*As many as are in favor* [as the question may be] say '*Aye*,'" and after the affirmative vote is expressed, "*As many as are opposed* say '*No*.'" If the Speaker be in doubt as to the result, or if a division is called for by any member the House shall divide. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats and be counted, and afterwards those in the negative. The count may be made by the Speaker, or, if he so directs, by the Clerk, or two members, one from each side, to be named for that purpose by the Speaker. When the result is ascertained the Speaker shall rise and state the decision of the House. Such vote shall not be printed in the Journal unless the yeas and nays are called for by not less than nine members of the House prior to the announcement of the decision by the Speaker.

Yeas and Nays

42. On the passage of every bill and joint resolution, and when the yeas and nays on any question are called for by one-tenth of those present, the Speaker shall direct a yea and nay vote to be taken, and every member present shall vote, unless excused. On all roll calls, when the voting machine is not used, before the result is announced, the Clerk shall read to the House the names of those who voted in the affirmative or in the negative, whichever is the smaller number, and announce the names of those absent and not voting, at which time

any member may correct a mistake committed in taking down his vote. The result shall then be announced, and the yeas and nays entered on the Journal, but if the House so orders, the announcement of the result and the entry of the yeas and nays upon the Journal may be postponed to the succeeding day, with liberty to absent members at any time before the result is announced by the Speaker, to appear and vote "Aye" or "No," in the presence of the House; and any member may, in the presence of the House, change his vote before the result is announced. The Journal shall also show those absent and not voting.

When the yeas and nays are called for by a member on any question, the Speaker shall hold this demand in abeyance until debate has closed upon the question under consideration, or until the previous question has been moved and sustained, and if sustained by one-tenth of the members present, the yeas and nays shall be taken.

Upon calls of the House, in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except the name of the Speaker shall be called last.

Pairs

43. Members may pair on any question by filing a signed statement of the same with the Clerk, who shall read the same to the House before the vote is taken. A blank form of pair for use of members shall be provided by the Clerk. No pair shall be recognized unless made in person by the member signing the same, nor unless one or both of the parties thereto are absent.

Division of Question

44. Any member may call for a division of any question before the vote thereon is taken, if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition will remain for the decision of the House, but the member calling for the division of a question shall state in what manner he proposes it shall be divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor motion to strike out and insert.

Calling of Yeas and Nays

45. No member or any person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called.

Tie Vote Loses Question

46. In all cases when the House is equally divided, the question shall be lost.

Verification of Vote

47. When a question upon which the yeas and nays have been taken has prevailed or failed by not more than five votes, the Speaker may, upon request of five members, order a verification of the vote. During such verification, no member shall change his vote unless it was erroneously recorded, nor may any member not having voted cast a vote. A verification must be called for immediately after a vote is announced and before any other business has intervened.

Explanation of Vote

48. No member shall be allowed to make any explanation of his vote during the taking of the yeas and nays; but after the roll has been called and the vote announced, any member may explain his vote and the explanation shall be recorded in the Journal if he requests it. The Speaker may limit the time allowed members for explaining votes.

When Members Not to Vote

49. Any member who has a personal or private interest in any measure or bill proposed or pending before the House shall disclose the fact and not vote thereon.

Voting by Machine

49-a. A voting machine may be used in taking the yeas and nays on any question, for quorum calls and for determining the result when a division is demanded. When a vote is to be taken on the voting machine the Speaker shall announce the question to be voted upon and direct the Clerk to prepare the machine. The Clerk shall then sound the gong which shall be notice to all members to vote. After reasonable time has been given all members to vote the Speaker shall ask the question, "Have all members voted?" vote himself, if the vote being taken is upon a question on which he is required to vote, and then direct the Clerk to close the machine and ascertain the result. As soon as this is done, the Clerk shall hand the record of the vote to the Speaker and he shall promptly announce the result. No vote may be changed after it has been recorded.

No member shall vote for another member, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member. In addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by law, any member who shall vote or attempt to vote for another member may be expelled as a member of the House or punished in such other manner as the House may determine. If a person not a member shall vote or attempt to vote for any member, he shall be barred from the floor of the House for the remainder of the session and may be further punished in such manner as the House may deem proper, in addition to such punishment as may be prescribed by law.

All other rules governing voting and the taking of the yeas and nays, in so far as applicable, shall apply to taking votes by means of the voting machine.

MOTIONS

Stating the Question

50. When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the Clerk before debate.

Form of Motion

51. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desires it; but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

Withdrawal of Motions

52. After a motion is stated by the Speaker or read by the Clerk, it is deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment, unless the previous question has been ordered, in which case it can only be withdrawn by leave of the House.

Order and Precedence of Motions

53. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except:
1. To adjourn.
 2. To lay on the table.
 3. For the previous question.
 4. To postpone to a day certain.
 5. To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending question immediately.
 6. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
 7. To commit to a Standing Committee.
 8. To commit to a Select Committee.
 9. To amend.
 10. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence of another motion to amend; and if carried, the bill is rejected.

Motion to Adjourn

54. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or when no business has been transacted since the motion to adjourn has been defeated.

Motions Not Debatable

55. The following motions shall not be decided without debate, and shall not be amended:

1. To adjourn.
2. To fix the time to which the House shall adjourn.
3. To lay on the table.
4. For the previous question.
5. To suspend the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days.
6. To recess.

Motions Not in Order

56. No motion directing the appropriation or payment of money shall be in order.

Effect of Indefinite Postponement

57. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted on during the session.

Motion to Reconsider

58. A motion to reconsider any question may be made by any member who voted with the majority, or in case of a tie vote, by any member. This motion shall be made on the same or next succeeding legislative day of the House. Such a motion, if seconded, shall take precedence of all other questions, except the consideration of a conference report or a motion to adjourn, and unless by motion postponed until some future time shall be acted upon at once. A motion to reconsider shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House, and if the House decides to reconsider, any member may thereafter call the subject up for consideration. A motion to reconsider a question, having been put and lost, shall not be renewed.

Debate on Motions to Reconsider

59. Debate shall be allowed on a motion to reconsider only when the question which it is proposed to reconsider is debatable. Where debate upon a motion to reconsider is in order, no member shall speak more than once nor for a longer period than three minutes.

Reconsideration of Question Requiring More Than Majority Vote

60. When a majority of members present vote in the affirmative on any question, but the question be lost because it is one in which the concurrence of a greater number than a majority of a quorum is necessary to an affirmative decision, any member may move for a reconsideration.

Effect of Motion to Table

61. A motion to lay on the table shall only have the effect of disposing of the matter temporarily, and may be taken from the table at any time after the eighth order of business has been passed.

Motion Must Be Germane

62. No motion on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

Previous Questions

63. When any question is before the House, any member being in order and having the floor may move the previous question, but such motion to be put must

be sustained by being seconded by ten members. The question being moved, the Speaker shall say, "*Is the motion sustained?*" and those favoring the motion shall rise. If a sufficient number arise, the previous question shall be thereby seconded, and the question shall then be put in this form, "*Shall the main question be now put?*" If this question be decided in the affirmative by a majority of the members voting, a quorum being present, it shall have the effect of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been asked and ordered, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have five minutes to close the discussion before the vote is taken; and when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have three minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. Should the previous question be decided in the negative, the House shall proceed with the matter before it as though the previous question had not been moved.

When a member moves the previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments or to the amendment or amendments only.

The previous question shall not be admitted in the Committee of the Whole.

MEETING OF THE HOUSE

Time of Meeting

64. The House shall meet every day, except Sunday, unless it shall be otherwise directed by special order, precisely at the hour to which it shall have adjourned at its last sitting; but if no hour were fixed at such sitting, then at two o'clock P. M.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

Daily

65. The daily order of business shall be as follows:
 - I. To read, correct, and approve the Journal.
 - II. To act upon leave of absence for members.
 - III. To receive and consider reports of standing committees.
 - IV. To receive and consider reports of select committees.
 - V. To receive and consider messages from the Executive, state officials, and other communications and remonstrances.
 - VI. To receive messages from the Senate, and consider amendments proposed by the Senate to bills passed by the House.
 - VII. To receive (a) resolutions, (b) petitions, (c) motions.
 - VIII. Bills introduced on motion for leave and referred to appropriate committees.
 - IX. To act on unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from previous day, but no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following on which it was offered.
 - X. House and Senate Bills on third reading.
 - XI. House and Senate Bills on second reading.
 - XII. House and Senate Bills on first reading.
 - XIII. Miscellaneous business.

Priority of Business

66. All questions relating to priority of business shall be decided without debate.

Special Orders

67. Any subject made a special order of business shall be laid before the House by the Speaker, or may be called up by any member, when the time fixed for its consideration arrives. If not called up or acted upon at the time fixed, it shall lose its standing as a special order.

Reports and Messages Receivable at Any Time

68. Messages from the Governor and Senate, communications and reports from state officers, reports from the Committee on Elections, which involve the right of a member to his seat, reports from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, reports from the Committee on Rules, and reports of Conference Committees may be received at any time when the House is not actually engaged in taking a vote on some question, in which case it shall be received as soon as the result of the vote is announced. When received it shall be disposed of as the House may direct.

Consideration of Local Bills

69. Local bills shall be placed upon a special calendar to be known as the Local Bill Calendar, and on Friday of each week, after the ninth order of business is passed, shall be taken up and disposed of before any other business is acted upon: *Provided*, That this rule shall not prohibit the consideration of local bills at such times as the House may determine after the last Friday within the constitutional duration of the regular session of the Legislature.

Special Calendar

70. The House may by resolution authorize the Committee on Rules to arrange a special daily calendar and the consideration of bills on this calendar shall take precedence over the Regular House calendar.

COMMITTEES

Kinds of Committees

71. Committees may be of four kinds, namely: Committee of the Whole House, Standing Committees, Select or Special Committees, and Conference Committees.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

72. The House may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time on the motion of any member, and in forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the chair and a chairman shall be appointed by him to preside over said committee. It shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the House. The proceedings in Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal except so far as reported to the House by the Chairman of the Committee.

Rules of Proceeding in the Committee of the Whole

73. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that any member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but he shall not speak a second time until every member desiring to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question nor a motion to lay on the table or to adjourn be made therein. The yeas and nays need not be taken in Committee of the Whole.

Consideration of Bills in Committee of the Whole

74. Upon demand by any member, bills committed to a Committee of the Whole House shall, in Committee of the Whole, be read by sections. All amendments made shall be noted by the Clerk and reported to the House by the Chairman. After being reported to the House, the bill shall again be subject to amendment before a vote on the report is taken.

Motion to Rise Decided Without Debate

75. A motion that the Committee of the Whole rise shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

STANDING

76. At the commencement of each regular session in odd-numbered years, the Speaker shall appoint the following standing committees, and all bills introduced and resolutions offered shall be referred to the appropriate committee, to-wit:

To consist of not less than eleven nor more than twenty-five members:

Agriculture
 Banking
 Claims
 Counties, Districts and Municipalities
 Delinquent Lands
 Education
 Elections
 Finance
 Forestry and Conservation
 Game and Fish
 Health
 Humane Institutions
 Insurance
 Judiciary
 Labor and Industry
 Military Affairs
 Mining
 Penal and Correctional Institutions
 Railroads
 Redistricting
 Roads
 Temperance
 Veterans Affairs, and

Rules, to consist of not less than seven nor more than twelve members, which number shall include the Speaker, majority leader and minority leader.

Committee on Elections

77. The Committee on Elections shall examine and report upon all the certificates, and other evidences referred to them, touching the right of persons claiming to have been elected members of the House, or to any office for the state at large; and also upon other petitions and matters touching elections and returns, or relating to the privileges of members and officers of the House, or witnesses attending the House or any committee thereof, as shall be referred to them.

Committee on Rules

78. The Committee on Rules shall have jurisdiction of all bills, resolutions, petitions, messages, memorials, and other matters relating to the following subjects:

- (a) Matters relating to the payment of money out of the contingent fund of the House or creating a charge upon the same.
- (b) Matters relating to the House Library; statuary and pictures; acceptance or purchase of works of art for the Capitol; purchase of books and manuscripts for the House; erection of monuments to the memory of individuals.
- (c) Matters relating to parliamentary rules; sale of food in the House wing of the Capitol; administration of the House wing of the Capitol; assignment of office space; and services to the House.
- (d) All matters relating to House printing.

The committee may report to the House, from time to time, rules for the government thereof, and amendments to such rules. The committee shall be privileged to report at any time and said report may be adopted by a majority vote.

All resolutions authorizing the appointment of attaches or relating to the appointment of persons, or prescribing the salary or pay of such attaches or persons, shall originate in and come from the Committee on Rules.

Committee on Finance

79. The Committee on Finance shall, as soon as possible after the commencement of the regular session, report the general tax and appropriation bill with an estimate of the probable revenue and expenditures, and of the public debt. They shall from time to time report such measures for equalizing and reducing taxation, supplying revenue and facilitating the collection thereof, reducing the public expenditure, and providing for the principal and interest of the public debt as may seem to them expedient; and they shall further examine into and report upon all matters and propositions relating to taxation and finance as shall be referred to them by the House.

Committee on Claims

80. All claims against the State, which may be presented to the House, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Reports of Committees

81. The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. All committees shall submit their reports to the House in writing, and the same shall be printed in the Journal. Reports of committees shall be advisory only. Committee chairmen shall see that the originals of all bills, resolutions, and such other documents as are referred to them, are returned to the House, with the report upon the matter to which they pertain.

Discharging Committee From Consideration of Bill

82. When a bill or resolution has been in the hands of a committee five legislative days after having been referred to it, the committee may be discharged from further consideration of the bill or resolution by a majority vote of all the members present. The chairman of a committee may move that his committee be discharged from consideration of the matter at any time after commitment and after the fiftieth day of the session any member may move to discharge a committee from consideration of any bill or resolution at any time after the same has been referred to it.

Committee Meetings

83. Meetings of all committees shall be upon a call of the chairman, but no committee shall sit during a session of the House without leave of the House. It shall be the duty of the Chairmen of Committees to announce, or have announced, from the floor of the House, or by the Speaker or Clerk, during the session of the House, committee meetings, and at such time, if practicable, the number of all bills to be considered at such meetings. In case of failure of the chairman of any committee to call a meeting of such committee upon the request of a member, then fifty per cent or more of the members of such committee shall have a right to call a meeting of such committee.

Committee Hearings

84. The introducer of a bill, and all other persons who shall so request of the chairman or clerk of the committee, shall be given an opportunity to be heard upon a measure referred to a committee, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration. Every committee hearing shall be open to the public.

Committee Clerks

85. The Speaker shall assign to the various committees such clerks and other clerical and stenographic help as may be necessary to properly carry on the work of the committees. Committee clerks shall keep such records and perform such duties as the chairman of the respective committees may direct.

Committee Records

86. The chairman of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record in which there shall be entered:

(a) The time and place of each hearing, and of each meeting of such committee.

(b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.

(c) The names and addresses of all persons appearing before the committee, with the name of person, persons, firm or corporation, and addresses, in whose behalf such appearance is made.

(d) The vote of each member on all motions, bills, resolutions and amendments acted upon, when a yea and nay vote is taken.

Such a record shall be read and approved at the next regular meeting of the committee. The committee records shall be open to inspection of the public at proper times and places and at the close of the session shall be filed with the Clerk of the House.

Committee Quorum; Sub-Committees

87. A majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A sub-committee, which shall report to the regular committee, may be appointed to consider and report to the committee on any matter referred to it.

Minority Views

88. The minority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the Journal, and said recommendations may, by a vote of the House, be substituted for and become the report of the committee.

House Rules to Govern Committee

89. The rules governing the proceedings of the House shall apply to the proceedings of the committee, in so far as the same are applicable.

Select or Special Committees

90. Select or special committees may be provided for on motion or resolution, designating the number and object, and, unless otherwise ordered, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

Conference Committees and Reports

91. All reports of conference committees shall be presented after having been signed by a majority of the conferees of each House and be printed in the Journal. No matter shall be considered by said committee, or reported upon by it, except that in disagreement between the two houses.

BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND PETITIONS

BILLS

Method of Introducing

92. All bills to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than 4:00 o'clock P. M. on the preceding legislative day. Before the next meeting of the House the Clerk shall number such bills as are presented and edit and correct them as to form. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business the Clerk shall report each of said bills by the title in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule shall not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor in case of urgency.

Bills to Be Presented in Triplicate

93. All bills shall be presented in triplicate and signed by the member introducing the same, the original copy for the use of the committee and for the permanent files of the House, the second for printing and copying, and the third for the use and accommodation of the members of the press, which shall be kept by the Clerk in some convenient place for this purpose.

Joint Sponsors of Bill

94. A bill may be introduced bearing the names of not more than two members as joint sponsors of the bill.

Reference to Committees

95. Bills introduced by any member, on motion for leave, or by any standing committee, shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and all such bills shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry. If the committee report a bill different from one so introduced, either by amendment or substitution, such bill shall be received and treated by the House as the original bill, and the committee report and Journal of the House shall show that the bill was either amended or substituted in committee.

What Bills to Contain

96. Bills proposing laws or changes in laws shall consist of a title, beginning with the words "A BILL TO," and contain a brief statement of the object of the proposed measure, and if it amends or changes a law, a reference to the law proposed to be changed. The bill proper shall begin with the enacting clause, "*Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia,*" and state at large the measure proposed.

Bill Not to Embrace More Than One Object

97. No bill shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be stated in the title, and no law shall be revived or amended by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large in the new act. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 30.)

Reporting Bills From Committee

98. When a bill is reported from committee with the recommendation that it do pass, it shall be placed on the calendar for the succeeding day and come up on first reading unless the House by action otherwise directs. If on the calendar when referred, it shall be replaced on the reading from which it was taken.

If a bill be reported favorably with amendments, the report and Journal shall so show, and when the bill reaches second reading the committee amendments shall be acted upon before other amendments are offered, except amendments to the committee amendments.

If a committee to which a bill has been referred reports that the same ought not to pass, the Speaker shall immediately propound the question, "*Shall the bill be rejected?*" If this question is decided in the negative, the bill shall be disposed of in the same manner as if reported favorably.

Printing of Bills

99. The Clerk shall have all bills printed that are ordered to second reading, and such other bills as the House may order printed.

Recommitment of Bills

100. A bill may be recommitted at any time before it passes. Should such recommitment take place after its engrossment, and an amendment be reported, the bill shall be placed on second reading when reported back.

Reading Bills

101. Before any bill is read by the Clerk, he shall state to the House whether it is on first, second or third reading.

Bills to Have Three Readings

102. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed

with. Upon any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill may be read twice or three times on the same day, and upon the first or second reading of any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the constitutional rule in order that the bill may, upon such reading, be read by its title: *Provided*, That in all cases there shall be three readings on each bill, and that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 29.)

Bills—First Reading

103. The first reading of a bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be, "*Shall the bill be rejected?*" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, it shall be regarded as ordered to its second reading, unless the House otherwise specially directs. On the first reading of a bill, it may at any stage of the reading be rejected on motion.

Bills—Second Reading

104. No bill shall be put upon its second reading until the same shall have been printed and delivered to the members of the House at least one day previous to such reading, unless in case of emergency.

Amending and Engrossing Bills

105. On the second reading of a bill on the demand of any two members, it shall be read section by section for amendment, and when the amendments as may be moved are disposed of, the question, unless the House otherwise order, shall be, if a House bill, "*Shall the bill be engrossed and ordered to the third reading?*" If a House bill shall be ordered to its engrossment and third reading, and amendments have been made thereto, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform with the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted and shall be the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. All House bills ordered to their engrossment and third reading shall be jacketed and engrossed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a House bill is passed by the Senate and returned to the House without amendment, or if amended and the amendment or amendments be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a Senate bill on second reading, if the same be amended by the House and passed on as amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full on slips of paper in typewriting and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the Senate, and all the amendments shall also appear in the House Journal.

Time Bills to Go Into Effect

106. In the passage of a bill by the House, a motion may be made that it take effect from its passage, or at some time other than ninety days after its passage; and if said motion be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to the House, taken by yeas and nays, the Clerk shall communicate that fact to the Senate along with the bill. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 30.)

Senate Bills

107. Senate bills passed by the Senate and reported to the House shall be referred to the appropriate committee unless the House otherwise directs. After this they shall be treated in the same manner as House bills.

RESOLUTIONS

108. Resolutions shall be of three classes, as follows:

(1) *Joint Resolutions*: All proposed amendments to the Constitution shall take the form of a joint resolution, which shall be subject to the rules which govern the proceedings on bills, except that it shall be read on three several days,

and, to be adopted, must on its third reading be agreed to by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House. (Const., Art. 14, Sec. 2.) When a proposed amendment to the Constitution is under consideration, the vote of a majority of the members present shall be sufficient to decide an amendment thereto or any collateral or incidental questions thereto short of the final question.

[Note: Joint resolutions are used only for amendments to the State Constitution and to ratify amendments to the Federal Constitution. Such resolutions do not have to be submitted to the Governor for his approval.]

(2) *Concurrent Resolutions*: Concurrent resolutions shall be used for the purpose of expressing the sentiments of the Legislature, for authorizing expenditures incidental to the sessions and business of the Legislature, for agreeing upon adjournments beyond the constitutional limitation, for creating special joint committees, for raising a joint assembly and other inferior and incidental purposes of legislation, and such other purposes as the Legislature may deem proper. The adoption of such resolutions must be concurred in by both houses.

(3) *House Resolutions*: These simple resolutions shall be used for expressing the will or order of the House on matters in which the concurrence of the Senate is not necessary. A House resolution shall be proper to express the sentiments of the body, to authorize expenditures from its contingent fund, for agreeing upon any question, and for all incidental purposes pertaining to the organization and work of the House.

Introduction of Resolutions

109. All resolutions to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than two hours prior to the convening of the session at which they are to be introduced. They shall be presented in triplicate and copies shall be for the same purpose as that of bills. When the proper order of business is reached, the Clerk shall proceed in the same manner as if they were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a resolution from the floor in case of urgency. The different classes of resolutions shall be numbered by the Clerk and entered in full in the Journal.

Action on Resolutions

110. All joint resolutions shall be referred to the appropriate committee, and all other resolutions introduced shall lie over one day and come up under the ninth order of business the following legislative day.

PETITIONS

111. All petitions, remonstrances, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be filed by the member with the Clerk prior to the convening of the House. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for presenting petitions or any such papers, the Clerk shall read a list of those on file, giving the member's name presenting same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of the member's selection unless otherwise ordered by the House. Each member, upon filing any such petition, remonstrance or other paper, shall endorse thereon his name, and if not so endorsed it shall not be received. The Journal shall show the name of the member presenting such papers, a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the disposition made of same.

AMENDMENTS

Forms For

112. The Clerk shall furnish to members sheets with a proper heading printed in blank upon which amendments shall be written, and all amendments offered shall be on such blanks and bear the name of the member offering the same.

Must Be Germane

113. No amendment shall be in order that is not germane to the matter under consideration; and the Speaker, when the question is raised, shall rule as to the admissibility of the proposed amendment.

Time for Offering

114. Amendments may be offered to any bill or joint resolution and acted upon on their second reading and before they are ordered to their engrossment and third reading. No bill shall be amended on third reading, except by unanimous consent of the members present. Amendments to resolutions other than joint resolutions shall be in order at any time the same are being considered. Committee amendments shall be subject to amendment and shall be disposed of before any other amendments are in order.

Reading and Stating

115. Amendments shall be read by the Clerk and stated by the Speaker before being acted upon.

By Striking Out Enacting Clause

116. A motion to amend by striking out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence over another motion to amend, and, if carried, the bill or resolution is rejected.

Amendment to an Amendment

117. A motion to amend a pending amendment may be received, but until it is disposed of no other motion to amend will be in order. But pending such amendment, a motion to amend in the nature of a substitute, and a motion to amend that substitute, may be received, but shall not be voted upon until the original matter is perfected.

Amendment to Have Precedence Over Substitute

118. If a substitute for a bill or resolution be offered, a motion to amend the original bill or resolution shall have precedence.

Motion to Amend to Have Precedence Over One to Strike Out

119. If a motion be made to strike out part of a bill or resolution, a motion to amend the part proposed to be stricken out shall have precedence.

Filling Blanks

120. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time proposed shall be first put, and the question shall be put on names in the order they were nominated.

No Amendment by Way of Rider

121. No amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill after engrossment.

Agreeing to Senate Amendments

122. When a House bill or House joint resolution shall be amended by the Senate, the question on agreeing to the bill or resolution as amended shall be again voted on by yeas and nays, and the result entered on the Journal, and in such a case the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall be necessary. (Const., Art. 6, Sec. 31.)

Amendment by Section

123. If a bill is being considered section by section, only amendments to the section under consideration shall be in order. After all sections have been considered separately, the whole bill shall be open for amendment except that an amendment seeking to strike out matter previously inserted and containing substantially no new proposition shall not be in order.

Amending Titles

124. After the passage of a bill or joint resolution, amendments to its title may be offered when the title is read for approval.

Amendments to Senate Bills

125. Any Senate bill or resolution may be amended in the same manner as a House bill or resolution. If a Senate bill or resolution is amended the same shall be noted by the Clerk on the jacket containing same before it is reported to the Senate.

After the reading of a Senate amendment to a House bill or resolution the question shall be, "*Will the House concur in the Senate Amendment?*" But it shall be in order to move that the House concur in the Senate amendment with an amendment; or that the House refuse to concur and ask the Senate to recede.

If the Senate shall refuse to concur in a House amendment to a Senate bill or resolution, the following motions shall be in order and shall be privileged in the order named: *First*, That the House recede; *Second*, That the House insist and ask for a committee of conference; *Third*, That the House adhere.

Amendments to Be Printed in Journal

126. All amendments proposed, unless withdrawn, shall be printed in the Journal.

Speaking on Amendments

127. On an amendment being moved, a member who has spoken to the main question may speak again to the amendment.

JOURNAL

Clerk to Keep

128. The Clerk of the House, under the direction of the Speaker, shall keep a full and correct Journal of the proceedings.

Approval and Correction

129. When the Journal has been read to the end that any mistakes made in the entry may be corrected, if no objection is made, it shall stand approved; but if objection is made, the first question of the House shall be to dispose of the same, and when such objections are disposed of and the Journal corrected, as the House may order, it shall stand as approved.

Printing Official Copies

130. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for correction, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith. From the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal, which shall be properly indexed. In addition thereto six copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof, certifying that the same is the official Journal of the House and the same shall be signed by the Speaker and Clerk. Such printed Journal shall be the official record of the House. They shall be bound in flexible binding, and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the House of Delegates of West Virginia," with designation of regular or special session, as the case may be, and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the Senate.

Journal to Be Printed Daily

131. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to furnish a copy of each day's proceedings of the Journal to the printer, to be printed and distributed without delay.

Form and Content of Journal

132. The Journal shall be kept and published in minute form so as to show a running account of all proceedings and actions taken. Every written motion, unless it be withdrawn on the same day submitted and before action has been taken thereon, and such other material and matters required by these rules and the joint rules of the Senate and House shall be printed in the Journal. No remarks of members, speeches, newspaper editorials and articles, or other material shall

be printed in the daily Journal, except explanations of votes as provided by these rules and such portions of remarks as may be necessary for the record in instances where a member may be called to order for words spoken in debate.

The Clerk shall keep and publish an Appendix to the bound and official Journals of each session of the House. There shall be included in the Appendix all remarks of members and other material ordered printed by the House.

An address or remarks by a member made on the floor of the House may be printed in the Appendix with the consent of the House only on the request of the member making such address or remarks.

CHANGE OR SUSPENSION OF RULES

Rescinding or Amending Rules

133. All propositions to amend or rescind any standing rule or order of the House shall be by resolution and be at once referred, without debate, to the Committee on Rules, and shall be reported therefrom within two days. Any such resolution may be adopted by a majority vote, a quorum being present.

[Note: The power to make its rules of procedure is given the House under Sec. 24, Art. 6 of the Constitution.]

Suspension of Rules

134. These rules shall not be suspended, except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present. Unless there be a unanimous consent for the suspension of rules, the vote shall be determined by yeas and nays.

[Note: The motion to suspend the rules is usually preceded by a member requesting unanimous consent of the House to do a particular thing. If no one objects the House is deemed to assent, and what is desired is allowed accordingly. If objection is made, then the member may move that the rules be suspended for the specific purpose or object he has in view. A motion to lay on the table may not be applied to a motion to suspend the rules. (Hind's Precedents, Sec. 5405.)]

Manual and Rules

135. On any question of order or parliamentary practice where the rules of the House or the joint rules of the House and Senate are silent or inexplicit, *Jefferson's Manual* and the *Digest of the Rules and Practices of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress* shall be considered as authority.

[Note: Jefferson's Manual was prepared by Thomas Jefferson for his own guidance as President of the United States Senate in the years he was Vice President, from 1797 to 1801. The House of Representatives, in 1837, by rule which still exists, provided that the provisions of the Manual should "govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House." The Manual is regarded by English parliamentarians as the best statement of what the law of Parliament was at the time Jefferson wrote it. (House Manual and Digest), 70th Congress, 1st Sess., Sec. 278.]

MISCELLANEOUS RULES

Persons Admitted to the Floor—Members' Gallery

136. No person except members of the Congress of the United States, members of the State Senate, former members of the West Virginia Legislature, the Clerk of the Senate, duly accredited representatives of the press, radio and television, and legislative attaches engaged in the proper discharge of their duties, shall be admitted within the House Chamber while the House is in session. No introductions shall be made while the House is in session. At the convening of the House, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall see that all persons not entitled to the privilege of the floor under this rule retire from the Chamber.

The west of center balcony of the House Chamber shall be designated "Members' Gallery" and reserved for guests of members of the House, and admission thereto shall be by pass in such form as may be approved by the Committee on Rules and signed by member issuing the same to a guest.

Lobbying in the House Chamber

137. No person engaged in lobbying shall be permitted upon the floor of the House at any time while the House is in session, and if any person while within

the Chamber when the House is in session attempts in any manner whatsoever to influence the vote or opinion of any member upon any subject of legislative consideration, he shall be removed from the Chamber and be debarred therefrom during the remainder of the session. Any attache who shall, at any time, engage in such activity shall be subject to immediate dismissal.

News Correspondents and Reporters

138. (a) Any person accorded the privilege of the press gallery or press table must be a news correspondent or reporter for a newspaper, a radio or television station, or of a recognized press association, who is not engaged in any department of state government, or in any other business; and no more than one representative of each shall be admitted to the press table or press gallery at one time.

(b) All applications for admission to the press gallery or press table must be made to the Speaker. Such applications shall state the name and location of the newspaper, news association, radio or television station, and be signed by the applicant. The Speaker may request the news representatives to establish a committee on accreditation of applicants, and he shall consider recommendations made by such committee.

(c) The Speaker shall verify statements made in such application, and if the application is approved by him, he shall issue a correspondent's card, signed by him.

(d) The correspondents shall not visit the members in their seats during the session of the House, and shall abide by such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the Rules Committee of the House.

(e) The card issued by the Speaker must be presented when required by any Sergeant-at-Arms. It shall not be transferrable. The transfer or loan of such card to any one shall be followed by its cancellation and the withdrawal of all its privileges from the correspondent so offending.

(f) The gallery or press tables allotted to news correspondents shall be for their exclusive use, and persons not holding correspondents' cards shall not be entitled to admission thereto.

Lounging Prohibited in the Hall of the House

139. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to prevent all persons not connected with the Legislature from assembling in the halls at any time when the House is not in session for the purpose of lounging or loafing. For the purpose of enforcing this rule, the Sergeant-at-Arms or his assistants shall be in attendance at all times, and the persistent neglect or disregard of this rule shall be cause for dismissal by the Speaker, or removal.

Peddling Prohibited

140. No person shall be permitted to hawk, peddle or offer for sale any article of traffic at any time within the hall of the House; and it shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to strictly enforce this rule.

Regulating Use of Halls

141. The Speaker shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the part of the Capitol building used by the House for refreshments and like purposes when the Legislature is in session.

Oaths

142. The Speaker or Clerk shall have authority to administer any oaths required by the business of the House.

Janitors

143. The janitors appointed for or assigned to the House shall, under direction of the Speaker, have care of the House chamber, committee rooms and halls of the House and keep the same in a neat and proper condition at all times.

JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

Joint Assembly

1. Whenever there shall be a joint assembly of the two houses, a brief account of the proceedings shall be entered upon the Journal of each house, except in the joint assembly for counting votes for state officers.

[NOTE: It is the custom to hold joint assemblies in the House Chamber and they are presided over by the Speaker. In such sessions the Clerk of the House acts as Clerk, assisted by the Clerk of the Senate. The President of the Senate is given a seat to the right of the Speaker and seats are arranged for the members of the Senate.]

Joint Assembly to Open and Publish Election Returns

2. As soon as the Senate, being organized, is informed that the House of Delegates is ready to proceed, as provided by section three of article seven of the Constitution, to open and publish the returns of the elections for state officers, the Senate, preceded by its President and other officers, shall repair in a body to the hall of the House of Delegates. Upon their arrival the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Delegates shall announce the presence of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall then address the Speaker of the House, stating that a majority of the Senate has assembled in the hall of the House of Delegates to be present at the opening and publishing of the returns of the elections for state officers, held on the day of The Speaker of the House of Delegates shall invite the President of the Senate to a seat upon the right, and the other members of the Senate and officers thereof to take seats assigned to them; and after announcing that a majority of the House of Delegates is present, shall then open and publish the returns of said election, proceeding by counties in alphabetical order, the Clerks of the two houses each taking down the returns as announced by the Speaker, to be entered upon the Journal of the House, and when completed and tabulated the Speaker shall announce the votes received by each person voted for, for each of said offices, and those receiving the largest number of votes shall be by him declared duly elected; and the Senate shall then return to its hall, and if any two or more candidates for any of said offices have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the two houses shall immediately proceed to choose one of such persons for said office by a joint vote, as provided by Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution.

Disagreement and Conference

3. Whenever a measure of one house is amended in the other and the house in which it originated shall refuse to concur in the amendment, the house amending the measure may either insist or recede therefrom. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. If said house refuses to concur, the other house may either recede from or insist upon its amendment, and a motion to recede shall take precedence of a motion to insist. The motion to lay on the table or to postpone indefinitely shall not be in order in respect to the motion to recede from or to insist.

A motion to recede having failed shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to insist and shall be so entered upon the Journal. A motion to insist being decided in the negative, shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to recede and shall be so entered upon the Journal. If the motion to insist prevails, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house may thereupon appoint such committee. Unless a different number is agreed upon, such conference committee shall consist of five members from each house.

Such committee shall consider and report upon only the subject matter of the amendment or amendments which were in disagreement, with necessary conse-

quential changes. The committee shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairmen, and having conferred freely, shall report to their respective houses the result of the conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action, with the papers referred, shall be immediately reported by the clerk to the other house. In case of disagreement, the papers shall remain with the house in which the measure originated. If an agreement is reached, the report shall be made and signed in duplicate by at least a majority of the conferees from each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the conferees of each house.

Messages Between the Houses

4. When a message is sent by one house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent, by the Doorkeeper thereof, if it be in session, and then be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person by whom it may be sent, but no message shall be received during a call of the roll. But the clerk of one house may communicate a message to the clerk of the other after adjournment, and any message so sent shall be received by the house to which it is sent whenever it may be in session.

Introduction of Bills

5. No bill, other than an appropriation bill, shall be introduced in either house after the fiftieth day of a regular session held in odd-numbered years unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill, and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each house present and voting.

During regular sessions held in even-numbered years, no bill, other than the annual budget bill and bills coming within the purview of a proclamation issued by the Governor in accordance with the provisions of section twenty-two, article six, of the State Constitution, shall be filed for introduction or be introduced in either house unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

When permission is requested to introduce a bill under the provisions hereof, triplicate copies of such bill shall accompany the resolution when filed for introduction or introduced.

One House to Notify Other of Rejection of Bill

6. When a bill or resolution passed in one house is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be sent to the house in which the same shall have been passed.

Record of Bills

7. The clerks of the two houses shall keep separate records or registers, in which shall be recorded every action taken by the Senate and House on each bill and resolution.

Clerks to Endorse Bills

8. The clerks of the two houses shall endorse on each bill a statement of any action taken by their respective bodies.

Notice to Be in Writing

9. Notice to either house of the action of the other shall be in writing, signed by the clerk of the house giving such notice.

Each House to Have Control of Own Printing

10. Each house may order the printing of bills, resolutions, reports, and other documents without the consent of the other.

Joint Committees

11. Joint standing committees of the Senate and House shall be appointed as follows:

(1) *Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills*—To consist of five members from each house.

(2) *Committee on Joint Rules*—To consist of the presiding officers and two members of each house, to be appointed by the presiding officers.

(3) *Joint Committee on Government and Finance*—The Joint Committee on Government and Finance shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates, of which not more than three of each house shall be members of the same political party; four of the members of the Senate committee shall be appointed by the President of the Senate and four of the members of the House committee shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall be *ex officio* members of the committee and co-chairmen thereof. The committee shall begin its work as soon as practicable after the adjournment *sine die* of the regular session of the Legislature.

It shall be the duty of the committee to study and survey generally matters of government and finance and to make a report on its studies and findings, its expenditures and such recommendations as it may deem proper, to succeeding extraordinary and regular sessions of the Legislature; and such committee is hereby vested with power and authority to employ technical and clerical assistance, compel the attendance and testimony of witnesses, the production of books, records, documents and other papers, and shall be vested with and authorized to exercise all powers and authority granted such committees by the statutes and Constitution of the State of West Virginia. The offices of the committee shall be maintained at the capitol building in Charleston, West Virginia.

The expenses of the committee shall be paid from the contingent fund of the Senate and contingent fund of the House of Delegates in equal amounts. The members of the committee shall receive no remuneration for their services, other than actual expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties hereunder as approved by the committee.

(4) Such other joint committees as may be provided for by concurrent resolution. A bill or resolution referred to a joint committee may be recalled from such committee by the house in which it originated.

Engrossed Bills to Be Filed With Clerk of House

12. All engrossed bills passed by, and joint and concurrent resolutions adopted by, both houses shall be filed with the Clerk of the House to be kept with the rolls of the Legislature and to be used by him in printing and publishing the acts of the Legislature.

Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills

13. The Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the presiding officer of each house, whose duty it shall be to compare carefully all bills and joint resolutions passed by both houses, with the enrollment thereof, and to correct any errors or omissions they may discover and to make reports to their respective houses from time to time, of the correctly enrolled bills or joint resolutions. It shall be in order for the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills to report at any time.

Printing Enrolled Bills

14. After a bill has been passed by both houses, the type from which it was originally printed shall be corrected as to any typographical errors that may

not previously have been corrected and to include any amendments that may have been made by either house since the last printing of the bill. After the type has been so corrected, two hundred copies of the bill shall be printed (except charter bills, of which only twenty-five of each shall be printed). Twelve of these copies shall be on seven and one-fourth by ten bond paper, twenty-pound basis of at least fifty per cent rag content for the use of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, one of which copies, when properly authenticated, shall become the Enrolled Bill, and the remainder shall be on twenty-pound basis, sulphite bond paper. From these copies all judges shall be furnished enrolled bills as provided for in section fourteen, article one, chapter four of the code.

Authentication of Enrolled Bills

15. Enrolled bills shall be authenticated by the signature of the chairman of the House Committee and the chairman of the Senate Committee, composing such Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, but in the absence of such chairman another member of the committee may act in his stead; and they shall require all bills and joint resolutions before such authentication to be free from interlineations or erasures and destroy any previous enrollment containing any interlineations or erasures. A certificate, showing in which house the bill originated and when it takes effect, signed by the clerks of the two houses, shall be endorsed on the bill. After enrolled bills and joint resolutions are authenticated as aforesaid, they shall be signed by the Speaker of the House and by the President of the Senate.

Presenting Bills to Governor

16. After a bill shall have been signed in each house, it shall be presented by the said committee to the Governor, for his approval. The said committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor, which time shall be entered on the Journal of each house.

Record of Enrolled Bills

17. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Enrolled Bills to keep a record book of all bills presented to the Governor for his approval. The title and number of each bill presented to the Governor shall be entered in this book, and when a bill is presented to him, the date presented and the signature of the Governor, showing receipt of same, shall be entered at the side of each title.

Action of Governor on Bills

18. Every bill disapproved by the Governor shall be returned by him to the house in which it originated, with his objections thereto, unless the Legislature shall, by its adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after said adjournment.

Every bill approved by the Governor shall, within five days after it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State and the fact of said approval communicated by the Governor to the house in which said bill originated.

Every bill which shall be neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor shall immediately, after the expiration of five days from the time it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall forthwith engross thereon a certificate to the following effect: "I certify that the foregoing act, having been presented to the Governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the Legislature in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the State, has become a law without his approval", and shall date and sign the same. The Governor shall notify the house in which the bill originated of each bill becoming a law without his approval.

Upon each bill returned to either house of the Legislature with the objections of the Governor, the Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates shall engross the action, if any, of their respective houses on the recommendation and passage of said bill, and sign the same.

Joint Meetings of Committees

19. Whenever any bill has been referred by the Senate to one of its standing committees, and the same or like bill has been referred by the House to one of its committees, the chairmen of the respective committees, when in their judgment the interest of legislation or the expedition of business will be better served thereby, may arrange for a joint meeting of their committees for the consideration of such bill. All joint committee meetings shall be presided over by the chairman of the Senate committee.

What Shall Be Printed in the Journal

20. The following shall always be printed in the Journal of each house:

- (a) Messages from the Governor and messages from the other house, the titles of all bills and the title and text of all resolutions.
- (b) Every vote taken by yeas and nays in each house; and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial, or paper presented to each house.
- (c) A true and accurate account of the proceedings of each house.

Manner of Printing the Journal and Bills

21. In printing the daily Journal of the proceedings of each house there shall be printed at the top of each page, except the first, the date of the Journal; and on the last page of each day's Journal, shall be printed the calendar for the next day.

At the top of the first page of each bill, preceding the title and number thereof, there shall be printed the name of the person by whom, or the committee by which, it was introduced and the date of introduction; and at the top of each page, except the first, shall be printed the number of the bill.

Use of Legislative Halls and Offices

22. Permission to use, other than for statutory purposes, either legislative chamber or offices used by the two houses, may be granted by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House, as the case may be. During legislative sessions, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the parts of the capitol building used by their respective houses, for any purposes whatsoever.

Resolutions

23. Resolutions requiring concurrent action may originate in either house, and shall be of two kinds, namely:

Joint Resolutions

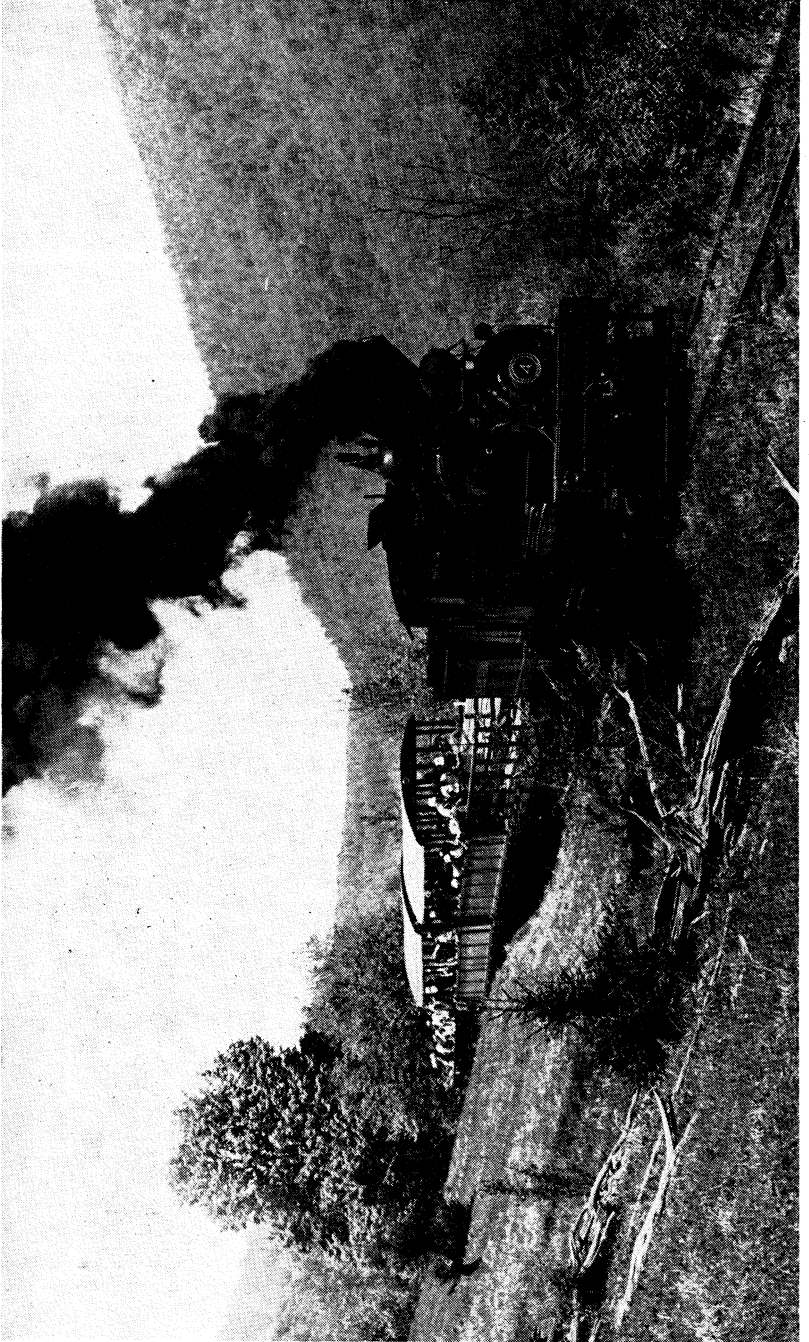
These resolutions shall be used for proposing amendments to the State Constitution and for ratifying amendments to the Constitution of the United States. Joint resolutions proposing amendments to the State Constitution shall be adopted as provided in section two, article fourteen of said Constitution.

Concurrent Resolutions

Such resolutions shall be used for all purposes not covered by joint resolutions as defined above.

Suspension of Joint Rules

24. No Joint Rule shall be suspended, except by a two-thirds vote of each house; and unless there be unanimous consent, such vote shall be taken by yeas and nays.

The West Virginia State Law Library consists of law books and legal periodicals only. It is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the Capitol Building and is in the charge of the State Law Librarian who is appointed by the Supreme Court of Appeals.

The library consists of purchased textbooks and reports and laws of other states as well as many foreign countries.

The State Law Librarian receives reports from the superintendent of public printing and supplies all judges of courts, West Virginia state officers and state law libraries of other states with copies of these reports.

The law governing the State Law Library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the Supreme Court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers and members and officers of the Legislature during the legislative sessions. The law also provides that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the library, but that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library. . . ."

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE BAR (Integrated)

Created by the Supreme Court of Appeals under its inherent rule-making power as authorized by Chapter 44, Acts of the Legislature, 1945. The court adopted and promulgated a definition of the practice of law; a code of professional ethics, a code of judicial ethics and a constitution and by-laws for the government of the State Bar, effective May 1, 1947. Its membership consists of all persons lawfully admitted to the practice of law in West Virginia. No person can practice law in the State of West Virginia unless he is a member in good standing of The West Virginia State Bar. There are two classes of membership—active and inactive. The annual active membership fee is now \$20.00 for members who have been admitted to practice for more than five years, and \$10.00 for members who have been admitted to practice for not more than five years.

The objects of the State Bar are to protect the interests of the public; to advance the administration of justice and the science of jurisprudence; to im-

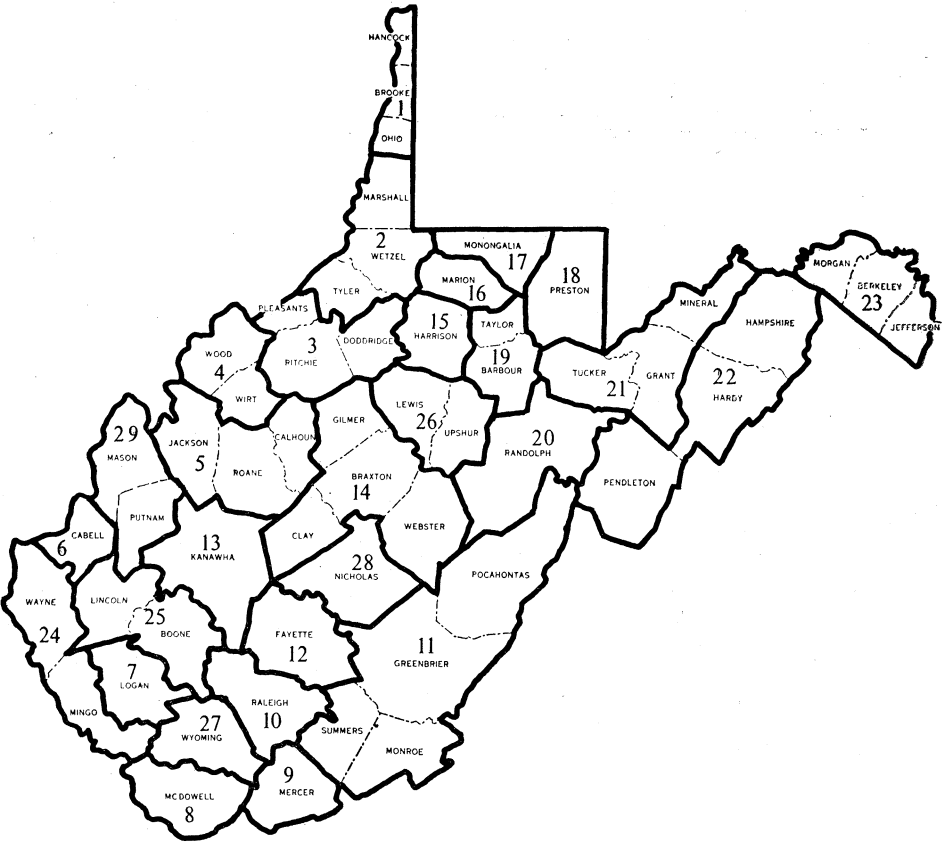

prove the relations between the public and the Bench and the Bar; to uphold and elevate the standards of honor, integrity, competency and courtesy in the legal profession; and to encourage cordial relations among its members. It is its declared purpose to give effect to pertinent rules of the Supreme Court of Appeals, and to perform the functions expressed in its Constitution and By-Laws. A principal duty of the State Bar is to uphold the standards of professional ethics and to diligently and vigilantly investigate and prosecute violations of these standards.

The State Bar is governed by a Board of Governors, consisting of all officers, except the secretary-treasurer, as *ex officio* members, and sixteen Governors, one Governor being elected by the members of the Bar by a secret mail ballot in each of the sixteen State Bar Districts. Officers are a president, chairman of the board, first vice president, second vice president and secretary-treasurer.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

MADE BY THE ORIGINAL THIRTEEN STATES IN CONGRESS
AT PHILADELPHIA

UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED JULY 4, 1776

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the State remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of and superior to the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our government:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here, by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms. Our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are and of right ought to be, free and independent States: that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent States, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent States may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Preamble

WE THE PEOPLE of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this CONSTITUTION for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I

Legislative Powers Vested in Congress

SECTION 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Composition of the House of Representatives

SECTION 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Qualifications of Representatives

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

Apportionment of Representatives and Direct Taxes—Census

*[Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free

*The Constitution, originally consisting of a preamble and seven articles was adopted September 17, 1787, at a convention in Philadelphia which had assembled on May twelfth of that year. On September 28, 1787, Congress directed that the Constitution be transmitted to the legislatures of the various States to be submitted for ratification or rejection to a convention of delegates chosen in each State.

Under the language of the Constitution, ratification by nine States was necessary. On March 4, 1789, the date which had been fixed for commencing the operations of government under the new Constitution, it had been ratified by eleven of the thirteen original states, as follows: Delaware, December 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, December 12, 1787; New Jersey, December 19, 1787; Georgia, January 2, 1788; Connecticut, January 9, 1788; Massachusetts, February 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 25, 1788; and New York, July 26, 1788.

North Carolina ratified the Constitution on November 21, 1789, and Rhode Island on May 29, 1789. Vermont ratified the Constitution January 10, 1791, and was, by act of Congress approved February 18, 1791; admitted into the Union.

Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other Persons.] †The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New-York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

Filling of Vacancies in Representation

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

Selection of Officers—Power of Impeachment

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Of the Senate

SECTION 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, [chosen by the Legislature] thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.

Classification of Senators—Filling of Vacancies

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one-third may be chosen every second Year; [and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies].*

Qualifications of Senators

No person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

Vice President to be President of Senate

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

Selection of Senate Officers—President pro tempore

The Senate shall chuse their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

Senate to Try Impeachments

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two-thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of Honor, Trust, or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Control of Congressional Elections

SECTION 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

Time for Assembling of Congress

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall [be on the first Monday in December,] unless they shall by Law appoint a different day.*

Each House to be the Judge of the Election and Qualifications of Its Members—Regulations as to Quorum

SECTION 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns, and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business, but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House to Determine Its Own Rules

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two-thirds, expel a Member.

Journals and Yeas and Nays

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Adjournment

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Compensation and Privileges of Members of Congress

SECTION 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the

United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

Incompatible Officers—Exclusions

No Senator, or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Revenue Bills to Originate in House

SECTION 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Manner of Passing Bills—Veto Power of President

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approves he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to the House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Concurrent Orders or Resolutions, to be Passed on by President

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

General Powers of Congress—Taxation

SECTION 8. The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defense and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

Borrowing of Money

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

Regulation of Commerce

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

Naturalization and Bankruptcy

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject to Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

Money, Weights and Measures

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

Counterfeiting

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

Post Office

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

Patents and Copyrights

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

Inferior Courts

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court;

Piracies, Felonies, Etc.

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high seas, and Offenses against the Law of Nations;

War—Marque and Reprisal

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

Armies

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

Navy

To provide and maintain a Navy;

Land and Naval Forces

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

Calling Out Militia

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrection and repel Invasion;

Organizing, Arming and Disciplining Militia

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of Training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

Exclusive Legislation Over District of Columbia

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To Enact Laws Necessary to Enforce Constitution

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested in this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Migration or Importation of Certain Persons Not to be Prohibited Before 1808

SECTION 9. The Migration or Importation of Such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

Writ of Habeas Corpus Not to be Suspended—Exception

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require.

Bills of Attainder and Ex Post Facto Laws Prohibited

No Bill or Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

Capitation and Other Direct Taxes

*No Capitation, or other direct Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

Exports Not to be Taxed

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference to be Given to Ports of Any State—Interstate Shipping

No preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another; nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

Money, How Drawn from Treasury—Financial Statements to be Published

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

Titles of Nobility Not to be Granted—Acceptance by Government Officers of Favors from Foreign Powers Prohibited

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

*See also the sixteenth amendment.

Limitations of the Powers of the Several States

SECTION 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit, make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

State Imposts and Duties

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controul of the Congress.

Further Restrictions on Powers of States

No State shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II

Of the President—The Executive Power

SECTION 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

Appointment and Qualifications of Presidential Electors

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

Original Method of Electing the President and Vice President

*[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest

*This paragraph has been superceded by amendment XII.

Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have Equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by ballot the Vice President.]

Congress May Determine Time of Choosing Electors and Day for Casting Their Votes

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

Qualifications for the Office of President

No person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

Filling Vacancy in Office of President

In case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

Compensation of the President

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Oath to be Taken by the President

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

The President to be Commander in Chief of Army and Navy and Head of Executive Departments—May Grant Reprieves and Pardons

SECTION 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offenses against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

President May, with Concurrence of Senate, Make Treaties, Appoint Ambassadors—Appointment of Inferior Officers, Authority of Congress Over

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the Supreme Court,

and all other Officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by law vest the Appointment of such Inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law. or in the Heads of Departments.

President May Fill Vacancies in Office During Recess of Senate

The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

President to Give Advice to Congress—May Convene or Adjourn It on Certain Occasions—To Receive Ambassadors—Have Laws Executed and Commission All Officers

SECTION 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

All Civil Officers Removable by Impeachment

SECTION 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

Judicial Power—How Vested—Term of Office and Compensation of Judges

SECTION 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behavior, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Jurisdiction of Federal Courts

SECTION 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

Original and Appellate Jurisdiction of Supreme Court

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

Trials of All Crimes, Except Impeachment, to be by Jury

The trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Treason Defined—Conviction of

SECTION 3. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or, in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of Two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

Congress to Declare Punishment for Treason—Proviso

The Congress shall have power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

ARTICLE IV

Each State to Give Full Faith and Credit to the Public Acts and Records of Other States

SECTION 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and Judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Privileges of Citizens

SECTION 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

Extradition Between the Several States

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

Persons Held to Labor or Service in One State, Fleeing to Another, to be Returned

No person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered upon Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.

New States

SECTION 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

Regulations Concerning Territory

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Republican Form of Government and Protection Guaranteed the Several States

SECTION 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V

Ways in Which the Constitution Can be Amended

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in each Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress: Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI

Debts Contracted Under the Confederation Secured

All debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

Constitution Laws and Treaties of the United States to be Supreme

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

Who Shall Take Constitutional Oath—No Religious Test as to Official Qualification

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any office or public Trust under the United States.

***ARTICLE VII**

Constitution to be Considered Adopted When Ratified by Nine States

The ratification of the Convention of nine States shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Mr. Hamilton from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia.

Resolved,

That the preceding Constitution be laid before the United States in Congress assembled, and that it is the Opinion of this Convention, that it should afterwards be submitted to a Convention of Delegates, chosen in each State by the People thereof, under the Recommendation of its Legislature, for their assent and Ratification; and that each Convention assenting to, and ratifying the Same, should give Notice thereof to the United States in Congress assembled. Resolved, That it is the Opinion of this Convention, that as soon as the Conventions of nine States shall have ratified this Constitution, the United States in Congress assembled should fix a Day on which Electors should be appointed by the States which shall have ratified the same, and a Day on which the Electors should assemble to vote for the President, and the Time and Place for commencing Proceedings under this Constitution. That after such Publication the Electors should be appointed, and the Senators and Representatives elected: That the Electors should meet on the Day fixed for the Election of the President, and should transmit their Votes certified, signed, sealed and directed, as the Constitution requires, to the Secretary of the United States in Congress assembled.

that the Senators and Representatives should convene at the Time and Place assigned; that the Senators should appoint a President of the Senate, for the sole Purpose of receiving, opening and counting the Votes for President; and, that after he shall be chosen, the Congress, together with the President, should, without Delay, proceed to execute this Constitution.

* AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

AMENDMENT I

Freedom of Religion, of Speech, of the Press, and Right of Petition

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II

Right of People to Bear Arms Not to be Infringed

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

AMENDMENT III

Quartering of Troops

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

AMENDMENT IV

Persons and Houses to be Secure from Unreasonable Searches and Seizures

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V

Trials for Crimes—Just Compensation for Private Property Taken for Public Use

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment of indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy or life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal

*In order to clarify sections of the Constitution which seemed insufficiently explicit with reference to individual and State rights, Congress, at its first session in the City of New York, September 25, 1789, submitted to the States twelve proposed amendments. Ten of the amendments were ratified by a sufficient number of the states, such ratification being completed on December 15, 1791. Two of the amendments failed of ratification. The first ten amendments printed herewith constitute the ten original amendments, popularly known as "A Bill of Rights."

case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI

Civil Rights in Trials for Crimes Enumerated

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defense.

AMENDMENT VII

Civil Rights in Civil Suits

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

AMENDMENT VIII

Excessive Bail, Fines and Punishments Prohibited

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

AMENDMENT IX

Reserved Rights of People

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

AMENDMENT X

Powers Not Delegated, Reserved to States and People Respectively

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

AMENDMENT XI

Judicial Power of United States Not to Extend to Suits Against a State

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.

AMENDMENT XII

Present Mode of Electing President and Vice-President by Electors

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the persons voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each,

which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate:—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted:—The person having the greatest number of votes for President shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the person having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. * [And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death, or other constitutional disability of the President.]—The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.

AMENDMENT XIII

Slavery Prohibited

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Congress Given Power to Enforce This Article

SECTION 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIV

Citizenship Defined—Privileges of Citizens

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Apportionment of Representatives

SECTION 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or

other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Disqualification for Office—Removal of Disability

SECTION 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Public Debt Not to Be Questioned—Payment of Debt and Claims Incurred in Aid of Rebellion Forbidden

SECTION 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss of emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Congress Given Power to Enforce This Article

SECTION 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

AMENDMENT XV

Right of Certain Citizens to Vote Established

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous conditions of servitude.

Congress Given Power to Enforce This Article

SECTION 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XVI

Taxes on Income—Congress Given Power to Lay and Collect

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII

Election of United States Senators—Filling of Vacancies—Qualifications of Electors

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years, and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislature.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacan-

cies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII

Manufacture, Sale or Transportation of Intoxicating Liquors, for Beverage Purposes, Prohibited

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Congress and the Several States Given Concurrent Power to Pass Appropriate Legislation to Enforce This Article

SECTION 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Provisions of Article to Become Operative When Adopted by Three-fourths of the States

SECTION 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XIX

Right of Citizens to Vote Not to Be Denied on Account of Sex

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XX

Terms of President, Vice-President and Members of Congress

SECTION 1. The terms of the President and Vice-President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

When Congress Shall Assemble

SECTION 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Procedure Where President-Elect or Vice-President-Elect Fails to Qualify

SECTION 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President-elect shall have died, the Vice-President-elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President-elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice-President-elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President-elect nor a Vice-President-elect shall have qualified, declaring who

shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice-President shall have qualified.

Congress to Choose in Case of Death of President or Vice-President

SECTION 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice-President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Effective Date

SECTION 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

SECTION 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.

AMENDMENT XXI

Repeal of Eighteenth Amendment

SECTION 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Transportation and Importation

SECTION 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Ratification

SECTION 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within several years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XXII

President's Tenure

SECTION 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the president more than twice, and no person who has held the office of president, or acted as president, for more than two years of a term of which some other person was elected as president shall be elected to the office of president more than once. But this article shall not apply to any person holding the office of president when this article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of president, or acting as president, during the term within which this article becomes operative from holding the office of president or acting as president during the remainder of such term.

SECTION 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.

The twenty-second amendment was certified by the administrator of general services on March 1, 1951, to have been ratified by three-fourths of the whole number of states to have become valid as a part of the Constitution of the United States.

AMENDMENT XXIII

District of Columbia

SECTION 1. The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

SECTION 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENTS RATIFIED BY LEGISLATURE OF WEST VIRGINIA

Since June 20, 1863—the date West Virginia was admitted to the Union—ten amendments to the Constitution of the United States have been submitted to the various legislatures for ratification or rejection. Nine of the amendments have been ratified, and the following table shows the date of ratification of each amendment by the legislature of West Virginia:

*This amendment was ratified by convention. An election was held on June 27, 1933, for the purpose of electing delegates to the convention. Chapter 22, Acts of the West Virginia Legislature, Regular Session, 1933, provided that the delegates elected to such convention should meet on the 28th day after their election to pass upon the question of whether or not the proposed amendment should be ratified. This would make the date of ratification of the amendment July 25, 1933.

The 21st amendment was declared in a proclamation of the Acting Secretary of State, dated December 5, 1933, to have been ratified by 36 of the 48 States. By his proclamation of December 5, 1933, the President proclaimed that the 18th amendment to the Constitution was repealed on December 5, 1933.

THE CONSTITUTION OF WEST VIRGINIA

Ratified in 1872

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The Judicial Amendment.
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The Korean Veterans' Bonus Amendment.

*Preamble

Since through Divine Providence we enjoy the blessings of civil, political and religious liberty, we, the people of West Virginia, in and through the provisions of this Constitution, reaffirm our faith in and constant reliance upon God and seek diligently to promote, preserve and perpetuate good government in the State of West Virginia for the common welfare, freedom and security of ourselves and our posterity.

ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

2. The Government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved by the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in time of peace, and any departure

therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

Representatives to Congress

4. For the election of representatives to Congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocohantas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became a part of the State.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the Legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871; and Mingo County, from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto, shall as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes—Penalty

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on

confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

"Montani Semper Liberi"—State Seal

7. The present seal of the State, with its motto "*Montani Semper Liberi*", shall be the great seal of the state of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds—Indictments

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, "Against the peace and dignity of the State."

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divert their posterity, namely: The enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from, the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms, that is the best, which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

4. The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, *ex-post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail Not Required

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offense. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

Unreasonable Search and Seizure Prohibited

6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath, or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and

defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

Private Property, How Taken

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged for public use, or for the use of such corporation, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: *Provided*, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law, of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 182, and adopted at the next election. Prior to being amended, the section read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case, be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, and was adopted at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,482; Against ratification, 34,073; Majority, 22,409. Acts 1879, page 182.]

Trial of Crimes—Provisions in Interest of Accused

14. Trials of crime, and of misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men*, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county

* (See section 21 of this article, making women eligible for jury service.)

where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witness against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

Religious Freedom Guaranteed

15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the Legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contracts as he shall please.

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolable

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolable.

Courts Open to All—Justice Administered Speedily

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, Etc., Provided Against

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

Jury Service for Women

Section 21. Regardless of sex all persons, who are otherwise qualified, shall be eligible to serve as petit jurors, in both civil and criminal cases, as grand jurors and as coroner's jurors.

[This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts, Regular Session 1955, p. 571, and ratified at the General Election November 6, 1956. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 327,113; Against ratification, 202,002; Majority, 125,111.]

ARTICLE IV

Elections and Officers

1. The *male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a

(*Stricken out by 1920 adoption of Federal female suffrage amendment.)

minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in any election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

Mode of Voting by Ballot

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be left free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads; or, except in time of war or public danger, to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office—Age Requirements

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any state, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provisions for Removal of Officials

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general laws, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

General Elections, When Held—Terms of Officials

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the Legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments, in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, Acts 1883, p. 137, and ratified at the next election. The original section provided that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of State officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. As a consequential amendment the term of office of members of the Legislature was made to begin on the first day of December instead of the first day of November, as in the original article.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this Constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgement in cases of impeachment, shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall after the adoption of this Constitution, either in, or out of the State fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

Safeguards for Ballots

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested election; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot.

Registration Laws Provided For

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters of this State.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 472, and adopted at the next election. The original section read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election, because his name is not, or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."]

ARTICLE V

Division of Powers

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

Legislature

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty-four, and the House of Delegates of one hundred members.]

Senators and Delegates—Term of Office

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected, shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as herein-after provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The district shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

[There are now seventeen senatorial districts, as provided by Chapter 1, Acts, 1st Extraordinary Session, 1964 (Code, Ch. 1, Art. 2)]

Senatorial Districts Designated

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1937, (Acts 1937, Ch. 128) the number of Senatorial Districts was increased to sixteen, the number of Senators to thirty-two, and the counties rearranged in the various districts.]

[Under the reapportionment act of 1964, Acts, Ch. 1, 1st Extraordinary Session, 1964 (Code, Ch. 1, Art. 2), the number of senatorial districts was fixed at seventeen. The County of Kanawha embraces two districts, the eighth and the seventeenth. The other fifty-four counties are arranged into sixteen districts, each consisting of two or more counties.]

Provisions for Delegate Representation

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a delegate District.

(By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, Ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. From 1916 to 1952, the House of Delegates consisted of ninety-four members. In 1951, the membership was increased to one-hundred members with each county continuing to have at least one member. Under Ch. 1, Acts 1st. Extraordinary Session, 1964, the membership was again fixed at one-hundred, but seven delegate districts were established, embracing fifteen counties, and allotted a total of nine delegates.)

After Census, Delegate Apportionment

7. After every census the Delegate shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every delegate District, and of every county not included in a Dele-

gate District, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District and county not included in a Delegate District, shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun, the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker, the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster, the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming, the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now seven Delegate Districts, each county having at least one member.]

Further Apportionments

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three Delegates.

To Ohio County, four Delegates.

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment. Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has fourteen delegates. For the present apportionment, see Chapter 1, Acts of the Legislature, 1st Extraordinary Session, 1964.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted Into State

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of the State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Senators and Delegates Required to be Residents of District

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or County from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried

officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crime, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in the State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office for Profit

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

16. Members of the Legislature, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability"; and they shall also take this further oath, to wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution, or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged from Civil Arrest

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

***Time of Assembly of Legislature**

18. The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Constitution, the board of public works shall, on and

[*This section originally read as follows: "The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of Government, biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day."

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted March 11, 1953 (Acts 1953, p. 612), and ratified at the general election in November, 1954, the section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; Against ratification, 137,624; Majority, 53,253.]

after the effective date hereof, submit to the Legislature an annual budget prepared as otherwise required by the Constitution.

Convening of Legislature by Governor

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three fifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Other Than at the Seat of Government

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

***Length of Legislative Session**

22. The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-five and every second year thereafter shall not exceed sixty days, and the regular session held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-six and every second year thereafter shall not exceed thirty days. During any thirty-day session, the Legislature shall consider no other business than the annual budget bill, except such as may be stated in a proclamation issued by the Governor at least ten days prior to the convening of the session, or such business as may be stated by the Legislature on its own motion in a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house. All regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house.

Concerning Adjournment

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

*[This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house."]

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919 (Acts 1919, p. 498), and ratified at the general election in November 1920, it was amended to read: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular sessions shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 160,929; Against ratification, 122,744; Majority, 38,185.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts 1927, p. 350, adopted by the general election in November 1928, this section was amended to read as follows: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 275,374; Against ratification, 85,123; Majority, 190,251.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, adopted March 11, 1952 (Acts, 1953, p. 612), and ratified at the general election in November, 1954, the section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; Against ratification, 137,624; Majority, 53,253.]

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest Delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and has taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and has taken his seat.

Authority to Punish Members

25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member but not twice for the same offense.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety and the undisturbed transaction of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

Accounting for State Monies

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is, or shall be, to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirements for Reading of Bills

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: *Provided*, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

Acts to Embrace But One Object—Time of Effect

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the

first session under the Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one house, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journals; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

"Majority" Defined

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either House of the Legislature", or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

*Compensation of Members

33. Each member of the Legislature shall receive for his services the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars a year, and expenses for one round trip in connection with any session, at the rate of ten cents a mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route: *Provided*, That if party caucuses are held in advance of the date of the assembly of the Legislature in odd-numbered years for the purpose of selecting candidates for officers of the two houses, expenses for travel at the rate herein fixed shall be allowed each member for one round trip in connection with attending such caucus. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate shall each receive an additional compensation of five dollars a day for each day served as presiding officer. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers or any other purpose whatever. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the compensation herein provided for shall be paid to each member of the Legislature on and after the adoption of this amendment.

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided for—Contracts for Printing

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[*The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919, Acts 1919, p. 456, and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. The only change made in section 33 was to strike out the words "four dollars per day" and insert "five hundred dollars per annum." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 160,929; Against ratification, 122,744; Majority, 38,185.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 4 adopted March 11, 1953 (Acts 1953, p. 612), and ratified at the general election in November, 1954, the section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 190,877; Against ratification, 137,624; Majority, 53,253.

Prior to the last amendment, the section read as follows: "The members of the Legislature shall each receive for their services the sum of five hundred dollars per annum and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate, shall each receive an additional compensation of two dollars per day for each day they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever."]

State Not to be Made Defendant in Any Court, Except in Garnishment Or Attachment Proceedings

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

[This section originally read as follows: "The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity."]

Under House Joint Resolution No. 3 (Acts, Regular Session, 1935, p. 662), ratified November 3, 1936, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 161,386; Against ratification, 61,472; Majority, 99,914.]

Lotteries Prohibited

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

Terms of Office Not To Be Extended After Election

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Cannot Be Increased During Official Terms

38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due to the State: *Provided*, The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not to Be Passed in Enumerated Cases

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for:

- Granting divorces;
 - Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;
 - Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;
 - Locating, or changing county seats;
 - Regulating, or changing county or district affairs;
 - Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;
 - Regulating the practice in courts of justice;
 - Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;
 - Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;
 - The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting;
 - The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;
 - Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;
 - Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;
 - Changing the law of descent;
 - Regulating the rate of interest;
 - Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;
 - Releasing taxes; releasing title to forfeited lands;
- The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor

in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

Municipal Home Rule

39-a. No local or special law shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The Legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages, and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns and villages, to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs: *Provided*, That any such charter or amendment thereto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted, shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this Constitution or the general laws of the State then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for

Each House to Keep Journal of Proceedings

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills to Be Specific

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

Board of Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

Election of Legislative, County and Municipal Officers

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be *viva voce*, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe—Punishment

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing

or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by Law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses: *Provided*, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Intoxicating Liquors

46. The Legislature shall by appropriate legislation, regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[This section originally read as follows: "Laws may be passed regulating or prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State." Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 6 (Acts 1911, p. 289), ratified at the general election in 1912, it was amended to read: "On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: *Provided, however*, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, securities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section."

Under Senate Committee Substitute for House Joint Resolution No. 1, (Acts, Regular Session, 1933, p. 532) ratified November 6, 1934, this section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment (1934): For ratification, 276,978; Against ratification, 237,559; Majority, 39,419.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

Homestead Exemption

48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution: *And provided further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

Property of Married Women

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

Plan of Proportional Representation

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

The Budget System

51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

Sub-Section A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

Sub-Section B

First: Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the sessions at which the budget is to be submitted, the board of public works, which shall consist of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Free Schools and Commissioner of Agriculture, shall submit to the Legislature, *two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years: Each budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) The revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the board of public works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

Second: Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations: (1) For the Legislature as certified to the board of public works in the manner hereinafter provided; (2) for the executive department; (3) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the Auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

Third: The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations", and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The board of public works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each house the budgets and a bill for all the proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each house shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The board of public works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct an oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officer of both houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiciary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein: *Provided, however,* That the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both houses shall be a law immediately without further action by the Governor.

*This provision has been modified by the amendment of section eighteen of this article, requiring an annual budget.

Fourth: The Governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the board of public works for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either house of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Sub-Section C—Supplementary Appropriation Bills

Neither house shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein, a supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each house by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall be presented to the Governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of section ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

Sub-Section D—General Provisions

First: If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the Governor may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such bill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

Second: The board of public works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each house, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the Auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the board of public works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The board of public works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

Third: The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

Fourth: In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitutions, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratified by the people, the provisions of this

section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the Governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

Motor Fuel and Motor Vehicle Revenue

52. Revenue from gasoline and other motor fuel excise and license taxation, motor vehicle registration and license taxes, and all other revenue derived from motor vehicles or motor fuels shall after the deduction of statutory refunds and cost of administration and collection authorized by legislative appropriation, be appropriated and used solely for construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways, and also the payment of the interest and principal on all road bonds heretofore issued or which may be hereafter issued for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of public highways, and the payment of obligations incurred in the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways.

[This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6 (Acts, Regular Session, 1941, p. 589), and ratified at the General Election November 3, 1942. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 228,828; Against ratification, 38,651; Majority, 190,177.]

Forestry

53. The Legislature may by general law define and classify forest lands and provide for cooperation by contract between the State and the owner in the planting, protection, and harvesting thereof. Forest lands embraced in any such contract may be exempted from all taxation or be taxed in such manner, including the imposition of a severance tax or charge as trees are harvested, as the Legislature may from time to time provide. But any tax measured by valuation shall not exceed the aggregate rates authorized by section one of article ten of this Constitution.

[This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, (Acts, Regular Session, 1945, p. 640) and ratified at the General Election November 5, 1946. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 179,150; Against ratification, 148,104; Majority, 31,046.]

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

1. The executive department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture and Attorney General, who shall be *ex officio* reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of

[This section originally read as follows: "The executive department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be *ex officio* reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office, respectively, shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General, reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law."

Under House Joint Resolution No. 7 (Acts, First Extraordinary Session, 1933, p. 506), and ratified at the general election November 6, 1934, it was amended to read: "The executive department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture and Attorney General, who shall be *ex officio* reporter of the court of appeals. Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837), and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958, the section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 230,879; Against ratification, 206,201; Majority, 24,678.]

Election

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture and Attorney General shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[This section originally read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

Under House Joint Resolution No. 5 (Acts, Regular Session, 1901, p. 459), and ratified at the general election in 1902, it was amended to read as follows: "An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law."

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837), and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958, the section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 230,879; Against ratification, 206,201; Majority, 24,678.]

Certification of Election Returns—Contests

3. The returns of every election for the above-named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed to "the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460), and ratified at the general election in 1902. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Eligibility

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and adopted at the next election. The section prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Chief Executive—Powers

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each

regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays), appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for; and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies—How Filled

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Executive May Remit Fines and Forfeitures

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, or punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-Chief of Military Forces

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State (except when they shall be called into the service of the United States), and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Official Bond of State Officers

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

How Bills Become Laws

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approves, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such consideration, a majority of the members elected to that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other house, by which it shall likewise, be reconsidered,

and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State, within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

Respecting Appropriations of Monies

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor, if he disapproves the bill, or any item of appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the house in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each house according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

16. In case of the death, conviction or impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies in Other Executive Departments

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture or Attorney General shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[This section originally read as follows: "If the office of Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be provided by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation, and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury."]

In the first amendment of this section, proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 5 (Acts, Regular Session, 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election 1902, the only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line, and by substitution of the word "prescribed" for the word "provided" in the eighth line.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837), and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958, the section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 230,879; Against ratification, 206,201; Majority, 24,678.]

Executive Heads to Make Reports

18. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall at least ten days, preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office, or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution adopted February 13, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 459, and ratified at the general election in 1902. This section, prior to amendment read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services, a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred; the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand, and the Attorney General, thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance, except as herein otherwise provided shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."

Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,280; Against ratification, 23,513; Majority, 32,767.]

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Department

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by joint resolution of March 6, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 175, and ratified at the general election in 1880.

Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 57,941; Against ratification, 34,270; Majority, 23,671.]

Supreme Court of Appeals

2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of *four judges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

[*The supreme court of appeals consists of five judges, by the provisions of the "Judicial Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution, and Acts 1903, ch. 19, amending and reenacting section 1 of chapter 113 of Warth's Code of 1899.]

Scope of Jurisdiction

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, and prohibition. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment or qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator, or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy tolls or taxes; and, also, in case of *quo warranto*, *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *certiorari*, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has been a conviction for felony or

misdeemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

Binding Authority of Decisions

4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

Reversal or Affirmance of Judgments

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reason therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal

6. A writ of error, *supersedeas*, or appeal shall be allowed only by the supreme court of appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment of proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

Provisions for Filling Supreme Court Vacancies

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the supreme court of appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Officers of Supreme Court

8. The officers of the supreme court of appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges, thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

Terms of Supreme Court

9. There shall be at least two terms of the supreme court of appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

Circuit Courts

10. The State shall be divided into *thirteen circuits. For the circuit hereinafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuits in which they may respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the supreme court of appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court may re-

[*Now twenty-nine.]

side in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportioned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

Terms of Circuit Court

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

Circuit Court Jurisdiction

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by *mandamus*, prohibition and *certiorari*. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *quo warranto* and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or *supersedeas* may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whether supervisory, original, appellate, or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

Division of State Into Circuits

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marion and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt, and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth; the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth.

[By various acts of the Legislature, authorized by section 14 following, the above division has been changed and the number of circuits increased to twenty-nine.]

Rearrangements of State Into Circuits

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any such session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

Special Terms and Judges of Circuit Courts

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit courts, where from any cause the judge shall fail to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

Salaries of and Limitation on Judges

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The *salary of a judge of the supreme court of appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: *Provided*, That Ohio County may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowances shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession

of law or hold any other office, appointment, or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

[*Under the judicial amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1901, page 462, and ratified in 1902, the salaries of the judges of the supreme court of appeals have been fixed by legislative enactment at seventeen thousand five hundred dollars per annum.]

How Judges May Be Removed

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodily infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two thirds of all the members elected to each house must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each house. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

General Provisions—Clerk of Circuit Courts

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

Courts of Limited Jurisdiction

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly in the supreme court of appeals.

Regarding Participation in Civil War

20. No citizen of this State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable to any proceeding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgment or decrees heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

Parts of Common Law Effective

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of this State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

County Courts

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, it shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such

times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, except that at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

Powers of County Courts

24. The County courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: *Provided*, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall, in all cases of contest, judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the regular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

Removal of Causes

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such

actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in, tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

Clerk of County Court

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Districting of County—Election of Justices of the Peace

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, and as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

Jurisdiction of Justice of the Peace

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpsit, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend through their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgement of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Courts

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such case all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

Incompatible Offices

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of the commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs—Consecutive Terms Prohibited

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

Malfeasance and Misfeasance in Office

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty, and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided For

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

7. The president of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

ARTICLE X**Taxation and Finance**

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including livestock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the Legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty per cent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty per cent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the Legislature among the levying units of the State in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including livestock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the Legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the State now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendments, read as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property may, by law, be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations."

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 10, 1932, Acts 1932 (extraordinary session), chapter 9, page 16, and was ratified at the general election in 1932. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 335,482; Against ratification, 43,931; Majority, 291,551.]

Bank Deposits and Money Exempt from Ad Valorem Property Taxes

1-a. Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding section, bank deposits and money shall not be subject to ad valorem property taxation.

[This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 839) and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 401,086; Against ratification, 102,265; Majority, 298,821.]

Capitation Tax

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which

shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Monies

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State, to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not to Be Granted in Certain Cases

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

Duties of County Authorities in Assessing Taxes

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars' valuation, except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, Etc.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax on all taxable property therein, in the ratio, as between the several classes or types of such taxable property, specified in section one of this article, separate and apart from and in addition to all other taxes for all other purposes, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years. Such tax, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal on bonds issued by any school district not exceeding in the aggregate three per centum of such assessed value, may be levied outside the limits fixed

by section one of this article: *Provided*, that no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum, on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: *Provided*, that no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same."]

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, (Acts, Regular Session, 1949, p. 716) ratified at the general election on November 7, 1950, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 340,054; Against ratification, 150,251; Majority, 189,803.]

Municipal Taxes to Be Uniform

9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

Better Schools Amendment

10. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property for the support of public schools may be increased in any school district for a period not to exceed five years, and in an amount not to exceed one hundred per cent of such maximum rates, if such increase is approved, in the manner provided by law, by at least sixty per cent of the qualified voters of the school district.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates provided for tax levies by school districts on the several classes of property may be used entirely for current expense purposes; and all levies required for principal and interest payments on any bonded indebtedness, now or hereafter contracted, not to exceed five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained in accordance with section eight of this article, shall be laid separate and apart and in addition to such maximum rates, but in the same proportions as such maximum rates are levied on the several classes of property.

[This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 8 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 840) and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 282,423; Against ratification, 165,741; Majority, 116,682.]

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by the line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

Corporate Liabilities or Indebtedness

2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatsoever: *Provided*, that nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any *bona fide* contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this state.

Rights of Stockholders

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that every corporation, other than a banking institution, shall have power to issue one or more classes and series within classes of stock, with or without par value, with full, limited or no voting powers, and with preferences and special rights and qualifications, and that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder holding stock having the right to vote for directors, shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

[This section originally read as follows: "The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 5 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 839), and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958, the section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 211,977; Against ratification, 154,175; Majority, 57,802.]

Street Railroads

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

6. The Legislature may provide by general law for the creation, organization, and regulation of banking institutions.

[This section originally read as follows: "The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stocks held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing, while they are such stockholders."

Under House Joint Resolution No. 3 (Acts, Regular Session, 1937, p. 581), ratified November 8, 1938, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 139,985; Against ratification, 62,241; Majority, 77,744.]

Railroads

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads, Public Highways

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discriminations between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations to Be Established

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town, or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines—Legislative Permission

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

Supervision of Free Schools

2. The general supervision of the free schools of the State shall be vested in the West Virginia Board of Education, which shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law. The board shall consist of nine members to be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for overlapping terms of nine years, except that the original appointments shall be for terms of one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight and nine years, respectively. No more than five members of the board shall belong to the same political party, and in addition to the general qualifications otherwise required by the Constitution, the Legislature may require other specific qualifications for membership on the board. No member of the board may be removed from office by the Governor except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the Governor of state elective officers.

The West Virginia Board of Education shall, in the manner prescribed by law, select the State Superintendent of Free Schools who shall serve at its will and

pleasure. He shall be the chief school officer of the State, and shall have powers and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall be a member of the Board of Public Works as provided by subsection B, section fifty one, article six of this Constitution.

[This section originally read as follows: "The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor." *Provided*, The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.]

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 (Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837), and ratified at the general election November 4, 1958, the section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 230,879; Against ratification, 206,201; Majority, 24,678.]

County Superintendents

3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary funds of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the State of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir, and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporation; all monies that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund", and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund", to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of the fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund": *Provided*, That all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

Support of Free Schools

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

School Districts

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

Levies for School Purposes

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector who shall make annual settlements with the county court; which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

Certain Acts Prohibited

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That nothing here shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch, thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvements; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provisions for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said states at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or es-

cheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees) for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865, and have paid all state taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

Former Owner's Privilege

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the cost of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter.

Land Books—Taxes

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein, entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with state, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein shall be forfeited and the title vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with state, county, and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all state and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, That such right to

redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

[This section originally read as follows: "It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with state tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with state tax on any part of the land, such part thereof, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all state and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited." Under House Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts, Second Extraordinary Session, 1933, p. 583, ratified at the general election on November 6, 1934, this section was amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 275,374; Against ratification, 85,123; Majority, 190,251.]

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law; passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention, until, at least, one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either house of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each house, be agreed to on its third reading, by two thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays, thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published, at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Judicial Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1901, p. 462). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on this amendment: For ratification, 54,676; Against Ratification, 24,710; Majority, 29,966.]

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of

said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 28 (Acts 1901, p. 465). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,694; Against ratification, 24,763; Majority, 31,931.]

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund, shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1919, p. 502). Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689; Against ratification, 130,569; Majority, 118,120.]

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the State, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17 (Acts 1927, p. 361). Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; Against ratification, 92,885; Majority, 267,712.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing, or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Secondary Road Bonds Amendment of 1948

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 5 (Acts 1947, p. 727.) Ratified November 2, 1948. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 475,272; Against ratification, 163,578; Majority, 311,693.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate fifty million dollars in addition to the state

bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February fifteenth, one thousand nine hundred nineteen, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, and Senate Joint Resolution No. 17, adopted by the Legislature at the regular session, one thousand nine hundred twenty-seven, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction, or for assisting in building and constructing a system of state secondary roads and highways.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Veterans' \$90,000,000.00 Bonus Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, (Acts 1949, p. 686.) Ratified November 7, 1950. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 431,979; Against ratification, 139,445; Majority, 292,534.]

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, not to exceed in the aggregate ninety million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated solely for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of World War I and World War II. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States in World War I between the sixth day of April, one thousand nine hundred seventeen, and the eleventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred eighteen, both dates inclusive, or in World War II between the seventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred forty-one, and the second day of September, one thousand nine hundred forty-five, both dates inclusive, or in both such wars, who were *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such forces, and who within the periods specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unremarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of the amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Korean Veterans' Bonus Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, (Acts, Regular Session, 1955, p. 572), and ratified at the General Election, November 6, 1956. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 476,936; Against ratification, 88,968; Majority, 387,968.]

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, for the following purposes:

(1) The paying of a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who served during the Korean conflict. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand nine hundred fifty, and the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred fifty-three, both dates inclusive, who were bona fide residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such service, and who within the period specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the district of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amounts shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relative of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unmarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

The principal amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose provided in paragraph (1) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the ninety million dollars bonds authorized by the veterans bonus amendment submitted by chapter nineteen of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia of one thousand nine hundred forty-nine, regular session, and ratified by the people of West Virginia at the general election held on the seventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred fifty (hereinafter referred to as "Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty"), which shall not have been issued on the date of the ratification of this amendment by the people of West Virginia: *Provided, however,* That such bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (1) above may be funded or refunded at any time in the manner provided in paragraph (2) below.

(2) The funding or refunding of all or any part of the bonds heretofore issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty. Said bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, may be so funded or refunded either on the maturity date of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty mature or are callable prior to maturity.

The principal amount of bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (2) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

Such bonds for the purposes authorized in paragraphs (1) and (2) above may be issued from time to time as separate issues for such purposes or as combined issues for such purposes.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating

beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds is finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds. The additional taxes on cigarettes and nonintoxicating beer and additional charges on the sale of each bottle of alcoholic liquor, provided for in chapter six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, shall continue to be pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or bonds issued pursuant to this amendment to fund or refund such bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty: *Provided, however,* That upon the funding or refunding of all outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or the deposit in trust of sufficient funds to pay all the principal of and interest on such outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty to their respective dates of maturity or to the first date upon which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, the taxes and charges provided for in said chapter six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, may be pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on any bonds issued under any of the provisions of this amendment.

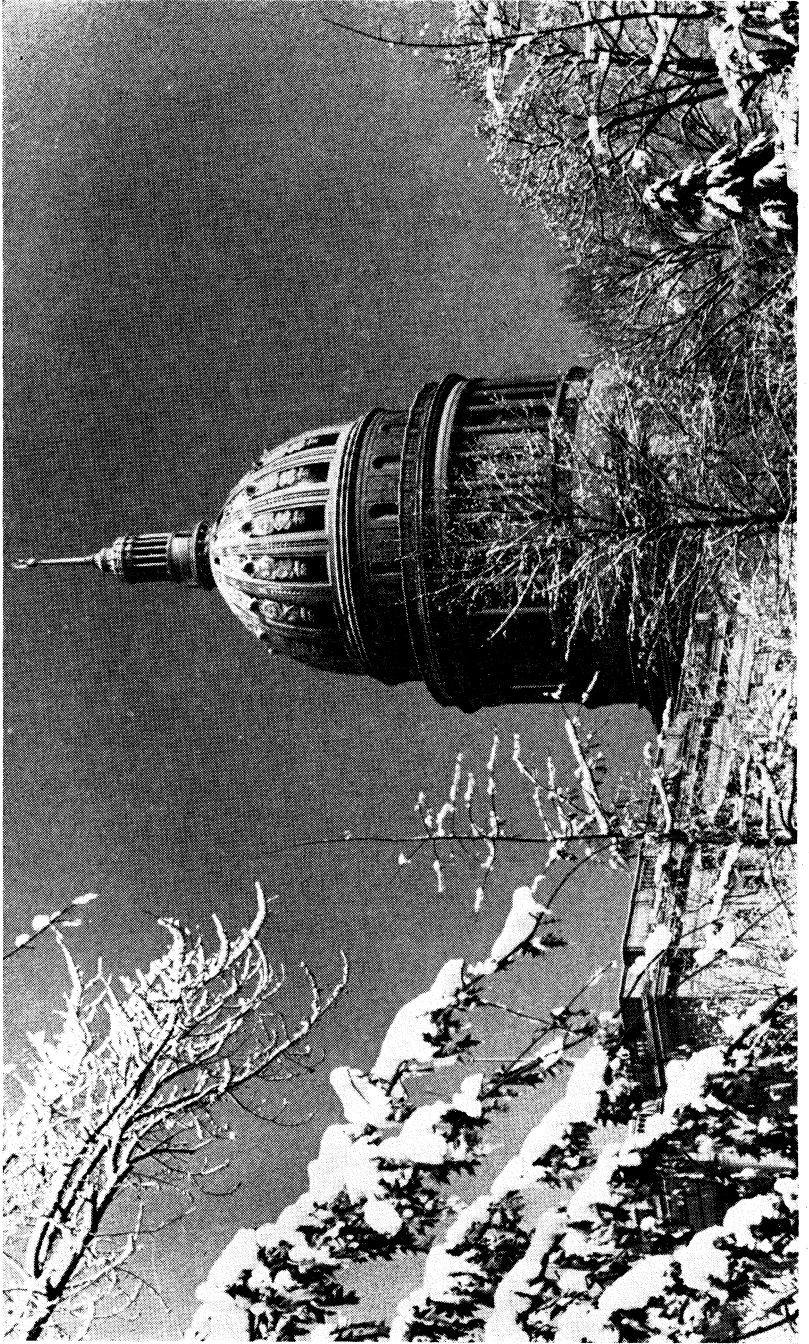

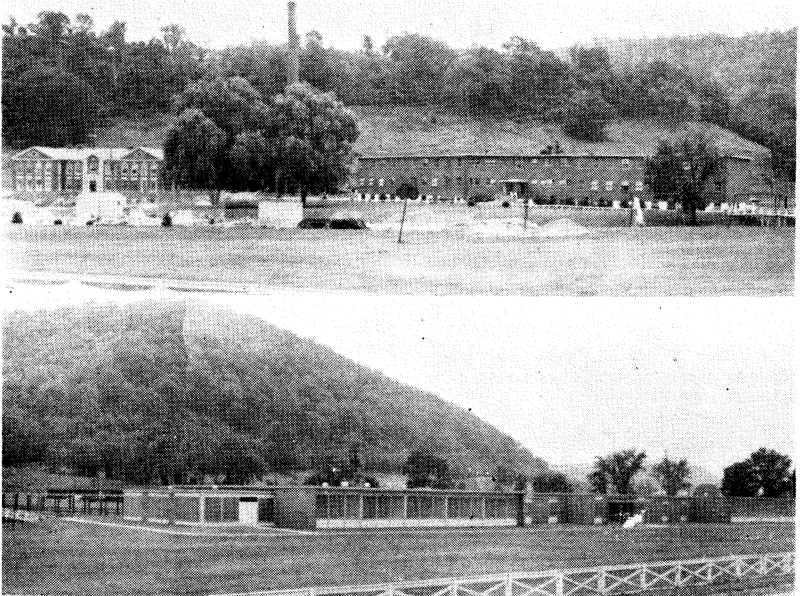
WEST VIRGINIA CHILDREN'S HOME

Elkins

Superintendent: Glenn W. Gainer. Financial Secretary: Martha H. Gainer.
Children: 59.

The West Virginia Children's Home, located in Elkins, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1899 and formally opened in 1911. In 1935 an additional unit was built to the two-story brick structure located on the 20-acre tract of land, located on Heavner Avenue. The purpose of the Home is to provide for orphan and neglected children, between the ages of 6 to 14 years, although they can remain here until they are 21 years of age. Children are admitted to the Home either by a Court order or the Department of Public Assistance to be kept, maintained, educated and trained until they can return to their former homes or placed in foster homes. In addition to the 20 acres of the Home campus, the institution owns 10 acres of farm land located on Leading Creek and 117 acres known as the Darby Memorial Farm, situated at the head of Woolwine Hollow. This acreage furnishes vegetables and grazing for beef cattle and grain for hogs. There are 29 head of cattle and 68 head of hogs, on the Home's farm. At the present time a two-room school is operated on the Home Campus by the Board of Education where the children attend until they complete the 7th grade, after which they complete their education in the Junior and Senior High Schools in the city of Elkins. The Home provides all school supplies and other educational aids in keeping with the best educational standards. Religious training is provided by the local churches, and the children attend Church and Sunday School of their choice. The Home provides a group singing once a week for all the children. They also take part in the various Youth activities provided by the local churches. The boys and girls belong to the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, which provides many activities the year around. The Home Campus is provided with modern playground equipment, including an open air swimming pool.





WEST VIRGINIA TRAINING SCHOOL

St. Marys

Superintendent: Colin A. Anderson, M.D.

Population Capacity: 600.

The West Virginia Training School is situated four miles north of St. Marys, at Spring Run on State Route 2, in Pleasants County. It was established in 1921 by an act of the Legislature. The property consists of 694 acres, part of which is under cultivation. The School is operated for the purpose of providing complete care for mentally deficient and retarded children. The aims of the School are to promote happiness, self-reliance, socialization, vocational training, and to attempt to equip those children who are able to return to community life.

Medical and psychiatric care is offered along with classes of an educational and vocational nature. Occupational therapy classes are planned to develop potential skills, and are graded and diversified in an endeavor to reveal any latent abilities. The School works in close cooperation with the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, through whom direct job placements are made. The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation also accepts patients from the School for training courses at the Center at Institute.

It is recognized that some children are unable to benefit from a training program, and for these custodial care is provided, always with a view to increasing their comfort and safety, as well as promoting some degree of self care and independence.

A large recreation hall provides facilities for indoor games, and has ample staging for concerts and programs by the children themselves. Three school buses are available to take the children to outside community activities and to Church. A School choir is in training. In 1964 a Charter was granted for a Boy Scout Troop. In use during the summer months are a swimming pool 60' x 30', and a wading pool 75' x 45' for the smaller children. Supervised outdoor playground activities are also available, and there is a picnic area with tables and other facilities on the hillside above the School.

Located on the School grounds are: an Administration and Ancillary Services Building, which includes a Beauty Shop and a Barber Shop; a children's Cottage Ward; a large dormitory building; a Staff Apartment Building of twenty-seven rooms; a new Laundry with the most up to date equipment; and a Crib Ward Building. This one story brick building is air conditioned and has two solaria which have on three sides, walls of solar glass to filter out ultra violet light. This building includes X-ray, electro-cardiograph and electro-encephalogram departments, a dental unit and laboratory. There are also two infirmaries of ten and twelve beds each, together with examination, physio-therapy and other treatment rooms. There are ample nursing stations and utility rooms.

The School has a staff of 252.

WEST VIRGINIA FORESTRY CAMP FOR BOYS

Davis

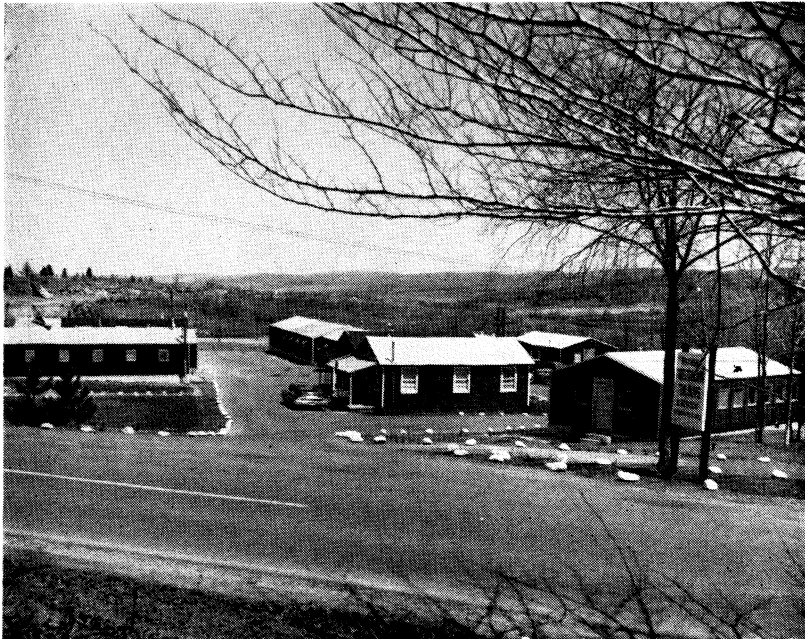

The West Virginia Forestry Camp for Boys is located at Davis, Tucker County, one mile west of Route 32. It was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1955 and established in 1956. It houses youthful male offenders between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one who have been convicted of or pleaded guilty to a criminal offense, other than a capital offense, and who in the opinion of the committing court, is amenable to discipline other than in close confinement. It is strictly an honor camp and offers a work program of outdoor activity conducted in cooperation with the West Virginia Conservation Commission in the upkeep and general maintenance of the Blackwater Falls State Park.

A movie projector is provided for showing 16 mm films each week and on all holidays.

A year round athletic program has been developed. This consists of football, soft ball, basketball, badminton, volleyball and horse-shoe. Church services are held every Sunday at the Camp Chapel. An educational program has been recently initiated and it offers General Education and a Woodworking Shop.

The staff consists of the Superintendent, Business Manager, Camp Secretary, Guidance Counselor, three Teachers, Athletic Director, Chaplain, Doctor, Dentist, Matron, three cooks and eight supervisors.





WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR GIRLS Industrial

Superintendent Martha J. Williams. Financial Secretary: Margaret P. Hull.
Capacity: 195, Enrollment: 160.

West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls is located one mile west of Salem, on U. S. Route 50. It was established by an act of the Legislature on February 18, 1897, and formally opened May 5, 1899. It is built on a 72-acre tract of which 38 acres were donated by the citizens of Salem.

From Jones Cottage, the first building, the plant has grown to include the following: Silver Hall Cottage in 1914; Sutton Cottage in 1928; Ava Standard Cottage in 1942; McCullough Cottage built in 1905, has been replaced by a new modern cottage which houses fifty girls. The Administration Building also built in 1942, includes offices and visiting rooms on the first floor. Living quarters for the Superintendent, Business Manager, with guest rooms comprise the second floor. The plant also includes the school building erected in 1915, which is called the Johnston School, with a very modern gymnasium completed in 1951. A large four-temperature storage building was completed in 1953. The Home also has its own clinic.

The girls receive standard elementary and accredited first class high school training in the very fine and well planned school program. Classes are offered from the first grade through the twelfth grade. The school is under the close supervision of the State Department of Education. The high school has operated as a first class high school since 1937. Some of the courses offered are food, clothing, nutrition, home planning, English, journalism, library training, mathematics, business training, art, music, physical education, history, civics, sociology, biology and geography. Since 1937, 344 girls have been graduated from high school and 873 from eighth grade. The school building includes a well equipped practice kitchen. The school affords a year-round recreational program (softball, badminton, shuffleboard, roller skating, basketball, etc.) All girls are members of the Harrison County Junior Red Cross Chapter. They take an active part in making many things such as tray mats, stuffed animals and dolls, tray favors, water glass collars, Christmas baskets, etc., to be sent to Veterans Hospitals, orphanages, overseas and homes for the aged. The school also has a well stocked library, auditorium, with seating capacity of 270, and a movie projector for showing 16 MM films, film strip projector and screen.

The girls receive domestic training by actual practice in the cottages where they live. They also receive religious training with chapel services conducted by a part time female chaplain each Sunday. A program of rehabilitation is being carried out through the carefully planned work of the school, in the dormitories in which the girls live, and the administration of the institution.

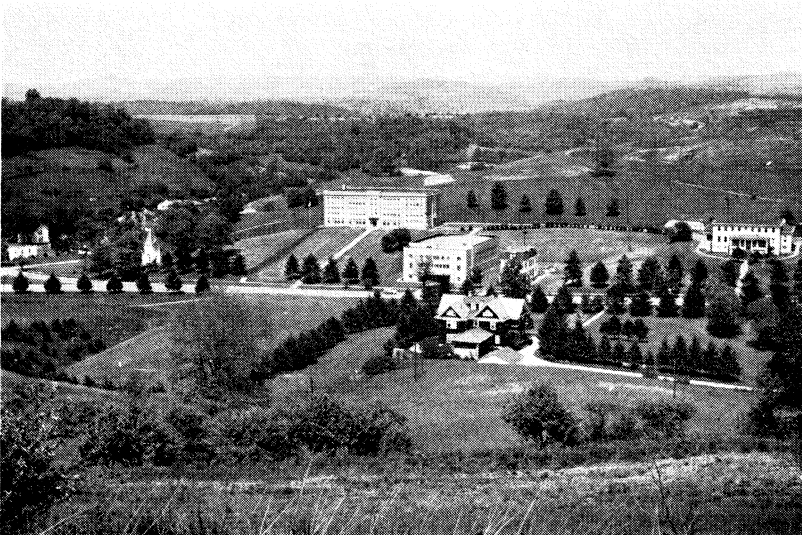
WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR BOYS**Grafton**

Superintendent: William T. Flanagan. Assistant Superintendent: Chas. N. Taylor. Business Manager: H. E. Ferrell. Enrollment: 277.

The West Virginia Industrial School for Boys is located at Pruntytown, three miles west of Grafton on U. S. Route 50. It was established by an Act of the Legislature in 1889 and formally opened July 21, 1891. In addition to the principal buildings, which are located on the main campus consisting of approximately 55 acres, the school owns and operates a farm of approximately 1,900 acres on which are located a considerable number of farm buildings. The boys work on the farm during the farming season at which time emphasis is placed on the training value of such a program, directed toward improving work habits and maintaining discipline standards. For use at the School a dairy herd of registered cows is maintained on the farm and the milk is pasteurized in the modern pasteurization plant of the institution.

The school now has a vocational rehabilitation training program consisting of four certified vocational instructors for full time vocational instruction in the fields of industrial arts, auto mechanics, welding and electricity. As funds become available, this highly important phase of the program is to be expanded. In addition to this, there are training units in shoe repairing and baking. The school also maintains the following units in which the boys receive a certain amount of training. Painting, plumbing, printing, laundering, woodwork, canning, auto mechanics and carpentry. The academic school is operated on approved state standards and contains grades one through ten. In compliance with the state law, those under sixteen years of age are required to attend academic school for a term of nine months each year. A well planned recreation and physical education program operates under the supervision of competent men. Football, basketball (indoor and outdoor), baseball, softball, volleyball and horseshoe pitching form the backbone of this program.

A Social Service Department classifies each boy upon his reception, presents him for parole and/or discharge at the proper time and maintains liaison between County and State Authorities. In most instances, the boys are placed in cottages according to their age or size or both. An Honor System has been established as a stimulant to good behavior and achievement for the boys and it is working well. A Drum and Bugle Corps, consisting of approximately 40 boys, is in operation and appears at many parades and festivals throughout the year, and there is now an active Boy Scout Troop. A full-time Chaplain, especially trained for this work, offers classes in religious education in the academic school and holds weekly religious services for the boys, and carries on a program of counseling and guidance.





PENAL

WEST VIRGINIA PENITENTIARY

Moundsville

Warden: O. C. Boles. Deputy Warden: Ira M. Coiner. Business Manager: J. H. Wilson.

As of March, 1964, the inmate population of the West Virginia Penitentiary was 1,300. There are 140 inmates housed at Camp Fairchance which is near the institution on the institution farm. These men are employed in the operation of the farm, mine and sawmill.

There are 306 inmates employed in Industry producing paint, tobacco, soap, clothing, license plates, mattresses, and printing.

All the commodities manufactured at the institution are for sale to state agencies, county and city governments. Prison produced goods are never sold on the open market, nor out of the state.

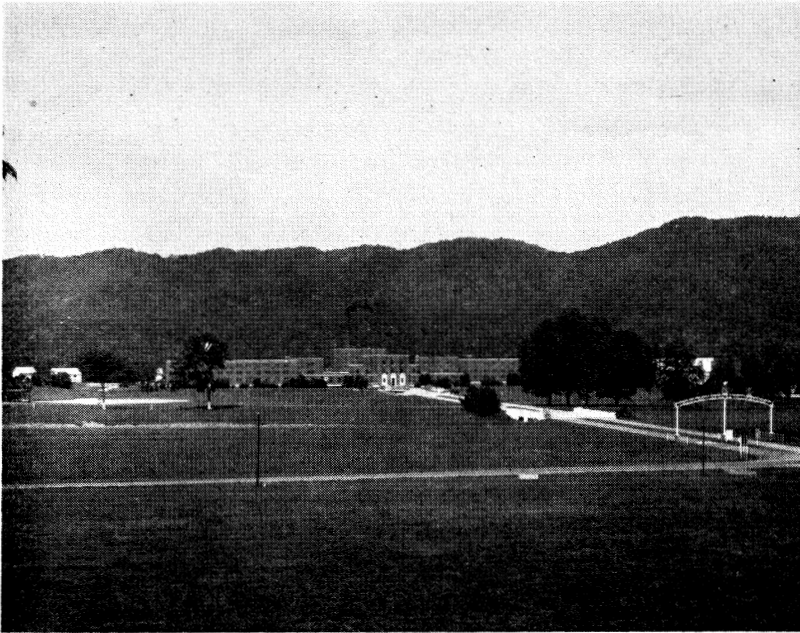
The Penitentiary is located on a ten-acre plot of ground with six acres enclosed by a 24 foot high cut stone wall. There are 1,224 cells in use and 160 new cells that will be completed in 1964.

MEDIUM SECURITY PRISON

Huttonsville

Warden: *Frank B. King.* Business Manager: *H. B. Walsh.* Inmates: 600.

The Medium Security Prison is located on a farm near Huttonsville and is 18 miles south of Elkins on U. S. Routes 219 and 250. It was established by an act of the Legislature in 1937 and was designed to relieve over-crowding at the West Virginia Penitentiary and at the same time aid in the rehabilitation of prisoners. The majority of the inmates are employed in general farm work but many are employed in other vocational trades. They are quartered in modernly equipped dormitories in which there are no cells. The farm consists of 5,000 acres of which approximately 2,000 acres are suitable for cultivation and pasture. The farm products produced are in excess of the needs of the institution and are sold to other state institutions. Much of the foods grown on the farm is canned in the very modern equipped cannery. The 1947 session of the Legislature separated the Medium Security Prison Farm from the West Virginia Penitentiary and established it as a separate institution. All provisions of the law applicable to the Penitentiary are in effect, except that criminal proceedings against inmates of this institution are brought in the Circuit Court of Randolph County.





WEST VIRGINIA STATE PRISON FOR WOMEN

Pence Springs

Superintendent: Mrs. Grace S. Gose. Financial Secretary: Mrs. June R. Bailey. Capacity: 60. Present Population: 45.

The West Virginia State Prison for Women was established by an Act of the West Virginia Legislature in 1947. Prior to that time women who were sentenced in West Virginia were housed in one wing of the State Penitentiary at Moundsville. The Prison is located at Pence Springs, Summers County, on Route No. 3 fifteen miles east of the city of Hinton.

The Prison is situated on a 205.6 acre tract of land which consists of well kept grounds, fifty acres of fertile farm land and several acres of woodland. The main building is well suited for its present use. It is a large three story red brick with full sized basement and attic. The first floor has a spacious living room, staff and inmate dining rooms, kitchen, business offices, commissary, quarantine unit and storage rooms. The second and third floors consist of inmate rooms, hospital unit, security unit, and officers quarters. The basement has a large room which is used for sewing and crafts and other sections which are used for laundry, walk-in-freezer, photography room, storage rooms, coal bins and furnace room, and quarters for the male officers on duty. Near the main building is the Chapel and assembly room. The assembly room is furnished with an electric organ and eighty individual chairs. In the basement is a well equipped cannery for the mass production of canned and frozen foods. Outside the security fence is the Superintendent's four-room cottage and a Duplex which has a furnished apartment for the Financial Secretary and an apartment for guests of the institution. There is also a garage, storage and farm equipment building and piggery on the grounds.

The farm supplies the institution with fresh vegetables in the summer and canned and frozen vegetables for winter. The sewing and craft department is used for vocational training. Many garments are made for institutional use and classes are taught in weaving. Rugs are woven for inmate rooms, as well as many pieces of linen and upholstery material. The inmates are taught the art of cooking and serving through the food service and the laundry assignments prepares many girls for work in home or commercial laundries.

A complete program of rehabilitation is provided in the institution. A religious program is carried out with visiting ministers coming each week. Several interested Church and laymen groups have visited the institution and conducted services. The Sunday School conducted by the inmates is well attended.

HOSPITALS AND SANITARIUMS

ANDREW S. ROWAN MEMORIAL HOME

Sweet Springs

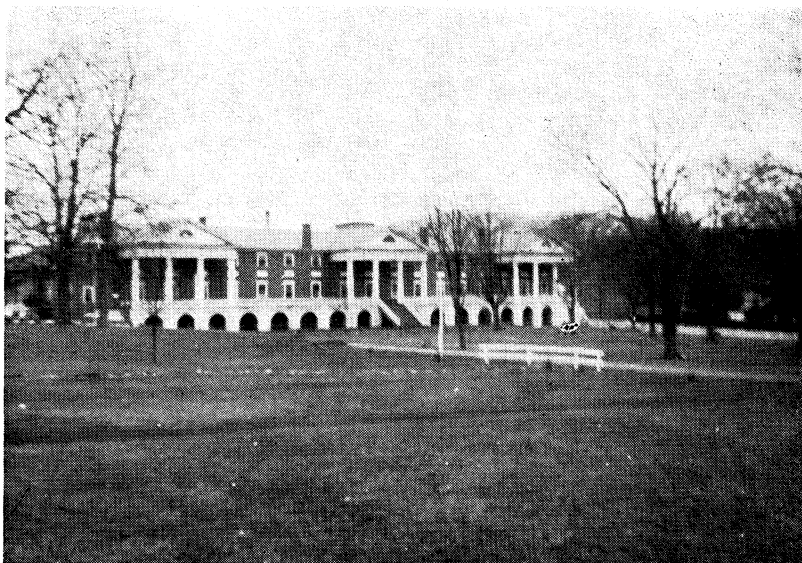

The Andrew S. Rowan Memorial Home for aged men and women was established by an act of the Legislature in 1945 and opened to guests July 1, of the same year.

This Institution is located at Sweet Springs, Monroe County, in the heart of the Blue Grass Section, on State Route No. 3 midway between Union and White Sulphur Springs.

There are many historical facts and traditions connected with the buildings and grounds. The oldest and largest building was completed in 1833 and is of the Thomas Jefferson design and named in his honor. A ninety-six bed annexation to this building has recently been completed in 1958. There are six hundred ninety acres including two hundred twenty-five of farm, and pasture lands and approximately thirty buildings. The dormitory used for men has undergone quite extensive repairs and alterations. A sprinkler system has been installed in the buildings even though some of the buildings are already fire proof. An excellent herd of registered Holstein cows is kept on the farm which supplies the guests with a bountiful supply of milk. The milk plant is one of the best to be found in this county.

Guests are admitted through the Department of Public Assistance, Voluntary pay or by transfer from other State Institutions and must have attained the age of sixty-five years.





BARBOURVILLE STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Barbourville

The Barbourville State Hospital, located at Barbourville, Cabell County, and reached by U. S. Route 60, was opened January 20, 1942. The hospital was originally called Barbourville Unit of Weston State Hospital. The 1947 Legislature changed the name to Barbourville Unit of Huntington State Hospital, and the 1949 Legislature, established it as Barbourville State Hospital. The State in 1941 purchased 23.76 acres of land and the two buildings which were formerly used as dormitories for Morris Harvey College, and patients were moved into the hospital as soon as each section was reconditioned and equipped. On August 1, 1942, the hospital had a population of 270 patients, its capacity at that time. Additional space has been provided through renovation of one of the buildings until the hospital had facilities for 315 patients. The 1947 Legislature made an appropriation for an Administration Building and a Storage Building. These two buildings have been completed and are now in use. The 1949 Legislature made an additional appropriation for construction of a modern laundry building and for renovation of the old buildings, and upon completion of the renovation and the additional space provided by the removal of the administrative offices from one of the dormitories to the new Administration Building, it has a capacity of 402 beds.

The 1957 Legislature appropriated \$100,000 for construction and furnishing of a Male Employees Dormitory. In 1964 this building was converted into a Patients' Self Government Ward.

BERKELEY SPRINGS SANITARIUM

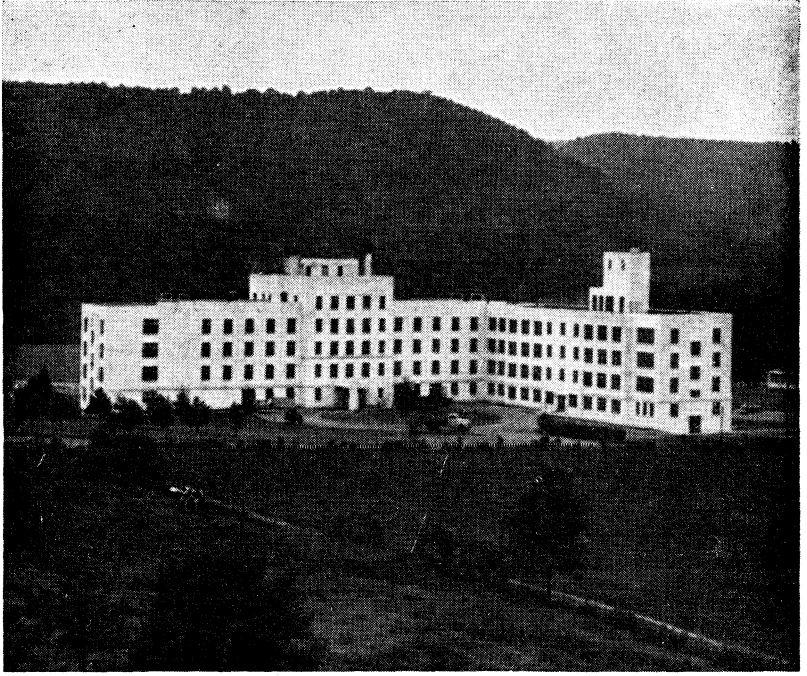
Berkeley Springs

Berkeley Springs Sanitarium is located in the City of Berkeley Springs. It offers baths and swimming pools which utilize the warm and medicinal waters of Berkeley Springs. Histories of colonists mentioned the qualities of the water as early as 1736, and prior to that, American Indians, who were subject to rheumatism knew of its medicinal qualities and called it the "healing waters." It was the first health and pleasure resort in the colonies. The temperature of the spring water is 74.3 degrees and is invariable, and is helpful in the treatment of rheumatism, gout, diabetes, and skin diseases. The springs have been expanded to include a modern open air swimming pool with modern dressing facilities and sunbathing, and an additional new bath house which has Roman Baths and all other types of baths for year-round use. The new bath house also has a solarium or sun deck, which is modern and meets present day requirements. The sanitarium has no facilities for housing patients, but for those who visit Berkeley Springs for baths, there are adequate hotel and boarding house facilities.

At no time in the more than two hundred and twenty-five years of resort history, which included patronage of George Washington and Lord Fairfax, were the famous springs so well equipped to treat patients or accommodate the vacationist, as they are today.





DENMAR STATE HOSPITAL

Beard

Superintendent: (Acting) Andrew Cserny, M.D. Business Manager: Lee W. Ruckman. Patients: 149. Female 91. Male 58.

Denmar State Hospital, formerly known as Denmar Sanitarium, is located approximately 15 miles south of Marlinton, 5 miles off U. S. Route 219 in Pocahontas County, was established by an act of the Legislature in 1957, for the chronically ill. Care and treatment is available to any person, a resident of the State of West Virginia, who first is a patient in any institution other than a penal institution, and second, any person having been approved by the commissioner of Public Institutions.

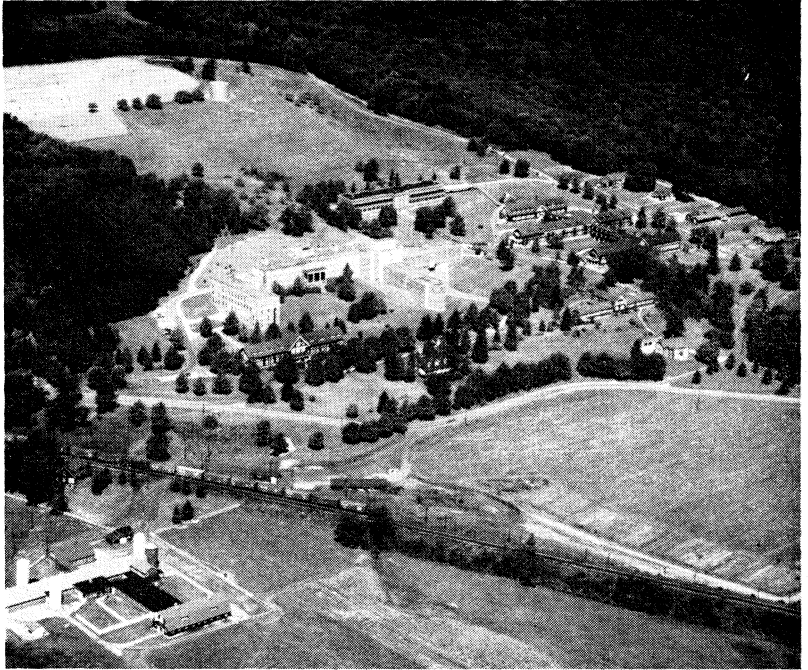
The hospital is healthfully situated on an 185-acre tract of land at about 2,200 feet above sea level on an eminence overlooking the Greenbrier River in the Allegheny Mountains.

FAIRMONT EMERGENCY HOSPITAL**(Surgical)****Fairmont**

Superintendent: Philip Johnson, M.D., F.A.C.S., F.I.C.S., F.I.M.A. Business Manager: Ernest Berle. Patients: 68.

Fairmont Emergency Hospital was established in 1899 for the purpose of treating persons injured in their usual occupations. The hospital accepts surgical and maternity pay cases and is the surgical clinic for the Industrial School for Boys at Pruntytown, the Industrial School for Girls at Salem, the West Virginia Training School at St. Marys, the Children's Home at Elkins, the Medium Security Prison at Huttonsville, the Spencer State Hospital at Spencer, the Weston State Hospital at Weston, the Barboursville State Hospital at Barboursville, the Forestry Camp at Davis, Lakin State Hospital at Lakin and from the West Virginia Penitentiary at Moundsville. No charge whatsoever is made for these cases. The work of the current year at regular hospital prices represents more than the total cost of the operation of the institution. The purpose of the institution at present is rapid service surgical rehabilitation.





HOPEMONT SANITARIUM

(Tuberculosis)

Hopemont

Superintendent: Hilton D. Rocha, M.D. Business Manager: Henry J. McKinley. Capacity: 322.

Hopemont Sanitarium on a 600-acre tract of land, is located at Hopemont, near Terra Alta, in Preston County and was founded in 1913. It accepts all ages of tuberculosis in any form in adults and children and admits all chronic respiratory diseases for diagnosis.

The institution consists of four fireproof hospital units under one roof. Also, Conley Hospital, a separate unit, is used to hospitalize tuberculosis prisoners under maximum security regulations. Other units of the sanitarium consist of residences, nurses' home, main dining hall, post office and laundry.

A registered Holstein herd is maintained to provide pasteurized and homogenized milk for the institution, and a piggery provides pork.

Two hospital units with a 50-bed capacity and adjoining classrooms are set aside for the children with tuberculosis. A qualified full-time teacher is provided by the Board of Education to teach patients (children and adults) in the school-rooms or at the bedside. Grade and high school courses are given.

The hospital is equipped for diagnosis and treatment of pulmonary disease, including surgery.

HUNTINGTON STATE HOSPITAL**(Mental)****Huntington**

Superintendent: Gaston DeLemos, M.D. Business Manager: Julius C. Fry.
Total number of patients: 1175.

Huntington State Hospital, located in the City of Huntington, was established in 1897 by an act of the Legislature as a Home for Incurables. The name of the institution was changed in 1901 to the West Virginia Asylum and in 1916 to Huntington State Hospital.

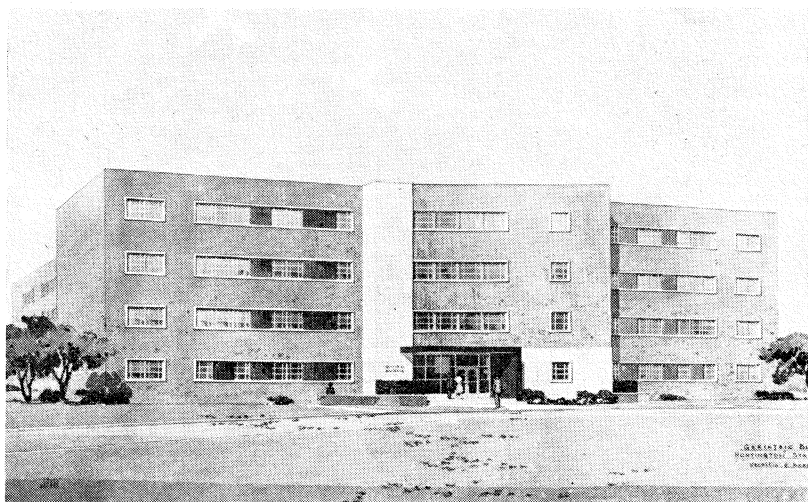
The Hospital is devoted to the treatment of mental illness. The Hospital receives both voluntary and legally committed patients, and the prevailing types of treatment are administered. Those charged with minor law violations from the districts served by this Hospital are studied psychiatrically for the Courts.

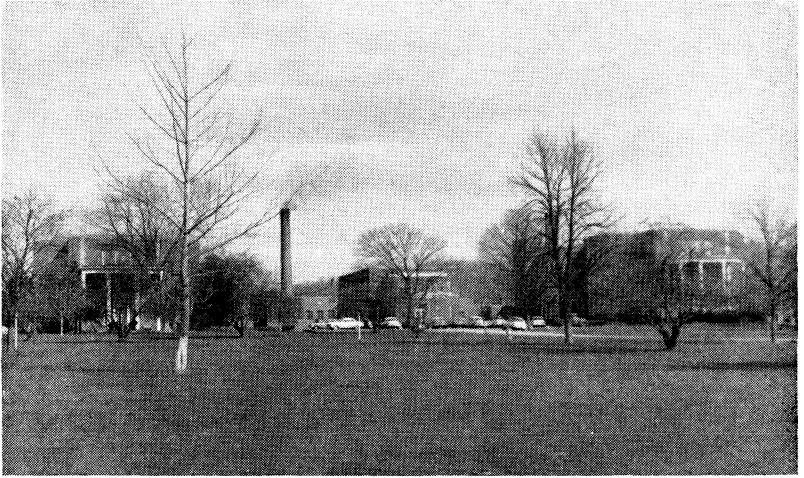
The physical plant includes ward buildings for patients, two of these being original buildings, an administration building; one building used for quarters for employees (one of these being the original administration building), residence for the superintendent; three residences for physicians a short distance from the hospital grounds; power house; laundry; building for occupational therapy and recreation; main kitchen; shops for maintenance in the basement of one ward building. Medical-surgical services for the Hospital were recently transferred to one of the new ward buildings as part of a general move to house all bed and non-ambulatory patients in fire-resistant buildings.

An in-resident Psychiatric affiliation program has been finished for student nurses. We now have students from the Wheeling Hospital affiliated here. A Psychiatric Nurses' program is also being conducted for student nurses from Marshall University.

Vocational Rehabilitation Division has a pilot program established at Huntington State Hospital for the retaining of those who have been mentally ill.

A Hospital Farm, consisting of 698 acres plus other leased lands, is located on the Guyandotte River a mile southeast of Barboursville, and is served by State Route 10. The farm is devoted to providing pork and milk to the hospital. A registered herd of Holstein milk cows is maintained.





LAKIN STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Lakin

Superintendent: R. E. Walden, M.D. Business Manager: Lenzy G. Austin. Number of patients: 502.

Lakin State Hospital was founded by an act of the Legislature in 1919 and was opened in 1926 for the reception and treatment of Negroes suffering from mental and nervous disorders; however, the staff and patient population have been integrated since 1954. Presently, the institution is the district hospital for Mason, Jackson, Wood, and Putnam counties.

The physical lay-out of Lakin State Hospital on the immediate grounds consists of the following: two main buildings of three stories each, one housing male and the other female patients. Other fireproof structures include a two-story office building, a cannery, a modern employees' dormitory, a heating plant, a duplex for physicians and a Medical Center which is presently being used for private, voluntary admissions, short term in-patient care for diagnosis, evaluation and treatment. The Treatment Center for Emotionally Disturbed Children is also located at Lakin. Recently constructed is a new building which houses the kitchen, dining area for patients, offices for ancillary personnel, library, canteen, conference room, etc. In addition, there are, on the immediate hospital grounds, five frame reconconditioned structures in which certain allied functions of the hospital such as laundry, recreation, and work shops are conducted.

In 1957 the former Boys' Industrial School was acquired by Lakin State Hospital. The main building and the dwelling houses have been converted into apartments for employees, farm and mechanical shops. The spacious gymnasium now being renovated is used for both patient therapy and employee recreational activities. The Lakin, West Virginia, Post Office is also located on these grounds.

The hospital is a member of the Mental Hospital Institute of the American Psychiatric Association and in 1952 received its gold medal for achievement—which is a national award. For eleven years, a Psychiatric Aide of the Year was cited for excellency in the care of mentally ill patients. This, too, was a national recognition by the American Psychiatric Association, until its discontinuance in 1963.

A rehabilitation center is located on the hospital grounds in what was formerly the male employees' dormitory. In this building are the remedial and special education classrooms, Beauty parlor, homemaking unit, manual arts shop and offices for related personnel.

Most of the accepted methods of diagnosis and treatment are utilized including clinical observation, social service, psychological testing, neurological and electroencephalography as indicated, occupational therapy, music therapy, recreational therapy, psychotherapy, educational therapy, and vocational rehabilitation, in addition to full utilization of the tranquilizing drugs, in an effort to maintain the institution as a treatment hospital rather than an institution for custodial care.

PINECREST SANITARIUM**(Tuberculosis)****Beckley**

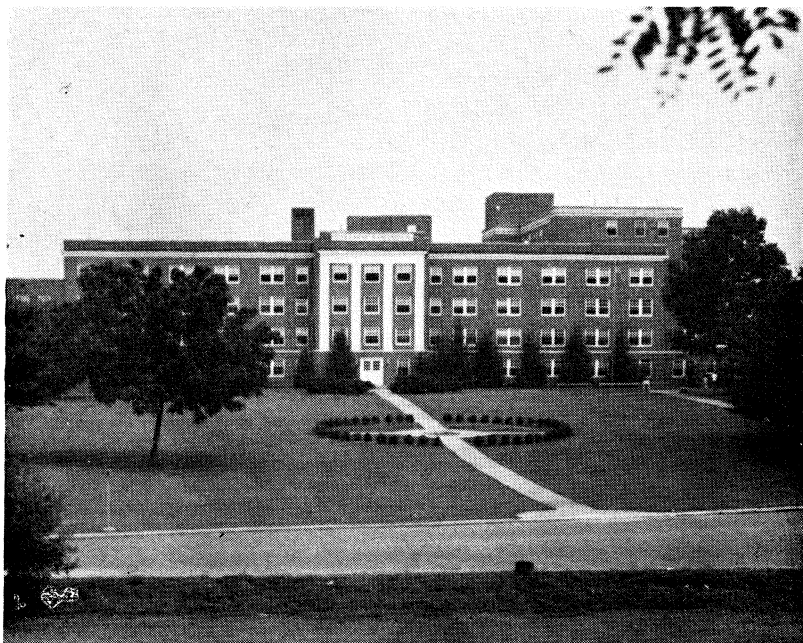
Pinecrest Sanitarium, located in Raleigh County at Beckley, was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1927 and formally opened March 18, 1930. At that time the sanitarium was known as Rutherford Sanitarium but at the session of the 1934 Legislature was changed to Pinecrest Sanitarium.

Pinecrest Sanitarium is located just outside the city limits of Beckley on Federal Routes 19-21 and State Highways 3-41 with thirty-minute bus service connecting with the city and the Atlantic Greyhound bus lines, also with the C. & O. Railway in Beckley and Prince.

The sanitarium has a fifty-acre campus, and a 250-acre farm, which is modernly equipped for farming, and a dairy herd of 95 Holstein cows supplying milk for the institution, also a large number of hogs supply pork and pork products, all consumed by the institution. Pinecrest Sanitarium is composed of four modern fireproof units all connected under one roof, with 621 beds for patients, a modern fireproof nurses' home, four modern dwellings for staff physicians, seven cottages for employees, a central heating plant, dairy barn, hog barn, laundry and numerous outside buildings.

Patients admitted to Pinecrest Sanitarium are assigned to individual physicians who carry out therapeutic procedures that are recommended by the entire staff. In this manner, the patient is given the benefit of consultation by the entire medical staff. The Pinecrest staff is composed of a Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Thoracic Surgeon, five full-time physicians, two X-ray technicians and two laboratory technicians, with ample office employees.

The ambulatory patients have the privilege of being entertained in the modern auditorium by moving pictures and plays produced by local talent. They also take their meals cafeteria in a spacious dining room. The Sanitarium is modern in every respect, with the most modern equipment available for the treatment of tuberculosis, both surgical and medical. A recreational director and trained medical social workers are employed full-time. The Sanitarium has the services of a full-time Chaplain and assistant.



SPENCER STATE HOSPITAL

(Mental)

Spencer

Superintendent: E. A. Litsinger, M.D. Business Manager: Victor N. Goldberg.

The Spencer State Hospital is located in the city of Spencer, Roane County. It was authorized by an act of the Legislature in May 1887 and formally opened in 1893.

The hospital proper is located on a tract of land comprised of 180 acres, a portion of which is devoted to a large

dairy farm which provides a constant supply of fresh milk for the hospital. The farm also supports a large number of hogs which supplies pork and pork products for the use of the institution. An additional 295 acres is located about two miles from the hospital in an area known as Trotter Lake and it serves as a recreational area for the patients as well as a water shed for a dam that impounds approximately 25,000,000 gallons of water.

The hospital's bed capacity is 1,030 and the population averages around 1,000 patients. The hospital staff is composed of seven physicians, all of whom have had at least five years experience and special training courses in psychiatry. There is a very active and well trained social service department and an active nursing staff which includes six registered nurses and two practical nurses. The hospital also provides dental treatment and has a modern high speed dental unit. The physically ill are treated in a separate medical department with the newest methods available. Electrocardiogram, laboratory and modern X-ray unit helps in the treatment and diagnoses of these patients.

The Spencer State Hospital adopted the open door policy and at the present time 76% of our patients reside on open wards. There are no mechanical re-



straints employed at the hospital. All forms of psychiatric treatment, such as psychotherapy, electro-convulsive therapy, chemotherapy and an active occupational and recreational therapies are utilized at the hospital. A new program, a class in remotivation for patients, has been in effect for a year which has added a great deal to the hospital's therapeutic success.

The hospital serves eight counties (Pleasants, Wirt, Calhoun, Roane, Clay, Kanawha, Fayette and Boone) which have a total population of approximately 400,000. In addition to the legally committed patients, the hospital also admits persons who make a voluntary application for admission.

The hospital is indebted to volunteer groups made up of citizens from Roane County and the City of Spencer, who have greatly assisted in the expansion of the Occupational Therapy and Recreational Programs.

In January 1964, a special program was initiated at this institution which incorporates the concept of group orientation in a comprehensive intensive alcohol treatment unit. A trained team consisting of members representing all disciplines, at all levels, from a psychiatrist who is the director and active participant, to and including psychiatric aides, constitutes the therapeutic community principle with regard to the leadership personnel. The patient becomes a member of a group, each of whom interact freely on a very personal basis with one another, which helps to develop interpersonal skills in meaningful communication. This unit is the first of its kind to operate in the State of West Virginia.

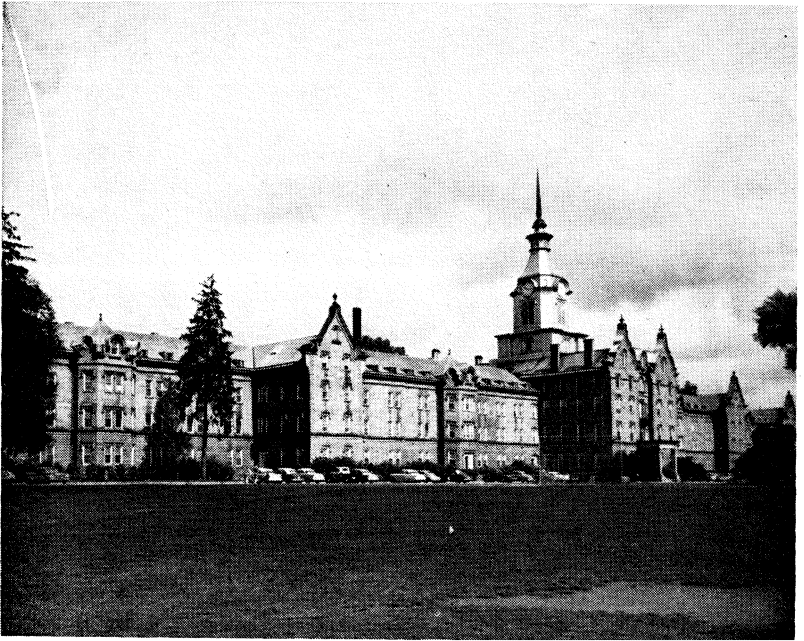
WELCH EMERGENCY HOSPITAL**(Surgical)****Welch**

Superintendent: Jorge Ribeiro, M.D. Financial Secretary: Miss Carole Arnold.

Welch Emergency Hospital, located in the City of Welch, was established in 1899, on a three-acre tract given to the state by J. J. Sperry for this purpose. Its particular service was to the miners in that region, but now takes care of a large part of the charity cases of Southern West Virginia. The patient load has increased, the average daily census now being 116 patients.

There has been extensive remodeling of kitchen and three dining rooms, X-ray, and laboratory. The hospital now has an obstetrical room fully equipped, (666 deliveries last year); 17,481 patients were treated in the out-patient department which maintains a 97 per cent occupancy.





WESTON STATE HOSPITAL
(Mental)
Weston

Superintendent: Alexander H. Baranski, M.D. Business Manager: William J. Murphy. Patients: 2,300.

The Weston State Hospital is located in the City of Weston. It is the oldest state institution in West Virginia, authorized on March 22, 1858, by an act of the Virginia Assembly. There was considerable delay in the construction of the hospital due to the Civil War, and the first patients were received on October 22, 1864. The hospital has grown from an initial capacity of 35 patients to 2,325.

The hospital is maintained and equipped to provide adequate treatment for all types of mental and nervous illness, both voluntarily and court committed; in addition, all mentally ill tubercular patients in the entire state are cared for in a specially constructed building. A surgical section has been added whereby all types of tubercular surgery are provided. In addition, a modern specially constructed building has been erected to take care of all criminally insane in the State. A 107-bed neuropsychiatric clinic building is in operation and the hospital is equipped to provide various types of treatment, including psychotherapy, occupational and recreational therapies and electro-shock therapy. The facilities consist of laboratory, X-ray, social services and psychology departments. A personnel building has been constructed and two other buildings constructed to house patients which replace old buildings which have outlived their usefulness. The staff includes a chiropodist, beautician and barber. On May 20, 1955, a section of the male wards was designated as the West Virginia Soldiers' Home and is administered by the medical hospital staff, all war veterans being admitted here for treatment.

A registered herd of Holstein cows is maintained, thus providing the hospital with an adequate supply of high grade milk, processed in a modern, pasteurized plant fully approved by the State Board of Health. A coal mine at the Western end of the farm operated by the Hospital furnishes coal for the four boilers in the power plant which supplies the heating, hot water and steam requirements for the institution.

The building and outlying farms occupy some 600 acres of land in Lewis County. The hospital grounds are large and spacious with many shade trees and provide excellent recreational facilities for the patients.

WEST VIRGINIA REHABILITATION CENTER AND WORKSHOP

Institute

William G. Winchell, Superintendent.

The West Virginia Rehabilitation Center was acquired by the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation on July 1, 1955, to assist in the rehabilitation of severely handicapped persons through an integrated program of medical, vocational, social, psychological, and evaluation services under competent leadership.

The Center, which is administered and operated by personnel of the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, is an integral part of the agency's statewide program of services for the handicapped. Application for admission to this facility is made through the Division's 55 field counselors who operate out of 22 field office locations scattered throughout the state. Admission is generally restricted to severely disabled clients or to those individuals who have a combination of disabling conditions which makes the rehabilitation process difficult or impossible outside a center setting.

Located just 3.5 miles west of Charleston on State Route 25, the Center at Institute has experienced rapid growth since it was first opened to 55 blind clients in 1955. As a multiple-disability facility—equipped and staffed to serve all types of disabilities—it now has a combined resident and out-patient capacity of more than 500.

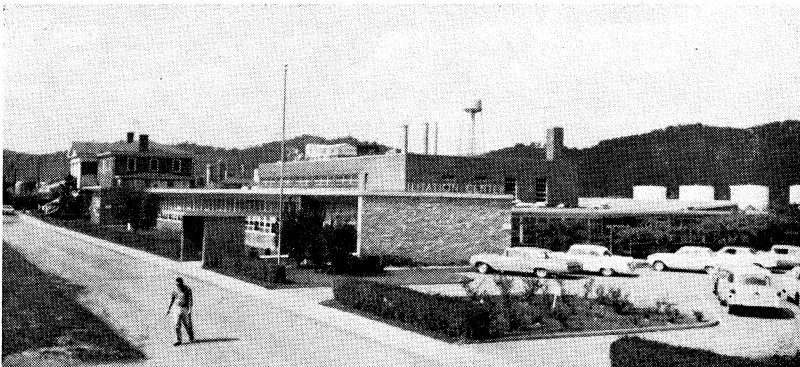
A recent \$1.2 million expansion program elevated the Center to a level where it is now regarded to be one of the best state-operated facilities of its type in the United States. A new Basic Rehabilitation Services Building and a State Sheltered Workshop for the Blind and Severely Disabled have made it possible to provide quality rehabilitation services to hundreds of severely disabled West Virginians who could not be helped in the past.

Although the Center has many characteristics of other facilities involved in the recovery of an individual from disease and injury—or in his adjustment to a mental handicap—it is the only institution in West Virginia which provides a full combination of medical, psycho-social, and vocational services. Because of this, its benefits are in sharp demand and vital to the successful rehabilitation of many individuals having such disabilities as broken backs, blindness, amputations, cerebral palsy, mental illness, mental retardation, strokes, severe heart disability, and speech and hearing difficulties.

As focal point for the Division's statewide case-service program, the Center is a means of bringing all elements of the rehabilitative process to bear on the problems of disability in a single, concerted effort. Within the new Basic Rehabilitation Services Building, psychologists, psychiatrists, social workers, vocational counselors, teachers, therapists, nurses, and physicians are all assembled under the same roof, enabling each member of the "team" to contribute the special skills of his discipline toward "total treatment" of the severely disabled client.

Services currently being offered at the Center may be grouped under four broad classifications—vocational evaluation, rehabilitation treatment, vocational training, and sheltered workshop services.

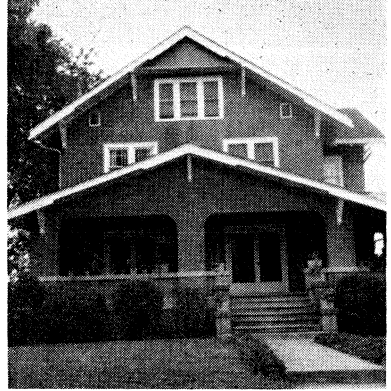
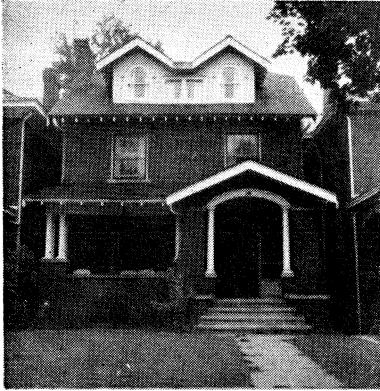
Vocational evaluation involves an intensive study of the individual to help the client set for himself realistic vocational goals. Rehabilitation treatment provides a full range of medical services—including physical and occupational therapy, special diets, surgery, and medications—to restore the handicapped individual to his optimum level of functioning. Vocational training is offered in 19 occupational fields as a means of preparing the disabled client to accept gainful employment following his release from the Center. Sheltered workshop



services are provided for those who cannot work in competitive employment. With sheltered employment available, these individuals can work under close supervision filling industrial contracts while developing new work skills, new habits, and job tolerance.

Facilities at the Center include a 60-bed nursing unit, a speech and hearing unit, a cardiac work classification unit, a small medical laboratory, a brace and limb shop, an optical aids clinic, dormitory accommodations, a 200-seat cafeteria, recreation facilities, a work evaluation unit, physical and occupational therapy sections, a sheltered workshop, training areas in 19 occupational fields, library facilities, and staff training and staff conference rooms.

These facilities are housed in nine fire-proof brick buildings situated on a 35-acre tract of level land.



REHABILITATION HOUSES

Huntington

The West Virginia Division of Vocational Rehabilitation operates two Rehabilitation Houses in a quiet residential section of Huntington for the benefit of discharged mental patients. The homes are intended to ease the abrupt transition between the state mental institution and the patient's home community.

Both the Rehabilitation House for Men and the Rehabilitation House for Women were established in 1960 as part of a state-federal research and demonstration project. At the conclusion of the three-year project period, the homes had proven so successful that they were included as permanent facilities within the agency's statewide program of services for the mentally handicapped. Between 1960 and 1963 (the project period), a total of 90 patients received services from the two homes. Only 14 of this number later had to be readmitted to a state mental institution.

Only patients who have previously been treated at a state mental institution are eligible to receive services from the two homes. For this reason, the homes are often referred to as "Half-Way" Houses, since they play a vital role in bridging the traumatic gap between years of confinement in a mental hospital ward to a normal, useful life in the community. And while many discharged patients may not require the services of a Rehabilitation House, the homes are especially beneficial to those individuals whose family or home environment might jeopardize their recovery.

Both houses are three-story brick homes—nicely furnished with attractive surroundings. The House for Women can accommodate twelve residents and two houseparents. The House for Men has a capacity of 15, including houseparents.

All of the patients who are sent to the houses are assigned household duties and are encouraged to accept gainful employment within the community. Some are engaged in full-time employment while the others may do spot labor or subcontract work.

Each home has a house mother and father. Home cooked meals and an active recreation program, both within the houses and the community, help to make life pleasant for the former patients. All are on self-medication and are visited once each week by a physician from Huntington State Hospital.

Vocational training or re-training is provided to those residents who show a need for it. This may be offered through the State Rehabilitation Center at Institute, local trade schools, business colleges, or through local business firms which are willing to provide on-the-job instruction.

Successful job placement of the Rehabilitation House resident is the ultimate goal of all rehabilitation efforts. This is probably the biggest step for the ex-patient in his return to community living.

Enrollment 1963-64: First semester full-time academic and vocational, 1,612 students; part-time, 1,024, second semester full-time academic and vocational, 1,503, part-time, 902.

West Virginia State College was chartered in 1891 and renamed in 1915 and in 1929. It was accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in 1927. It was placed on the list of institutions approved for membership eligibility in the American Association of University Women in 1962. West Virginia State College is accredited for the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers at the bachelor degree level by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education. From 1891 until June 30, 1957, the college served as a land-grant college in the State of West Virginia. Beginning July 1, 1957, it became a multi-purpose college offering standard four-year curricula in arts and science, teacher education, business administration, home economics, music and technical science. Degree courses are offered for elementary and high school teachers. These curricula include courses in art, biological science, biology and general science, commerce, English, French, German, health education, home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, music, physical education, physical and general science, social studies and Spanish.

Pre-professional training includes dentistry, engineering, pharmacy, law, medicine and nursing, theology and veterinary medicine. Special services are offered in the psychology laboratory, foreign language laboratory and speech clinic. The college offers a comprehensive evening school program, a two-year Associate of Arts in Commerce Degree, a two-year Associate of Science in Law Enforcement Degree, two-year terminal technical curricula and ROTC training (General Military Science). West Virginia State College offers freshman and sophomore courses in engineering.

Alderson-Broaddus College is an institution of Christian higher education established in 1871 as Broaddus College, and merged with Alderson Junior College in 1932. Sponsored by the West Virginia Baptist Convention, and affiliated with the American Baptist Convention, it is fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the West Virginia State Department of Education, as a four-year, co-educational liberal arts college. It is a member of the Association of American Colleges, the American Association of Schools of Religious Education, and the American Baptist Education Association.

The instructional program is organized under four divisions: Humanities, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Vocational and Professional Studies. In addition to offerings in the Liberal Arts, there are professional programs of study in business administration, Christian education, elementary education, medical technology, music education, nursing, radiologic technology, and secondary education. The pre-professional programs include dentistry, law, medicine, ministry, and social work. These curricula lead to the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees. The academic year is on a year-round, 4-term basis. Students attend three terms each year, with vacations staggered throughout the four years (i.e. Freshmen-summer term off; Sophomore-spring; Juniors-winter; Seniors-fall). Students take three courses, five days a week each term for a concentrated learning experience. Credits will continue to be measured in semester hours.

Enriched educational experiences are offered for graduation credit during the vacation terms of the Junior and Senior years. They include: foreign study and travel; co-operative educational programs with Broaddus Hospital and business and industry; independent study; and Christian and humanitarian service.

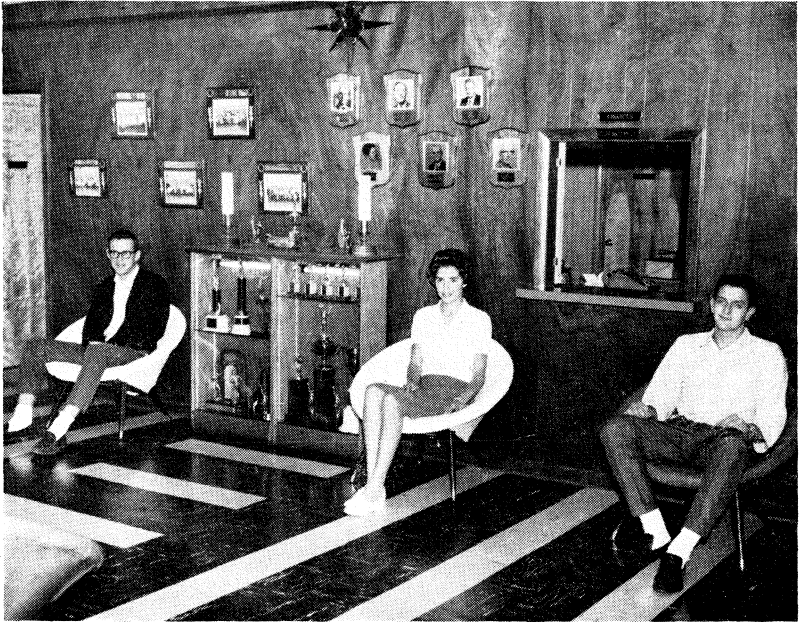

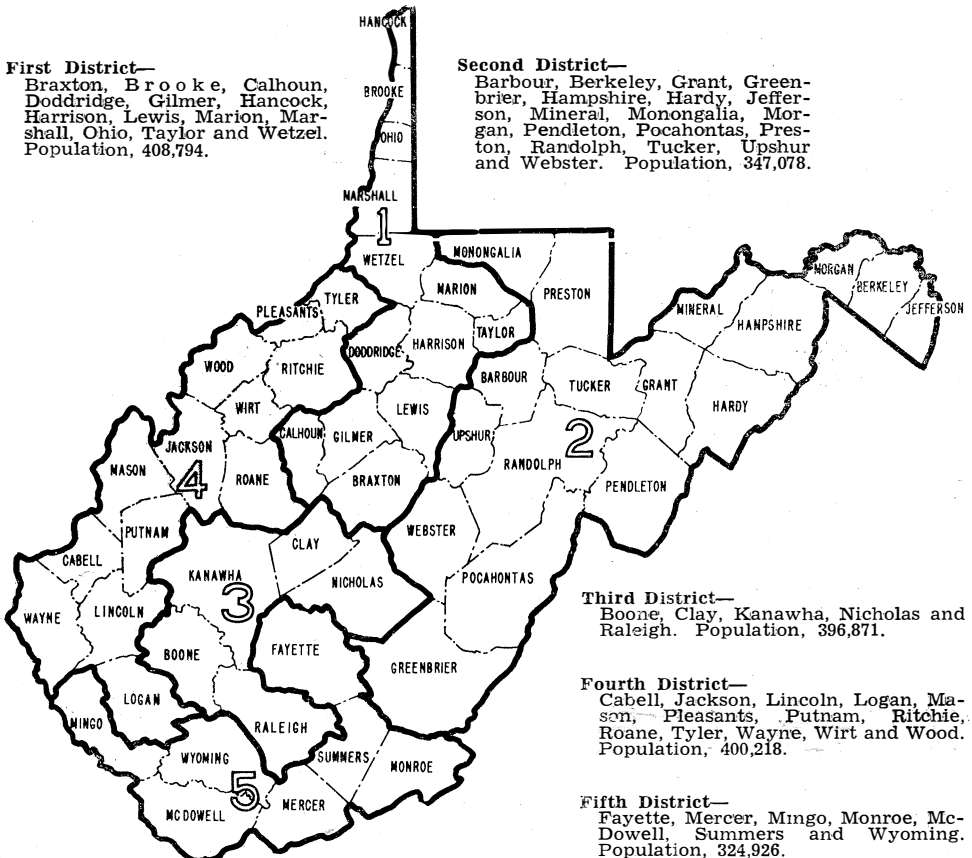

Congress has delegated to the Corps of Engineers responsibility for the development, construction, operation and maintenance of navigation facilities, flood control structures, and related improvements.

The Civil Works Program of the Corps of Engineers is divided on the basis of watershed drainage areas. The Ohio River drainage basin includes all of West Virginia except the eastern Panhandle, which is in the Potomac River Basin. The Huntington District of the Ohio River Division encompasses that part of the Ohio River Basin in West Virginia downstream from Capatina in Marshall County. The Pittsburgh District encompasses the upstream remainder of the Ohio River Basin including the Basin of the Monongahela River. The Potomac River Basin is included in the Baltimore District of the North Atlantic Division.

Responsibility for military construction in the entire State of West Virginia rests with the U.S. Army Engineer District, Louisville, Kentucky, Corps of Engineers.

Extension of the Ohio River navigation system in West Virginia presently includes three high lift dams on the Kanawha River and four navigation structures on the Monongahela River. Operation of the navigation structures on Little Kanawha and Big Sandy Rivers for commercial navigation has been discontinued. Navigation is not a feature of the Potomac River located in West Virginia.

Improvement of the navigation facilities includes construction of modern high lift structures to replace existing obsolete dams. On the Ohio River two of these structures are complete. Greenup Locks and Dam, Greenup, Kentucky replaced Locks and Dams, 27 and 28 in West Virginia, 29 and 30 in Kentucky. New Cumberland Locks and Dams, New Cumberland, West Virginia, replaced Locks and Dams, 7, 8 and 9 in West Virginia. Other navigation structures now under construction on the Ohio River in West Virginia are: Pike Island Locks and Dam, Wheeling, West Virginia, which will replace existing Locks and Dams 10 and 11; Belleville Locks and Dam, Belleville, West Virginia, which will replace Locks and Dams 18, 19 and 20; and Racine Locks and Dam, Letart, West Virginia, which will replace existing Locks and Dams 21, 22 and 23. West Virginia will benefit from the construction of these modern navigation improvements on the Ohio River.

Modernization of the obsolescent Monongahela River navigation structures in the upper reaches of the waterway is also currently in progress. Hildebrand Lock and Dam and modification of Dam 8 have been completed. Those navigation structures now under construction on the Monongahela River are: Opekiska Lock and Dam, which will replace existing Locks and Dams 14 and 15 and Maxwell Locks and Dam, which, when integrated with reconstruction of Dam 4, will replace Locks and Dams 5 and 6.

Flood control reservoirs within the State constructed by the Corps of Engineers are Bluestone Reservoir on New River, near Hinton; Sutton Reservoir on Elk River near Sutton; and Tygart Reservoir on Tygart River near Grafton. Summersville Dam and Reservoir on Gauley River is under construction. Others are authorized by Congress and will be constructed as funds are appropriated.

Local protection projects completed by the Corps of Engineers in West Virginia are located at Parkersburg, Point Pleasant, Huntington, Ceredo-Kenova, Ridgeley, W. Va.-Cumberland, Md. (one project) and Elkins, and Williamson. Channel improvement projects have been completed on Brush Creek at Princeton, West Virginia, and on Meadow River at East Rainelle. Several completed snagging and clearing channel improvement projects have reduced or alleviated flood damage along the smaller tributaries of the main rivers within the State.

The Federal Reformatory for Women is situated in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains in Summers and Monroe Counties. It was established by Act of Congress June 7, 1924, and the buildings and grounds have a value in excess of \$2,000,000. It was designed to take care of all women Federal sentenced prisoners in the United States and the insular possessions and has a capacity of 600. There are fifteen buildings housing inmates, two separate housing units for youth and juvenile offenders, a hospital, administration building, a garment factory, laundry, vocational shops building, school building, chapel and auditorium, storehouse, and shops. The Enabling Act specified that each inmate should be given training that would fit her to be self-supporting on her return to society, and the entire program of the institution is based upon this plan for rehabilitation. An intelligent and sincere attempt is made to supplant the old-time theory of punishment with a program geared to changing attitude and creating new and constructive goals. Classification and casework are highly developed to provide for adequate training within the institution and proper placement in jobs after release.

The Newton D. Baker General Hospital of the United States Army was taken over by the Veterans Administration and opened for patients on November 15, 1946. The hospital is now known as the Veterans Administration Center.

The reservation comprises approximately 182 acres of land, 100 buildings, its own water and sewage systems. It has spur trackage from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for freight deliveries and passenger transportation is available by bus from many of the surrounding communities.

Veterans Administration Center has an authorized capacity of 840 hospital beds and 500 domiciliary beds. The hospital beds are proportioned as follows: 236 for Tuberculosis Service, 440 for General Medical and 164 for Surgical Service, including Intermediate Service.

The majority of the buildings comprising the hospital plant are connected by enclosed corridors. This group includes the administrative offices, all of the clinics, the operating suite, twenty-one wards, domiciliary barracks, mess halls, recreation halls, canteen, library, and warehouse.

The Veterans Employment Representative is attached to the staff of the public employment service in the State. He is administratively responsible to the Secretary of Labor through the Chief of the Veterans Employment Service for the execution of the Secretary's veterans' placement policies through the public employment service in the State. In cooperation with the public employment service staff in the State, he shall—

“(a) be functionally responsible for the supervision of the registration of veterans in local employment offices for suitable types of employment and for placement of veterans in employment;

“(b) assist in securing and maintaining current information as to the various types of available employment in public works and private industry or business;

“(c) promote the interest of employers in employing veterans;

“(d) maintain regular contact with employers and veterans' organizations with a view of keeping employers advised of veterans available for employment and veterans advised of opportunities for employment; and

“(e) assist in every possible way in improving working conditions and the advancement of employment of veterans.”

The Veterans Employment Representative assists the Director of the Department of Employment Security with problems concerning veterans employment.

The Governor Committee is affiliated with the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped, and promotes programs in the interest of handicapped persons seeking employment opportunities within the state.

Federal, State and private agencies, whose activities are coordinated in serving handicapped persons and disabled veterans, cooperate fully in effecting programs such as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." High School Research Contests (pertaining to the handicapped); Award of Merit and Outstanding Service; Physician's awards; Handicapped Employer Awards; high school poster contests; and community planning for handicapped groups.

Participating actively are the following agencies: Veterans Administration, Department of Veterans Affairs, organized labor, Division Vocational Rehabilitation, Department Employment Security, State Executive Department, veterans organizations, and the Veterans Employment Service.

The Committee Chairman serves at the will and pleasure of the Governor. Individual members recommended by local community committees are either reappointed or newly appointed each year by the Chief Executive.

Members of the West Virginia Committee represent Federal, State and Municipal government, industry, labor, civic, veterans, fraternal, medical, ministerial, women, and other groups throughout the state.

The committee is a non-dues paying organization and at times when finances are necessary for contest prizes the required amounts are secured from generous employers who have been responsible for so many successful programs.

Congress has determined that the first full week in each October shall be observed as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week" throughout the Nation. This week's observance is intended to be a reminder to those employers who remain reluctant in employing handicapped workers. National, state and local media of press, radio and television have carried the message of the handicapped in an excellent coverage of the various programs.

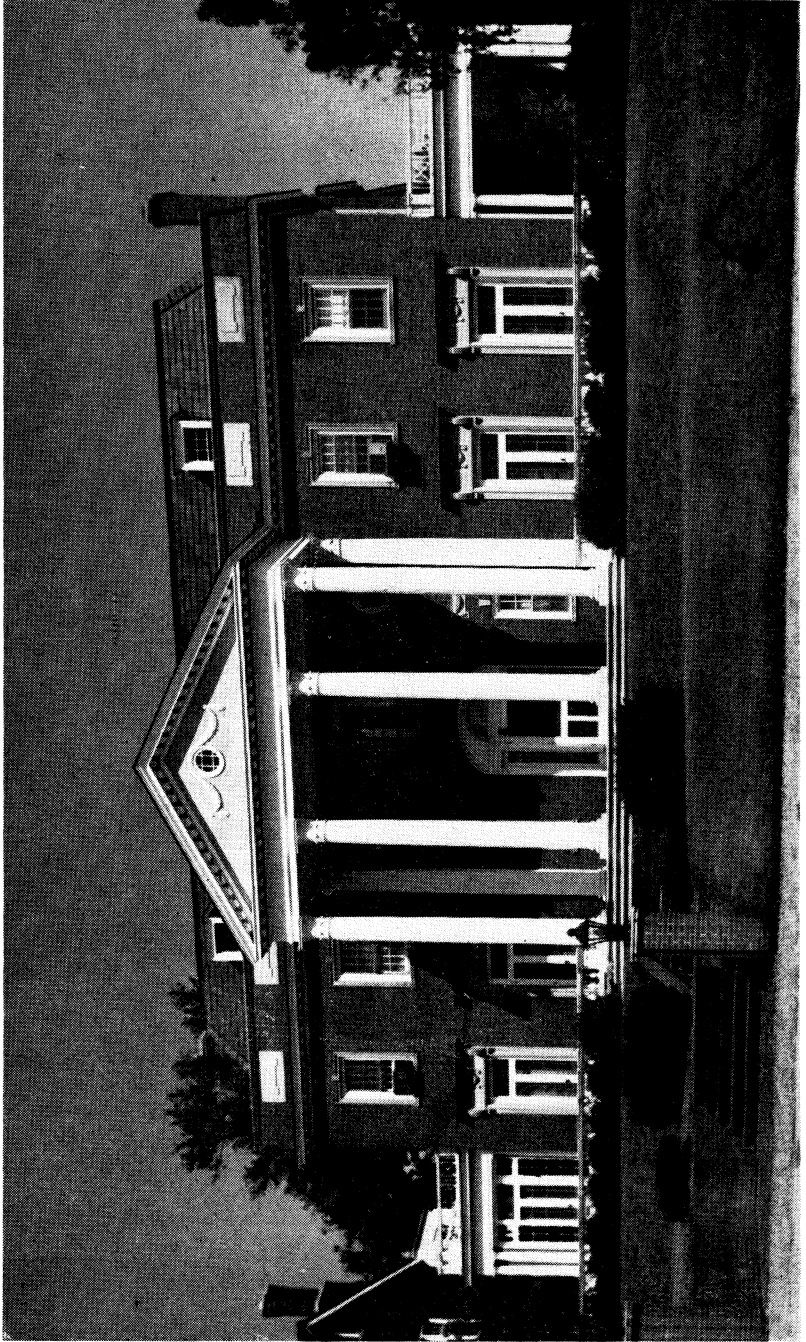

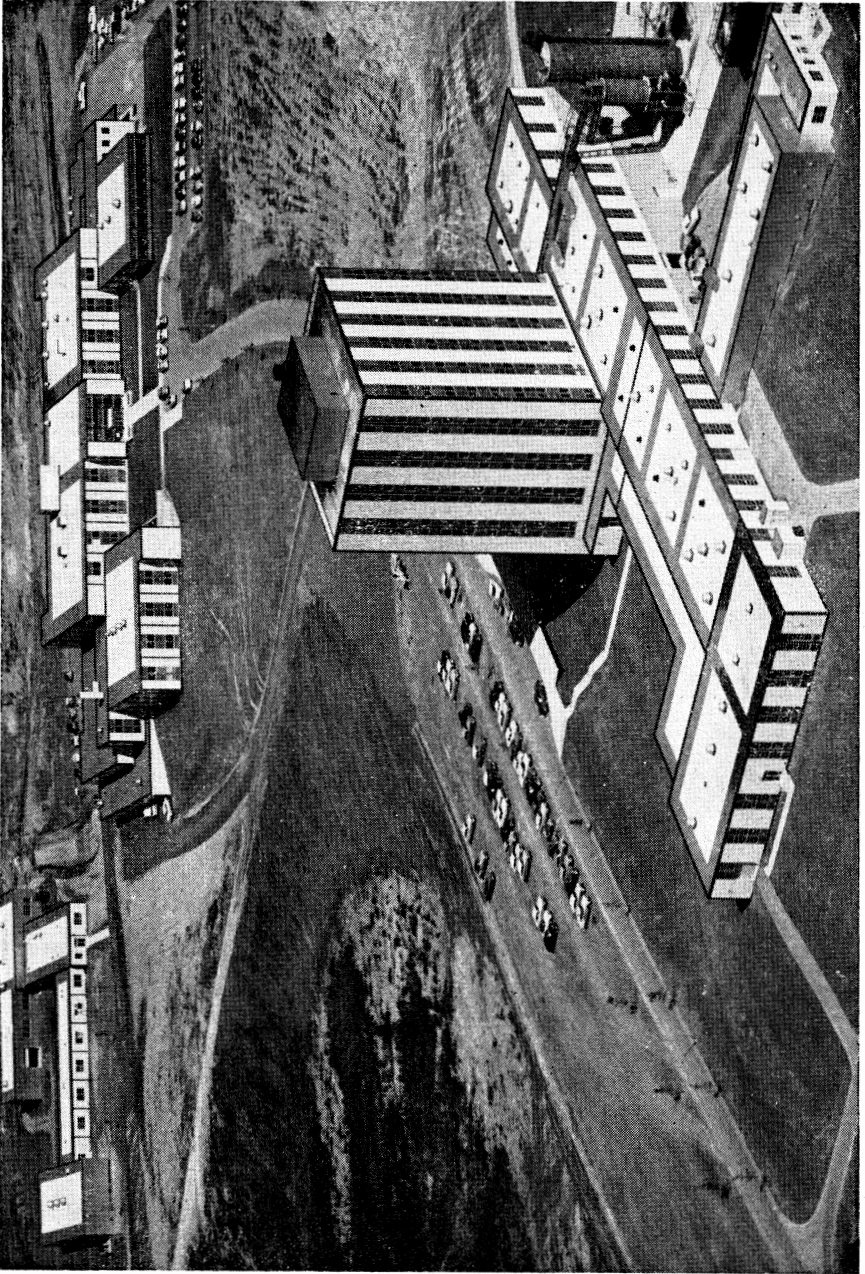

OFFICIAL MUNICIPAL REGISTER

(Corrected to September 1, 1964)

CLASS I, II AND III CITIES

Under the provisions of Chapter 56, Acts of the Legislature, regular session, 1939, municipal corporations are classified by population as follows: Population in excess of 50,000, Class I city; population more than 10,000 and not more than 50,000, Class II city; and population more than 2,000 and not more than 10,000, Class III city. Municipal corporations not included in these classifications are known as towns or villages.

Transition from one to another class of municipal corporation occurs automatically when the requisite population qualification has been met. Population is determined on the basis of the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States or the Legislature of West Virginia. Census of 1960 is used as basis in determining class of cities listed in Register.

He also used it for a sort of crude hotel for himself and his men who drove cattle from Clarksburg to the Ohio River at Marietta which was the nearest market.

Samuel Fitz Randolph purchased the property on which the village was founded in 1790. Mr. Randolph had started with a caravan of pioneer settlers from Salem, New Jersey, who crossed the mountains in 1789 and made their first stop at Woodbridgetown, Pennsylvania. Mr. Randolph, a number of Davises, some Maxsons, and others came on to what is now Salem, after a two and one-half year trek from the sea coast.

Salem was the first settlement of Seventh Day Baptists west of the mountains. It is now the home of Salem College, founded in 1888, and the Industrial Home for Girls established in 1898. Glass has been a major industry. The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the George Washington highway and state highway route No. 23 pass through it. It is the birthplace

of United States Senator Jennings Randolph and the great writer, Granville Davison Hall, author of *Daughter of the Elm*, *The Rending of Virginia*, and many other historical books.

THE AMERICAN FLAG

DESCRIPTION OF THE FLAG

The Flag of the United States of America has 13 horizontal stripes—7 red and 6 white—the red and white stripes alternating, and a union which consists of white stars of five points on a blue field placed in the upper quarter next to the staff and extending to the lower edge of the fourth red stripe from the top. The number of stars is the same as the number of States in the Union. The canton or union now contains 50 stars. On the admission of a State into the Union a star will be added to the union of the Flag, and such addition will take effect on the 4th day of July next succeeding such admission.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union; in front of the rock are two hunter's rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE CAPITOL

West Virginia's Capitol Building, one of the world's beautiful examples of Italian Renaissance architecture, stands on the north bank of the historic Great Kanawha River in the capital city of Charleston. Its golden dome, rising 300 feet, as a landmark visible both day and night from a number of distant points in the city.

Completed in 1932 at a cost of nearly \$10,000,000, the building was designed by Cass Gilbert, an architect of international prominence.

The huge U-shaped structure consists of a main unit and two wings which are situated on 16 acres of ground. There are 333 rooms and a total floor space of 535,000 square feet. Unlike the exterior of Indiana buff limestone, the interior is laid with Imperial Danby Vermont marble.

In the rotunda is a two-ton crystal chandelier which has 15,000 candle power. It is suspended 180 feet above the floor by a gold chain 54 feet long. It contains 6,500 rock crystals. Sparkling chandeliers in the House and Senate chambers are made of 10,000 separate pieces of rock crystal.

A specially-prepared paint, "Governor's Blue," covers the walls of the outer reception room of the governor's suite, the show room of the Capitol. A light Turquoise rug, 27'x72'x2" and weighing 1,996 pounds, carpets the floor.

Directly beneath the executive suite is the State Museum containing numerous exhibits to illustrate the history, science and social conditions of early West Virginia.



STATE BIRD

Resplendent in his plumage of scarlet, the Cardinal was made West Virginia's official bird by concurrent resolution of the 1949 legislature. The male of the species is a rich scarlet with a mask and shading of black, while the young and female are somewhat less brilliant. The cardinal measures approximately eight inches in length and ranges from New York State to the Gulf States and as far West as Oklahoma. His scientific name is *Richmondena cardinalis*.



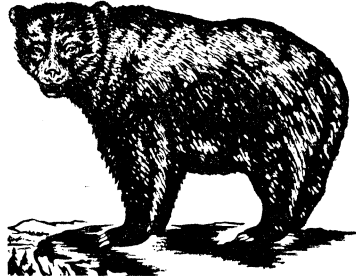
STATE FLOWER

The *Rhododendron maximum*, or "big laurel," was designated the official floral emblem of the Mountain State at the suggestion of Governor Albert Blakeslee White on January 23, 1903. It is a shrub of the heath family, and is distinctive for its large evergreen leaves and delicately impressive pale pink or white bloom, mottled with either red or yellow flecks. The big laurel is a mountaineer through and through, preferring as it does the upland climate of the Appalachian and Allegheny ranges.



STATE TREE

The Sugar Maple, or *Acer saccharum* as it is known scientifically, abounds in West Virginia and was made West Virginia's official tree by concurrent resolution of the 1949 Legislature. It produces an excellent wood for furniture construction, lighter and stronger than oak. West Virginia Sugar Maples also produce much of the maple syrup for which Vermont is famous. A single tree is 70-120 feet high and produces two to three pounds of sugar when "sugared off." It has a five-lobed leaf and produces a small wing-shaped seed pod.



STATE ANIMAL

The Black Bear . . . *Euarctos americanus* actually, he is strongly tinted with brown. His habitat in West Virginia has been reduced to approximately 12 counties in the Eastern Mountain Region, though he still roams freely through 36 states and Canada. Either one or two cubs (rarely three) are born at a time, weighing about eight ounces each. The adult reaches an average maximum weight of 250 pounds, though they have been known to attain 650 pounds.

THE MOVEMENT FOR WEST VIRGINIA STATEHOOD

(By DR. JAMES L. HUPP—STATE HISTORIAN and ARCHIVIST)

The movement for West Virginia statehood had its origins in differences between eastern and western Virginia that existed long before June 20, 1863. One of the most striking of these differences lay in conditions of geography. The Tidewater and Piedmont regions of eastern Virginia were comprised of lowlands and gently rolling hills, which together with a mild climate and rich soils, made them excellent for the growing of tobacco and other plantation type crops. The Allegheny and Trans-Allegheny parts of Virginia, on the other hand, were often hilly regions with poor, thin soils and extremes of climate. Here the small diversified farm prevailed. A second major difference appeared in people themselves. The inhabitants of eastern Virginia were largely English in origin, whereas those of the western part of the state were primarily German and Scotch-Irish. Eastern Virginians were often Anglican or Episcopalian in their religious ideas, but dissenting sects such as Methodists, Baptists and Presbyterians predominated in western Virginia almost from the beginning.

As time passed, other differences began to appear between eastern and western Virginia. These included conflicting views on such questions as education, internal improvements, taxation and the basis for representation. The western parts of the state complained that they were neglected in education and internal improvements. On the other hand they maintained that they were under-represented in the Virginia General Assembly and bore an unfair share of the taxes. In the Constitutional Convention of 1829-1830 the West demanded an extension of the suffrage, the election rather than appointment of county officers, and a redistribution of seats in the Virginia legislature which would reflect the growing population of the west.

The demands of the westerners were only partially met by the new constitution. The legislature was still chosen on the basis of apportioning the number of delegates by sections, which left the west in an unfavorable position. The western contention that voting should be on the basis of "one man, one vote" rather than a mixed basis of white population and direct taxes also failed to become a reality. The Convention of 1829-1830 left the westerners with a feeling of bitterness that was often manifested in agitation for separation from Virginia and the formation of a new state.

The failure of the Convention of 1829-1830 to achieve a solution of the state's problems that would satisfy both easterners and westerners led to a second major effort to bring about constitutional change. In 1850 representatives from eastern Virginia appeared more willing to make concessions to the western part of the state. Changes in the constitution now provided that representation in the House of Delegates was to be on the basis of white population. The suffrage was extended to all males over twenty-one years of age and a large number of state and county offices became elective. On the other hand, there were disadvantages for the west in that it now became unconstitutional to pledge the credit of the state for the construction of internal improvements, such as roads and canals and to use lotteries as a means of raising money, even for educational and religious purposes.

In spite of the concessions made to the west, there still remained many sources of friction between the eastern and western parts of the state. Throughout the 1850's these differences plagued the Old Dominion. The breaking point came in April, 1861, when Virginia, fearful of the election of Lincoln as President and responding to the firing upon Fort Sumter, passed an ordinance of secession and cast her lot with the Confederacy. This action was a great shock to delegates from western Virginia, two-thirds of whom voted against secession. After waiting two or three days in hopes of a "more happy turn of events" the West Virginia delegates left Richmond and returned to their home counties. Already John S. Carlile of Harrison County had hurried home to promote Unionist sentiment. As a result of Carlile's efforts, a convention was held in Clarksburg on April 22, 1861. At this convention plans were made for another meeting on May 13 to

which each county of northwestern Virginia was asked to send five of its ablest men. The Clarksburg convention condemned the secession ordinance and indicated the Trans-Allegheny region was not prepared to follow Virginia out of the Union.

The convention set for May 13 met at Wheeling. Altogether 436 delegates representing twenty-six West Virginia counties and Frederick County now in Virginia were present. These delegates were elected by various means, some of which were irregular. As a consequence, many of them looked upon the Wheeling convention as a mass meeting, while others maintained that it was empowered to take legal action. Furthermore, the delegates themselves were not in full agreement as to the course they should pursue. Carlile favored an immediate proclamation of a new state. Other, more moderate, leaders such as Waitman T. Willey, Francis H. Pierpont and John J. Jackson, opposed hasty action, preferring to wait until the people of Virginia could vote upon the ordinance of secession. This moderate group prevailed. Should the people approve the secession ordinance, the counties of western Virginia and others were asked to send delegates to another convention to meet at Wheeling on June 11. In the interim, affairs were to be placed in the hands of a "Central Committee," headed by Carlile.

Accordingly, following the ratification of the secession ordinance, a second convention met at Wheeling on June 11. The Second Wheeling Convention was made up of delegates representing thirty-four counties. Fifteen West Virginia counties, embracing about one-third of the area of the state, sent no delegates. One of the most important actions of the Second Wheeling Convention was the adoption of a "Declaration of Rights" which branded the Virginia secession ordinance as illegal. This was, in effect, a declaration of independence by western Virginia from the Old Dominion.

A second major action of the convention was the passage of a resolution calling for the reorganization of the government of Virginia on the basis of loyalty to the Union. Upon the passage of this resolution Francis Pierpont was chosen governor and Waitman T. Willey and John S. Carlile were named to fill the two Senate seats vacated by Robert M. T. Hunter and James M. Mason, who had cast their lot with the Confederacy.

From August 6 to August 21, 1861, the Second Wheeling Convention met in adjourned session. It was at this time that the first steps were officially taken to create a new state in what is now West Virginia. Carlile favored a much smaller state than that which was eventually formed and would have included only those counties west of the Alleghenies. Other delegates, particularly Daniel D. T. Farnsworth, favored boundaries approximating those of present-day West Virginia. These differences were settled in a compromise which permitted the counties of the Eastern Panhandle, together with Greenbrier and Pocahontas, to decide for themselves whether they should join the new state. With this thorny problem temporarily settled, the convention on August 20, 1861, by a vote of 48 to 27, passed an ordinance to create the new state of "Kanawha" which would include thirty-nine western counties.

Now that the preliminary approval had been indicated by Virginia, a convention assembled at Wheeling on November 26, 1861, to draw up a constitution for the proposed new state. The first session, with a membership of fifty-three persons, lasted from November 26, 1861, to February 18, 1862. A recalled session with fifty-six members lasted from February 12 to February 20, 1863. Neither Webster nor Monroe counties was represented in either session. Other counties, such as Pendleton, Pocahontas, Greenbrier and Morgan were represented only in the recalled session. Still other counties, such as Calhoun, Clay, Fayette, Logan, McDowell, Mercer, Wyoming and Nicholas, had somewhat irregular representation because of the unfavorable military situation which then prevailed. The representatives to the constitutional convention were largely native West Virginians. Most of them were farmers or ministers by occupation. The Methodists were particularly well represented giving rise to the oft-repeated assertion that "the Methodists made West Virginia."

In taking up the question of a name for the new state the convention ultimately rejected the name "Kanawha" and chose "West Virginia" instead. This change in name was justified on the grounds that there was already a Kanawha County

and a Kanawha River and that further use of that name might make for confusion. The boundaries of the new state were to include the original thirty-nine counties named in the dismemberment ordinance, but provisions were now made to include as many as thirty-one more counties. This latter group to include the rich counties which lay along the Virginia and Tennessee Railroad, those countries lying along the main ridge of the Alleghenies, and those which would enable the state to control the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

The new constitution, as might have been expected, made most state offices elective. It provided for a governor who would serve a two-year term and be eligible to succeed himself. The legislature was to meet annually with sessions to last forty-five days. Suffrage was on the basis of white male population. A "Yankee" innovation was the creation of townships of which there were to be from three to ten to each county. Through these township meetings a system of free schools was to operate. One of the interesting features of the constitution lay in its failure to provide for the abolition of slavery. Instead slavery was indirectly recognized by providing for the taxation of all property at its true and actual value.

With the questions of a name for the new state, its boundaries, and its constitution out of the way, the next major step was to secure the official consent of Virginia for the formation of the new state of West Virginia from territory within her borders. At this time, however, Virginia had two governments. First, there was the government at Richmond which had given its support to the Confederacy. Secondly, there was the Reorganized Government at Wheeling under Francis H. Pierpont, which had given its loyalty to the Union. Since the sympathies of the proposed new state of West Virginia would favor the Union, it was but natural that the leaders of the West Virginia statehood movement should seek permission from the Pierpont government. On May 13, 1862, Pierpont called the Virginia General Assembly into session and on that day it gave its consent for the partition of the state and the formation of West Virginia.

Other obstacles still lay in the path of West Virginia statehood. The action of the Virginia Reorganized Government must yet be approved by the United States Congress and the President. In Congress, the West Virginia Statehood Bill was referred to the Senate Committee on Territories. Since John S. Carlile was now chairman of this committee, it might seem that there would be no serious difficulty for the bill. However, at this time Carlile engaged in actions which even yet are difficult to understand. After several delays, he amended the West Virginia Statehood Bill so that it would include fifteen additional counties, only three of which had been mentioned in the constitution for the proposed state. Furthermore, he added to the bill an enabling act which authorized the proposed state to call another constitutional convention. When this second constitution had been ratified by the people and approved by the Virginia Assembly, the statehood measure would then go directly to the President for his signature if, in the meantime, the new state had taken steps to abolish slavery.

At this time when the whole statehood movement seemed in jeopardy, Waitman T. Willey offered a compromise solution providing for gradual emancipation of slaves in West Virginia. The Willey Amendment, as his plan was known, provided that all slaves under twenty-one years old on July 4, 1863, would become free upon reaching the age of twenty-one. In addition, other Negro slaves were not to be brought into the state. After great debates in both houses of Congress, the Willey Amendment was adopted by a vote of 23 to 15 in the Senate and by a margin of 96 to 55 in the House of Representatives.

The question of West Virginia statehood now rested with the President, Abraham Lincoln. After careful reflection and consultations with his Cabinet, Lincoln signed the Bill whereby West Virginia was added to the Union as a new state. Lincoln's action was based on two major premises. First, he considered the Reorganized Government to be the legal government of Virginia and, therefore, capable of approving the formation of West Virginia. Secondly, his decision was based upon expediency in a belief that West Virginia could do more good in the Union than outside the Union.

Lincoln's approval was made upon the condition that the people of West Virginia accepted the Willey Amendment. The recalled session of the West Virginia Constitutional Convention met and, after hearing pleas by Senator Waitman

T. Willey, approved the Willey Amendment on February 17, 1863, by a vote of 54 to 0. On the following day the constitution as a whole was approved by a vote of 52 to 0. On March 26, 1863, the constitution, together with the Willey Amendment, was submitted to the people of West Virginia for ratification. In spite of efforts of Carlile and other opponents to prevent its ratification, the people of West Virginia by a vote of 27,749 to 572 gave overwhelming approval to the constitution.

On April 20, 1863, President Lincoln, believing that constitutional points had been settled, issued a proclamation stating that sixty days from that date West Virginia should enter the Union. Accordingly, on June 20, 1863, West Virginia took her place as the thirty-fifth state in the Union.

The Pierpont government now left Wheeling and established itself beyond the borders of West Virginia at Alexandria, Virginia, within the shadow of the national capitol. At Wheeling, a new government took office under the leadership of Arthur I. Boreman, the first governor of West Virginia.

Wheeling remained the Capitol until 1869 when it was moved to Charleston. It remained in Charleston until 1875 when it was moved back to Wheeling, where it stayed until 1885. It was then moved to Charleston where it has remained until the present time.

The part of Virginia west of the mountains had always been looked upon as a wilderness and as has already been noted little attention had been given to it. Thus, when she became a state she had little promise of the glorious destiny that was in store for her. Her assets were little known. The immense value of her timber forests; the almost inexhaustible deposit of her coal, oil and gas; her richness in iron ores and salt; the great fertility of her hills and valleys; her beautiful landscape and other resources were then unknown.

After the lapse of a few years conditions began to change for the better. The original constitution was altered and the liberties of the people were expanded, capital began to come in, and the state started to move forward.

The development of the state gained some impetus through an exhibit of its coal, iron, timber and other resources at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876. Soon after the state had thus shown to the world the vastness and variety of her resources—new mines were opened, new saw mills were built, gas and oil were discovered, wells were drilled and new people came in. In 1892, West Virginia exceeded all other states in building of railroads and the state was on her way.

Thus was launched the new state the "Mountain State" which last year, 1963, commemorated one hundred years of statehood and more than two hundred years of proud and honorable history.

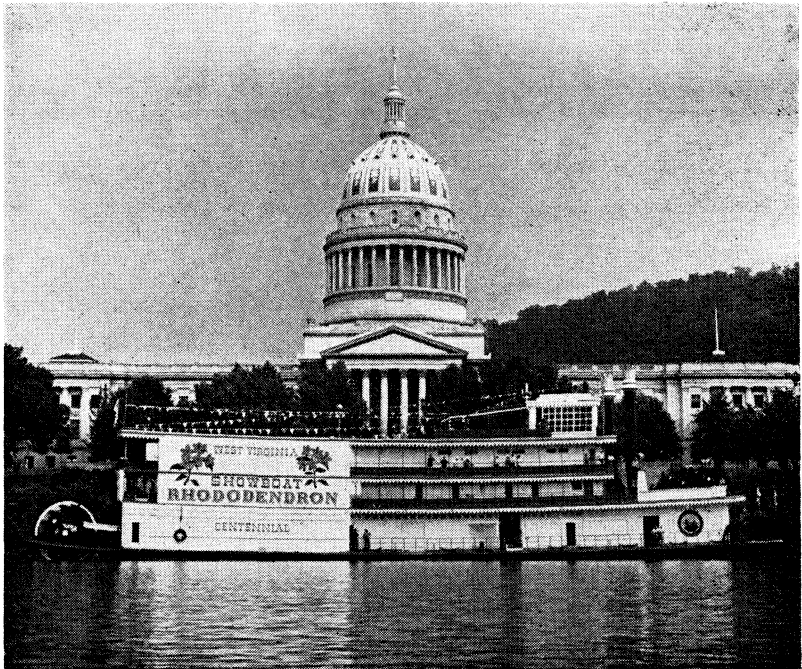

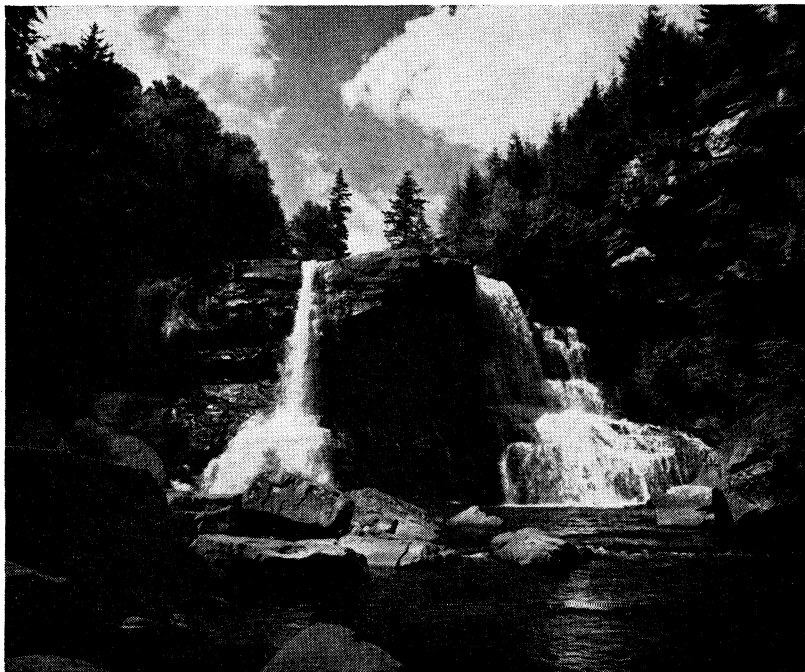

WEST VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE—1963-64

During late 1963 and midway into 1964, the Department of Commerce grew steadily in stature as the fountainhead of West Virginia's economic recovery effort. Forging a close-knit team of business, labor and local and federal governments, the department could point with great satisfaction to the role it had played in the best business year in the State's history and the third successive economic improvement.

While the department will not know the entire 1963 and 1964 travel picture until after West Virginia University's first comprehensive travel study is completed, a wide sampling indicates that travel jumped in 1964 between 7 and 9 per cent over the previous year. This ever-growing portion of our economy now supports between 25,000 and 27,000 tourist-serving jobs in the Mountain State.

If the same momentum is maintained which has been stimulated over the past three and one-half years, it can be predicted that the travel industry in West Virginia will support 50,000 jobs in the next 10 years.

It is impressive to note that more than \$48 million in tourist accommodations and facilities has been spent, planned or announced in 1963-64. This expenditure alone could account for as many as 4800 new jobs when the facilities are fully operative and promoted as tourist enticements.

Nearly one-half of this \$48 million in planned tourist facilities was announced by private capital, while the rest was in state and federal funds.

In addition to actual construction plans, communities and tourist enterprises in West Virginia spent upwards of \$100,000 for promotional literature and other materials to tell the world about their scenic, historic and recreational attractions. Many more have been planned.

Travel Development

West Virginia's steadily increasing number of visitors is by no means accidental. It has come about through a constantly expanding program of advertising and promotion by the State, communities, tourist enterprises, and most of all the press, radio and television within the State as well as outside our borders. During 1963-64 the Travel Development Division distributed 792,000 travel folders to information centers, companies and prospective tourists compared to 388,000 in 1962 and 172,000 in 1961. During 1964, more than one million folders will be mailed.

The department supplied literature to 79 of the nation's leading industries in 1964 to enable their travel information centers to serve their employees better in deciding on suitable touring and vacation sites.

Further growth of the tourist trade was forecast after completion of a survey on January 1, 1964 by the hotel and motel industry. It showed that the hotel and motel industry invested several million dollars and will invest additional millions in the year ahead. This survey showed 13 new motels opened for business, eight others enlarged, and construction either started or plans finalized for 13 more. The report showed 596 rooms or units completed during the fiscal year and now operational. The 13 new motels have a combined total of 501 rooms, while 95 rooms were added to eight establishments which began business sometime prior to the past year. Expansion of these facilities represented an investment by private enterprise of about \$3 million.

During the year, five of West Virginia's handicraft glass plants made improvements, or expanded to handle the tourist traffic, to make their facilities more pleasing for the visitor. The Morgantown Glassware Guild alone entertained more than 10,000 visitors during 1963, and indications were that 1964 would break all records.

At Oglebay Park near Wheeling new ski lifts were being erected, while throughout the State six private tent and trailer camping areas were opened. New resorts were either under construction or in the final planning stage in Hardy, Preston and Mercer counties. During the year, in addition to the Cass Scenic Railroad, a new scenic railroad opened at Skyland, Inc. on East River Mountain near Bluefield. This was constructed in conjunction with the first specially built native arts and crafts center.

At Rainelle, the first commercial game preserve of its kind was built to open to bow hunters on October 1, 1964, along with other facilities. During the year the State's first White Water Weekend held at Petersburg along 14 miles of the North Fork of the South Branch of the Potomac drew more than 7,000 visitors from 21 states, and 60 canoeists and kayak enthusiasts from seven states, who did the actual racing. The tremendous chain reaction of the West Virginia tourist picture is almost indescribable. People are spending more to promote and advertise and build facilities than ever before. Private enterprise is well on the way to matching the State and federal governments' enthusiasm for recreational development in West Virginia.

Planning And Research

In planning and research the department as a primary function administered the 701 Comprehensive Urban Planning Assistance Program. This was in cooperation with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, which grants up to three-fourths of the cost of community planning programs in redevelopment areas designated under the ARA Act, and up to two-thirds in all other areas.

Planning activities in the State under the 701 program have developed from four projects in 1959 totaling \$67,800 to 32 projects as of June 30, 1964, totaling \$804,532. During the past fiscal year the division cooperated actively with the Urban Planning Division of the State Road Commission in promoting regional comprehensive planning programs in three Standard Metropolitan Statistical areas in West Virginia. These included adjacent counties in Ohio and Kentucky. Under the 1962 amendment to the Federal Highway Act, the Bureau of Public Roads requires that continuous comprehensive planning programs be carried on in these Standard Metropolitan Statistical areas starting not later than July 1, 1965, if these areas are to continue to receive federal road building funds.

During the year the Division of Planning and Research cooperated with the Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation in developing an inventory of all actual and potential recreational facilities in the State, preparatory to the development of a comprehensive plan for the State. This would be in compliance with Chapter 131, Section 3, Acts of the Legislature, 1961. A prospectus for state planning for West Virginia has been prepared by the West Virginia Center for Appalachian Studies and Development, in cooperation with the Division of Planning and Research. These will form the basis for an application for funds from the Housing and Home Finance Agency to initiate the State comprehensive planning program.

Activity in area redevelopment throughout the State has been expedited by the department in cooperation with local development organizations and other state and federal agencies. By June 30, 1963, 51 State counties had been designated as redevelopment areas under criteria of the ARA. With departmental advice all 51 of these counties prepared and submitted overall economic development programs, all of which have been approved by the department and the ARA. Due to improved economic conditions, by June 30, 1964, three of these counties were ruled no longer eligible. These counties were Grant, Tyler and Wetzel. By virtue of improved economic conditions the counties of Wood, Wirt,

Preston and Ritchie have been advised by ARA that they will be held ineligible after November 30, 1964.

Since the inception of ARA on May 1, 1961, and through June 30, 1964, 92 projects have been approved for West Virginia amounting to \$36,836,230 in federal loans and grants. An additional 24 projects totaling \$16,123,517 await approval.

Another service provided by the Planning and Research Division has been the assignment of a public works coordinator to advise and assist communities applying for funds under the accelerated Public Works Act of 1962. A total of 215 projects amounting to \$37,568,396 in federal funds had been approved for cities, towns, counties and public service districts by June 30, 1964. An additional 111 projects totaling \$24,532,333 were pending as of June 30, 1964. The favorable impact of these projects upon the economy of West Virginia has been widespread.

Industrial Development

From an industrial development point of view, a special effort was made during the past year to establish a closer working relationship with many State communities, with all 55 counties and with manufacturing establishments located within these areas. The state was divided into two geographical regions, and each was assigned to an area development specialist. Special attention was devoted to identifying suitable industrial plant sites and obtaining current data pertaining to available buildings and prevailing economic conditions.

Many meetings were held with civic leaders in practically every county and the purposes were three-fold: (1) to impress upon community leaders their responsibility in bringing about economic betterment; (2) the appropriate steps to be followed in seeking industrial development; and (3) endeavoring to have communities prepare themselves for industrial development. This help included assistance in preparing and filing applications for state and federal monies.

Close working relationship is continuing with the area industrial development departments of electric power, natural gas, railroads, telephone companies and chambers of commerce. Universities and colleges were called upon, and the Department of Commerce gladly lent its advice and counsel to all industrial development and economic study groups within the state.

The Industrial Development Division continued a program of calling on out-of-state industrialists and presenting to them the economic advantages of West Virginia locations. Arrangements were made for out-of-state industrialists to visit and inspect many of the communities and their plant sites throughout West Virginia. In most instances the department maintains the position of liaison between the community and the out-of-state industrialist. It is known that only a limited portion of these prospects would be of lasting value to local and state economy, and for that reason a great deal of time is spent in screening prospects for the purpose of protecting the best interests of all concerned.

The results of these efforts have been manifested in many ways. Without question, considerable impetus has been added to the further diversification of the industries of West Virginia with resultant strengthening of the economy. Unemployment continues to drop, and the backlog of industrial prospects continues to grow.

Despite loss of jobs due to mechanization, automation and plant obsolescence, both manufacturing and overall employment continues to show a healthy net gain.

From present discernible factors, there is reason to believe that the State will continue to make progress in increasing employment and building a stronger economy. Some of the special services offered by the department to attract industry and travel include assistance to communities in establishing nonprofit development corporations to expand industrial and travel development programs; analysis of plant and resort requirements for potential investors and recommendation of specific locations best suited to the industry or resort de-

veloper. Where justified, detailed information is supplied industries, setting forth community statistics, plant site information, taxes, financing and other pertinent facts of interest.

The department pays special attention to wood utilization industries; provides financing counsel and, through the West Virginia Industrial Development Authority, offers financial assistance to local industrial and tourist development groups.

In an effort to stimulate export trade and visits to West Virginia, one representative of the industrial division headed a World Trade Mission in the spring of 1964, generating great interest among European industrialists and travel agencies in West Virginia's tourist and industrial potential.

A special effort is made to assist small, new, and existing businesses in obtaining federal and private financial aid.

In 1963-64 arts and crafts were accelerated through an established program designed to develop markets for goods produced in West Virginia, and to gain recognition of the talents of State artists and craftsmen. As a result, several new markets were established and the program continues to gain momentum both in statewide interest and participation.

On April 22, 1964, the West Virginia Pavilion opened at the New York World's Fair. The pavilion was dedicated a week later on April 29 (just one year to the day after ground-breaking) and on Statehood Day, June 20, appropriate recognition was given by the World's Fair authorities in commemoration of West Virginia's 101st birthday anniversary.

Native arts and crafts, including handmade glass, were featured at the West Virginia Pavilion at the New York World's Fair. In addition, the second Mountain State Art and Craft Fair was held at Cedar Lakes near Ripley, West Virginia, and 1964 attendance increased 40 per cent over that of 1963.

The fair operated through October, 1964, and will reopen on April 1, 1965. The pavilion focuses international attention on West Virginia's natural resources and space age accomplishments. Featured at the pavilion are the state's vacation and travel attractions, handcrafted glass, coal mining, wood products, native works of art and crafts, the Radio Astronomy Sky, educational and industrial exhibits.

Big Sandy River

Formed by the junction of Tug Fork and Levisa Fork at Louisa, Kentucky. Mouth, junction with Ohio at Kenova, Wayne County, West Virginia.

Cheat River

Formed by the junction of Black Fork and Shavers Fork at Parsons, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Monongahela River at Point Marion, Pennsylvania.

Coal River

Source in central part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at St. Albans, Kanawha County.

Elk River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at Charleston, Kanawha County.

Gauley River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Greenbrier River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River just above Hinton in Summers County.

Guyandotte River

Source in southern part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Huntington, Cabell County.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers just above Kanawha Falls in Fayette County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Point Pleasant, Mason County.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Parkersburg.

Monongahela River

Formed by the junction of Tygart and West Fork Rivers at Fairmont. Joins the Allegheny River at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to form the Ohio River.

New River

Source in southern part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois.

Potomac River

Formed by the junction of the North and South branches near Green Spring, Hampshire County. Mouth, Chesapeake Bay.

North Branch Potomac River

Source of Fairfax Stone which today marks western limits of Maryland and corners of Grant and Tucker Counties. Mouth, junction with South Branch to form Potomac River.

South Branch Potomac River

Source near Hightown, Highland County, Virginia. Mouth, junction with North Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County.

Tug Fork

Source in southwestern part of McDowell County. Mouth, junction with Levisa Fork to form Big Sandy River at Louisa, Kentucky.

Tygart River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with West Fork River at Fairmont to form Monongahela River.

West Fork River

Source in western part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Tygart River at Fairmont to form Monogahela River.

INLAND WATERWAYS—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by the Department of the Army)

Ohio River—Improvement of the Ohio River for navigation, as authorized by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of 25 June 1910, provides for a minimum channel depth of 9 feet in the entire 981 miles of the river by the construction of locks and dams and open channel work. The original system completed in 1929, and major modifications completed in 1937, resulted in 46 lock and dam structures including the Gallipolis Locks and Dam near Apple Grove.

The Ohio River modernization and replacement program now under way will reduce the total navigation projects to 19, providing larger locks and deeper pools. New projects adjoining West Virginia include the pool of Greenup Locks and Dam, completed in June 1964 between Kentucky, West Virginia and Ohio, a proposed third lock for the Gallipolis project, the Racine Locks and Dam under construction near Letart, the Belleville Locks and Dam under construction at Belleville, the Willow Island Locks and Dam now being planned at Willow Island, the Hannibal Locks and Dam nearing construction at New Martinsville, the Pike Island Locks and Dam under construction at Wheeling, and the New Cumberland Locks and Dam completed in September 1963 near New Cumberland.

Monongahela River, West Virginia and Pennsylvania—The existing project provides for improvement of the river by 11 locks and dams to afford slackwater navigation for its entire length from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to one mile from Fairmont, West Virginia, a distance of 128.7 miles. The controlling depth between Pittsburgh and Lock and Dam 14 at Opekiska, West Virginia, 115.3 miles above the mouth, is 9 feet, and above Lock 14, 7 feet to the upper limits of the project.

Modernization of the Monongahela River navigation structures in the upper reaches of the waterway in West Virginia is approximately complete. Morgantown and Hildebrand Locks and Dams and modification of Dam 8 have been completed; and Opekiska Lock and Dam, which will replace existing Locks and Dams 14 and 15 and extend the 9-foot controlling depth to the head of the river, is under construction.

Modernization of the Monongahela River navigation structures in the upper reaches of the waterway is currently in progress. Hildebrand Lock and Dam and modification of Dam 8 have been completed. Those navigation structures now under construction are: Opekiska Lock and Dam, which will replace existing Locks and Dams 14 and 15 and Maxwell Locks and Dam, which, when integrated with reconstruction of Dam 4, will replace Locks and Dams 5 and 6.

Kanawha River, West Virginia—Three high-lift dams on the Kanawha River and the Gallipolis Dam on the Ohio River provide a minimum channel depth of 9 feet on the Kanawha River for 91 miles from the mouth to Deep Water. Each Kanawha River dam has twin locks, and the Kanawha Valley Power Company has a hydroelectric plant at each site. The two upstream dams, London and Marmet, were completed in 1934, Winfield Dam in 1937, and Gallipolis Dam in the Ohio River in 1937 as part of the Kanawha River improvement.

Sutton Reservoir—The Sutton Reservoir, located on the Elk River near Sutton, was authorized by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1938. Sealing of mine workings at the site was begun in 1949, but work on the dam was not started until 1956.

Construction of the project was completed in January 1961. The dam is of concrete, 210 feet high and 1,178 feet long. The reservoir has a total capacity of 265,300 acre-feet and controls a drainage area of 537 square miles. A minimum pool 5.9 miles in length, with a surface area of 270 acres and a capacity of 4,100 acre-feet, is maintained during the winter. A seasonal pool with a maximum length of 14.5 miles, surface area of 1,520 acres and storage of 60,100 acre-feet, is maintained for low-flow augmentation and recreation. The remaining reservoir capacity is utilized for flood control storage.

Tygart River Dam—The Tygart River Dam, located on the Tygart River 2.25 miles upstream of Grafton, West Virginia, was authorized by the Public Works Administration January 11, 1934 and approved by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of August 30, 1935. The concrete gravity dam is 1,921 feet in length at the top and rises 207 feet above the river bed at the uncontrolled center spillway section, which is flanked by abutment sections 23 feet higher. The structure provides for the gross controlled storage of 289,600 acre-feet of water and is operated as a unit in the reservoir system for the protection of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and the upper Ohio River Valley, generally. In addition to flood control, the reservoir provides for low water discharge regulation annually, by the gradual release of stored spring flood waters during the summer-fall period to assure a river flow of 340 cubic feet per second at Lock and Dam 8, Monongahela River. The storage of 100,000 acre-feet of water is allotted for this purpose.

FLOOD CONTROL RESERVOIRS—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by the Department of the Army)

Bluestone Reservoir—The Bluestone Reservoir, located on the New River near Hinton, was authorized by Presidential executive order in 1935 and approved by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1936. Construction of the project was begun early in 1942, suspended in 1944 because of the war emergency, resumed in 1946, and completed in June 1952. The dam, of concrete construction, is 165 feet high and 2,048 feet long. The reservoir has a capacity of 631,000 acre-feet to serve a drainage area of 4,565 square miles. During periods of low and normal flows in New River, the elevation of the reservoir varies about 3 feet, with a minimum pool 9.5 miles in length and 1,800 acres in area that utilizes about 30,900 acre-feet of the total reservoir capacity. The remaining reservoir capacity will be reserved for impoundment of flood flows as required for flood control.

DRIVER IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

(Point System)

WEST Virginia's Driver Improvement Program, as administered by the Department of Motor Vehicles, is designed to eliminate the chronically careless driver from the state's highway system.

Under the program, "points" are assigned to those convicted of various moving traffic violations. Conviction notices are forwarded to the Department of Motor Vehicles, which maintains each individual's driving record and statistics.

An operator receiving a total of 6 points is sent a warning letter by the Department, outlining the need for more careful driving. Individuals reaching the 9 to 12 point level are required to appear before a Department Reviewing Officer, at which time the most serious cases are subject to suspension of their operator's privileges.

SPEED LIMITS

The speed limit for automobiles on open country highways in West Virginia is 55 miles per hour; on suburban streets, 25 miles per hour; and on city streets 20 miles per hour.

An operator of a motor vehicle must be at least 16 years of age. The fee for a learner's permit is \$4.00, and the fee for an operator's license is \$5.00. An operator's license expires four years from the date of issuance and may be renewed for successive periods of four years upon the payment of a fee of \$5.00 for each such renewal.

These forms must be returned to the Division of Parks and Recreation, properly filled in, together with check or money order for the full amount of the rental, plus tax, before applications can be processed.

Applications are listed strictly in order of their receipt, regardless of identities of the applicants—in other words, cabins are rented upon a "first come, first served" basis. No applications are accepted until January 15, and no out-of-state applications are processed until February 15.

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FISHING: Six lakes, and a number of streams within state forests or state park boundaries, or in the vicinity, offer fishing for trout, bass and panfish. The lakes in Watoga, Tomlinson Run and Cacapon state parks and in Seneca state forest are open throughout the summer for fishing. Year-round fishing is permitted in Bluestone and Tygart Reservoirs, adjoining Bluestone and Tygart Lake state parks respectively. The trout streams in Babcock and Holly River State parks are as outlined in the current "West Virginia Fishing Regulations." Fishing in Cedar Creek and North Bend State Parks and Kumbrabow, Cabwaylingo, and Cooper's Rock state forests is subject to the statewide open seasons and regulations for the species found in the streams on these areas.

Monongahela National Forest was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on April 28, 1920, under the Weeks Law. This law of 1911 provides for the cooperation by states with the United States, and the protection of watersheds of navigable streams. In West Virginia, the national forest was established for flood protection in the Ohio and Potomac River valleys. It is one of a system of about 150 national forests and the only national forest wholly in West Virginia. The Clark-McNary Act of June 7, 1924, broadened the objectives to provide for re-forestation and production of timber. The Multiple Use Act of June 12, 1960, provides that National Forests shall be managed for outdoor recreation, range, timber, watershed, hunting and fishing.

The public forest is dedicated to the protection, development, and management of all its resources for the greatest good to the greatest number.

Within the proclaimed boundary there are 1,641,981 acres of which 805,668 acres are owned by the United States. Directly in charge of the national forest is the Forest Supervisor. In the national forest are six ranger districts, each in charge of a district ranger.

The public forest is administered in cooperation with several conservation agencies, including the West Virginia Department of Natural Resources. Twenty-five per cent of receipts from the sale of timber and other products and use fees is returned to the nine national forest counties for schools (80%) and roads (20%).

At Parsons is one of the largest forest tree nurseries east of the Mississippi River. It is used by the West Virginia Department of Natural Resources.

OIL AND GAS DEVELOPMENTS IN WEST VIRGINIA IN 1963

ABSTRACT

The total number of wells drilled in West Virginia in 1963, reported to February 15, 1964, was 1,419 (42 completions—T.D. but production not reported), a decrease (1,557 in 1962) of 138, or 8.9%. Permits to drill or deepen issued by the Oil and Gas Division of the West Virginia Department of Mines totaled 1,427 (1,649 in 1962), a decrease of 222, or 13.4%. Apparent discrepancies in total completions (42) are caused by having completion total depths but no report as to production as mentioned below.

136 permits to drill were cancelled during the year, mostly permits issued previous to 1963.

Abandoned during the year were 69 gas wells and 50 oil wells, or a total of 119 wells. No information on the exact number of abandonments of wells drilled since May, 1929, is available, as these wells are abandoned under original drilling permit numbers. Wells completed were: 782 gas; 93 oil; oil and gas wells, 242; storage, water-injection, brine, rock salt, water, and pressure wells, 94; dry holes, 166; total, 1,387 (432 unreported as to production). Compared with 1962, gas wells decreased 88, or 10.1%; oil wells decreased 8, or 0.8%; oil and gas wells decreased 87, or 26.4%; storage and other wells increased 36, or 44.8%; dry holes decreased 33, or 16.6%, the percentage of dry holes to total completions being 11.7%. Depth of wells ranged from 60 to 14,594 ft., compared with 246 to 17,111 feet in 1962. Total footage drilled was 3,754,915 ft.; an increase of 350,749½ ft., or 10.3% over 1962 (3,404,165½ ft.). The average depth of wells (2,646 ft.) increased 462 ft. over the 1962 average (2,184) or 21.1%. The total initial daily open flow of the gas wells was 1,493,863 a decrease of 125,219 MCF or 7.69% under the 1962 total (1,629,082) MCF. The size of gas wells ranged from 8 to 39,200 MCF compared with 2 to 25,500 MCF in 1962. The total daily initial oil was 12,836 bbls., a decrease of 2,329½ bbls. under 1962 (15,165½ bbls.) or 15.26%. The size of the oil wells ranged from ½ to 800 bbls.; compared with ½ to 410 bbls. in 1962. The number of wells drilling or unreported, if completed at the end of the year, was 464, 112 less than in 1962 (576), or a decrease of 18.4%.

Since we receive drilling and scout reports weekly and monthly, from several major companies, and copies of all records filed with the Oil and Gas Division of the State Department of Mines, the status of practically every drilling well was known. Many reports showed depths of well, stating they were being tested after fracture. Their depths are included in total footage drilled, but tables will be short whatever their production was. If they were reported as gas or oil wells, they have been reported as such wells. No letters were sent these operators since we have had little success in getting replies in time to include in the annual report. The Oil and Gas Division is making an effort to have the operators report their completions in a reasonable time. Some operators do not file records promptly, claiming they are "not completed." The Department of Mines may have to refuse further permits to these operators until previous completions are reported. The total initial gas and oil production after fracture is generally several times the production before fracture. Approximately 90% of the wells were fractured during the year. Some almost fantastic results were reported, one gas well fracturing from an 8 MCF show to more than 39,000,000 cu. ft. The West Virginia University collects information concerning fracturing of wells and issues an annual report showing details for each of the wells fractured. Many of the wells would have been abandoned as dry holes except for fracturing.

The average size of gas wells was 1,665 MCF compared with 1,569 MCF in 1962, an increase of 86 MCF, or 5.5%. In calculating this average the number of gas wells (782) was increased by half of the number of oil and gas wells (121) or 903 wells. The average size of the oil wells was 60 bbls., compared with 57.2 bbls. in 1962, an increase of 2.8 bbls., or 5%. Half the oil and gas wells (121) were added to the 93 oil wells (or a total of 214) in calculating this average.

Preliminary estimates of production for 1963: gas 260,000,000 MCF, compared with 253,400,000 MCF in 1962, an increase of 6,600,000 MCF, or 2.6%; oil, 3,350,000 bbls. a decrease of 126,000 bbls. under the 1962 estimate (3,470,000 bbls.) or 3.46%. Possibly 40,000,000 MCF went to storage. Gas is stored in West Virginia from four other states. The estimated number of producing wells at the end of 1963; gas 19,111; oil, 13,044; and the table of operations gives statistics by counties.

The table of Oil and Gas Operations in West Virginia by Counties in 1963 gives the pertinent facts regarding results. There was no activity in the 12 counties not listed.

Comparison totals for the preceding 4 years are also shown in the bottom 4 lines of the table.

Permits to drill or deepen issued by the Oil and Gas Division of the State Department of Mines totaled 1,427, or 222 less than in 1962 (1,649), a decrease of 13.4%. There were 136 cancellations of drilling permits during the year. By counties they were: Barbour 4, Boone 1, Braxton 5, Calhoun 2, Clay 6, Doddridge 29, Fayette 1, Gilmer 8, Harrison 2, Kanawha 1, Lewis 24, Logan 1, Marshall 4, Pleasants 4, Ritchie 21, Roane 1, Tyler 3, Upshur 15, Wayne 1, Wetzel 2, Wyoming 1.

Abandonments of gas wells during the year (wells drilled before May, 1929) totaled 69, compared with 83 in 1962.

Abandonments of oil wells during the years (wells drilled before May, 1929) totaled 50, compared with 147 in 1962.

88 less gas wells, 8 less oil wells, 87 less oil and gas wells, 26 more storage *et al.* wells, and 33 less dry holes were completed in 1963 than in 1962.

In 1963, the percentages were: gas wells, 56.79%; oil wells 6.75%; oil and gas wells, 17.57%; storage *et al.* wells 6.83%; and dry holes 12.06%, based on results of 1,377 wells completed for which production was reported. Total completions were 1,419, with production of 42 known completions not reported.

If the storage *et al.* wells are kept out of the total completions (1,377 minus 94=1,283 wells) the percentages would be: gas wells 60.95%; oil wells 7.25%; oil and gas wells, 18.86%; and dry holes 12.94%.

Total completions were 1,377 (+42 unreported as to production), as against 1,557 in 1962, a decrease of 138, or 8.9%. Lewis County, with 189 completions topped the list of completions by counties, followed by Ritchie, Doddridge, Gilmer, Kanawha, Upshur, and Roane. These seven counties accounted for 864 completions, or 60.89% of the total completions.

69 gas wells (those drilled before May, 1929) were abandoned during the year, whereas 50 oil wells were abandoned in 1963. No information of exact number of abandonment of wells drilled since May, 1929, is possible, as these wells are abandoned under the original drilling permit numbers. Of the wells uncompleted or unreported at the end of the year, 214, or 46%+ were from five counties, Doddridge, Lewis, Ritchie, Calhoun, and Gilmer.

Drilling depths ranged from 60 to 14,594 ft., as against 246 to 17,111 ft. in 1962. The total footage drilled (3,754,915 feet) increased 350,749½ ft. over the 1962 total (3,404,165½ ft.), or 10.3%. The total footage drilled does not include any footage for wells tabulated as drilling. The actual footage drilled would be slightly less than given if the original depth of wells deepened were known and subtracted from the total given. For comparative purposes, footage for deeper drilling would be nearly the same from year to year. The average depth (2,646 ft.) is 462 ft. more than in 1962 (2,184 ft.) or 21.1%.

The total initial daily open flow of gas wells was 1,493,863 MCF, a decrease of 125,219 MCF, or 7.69% under the 1962 total (1,629,082 MCF).

The range in size of the gas wells was 8 to 39,200,000 MCF, compared with 2 to 25,500 MCF in 1962.

The average size of the gas wells was 1,665 MCF, compared with 1,569 MCF in 1962, an increase of 96 MCF, or 6.1%.

The total daily initial oil was 12,836 bbls., a decrease of 2,329½ bbls. under 1962 (15,165¼ bbls.), or 15.26%.

The range in size of the oil wells was ½ to 800 bbls. daily, compared with ¼ to 410 bbls. in 1962.

The average size of the oil wells was 60 bbls. compared with 57.2 bbls. in 1962, an increase of 2.8 bbls., or 5%.

In calculating the average size of the wells, half of the total number of oil and gas wells (½ of 242) or 121, (5th column in the table) was added to the total gas wells and total oil wells, as given in the 3d and 4th columns of the table.

At the end of the year, 464 wells were drilling or unreported if completed. This was 112 less than in 1962 (576), a decrease of 19.3%.

Six Counties, Lewis, Ritchie, Gilmer, Upshur, Doddridge, and Kanawha, had a daily open flow of 954,135 MCF, or 63.87% of the total for the state.

Six Counties, Lewis, Doddridge, Ritchie, Wirt, Roane, and Gilmer, had daily initial oil of 11,943½ bbls., or 89.54% of the total for the state.

Preliminary estimates of production for 1963: gas 260,000,000 MCF; compared with 253,400,000 MCF in 1962, an increase of 6,600,000 MCF or 2.6%; oil, 3,350,000 bbls., a decrease of 120,000 bbls., under the 1962 estimate (3,470,000 bbls.) or 3.46%. Possibly 40,000,000 MCF went to storage. Gas is stored in West Virginia from four other states.

Oil production was curtailed somewhat by proration, lack of pipe lines, storage, and refineries. 563 companies or individuals were granted drilling permits during the year.

The estimated number of producing wells at the end of 1963, gas 19,111; oil, 13,044. The number might be reduced somewhat if the number of wells abandoned under drilling permit numbers (drilled since May, 1929) were known.

Several wells drilling are to be storage wells, in Marshall, Putnam, Roane, Tucker, and Upshur Counties.

33 wells were drilled to the Oriskany sand or deeper in 1963, with 16 still drilling, one now near 11,000 ft.

A few Devonian shale gas wells were drilled in the southwestern part of the state.

Approximately 90% of the new wells and several old ones were fractured with generally favorable results, and with several remarkable results. How they will hold up is the question. The decline will probably be rapid but they will probably drain a large area. Studies are now being made by the West Virginia University on declines in production after fracturing.

Secondary recovery operations for oil are continuing in the state.

Several Benson sand gas wells were completed in 1963, in Barbour, Lewis, and Upshur Counties, and one reported in Braxton County.

Three wells in Upshur County reported making oil in the Benson sand.

Several major companies are taking an active interest in West Virginia.

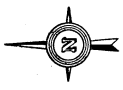
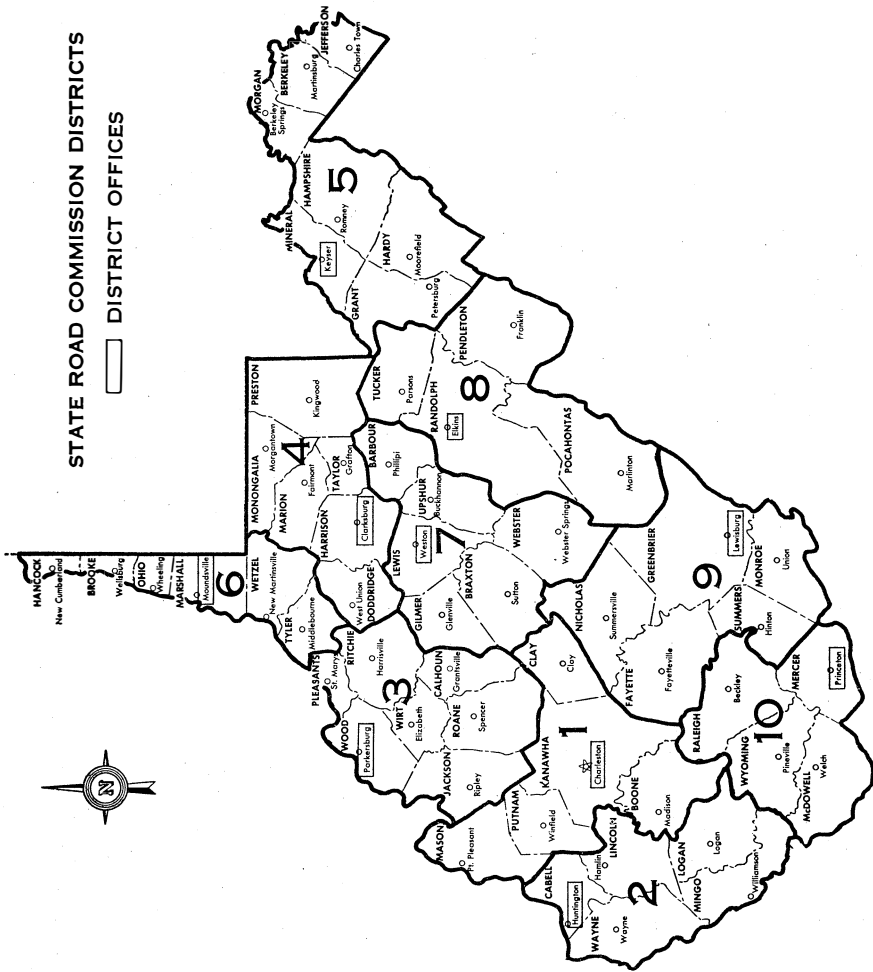

Section 1—Summary

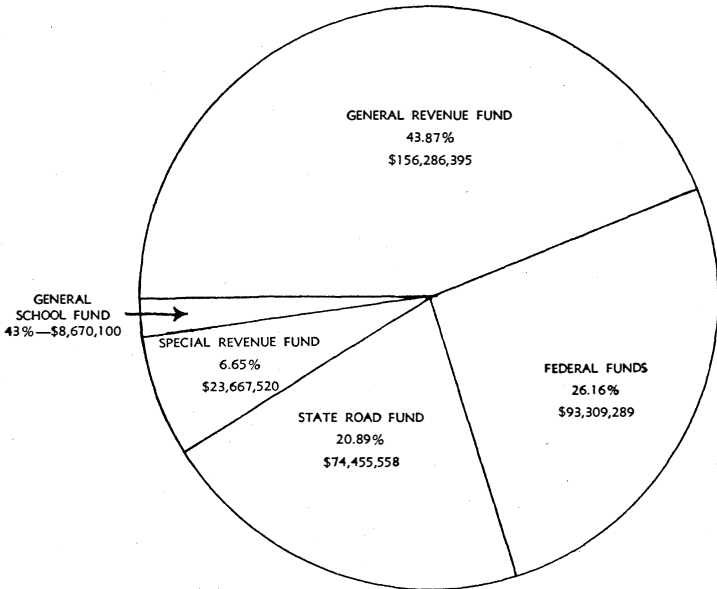
Revenues collected for the operation of state government are deposited into various funds as provided by statute and the constitution. Many of these funds are dedicated for specific purposes and are carried in separate accounts and expended only for the purposes authorized by law. These include the General School Fund, State Road Fund, Federal Funds, and various other designated as Special Revenue Funds. Approximately 55 per cent of all revenues collected during the 1963-64 fiscal year are within this group of dedicated funds. All revenues not dedicated for specific purposes are deposited into the General Revenue Fund from which the Legislature makes appropriations for the operation of the various departments, schools and institutions.

Total revenues collected for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964, amount to 356.4 million dollars as compared to 329.3 million for the previous fiscal year, an increase of some 27.1 million dollars. This is summarized as follows:

THE STATE DOLLAR—WHERE IT CAME FROM 1963-64—\$356,388,862



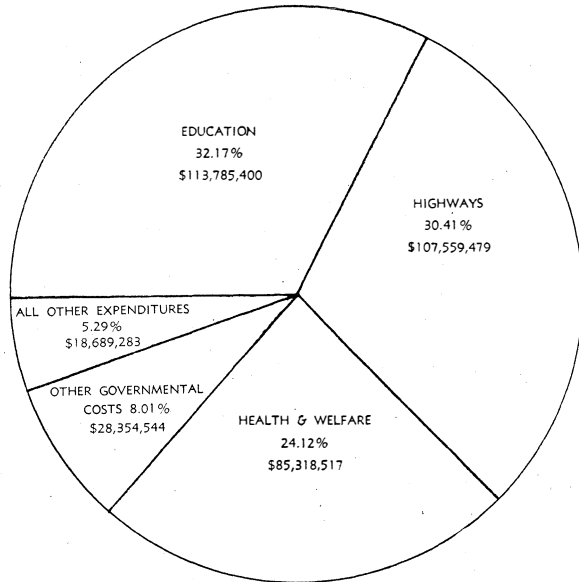

COLLECTION OF BUSINESS AND OCCUPATION TAX AND PRIVILEGE TAX ON CERTAIN CARRIER CORPORATIONS (TRANSPORTATION PRIVILEGE TAX)

The Business and Occupation Tax, Chapter 11, Article 13, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied for the privilege of engaging in business in West Virginia. The tax is measured by the application of rates against values of products, gross proceeds of sales, or gross income according to the classification of the business activity in which the taxpayer is engaged. Despite the commonly applied erroneous name, "Gross Sales Tax", it is not a sales tax. Neither is it a transaction tax in the sense that once it is paid on a particular article or service or activity it need not again be paid. It is not, strictly speaking, an income tax, although in most instances, the gross income is the *measure* of the tax. Under the production and manufacturing classifications the measure of the tax is the *value* of the article produced or manufactured as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof, provided the proceeds of sale are indicative of the true value of the article. If more than one person engages in a single activity or transaction, as in the case of the contractor and sub-contractor, each must pay a tax measured by his entire income regardless of the tax paid by the other.

The Privilege Tax on Certain Carrier Corporations, commonly and hereafter referred to as the Transportation Privilege Tax, Chapter 11, Article 12A, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax for the privilege of engaging in business in West Virginia levied on railroad corporations, steamboats, steamships or other floating property, motor vehicle carriers, railroad car corporations, telephone and telegraph corporations and airline corporations.

With the exception of railroad corporations, the tax is measured by the application of rates against *gross* income from all business beginning and ending within the State of West Virginia, and in addition by the application of rates to a percentage of total *net* income, such percentage being determined as provided by Section 5 of the law. The tax on railroad corporations is measured by the application of rates to the value of the total property, tangible and intangible, in this State as determined by the Board of Public Works for the purposes of the general property tax, and in addition by the application of rates to a percentage of total net income.

Activities subject to the Transportation Privilege Tax are not subject to Business and Occupation Tax.

The revenue collected by virtue of these two tax laws is deposited to the credit of the general revenue fund of the State and constitute the largest single source of the State's general revenue raised by so called "indirect" taxation.

The business classifications under the Business and Occupation Tax Law are as follows:

A. Production of Coal and Other Natural Resource Products. The tax is measured by the value of the articles mined or produced as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the producer, the rates being applied against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

B. Manufacturing, Compounding or Preparing for Sale. The tax is measured by the value of the articles manufactured, compounded or prepared for sale in West Virginia, as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the manufacturer or person compounding or preparing the same. The rate, 40

cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of the sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

C. (1) Business of Selling Tangible Property at Retail. There is levied a tax of 50 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

(2) Business of Selling Tangible Property at Wholesale. There is levied a tax of 25 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

D. Public Service or Utility Business. The tax rates set forth hereinbelow are levied on the gross income of the following businesses:

Electric Light and Power Companies (sales) and demand charges, domestic purposes and commercial lighting	\$5.20 per \$100.00
Water Companies	\$4.00 per \$100.00
Electric Light and Power Companies (all other sales and demand charges):	\$3.90 per \$100.00
Natural Gas Companies: Toll Bridges	\$3.90 per \$100.00
Other Public Utilities—(Except telegraph and telephone companies, railways and other transportation companies)	\$2.60 per \$100.00

E. Contracting. There is levied a tax of \$2.60 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

G. Amusement. There is levied a tax of 65 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

H. Service Business or Calling Not Otherwise Specifically Taxed. There is levied a tax of \$1.05 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

I. Business of Furnishing Property for Hire. There is levied a tax of \$1.05 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

J. Small Loan and Industrial Loan. There is levied a tax of \$1.05 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

An annual exemption of \$50.00 is provided under the Business and Occupation Tax Law for each person, as defined by the statute, engaged in business in the state.

The business classifications under the Transportation Privilege Tax Law are as follows:

A. Motor Vehicle Carriers, Railroad Car Corporations, Express Corporations or Companies. \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of gross intrastate income, and \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

B. (1) Telephone Corporations. \$2.75 on each \$100.00 of gross intrastate income and \$2.75 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

(2) Telegraph Corporations. \$5.00 on each \$100.00 of gross intrastate income and \$5.00 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

C. Pipe Line Corporations. \$1.50 on each \$100.00 of gross intrastate income (effective July 1, 1953—prior to that date \$3.50) and \$3.50 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

D. Airline Corporations and Operation of Steamboat or Other Watercraft. \$3.00 on each \$100.00 of gross intrastate income and \$3.00 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

E. Railroad Corporations. 50 cents on each \$100.00 of assessed value of all property within the State of West Virginia, and \$4.00 on each \$100.00 of pro-rated (to determine part derived from West Virginia business) net income from all business.

To the normal rates imposed by Article 12-A there is added, in all cases, a surtax of 30 per cent of the normal tax.

An annual exemption of \$50.00 and an additional credit of five per cent of the tax due after the deduction of said exemption is provided under the Transportation Privilege Tax Law for persons engaged in business in the state.

Authorized agents of municipalities having a Gross Sales Tax Ordinance are permitted to inspect and make copies of returns filed with the State Tax Commissioner upon the written request of the Mayors of such municipalities.

PERSONAL INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Personal Income Tax Act (W. Va. Code, ch. 11, art. 21) was enacted by the 1961 regular session of the legislature on February 10, 1961, and signed by the Governor on February 14, 1961. The provisions of the Act applied to all taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1961, including that part which elapsed prior to the effective date of the Act. The Act was applied to taxable years beginning prior to and ending in the year 1961, but the tax imposed for any such year was on a prorated basis.

Description of Tax: The West Virginia Income Tax Act imposes a personal income tax on the taxable income of all resident individuals, and resident estates and trusts, irrespective of where such income is earned. Nonresident individuals, estates and trusts are taxed only upon income derived from West Virginia sources. Corporations and partnerships are not subject to the West Virginia income tax. A trust or other unincorporated organization which by reason of its activities is exempt from federal income tax is also exempt from West Virginia income tax.

The nature of the Act was to adopt for West Virginia personal income tax the provisions of the federal income tax laws relating to the determination of income. As adopted, it can be stated that the West Virginia Income Tax Act is a conformity statute. The same general concepts of income, gain, loss and deduction are employed in the West Virginia Act as are employed in the federal income tax law. The method used to make reference to the federal law is general in scope. With the exception of several rather technical modifications, West Virginia adjusted gross income is federal adjusted gross income. Amendments made to the federal income tax law which affect income, gain, loss and deduction are reflected in the West Virginia income tax law by periodic legislative enactments. The conformity with the federal income tax law was adopted to simplify preparation of state income tax returns, to improve enforcement of the state income tax through better use of information obtained from federal income tax audits, and to aid interpretation of the state tax law through increased use of federal judicial and administrative determinations and precedents.

Deductions. An individual, resident or nonresident, may use the West Virginia standard deduction on his state return, regardless of whether he used the standard deduction or claimed itemized deductions on his federal return. The West Virginia standard deduction of an individual is ten (10) percent of his West Virginia adjusted gross income or \$1,000, whichever is less. A resident or nonresident individual may elect to use itemized deductions in computing his West Virginia taxable income only if he claimed itemized deductions for the same year on his

federal return. Itemized deductions for residents are the same as federal deductions, with the exception of two modifications; nonresidents' deductions must be attributed to or connected with West Virginia sources.

Personal Exemptions. An individual, resident or nonresident, is allowed an exemption of \$600.00 for each exemption to which he is entitled for the taxable year for federal income tax purposes. A husband and wife who file joint federal but separate West Virginia returns may each claim only the exemptions to which he or she would have been entitled if separate federal returns had been filed. The exemption for an estate or trust is \$600.00.

Rate of Tax. For all taxable years or portions thereof ending prior to January 1, 1963, the West Virginia income tax rate was six (6) per centum of the federal income tax which would have been imposed on an identical amount of federal taxable income. For taxable years or portions thereof beginning on or after January 1, 1963, the West Virginia income tax rate, which is equally applicable to individuals, estates and trusts, is a graduated rate which begins at 1.2% of West Virginia taxable income. The maximum rate is 5.5% of the West Virginia taxable income. The West Virginia Income Tax Act provides only two rate schedules; one for joint returns and surviving spouses, and one for individuals and heads of household.

Credits Against Tax. The West Virginia Income Tax Act provides credits against the personal income tax for: (1) business and occupation tax imposed against the taxpayer; (2) transportation privilege tax imposed against the taxpayer; (3) West Virginia income tax withheld from the individual's wages or salary; (4) estimated income tax payments made by the individual; (5) income taxes paid by residents to other states; and (6) income taxes paid by nonresidents to their state of residence. No federal credits are allowed against the West Virginia income tax.

WEST VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF WELFARE FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

The Food Stamp Program in West Virginia is in operation in Logan, Mingo, McDowell and Wayne Counties as part of a federal pilot project to assure needy families in economically depressed areas of nutritional diets. It is a joint undertaking of the United States Department of Agriculture and West Virginia's Department of Welfare. Low-income families who are not on welfare, as well as those who receive public assistance, are eligible to participate. They purchase food stamp coupons in accordance to their monthly income and the number of persons in their household, and are provided free a sufficient amount of bonus coupons to insure the household of nutritional meals. For example, a three member household with a net monthly income of \$80.00 to \$89.99 buys \$34.00 worth of stamps and receives another \$26.00 worth free.

The program contributes to a family's pride and self-respect with its provision for participation according to income. It increases the purchasing power of low-income families at the same time that it enables them to choose and buy beneficial food items. The food stamps, redeemable at retail stores designated by the United States Department of Agriculture, have meant significant boosts for the local economy. Retail and wholesale food merchants of course benefit, but so do other business establishments because of more ready cash in the hands of many families for other necessities.

Administrative costs largely borne by the state are higher, but the Food Stamp Program is considered superior to that involving the direct distribution of federal surplus food commodities for a number of reasons. It is geared to a more adequate diet, and help in the light of need. Under the direct commodity distribution arrangement, everyone receives the same comparatively limited number of food items, regardless of relative need. Also, increased returns to the state in consumers sales and gross sales taxes on accelerated business activity attributed to the free food stamps tend to balance the administrative outlay.
