ARCH A. MOORE, JR.
Governor of West Virginia

ARCH A. MOORE, JR. (Republican) of Glen Dale, Marshall County, West Virginia; the State's 30th Governor, and previously the 28th Governor. First Governor in the State's modern history to be re-elected to a four-year term (1972), and the first Governor of West Virginia to be elected to three four-year terms. First elected to public office in 1952 as a member of the West Virginia House of Delegates. Entered United States Congress after being elected to the House of Representatives in 1956. Progressively increased margin of victory over majority party opponents in subsequent elections in 1958, 1960, 1962, 1964, and 1966. Sought his party's nomination for Governor in 1968; won nomination with an overwhelming primary election victory, and won the general election by a narrow margin in a year when his party's candidate for President failed to carry the State. The Governor, whose party trails in registration by more than two to one, has been the State's most electable minority party candidate in modern history. Governor Moore has been a prominent leader among the nation's governors. In 1971, became the first and only West Virginia Governor to be elected National Chairman of the nation's governors. Served in 1976 as National Chairman of the Republican Governor's Association; served as President of the Council of State Governments in 1972-1973; served as Chairman of the Appalachian Governors of the Appalachian Regional Commission in 1971; became President of the Education Commission of the United States and served from 1974-1976 in that capacity. Internationally, has represented the United States on every major continent of the world. In 1974, was one of the first Governors to be invited to the Peoples Republic of China by its government. Further represented the United States as the Special Representative of the President and formally opened the Bicentennial Exposition of the "World of Franklin and Jefferson" in 1976 in Warsaw, Poland. Has served on the Republican National Committee since 1963 and is its senior member in terms of years of service. Elected as a delegate to his party's National Convention in 1964, 1976, 1980 and 1984. Veteran of World War II, served in the United States Infantry; has been decorated with the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Combat Infantryman's Badge, and the European Campaign Ribbon with Three Battle Stars. Married on August 11, 1949 to Shelley Riley; three children—Arch A. Moore III; Shelley Wellons Moore Capito; and Lucy St. Clair Moore Durbin; and six grandchildren. Born in Glen Dale on April 16, 1923; educated in public schools of Marshall County; graduate of West Virginia University in 1948 with an A.B. degree in Political Science; graduate of the West Virginia University College of Law in 1951 with a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree. Holds eleven honorary doctorates in Laws, and Public Administration from various colleges and universities.

GOVERNOR**ARCH A. MOORE, JR.****Ground Floor, Main Unit, Capitol**

Salary: \$72,000 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 1, Constitution of 1863.)

The Governor is vested with the chief executive powers of the State, recommends to the Legislature, by message at the commencement of each session thereof, the passage of such measures as he deems expedient; appoints, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, certain officers of the State Government, who may be removed by him for cause; may remit fines and penalties, grant reprieves, commute sentences and pardon and parole after conviction; is Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State and, as such, may call out the National Guard to enforce laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

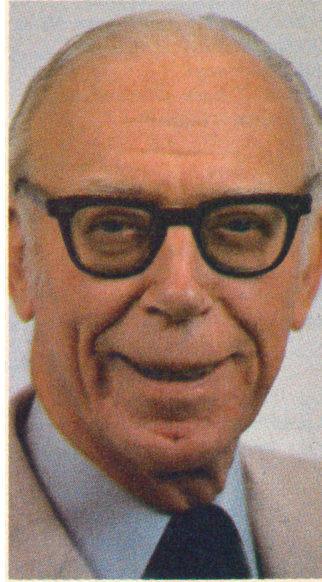
Salary: \$43,200. Elected for a term of four years. (Office created by Article V, Section 7, Constitution of 1863.)

Chief election official of the State, chief of voter registration. Ex officio member of the State Elections Commission. Oversees elections throughout the state. Registrar of corporations, both profit and nonprofit, issuing certificates of incorporation for the creation of all domestic corporations and certificates of authority to foreign corporations to transact business in West Virginia. Keeper of the executive journal, an official record of State Government, maintaining records of all the actions of the Governor. Member and ex officio secretary of the Board of Public Works, maintaining records of all actions of the Board of Public Works. Member and ex officio secretary of the State Armory Board. Ex officio member of West Virginia Housing Development Fund. Ex officio secretary and executive officer of the State Building Commission. Provides and maintains records of Emergency Interim Legislative Succession. Publishes the *State Register of Administrative Regulations*. Official administrator of the Uniform Commercial Code, which protects individuals and companies through the "Uniform Trust Receipts Act." Chairman of the Commission on Charitable Organizations which operates under the "Solicitation of Charitable Funds Act". Authorizes and issues licenses to private detectives, investigators and security agencies. Processes all applications of notaries public and commissioners for West Virginia. Keeper of the Great and Less Seals of the State, being the only official authorized to attach these seals to official papers. Maintains affidavits of circulation and qualifications of all newspapers in the State of West Virginia who wish to register to accept "legal advertisements" which are required by law or court to be made. The officer designated to implement the conflicts of interest statutes for public officers, agents, servants, and employees. The officer designated to implement the "Uniform Facsimile Signatures of Public Officials Act." Maintains a record and file of all enrolled bills originated and passed in the Legislature. Provides certified copies of all bills passed by the Legislature.

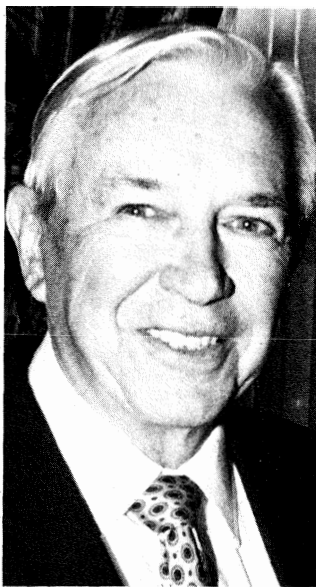

Salary of Commissioner: \$36,500 per year. Appointed by the Governor by and with consent of the Senate to serve at the will and pleasure of the Governor.

The Department of Corrections, formerly a major division within the Department of Public Institutions, was established in 1977. The commissioner of the department oversees and directs the state's correctional system. That system consists of five adult facilities: The West Virginia Penitentiary at Moundsville, the Huttonsville Correctional Center at Huttonsville, and Work Release Units at Charleston, Beckley and Huntington; one youthful offender center: The Anthony Center at Neola, and, two juvenile institutions: The West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth at Salem and the Davis Center at Davis. The commissioner is also responsible for the supervision of parolees assigned to the department's custody or accepted through the Interstate Compact. Generally, the state correctional system is responsible for approximately 1,450 incarcerated adults, 110 youthful offenders, 100 juvenile offenders and 2,200 persons under probation and parole supervision. Female adult inmates are housed at the Federal Correctional Institution at Alderson.

The West Virginia Board of Education consists of eleven members, of whom one shall be the state superintendent of schools, ex-officio, and one shall be

the chancellor of the board of regents, ex-officio, neither entitled to vote, the other nine must be citizens of the State; appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate for overlapping terms of nine years. No more than five of the appointed members may belong to the same political party. No person shall be eligible for appointment to membership who is a member of any political party executive committee or holds any other public office or public employment under the federal government or under the government of the State or any of the political subdivisions. No member of the board may be removed from office except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty or gross immorality and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the Governor of State elective officers. At least six meetings shall be held each year upon its own resolution or at the call of the president. Appointed members receive \$100 per day per meeting and are reimbursed for actual expenses incident to the performances of their duties. The secretary who is appointed by the board keeps a record of its proceedings and performs such other duties as the board may prescribe.

Subject to and in conformity with the constitution and laws of West Virginia, the Board of Education determines the educational policies of the elementary and secondary schools, selects the State Superintendent of Free Schools, and makes rules for carrying into effect laws and policies of the State relating to education. The State Board has general control, supervision and management of the business and educational affairs of the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind.

Acting as the State Board of Vocational Education, the State Board of Education administers and controls the state plans for vocational rehabilitation.

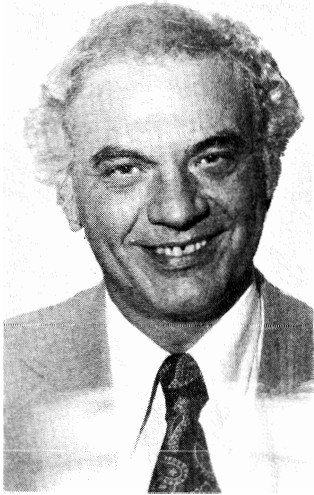

By ratification of an amendment to the Constitution of West Virginia in the General Election on November 4, 1958, the office of State Superintendent of Free Schools was changed from an elective position to an appointive by the West Virginia Board of Education. The West Virginia Board of Education shall, in the manner prescribed by law, select the State Superintendent of Free Schools who shall serve at its will and pleasure. He shall be the chief school officer of the State and shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as prescribed by law. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall be a member of the Board of Public Works as prescribed by Subsection B, Section 51, Article 6 of the Constitution. In accordance with the newly adopted constitutional amendment, the West Virginia Board of Education appointed the State Superintendent of Free Schools on December 10, 1958.

Institute

EARL W. WOLFE, Director and Executive Officer

The State Board of Vocational Education, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation was established by the 1945 Legislature, Chapter 18, Art. 10A (Code). As such it is authorized and directed to cooperate with the federal government to provide rehabilitation to disabled persons. The board appoints the director of the division, who recommends necessary personnel and establishes appropriate administrative units with the approval of the board. The director makes regulations, submits an annual report to the board, requisitions the disbursement of all rehabilitation funds, and takes such other action as necessary to provide rehabilitation services.

The director, under the direction of the board, operates the agency under state plans approved by the Rehabilitation Services Administration and the Social Security Administration. The director is authorized by law to receive gifts and determine eligibility for service.

The board is also authorized to establish and operate rehabilitation centers and workshops and to promulgate rules and regulations for operation of such facilities in the state by public or voluntary agencies, to certify workshops as eligible to sell products to the state, and to receive federal vocational rehabilitation aid.

The wide variety of services provided by vocational rehabilitation can be grouped under four broad headings: (1) medical, (2) psychological, (3) social and (4) vocational.

Established in 1969, the 13-member West Virginia Board of Regents is the central administrative and planning agency for all state colleges and universities. Almost all of the day-to-day decision making activities for public higher education are delegated to the state colleges and universities under policies established by the Board. The main functions of the Board are to set the budgets for each public institution of higher education, appoint institutional presidents, supervise construction projects, advise the Governor and the Legislature on higher education, review and evaluate instructional programs and hear employee and student appeals that cannot be resolved at the campus level.

Nine members of the Board are gubernatorial appointees, appointed with the advice and consent of the State Senate for six-year terms. The State Superintendent of Schools is an ex officio and nonvoting member.

The Board receives comments and suggestions from the approximate 3,000 public higher education faculty members through the elected chair of the Advisory Council of Faculty, from the nearly 7,000 public higher education classified employees through the elected chair of the Advisory Council of Classified Employees, and from the more than 70,000 students enrolled in state colleges and universities through the elected chair of the Advisory Council of Students. Along with the gubernatorially appointed citizen members and the state superintendent, the chairpersons of the statutorily-created councils serve as ex officio and voting members of the Board. By law, no more than five of the citizen members may belong to the same political party and at least two citizen members must be appointed from each state congressional district.

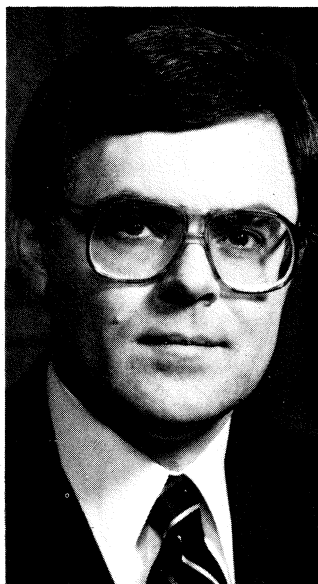
The Board holds at least ten meetings a year with each meeting spanning several days. Members receive \$100 per diem while engaged in the work of the Board, plus actual expenses. A President, who may serve no more than two terms, and any other officers deemed necessary, are elected annually at the June meeting of the Board. To carry out its directives, the Board employs a Chancellor and such professional and clerical personnel as are necessary, and prescribes their duties and compensation. (Code 18-26)

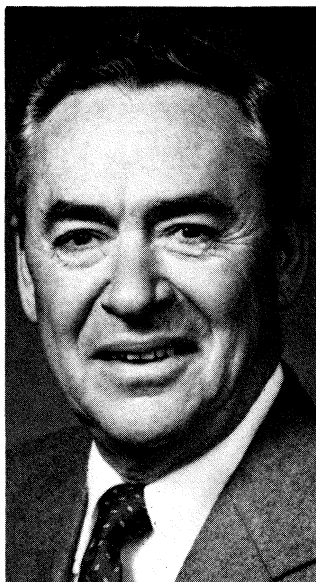

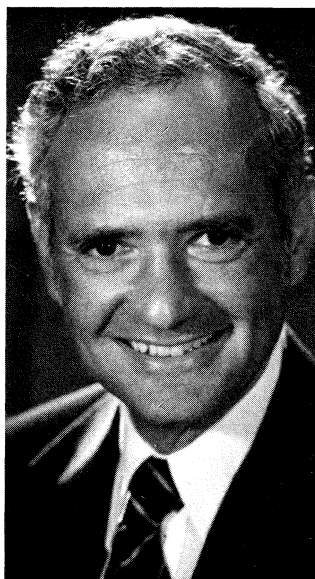




CHANCELLOR

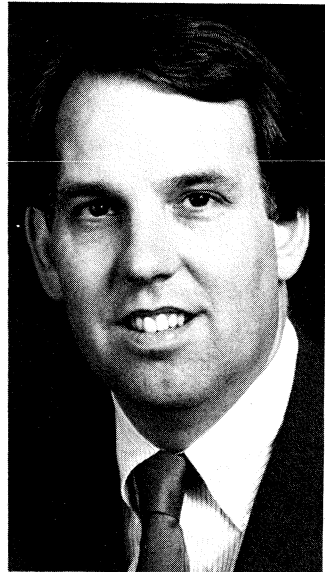

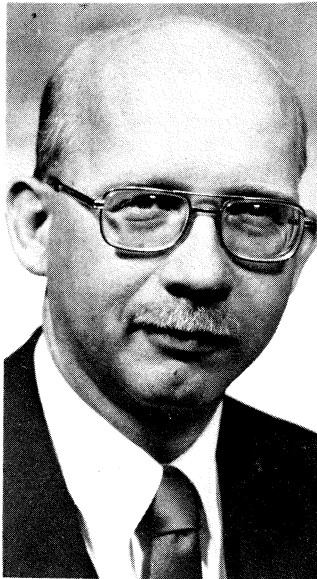

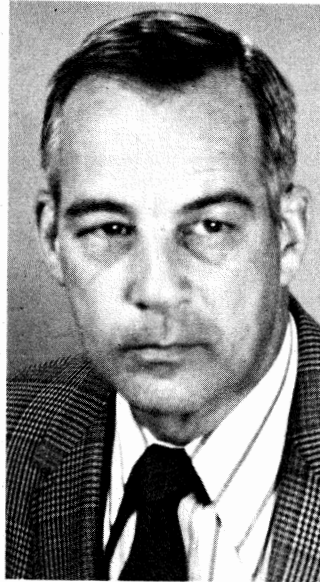

Salary of Commissioner: \$47,500 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Term: Four years, runs concurrently with Governor's term of office.

Members of the Advisory Board to the West Virginia Department of Highways receive \$25 per day for days actually in session; compensation not to exceed \$300 per year. Advisory Board composed of seven members, appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of Senate. Bipartisan. Term: Seven years.

The West Virginia Department of Highways has jurisdiction over planning, engineering, right-of-way acquisition, construction, reconstruction, traffic regulation, and maintenance of 32,999 miles of designated state roads, including the administration of highway funds. The Department of Highways is also responsible for 696 miles of Delta Roads, but can perform only routine maintenance on these sections of roadway. The Highway Department is also responsible for 155 miles of Park and Forest Roads and can perform routine and special maintenance on these roads. This makes a grand total of 33,850 miles that are the maintenance responsibility of the Department of Highways. Interstate and other Federal-Aid Highways included within the State Highway System are planned and constructed in participation with the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration. Other responsibilities include highway research, outdoor advertising contiguous to state roads, roadside development, safety, weight enforcement and dissemination of highway information.

WILLIAM S. RITCHIE, JR., born in Ravenswood; earned B.S. Civil Engineering degree from West Virginia University in 1951; Vice President and General Superintendent of Boso and Ritchie in 1969; served as Commissioner of Department of Highways 1969-1976; joined Hobet Mining & Construction Company, Inc., in 1977; named Senior Vice President, Operations, Ashland Coal in 1979; married to former Connie Lou Rector; four children and four grandchildren; member, West Virginia Turnpike Commission and Past President of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials; appointed as Commissioner of Highways again on February 18, 1985, by Governor Moore.

The office of the Insurance Commissioner was first established by the Legislature in 1887, with the State Auditor named as ex officio Commissioner. The office was maintained as one of the functions of the State Auditor's Office until 1947 when the Legislature by special act established the office of Insurance Commissioner as a separate department of the State government, the commissioner to be appointed by the Governor with the consent and approval of the Senate. It is the duty of the Insurance Commissioner to police the business of insurance and all those persons engaged in it in the manner prescribed by law.

The Department of Labor, created by the Legislature in 1889 to protect and promote the safety and prosperity of the citizens of West Virginia, provides services through three divisions. The Wage and Hour Division enforces the state minimum wage law and wage payment and collection law; issues the fair minimum wage rates for each county for public construction of highways, buildings and other heavy construction; enforces limitations on use of detection of deception devices; approves issuance of age certificates and work permits to minors by school authorities; investigates and approves the licensing of private employment agencies. The Weights and Measures Division tests and approves all measuring and weighing devices used in commerce; enforces laws pertaining to fair and accurate packaging and labeling of products; enforces business sale laws and laws regulating upholstered furniture and bedding; serves as state designee for the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission; and operates a Measurement Laboratory/Calibration Station. Safety and Boiler Division offers safety and health consultation services to employers in order to promote employee safety and health; tests and certifies all steam boilers annually; enforces the hazardous chemicals "right-to-know" law; and provides safety training. The Department also conducts an annual occupational injury and illness survey in coordination with the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics; maintains a labor reference library; and oversees the West Virginia Labor-Management Council to promote harmony between labor, management, and state government. The Commissioner will act as a mediator or arbitrator upon the request of both labor and management.

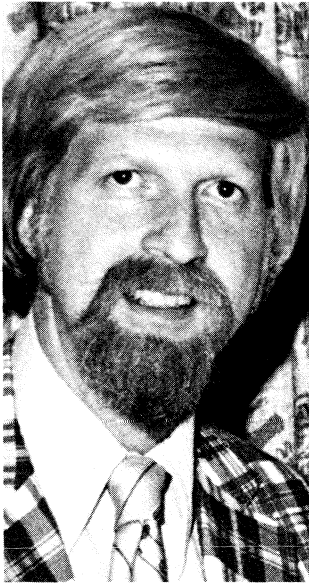

Created in 1929, the West Virginia Library Commission is nonpartisan and is composed of five members, two of whom must be women; appointed by the Governor, with consent of the Senate; length of term, four years, any vacancy filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. Members serve without compensation but are reimbursed for travel expenses. The Commission appoints the Executive Secretary who serves at the will and pleasure of the Commission. The Commission is authorized to give counsel and advice to state-institutional, free and public libraries, as to best means of establishment and administration; to send any of its members or staff to aid in organizing such libraries or assist in the improvement of those already established; to purchase library materials and distribute them as needed to places in the State without adequate public library service; and to establish, maintain and operate regional libraries. It is authorized to collect, publish and distribute statistics and other data concerning libraries of any sort located within the State. The Commission is authorized to promulgate rules and regulations governing library services in the State.

The Executive Secretary is the Chief Administrative Officer of the System and is responsible to a Board of Trustees.

Salary of Superintendent: \$42,500 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with advice and consent of the Senate. Term: Four years, runs concurrently with Governor's term of office.

Retirement Board: Consists of the Attorney General, the State Treasurer, the Superintendent, and two members in active service of the department, elected by vote of members, who serve without compensation.

The Department of Public Safety is a state police department with state-wide general police powers, created in 1919. The West Virginia Department of

Public Safety shall have the mission of statewide enforcement of criminal and traffic laws with emphasis on providing basic enforcement and citizen protection from criminal depredation throughout the state and maintaining the safety of the state's public streets, roads and highways. With a fleet of two-way-radio equipped vehicles, the state police handle a large share of the investigation of major crime and apprehension of dangerous criminals and take primary responsibility for patrolling the highways, enforcing the traffic laws and preventing motor vehicle accidents, besides many miscellaneous services in the public interest, including duty at the scene of emergencies, riots or disaster.

The Retirement Board has power to make, revise and terminate awards from the Department Death, Disability and Retirement Fund to retired or disabled members, or to beneficiaries of deceased members.

The State Tax Department is charged with the responsibility for the enforcement of the statutes relating to certain state taxes and the collection thereof, including the business and occupation, corporate net income, carrier income, consumers sales and use, personal income, inheritance and transfer, forfeiture, gasoline, cigarette, soft drinks and business franchise taxes. The tax commissioner is charged with the responsibility of preparing for the Board of Public Works tentative assessments for all public utilities operating within the State; he enforces statutes relating to the assessment and collection of all state, county and municipal property appraisal and property evaluation programs. The tax commissioner is an ex officio member and chairman of the Municipal Bond Commission and of the West Virginia Economic Development Authority. As ex officio Chief Inspector of Public Offices, he is responsible for the supervision, inspection and auditing of the accounts and records of public officials as designated by specific statutes.

MICHAEL E. CARYL, of Martinsburg, Berkeley County, was appointed commissioner of the State Tax Department by Governor Moore on February 13, 1985, and took office February 25, 1985. Native of Romney; attended West Virginia University where he graduated with high honors with a bachelor of science degree in business administration. Following graduation in 1968, enlisted in the U.S. Army and served with the White House Communications Agency in Washington, D.C. Upon completing military service in 1971, entered Yale Law School, graduating in May 1974. Former partner in the law firm of Loy, Shingleton and Caryl in Martinsburg where he specialized in tax law. In Martinsburg, was a member of the Martinsburg Rotary Club and the Board of Directors of the Eastern Panhandle Training Center. Former member, Board of Directors, West Virginia Tax Institute; chairman of the West Virginia State Bar Committee on State and Federal Taxation, and has practiced before the United States Tax Court. STATE BOARDS and COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, Article 1 of the Code of West Virginia, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year. Each board is also given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers are authorized to administer oaths.

Each applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of \$20, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge \$5 for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof. All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board, and each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues. An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked has the right to appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Unless otherwise specified, members of boards are allowed \$35 per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January, and the secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

Created under Chapter 128, Acts of the Legislature, 1959; non-partisan; composed of six members, at least three to be certified public accountants, all to have been in practice in West Virginia for at least five years; appointed by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate; term, three years; members eligible for reappointment; board elects own officers; self-sustaining; members receive \$25 per diem while in session, and actual expenses; duties, to regulate the practice of public accounting, provide for the certification and registration of persons engaged in accounting and the issuance of certificates and registration cards to such persons. Smith as the official state agency to implement Public Law 89-73, the Older Americans Act of 1965; consists of fifteen members, five of whom shall be: superintendent of schools, director of health, commissioner of Human Services, director of the division of vocational rehabilitation and the commissioner of employment security; ten to be appointed by the Governor with consent of the Senate, for terms of four years following initial appointments; commission shall elect chairman and vice chairman; serve without compensation but receive actual expenses; commission employs a director who serves as staff officer for the agency and is responsible for the implementation of the aging programs in the state under the direction of the Commission. He administers programs for the aging with federal funds received through the Older Americans Act and administers state funds through appropriations designated by the State Legislature for the elderly in West Virginia. He supervises the staff of the Commission on Aging and provides technical assistance to staff of area agencies on aging and county aging projects. He is responsible for coordinating public awareness of senior issues through speeches and contacts with the media. He collaborates and coordinates services for senior citizens with other state agencies and serves on various boards and commissions where expertise on aging issues and problems is needed. He works closely with the Governor and the Legislature to improve programs for senior citizens. He oversees the coordination of a West Virginia Silver Haired Legislature annually, and the coordination of a statewide Senior Citizens' Conference which is attended by over a thousand seniors from West Virginia each year.

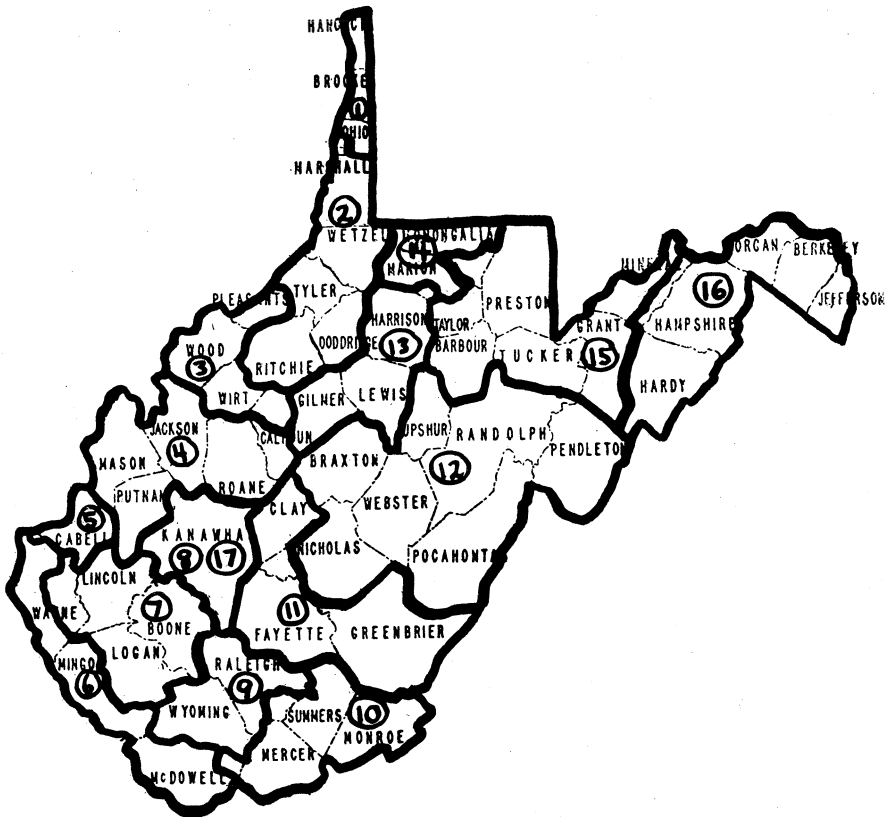

LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

ENCIL BAILEY, Auditor

Created by an Act of the Legislature in the Session of 1953, for the purpose of providing more expeditious management and efficient study of the financial problems which confront each session of the Legislature, and to provide a more economical control by the Legislature over the revenues and expenditures of the State.

The Legislative Auditor is appointed by the Joint Committee on Government and Finance, and serves at its will and pleasure. His duty shall be to compile fiscal information for the use of the Senate and House of Delegates, to make a continuous audit and analysis of the revenues and expenditures of the State, and to make post audits of the spending units of the state government, at least once every two years, if practicable.

He shall be solely responsible to the Legislature, and shall prepare an appropriate budget for each spending unit, for each annum for which appropriations are sought and shall submit his report to the Committee at least thirty days prior to any Legislative Session with appropriate recommendations, together with such other findings and reports as are deemed necessary. His compensation is fixed by the Joint Committee on Government and Finance, and he shall receive in addition, necessary traveling expenses incident to the performance of his duties. The Legislative Auditor may also appoint and employ such assistants which may be necessary in the discharge of his duties and the salaries of such employees shall be fixed by the Committee.

COURT OF CLAIMS

Room 4, Main Unit, Capitol

Created by an Act of the Legislature in 1967. Consists of three judges appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each appointment is made from a list of three qualified nominees furnished by the Board of Governors of the West Virginia State Bar. Bi-partisan; Term, Six years; Per Diem, \$140.00 for each day actually served, not to exceed one hundred days in any fiscal year (excluding crime reparations time), plus actual expenses.

The Court of Claims hears claims against the state for money damages arising out of contracts and torts. Awards made are subject to final approval by the Legislature. Upon request, it issues advisory opinions to state agencies. It also investigates and hears claims, made by victims of criminally injurious conduct, for awards from a crime victims reparations fund created by the Legislature in 1981 and funded by \$3.00 additional court costs being imposed upon every person pleading guilty or found guilty of a felony or misdemeanor other than a non-moving traffic offense.

CHIEF JUSTICES, SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

RICHARD NEELY, of Fairmont, was born August 2, 1941, the son of John C. and Elinore Neely of Marion County and the grandson of Matthew Mansfield Neely, West Virginia's twenty-fifth governor. Educated at Dartmouth College, where he read economics and received his bachelor of arts degree in 1964, and Yale Law School, where he received his bachelor of laws degree in 1967. Served from 1967 to 1969 as a captain of artillery in the U.S. Army, and in 1968 and 1969 in the Republic of Vietnam as Staff Economist in charge of economic development for the Third Corps Tactical Zone, which comprised one quarter of South Vietnam. Author of the economic development section of the 1969 Pacification Plan for the entire Republic of Vietnam, and was awarded the Bronze Star and Vietnam Honor Medal, First Class. Opened his own law practice in Fairmont in 1969. Elected in 1970 to the West Virginia House of Delegates as a Democrat from Marion County. Elected in 1972 to a full twelve-year term as Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia and served as Chief Justice, 1980. Chairman of the Board of Directors of Kane and Keyser Hardware Co., Inc., of Belington; general partner in two rural housing developments. Member, Local 425, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. Appointed Frederic William Atherton Lecturer, Harvard University, 1982-83. Professor of economics at the University of Charleston. Author of *How Courts Govern America*, Yale University Press (London and New Haven, 1981); *Why Courts Don't Work*, McGraw Hill (New York, 1983), and *The Divorce Decision*, McGraw Hill (New York, 1984). Married to the former Carolyn Elmore of Princeton, West Virginia; one son, John Champ Neely II.

THOMAS B. MILLER was elected to a twelve-year term on the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and took office on January 1, 1977. In 1982, he served as Chief Justice of the court. In 1979, the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals was designated as the Outstanding Appellate Court in America by the American Trial Lawyers Association. In 1980, he received a Certificate of Merit from the National Juvenile Law Center, Inc., for work in the field of juvenile law. Prior to his election to the Supreme Court, Justice Miller was a partner in the law firm of Schrader, Miller, Stamp & Recht in Wheeling, where he practiced law for twenty years. As a practicing attorney, he specialized in trial work. He served as a member of the Unlawful Practice Committee of the West Virginia State Bar and also served as a member of the West Virginia Board of Law Examiners. He graduated from West Virginia University College of Law in 1956 and was a member of the West Virginia Law Review. Justice Miller received his college degree from the University of Virginia in 1950 and was a member of the NROTC at the university. Upon graduation, he received his commission as an ensign in the United States Navy and was assigned to the U.S.S. Leyte Gulf, an aircraft carrier, which served in the Seventh Fleet off Korea during the Korean War. He was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant (JG) in 1953. He is married to the former Vaughn Nolte of Wheeling and they have four children.

JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

DARRELL VIVIAN McGRAW, JR., was born November 8, 1936, in Wyoming County; the son of Darrell V. and Julia Roselle ZeKany McGraw; educated in the public schools, the U.S. Army and West Virginia University, A.B., M.A., LL.B. and J.D.; member of the Democratic Party, United Methodist Church and Veterans of Foreign Wars. Elected to Supreme Court of Appeals in 1976.

THOMAS E. McHUGH was elected to the Supreme Court of Appeals in 1980 and assumed his duties January 1, 1981. Chosen by the West Virginia Supreme Court to serve as Chief Justice January 1 through December 31, 1984. He was born in Charleston, March 26, 1936. Justice McHugh is a graduate of West Virginia University, A.B. Political Science, 1958 and served as 1st Lt. U.S. Army 1958-61, Infantry and Adjutant General Corps. Received law degree from West Virginia University College of Law, 1964; member of Order of Coif, legal honorary. In law school was associate editor of the West Virginia Law Review. He served as law clerk to Judge Harlan Calhoun, West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, 1966-68. President, West Virginia Judicial Association, 1981-82. He was elected Judge of the Circuit Court of Kanawha County in 1974 and reelected in 1976; chosen by other judges in Circuit Court to serve as chief judge 1974-80. Wife, Judith; four children, Karen, Cindy, James and John.

W. T. BROTHERTON, JR., of Charleston, Kanawha County. Elected to West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals in 1984 for a twelve-year term. Elected to the House of Delegates in 1952, 1954, 1956, 1958, 1960 and 1962. Elected to the Senate in 1964, 1968, 1972 and 1976. Chairman of the House Committee on the Judiciary at the 1958 Session and both House Majority Leader and Chairman of House Judiciary Committee 1960 through 1964. Chairman of Senate Judiciary Committee 1968 through 1970. Senate Majority Leader and Chairman of Senate Judiciary Committee 1970 through 1972. Elected President of the West Virginia Senate in 1972 and served in that capacity through 1980. Total legislative service of 28 years. Co-chairman of Legislative Commission on Special Investigations from the date of its creation until 1980, when he left legislative service. Former Assistant, Kanawha County Prosecuting Attorney's office. He was born in Kanawha County on April 17, 1926. Justice Brotherton is a graduate of Washington & Lee University (AB) (LLB). Married June 17, 1950, to Ann J. Caskey. Three children — Elizabeth A., William T., III, and Laura J. Episcopalian. Mason. Member, Kappa Alpha; Phi Alpha Delta. U.S. Navy, World War II. Sole practitioner of law in West Virginia since 1950. Former President, Charleston Chapter of Washington & Lee Alumni Association, 1965-67. Selected Sunday Gazette-Mail's West Virginian of the Year, 1970. Honorary Doctor of Letters Degree, West Virginia Institute of Technology, 1976. Honorary Associate Degree, West Virginia Northern Community College, 1977. Chairman of Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth Sternwheel Regatta Commissions, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985.

SUPREME COURT LAW LIBRARY

The West Virginia Supreme Court Law Library consists of law books and legal treatises and legal periodicals, with reports of other states and some foreign countries.

The Supreme Court Law Library is located on the Fourth Floor, East Wing, of the Capitol, and is under the supervision of the State Director of Law Libraries. Under the Judicial Reorganization Amendment, 30 Circuit Law Libraries have been established.

The Supreme Court Law Librarian receives the West Virginia Reports and supplies the Justices of the Supreme Court, State and Federal Courts, State Agencies and State Colleges and Universities with copies. He also receives Reports and Acts of the West Virginia Legislature for distribution to other states on exchange basis.

The law governing the Supreme Court Law Library provides that the library shall be open to the Justices

of the Supreme Court, law and writ clerks, judges of the United States and Circuit Courts, state officers, and members and officers of the Legislature during the legislative sessions.

THE JUDICIAL INVESTIGATION COMMISSION

Created by Rules promulgated by the Supreme Court of Appeals by Order entered December 15, 1982, the Judicial Investigation Commission is authorized to receive and initiate complaints concerning any Supreme Court Justice, Circuit Judge, or Magistrate of this State and to conduct full investigations in connection therewith; to file complaints with the Judicial Hearing Board, after presentation of a report of the investigation by Counsel for the Commission, if a majority of the members of the Commission believe that probable cause exists to charge a Justice, Judge, or Magistrate with violation of the Judicial Code of Ethics, Code of Regulations and Standards of Conduct and Performances, or to charge that a Justice, Judge, or Magistrate, because of advancing years and attendant physical or mental incapacity, should not continue to serve.

JUDICIAL HEARING BOARD

Created by Rules promulgated by the Supreme Court of Appeals by Order entered December 15, 1982, the Judicial Hearing Board shall be convened to hear complaints against Supreme Court Justices, Circuit Judges, and Magistrates filed by the Judicial Investigation Commission. At the conclusion of a hearing and upon consideration of all the substantial, probative, and reliable evidence developed and upon the arguments presented, the Board shall make and enter on the record of the proceedings its written recommendation, which shall contain findings of fact, conclusions of law, and proposed disposition. The proposed disposition shall be: (1) That the Justice, Judge, or Magistrate be censured or temporarily suspended subject

to such sanctions and penalties as may be imposed for violation of any Code of Ethics or Code of Regulations and Standards of Conduct and Performances; (2) That a Justice, Judge, or Magistrate who is eligible for retirement under the West Virginia Judges' Retirement System be retired because of advancing years and attendant physical or mental incapacity; or (3) That the complaint be dismissed. The Board's written recommendation, together with a verbatim transcript of the proceedings before it and all papers, motions, documents, evidence, and exhibits as were before the Board, shall be transmitted to and filed with the Clerk of the Supreme Court of Appeals and shall be personally served on the Judge. Filing with the Supreme Court of the Board's recommendation, together with certification of service upon the Justice, Judge, or Magistrate, shall constitute commencement of proceedings to disposition before the Supreme Court of Appeals.

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE BAR (Integrated)

State Capitol, Bldg. 1, Room 400

Created by the Supreme Court of Appeals under its inherent rule-making power as authorized by Chapter 44, Acts of the Legislature, 1945. The court adopted and promulgated a definition of the practice of law; a code of professional ethics, a code of judicial ethics and a constitution and by-laws for the government of the State Bar, effective May 1, 1947. Its membership consists of all persons lawfully admitted to the practice of law in West Virginia.

By a majority vote in 1978, the members of the State Bar consented to the payment of an annual membership fee as follows: first annual membership fee payment, \$50.00; second and third annual membership fee payments, \$75.00; and fourth and subsequent annual membership fee payments, \$100.00.

The objects of the State Bar are to protect the interests of the public; to advance the administration of justice and the science of jurisprudence; to improve the relations between the public and the Bench and the

Bar; to uphold and elevate the standards of honor, integrity, competency and courtesy in the legal profession; and to encourage cordial relations among its members. It is its declared purpose to give effect to pertinent rules of the Supreme Court of Appeals, and to perform the functions expressed in its Constitution and By-Laws. A principal duty of the State Bar is to uphold the standards of professional ethics and to diligently and vigilantly investigate and prosecute violations of these standards.

The State Bar is governed by a Board of Governors, consisting of all officers, except the secretary-treasurer, as *ex officio* members, and sixteen Governors, one Governor being elected by the members of the Bar by a secret mail ballot in each of the sixteen State Bar Districts. Officers include a president, chairman of the board, first vice president, second vice president, secretary-treasurer, and chairman of the Young Lawyers Section.

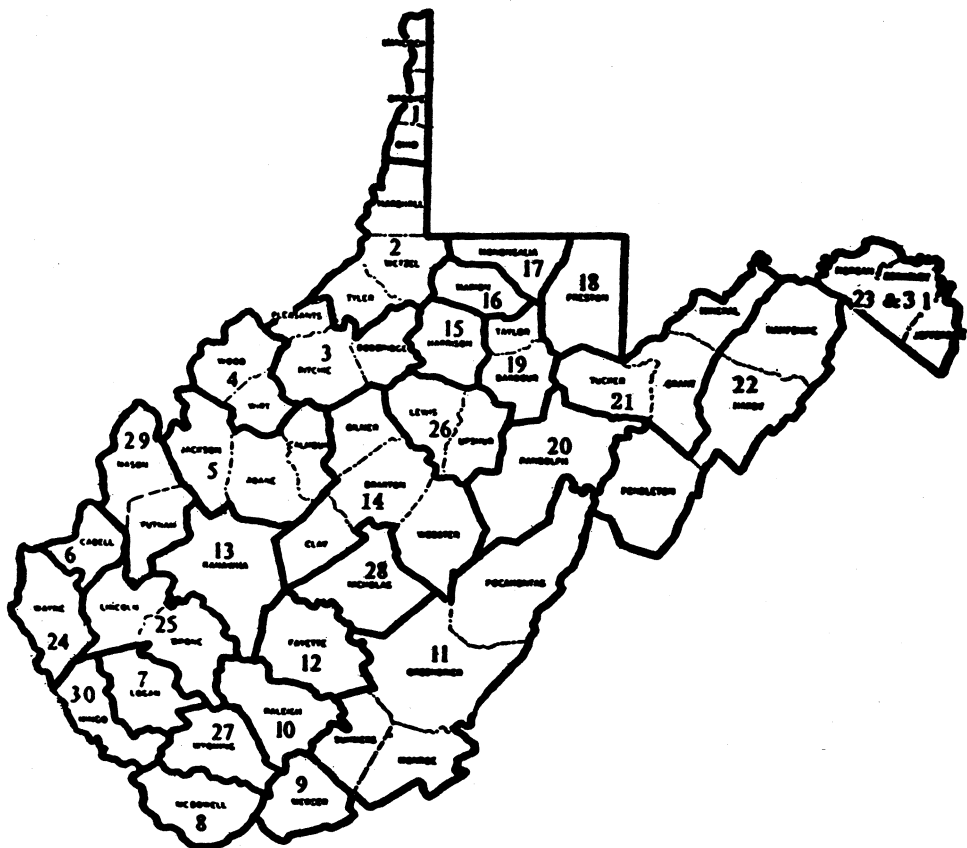

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

[Preamble]

WE THE PEOPLE of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this CONSTITUTION for the United States of America.¹

ARTICLE I.

Section 1.

[Legislative Powers]

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2.

[House of Representatives, How Constituted, Power of Impeachment]

The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

[Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons.]² The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New-York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3.

[The Senate, How Constituted, Impeachment Trials]

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.]³

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; [and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.]⁴

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4.

[Election of Senators and Representatives]

The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.⁵

Section 5.

[Quorum, Journals, Meetings, Adjournments]

Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behaviour, and, the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6.

[Compensation, Privileges, Disabilities]

The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7.

[Procedure in Passing Bills and Resolutions]

All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to that President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8.

[Powers of Congress]

The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9.

[Limitations upon Powers of Congress]

The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Section 10.

[Restrictions upon Powers of States]

No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing it's inspection Laws: and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controul of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keeps Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1.

[Executive Power, Election, Qualifications of the President]

The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress; but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all of the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like

Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.]⁶

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a resident within the United States.

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased or diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2.

[Powers of the President]

The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3.

[Powers and Duties of the President]

He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient;

he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4.

[Impeachment]

The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1.

[Judicial Power, Tenure of Office]

The Judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2.

[Jurisdiction]

The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States,—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.⁷

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3.

[Treason, Proof and Punishment]

Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

ARTICLE IV.**Section 1.**

[Faith and Credit among States]

Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2.

[Privileges and Immunities, Fugitives]

The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No Person held to Service of Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.

Section 3.

[Admission of New States]

New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4.

[Guarantee of Republican Government]

The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V.

[Amendment of the Constitution]

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI.*[Debts, Supremacy, Oath]*

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.*[Ratification and Establishment]*

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.⁸ done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth IN WITNESS whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names,

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION⁹

[AMENDMENT I]

[Freedom of Religion, of Speech, and of the Press]

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

[AMENDMENT II]

[Right to Keep and Bear Arms]

A well regulated Militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

[AMENDMENT III]

[Quartering of Soldiers]

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

[AMENDMENT IV]

[Security from Unwarrantable Search and Seizure]

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

[AMENDMENT V]

[Rights of Accused in Criminal Proceedings]

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person

be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

[AMENDMENT VI]

[Right to Speedy Trial, Witnesses, etc.]

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

[AMENDMENT VII]

[Trial by Jury in Civil Cases]

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

[AMENDMENT VIII]

[Bails, Fines, Punishments]

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

[AMENDMENT IX]

[Reservation of Rights of the People]

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

[AMENDMENT X]

[Powers Reserved to States or People]

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

[AMENDMENT XI]

[Restriction of Judicial Power]

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.¹⁰

[AMENDMENT XII]

[Election of President and Vice-President]

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for

each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.—The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.¹¹

[AMENDMENT XIII]

Section 1.

[Abolition of Slavery]

Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2.

[Power to Enforce This Article]

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹²

[AMENDMENT XIV]

Section 1.

[Citizenship Rights Not to Be Abridged by States]

All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2.

[Apportionment of Representatives in Congress]

Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male

inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3.

[Persons Disqualified from Holding Office]

No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may be a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4.

[What Public Debts Are Valid]

The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5.

[Power to Enforce This Article]

The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.¹³

[AMENDMENT XV]

Section 1.

[Negro Suffrage]

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2.

[Power to Enforce This Article]

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹⁴

[AMENDMENT XVI]

[Authorizing Income Taxes]

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.¹⁵

[AMENDMENT XVII]

[Popular Election of Senators]

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected

by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.¹⁶

[AMENDMENT XVIII]

Section 1.

[National Liquor Prohibition]

After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2.

[Power to Enforce This Article]

The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3.

[Ratification within Seven Years]

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.¹⁷

[AMENDMENT XIX]

[Woman Suffrage]

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹⁸

[AMENDMENT XX]

Section 1.

[Terms of Office]

The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2.

[Time of Convening Congress]

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3.*[Death of President Elect]*

If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4.*[Election of the President]*

The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5.*[Effective Date of Sections 1 and 2]*

Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.¹⁹

[AMENDMENT XXI]

Section 1.*[National Liquor Prohibition Repealed]*

The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2.*[Transportation of Liquor into "Dry" States]*

The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁰

[AMENDMENT XXII]

Section 1.*[Terms of Office of the President]*

No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislature of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.²¹

[AMENDMENT XXIII]

Section 1.*[Electors for President and Vice President in District of Columbia]*

The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendments.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²²

[AMENDMENT XXIV]

Section 1.*[Poll Tax Payment Not Required to Vote in Federal Elections]*

The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²³

[AMENDMENT XXV]

Section 1.*[Succession upon Death, Resignation or Removal of President]*

In case of the removal of the President from office or of his death or resignation, the Vice President shall become President.

Section 2.*[Vacancy in Office of Vice President]*

Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of the Vice President, the President shall nominate a Vice President who shall take office upon confirmation by a majority vote of both Houses of Congress.

Section 3.*[Declaration by President of Inability to Perform Duties]*

Whenever the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, such powers and duties shall be discharged by the Vice President as Acting President.

Section 4.*[Declaration of President's Disability by Vice President and Other Officers; Determination of Issue]*

Whenever the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive departments or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting President.

Thereafter, when the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that no inability exists, he shall resume the powers and duties of his office unless the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive department or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit within four days to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office. Thereupon Congress shall decide the issue, assembling within forty-eight hours for that purpose if not in session. If the Congress, within twenty-one days after receipt of the latter written declaration, or, if Congress is not in session, within twenty-one days after Congress is required to assemble, determines by two-thirds vote of both Houses that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall continue to discharge the same as Acting President; otherwise, the President shall resume the powers and duties of his office.²⁴

[AMENDMENT XXVI]

Section 1.*[Voting by Persons Eighteen Years of Age]*

The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²⁵

Preamble

Since through Divine Providence we enjoy the blessings of civil, political and religious liberty, we, the people of West Virginia, in and through the provisions of this Constitution, reaffirm our faith in and constant reliance upon God and seek diligently to promote, preserve and perpetuate good government in the State of West Virginia for the common welfare, freedom and security of ourselves and our posterity.

[Editors note.—This preamble was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts 1959, p. 659; submitted by Acts 1960, c. 4; and ratified November 8, 1960.]

ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

§1. The State of West Virginia is and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

§2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the states, are reserved to the states or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved to the states is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State, from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

§3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in time of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

Representatives to Congress

§4. For the election of representatives to Congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

§1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over, the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by, the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[Editor's note.]—All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the Constitution of 1863 forty-four of the above-named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition, the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should that Constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising those counties. The districts adopted the Constitution, and these six counties became part of the State.

The remaining four counties mentioned above were created by acts of the Legislature as follows: Mineral county, from Hampshire county, on February 1, 1866; Grant county, from Hardy county, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln county, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone counties on February 23, 1867; and Summers county, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette counties, on February 27, 1871. After the ratification of the Constitution of 1872, Mingo county was created by act of the Legislature from Logan county, on February 23, 1895, to make a total of fifty-five counties.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

§2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

§3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

§4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto, shall as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

§5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens, as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes—Penalty

§6. Treason against the State, shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties, of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

“Montani Semper Liberi”—State Seal

§7. The present seal of the State, with its motto, “Montani Semper Liberi,” shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the secretary of state, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds—Indictments

§8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, “Against the peace and dignity of the State.”

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

§1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

§2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from, the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

§3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms that is the best which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable, and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

§4. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail Not Required

§5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offence. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offence committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offence.

Unreasonable Searches and Seizures Prohibited

§6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

§7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

§8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

Private Property, How Taken

§9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporation, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner, as may be prescribed by general law; provided, that when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

§10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

§11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offences, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law, of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

§12. Standing armies in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offence that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

§13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit in a court of limited jurisdiction a jury shall consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise reexamined in any case than according to rule of court or law.

Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 11, Acts, Regular Session, 1879, p. 182; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1879, c. 50; and ratified October 12, 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,482; Against ratification, 34,073; Majority, 22,409.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case, be otherwise reexamined than according to the rules of common law."

The second amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts, Regular Session, 1974, p. 946; submitted under authority of art. 11, c. 3, of the West Virginia Code; and ratified November 5, 1974. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 217,732; Against ratification, 127,393; Majority, 90,339.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise reexamined in any case than according to the rules of the common law."

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Trial of Crimes—Provisions in Interest of Accused

§14. Trials of crimes, and of misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided shall be by a jury of twelve men, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offence was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause show, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defence; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

Religious Freedom Guaranteed

§15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in nowise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the Legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support, such private contract as he shall please.

Voluntary Contemplation, Meditation or Prayer in Schools

§15a. Public schools shall provide a designated brief time at the beginning of each school day for any student desiring to exercise their right to personal and private contemplation, meditation or prayer. No student of a public school may be denied the right to personal and private contemplation, meditation or prayer nor shall any student be required or encouraged to engage in any given contemplation, meditation or prayer as a part of the school curriculum.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts, Regular Session, 1984, p. 1123; and ratified November 6, 1984. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 511,057; Against ratification, 145,835; Majority, 365,222.]

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolable

§16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolable.

Courts Open to All—Justice Administered Speedily

§17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

§18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, etc., Provided Against

§19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

§20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

Jury Service for Women

§21. Regardless of sex, all persons, who are otherwise qualified, shall be eligible to serve as petit jurors, in both civil and criminal cases, as grand jurors and as coroner's jurors.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts 1955, p. 571; submitted by Acts 1955, c. 22; and ratified on November 6, 1956.]

ARTICLE IV

Election and Officers

§1. The male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

[**Editor's note.**—The Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution now provides that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex. As to the appointment of women as probation officers before the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment, see State ex rel. Hall v. Monongalia County Court, 82 W. Va. 564, 96 S.E. 966 (1918). See also W. Va. Const. art. IV, §4.]

[XXVI amendment of 1971 to the United States Constitution now provides that the rights of citizens of the United States who are eighteen years of age or older shall not be denied or abridged on account of age.]

Mode of Voting by Ballot

§2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be left free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

§3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads; or, except in time of war or public danger, to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office—Age Requirements

§4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any state, county or municipal office; but the governor and judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the attorney general and senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

§5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provision for Removal of Officials

§6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general laws, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

General Elections, When Held—Terms of Officials

§7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the Legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments, in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts 1883, p. 137; submitted by Acts 1883, c. 43; and ratified on October 14, 1884. Prior to the amendment, this section provided that the general election should be held on the second Tuesday in October and that terms of members of the Legislature began on the first day of November.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

§8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this Constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

§9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments, and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the president of the supreme court of appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature, for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

§10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

Safeguards for Ballots

§11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner, upon the ballot.

Registration Laws Provided For

§12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 19, Acts 1901, p. 472; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 154; and ratified on November 4, 1902. The original section read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election, because his name is not, or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."]

ARTICLE V

Division of Powers

§1. The legislative, executive and judicial departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

The Legislature

§1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

§2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members, subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[**Editor's note.**—The Senate is now composed of thirty-four, and the House of Delegates of one hundred members.]

Senators and Delegates—Terms of Office

§3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and delegates for the term of two years. The senators first elected, shall divide themselves into two classes, one senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one half of the senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

§4. For the election of senators, the State shall be divided into twelve senatorial districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the senatorial districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

Senatorial Districts Designated

§5. Until the senatorial districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first senatorial district; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[Editor's note.—There are now seventeen senatorial districts. See § 1-2-1 of the Code, as amended by c. 99, p. 540, Acts, 1982 Regular Session.]

Provision for Delegate Representation

§6. For the election of delegates, every county containing a population of less than three fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall, at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a delegate district.

After Census, Delegate Apportionment

§7. After every census the delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the house is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every delegate district, and of every county not included in a delegate district, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional delegates necessary to make up the number of which the house is to consist, shall then be assigned to those delegate districts, and counties not included in a delegate district, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every delegate district and county not included in a delegate district, shall be entitled to at least one delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

§8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first delegate district, and elect three delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one delegate.

Further Apportionments

§9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of delegates to the counties not included in delegate districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three delegates.

To Ohio County, four delegates.

[Editor's note.—Many changes have been made in this apportionment. There are now forty delegate districts. For the present apportionment, see Acts, Regular Session, 1982, c. 99, p. 540.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

§10. The arrangement of the senatorial and delegate districts, and apportionment of delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such districts shall be altered, and delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted into State

§11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provisions shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Senators and Delegates Required to Be Residents of Districts

§12. No person shall be a senator or delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the district or county from which he is elected; and if a senator or delegate remove from the district or county for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

§13. No person holding any other lucrative office or employment under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; and no person who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970; and ratified November 3, 1970.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature."

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

§14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether state, county, township, district, or

other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office for Profit

§15. No senator or delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

§16. Members of the Legislature, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, to-wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person, for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate) on any bill, resolution or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a judge of the supreme court of appeals, or of a circuit court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the secretary of state shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged from Civil Arrest

§17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

Time and Place of Assembly of Legislature

§18. The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener unless convened by the governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Upon the convening of the Legislature in each odd-numbered year, each house shall proceed to organize by the election of its officers for two-year terms and both houses shall then in joint assembly open and publish the election returns delivered to the Legislature as prescribed by other provisions of this Constitution and by general law. When all of these matters have been completed in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter, the Legislature shall adjourn until the second Wednesday of February following. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-one of this article and any other provisions of this Constitution, on and after the effective date hereof, there shall be submitted by the governor to the Legislature, on the second Wednesday of February in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter, and on the second Wednesday of January of all other years, unless a later time in any year be fixed by the Legislature, a budget for the next ensuing fiscal year and a bill for the proposed appropriations of such budget.

The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day."

Convening of Legislature by Governor

§19. The governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three fifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

§20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Other Than at the Seat of Government

§21. The governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of the government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health shall require it.

Length of Legislative Session

§22. The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter shall, in addition to the meeting days preceding the adjournment provided for in section eighteen of this article, not exceed sixty calendar days computed from and including the second Wednesday of February, and the regular session held in all other years shall not exceed sixty calendar days computed from and including the second Wednesday of January. Any regular session may be extended by a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house determined by yeas and nays and entered on the journals.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house."

It was amended to read:

"All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On re-assembling of the Legislature no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular session shall not continue longer than forty-five days after convening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house."

Concerning Adjournment

§23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

§24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a president; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate in point of continuous service present at the assembly of the Legislature at which officers thereof are to be selected, and if there be two or more such delegates with equal continuous service the one agreed upon by such delegates or chosen by such delegates by lot, shall call the house to order, and preside over it until the speaker thereof shall have been chosen, and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate in point of continuous service present at the assembly of the Legislature at which officers thereof are to be selected, and if there be two or more such members with equal continuous service the one agreed upon by such members or chosen by such members by lot, shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a president of the Senate shall have been chosen, and have taken his seat.

Authority to Punish Members

§25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offence.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

§26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety, and the undisturbed transaction of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offence, by the ordinary course of law.

Accounting for State Moneys

§27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether state, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is, or shall be, to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the state or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases, such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

§28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirement for Reading of Bills

§29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless, in case of urgency, by vote of four fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: Provided, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

Acts to Embrace But One Object—Time of Effect

§30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under this Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

§31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one house, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journals; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

“Majority” Defined

§32. Whenever the words, “a majority of the members elected to either house of the Legislature,” or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to

mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

Compensation and Expenses of Members

§33. Members of the Legislature shall receive such compensation in connection with the performance of their respective duties as members of the Legislature and such allowances for travel and other expenses in connection therewith as shall be (1) established in a resolution submitted to the Legislature by the citizens legislative compensation commission hereinafter created, and (2) thereafter enacted into general law by the Legislature at a regular session thereof, subject to such requirements and conditions as shall be prescribed in such general law. The Legislature may in any such general law reduce but shall not increase any item of compensation or expense allowance established in such resolution. All voting on the floor of both houses on the question of passage of any such general law shall be by yeas and nays to be entered on the journals.

The citizens legislative compensation commission is hereby created. It shall be composed of seven members who have been residents of this State for at least ten years prior to the date of appointment, to be appointed by the governor within twenty days after ratification of this amendment, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party. The members shall be broadly representative of the public at large. Members of the Legislature and officers and employees of the State or of any county, municipality or other governmental unit of the State shall not be eligible for appointment to or to serve as members of the commission. Each member of the commission shall serve for a term of seven years, except of the members first appointed, one member shall be appointed for a term of one year, and one each for terms ending two, three, four, five, six and seven years after the date of appointment. As the term of each member first appointed expires, a successor shall be appointed for a seven-year term. Any member may be reappointed for any number of terms and any vacancy shall be filled by the governor for the unexpired term. Any member of the commission may be removed by the governor prior to the expiration of such member's term for official misconduct, incompetency or neglect of duty. The governor shall designate one member of the commission as chairman. The members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but shall be entitled to be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties as such members.

The commission shall meet as often as may be necessary and shall within fifteen days after the beginning of the regular session of the Legislature in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-one and within fifteen days after the beginning of the regular session in each fourth year thereafter submit by resolution to the Legislature its determination of compensation and expense allowances, which resolution must be concurred in by at least four members of the commission.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, such compensation and expense allowances as may be provided for by any such general law shall be paid on and after the effective date of such general law. Until the first such general law becomes effective, the provisions of this section in effect immediately prior to the ratification of this amendment shall continue to govern.

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided for— Contracts for Printing

§34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a letting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

State Not to Be Made Defendant in Any Court

§35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof, or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

Lotteries; Bingo; Raffles; County Option

§36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State; except that the Legislature may authorize lotteries which are regulated, controlled, owned and operated by the State of West Virginia in the manner provided by general law, either separately by this State or jointly or in cooperation with one or more other states and may authorize state-regulated bingo games and raffles for the purpose of raising money by charitable or public service organizations or by the State Fair of West Virginia for charitable or public service purposes: *Provided*, That each county may disapprove the holding of bingo games and raffles within that county at a regular, primary or special election but once having disapproved such activity, may thereafter authorize the holding of bingo games and raffles, by majority vote at a regular, primary or special election held not sooner than five years after the election resulting in disapproval; that all proceeds from the bingo games and raffles be used for the purpose of supporting charitable or public service purposes; and that the Legislature shall provide a means of regulating the bingo games and raffles so as to ensure that only charitable or public service purposes are served by the conducting of the bingo games and raffles.

“The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries, or gift enterprises for any purpose, and pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.”

The second amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1983, p. 1076; and ratified November 6, 1984. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 437,357; Against ratification, 219,453; Majority, 217,904.

This section was amended to allow the Legislature to authorize lotteries which are regulated, controlled, owned and operated by the State of West Virginia in the manner provided by general law, either separately by this State or jointly or in cooperation with one or more other states.]

Terms of Office Not to Be Extended after Election

§37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Cannot Be Increased During Official Term

§38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due to the State: Provided, the Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not to Be Passed in Enumerated Cases

§39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

Granting divorces;

Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;

Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;

Locating, or changing county seats;

Regulating or changing county or district affairs;

Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;

Regulating the practice in courts of justice;

Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;

Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;

The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting;

The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;

Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;

Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;

Changing the law of descent;

Regulating the rate of interest;

Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;

Releasing taxes; releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give relief asked for.

Home Rule for Municipalities

§39(a). No local or special laws shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The Legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages, and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns and villages to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such

corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs: Provided, that any such charter or amendment thereto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted, shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this Constitution or the general laws of the State then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts 1935, p. 706; submitted by Acts 1935, c. 22; and ratified on November 3, 1936.]

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

§40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

Each House to Keep Journal of Proceedings

§41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills to Be Specific

§42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

Board or Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

§43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

Election of Legislative, County and Municipal Officers

§44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe—Punishment

§45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offences; provided, that any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offence of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offences specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Liquor

§46. The Legislature shall by appropriate legislation regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[Editor's note.]—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts 1911, p. 289; submitted by Acts 1911, c. 15; and ratified on November 5, 1912. Prior to the amendment, which provided for prohibition commencing on July 1, 1914, this section authorized laws regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors.

The second amendment was proposed by Sen. Com. Sub. for Eng. House Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1933, p. 313; submitted by Acts 1933, c. 25; and ratified on November 6, 1934. The amendment rewrote the section to read as set out above.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

§47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

Homestead Exemption

§48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of five thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of one thousand dollars, exempt from forced sale, subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in nowise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution and the increases in such homestead exemption provided by this amendment shall in nowise affect the debts or liabilities existing at the time of the ratification of such amendment: *Provided, however*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

[Editor's note.]—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, Acts, Regular Session, 1973, p. 582; and ratified at a special election November 6, 1973. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 202,407; Against ratification, 31,665; Majority, 170,742.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in nowise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution: *And provided further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon."

Property of Married Woman

§49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

Plan of Proportional Representation

§50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the senatorial districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

Budget and Supplementary Appropriation Bills

§51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the provisions of this section.

Subsection A—Appropriation Bills

(1) Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter provided.

Subsection B—Budget Bills

(2) Within ten days after the convening of the regular session of the Legislature in odd-numbered years, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature, and on the second Wednesday of January in even-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the Legislature a budget for the next ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the fiscal year and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of each fiscal year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (a) An estimate of the revenues and expenditures for the current fiscal year, including the actual revenues and actual expenditures to the extent available, and the revenues and expenditures for the next preceding fiscal year; (b) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (c) the debts and funds of the State; (d) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of the fiscal year covered by the budget; (e) any explanation the governor may desire to make as to the important features of the budget and any suggestions as to methods for reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

(3) Each budget shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations, in such form and detail as the governor shall determine or as may be prescribed by law: (a) For the Legislature as certified to the governor in the manner hereinafter provided; (b) for the executive department; (c) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the governor by the auditor; (d) for payment and discharge of the principal and interest of any debt of the State created in conformity with the Constitution, and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (e) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (f) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and in laws made in pursuance thereof.

(4) The governor shall deliver to the presiding officer of each house the budget and a bill for all the proposed appropriations of the budget clearly itemized and classified, in such form and detail as the governor shall determine or as may be prescribed by law; and the presiding officer of each house shall promptly cause the bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The governor may, with the consent of the Legislature, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement the budget to correct an oversight, or to provide funds contingent on passage of pending legislation, and in case of an emergency, he may deliver such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officers of both houses; and the amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of the budget bill as an addition to the items of the bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of the bill the amendment or supplement may affect.

(5) The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or decreasing any item therein: Provided, that no item relating to the judiciary shall be decreased, and except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or decreased during his term of office: Provided further, that the Legislature shall not increase the estimate of revenue submitted in the budget without the approval of the governor.

(6) The governor and such representatives of the executive departments, boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for state moneys as have been designated by the governor for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either house of the Legislature it shall be their duty, to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Subsection C—Supplementary Appropriation Bills

(7) Neither house shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following: (a) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called therein a supplementary appropriation bill; (b) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in the bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available.

Subsection D—General Provisions

(8) If the budget bill shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the governor shall issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of the bill; but no matter other than the bill shall be considered during such an extension of a session except a provision for the cost thereof.

(9) For the purpose of making up the budget, the governor shall have the power, and it shall be his duty, to require from the proper state officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state moneys and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as he shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each house, and for the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the auditor, shall be transmitted to the governor in such form and at such times as he shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

(10) The governor may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies and all institutions applying for state moneys. After such public hearings he may, in his discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments.

(11) Every budget bill or supplementary appropriation bill passed by a majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. The governor may veto the bill, or he may disapprove or reduce items or parts of items contained therein. If he approves he shall sign it and thereupon it shall become a law. The bill, items or parts thereof, disapproved or reduced by the governor, shall be returned with his objections to each house of the Legislature.

Each house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal and proceed to reconsider. If, after reconsideration, two thirds of the members elected to each house agree to pass the bill, or such items or parts thereof, as were disapproved or reduced, the bill, items or parts thereof, approved by two thirds of such members, shall become law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. In all such cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal.

A bill, item or part thereof, which is not returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after the bill has been presented to him shall become a law in like manner as if he had signed the bill, unless the Legislature, by adjournment, prevents such return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, within five days after such adjournment, and shall become a law; or it shall be so filed within such five days with the objections of the governor, in which case it shall become law to the extent not disapproved by the governor.

(12) The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

(13) In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section nineteen of this article, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

(14) If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

Revenues Applicable to Roads

§52. Revenue from gasoline and other motor fuel excise and license taxation, motor vehicle registration and license taxes, and all other revenue derived from motor vehicles or motor fuels shall, after deduction of statutory refunds and cost of administration and collection authorized by legislative appropriation, be appropriated and used solely for construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways, and also the payment of the interest and principal on all road bonds heretofore issued or which may be hereafter issued for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of public highways, and the payment of obligations incurred in the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways.

Forestry Amendment

§53. The Legislature may by general law define and classify forest lands and provide for cooperation by contract between the State and the owner in the planting, cultivation, protection, and harvesting thereof. Forest lands embraced in any such contract may be exempted from all taxation or be taxed in such manner, including the imposition of a severance tax or charge as trees are harvested, as the Legislature may from time to time provide. But any tax measured by valuation shall not exceed the aggregate rates authorized by section one of article ten of this Constitution.

Continuity of Government Amendment

§54. The Legislature of West Virginia, in order to insure continuity of State and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty (1) to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices, and (2) to adopt such other measures as may be necessary and proper for insuring the continuity of governmental operations.

[Editor's note.—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts 1959, p. 660; submitted by Acts 1959, c. 19; and ratified on November 8, 1960.]

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

§1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general, who shall be ex officio reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

[Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, Acts 1933, 1st Ex. Sess., p. 506; submitted by Acts 1933, 1st Ex. Sess., c. 30; and ratified on November 6, 1934. The amendment inserted "commissioner of agriculture" in the first sentence of this section. Prior to the amendment the terms of office commenced on the fourth day of March, and the attorney general was excepted from the residence requirement of the third sentence.

Election

§2. An election for governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902. This section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "An election for governor, State superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, and attorney general, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts 1957, c. 19; and ratified on November 4, 1958. The amendment deleted "State superintendent of free schools" and added "commissioner of agriculture."]

Certification of Election Returns—Contests

§3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the secretary of state, directed "to the speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the house, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902. The amendment deleted the last sentence which provided for appointment of the secretary of state and his term of office.]

Eligibility

§4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. A person who has been elected or who has served as governor during all or any part of two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for the office of governor during any part of the term immediately following the second of the two consecutive terms. The person holding the office of governor when this section is ratified shall not be prevented from holding the office of governor during the term immediately following the term he is then serving.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Neither the governor, State superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."

It was amended to read:

"None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."

The second amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 454; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 23; and ratified November 3, 1970. The amendment, which was designated the "Governors Succession Amendment," rewrote the second sentence and added the third sentence. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 213,758; Against ratification, 157,597; Majority, 56,161.

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Chief Executive—Powers

§5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

§6. The governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money

received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

§7. The governor may, on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

§8. The governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for; and no such officers shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies—How Filled

§9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate, (a majority of all the senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

§10. The governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Executive May Remit Fines and Forfeitures

§11. The governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-Chief of Military Forces

§12. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called into the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Official Bond of State Officers

§13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

Governor's Approval or Disapproval of Bills Passed by the Legislature

§14. Subject to the provisions of section fifteen of this article, every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approves, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his

objections, to the house in which it originated, which house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and may proceed to reconsider the returned bill. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution, any such bill may be reconsidered even if the Legislature is at the time in extended session for the sole purpose of considering the budget bill, as specified in said section fifty-one. If after any such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections of the governor to the other house, by which it may likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. If upon any such reconsideration the bill is amended and reenacted, then it shall be again sent to the governor and he shall act upon it as if it were before him for the first time. In all cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal.

Any bill which shall not be returned by the governor within five days, Sundays excepted, after it shall have been presented to him shall be a law, in the same manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by adjournment sine die, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the secretary of state within fifteen days, Sundays excepted, after such adjournment, or become a law.

Editor's note.—A budget bill or supplementary appropriation bill, disapproved by the governor, requires a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house in order to become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the secretary of state, within five days after such adjournment, or become a law."]

Governor's Approval or Disapproval of Bills Making Appropriations of Money

§15. A bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money must be submitted to the governor for his approval or disapproval to the extent and only to the extent required by section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution, and any provision therein contained as to such approval or disapproval shall govern and control as to any such bill.

This section, prior to its amendment read:

"Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the house in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless repassed by a majority of each house according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills."]

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

§16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the governor, the president of the Senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the Senate, for any of the

above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies in Other Executive Departments

§17. If the office of secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture or attorney general shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all moneys received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources and for every service performed, and make a semiannual report thereof to the governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902. The amendment inserted "secretary of state" near the beginning of the section and substituted "prescribed" for "provided" near the end of the first sentence.

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts 1957, c. 19; ratified on November 4, 1958. The amendment deleted "State superintendent of free schools" and inserted "commissioner of agriculture" in the first sentence.]

Executive Heads to Make Reports

§18. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of state institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

§19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902. This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The governor shall receive for his services, a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite, shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The secretary of state shall receive one thousand; the State superintendent of free schools, fifteen hundred; the treasurer, fourteen hundred; the auditor, two thousand; and the attorney general thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."]

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Power

§1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested solely in a supreme court of appeals and in the circuit courts, and in such intermediate appellate courts and magistrate courts as shall be hereafter established by the Legislature, and in the justices, judges and magistrates of such courts.

Supreme Court of Appeals

§2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of five justices. A majority of the justices of the court shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The justices shall be elected by the voters of the State for a term of twelve years, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such justices is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis.

Provision shall be made by rules of the supreme court of appeals for the selection of a member of the court to serve as chief justice thereof. If the chief justice is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, one of the justices of the court designated in accordance with the rules of the court shall serve temporarily in his stead.

When any justice is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, the chief justice may assign a judge of a circuit court or of an intermediate appellate court to serve from time to time in his stead.

Supreme Court of Appeals; Jurisdiction and Powers; Officers and Employees; Terms

§3. The supreme court of appeals shall have original jurisdiction of proceedings in habeas corpus, mandamus, prohibition and certiorari.

The court shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases at law where the matter in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, is of greater value or amount than three hundred dollars unless such value or amount is increased by the Legislature; in civil cases in equity; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land; in proceedings in quo warranto, habeas corpus, mandamus, prohibition and certiorari; and in cases involving personal freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases, where there has been a conviction for a felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be conferred upon it by law where there has been such a conviction in any other court. In criminal proceedings relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as to the defendant. It shall have such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

The court shall have power to promulgate rules for all cases and proceedings, civil and criminal, for all of the courts of the State relating to writs, warrants, process, practice and procedure, which shall have the force and effect of law.

The court shall have general supervisory control over all intermediate appellate courts, circuit courts and magistrate courts. The chief justice shall be the administrative head of all the courts. He may assign a judge from one intermediate appellate court to another, from one circuit court to another, or from one magistrate court to another, for temporary service. The court shall appoint an administrative director to serve at its pleasure at a salary to be fixed by the court. The administrative director shall, under the direction of the chief justice, prepare and submit a budget for the court.

The officers and employees of the supreme court of appeals, including the clerk and the law librarian, shall be appointed and may be removed by the court. Their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by the court.

The number, times and places of the terms of the supreme court of appeals shall be prescribed by law. There shall be at least two terms of the court held annually.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal; Scope and Form of Decisions

§4. A writ of error, supersedeas or appeal shall be allowed by the supreme court of appeals, or a justice thereof, only upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of a court and then only after the court, or a justice thereof, shall have examined and considered the record and is satisfied that there probably is error in the record, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the court.

No decision rendered by the court shall be considered as binding authority upon any court, except in the particular case decided, unless a majority of the justices of the court concur in such decision.

When a judgment or order of another court is reversed, modified or affirmed by the court, every point fairly arising upon the record shall be considered and decided; the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case in which an opinion is written and in which a majority of the justices thereof concurred, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Circuit Courts

§5. The judge or judges of each circuit court shall be elected by the voters of the circuit for a term of eight years, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such judges is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis. Upon the effective date of this article, each statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction existing in the State immediately prior to such effective date shall become part of the circuit court for the circuit in which it presently exists, and each such judge of such statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction shall thereupon become a judge of such circuit court. During his continuance in office, a judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is a judge.

The Legislature may increase, or other than during term of office decrease, the number of circuit judges within any circuit. The judicial circuits in existence on the effective date of this article shall remain as so constituted until changed by law, and the Legislature, at any session thereof held in the odd-numbered year next preceding the time for the full term election of the judges thereof, may rearrange the circuits and may increase or diminish the number of circuits. A judge of a circuit court in office at the time of any such change shall continue as a judge of the circuit in which he shall continue to reside after such change until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article.

There shall be at least one judge for each circuit court and as many more as may be necessary to transact the business of such court. If there be two or more judges of a circuit court, provision shall be made by rules of such circuit court for the selection of one of such judges to serve as chief judge thereof. If the chief judge is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, one of the judges of the circuit court designated in accordance with the rules of such court shall serve temporarily in his stead.

The supreme court of appeals shall provide for dividing the business of those circuits in which there shall be more than one judge between the judges thereof so as to promote and secure the convenient and expeditious transaction of such business.

In every county in the State the circuit court for such county shall sit at least three times in each year. The supreme court of appeals shall designate the times at which each circuit court shall sit, but until this action is taken by the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall sit at the times prescribed by law. If there be two or more judges of a circuit court, such judges may hold court in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times.

Circuit Courts; Jurisdiction, Authority and Power

§6. Circuit courts shall have control of all proceedings before magistrate courts by mandamus, prohibition and certiorari.

Circuit courts shall have original and general jurisdiction of all civil cases at law where the value or amount in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds one hundred dollars unless such value or amount is increased by the Legislature; of all civil cases in equity; of proceedings in habeas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto, prohibition and certiorari; and of all crimes and misdemeanors. On and after January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, the Legislature may provide that all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators, and the settle-

ments of their accounts, shall be vested exclusively in circuit courts or their officers, but until such time as the Legislature provides otherwise, jurisdiction in such matters shall remain in the county commissions or tribunals existing in lieu thereof or the officers of such county commissions or tribunals.

Circuit courts shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or supersedeas is allowed by law to the judgment or proceedings of any magistrate court, unless such jurisdiction is conferred by law exclusively upon an intermediate appellate court or the supreme court of appeals.

Circuit courts shall also have such other jurisdiction, authority or power, original or appellate or concurrent, as may be prescribed by law.

Subject to the approval of the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall have the authority and power to establish local rules to govern the court.

Subject to the supervisory control of the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall have general supervisory control over all magistrate courts in the circuit. Under the direction of the chief justice of the supreme court of appeals, the judge of the circuit court, or the chief judge thereof if there be more than one judge of the circuit court, shall be the administrative head of the circuit court and all magistrate courts in the circuit.

General Provisions Relating to Justices, Judges and Magistrates

§7. All justices, judges and magistrates must be residents of this State and shall be commissioned by the governor. No person may hereafter be elected as a justice of the supreme court of appeals unless he has been admitted to practice law for at least ten years prior to his election, and no person may hereafter be elected as a judge of a circuit court unless he has been admitted to practice law for at least five years prior to his election.

Justices, judges and magistrates shall receive the salaries fixed by law, which shall be paid entirely out of the state treasury, and which may be increased but shall not be diminished during their term of office, and they shall receive expenses as provided by law. The salary of a circuit judge shall also not be diminished during his term of office by virtue of the statutory courts of record of limited jurisdiction of his circuit becoming a part of such circuit as provided in section five of this article.

Any justice of the supreme court of appeals and any judge of any circuit court, including any statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction which becomes a part of a circuit court by virtue of section five of this article, in office on the effective date of this article shall continue in office until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article: *Provided*, That as to the term of any judge of a statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction which does not expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, the following provisions shall govern and control unless any such judges shall be sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article: (1) If the term would otherwise expire before the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, such term shall continue through and expire on said thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, (2) if the term would otherwise expire on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, such term shall terminate and expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, and (3) if the term would otherwise expire after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, but other than on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, such term shall continue through and expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred eighty-four.

No justice, judge or magistrate shall hold any other office, or accept any appointment or public trust, under this or any other government; nor shall he become a candidate for any elective public office or nomination thereto, except a judicial office; and the violation of any of these provisions shall vacate his judicial office. No justice of the supreme court of appeals or judge of an intermediate appellate court or of a circuit court shall practice the profession of law during the term of his office, but magistrates who are licensed to practice this profession may practice law except to the extent prohibited by the Legislature.

If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the office of a justice of the supreme court of appeals or a judge of a circuit court, the governor shall issue a directive of election to fill such vacancy in the manner prescribed by law for electing a justice or judge of the court in which the vacancy exists, and the justice or judge shall be elected for the unexpired term; and in the meantime, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a justice or judge shall be elected and qualified. If the unexpired term be less than two years, or such additional period, not exceeding a total of three years, as may be prescribed by law, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Censure, Temporary Suspension and Retirement of Justices, Judges and Magistrates; Removal

§8. Under its inherent rule-making power, which is hereby declared, the supreme court of appeals shall, from time to time, prescribe, adopt, promulgate and amend rules prescribing a judicial code of ethics, and a code of regulations and standards of conduct and performances for justices, judges and magistrates, along with sanctions and penalties for any violation thereof, and the supreme court of appeals is authorized to censure or temporarily suspend any justice, judge or magistrate having the judicial power of the State, including one of its own members, for any violation of any such code of ethics, code of regulations and standards, or to retire any such justice, judge or magistrate who is eligible for retirement under the West Virginia judges' retirement system (or any successor or substituted retirement system for justices, judges and magistrates of this State) and who, because of advancing years and attendant physical or mental incapacity, should not, in the opinion of the supreme court of appeals, continue to serve as a justice, judge or magistrate.

No justice, judge or magistrate shall be censured, temporarily suspended or retired under the provisions of this section unless he shall have been afforded the right to have a hearing before the supreme court of appeals, nor unless he shall have received notice of the proceedings, with a statement of the cause or causes alleged for his censure, temporary suspension or retirement, at least twenty days before the day on which the proceeding is to commence. No justice of the supreme court of appeals may be temporarily suspended or retired unless all of the other justices concur in such temporary suspension or retirement. When rules herein authorized are prescribed, adopted and promulgated, they shall supersede all laws and parts of laws in conflict therewith, and such laws shall be and become of no further force or effect to the extent of such conflict.

A retired justice or judge may, with his permission and with the approval of the supreme court of appeals, be recalled by the chief justice of the supreme court of appeals for temporary assignment as a justice of the supreme court of appeals, or judge of an intermediate appellate court, a circuit court or a magistrate court.

A justice or judge may be removed only by impeachment in accordance with the provisions of section nine, article four of this Constitution. A magistrate may be removed from office in the manner provided by law for the removal of county officers.

Clerks of Circuit Courts

§9. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties, responsibilities, compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law. Whenever the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act in any matter, a clerk to act therein shall be appointed by the judge of the circuit court or the chief judge thereof, if there be more than one judge of the circuit court. Vacancies shall be filled in the manner prescribed by law. A clerk of the circuit court in office on the effective date of this article shall continue in office until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

Magistrate Courts

§10. The Legislature shall establish in each county a magistrate court or courts with the right of appeal as prescribed by law. Such courts shall be courts of record if so prescribed by law.

The Legislature shall determine the qualifications and the number of magistrates for each such court to be elected by the voters of the county, and the Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such magistrates is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis: *Provided*, That any person in office as a justice of the peace of this State on the effective date of this article and who has served as a justice of the peace of this State for at least one year prior to such effective date shall, insofar as any qualifications established by the Legislature for the office of magistrate are concerned and notwithstanding the same, be deemed qualified for life to run for election as a magistrate of any such court: *And provided further*, That the Legislature shall not have the power to require that a magistrate be a person licensed to practice in the profession of law, nor shall any justice or judge of any higher court establish any rules which by their nature would dictate or mandate that a magistrate be a person licensed to practice the profession of law. The magistrates of such courts shall hold their offices for the term of four years unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature shall also determine the number of officers to be selected for each such court and the manner of their selection. During his continuance in office a magistrate or officer of such a court shall reside in the county for which he is elected or selected. The Legislature shall prescribe by law for the filling of any vacancy in the office of a magistrate or officer of such court.

The jurisdiction of a magistrate court shall extend throughout the county for which it is established, shall be uniform for all counties of the State and shall be subject to such regulations as to venue of actions and the counties in which process may be executed or served on parties or witnesses as may be prescribed by law. The times and places for holding such courts shall be designated or determined in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

Magistrate courts shall have such original jurisdiction in criminal matters as may be prescribed by law, but no person shall be convicted or sentenced for a felony in such courts. In criminal cases, the procedure may be by information or warrant of arrest, without presentment or indictment by a grand jury. Such courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases at law wherein the value or amount in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars, unless such amount and value shall be increased by the Legislature, except such civil matters as may be excluded from their jurisdiction by law; and, to the extent provided by law, in proceedings involving real estate when the title thereto is not in controversy. No judgment of a magistrate in any proceeding involving real estate or any right pertaining thereto shall bar the title of any party or any remedy therefor.

The division of the business of a magistrate court in any county in which there shall be more than one magistrate of such court between the magistrates thereof so as to promote and secure the convenient and expeditious transaction of such business shall be determined in such manner or by such method as shall be prescribed by the judge of the circuit court of such county, or the chief judge thereof, if there be more than one judge of such circuit court.

In a trial by jury in a magistrate court, the jury shall consist of six jurors who are qualified as prescribed by law.

No magistrate or any officer of a magistrate court shall be compensated for his services on a fee basis or receive to his own use for his services any pecuniary compensation, reward or benefit other than the salary prescribed by law.

Municipal Courts

§11. The Legislature may provide for the establishment in incorporated cities, towns or villages of municipal, police or mayors' courts, and may also provide the manner of selection of the judges of such courts. Such courts shall have jurisdiction to enforce municipal ordinances, with the right of appeal as prescribed by law. Until otherwise provided by law, all such courts heretofore established shall remain and continue as now constituted, and with the same right of appeal, insofar as their jurisdiction to enforce municipal ordinances is concerned; but on and after January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, any other jurisdiction now exercised by such courts shall cease. No judge of a municipal, police or mayor's court or any officer thereof shall be compensated for his services on a fee basis or

receive to his own use for his services any pecuniary compensation, reward or benefit other than the salary prescribed therefor.

Issuance and Execution of Writs, Warrants and Process; Admission to Bail

§12. The Legislature may designate the courts and officers or deputies thereof who shall have the power to issue, execute or serve such writs, warrants or any other process as may be prescribed by law, and may specify before what courts or officers thereof such writs, warrants or other process shall be returnable. The Legislature may also designate the courts and officers or deputies thereof who shall have the power to admit persons to bail. No person exercising such powers shall be compensated therefor on a fee basis.

Parts of Existing Law Effective

§13. Except as otherwise provided in this article, such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force on the effective date of this article and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of this State until altered or repealed by the Legislature.

Pending Causes; Transfer of Causes; Records

§14. Until otherwise provided by law, all matters pending in any court on the effective date of this article shall remain and be prosecuted in the court in which they are pending.

Whenever the jurisdiction, powers or duties of any court are terminated or changed, the Legislature shall provide by law for the transfer of all matters pending therein as to which the court shall not thereafter act, together with all of the records and papers pertaining thereto, to a court having jurisdiction, powers or duties as to such matters, and shall provide for the prosecution therein of such matters as if then and there pending.

All records and papers pertaining to matters already disposed of in any court shall be preserved or disposed of in a manner prescribed by law.

Offices Phased Out; Effective Date of Article; Certain Provisions to Be Operable at Time Specified; Effect of Article on Certain Provisions of Constitution

§15. Notwithstanding the provisions of section one of this article, the office of justice of the peace, as heretofore constituted, shall continue until January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven. No person shall be elected to the office of justice of the peace or constable at the general election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, and said offices shall cease to exist as of January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven.

This article shall take effect from the time of ratification, but in any case where it is specified in this article that a provision shall become operable on and after a certain date, such date shall govern and control as to the operable date of such provision.

The provisions of the article shall supersede and prevail over all other provisions of this Constitution which are expressly or impliedly in conflict or inconsistent therewith.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

§1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

§2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall with the advice and consent of the county court have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs

§3. A person who has been elected or who has served as sheriff during all or any part of two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for the office of sheriff during any part of the term immediately following the second of the two consecutive terms. The person holding the office of sheriff when this section is ratified shall not be prevented from holding the office of sheriff during the term immediately following the term he is then serving.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1973, p. 700; and ratified at a special election on November 6, 1973. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 123,003; Against ratification, 107,427; Majority, 15,576.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.]

Malfeasance and Misfeasance in Office

§4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their office shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided for

§5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

§6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

§7. The president of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

§8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

County Commissions

§9. The office of county court or tribunal in lieu thereof heretofore created is hereby continued in all respects as heretofore constituted, but from and after the effective date of this amendment shall be designated as the county commission and wherever in this Constitution, the code of West Virginia, acts of the Legislature or elsewhere in law a reference is made to the county court of any county, such reference shall be read, construed and understood to mean the county commission.

Except as otherwise provided in section eleven or thirteen of this article, there shall be in each county of the state a county commission, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed and entered of record by the said commission. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said commissions.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

§10. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for a term of six years, except that at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for a term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years; but no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. If two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president. The commissioners of said commissions, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Powers of County Commissioners

§11. The county commissions, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: *Provided*, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. Until otherwise prescribed by law, they shall, in all cases of contest, be the judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such commissions may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. Such existing tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature to act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of county commissions in certain counties shall remain and continue as now constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established until otherwise provided by law, and they shall have and exercise the powers which the county commissions have under this article, and, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in section twelve of this article shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties, heretofore conferred on, or required of, any such tribunal or the clerk of such tribunal respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record and such other matters as are prescribed by law to be exercised and discharged by the clerk thereof.

Clerk of County Commission

§12. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county commission, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be

prescribed by law. But the clerks of said commissions, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Commissions

§13. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county commission established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county commission created by this article. Whenever a county commission shall receive a petition signed by ten percent of the registered voters of such county requesting the reformation, alteration or modification of such county commission, it shall be the mandatory duty of such county commission to request the Legislature, at its next regular session thereafter, to enact an act reforming, altering or modifying such county commission and establishing in lieu thereof another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by such county commission, such act to take effect upon the assent of the voters of such county, as aforesaid. Whenever any such tribunal is established, all of the provisions of this article in relation to the county commission shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said commission. When such tribunal has been established, it shall continue to act in lieu of the county commission until otherwise provided by law.

The purpose of the foregoing sections 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 is to remove the county court from the Judicial Department, art. 8, as amended, and to transfer the office of county court or tribunal to art. 9, County Organization.]

ARTICLE X

Taxation and Finance

§1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including livestock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the Legislature shall further provide by general law, for increasing the maximum rates, authorized to be fixed, by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property, by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty percent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty percent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the Legislature among the levying units of the State in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including livestock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have authority

to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation, incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the Legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the State now existing.

Exemptions From and Additional Adjustments to Ad Valorem Property Taxation

§1a. Notwithstanding the provisions of sections one and one-b of this article, household goods and personal effects, if such household goods or personal effects are not held or used for profit, and all intangible personal property shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation: *Provided*, That intangible personal property may be made subject to such taxation only to the extent provided by the Legislature by general law not inconsistent with this section.

The Legislature shall not impose ad valorem property taxation upon money, bank deposits and other investments determined by such law to be in the nature of deposits in a bank or other financial institution, or upon pensions, monies or investments determined by the Legislature in such law to be in lieu of or otherwise in the nature of pensions.

The Legislature by general law may exempt from such taxation any amount of the value of all or certain intangible personal property and any type, group or class of such intangibles but such exemptions shall be uniform throughout the state. No tax imposed upon such intangibles shall be at a rate or rates in excess of the maximum rate permitted to be imposed upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture as provided in sections one, one-b or ten of this article, as the case may be, in the county wherein the intangible personal property has situs, as such situs is determined by the Legislature in such general law.

The valuations with respect to property acquired or created subsequent to any statewide reappraisal and the valuations with respect to any intangible personal property subjected to ad valorem property taxation pursuant to this section shall be allocated and phased-in over a period of years and be valued with respect to the same base year as other property subject to ad valorem property taxation in order to provide for equitable and similar treatment of such property subsequently acquired or created or such intangible personal property as compared to similarly situated previously existing property of similar value whose owner is receiving the benefit of any allocation and phase-in allowed pursuant to section one-b of this article.

Any intangible personal property which would be subject to ad valorem property taxation under prior provisions of this Constitution shall continue to be subjected to such taxation as provided by and in accordance with current statutory law for the assessment of such taxes upon such property, which laws are hereby validated for such purpose or purposes, until the first day of July in the year one thousand nine hundred eighty-five, or until the first statewide reappraisal of property pursuant to section one-b of this article shall be first implemented and employed to fix values for ad valorem property taxation, whichever shall last occur, and thereafter no intangible personal property shall be subject to such taxation save for and except as provided by the Legislature by general law enacted after the ratification of the amendment of this section in the year one thousand nine hundred eighty-four.

**Property Tax Limitation and Homestead Exemption
Amendment of 1982**

§1b. Ad valorem property taxation shall be in accordance with this section and other applicable provisions of this article not inconsistent with this section.

Subsection A—Value; Rate of Assessment; Exceptions

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Constitution and except as otherwise provided in this section, all property subject to ad valorem taxation shall be assessed at sixty percent of its value, as directed to be ascertained in this section, except that the Legislature may from time to time, by general law agreed to by two thirds of the members elected to each house, establish a higher percentage for the purposes of this paragraph, which percentage shall be uniform as to all classes of property defined in section one of this article, but not more than one hundred percent of such value.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, for the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-two, and the first day of July of each year thereafter until the values may be fixed as a result of the first statewide reappraisal hereinafter required, assessments shall be made under the provisions of current statutory law, which is hereby validated for such purpose until and unless amended by the Legislature. Assessment and taxation in accord with this section shall be deemed to be equal and uniform for all purposes.

Subsection B—Determination of Value

The Legislature shall provide by general law for periodic statewide reappraisal of all property, which reappraisal shall be related for all property to a specified base year which, as to each such reappraisal, shall be uniform for each appraisal for all classes of property and all counties. In such law, the Legislature shall provide for consideration of (1) trends in market values over a fixed period of years prior to the base year, (2) the location of the property, and (3) such other factors and methods as it may determine: *Provided*, That with respect to reappraisal of all property upon the base year of one thousand nine hundred eighty, such reappraisals are deemed to be valid and in compliance with this section: *Provided, however*, That with respect to farm property, as defined from time to time by the Legislature by general law, the determination of value shall be according to its fair and reasonable value for farming purposes, as may be defined by general law.

The results of each statewide appraisal shall upon completion be certified and published and errors therein may be corrected, all as provided by general law. The first such statewide appraisal shall be completed, certified and published on or before the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred eighty-five, for use when directed by the Legislature.

The Legislature shall further prescribe by general law the manner in which each statewide reappraisal shall be employed to establish the value of the various separately assessed parcels or interests in parcels of real property and various items of personal property subject to ad valorem property taxation, the methods by which increases and reductions in value subsequent to the base year of each statewide reappraisal shall be ascertained, and require the enforcement thereof.

Subsection C—General Homestead Exemption

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Constitution to the contrary, the first twenty thousand dollars of assessed valuation of any real property, or of personal property in the form of a mobile home, used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this state and who is sixty-five years of age or older or is permanently and totally disabled as that term may be defined by the Legislature, shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation, subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general law.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the Legislature shall have the authority to provide by general law for an exemption from ad valorem property taxation in an amount not to exceed the first twenty thousand dollars of value of any real property, or of personal property in the form of a mobile home, used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this state, and who is under sixty-five years of age and not totally and permanently disabled: *Provided*, That upon enactment of such general law, this exemption shall only apply to such property in any county in which the property was appraised at its value as of the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred eighty, or thereafter, as determined by the Legislature, and this exemption shall be phased in over such period of time not to exceed five years from the date such property was so appraised, or such longer time as the Legislature may determine by general law: *Provided, however*, That in no event shall any one person and his spouse, or one homestead be entitled to more than one exemption under these provisions: *Provided further*, That these provisions are subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general law.

The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by general law for property tax relief to citizens of this State who are tenants of residential or farm property.

Subsection D—Additional Limitations on Value

With respect to the first statewide reappraisal, pursuant to this section, the resulting increase in value in each and every parcel of land or interest therein and various items of personal property subject to ad valorem property taxation over and above the previously assessed value shall be allocated over a period of ten years in equal amounts annually.

The Legislature may by general law also provide for the phasing in of any subsequent statewide reappraisal of property.

Subsection E—Levies for Free Schools

In equalizing the support of free schools provided by state and local taxes, the Legislature may require that the local school districts levy all or any portion of the maximum levies allowed under section one of this article which has been allocated to such local school districts.

Within the limits of the maximum levies permitted for excess levies for schools or better schools in sections one and ten of this article, the Legislature may, in lieu of the exercise of such powers by the local school districts as heretofore provided, submit to the voters, by general law, a statewide excess levy, and if it be approved by the required number of voters, impose such levy, subject however to all the limitations and requirements for the approval of such levies as in the case of a district levy. The law submitting the question to the voters shall provide, upon approval of the levy by the voters, for the assumption of the obligation of any local excess levies for schools then in force theretofore authorized by the voters of a local taxing unit to the extent of such excess levies imposed by the state and so as to avoid double taxation of those local districts. The Legislature may also by general law reserve to the school districts such portions of the power to lay authorized excess levies as it may deem appropriate to enable local school districts to provide educational services which are not required to be furnished or supported by the state. If a statewide excess levy for the support of free schools is approved by the required majority, the revenue from such a statewide excess levy shall be deposited in the state treasury and be allocated first for the local obligations assumed

and thereafter for such part of the state effort to support free schools, by appropriation or as the law submitting the levy to the voters shall require, as the case may be.

The defeat of any such proposed statewide excess levy for school purposes shall not in any way abrogate or impair any local existing excess levy for such purpose nor prevent the adoption of any future local excess levy for such purpose.

Subsection F—Implementation

In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and other provisions of this Constitution, the provisions of this section shall prevail. The Legislature shall have plenary power to provide by general law for the equitable application of this article and, as to taxes to be assessed prior to the first statewide reappraisal, to make such laws retroactive to the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-two or thereafter.

Capitation Tax

§2. Repealed.

[Editor's note.—The repeal of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, 1970; submitted by Acts, 1970, c. 21; and ratified on November 3, 1970. The amendment was designated the "Capitation Tax Repeal Amendment." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 253,638; Against ratification, 117,660; Majority, 135,978.]

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Moneys

§3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated, or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public moneys shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

§4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State, to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

§5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the state debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not to Be Granted in Certain Cases

§6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

Appropriations and Taxation for the Benefit of Counties, Municipalities or Other Political Subdivisions of the State

§6a. Notwithstanding the provisions of section six of this article, (1) the Legislature may appropriate state funds for use in matching or maximizing grants-in-aid for public purposes from the United States or any department, bureau, commission or agency thereof, or any other source, to any county, municipality or other political subdivision of the State, under such circumstances and subject to such terms, conditions and restrictions as the Legislature may prescribe by law, and (2) the Legislature may impose a state tax or taxes or dedicate a state tax or taxes or any portion thereof for the benefit of and use by counties, municipalities or other political subdivisions of the State for public purposes, the proceeds of any such imposed or dedicated tax or taxes or portion thereof to be distributed to such counties, municipalities or other political subdivisions of the State under such circumstances and subject to such terms, conditions and restrictions as the Legislature may prescribe by law.

Duties of County Authorities in Assessing Taxes

§7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars valuation, except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, etc.

§8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax on all taxable property therein, in the ratio, as between the several classes or types of such taxable property, specified in section one of this article, separate and apart from and in addition to all other taxes for all other purposes, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years. Such tax, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal on bonds issued by any school district not exceeding in the aggregate three per centum of such assessed value, may be levied outside the limits fixed by section one of this article: Provided, that no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1949, p. 716; submitted by Acts 1949, c. 18; and ratified on November 7, 1950. The amendment, known as the "School Bond Amendment," inserted in the first sentence the provision as to property subject to the tax. It also added the part of the second sentence which precedes the proviso.]

Municipal Taxes to Be Uniform

§9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

School Levy and Bond Amendment

§10. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property for the support of public schools may be increased in any school district for a period not to exceed five years, and in an amount not to exceed one hundred percent of such maximum rates, if such increase is approved, in the manner provided by law, by at least a majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates provided for tax levies by school districts on the several classes of property may be used entirely for current expense purposes; and all levies required for principal and interest payments on any bonded indebtedness, now or hereafter contracted, not to exceed five percent on the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained in accordance with section eight of this article, shall be laid separate and apart and in addition to such maximum rates, but in the same proportions as such maximum rates are levied on the several classes of property.

Notwithstanding the provisions of section eight of this article relating to a vote of the people or any other provisions of this Constitution, a county board of education may contract indebtedness and issue bonds for public school purposes as provided by law, if, when submitted to a vote of the people of the county, in the manner provided by law, the question of contracting indebtedness and issuing bonds is approved by a majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

[Editor's note.—This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 840; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1957, c. 17; and ratified November 4, 1958. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 282,423; Against ratification, 165,741; Majority, 116,682.

The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 14, Acts, 1982, p. 785; and ratified at the General Election, November 2, 1982. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,912; Against ratification, 240,905; Majority, 8,007.

The purpose of this section is to permit county school levies, indebtedness and bonds to be approved by a simple majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property for the support of public schools may be increased in any school district for a period not to exceed five years, and in an amount not to exceed one hundred percent of such maximum rates, if such increase is approved, in the manner provided by law, by at least sixty percent of the qualified voters of the school district.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates provided for tax levies by school districts on the several classes of property may be used entirely for current expense purposes; and all levies required for principal and interest payments on any bonded indebtedness, now or hereafter contracted, not to exceed five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained in accordance with section eight of this article, shall be laid separate and apart and in addition to such maximum rates, but in the same proportions as such maximum rates are levied on the several classes of property.”]

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

§1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: Provided, that nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio river by line of the James river, Greenbrier, New river and Great Kanawha.

Corporate Liability for Indebtedness

§2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint-stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

§3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: Provided, that nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any bona fide contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

Rights of Stockholders

§4. The Legislature shall provide by law that every corporation, other than a banking institution, shall have power to issue one or more classes and series within classes of stock, with or without par value, with full, limited or no voting powers, and with preferences and special rights and qualifications, and that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder holding stock having the right to vote for directors, shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 5, Acts 1957, p. 839; submitted by Acts 1957, c. 18; and ratified on November 4, 1958. The amendment inserted the provisions as to laws empowering corporations, other than banking institutions, to issue stock in classes with or without par value and with full, limited or no voting rights, and limited the provisions as to voting to stock having right to vote for directors.]

Street Railroads

§5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

§6. The Legislature may provide by general law for the creation, organization, and regulation of banking institutions.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment to this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts 1937, p. 581; submitted by Acts 1937, c. 7; and ratified November 8, 1938. Prior to the amendment the section read as follows: "The Legislature may provide, by a general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders."]

Railroads

§7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the conditions of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

§8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads Public Highways

§9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freights, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discriminations between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations to Be Established

§10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines—Legislative Permission

§11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

§12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

§1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

Supervision of Free Schools

§2. The general supervision of the free schools of the State shall be vested in the West Virginia board of education, which shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law. The board shall consist of nine members to be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for overlapping terms of nine years, except that the original appointments shall be for terms of one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, and nine years, respectively. No more than five members of the boards shall belong to the same political party, and in addition to the general qualifications otherwise required by the Constitution, the Legislature may require other specific qualifications for membership on the board. No member of the board may be removed from office by the governor except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the governor of State elective officers.

The West Virginia board of education shall, in the manner prescribed by law, select the state superintendent of free schools who shall serve at its will and pleasure. He shall be the chief school officer of the State and shall have powers and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

The state superintendent of free schools shall be a member of the board of public works as provided by subsection B, section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts 1957, c. 19; and ratified on November 4, 1958. The amendment rewrote this section. Prior to the amendment this section pertained only to the state superintendent of free schools.]

County Superintendents

§3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

§4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the state of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the state of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir, and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporation; all moneys that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund, to be called the "school fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities cannot be obtained, then said "school fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the governor, superintendent of free schools, auditor and treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "board of the school fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "school fund": Provided, that all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[*Editor's note.*—The Irreducible School Fund Amendment, ratified on November 4, 1902, and set forth at the end of the Constitution, provides that the accumulation of the school fund provided for in this section shall cease, that all moneys in the fund over one million dollars and interest on the fund shall be used for support of the free schools, and that all money and taxes formerly payable into the treasury to the credit of the school fund shall be credited to the general school fund for the support of the free schools.]

Support of Free Schools

§5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "school fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

[*Editor's note.*—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, 1970; submitted by Acts 1970, c. 21; and ratified on November 3, 1970. The amendment, which also repealed W. Va. Const., art. X, § 2, was designated the "Capitation Tax Repeal Amendment." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 253,638; Against ratification, 117,660; Majority, 135,978.]

School Districts

§6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

Levies for School Purposes

§7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be

prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlement with the county court; which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited*

§8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

[*Under the Federal Constitution, as interpreted by the United States Supreme Court, this section has been rendered null and void and is now of no force and effect.]

Certain Acts Prohibited

§9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under state control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: Provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

§10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

§11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any state normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

§12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage, moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvements; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provision for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

§1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

§2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

§3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the state of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said states at sales made for the nonpayment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the state taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if

there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited, would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all state taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865, and have paid all state taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

§4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

Former Owner's Privilege

§5. The former owner of any such land, shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter.

Land Books—Taxes

§6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein, entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with state, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfeited, and title vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with state, county and district taxes, on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: Provided, such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

[Editor's note.]—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts 1933, 2nd Ex. Sess., p. 583; submitted by Acts 1933, 2nd Ex. Sess., c. 72; and ratified on November 6, 1934. The amendment rewrote this section. Prior to the amendment this section provided for the forfeiture of tracts containing one thousand acres or more, did not expressly provide for owners of undivided interests, and did not mention county and district taxes.

It was held, before the amendment, that although this section provided for the forfeiture of lands containing one thousand acres or more, it did not limit such forfeiture to such tracts, and that an act providing for the forfeiture of a less number of acres than one thousand, for nonentry upon the land books, was merely cumulative and not inhibited by this section of the Constitution.]

ARTICLE XIV**Amendments**

§1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention, until, at least, one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

§2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either house of the Legislature at any regular or extraordinary session thereof; and if the same, being read on three several days in each house, be agreed to on its third reading, by two thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, at a special election, or at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published, at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. If a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately, but an amendment may relate to a single subject or to related subject matters and may amend or modify as many articles and as many sections of the Constitution as may be necessary and appropriate in order to accomplish the objectives of the amendment. Whenever one or more amendments are submitted at a special election, no other question, issue or matter shall be voted upon at such special election, and the cost of such special election throughout the State shall be paid out of the state treasury.

[Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts, Regular Session, 1960, p. 833; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1960, c. 5; and ratified November 8, 1960. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 222,210; Against ratification, 114,530; Majority, 107,680.

It added the words "but an amendment may relate to a single subject or to related subject matters and may amend or modify as many articles and as many sections of the Constitution as may be necessary and appropriate in order to accomplish the objectives of the amendment."

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Regular Session, 1971, p. 1041; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1971, c. 17; and ratified November 7, 1972. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 391,390; Against ratification, 145,918; Majority, 245,472.

It inserted the words "at any regular or extraordinary session" in the first sentence; provided for submitting proposed amendments to the voters at special elections as well as general elections; and added the last sentence as it appears in the section above.]

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION**The Judicial Amendment**

The supreme court of appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five, and the governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five. The judges of

the supreme court of appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

[**Editor's note.**—This amendment was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts 1901, p. 462; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902.]

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all moneys to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of the free schools of this State.

All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provision of the said section four, to the credit of the school fund, shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

[**Editor's note.**—This amendment was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 11, Acts 1901, p. 465; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified on November 4, 1902.]

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the State, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

[**Editor's note.**—This amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1919, p. 502; submitted by Acts 1919, c. 77; and ratified on November 2, 1920.

The authority as to additional bonds granted by this amendment is revoked as of January 1, 1965, by the "Better Roads Amendment," ratified on November 3, 1964, and set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing, or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

[**Editor's note.**—This amendment was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17, Acts 1927, p. 361; submitted by Acts 1927, c. 29; and ratified on November 6, 1928.]

Fifty Million Dollar Bond Issue for Roads Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate fifty million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February fifteenth, one thousand nine hundred nineteen, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, and Senate Joint Resolution No. 17, adopted

by the Legislature at the regular session, one thousand nine hundred twenty-seven, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction, or for assisting in building and constructing a system of state secondary roads and highways.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, not to exceed in the aggregate ninety million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated solely for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of World War I and World War II. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States in World War I between the sixth day of April, one thousand nine hundred seventeen, and the eleventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred eighteen, both dates inclusive, or in World War II between the seventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred forty-one, and the second day of September, one thousand nine hundred forty-five, both dates inclusive, or in both such wars, who were bona fide residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such forces, and who within the periods specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unremarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Korean Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, for the following purposes:

(1) The paying of a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who served during the Korean conflict. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand nine hundred fifty, and the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand

nine hundred fifty-three, both dates inclusive, who were bona fide residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such service, and who within the period specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amounts shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unmarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

The principal amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose provided in paragraph (1) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the ninety million dollars bonds authorized by the Veterans Bonus Amendment submitted by chapter nineteen of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia of one thousand nine hundred forty-nine, regular session, and ratified by the people of West Virginia at the general election held on the seventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred fifty (hereinafter referred to as "Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty"), which shall not have been issued on the date of the ratification of this amendment by the people of West Virginia: Provided, however, that such bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (1) above may be funded or refunded at any time in the manner provided in paragraph (2) below.

(2) The funding or refunding of all or any part of the bonds heretofore issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty. Said bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty may be so funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty mature or are callable prior to maturity.

The principal amount of bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (2) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

Such bonds for the purposes authorized in paragraphs (1) and (2) above may be issued from time to time as separate issues for such purposes or as combined issues for such purposes.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds is finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds. The additional

taxes on cigarettes and nonintoxicating beer and additional charges on the sale of each bottle of alcoholic liquor, provided for in chapters six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, shall continue to be pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty, or bonds issued pursuant to this amendment to fund or refund such bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty: Provided, however, that upon the funding or refunding of all outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty, or the deposit in trust of sufficient funds to pay all the principal of and interest on such outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty to their respective dates of maturity or to the first date upon which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, the taxes and charges provided for in said chapters six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, may be pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on any bonds issued under any of the provisions of this amendment.

Better Roads Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction of state roads and highways provided for by this Constitution and the laws enacted thereunder. Such bonds may be issued and sold in amounts not to exceed twenty million dollars in any fiscal year. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall, at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

The authority to issue and sell and have outstanding additional bonds granted by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, is hereby revoked as of January 1, 1965, but said amendment shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect.

Roads Development Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate three hundred fifty million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction of free state roads and highways provided for by this Constitution and the laws enacted thereunder. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall, at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

Better School Buildings Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall, notwithstanding the provisions of section six, article ten of this Constitution or any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, be distributed to such county boards of education as qualify therefor by meeting such conditions, qualifications and requirements as shall be prescribed by general law and used and appropriated by such county boards of education solely for the construction, renovation or remodeling of elementary or secondary public school buildings or facilities, the equipping of the same in connection with any such construction, renovation or remodeling and the acquisition and preparation of sites for elementary or secondary public school buildings or facilities. Such bonds may be issued and sold at such time or times and in such amount or amounts as the Legislature shall authorize. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty-four years, and all such taxes so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of the bonds.

Better Highways Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate five hundred million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the following purposes and in the following amounts:

- (1) One hundred twenty million dollars for bridge replacement and improvement program;
- (2) One hundred thirty million dollars for completion of the Appalachian Highway System;
- (3) Fifty million dollars for upgrading sections of trunkline and feeder systems;
- (4) Fifty million dollars for upgrading West Virginia State Route 2;
- (5) One hundred million dollars for upgrading state and local service roads;
- (6) Fifty million dollars for construction, reconstruction, improving and upgrading of U. S. Route 52 between Huntington and Bluefield, West Virginia.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and the principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

Vietnam Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall provide by law, either for the appropriation from the general revenues of the State, or for the issuance and sale of state bonds, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, or a combination of both as the Legislature may determine, for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who were in active service during the periods hereinafter described. Such

bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred sixty-four, and the date determined by the President or Congress of the United States as the end of involvement of United States armed forces in the Vietnam conflict, both dates inclusive, who were bona fide residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such active service and for a period of at least six months immediately prior thereto, who have not been separated from such service under conditions other than honorable, and who, within the period specified above, actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such bonus shall also be paid to any person, otherwise eligible under the preceding sentence, who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States prior to the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred sixty-four, and who received the Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal. Such bonus shall also be paid to any veteran, otherwise qualified under either of the two sentences next preceding, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the armed forces because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of twenty dollars per month for each month of active service, or major fraction thereof, for veterans who received the Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal or the Vietnam service medal, up to four hundred dollars, and ten dollars per month for each month of active service, or major fraction thereof, for veterans who have not received the Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal or the Vietnam service medal, up to three hundred dollars. Not more than one bonus shall be paid to or on behalf of the service of any one veteran.

The bonus to which any deceased veteran would have been entitled, if living, shall be paid to the following surviving relatives of such veterans, if such relatives are residents of the State when such application is made and if such relatives are living at the time payment is made: Any unmarried widow or widower, or, if none, all children, stepchildren and adopted children under the age of eighteen, or, if none, any parent, stepparent, adoptive parent or person standing in loco parentis. The categories of persons listed shall be treated as separate categories listed in order of entitlement and where there be more than one member of a class, the bonus shall be paid to each member according to his proportional share. Where a deceased veteran's death was connected with such service and resulted from such service during the time period specified, however, the surviving relatives shall be paid, in accordance with the same order of entitlement, the sum of five hundred dollars in lieu of any bonus to which the deceased might have been entitled if living.

The principal amount of any bonds issued for the purpose of paying the bonuses provided for in this amendment shall not exceed the principal amount of forty million dollars, but may be funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds mature or are callable prior to maturity. The principal amount of any refunding bonds issued under the provisions of this paragraph shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

The bonds may be issued from time to time for the purposes authorized by this amendment as separate issues or as combined issues.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or a tax on any other tobacco products, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine or liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any combination of one or more thereof, or such other dedicated tax as the Legislature may determine, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until

such principal of and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds.

The Legislature shall have the power to enact legislation necessary and proper to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Qualified Veterans Housing Bonds Amendment

The Legislature shall have the power to authorize the issuing and selling of general obligation bonds of the State which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The aggregate annual amount payable on all such bonds, including both principal and interest, shall be limited such that the debt service accruing on such bonds in any fiscal year shall not exceed \$35,000,000, exclusive of any amounts payable on such bonds for which moneys or securities have been irrevocably set aside and dedicated solely for the purpose of such payment. The proceeds of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated to provide financing for owner-occupied residences for persons determined by the Legislature to be qualified veterans, except that (i) part of the proceeds from each separate issuance of bonds may be set aside as a reserve for the purposes of the Veterans' Mortgage Fund herein authorized and (ii) proceeds may be dedicated for the payment of principal, redemption price or interest on any such bonds to be refunded. Such bonds may be issued and sold at such time or times and in such amount or amounts as the Legislature shall authorize. All proceeds of such bonds, and all revenues derived from the use and investment of such proceeds, shall be deposited in a separate fund of the State, designated as the Veterans' Mortgage Fund. Amounts in such fund shall be used solely for the purposes of making loans for qualified veterans, providing for the payment or redemption of such bonds and the interest thereon, and providing for the payment of necessary expenses in connection therewith. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding forty years, and all such taxes so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds until the obligation of the State with respect to the payment of such principal and interest has been discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of such bonds. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys on deposit in the Veterans' Mortgage Fund are insufficient to pay all amounts accruing on such bonds in such year.

The Legislature shall have the power to enact legislation to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Prohibition amendment, prohibiting forever the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors within the State. Rejected. Vote for, 41,668; against, 76,555.

Legislative amendment, providing that no session of the Legislature should continue longer than sixty days without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House. Rejected. Vote for, 30,445; against, 79,631.

1902

Registration law amendment, providing for the enactment of registration laws by the Legislature. Adopted. Vote for, 55,196; against, 25,379.

Executive department amendment, providing for the election and qualification of a secretary of state. Adopted. Vote for, 59,509; against, 22,022.

Salary amendment, providing for the payment of such salaries to officials as may be established by law. Adopted. Vote for, 56,280; against, 23,513.

Judicial amendment, providing that the supreme court of appeals shall consist of five judges, who shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law. Adopted. Vote for, 54,676; against, 24,710.

Irreducible school fund amendment, relating to the permanent and invested school fund. Adopted. Vote for, 56,694; against, 24,763.

Qualification amendment, eliminating appointive officials from provisions of section 4, Article IV of the Constitution. Rejected. Vote for, 39,162; against, 40,626.

Salary increase amendment, providing for an increase in compensation for county commissioners. Rejected. Vote for, 31,059; against, 51,455.

1910

Qualification amendment, providing for the appointment of female citizens to certain offices within the State. Rejected. Vote for, 44,168; against, 45,044.

Supreme court amendment, increasing the number of supreme court judges to seven. Rejected. Vote for, 36,427; against, 52,578.

1912

Prohibition amendment, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating malt, vinous or spirituous liquors. Adopted. Vote for, 164,945; against, 72,603.

1916

County court amendment, providing for increase in compensation for county commissioners. Rejected. Vote for, 80,674; against, 130,023.

Proposed Female Suffrage Amendment. Rejected. Vote for, 63,540; against, 162,158.

1918

Budget amendment, providing for adoption of a budget system. Adopted. Vote for, 51,405; against, 26,651.

1920

Good roads amendment, providing for a fifty million dollar bond issue for the construction and maintenance of good roads. Adopted. Vote for, 248,689; against, 130,569.

Legislative amendment, providing for a split session of the Legislature, and for payment to each member of five hundred dollars per annum. Adopted. Vote for, 160,929; against, 122,744.

1926

Budget amendment, providing for amendment to section 51 of Article VI. Rejected. Vote for, 126,125; against, 134,842.

Property qualification amendment, providing for collection of taxes on money, notes, accounts receivable, and bonds, at a rate not to exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars actual value. Rejected. Vote for, 111,927; against, 159,653.

1928

Good roads amendment, providing for a bond issue of thirty-five million dollars for the construction of good roads. Adopted. Vote for, 360,597; against, 92,885.

Legislative amendment, providing for a legislative session of sixty days. Adopted. Vote for, 275,374; against, 85,123.

1930

Lieutenant-Governor amendment, providing for the election of a lieutenant governor. Rejected. Vote for, 48,781; against, 172,703.

Probate commissioner amendment, providing for the appointment of a probate commissioner in each county. Rejected. Vote for, 50,674; against, 173,447.

Budget amendment, providing for an amendment to section 51, Article VI. Rejected. Vote for, 50,226; against, 171,464.

Circuit Court amendment, providing for the division of the State into circuits by the Legislature. Rejected. Vote for, 49,902; against, 170,220.

1932

Tax limitation amendment, providing for the classification of property for taxation purposes. Adopted. Vote for, 335,482; against, 43,931.

1934

Prohibition amendment, providing for the repeal of the prohibition amendment. Adopted. Vote for, 276,978; against, 237,559.

CHARITABLE**WEST VIRGINIA CHILDREN'S HOME****Elkins 26241***Director: Carson W. Markley.*

Located in Randolph County, the West Virginia Children's Home was established by an Act of the Legislature in 1917. The two-story brick structure is situated on a 17-acre tract which includes playground equipment, an open air swimming pool, and a modern school with adjoining gymnasium facilities.

The West Virginia Children's Home is operated and administered by the West Virginia Department of Human Services.

Originally an orphanage for neglected children, the Home now provides non-secure residential diagnostic and short-term treatment services to adolescent youth. Placements are voluntary. The Home provides an array of educational, recreational, and cultural enrichment programs together with its regimen of diagnostic services.

The aim is to provide each child with the emotional and educational tools to enable a return to his or her community.

CORRECTIONAL**ANTHONY CENTER****Neola 24961***Superintendent: Wyetta Fredericks. Capacity: 100.*

Anthony Center is located at Neola in Greenbrier County on Route 92, near White Sulphur Springs. This sixty-one acre site, initially established and operated by the Federal Government as a Job Corps center, was leased in 1970 from the United States Forest Service for its present purpose. The Center houses youthful male offenders between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one who have been adjudicated guilty of a crime, other than a capital offense, and who in the opinion of the committing court are amenable to rehabilitative programs not requiring close confinement. The period of incarceration is six months, or longer if deemed advisable by the Center Superintendent, but may not exceed two years.

The institution provides individual and group counseling, a comprehensive academic and vocational training curriculum, job and/or educational placement, a work program, religious opportunities, and a recreational program.

The academic and vocational education programs integrated with extensive counseling serve as the treatment vehicle. Residents are placed in groups of eight to ten and function as a group in their daily activities. Peer pressure originating in the group is asserted to help internalize socially acceptable values, and displace counter-productive behavior patterns acquired prior to placement at Anthony Center. Guidance is provided by the staff who employ the Peer Group Interaction technique - utilizing peer approval and acceptance to encourage appropriate conduct and attitude. An extension of the educational and counseling programs is recourse to psychological services provided by a practicing clinical psychologist who is on site two days each week.

Academic courses offered are history, math, reading, English, social studies, and science. Special Education services are available as needed for teaching language arts and math. Vocational courses available are woodworking, welding, masonry, auto mechanics, building maintenance, with a "special needs" program being implemented to supplement the needs of the disadvantaged student. Each of the vocational courses have three levels of achievement, so that an individual can work at his particular level. The main objective of the educational program is to teach each resident an employable skill. This is accomplished by first, the student obtaining his GED (General Education Diploma) and then reaching a level of proficiency in at least one phase of any of the vocational courses. Classes are taught year round by eleven full-time certified teachers. The last phase of the program is to place each resident in a job or educational system prior to release.

Work details involve the kitchen, laundry, barracks, vehicles, water and sewage systems, and general institutional upkeep. Job simulated projects include community beautification and construction projects, along with road and stream clean-up.

A local clergyman holds worship services on a weekly basis for all interested residents. He also provides individual counseling for residents when needed.

The year-round recreational program consists of softball, horseshoes, volleyball, basketball, football, and weight lifting. When the weather permits, swimming is also included on the agenda. The spacious gymnasium makes it possible for residents to participate in indoor sports during the winter months. This program is based on one hundred percent participation.

Upon completion of the academic, vocational, and counseling programs, residents are placed in a pre-release group. In pre-release they are given additional responsibilities and privileges in a program designed to de-institutionalize and prepare them for return to society at large.

HUTTONSVILLE CORRECTIONAL CENTER

Huttonsville 26273

Warden: C. M. White. Deputy Warden: Franklin D. Phares. Capacity: 696.

The Huttonsville Correctional Center is located on a farm near Huttonsville in Randolph County, approximately 18 miles south of Elkins on U.S. Route 250. It was created by an Act of the Legislature in 1937 to relieve overcrowding at the West Virginia Penitentiary. It remained a branch of the parent institution until 1947, at which time the Legislature established it as a separate entity - the West Virginia Medium Security Prison. In 1970, the Center received its current name by Legislative Act.

The primary form of employment for the inmates has always been general farm work. Although by Act of the Legislature in 1977 the 5,000 acre farm was turned over to the Farm Management Commission, with a resultant change of agricultural emphasis from labor intensive general purpose farming to beef cattle production, the largest single inmate labor effort remains on the farm. Many educational programs, both vocational and academic, are offered to interested inmates. These classes give them an opportunity to engage in rehabilitative efforts during their non-working hours. Through the cooperation of the Department of Education's Adult Basic Education program, inmates are provided classes in remedial reading and are able to work toward, and obtain, GED certificates. A Special Education program offers remediation to handicapped students. Vocational courses include auto mechanics, auto body repair, welding, machine shop, typing, electricity and Braille transcribing. Basic college classes are offered through West Virginia Wesleyan College's "Outreach" program. The ACT is administered on a bi-monthly schedule. An Art Class offers inmates instruction in basic drawing and painting, the music class provides instruction in piano, guitar and banjo. A leatherworking craft class has been established.

The institution has, since 1970, served as the intake point for all adult male felons sentenced to the custody of the Department of Corrections. Upon reception, inmates are placed in the Diagnostic and Classification Unit for a period of approximately four weeks, during which time they undergo diagnostic testing, interviews, counseling, and evaluation. Based upon the information gathered during this period, each inmate is individually classified for transfer to the West Virginia Penitentiary or for integration into the Center's population with concurrent recommendations for placement in rehabilitative programming. Since

1972, the various county courts have had the option of sending convicted, but not sentenced, adult male felons to the Diagnostic Unit for a 60 day evaluation. Those sentenced for this purpose undergo a regimen similar to the one experienced by regularly committed inmates, but somewhat more rigorous. A report is then provided the court which attempts to describe the man's personality, make some broad predictions about future tendencies, and offer some options for consideration by the Judge prior to deciding between probation and incarceration. Living quarters at this facility consist of military barracks style dormitories. There are no provisions for extended individual confinement.

The population increased to a record high of seven hundred and twenty-nine on May 20, 1983, representing a 54.8 percent increase over the five year period from June 1, 1978.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR YOUTH

Industrial 26375

Superintendent: Ronald Gregory. Capacity: 85.

The West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth is located one mile west of Salem on old U.S. Route 50. It was established by an Act of the Legislature on February 18, 1897, and formally opened May 5, 1899. It was built on a 61 acre tract; 11 acres have since been returned to the City of Salem for use as a City Park.

From Jones Cottage, the first building, the physical plant has grown to include the following buildings: Silver Hall Cottage (1914); Sutton Cottage (1928); Ava Stanard Cottage (1942); New Jones Cottage (1961). The Administration Building built in 1942, houses the administrative offices and a residence for the Superintendent. The complex also includes Johnston High School, erected in 1915, and a modern gymnasium completed in 1951. A large four-temperature storage building was completed in 1951.

The Industrial Home for Youth provides treatment services for both male and female juveniles who have been adjudicated delinquent.

The rehabilitation program is based on individual treatment plans established with the youth and his treatment team. These plans establish long and short term goals with the child for behavioral, educational, and emotional needs. The resident meets with his counselor on a regular weekly basis to discuss strategies for attainment of these goals.

In addition to the therapeutic programs, residents also have the opportunity to receive individual counseling from a licensed clinical psychologist and counselor. The psychologist also conducts an evaluation for each new resident.

It is the goal of the educational personnel to help each student be successful in learning situations, thus building positive attitudes toward learning. The educational programs offered at the Industrial Home for Youth include: Special Education, Basic Education, Physical Education, Vocational Education, Life Skills Class and G.E.D. If the students meet the requirements, they also have the opportunity to attend Salem College or the Gore Vocational Center. Each resident's educational curriculum is designed to meet individual needs.

In addition to the population which has been sentenced to the Industrial Home for Youth, the Home also provides a Diagnostic Unit for both males and females, pursuant to West Virginia Code 40-5-13(a).

This unit houses youths adjudicated delinquent and committed for not more than a thirty-day period. These youths are completely segregated from the regular sentenced population. The Unit provides the committing court with a complete psychological and medical evaluation and with a social summary on each child.

WEST VIRGINIA PENITENTIARY

Moundsville 26041

Warden: Jerry G. Hedrick. Deputy Warden: B. C. Clutter. Capacity: 694.

The West Virginia Penitentiary is located at 818 Jefferson Avenue, Moundsville, in Marshall County. Built in 1866, it was designed as a maximum security facility for both male and female felons. This walled facility

was restricted to males in 1948 and covers an area of about six acres. Prison Industry facilities are located within the walls and the inmates are assigned to those industrial areas according to need, interest and ability. The industries produce signs, license plates and printing. These structures also house maintenance sections including plumbing, sheet metal and carpentry.

In recent years a vocational and educational program has been implemented to provide educational and vocational skill development. Inmates may obtain their G.E.D. certificates and, if qualified, participate in college courses offered in a cooperative program with West Virginia Northern Community College which is located nearby. More extensive vocational courses including auto mechanics, electronics, air conditioning and refrigeration, sheet metal, welding, and furniture refinishing are being planned. Participation in both the educational and vocational programs is voluntary.

DAVIS CENTER

Davis Center is located near the entrance to Blackwater Falls State Park in Tucker County. It was authorized by an Act of the Legislature in 1955. It is a minimum security facility that houses youthful male offenders between the ages of sixteen and eighteen who have been adjudicated delinquent by the various courts of record in the state. The period of confinement averages six months, or can be longer if deemed advisable by the Center Superintendent.

Davis Center operates a Peer Group Interaction Counseling Program. Residents are placed in groups of eight to ten where primary emphasis is directed toward developing responsibility for their actions and rebuilding their life compatible with socially acceptable behavior and goals. Each resident receives five weekly one and one-half hour group sessions.

A diagnostic program is offered to assess the residents' strengths and weaknesses in academic, vocational and personality areas. Individual counseling and drug and alcohol classes are provided.

A full prescriptive educational program is offered which includes remedial, Graduate Education Diploma (GED), post-high school or college preparatory. Educational classes are held in a new 5,000 square-foot School Building, the Withrow Educational Center, which was constructed entirely by residents and staff as part of the institution's Building Construction class.

Vocational classes consist of auto mechanics, welding, woodworking, and building construction. Additional classes in auto-body, building construction, power mechanics and welding are offered at the nearby Arch Moore Career Center.

A full range of recreational activities is offered, including basketball, volleyball, weight lifting, swimming and softball. Recreational activities also utilize nearby state parks and the natural mountain beauty of the Monongahela National Forest. Non-denominational religious services are held each Sunday.

Through the use of the Peer Group Interaction Program, young men receive counseling and guidance by their peers with adult assistance. No form of corporal punishment is used. A young man's stay depends on developing responsibility for caring and concern for group members, as well as fulfilling his contract. Ultimately, a major goal is to enhance the young man's capabilities of making socially accepted choices and decisions after his release back into society.

ADULT/JUVENILE PROBATION AND PAROLE SERVICES

During the Fiscal Year 1984-85 Probation and Parole had responsibility for monitoring approximately 2,200 persons who were either on probation and parole in West Virginia or were moving in or out of the State via the Interstate Compact System.

Work/Study Release Centers

Work/Study Release is a community-based program operated by the Department of Corrections with three Centers located in Charleston, Beckley and Huntington.

The Charleston and the Beckley Centers house approximately seventy inmates each and Huntington Center houses thirty. All centers are co-ed.

Inmates are selected who are near parole eligibility or discharge. Some are employed in community jobs, while others take advantage of local educational or vocational opportunities.

The purpose of this program is to ease the inmates' transition from the correctional institution back into the community and at the same time provide financial support for the family of inmates.

ANDREW S. ROWAN MEMORIAL HOME

Sweet Springs 24980

Administrator: S. Mason Preston. Clinical Director: Malcom Harris, M.D. Average Daily Population: 180.

Located in the picturesque Sweet Springs valley of Monroe County, the Andrew S. Rowan Memorial Home was established by an Act of the Legislature in 1945. The facility is named in honor of Col. Andrew Summers Rowan, a Monroe County native, famous for his Spanish-American War exploits when he was the man who carried the "Message to Garcia".

The buildings and grounds are rich with history and tradition. The "Old Sweet" dates back as an old resort to the late 1700s and has hosted many Presidents, statesmen and foreign dignitaries. The oldest and largest building still in use, completed in 1833, is of the Thomas Jefferson design and named in his honor. A 96-bed annex was added in 1956 and the most recent addition, a 100-bed wing, was completed in October 1974. The State has taken great pains to maintain the historical integrity of the architecture throughout the expansions.

Serving senior citizens of West Virginia as a personal care nursing home, the Rowan facility provides 24-hour nursing coverage in the least possible restrictive setting. It tries to maintain a true "Home" setting for its residents. In addition a Respite Care service was established in 1981 to provide a maximum of two weeks of temporary care to State residents over 60 who meet the other admission requirements. This service has proved especially helpful to families needing proper supervision of elderly relatives for short periods of time.

COLIN ANDERSON CENTER

St. Marys 26170

Administrator: William E. Richards, Jr. Clinical Director: Canon Zerrudo, M.D. Average Daily Population: 313.

Colin Anderson Center is located one mile north of St. Marys, on State Route 2, in Pleasants County. Established in 1921 by an Act of the Legislature, it was formerly known as the West Virginia Training School. In 1965, the Legislature changed the name of the institution to Colin Anderson Center, in honor of the late Dr. Anderson who served as superintendent with dedication and devotion from 1958 until his death in 1964.

The Colin Anderson Center functions as a training and residential center for the developmentally disabled, and as a research and training center for developing new and adapting existing methods of treatment and training, as well as providing learning opportunity for students of the many professions dealing with developmental disabilities. Of the 368 beds, 156 are certified for Title XIX Medicaid as an Intermediate Care Facility/Mental Retardation provider.

The center provides a full range of habilitative services including medical, housing and food services, psychological, speech and hearing, recreational, prevocational, and such other services as may be required in order to allow the resident to function at his highest level.

DENMAR HOSPITAL

Administrator: James W. Burke. Average Daily Population: 170.

Located near Hillsboro, in Pocahontas County, Denmar Care Center provides intermediate nursing care services for 155 residents in the main building and personal care services for 20 residents in unit seven.

Denmar's major objective is to provide complete inpatient services for 175 residents who are legal residents of West Virginia, and also meet medical necessity and financial eligibility to be admitted to Denmar Care Center.

Denmar has completed all the service/program requirements for 155 beds to be certified for an Intermediate Care Facility under federal rules and regulations. The last of the physical plant renovations to meet ICF standards, including fire marshal's office requirements, are also completed. Certificate of Need and Health Systems Agency's approvals for their certification have been received. Recertification was granted in July of 1985.

MARION HEALTH CARE HOSPITAL

Located in Marion County, the original Fairmont Emergency Hospital was constructed in 1899. The new Hospital was completed in January, 1980. The facility operates an Outpatient Clinic as well as a 41 bed long-term care unit and an Alcohol Treatment Program which includes detoxification, residential beds, a day treatment program and family and community education. Health services are provided to residents of Northern West Virginia.

GREENBRIER CENTER

On July 1, 1973, the campus of the former Greenbrier College for Women was purchased by the West Virginia Department of Mental Health and converted to a mental retardation center serving individuals throughout West Virginia. Greenbrier Center, located on the western slopes of the Alleghenies in the beautiful Greenbrier Valley, is situated on a campus on which learning has continually taken place since 1808.

Greenbrier Center is a short-term intensive training facility with the expressed goal of providing developmentally disabled individuals an avenue for a rapid and successful transition back into their community environment utilizing a full range of professional services.

The Center, situated in the historical section of downtown Lewisburg, is readily accessible to a variety of community services. The Center's campus contains a swimming pool, gymnasium facilities, a stable for handicapped therapeutic horseback riding, playgrounds, classrooms, a greenhouse, truck gardens, farm animals, and two cottages for more independent living experiences.

HOPEMONT
Hopemont 26764

Administrator: Charles S. Forsythe. Clinical Director: Hilton C. Rocha, M.D. Average Daily Population: 150.

Located near Terra Alta in Preston County, Hopemont was founded in 1913 (Hopemont Sanitarium) to provide treatment for tubercular patients. Legislation enacted in 1965 changed the name of the institution to Hopemont Hospital and designated the hospital as a long-term care facility for the chronically ill.

Hopemont is now a personal care home. Since July 1, 1983, residents of West Virginia who are unable to pay for care in a private home but who meet the requirements for personal care will be admitted to Hopemont.

Medical and nursing care are provided. Dental, podiatry, and eye care are available. Physiotherapy (including hydrotherapy), speech therapy, craft-occupational therapy, and recreational activities are provided.

HUNTINGTON STATE HOSPITAL**P.O. Box 448****Huntington 25709**

Administrator: Charles J. Langan, Ph.D. Clinical Director: Raymond Watson, M.D. Average Daily Population: 325.

Located in Huntington, the county seat of Cabell County, Huntington State Hospital was authorized by an Act of the Legislature in 1897.

The hospital serves patients from the seventeen-county area of Boone, Cabell, Clay, Fayette, Kanawha, Lincoln, Logan, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Monroe, Putnam, Raleigh, Summers, Wayne, and Wyoming counties.

Huntington State Hospital provides a variety of treatment for a broad range of behavioral health disorders. The physical plant includes an administration building and three ward buildings with one building being dedicated to rehabilitation services. Clinical support programs include Occupational Therapy, Recreational Therapy, Sheltered Workshop, and Special Substance Abuse Unit, which is operated by the Prætera Center for Mental Health Services, Inc.

Formal affiliation with Marshall University and other institutions of learning provide teaching opportunities for health care professionals in the fields of medicine, psychology, social work, and nursing.

LAKIN HOSPITAL**Lakin 25250**

Lakin Hospital was founded by an Act of the Legislature in 1919 and was opened in 1926 for persons suffering from mental and nervous disorders. The name of the hospital was changed in 1954 to Lakin State Hospital, and by a 1974 Act of the Legislature to Lakin Hospital.

Located approximately eight miles from Point Pleasant in Mason County, Lakin Hospital is situated on a large level plot of land adjoining many acres of farm land. The hospital has two distinct programs: a Long-Term Care facility for geriatric and adult handicapped patients and a residential program for emotionally disturbed adolescents.

Efforts are made to enhance the hospital environment to be more like in the community, to encourage independence and self-responsibility in the residents when possible. Field trips, home visits, and a camping program maintain ties to life outside the institutional setting.

The Lakin Hospital philosophy has always been one of effecting positive, progressive change and self-improvement. In accordance with this philosophy, the hospital has qualified for certification as an Intermediate Care Facility and the Adolescent Unit has completed an eight bed group home as a component in the program in order to effect a smoother transition in returning to the community. A professional teaching/therapy staff is employed in the Adolescent Unit to provide quality care, education and self-expression.

PINECREST HOSPITAL**P.O. Box 1109****Beckley 25802**

Administrator: Kyle E. Baker. Average Daily Census: 237.

Located in Raleigh County, Pinecrest Hospital was authorized by an Act of the Legislature in 1927 and opened in March of 1930.

Although Pinecrest Hospital is primarily a long-term care facility providing comprehensive geriatric services to residents requiring intermediate care, services are also provided to persons in need of custodial care. It is also the only state facility still providing inpatient care to tubercular patients. Precedence for

admission is given to applicants who are legal residents of West Virginia and those individuals who are unable to pay for care in private nursing homes.

Renovations to "C" Wing were completed in June of 1981 and the 93-bed unit was certified as an Intermediate Care Facility effective October 1, 1981, for participation in the Medicaid Program.

During the 1982 Legislative Session, an appropriation was made from the Health Facilities Revenue Fund for the establishment of a Regional Inpatient Psychiatric Unit at Pinecrest to serve Southern West Virginia. Money was also allocated for renovation, which began in June of 1984, on "B" Wing in order to meet Medicaid certification standards and to establish a Personal Care Home on the grounds to provide residential living in the least restrictive environment. It is anticipated that this renovation will be completed within two years. In addition, a group home serving as a transitional living unit for the inpatient psychiatric unit shall become operational by July 1986. This unit is intended to allow mental health patients an adjustment period prior to returning to the community.

In the spring of 1983, vacant space in the building was made available to other agencies. Since that time Veterans Affairs and the Department of Welfare have located on the grounds of Pinecrest.

SPENCER HOSPITAL

Located in Spencer, the county seat of Roane County, Spencer Hospital was authorized by an Act of the Legislature in May 1887, and formally opened in 1893.

With the development of the Hartley Plan in 1983, the mission of Spencer Hospital was changed to that of a training center for an adult Developmentally Disabled population.

Spencer Hospital has a current population of approximately 140 to 150 persons. Client services include training activities in: Vocational Skills, Physical Education and Recreation, Use of Leisure Time, Self Care Skills, Primary Skills, Academics, Physical Therapy, Cooking, Communication and Independent Living.

WELCH EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

Administrator: Earl S. Whiteley. Medical Director: Robert Hite, D. O. Director of Nursing: Susan Hogg, MSN. Estimated Daily Population: 98. Outpatient clinic visits: 24,500.

Welch Emergency Hospital, formerly Old Miners' Hospital No. 1 was established by an Act of the Legislature in 1899 and began providing patient services in January 1902, located in McDowell County, City of Welch.

Currently, Welch Emergency Hospital is developing its staff to meet its new full services Acute Care mission. Construction was completed in May 1985.

Services currently in operation and/or planned for by July 1985 are: Medical/Surgical, Outpatient Same-Day Surgery, Day Clinic, 24-hour Emergency Room, Intensive Care Unit, Obstetrics, Birthing, Substance Abuse, Long-Term Intermediate Care, Maternity/Family Planning, and Hearing and Speech services.

When fully staffed, the facility will utilize 229 full-time employees. The hospital is the site of an ARC grant to convert the new facility heating system from natural gas to coal. As a result of this project, the facility has reduced its fuel costs by 61%.

The facility is affiliated with the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine as a teaching hospital. Currently, fourth year medical students and interns assist the staff in assessing patient needs. A two-year family practice residency is planned for Fiscal Year 1986.

The services at Welch Emergency Hospital are for all members of the community. Exoneration policies are available to those patients unable to pay for part or all of their care.

WESTON HOSPITAL**Drawer 1127****Weston 26452**

West Virginia's oldest and largest mental institution. Weston Hospital is located in the City of Weston. Although authorized on March 22, 1858, by an Act of the Virginia Assembly, opening was delayed by the Civil War until October 22, 1864. Today, Weston Hospital continues to serve 38 of West Virginia's 55 counties: Marion, Monongalia, Nicholas, Preston, Ohio, Taylor, Gilmer, Berkeley, Morgan, Wetzel, Braxton, Harrison, Hampshire, Barbour, Doddridge, Lewis, Jefferson, Grant, Greenbrier, Hardy, Mineral, Pendleton, Pocahontas, Randolph, Webster, Hancock, Tucker, Upshur, Brooke, Marshall, Pleasants, Wirt, Wood, Jackson, Ritchie, Roane, Calhoun and Tyler.

The buildings and outlying camping and recreation land in conjunction with the Farm Commission occupy 616 acres of land in Lewis County. The hospital is listed on the National Register for Historical Preservation, the official list of the nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation.

In addition to improving the basic food, clothing, shelter and medical needs for the client/patients, the Weston Hospital staff provides over 200,000 client/patient treatment hours a year. There are over 118 psychiatric, social, psychological, spiritual, learning, recreational and emotional treatment needs. These services are delivered to the client/patient on an individually determined plan with the staff working as a multi-professional team. Weston Hospital is also the site of the state's only Forensic Psychiatric Unit.

Cooperative programs with West Virginia University, including the Medical School and other nearby institutions of learning, have proven beneficial to health care students and patients.

The Appalachian County Mental Health Center operates a two-level Substance Abuse Program in a separate 60-bed building on the Hospital grounds.

PUBLIC COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY

Morgantown 26506

West Virginia University combines many of the advantages of both a large and small institution. It is a comprehensive university offering 175 degree programs from the bachelor's through the doctoral level. But it is decentralized in 15 colleges and schools on two campuses in Morgantown, which helps maintain the friendly, informal atmosphere of smaller institutions.

With 19,000 students and 1,307 faculty, WVU is large enough to support academic diversity (more than 3,800 courses are offered). WVU students come from all 55 West Virginia counties, 48 other states, and 79 foreign countries. One of the University's proudest traditions is sending 20 Rhodes Scholars to Oxford University in England, which ranks WVU among the nation's top 32 institutions. WVU freshman students score well in the American College Testing Program — 20.1 compared to 18.8 nationally.

West Virginia University is one of only 24 state universities in the nation that serve as both the comprehensive and land-grant institutions in their states. They are called land-grant institutions (there are 68) because the Congressional act establishing them in 1862 gave federally owned land to each state that then sold the land and used the funds to begin a college offering programs in agriculture and engineering.

Since its founding in 1867, WVU has developed into the center of graduate and professional education, research, and extension programs in West Virginia. Coal and energy are a major focus of University research. The Personal Rapid Transit (PRT) System, which was built by the U.S. Department of Transportation as a national research and demonstration project, connects downtown Morgantown and the campuses. The PRT, perhaps the largest research and demonstration project ever built on a university campus, consists of computer-directed, electric-powered cars that operate on a concrete-and-steel guideway without drivers on board.

The Morgantown campuses contain 121 buildings on 799 acres, valued at \$348 million, and the state's only research library with 1,030,484 books, 860,185 microforms and microfilms, and 9,000 periodicals. The WVU Library maintains one of the finest regional collections of its kind, the West Virginia and Regional History Collection. The Core Arboretum is the only place in the State where many of West Virginia's native plants have been brought together in a single location.

Branches include the Charleston Division of the WVU Medical Center; Wheeling Division of the School of Medicine; Potomac State College at Keyser, the state's only residential junior college; and five off-campus graduate centers at Jackson's Mill near Weston, in Parkersburg, at Potomac State College, Shepherd College in the Eastern Panhandle, and West Liberty State College in the Northern Panhandle.

West Virginia University operates eight experimental farms in Hardy, Jefferson, Monongalia, Monroe, and Preston counties; six experimental forests in Greenbrier, Monongalia, Preston, Randolph, Raleigh, and Wetzel counties; a geology camp in Greenbrier County; and the State 4-H Camp and a museum of mid-nineteenth century life at Jackson's Mill, the boyhood home of Confederate General Stonewall Jackson that has been entered in the National Register of Historic Places.

Established as Marshall Academy in 1837, Marshall University awarded more than 1,650 undergraduate and graduate degrees at its 1985 Commencement.

Having become Marshall College in 1858 and a State normal school in 1867, Marshall was granted university status by the 55th West Virginia Legislature in 1961. Total enrollment is more than 11,000.

Marshall operates in 10 colleges and schools: College of Liberal Arts, College of Education, College of Science, College of Business, Graduate School, School of Medicine, the Community College, School of Journalism, College of Fine Arts, and School of Nursing.

Four-year degrees granted are Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Science in Cytotechnology. Two-year degrees granted are Associate in Arts, Associate in Science, Associate in Science in Nursing, Associate in Science in Cytotechnology. The Graduate School grants the degrees of Master of Arts, Master of Science, Master of Business Administration, Master of Arts in Journalism. The Doctor of Medicine professional degree is offered.

Marshall University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. The Department of Chemistry is accredited by the American Chemical Society. The School of Medicine has received full accreditation from the Liaison Committee on Medical Education. The Associate Degree and Bachelor Degree programs in nursing are accredited by the National League for Nursing. The University is approved by the American Association of University Women, and holds membership in the American Council on Education, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, and the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

The main campus occupies approximately 65 acres of land near the center of Huntington. Married student housing is located at the University Heights campus on the outskirts of the city.

Off-campus classes are conducted in many areas of the state.

Approximately \$25 million worth of construction and renovation work currently is under way or in the planning stages for the university.

Courses are offered by the College generally in the late afternoon and evening throughout a sixteen-county area of Southern West Virginia. Currently master's degree programs are offered in business administration, industrial relations, management, chemical engineering, industrial engineering, counseling, special education, educational administration, elementary education, reading education, secondary education, public administration, general engineering, school psychology, environmental studies, information systems, engineering management, humanistic studies, accounting (in conjunction with Marshall University).

The College of Graduate Studies is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education.

WEST VIRGINIA SCHOOL OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE

The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine originally was incorporated in 1972 under the name Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine. The Greenbrier Military School, which had been in continuous operation for 160 years, closed in May 1972 and was purchased in July by the West Virginia Society of Osteopathic Medicine. In December, a charter for the Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine was obtained from the State of West Virginia, and the school opened in October 1974 as a private institution with a charter class of 36 students. In January 1976 the college was brought into the State system of higher education as the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine.

The purpose of the school is to prepare osteopathic physicians who are motivated to practice in rural areas. Consistent with this purpose, the curriculum is designed to produce physicians who are confident in rural practice settings, and to assure they will have the educational competence and legal status required for licensure in all states.

The four-year college has been granted full accreditation by the American Osteopathic Association. The American Osteopathic Association is recognized by the National Commission on Accreditation as the official and only accrediting agency for osteopathic medical colleges in America.

Fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Bluefield State College has the added distinction of having certain engineering technology programs accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, Inc., and the nursing program is accredited by the West Virginia Board of Nursing Examiners and the National League for Nursing. The teacher education program is fully accredited by the West Virginia Board of Education.

WEST VIRGINIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

This institution, West Virginia's only state operated specialized technical college, was established through an Act of the Legislature in 1895.

The college opened January 4, 1897, as Montgomery Preparatory School, a branch of West Virginia University, and was renamed West Virginia Trades School in 1917.

In 1921, state authorities decided that a junior college was needed in the upper Kanawha Valley, especially for the training of much needed elementary school teachers. Enrollment rose in the newly named New River State School. By 1929, the school was a four-year college and had its first A. B. graduates. A name change occurred in 1931 to New River State College with a final change in 1941 to West Virginia Institute of Technology.

The school, popularly known as Tech, is a co-educational college, authorized to offer four years of studies leading to Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Technology degrees, and two years of studies leading to an Associate in Science and Associate in Arts degree. A program for a master's degree in engineering was approved by the West Virginia Board of Regents in 1979. The college is fully accredited by the Commission on Institutions of the North Central Association, and individual programs are accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Accreditation Commissions of the Accreditation Board of Engineering Technology (ABET), the American Chemical Society, and the American Dental Association, and the West Virginia Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses.

The Bachelor of Science degree is offered in accounting, computer management and data processing, business management, industrial management, labor studies and industrial relations, printing management, chemical engineering, civil engineering, electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, computer science, chemistry, mathematics, physics, biology education, business education, chemistry education, industrial arts education, mathematics education, music education, music administration, physical education, health and safety education, physics education, vocational technical education, public services, health services administration, and biology/business emphasis. A Bachelor's degree is also offered in mining engineering technology, electronic engineering technology, and engineering technology.

The Bachelor of Arts degree is offered in history and government, social studies education, music administration, music education, and the Board of Regents Bachelor of Arts.

The Associate in Science degree is offered in accounting, general studies, data processing, dental hygiene, general business, secretarial studies, nursing, business supervision, printing technology, medical secretarial studies, legal secretarial studies, building construction, and the following engineering technologies: civil-surveying, drafting and design, electrical, mechanical, and mining.

WEST VIRGINIA NORTHERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE

New Martinsville—Weirton—Wheeling

Established by the West Virginia Board of Regents as a dual campus comprehensive community college effective July 1, 1972, West Virginia Northern expanded to a third campus in 1973. Operational centers are located at College Square in Wheeling (administrative headquarters), 150 Park Avenue in Weirton, and 172 Main Street in New Martinsville.

West Virginia Northern represents the fusion and expansion of two streams of educational opportunity in the upper Ohio Valley. They first began with a limited college expansion program in downtown Wheeling in 1938 and culminated in the Wheeling campus of West Liberty State College in 1965. The second dates to the establishment in 1965 of a branch college in Weirton sponsored jointly by the Hancock County Board of Education and West Liberty State College. The College's service area encompasses the five northernmost counties of the State. Students from adjacent areas of Pennsylvania and Ohio also are served.

WEST VIRGINIA SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND THE BLIND

Chartered March 3, 1870. Two separate schools are located on one campus. Both schools offer a complete educational program for the hearing handicapped and the visually handicapped.

Students are enrolled at the age of five and may be enrolled at earlier ages if there is space available. Students must be educable, residents of the State of West Virginia, in good health and have a hearing or visual loss sufficient to prevent normal progress in the usual public school setting.

The schools are operated by the West Virginia Board of Education and supported by the State of West Virginia at no charge to the student or parent. Parents are to furnish clothing, incidental needs, etc., and transportation to the schools.

Both schools have the usual elementary and high school curriculum, as well as specialized classes and instructors, in order to meet the specific needs of the students. Both schools offer vocational training as well as academic training. They follow a school year calendar similar to that of the regular public schools. Visitors are encouraged to see the schools anytime the schools are in operation.

Information concerning the schools or enrollment procedures may be obtained by writing to the Superintendent.

WEST VIRGINIA REHABILITATION CENTER

Institute 25112

Operated by the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation which is governed by the State Board of Vocational Education, the West Virginia Rehabilitation Center provides a full range of rehabilitation services needed by disabled individuals in order to become employed. Rehabilitation counselors statewide arrange admission to the Center for those clients of the Division whose severe disabilities require the coordinated, intensive services that can be provided only under one roof.

Established in 1955, the Center is one of only a few such comprehensive rehabilitation centers in the United States and is supported by state and federal tax dollars. The facility is situated on a 35-acre campus 12 miles west of Charleston and consists of 12 acres of totally accessible, interconnected buildings. The staff of over 300 professional and support personnel use a rehabilitation team approach to provide services to a capacity enrollment of 400 and an annual caseload of some 1,700 disabled citizens.

The Center is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities and by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

An individual may receive one or more of the Center's specialized services:

Physical restoration: Under the direction of a Board Certified physiatrist (specialist in physical medicine and rehabilitation), the Center operates a comprehensive medical services program to minimize the effect of disability on a person's ability to work. The medical unit consists of a 70-bed treatment unit which provides nursing services to clients on a 24-hour basis, a staff of licensed physical and occupational therapists, certified speech pathologists and audiologist, X-ray department, dental clinic, medical laboratory and pharmacy. Additionally, the Center utilizes a number of medical consultants representing most specialties.

Vocational evaluation: For those persons who have never held a job or whose disability prevents their returning to a previous job, a series of job samples and tests provides information about existing job skills, work habits, interests, abilities, and possible training needs.

Vocational training: Among the 20 some vocational training courses offered are accounting, secretarial, automobile mechanics, automobile body repair, automobile servicing, data entry, food service, laundry worker, small engine repair, electronics/radio-TV servicing, horticulture, building maintenance, professional housekeeping, nursing assistant, drafting and an elective course in small business practices.

Work adjustment: An opportunity to develop good work habits, to increase work tolerance and to gain work experience is afforded sheltered workshop students. Workshop activities include woodworking, industrial cargo box assembly, glassware decoration, silkscreening, ceramics, nail packaging and various other sub-contracting jobs. Many items made by workshop students are sold in gift shops throughout the state.

Personal adjustment: Courses are designed to foster maturity, independent living skills, interpersonal relationships, appropriate social behavior and other such basic skills required in the world of work. Special personal adjustment courses are offered for deaf and severely hearing impaired students and for blind and visually impaired students. The deaf unit teaches academic and independent living skills and provides interpreter services throughout a student's entire course at the Center. The blind unit teaches orientation and mobility, communication skills and independent living/homemaking.

In addition to the primary areas listed above, the Center offers remedial education to prepare students for the GED test which is administered monthly at the Center and to tutor students who are deficient in basic academic skills. Driver education classes prepare students for obtaining a license and instruct physically disabled persons in the use of adaptive driving equipment.

The recreation building includes a gymnasium, swimming pool, weightlifting room, library, creative arts center, game room, bowling lanes, auditorium and snack bar. Concerts, shopping trips, picnics and leisure education classes are examples of regularly-scheduled group activities designed to provide an enjoyable and constructive use of leisure time.

Religious activities and non-denominational worship services are supervised by a chaplain who is available for counseling. Located on the campus is an Interfaith Chapel constructed with private funds.

ALDERSON-BROADDUS COLLEGE

Alderson-Broaddus College is a fully accredited, four-year degree-granting, liberal arts and science institution located on a 150-acre campus in Philippi, the site of the first land battle of the Civil War. The co-educational, private college is fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and affiliated with the West Virginia Baptist Convention and the American Baptist Churches, USA. The College is committed in charter and by-laws to three main purposes:

- 1) good academic instruction
- 2) a Christian environment for learning, and
- 3) the instilling of a service motivation in its students. Its enrollment is just over eight hundred students and the total full-time College faculty numbers about sixty, thirty-five percent with earned doctorates.

The College offers a number of career-oriented programs but each field of study requires a thorough grounding in the liberal arts and sciences. Over the years, teacher education has been a strong major at the institution and more recently, special education for the learning disabled, the mentally retarded, and the gifted have been additions in this department. In 1945, the College inaugurated the state's first degree program in nursing. In 1967, the school initiated the nation's first degree program for physician's assistants. These health programs, along with other allied health majors, are made possible by a close affiliation with Broaddus Hospital, located on the College campus and by affiliation with other health delivery institutions nearby.

Alderson-Broaddus has recently installed the largest and most up-to-date computer on a private college campus, and has instituted majors in computer science, management information systems, and Christian Studies for bi-vocational ministers. Alderson-Broaddus has the only accredited Social Work program on a private college campus in the state.

The College operates on a semester system, emphasizing concentration of learning, efficient utilization of facilities, and enrichment for students through a number of opportunities which include:

- 1) independent study
- 2) study in other cultures
- 3) internship opportunities with business and industry and various health and social agencies, and
- 4) Christian and humanitarian service projects.

Many students complete at least one term of off-campus internship as part of their graduation requirements.

More than half of the students at Alderson-Broaddus are from West Virginia, with another fourth from Pennsylvania and Ohio, and the balance from 29 other states and eight foreign countries. While the College is proud of its Baptist heritage and its active church relatedness, its religious emphasis is conceived in broad terms to serve all backgrounds with the intent of exposing rather than imposing. Total student costs for the 1985-86 academic year are \$7,263. Over ninety percent of the students receive significant scholarship, grant-in-aid, and work opportunity assistance. The College believes there is a significant growth factor for students in the residential campus living arrangement. Ninety percent of the single students are resident on campus, and married couple facilities are available in modern College owned and managed apartments.

The main campus of the College occupies approximately 90 acres of land, on which are located academic, religious, administrative, and auxiliary enterprise buildings. Modern academic buildings provide excellent laboratory facilities in addition to adequate space for classrooms and offices. There are seventeen major buildings, including dormitories and food service facilities. All structures in use on the campus have been completed since 1956, with most having been completed between 1965 and 1980. The most recently developed buildings on the campus include Wilcox Chapel (1976) and New Main Hall (1980), the complex which houses all the major administrative operations of the College.

The Appalachian Bible College is an independent, co-educational Bible college whose central objective is the training of men and women for various branches of the Christian ministry. Current matriculation is 188. Approximately one-third of the student body comes from West Virginia. Over 20 other states are represented.

The campus comprises 110 acres located at the junction of W. Va. Route 16 and U.S. Highway 19, (Corridor "L") at the North Beckley Interchange of the West Virginia Turnpike, three miles north of Beckley. The land, buildings, and property are valued at approximately \$4 million. Five major buildings on campus include an administration-library-dining room building, a women's dormitory, a men's dormitory, music buildings, and a classroom building.

Subsidized by the gifts of churches and individuals, the college's cost to students is kept low. Registration, fees, tuition, and board and room costs amount to \$4,892 per year. Some scholarships and work opportunities are available.

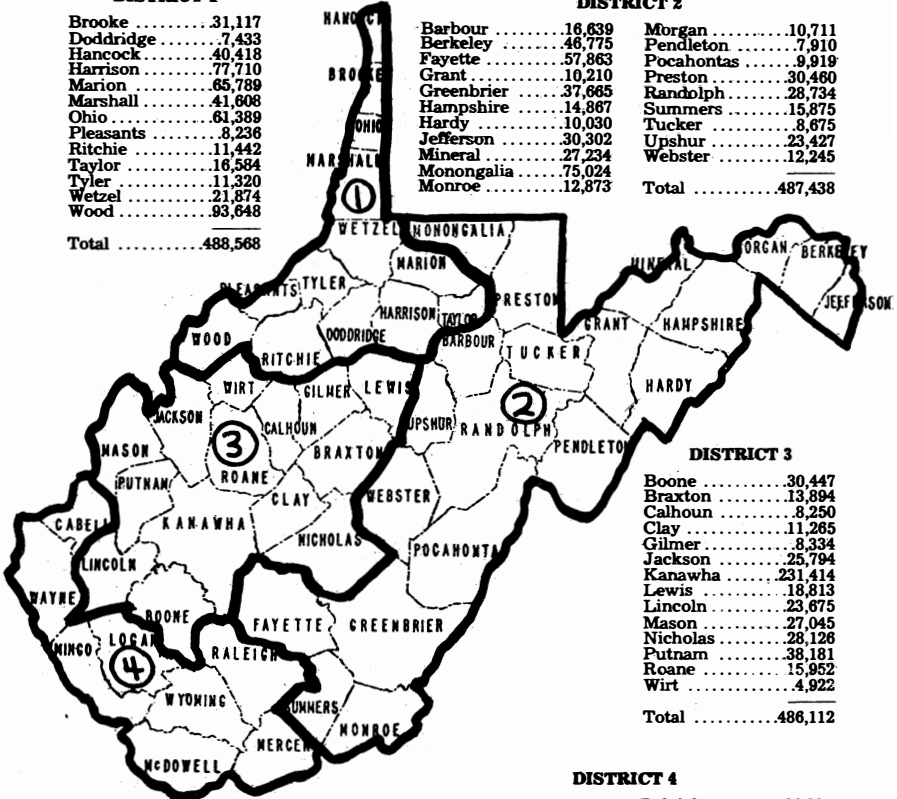

BYRD (D) of Sophia, Raleigh County; born in North Wilkesboro, North Carolina; Baptist; J.D. cum laude, American University; married Erma Ora James; two daughters: Mrs. Mohammad (Mona Byrd) Fatemi and Mrs. Jon (Marjorie Byrd) Moore; six grandchildren, Erik, Darius, and Fredrik Fatemi and Michael (deceased), Mona, and Mary Anne Moore; 33rd Mason, and awarded "Grand Cross of the Court of Honour" (the highest individual decoration bestowed by the Supreme Council); received the Father Thomas L. 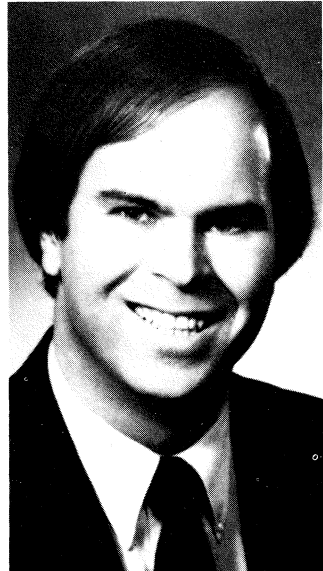


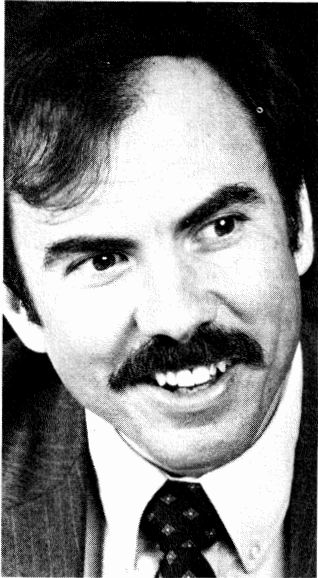

Married to the former Sharon Percy on April 1, 1967; four children, John (Jamie), Valerie, Charles and Justin. Appointed in 1961 by President John F. Kennedy to the National Advisory Council of the Peace Corps; appointed special assistant to Peace Corps Director R. Sargent Shriver in 1962; served in the U.S. Department in the Bureau of Far Eastern Affairs as desk officer for Indonesian Affairs and as special assistant; appointed by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy in July, 1964, to work in West Virginia with President's Commission on Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime; social worker in Emmons, West Virginia. 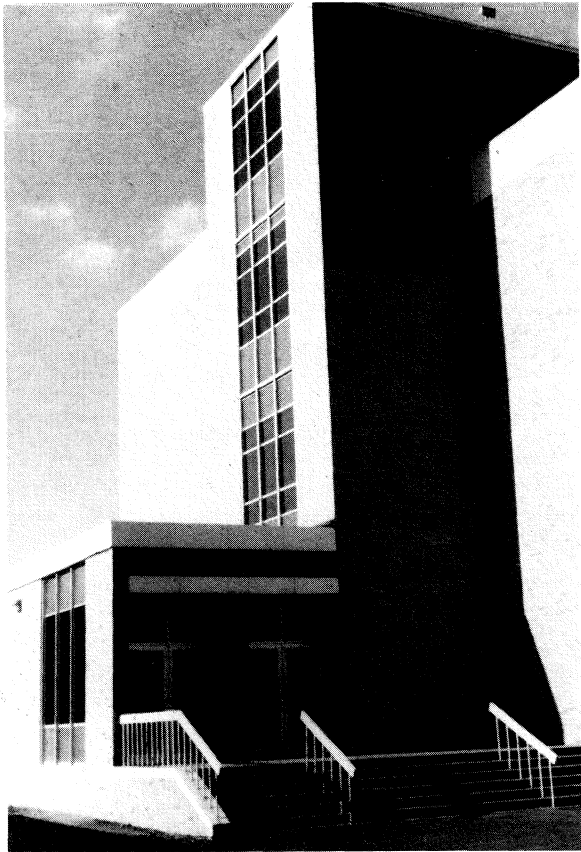

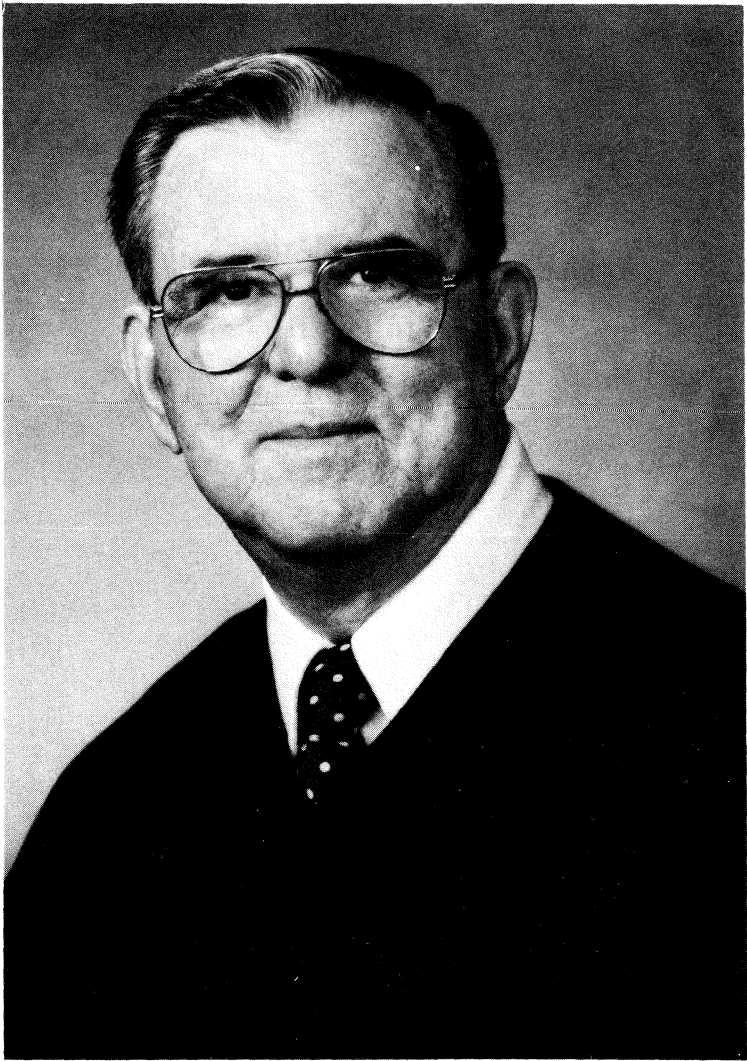

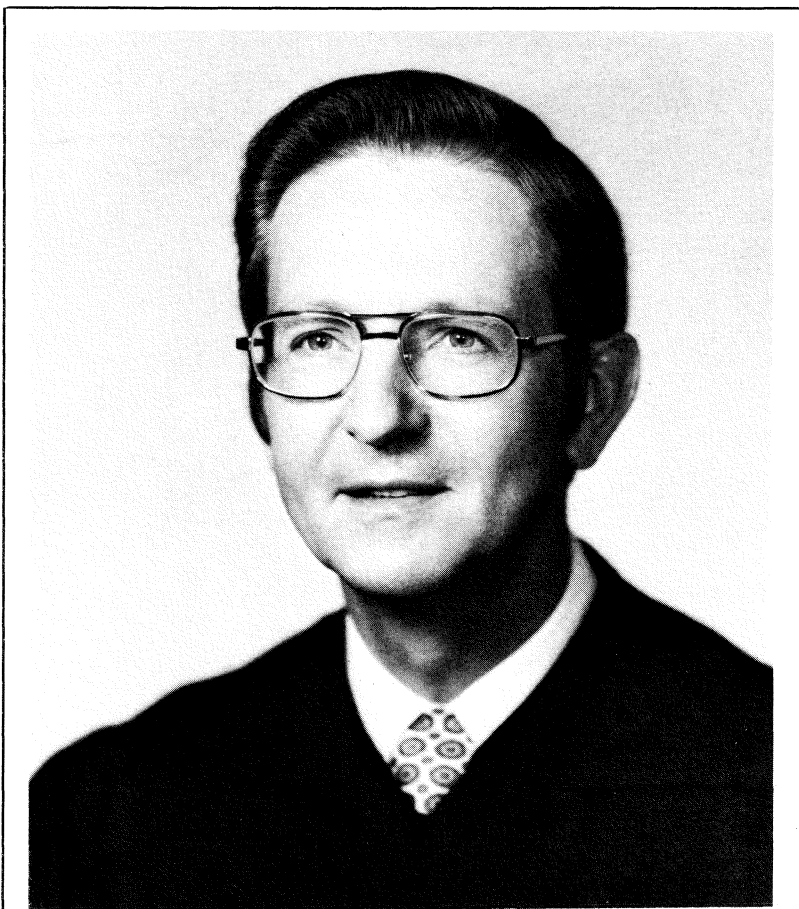

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

United States Marine Corps activities in West Virginia consist of two organized Marine Corps Reserve Training Centers, one Recruiting Station Headquarters and eight Recruiting Sub-stations.

The purpose of the Marine Corps Reserve Training Centers is to facilitate the training programs and mobilization readiness of the Marine Corps Reserve Units in the event of mobilization, war or national emergency. Both Marine Corps Reserve Units in West Virginia are listed as excellent in their readiness posture. The South Charleston Unit (Company A, 4th Combat Engineer Battalion) has been nominated for several national awards for its accomplishment in combining its engineer training with a domestic action program. The primary mission of Company A is to provide close combat engineering support of an engineer nature as necessary to meet the essential habitual requirements of an infantry regiment and associated task elements in combat operations under moderate conditions of climate, weather, and terrain. Through the use of its engineer skills and equipment, Company A has saved State and local governments a considerable amount of money by building and renovating recreational facilities, cultural centers, and public land areas.

The Inspector-Instructor Staff of each Marine Corps Reserve Unit is assigned to train and assist the unit in meeting established Marine Corps Standards. These active duty Marines are also responsible to represent the Marine Corps on appropriate occasions as well as assist Marine dependents in West Virginia while their sponsor is stationed overseas.

The Main Recruiting Station and Sub-stations are primarily tasked with selection and screening qualified volunteers for the United States Marine Corps, Marine Corps Reserve, and with processing applicants for the Naval Reserve Officer Training Commissioning (NROTC) programs.

The West Virginia National Guard is authorized and governed by Article I, Chapter 15 of the West Virginia Code and is constituted as both State and Federal force by authority of the National Defense Act approved June 3, 1916, as amended to January 1, 1945, inclusive. The National Guard is a reserve component of the Army of the United States and the United States Air Force and is composed of officers and enlisted personnel who volunteer for duty and are qualified in accordance with Federal and State regulations governing same. In time of peace, the National Guard is a State force, controlled by the Adjutant General as a principal military representative of the Commander-in-Chief. The Adjutant General issues, in the name of the Governor, all orders to the National Guard, disburses funds appropriated by the State Legislature for this purpose and acts as Commanding General for the Commander-in-Chief. In the event of war, insurrection, rebellion, invasion, tumult or a case of public disaster, the Governor has the power to order the West Virginia National Guard or any part thereof, into the active service of the State and to cause them to perform such duty as he shall deem proper. The National Guard is equipped and paid by the Federal Government, but must meet certain organizational and training standards to qualify for Federal recognition. When Congress

declares a national emergency and authorizes the use of armed forces requiring troops in excess of those in the Active Forces, the President of the United States may order the National Guard into the active military service of the United States. Initial enlistments in the National Guard are for a period of eight years with reenlistments authorized for one to six years.

Congress has delegated to the Corps of Engineers responsibility for the development, construction, operation, and maintenance of navigation facilities, flood control structures, and related improvements, and services for water resources management.

The Civil Works Program of the Corps of Engineers is divided on the basis of watershed drainage areas. The Ohio River drainage basin includes all of West Virginia except the Eastern Panhandle, which is in the Potomac River basin. The Huntington District of the Ohio River Division encompasses that part of the Ohio River basin in West Virginia downstream from New Martinsville in Wetzel County. The Pittsburgh District encompasses the upstream remainder of the Ohio River basin, including the basin of the Monongahela River. The Potomac River basin is included in the Baltimore District of the North Atlantic Division.

Responsibility for military construction in West Virginia rests with the U. S. Army Engineer District, Baltimore.

Extension of the Ohio River navigation system in West Virginia presently includes three high lift dams on the Kanawha River and three navigation structures on the Monongahela River.

Improvement of the navigation facilities on the Ohio River bordering West Virginia includes eight high lift structures which replaced 22 obsolete, low lift dams. Seven of the structures have double, parallel locks with dimensions of 1,200 feet by 110 feet and 600 feet by 110 feet. The other structure, Gallipolis, was completed in 1937 and has parallel locks measuring 600 feet by 110 feet and 360 feet by 110 feet. In river-descending order, the structures are New Cumberland Locks and Dam, at New Cumberland; Pike Island Locks and Dam, near Wheeling; Hannibal Locks and Dam, near New Martinsville; Willow Island Locks and Dam, near Willow Island; Belleville Locks and Dam, near Belleville; Racine Locks and Dam, near Letart; and Gallipolis Locks and Dam, near Apple Grove. The pool of the other structure, Greenup Locks and Dam, near Greenup, Kentucky, borders Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia and extends to the Gallipolis Dam. In order to provide comparable locking capacity, a study has been completed recommending authorization for modernization of the Gallipolis structure.

Modernization of the obsolete navigation structures in the upper portion of the Monongahela River is complete. Opekiska, Hildebrand and Morgantown Locks and Dams are complete and located entirely within West Virginia. Point Marion Lock and Dam is in Pennsylvania, with its upper pool extending to Morgantown Dam. Modifications to Point Marion Dam are complete and replacement of the lock is under study.

Multipurpose reservoir projects constructed by the Army Engineers within the State include Bluestone Lake on New River at Hinton; Sutton Lake on Elk River at Sutton; Tygart Lake on Tygart Valley River near Grafton; Summersville Lake on Gauley River near Summersville; East Lynn Lake on East Fork of Twelvepole Creek near Huntington; R. D. Bailey Lake on Guyandotte River near Gilbert; Burnsville Lake on Little Kanawha River near Burnsville; Beech Fork Lake on Twelvepole Creek near Huntington and Bloomington Lake on North Branch Potomac River near Piedmont. The Stonewall Jackson Lake project on West Fork River near Weston is under construction.

Local protection projects completed by the Corps of Engineers in West Virginia are located at Parkersburg, Point Pleasant, Huntington, Ceredo-Kenova, Ridgeley, W.Va.-Cumberland, Md. (one project), Buckhannon, Elkins, Princeton, East Rainelle, and Williamson. Several completed small flood control projects and snagging and clearing projects have reduced or alleviated flood damage along smaller tributaries of main rivers within the State.

Services provided include those related to floodplain management and disaster relief assistance. The floodplain management services program provides for preparation of floodplain information reports for communities of the State upon their request, and help to any community, agency, or individual in evaluating flood hazards at individual locations.

FEDERAL CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION

The Federal Correctional Institution is situated in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains in Summers and Monroe Counties. It was established by an act of Congress June 7, 1924, and the buildings and grounds have a value in excess of \$3.5 million. It was designed to take care of all women Federal sentenced prisoners in the United States and the insular possessions and has a capacity of 572. Since 1982 the institution has housed female offenders committed to custody by West Virginia State Courts. There are seventeen buildings housing inmates, a hospital, administration building, garment factory, decal-screen print factory, laundry, vocational-educational building, chapel and auditorium, storehouse, dining room and shops. The enabling act specified that each inmate should be given training that would fit her to be self-supporting upon her return to society. The institution program has expanded to meet the needs of a changing society. Specific program areas include counseling, education, medical and psychological, casework, religious, vocational, and certified apprenticeship programs in the building trades, welding, refrigeration, boiler house operations and auto mechanics. The institution program is further complemented by community centers which are located in various cities throughout the United States.

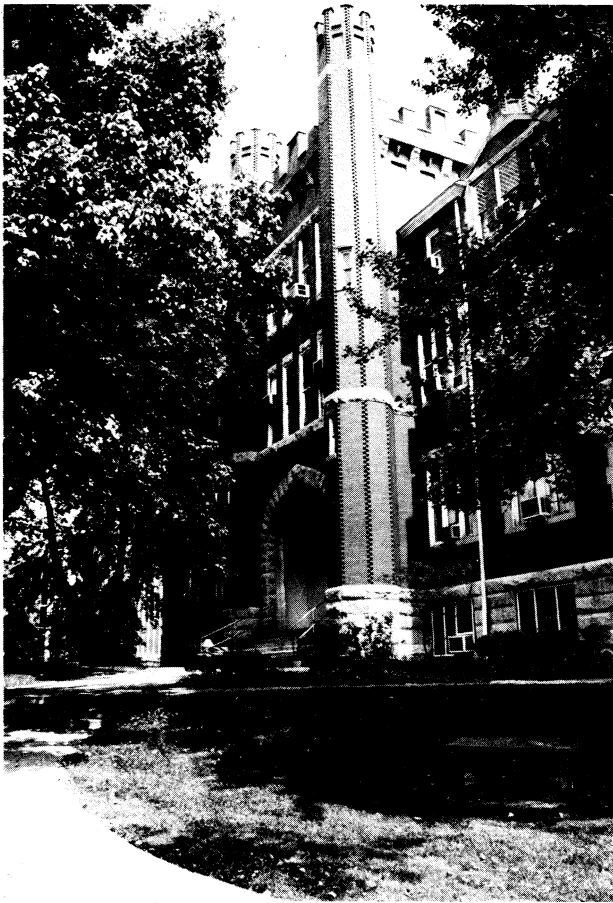

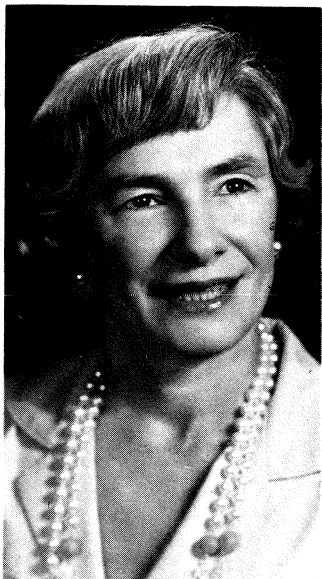

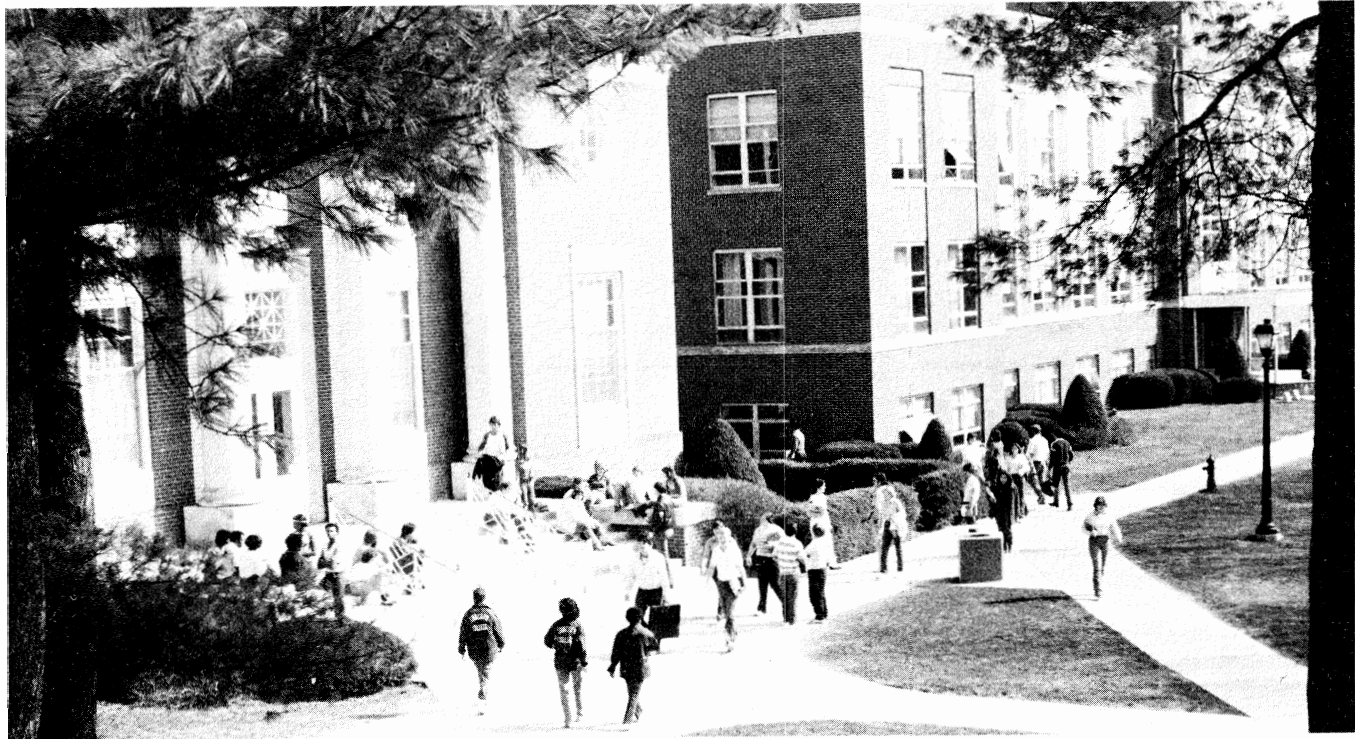

CLASS I, II AND III CITIES

Under the provisions of Chapter 56, Acts of the Legislature, regular session, 1937, municipal corporations are classified by population as follows: Population in excess of 50,000, Class I city; population more than 10,000 and not more than 50,000, Class II city; and population more than 2,000 and not more than 10,000, Class III city. Municipal corporations not included in these classifications are known as towns or villages.

Transition from one to another class of municipal corporation occurs automatically when the requisite population qualification has been met. Population is determined on the basis of the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States or the Legislature of West Virginia. Census of 1980 is used as basis in determining class of cities listed in this Register.

Although the peace treaty with the Indians was still in effect when Zane settled here, he and his followers immediately built a fort, which they called "Fort Henry." Here was fought in September, 1782, the last battle of the American Revolution. It was during this siege that the famous legend of Betty Zane was established, when she braved a storm of gunfire to carry powder from the Zane cabin to the fort.

Wheeling was the state's capital until 1870 and again from 1875 to 1880 when the government was moved to Charleston.

First church in Wheeling — Fourth Street Methodist Episcopal, erected in 1818-19 on land given by Noah Zane. First Catholic church—St. Joseph's—was erected in the year 1822 on land given, likewise, by Noah Zane. 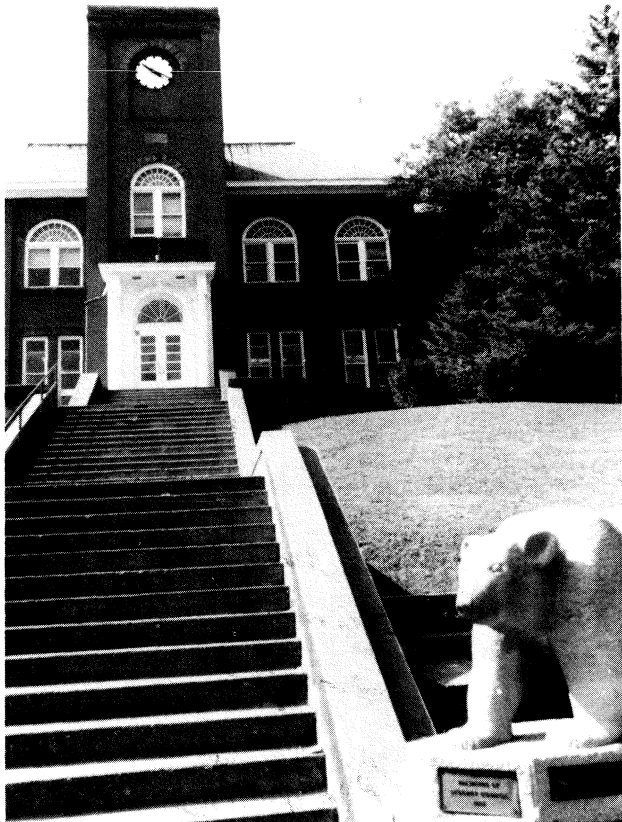

THE AMERICAN FLAG

DESCRIPTION OF THE FLAG

The Flag of the United States of America has 13 horizontal stripes—7 red and 6 white—the red and white stripes alternating, and a union which consists of white stars of five points on a blue field placed in the upper quarter next to the staff and extending to the lower edge of the fourth red stripe from the top. The number of stars is the same as the number of States in the Union. The canton or union now contains 50 stars. On the admission of a State into the Union a star will be added to the union of the Flag, and such addition will take effect on the 4th day of July next succeeding such admission.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, by Senate Joint Resolution No. 18, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is the Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia." The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, was adopted by the Legislature on September 26, 1863, and symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia," together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union, in front of the rock are two hunters' rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty."

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE SONGS

"THE WEST VIRGINIA HILLS", "THIS IS MY WEST VIRGINIA" and "WEST VIRGINIA, MY HOME SWEET HOME" were designated as the official State Songs of West Virginia, each ranking equally with the others in official status, by House Concurrent Resolution No. 19, adopted by the Legislature on February 28, 1963.

OFFICIAL COLORS

OLD GOLD and BLUE were designated as Official State Colors by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 20, adopted by the Legislature on March 8, 1863.

STATE DAY

“West Virginia Day”

On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln approved the Statehood Bill for West Virginia on the condition that it would gradually abolish slavery. West Virginia was proclaimed a State on April 20, 1863, with the bill becoming effective sixty days later on June 20, 1863.

“West Virginia Day” became a legal holiday by Chapter 59, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 1927. (Code 2-2-1)

STATE TREE

The Sugar Maple or ACER SACCHARUM, as it is known scientifically, was made West Virginia's official tree by House Concurrent Resolution No. 12, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1949, authorizing a vote by pupils of public schools and civic organizations. It produces an excellent wood for furniture as well as maple syrup. A single tree is 70 to 120 feet high and produces two to three pounds of sugar when “sugared off”; has a five-lobed leaf and produces a small wing-shaped pod.

STATE BIRD

The Cardinal or RICHMONDENA CARDINALIS, as it is known scientifically, was made West Virginia's official bird by House Concurrent Resolution No. 12, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1949, authorizing a vote by pupils of public schools and civic organizations. The male of the species is a rich scarlet with a mask and shading of black, while the young birds and females are a less brilliant color. The adult bird measures approximately eight inches long. It can be found from New York State to the Gulf of Mexico and as far west as Oklahoma.

STATE FLOWER

The RHODODENDRON MAXIMUM or “Big Laurel” was made the official State Flower of West Virginia by House Joint Resolution No. 19, adopted by the Legislature on January 29, 1903, following a recommendation by the Governor and a vote by the pupils of public schools. It is a shrub of the heath family and may be recognized by its large evergreen leaves and delicate pale pink or white bloom, mottled with either red or yellow flecks.

STATE ANIMAL

The BLACK BEAR or EUARCTOS AMERICANUS was selected as official State Animal of West Virginia by a poll of students, teachers and sportsmen conducted by the Department of Natural Resources in 1954-55 and officially adopted by the Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, by House Concurrent Resolution No. 6. It is the only species of bear found in the State. While commonly referred to as the “black bear” its coloring is actually deeply tinted with

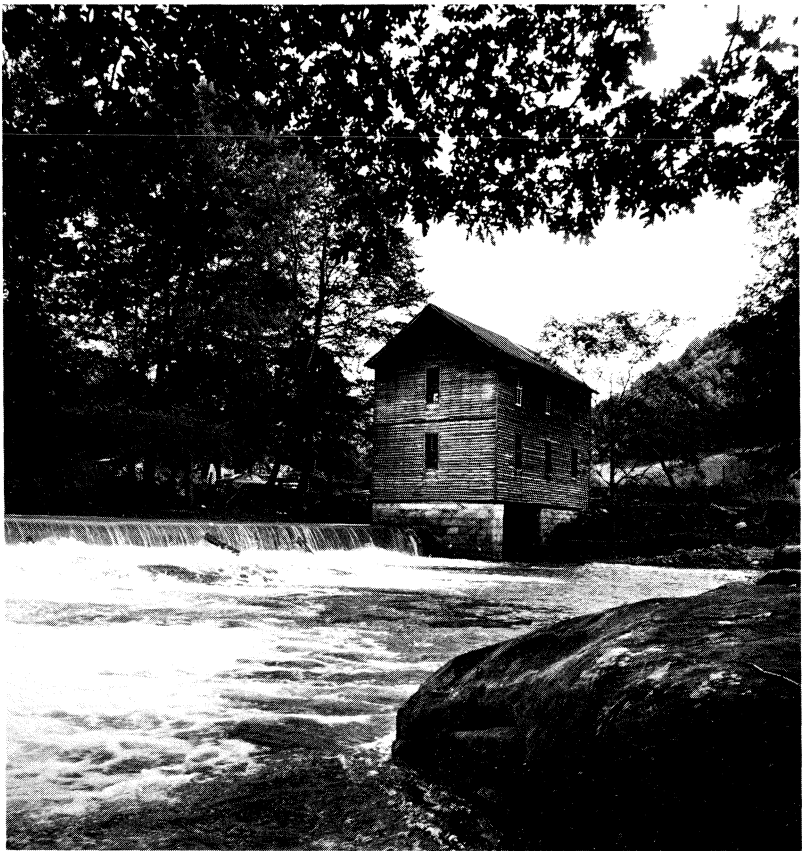
brown. Its habitat in the State is primarily in the eastern mountain region. A litter usually consists of one or two cubs, rarely three, each weighing about eight ounces at birth. The adult reaches an average maximum weight of 250 pounds.

STATE FRUIT

The APPLE was designated as the official State Fruit by House Concurrent Resolution No. 56, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1972.

STATE FISH

The BROOK TROUT was designated the State Fish by House Concurrent Resolution No. 6 adopted Regular Session, 1973, following a poll of sportsmen who favored the Brook Trout. The brook trout is a native West Virginia species.

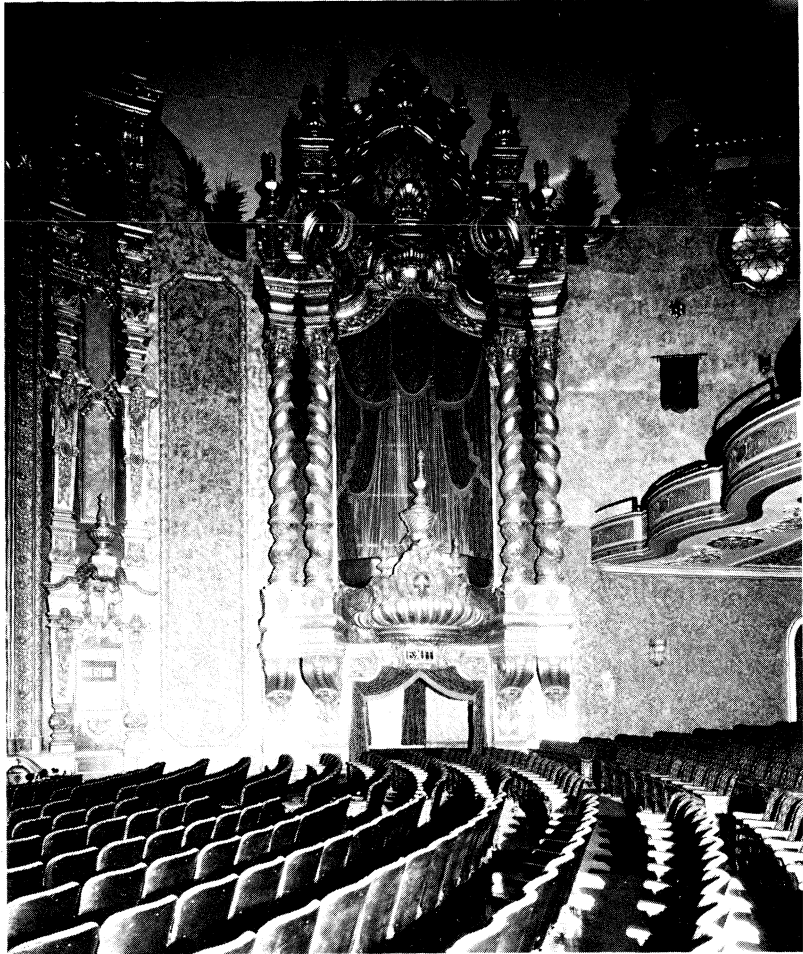

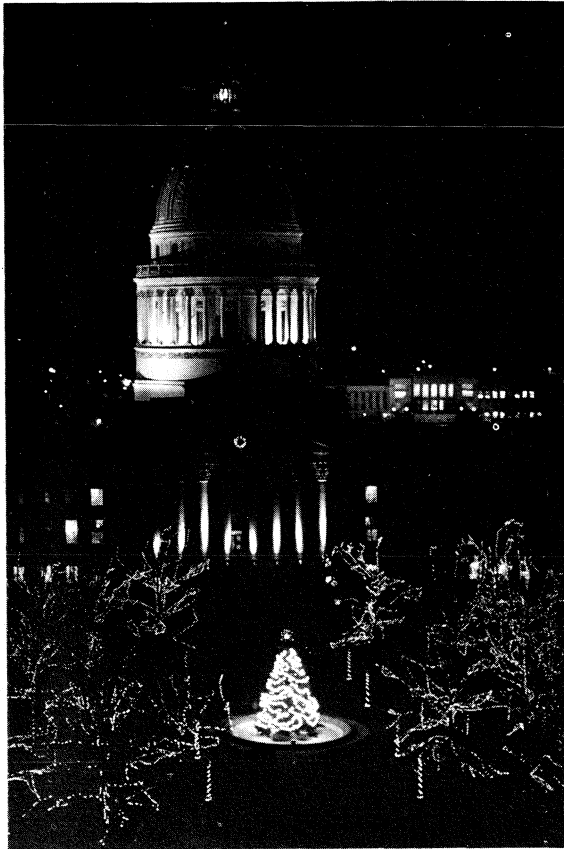

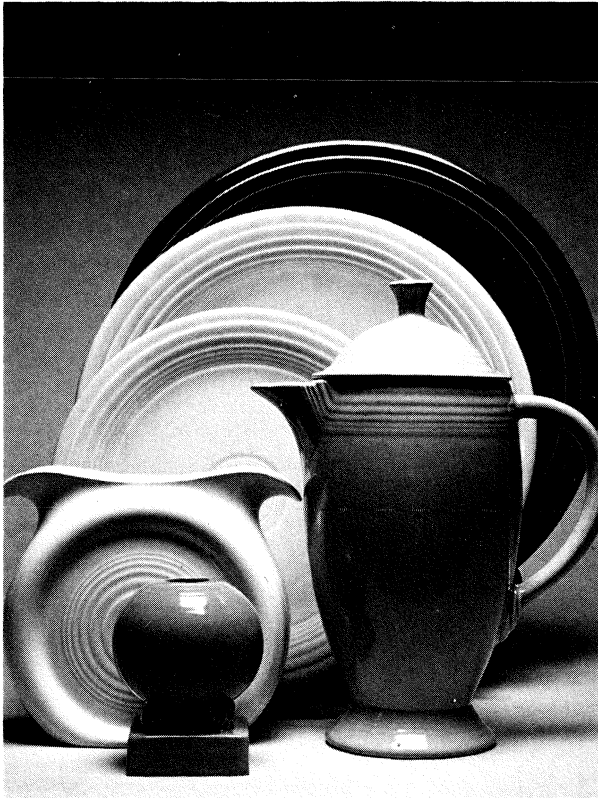

Big Sandy River

Formed by the junction of Tug Fork and Levisa Fork at Louisa, Kentucky. Mouth, junction with Ohio at Kenova, Wayne County, West Virginia.

Cheat River

Formed by the junction of Black Fork and Shavers Fork at Parsons, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Monongahela River at Point Marion, Pennsylvania.

Coal River

Source in central part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at St. Albans, Kanawha County.

Elk River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at Charleston, Kanawha County.

Gauley River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Greenbrier River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with New River just above Hinton in Summers County.

Guyandotte River

Source in southern part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Huntington, Cabell County.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers just above Kanawha Falls in Fayette County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Point Pleasant, Mason County.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River in Parkersburg.

Monongahela River

Formed by the junction of Tygart Valley and West Fork Rivers at Fairmont. Joins the Allegheny River at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to form the Ohio River.

New River

Source in southern part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois.

Potomac River

Formed by the junction of the North and South Branches near Green Spring, Hampshire County. Mouth, Chesapeake Bay.

North Branch Potomac River

Source near Fairfax Stone which today marks corners of Grant, Preston and Tucker Counties. Mouth, junction with South Branch to form Potomac River.

South Branch Potomac River

Source near Hightown, Highland County, Virginia. Mouth, junction with North Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County.

Tug Fork

Source in southeastern part of McDowell County. Mouth, junction with Levisa Fork to form Big Sandy River at Louisa, Kentucky.

Tygart Valley River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with West Fork River at Fairmont to form Monongahela River.

West Fork River

Source in western part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Tygart Valley River at Fairmont to form Monongahela River.

INLAND WATERWAYS—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by the Department of the Army)

Ohio River: Improvement of the Ohio River for navigation, as authorized by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of 1910, provides for a minimum channel depth of nine feet in the entire 981 miles of the river by the construction of locks and dams and open channel work. The original system, completed in 1929, and major modifications completed in 1937, resulted in 46 lock and dam structures.

In 1953 a modernization and replacement program was begun which will reduce the total number of navigation projects to 19, providing higher dams, larger locks, and deeper pools. Projects adjoining West Virginia include the pool of Greenup Locks and Dam, completed in 1964, between Kentucky, West Virginia, and Ohio; a proposed improvement of Gallipolis Locks and Dams, near Apple Grove; the Racine Locks and Dam, near Letart, completed in 1970; Belleville Locks and Dam, completed in 1969 at Belleville; Willow Island Locks and Dam, near Waverly, West Virginia, completed in 1975; Hannibal Locks and Dam, at New

Martinsville, completed in 1975; Pike Island Locks and Dam, completed in 1965 at Wheeling; and New Cumberland Locks and Dam, completed in 1962 near New Cumberland.

Kanawha River, West Virginia: Three high-lift dams on the Kanawha River and the Gallipolis Dam on the Ohio River provide a minimum channel depth of nine feet on the Kanawha River for 91 miles, from the mouth to Deepwater. Each Kanawha River dam has twin locks, and the Kanawha Valley Power Company has a hydroelectric plant at each site. The two upstream dams, London and Marmet, were completed in 1934, Winfield Dam in 1937, and Gallipolis Dam on the Ohio River in 1937.

Monongahela River, West Virginia and Pennsylvania: The existing Monongahela navigation system comprises nine locks and dams, affording slack-water navigation from Pittsburgh to above Fairmont, West Virginia, a distance of 128.7 miles. The controlling depth is nine feet and the navigable width varies from 250 feet in the upper reach to practically the full width at the mouth of the River.

Modernization of the Monongahela River navigation structures in the upper reaches of the waterway was completed with the construction of the Morgantown, Hildebrand, and Opekiska Locks and Dams and the earlier modification of Dam No. 8 near Point Marion, Pennsylvania. In the middle portion of the river, the Maxwell Locks and Dam and the reconstruction of Dam No. 4 combined to eliminate Locks and Dams Nos. 5 and 6. Replacement of Lock and Dam No. 7 and Lock No. 8 has been recommended and, if undertaken, now being studied, will complete the modernization program in the upper two thirds of the river. The lower section, including Locks and Dams Nos. 2, 3 and 4, is currently under study for possible rehabilitation and/or replacement needs.

MULTIPLE-PURPOSE LAKES—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by the Department of the Army)

Completed Projects:

Beech Fork Lake: Creation of a lake on Beech Fork of Twelvetpole Creek, near Huntington, was authorized by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1962. Construction of the dam was completed in February 1977. Additional public use development, some in conjunction with a proposed State lodge complex, remains to be accomplished. The dam is an earth fill, with a maximum height of 86 feet and a top length of 1,000 feet. The lake has a maximum capacity of 37,540 acre-feet and controls the runoff from a drainage area of 78 square miles. A minimum pool of 4,200 acre-feet with a surface area of 450 acres is maintained during the winter. A seasonal pool of 9,180 acre-feet with surface area of 720 acres is maintained during the summer season for recreation purposes. The remaining capacity is utilized for flood control.

Bloomington Lake: The Bloomington Lake project was authorized by Congress in 1962 as a unit of the comprehensive water resource development plan for the Potomac River basin. The damsite is in Mineral County, West Virginia, and Garrett County, Maryland, on North Branch Potomac River about eight miles upstream from the mouth of Savage River. The dam is a rolled earth and rockfill structure with a maximum height of 296 feet and a top length of 2,130 feet. The reservoir has a capacity of 130,900 acre-feet and will control runoff from a drainage area of 263 square miles. The project provides low-flow augmentation, water quality control, flood control, water supply and recreation. Construction was begun in 1971 and was completed in 1981.

Bluestone Lake: Bluestone Lake, located on New River near Hinton, was authorized by Presidential executive order in 1935 and approved by Congress in the Flood Control Acts of 1936 and 1938. Construction of the project was begun early in 1942, suspended in 1944 because of the war emergency, resumed in 1946, and completed for operational purposes in 1949. The dam, of concrete construction, is 165 feet high and 2,048 feet long. The lake regulates the runoff of a drainage area of 4,565 square miles and has a total storage capacity of 631,000 acre-feet. During periods of low and normal flows in New River, the elevation of the lake varies about four feet, with a minimum pool 9.5 miles in length and an area of 1,800

acres that accounts for about 30,900 acre-feet of the total storage capacity. The remaining capacity is reserved for the impoundment of floodflows, as required for flood control.

Burnsville Lake: Construction of the Burnsville Lake project was begun in the summer of 1972 and the dam was completed in September 1976. The project controls the runoff from a drainage area of 165 square miles. The dam is a rockfill embankment rising 84.5 feet above the streambed. Top elevation is 839 feet above sea level, and the crest length 1,400 feet. A perched gated spillway with a crest width of 142 feet and a crest elevation of 792 feet is located in the left abutment. The outlet works are located in the spillway section. The minimum pool is maintained at elevation 776 with a surface area of 550 acres. The seasonal (water quality control) pool is at elevation 789 and has a surface area of 968 acres. The flood control pool is at elevation 825 and has a capacity ranging from 51,200 acre-feet in summer to 61,300 acre-feet in winter, with a surface area of 1,900 acres.

East Lynn Lake: East Lynn Lake, located on East Fork at Twelvepole Creek, was authorized by Congress in the 1938 Flood Control Act. Construction of the dam was completed in 1972. The dam is an earthfill structure with a maximum height of 113 feet and a crest length of 652 feet. The lake provides a maximum capacity of 82,500 acre-feet and controls the runoff from a drainage area of 133 square miles. A minimum pool with a surface area of 823 acres and a capacity of 11,705 acre-feet is maintained during the winter, while a seasonal pool with a surface area of 1,005 acres and a capacity of 17,100 acre-feet is maintained during the summer. The remaining storage is for flood control.

R. D. Bailey Lake: The R. D. Bailey Lake is located on Guyandotte River in Wyoming County. The dam is complete and was dedicated in August 1980. The dam is 310 feet high and with a top length of 1,370 feet. The lake has total capacity of 203,700 acre-feet. A minimum pool of 22,000 acre-feet with a surface area of 440 acres is maintained in the winter months. A seasonal pool for recreation and water quality control having a capacity of 34,000 acre-feet and a surface area of 630 acres is maintained during the summer. The remaining storage capacity is for flood control.

Summersville Lake: Built between 1960 and 1966, Summersville Lake is situated on Gauley River near Summersville. The dam is a rockfill type, with a maximum height of 390 feet and a top length of 2,280 feet. The drainage area above the dam is 803 square miles. It provides a maximum capacity of 390,800 acre-feet of storage for flood water, of which 163,400 acre-feet may be used for low-flow augmentation in the Kanawha River in summer. The summer recreation pool is 13.7 miles long and 2,723 acres in area.

Sutton Lake: Sutton Lake, located on the Elk River near Sutton, was authorized by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1938. Sealing of mine workings at the site was begun in 1949, but work on the dam was not started until 1956. Construction of the project was completed in 1961. The dam is of concrete, 210 feet high and 1,178 feet long. The lake has a total capacity of 265,300 acre-feet and controls the runoff from a drainage area of 537 square miles. A minimum pool 5.9 miles in length, with a surface area of 270 acres and a capacity of 4,100 acre-feet, is maintained during the winter. A seasonal pool with a maximum length of 14.5 miles, surface area of 1,520 acres, and storage capacity of 60,100 acre-feet is maintained for low-flow augmentation and recreation. The remaining capacity is utilized for flood control storage.

Tygart Lake: Tygart Dam, on the Tygart Valley River 2.25 miles upstream from Grafton, was authorized by the Public Works Administration in 1934 and approved by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of 1935. The concrete gravity dam is 1,921 feet in length at the top and rises 230 feet above the riverbed. The structure provides for the gross controlled storage of 287,700 acre-feet of water. It is operated as a unit in the reservoir system for the protection of Pittsburgh and the Monongahela and Upper Ohio River valleys. In addition to flood control, Tygart Lake provides for low-water discharge regulation by the gradual release of stored spring flood waters during the summer-fall period to assure a river flow of 340 cubic feet per second at Lock and Dam No. 8 on the Monongahela River. Storage of about 100,000 acre-feet of water is allotted for this purpose. The potential of developing hydro power at the project is currently being studied.

Projects Under Construction:

Stonewall Jackson Lake: The Stonewall Jackson Lake project was authorized by the Flood Control Act of 1966 for the purposes of flood control, water quality control, water supply, and recreation. The project, although benefiting primarily the West Fork and upper Monongahela River valleys, will be operated as a unit in the comprehensive plan for flood control in the Ohio River basin; to improve water quality in the West Fork, Monongahela, and Ohio Rivers; to provide storage for water supply; and for general and fish and wildlife recreation. Land acquisition has almost been completed and the major road relocation program is well under way.

The dam is under construction and is located on the West Fork River at Brownsville, Lewis County, with the full pool extending upstream to Walkersville and Crawford, also in Lewis County.

The maximum summer pool for water quality control, water supply, and recreation will be at elevation 1,072 feet above sea level, with a surface area of 2,650 acres. At the full pool elevation of 1,082, the project will provide for the gross storage of 74,700 acre-feet of water. The project is currently under construction.

Local Flood Protection Projects:

All completed major flood protection projects in West Virginia, except at Ridgeley, are units in the comprehensive plan for flood control and allied purposes in the Ohio River basin. The local protection projects have been constructed so that, acting alone, they provide a degree of flood protection which in most places is equal to protection against the maximum flood of record in the project localities. Each locality along the Ohio River which has local protective works also receives additional protection from a coordinated system of upstream multiple-purpose reservoirs designed to reduce flood flows on the Ohio River and to contribute to the reduction of floods on the lower Mississippi River.

Completed reservoir and local flood protection projects in West Virginia have already made a major contribution toward reduction of flood damages; flood control benefits from their operation through September 1980 have aggregated a total estimated amount of more than \$1.4 billion.

Ohio River Projects: Local protective works have been completed for Ceredo-Kenova, Huntington, Parkersburg, and Point Pleasant. The projects consist of concrete walls and earth levees to prevent entrance of flood waters, pumping stations to discharge sewage and internal drainage during flood periods, and gated openings through the works to permit unobstructed movement of traffic during normal (nonflood) river conditions. Operation and maintenance are local responsibilities.

Buckhannon LPP: A project in the vicinity of Buckhannon completed in 1969 provided channel improvement along Buckhannon River for 4.6 miles.

Elkins LPP: The principal elements are a cutoff channel and dikes, located about 1.5 miles above the city, which divert floodflows from the loop of Tygart Valley River on which Elkins is located. The project was completed in 1949 and is unique in that the Federal Government has the responsibility for maintaining the dimension features of the improvement.

Princeton LPP: Principal features of the protection works are 3.9 miles of channel improvement along Brush Creek. The project was completed in 1961.

East Rainelle LPP: The project consists of 4.3 miles of channel improvement on Meadow River and Sewell and Boggs Creeks. The project was completed in 1962.

Ridgeley, West Virginia, and Cumberland, Maryland: Ridgeley, in Mineral County, is located on the south bank of North Branch Potomac River, opposite Cumberland, Maryland. Protective works for these communities include about 3.3 miles of channel improvements on North Branch and its tributary, Wills Creek, supplemented by a system of earth levees and concrete floodwalls. The project includes three pumping stations with related interior

drainage facilities and eight pressure conduits totaling 11,800 feet in length. An industrial watersupply dam, three highway bridges, and a railroad bridge were reconstructed. The project was completed in 1959. Additional channel improvement on North Branch Potomac River was completed in 1964.

Williamson LPP: The business section of Williamson is protected by a project consisting of 2,135 feet of concrete wall along Tug Fork of Big Sandy River, a pump station, and 16 gated openings. The project was completed in 1963.

Barboursville Bank Protection Project: The project consisted of repairing and restoring a bank of Guyandotte River in the vicinity of Water Street in Barboursville. The work consisted of placing dumped rockfill on the right bank of the river for the prevention of erosion, and channel excavation on the opposite bank. Construction was completed in 1965.

Tug Fork of Big Sandy River: Under authority of Section 202 of the Energy and Water Development Appropriation Act of 1981 (PL 96-367), the Corps was directed to provide flood protection measures to communities along the Tug Fork of the Big Sandy River. Construction of a Pump Station for West Williamson was initiated in May 1983. Preconstruction efforts are underway for additional protective works at West Williamson and for the Williamson Commercial Business District.

Local Protection Work Under Special Continuing Authority: Small flood control projects under authority provided to the Corps of Engineers by Section 205 of the Flood Control Act of 1948, as amended, include channel improvement work completed along North Branch Potomac River at Blaine and Bayard and along Middle Fork Mud River in the Griffithsville-Yawkey area.

Projects under the authority provided to the Corps of Engineers to snag and clear streams in the interest of flood control by Section 208 of the Flood Control Act of 1954 include projects completed at Berwind on Dry Fork, a tributary of Tug Fork of Big Sandy River; Bramwell and Montcalm on Bluestone River; Cairo on North Fork Hughes River; Colliers on Harmon Creek; Huntington on Fourpole Creek; Pine Grove on Fishing Creek; Jacksonburg, and Smithfield on South Fork Fishing Creek; Richwood on Cherry River; Stonewood and Nutter Fort on Elk Creek; West Union on Middle Island Creek; Weston on Polk Creek and Stonecoal Creek; Wyatt on Bingamon Creek; Pax on Paint Creek and Ripley on Mill Creek.

Projects under authority provided for the Corps of Engineers by Section 32 of the Water Resources Development Act for Streambank Erosion Control Evaluation and Demonstration include projects completed at Sistersville, Warwood, Ravenswood and St. Marys along the Ohio River, and South Charleston on the Kanawha River.

Projects under authority provided to the Corps of Engineers for streambank protection by Section 14 of the Flood Control Act of 1946, include projects completed at Warwood and Chester along the Ohio River.

SPEED LIMITS

The speed limit for automobiles on open country highways in West Virginia is 55 miles per hour; on suburban streets, 25 miles per hour; and on city streets, 20 miles per hour.

OPERATOR'S LICENSE

An operator of a motor vehicle must be at least 16 years of age. The fee for a learner's permit is \$4.00 and the fee for an operator's license is \$10.00. An operator's license expires four years from the date of issuance and may be renewed for successive periods of four years upon the payment of a fee of \$10.00 for each such renewal.

DRIVER IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

(Point System)

West Virginia's Driver Improvement Program, as administered by the Department of Motor Vehicles, is designed to eliminate the chronically careless driver from the state's highway system.

Under the program "points" are assigned to those convicted of various moving traffic violations. Conviction notices are forwarded to the Department of Motor Vehicles, which maintains each individual's driving record and statistics.

A driver receiving a total of six points within two years is sent a warning letter by the Department outlining the need for more careful driving. Individuals accumulating nine or more points are required to appear for a counseling session with a Department representative. If a driver accumulates twelve or more points, the Department may take corrective action such as probation or suspension of driving privileges.

Total well completions reported in West Virginia during 1984 increased 1.9 percent over 1983. Exploratory completions dropped 60.4 percent from last year. Of the 53 exploratory wells reported, 5 were new-field wildcats (3 successful), 2 were new-pool tests (both successful), 23 were deeper-pool tests, (17 successful, 4 plugged back for shallow development), 9 were shallow-pool tests (7 successful), and 14 were outposts (12 successful). In addition, 12 shallow pools were discovered by development wells. Thus, 3 new fields and 38 new pools were discovered, compared to 5 new fields and 114 new pools in 1983. The success rate for exploratory wells was 77.4 percent, whereas development wells were completed successfully 95.8 percent of the time.

Wells were officially reported as completed in 42 of the 55 counties in the State (Table I). Total completions reported (including workovers) were 2,165. Of these, 1,640 were gas, 81 were oil, 300 were combination oil and gas, only 100 were dry, and 44 were miscellaneous wells completed for water injection (38), gas storage (4), and observation (2). Elk-Poca (Sissonville) was the most active gas field (Table II) and Blue Creek (Falling Rock) the most active oil field. Counties with the most completions reported include: Ritchie (381 wells), Pleasants (160 wells), Barbour (142 wells), and Lewis (128 wells). Wood County had the most exploratory drilling (8 wells), followed by Calhoun County with 4 wells.

Of the 41 exploratory successes reported, 33 were in shallow formations. However, 2 of these established production at depths below 6,000 feet, making them deep wells according to the legal definition in West Virginia. Of the 53 exploratory wells, 30 tested Upper Devonian sands from the Gordon to Elk, or laterally equivalent shales from the Huron to the Marcellus farther west. As a result, 10 successes were reported in these sands, with another 17 successful in the shale facies.

Exploration in the State, although reduced from previous years, was still concentrated in the following programs: deep Oriskany gas in the structurally complex Eastern Overthrust Belt; lower Chemung and Brallier sandstones and siltstones below the old Benson trend; minor expansion of the Devonian shale play associated with the Burning Springs anticline; continued scattered,

deep shale tests, many below 6,000 feet, in southern West Virginia; and scattered deep tests to the Oriskany or Silurian units across northern West Virginia.

Deep drilling increased 29.0 percent, particularly in Wood County where 24 deep tests were reported, compared to only 1 a year ago. Another 15 deep wells were reported in Jackson County, 2 of which were Newburg tests. Oriskany wells were reported in 21 of the 42 counties that experienced some drilling last year, and Silurian tests were drilled in 6 others. Forty-five of these 89 deep tests were successful, 41 in the Oriskany and 4 in the Tuscarora. The successful Tuscarora wells were in Indian Creek pool, Kanawha County. Two Newburg tests were dry.

Shallow wells, both exploratory and development, accounted for 96.75 percent of all wells reported during 1984. Ritchie was again the most active county, with 381 completions reported, and 1,828,339 feet drilled. Of the 381 completions reported, 320 tested the Devonian shales. A total of 1,204 wells in 9 contiguous counties across northern West Virginia was reported as completed in Upper Devonian sandstones and siltstones or laterally equivalent shales. Chemung and Brallier sandstones (Bayard through Elk) were the lowest units tested in 743 wells, up 7.8 percent from 1983. Devonian shales continued to be the principal target in 1984, with 873 completions reported. The shales were the lowest zones completed in 832 wells, and were completed 910 times as shallower pays. Four Devonian shale fields were among the 10 most active fields in the State during 1984 (Table II). The Chemung sands were the deepest pays in 738 wells, of which 285 were Brallier pays, and 210 were in the Benson. In addition these sands were completed 1,300 times as shallower pays in wells with more than 1 pay zone.

Pocono completions ranked third, with 170, up from 115 in 1983. These sands (Squaw, Weir, and Berea) were the deepest pays in 134 wells, and were completed 161 times as shallower pays. The Big Injun sandstone was the lowest unit tested in 154 wells (compared to 334 in 1983), and the deepest zone completed in 147 wells (285 in 1983). Also, the Big Injun was a shallower pay in 79 deeper wells (49 in 1983). These numbers serve to further illustrate the trend toward deeper drilling in the State over the last several years.

Oil production increased 4.9 percent, and gas production increased 10.5 percent (Table III). Average IP figures for wells reported in 1984 were: oil wells, 9 barrels per day; gas wells, 724 Mcf per day; and combination wells, 27 barrels per day and 598 Mcf per day. Oil prices continued to fall during th

year, from \$27.00 per barrel in January to \$24.00 per barrel at year's end. The average wellhead price paid in West Virginia was \$3.45 per Mcf, an increase over the previous year.

STATE PARKS AND FORESTS

WEST VIRGINIA'S RECREATION PARADISE

West Virginia's State Park and Forest System is a living legacy of recreation, cultural, and vacation opportunities for all citizens, and for growing numbers of vacationers from other states. For the past 50 years, the system has been maintained and expanded to provide quality recreation that our citizens appreciate as a major ingredient of the "good life."

The system began in 1929 with the establishment of the site of a major state Civil War engagement, Droop Mountain, as the first state park area. Shortly afterwards, during the years of the Great Depression, major emphasis was placed on creation of a system of parks and vacation lands in the Mountain State. By the mid-1930's parks such as Cacapon, Lost River, Babcock, Holly River, and Watoga were begun. The development of vacation cabins, roads, trails, lakes and swimming pools was undertaken by the State, in cooperation with the old Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), and the National Park Service. It was the beginning of the fine system that has continued to rank right at the top nationally among state park facilities.

Vacation cabins became one of the most popular attractions right from the first. To this day, most park and forest cabins are booked to capacity months before the traditional summer vacation season. Now, with the expansion of winter sports facilities, longer vacation periods, and public awareness of a four-season concept of recreation, cabins are filled at many parks year-round. Cabins, whether the old-time log style, or of modern construction, provide quality family outdoor lodging as well as the perfect choice for those persons on a budget.

The greatest period of demand for recreational facilities followed World War II. While most states had the opportunity of developing a basic park system in the 1930's, only a very few, among them West Virginia, chose to expand and develop to meet the growing demand for more parks, more acres, and more facilities for their accommodation.

By the mid-1950's the parks boasted of year-round public facilities, with the completion of dozens of heated "deluxe" cabins, and rustic (yet modern) lodges at Blackwater Falls, Cacapon and Mont Chateau State Parks. Funds to build these facilities came from the State's first revenue bond program, whereby money was borrowed for construction and repaid over a score of years from earnings through public rental.

Blackwater Falls State Park is a typical example. The region was ravaged in the early 1900's by logging, then by a series of disastrous forest fires, and further by exploitation and strip mining which occurred during the unregulated demand for coal during World War II. The new lodge and 25 deluxe cabins formed the nucleus of a major state park, which preserved for all time the rich natural beauty of the deep gorge of Blackwater River, the famous falls of which are a natural landmark in West Virginia, and provided miles of trails for hiking and riding. By 1970, the park was one of the leading year-round facilities in the entire park system.

In the early 1960's the older, but highly popular, log vacation cabins which were largely constructed by hand as the final example of mountain skill at stonecutting and log home building were totally remodeled. The biggest addition at this time was the construction of modern kitchens. Many state forest cabins were also upgraded in a similar manner, but at two forests—Kumbrabow and Seneca—the older facilities were left intact for those family visitors who wanted to share the traditional mountain heritage of kerosene lighting and water pumped from a well.

By 1963 it was evident that the emergence of the Appalachian region as a vacationland was only a matter of time. Demands on the public and private sector of recreation were unprecedented, but development had not occurred. Accordingly, an agreement was reached between the Federal and State governments for a demonstration program. The multi-million dollar program was designed, in part, to demonstrate to the private sector that recreation was a major future source of jobs, and that this industry would eventually emerge as a major factor in the State's highlands region. The "State Parks for the 1970's" program, as it was termed, eventually added three new state parks to the system, and provided for major expansion to three others.

At Grandview, near Beckley, site of the outdoor dramatic productions of "Honey In The Rock," and "Hatfields and McCoys," parking and picnic areas were greatly expanded and nature trails improved to accommodate the growing crowds at this scenic park which overlooks the famed New River Gorge.

By 1968, a major expansion program was completed at the Cass Scenic Railroad. This old logging line, remnant of thousands of miles of such railway which crisscrossed the mountains, became a state park facility in 1961. From 1963 through 1967 it operated only on a four mile segment. Beginning in 1968, as a result of this renovation of trackage, the full eleven mile line to the area of Bald Knob (West Virginia's second highest mountain) was opened to public use. Additional public facilities included a 300-car parking lot. Funds to accomplish this project were borrowed and will be repaid through income from the sale of tickets to ride the old logging trains.

Hawks Nest, a spectacular overlook high atop the famed New River Gorge, has long been one of the Mountain State's most popular park attractions. Under the "State Parks for the 1970's" program this park was greatly expanded. New facilities include a 30-room lodge overlooking the canyon, new overlook at Lovers' Leap, a marina and boat dock on the lake at the bottom of the deep chasm, and a unique aerial cable tramway to carry visitors from the rim to the bottom of the gorge.

Pipestem State Park Resort has become one of the leading state park recreational attractions in eastern America. Breath-taking in almost every dimension, Pipestem is set along a rolling plateau overlooking the rugged and undeveloped Bluestone River Gorge, near Hinton and Princeton.

The park features two comfortable lodges, the 113-room Pipestem Lodge perched on the edge of the river canyon; and Mountain Creek Lodge, a secluded 30-room facility at the bottom of the deep gorge. The Mountain Creek facility is accessible *only* via the park's canyon aerial tramway system which sweeps over a thousand feet down into the valley from the visitor center.

Other recreational facilities include a challenging 18-hole championship golf course and an enjoyable par-3 "executive golf layout." Clubhouse facilities rank second to none and highlight golf as a major new attraction of state parks.

The visitor center, headquarters for the year-round nature and recreation program, also features a native West Virginia Arts and Crafts demonstration and sales center which is coming into its own as a major outlet for Appalachian crafts. Nearby is a 550-seat outdoor amphitheater where outdoor drama and music concerts are performed regularly, the recreation center with its 200-seat cafeteria, olympic-size swimming pool and indoor recreation rooms, and an ice skating rink.

Remaining major facilities include an overlook atop Pipestem Knob, highest peak of the region, a 50-unit, completely equipped campground, archery range, nature center, riding stable with both horses and bicycles featured, and the park information and headquarters building.

Twin Falls, near Mullens and Pineville, provides year-round recreation in the State's southern highlands for the first time. The park features a 20-room guest lodge and 13 comfortable, heated guest cabins for year-round occupancy. Other highlights are an 18-hole

regulation golf course, archery, and a recreation center building that includes a large swimming pool and indoor recreation.

Canaan Valley, located in a deep, high mountain valley near Blackwater Falls State Park, is blossoming as one of the premier winter sports centers in the East. The valley, which exceeds 3000 feet in average elevation, is surrounded by 4000 - 4500-foot high mountain peaks.

Accommodations available at Canaan Valley include a 250-room lodge with deluxe conference center which offers a wide range of audiovisual equipment, restaurant with a seating capacity of 500, and gift shop; 15 deluxe cabins and 34 deluxe campsites, with a country store nearby. The lodge overlooks the scenic valley and the park's 18-hole championship golf course.

The park's winter sports center includes miles of ski trails, most serviced by full artificial supplemental snow-making equipment. Three double-chair ski lifts are operated all winter, and also in summertime as a scenic tourist attraction. The ski center includes a pro shop, restaurant, skiers' pub, lounge, and other public facilities.

As planned recreational development continues, many additional features are being created. The Cacapon State Park 18-hole championship golf course is attracting thousands of golfers to this fine year-round eastern panhandle attraction. Eight year-round guest cabins, more campsites and handicapped hiking trails have been completed at North Bend, the State's major Ohio Valley parkland.

Of historical interest is the reconstruction of a grist mill on Glade Creek at Babcock State Park. The mill, completed in 1976, was created by combining parts and pieces from several old mills which once dotted the state. The basic structure of the mill, originally the Stoney Creek Grist Mill, was moved to Babcock from a spot near Campbelltown, Pocahontas County. From the Spring Run Grist Mill near Petersburg, Grant County, the overshot water wheel was acquired; several other parts came from the Roaring Creek Grist Mill near Onego, Pendleton County. Cornmeal and buckwheat flour are ground at the Glade Creek Mill and may be purchased there.

West Virginia frontier life of the late 1700's is the main attraction at Prickett's Fort State Park. The fort was recently reconstructed to look as it was believed to have looked in 1774, the date of its original completion. There are 16 one-room cabins, a meeting hall and storehouse within the fort, demonstrating the lifestyle of the settlers who relied upon the security of its sturdy walls to protect them from the Indians. Visitors can view demonstrations of 18th Century crafts including open hearth cookery and baking; carding, spinning and weaving of wool; basket making, candle dipping and wood lye soap making; horn and leatherworking; gunsmithing, blacksmithing and coopering.

West Virginia's newest park is Beech Fork State Park, consisting of 3,860 acres; facilities: 276 campsites. When fully developed, Beech Fork will include day use facilities such as swimming, tennis, game courts, picnicking, hiking trails and an 18-hole championship golf course. Overnight accommodations will include a lodge and cabins.

Another unique addition to the park system is the Greenbrier River Trail. Though not actually referred to as a state park, the 1980 session of the West Virginia Legislature designated an abandoned rail-line of the Chesapeake and Ohio System, the Greenbrier River Trail, and allowed the Division of Parks and Recreation to acquire the land for the purpose of developing a hiking-biking trail. The rails and ties have been removed, and 76 miles of the trail will be resurfaced with finely crushed limestone. As well as backpacking and biking, the trail may be used as access to the Greenbrier River by fishermen and canoers, and as a cross-country ski trail in the winter. Motorized vehicles are not allowed on the trail. Camping areas, lean-to shelters, water and sanitary facilities, and interpretive signing are among the proposed future developments for the trail.

West Virginia's recreation system is a source of pride and enjoyment to West Virginians and other visitors. More than seven and one-half million tourists visit West Virginia parks and forests each year for quality family recreation in the scenic outdoors.

(Barbour County) A beautifully wooded tract along a fine boulder strewn stream. Picnicking facilities, swimming, bathhouse, refreshment stand, children's playground, campground, and hiking trails. Acreage, 355. Post Office, Buckhannon.

BABCOCK

EDWARD A. BOYD, JR., Superintendent

(Fayette County) On U.S. Route 19, 4 miles south of U.S. 60. Adjacent to New River Canyon. Twenty-six cabins and fifty campsites. Features include: reconstructed grist mill on Glade Creek featuring freshly ground cornmeal and buckwheat flour, swimming pool, picnic area, fishing, trails, and scenic overlooks; children's playground, restaurant, tennis, volleyball, badminton, archery, croquet, horseshoe courts. Elevation 1,000 to 2,600 feet. Acreage, 4,127. Post Office, Clifftop.

BEARTOWN

MICHAEL SMITH, Superintendent

This natural area, just off U. S. 219 on the Pocahontas-Greenbrier County border, is unique due to its outstanding rock formations. Boardwalks and trails are available for the purpose of self-guided tours. Acreage 110.

BEECH FORK

(Cabell County) The system's newest park, Beech Fork is still under construction. Presently, 276 campsites with electric hookups are available. A recently constructed visitor's center/park headquarters is located at the Bowen entrance to greet park guests.

When fully developed Beech Fork will include day use facilities such as swimming, tennis, game courts, picnicking, hiking trails and an 18-hole championship golf course. Overnight accommodations will include a lodge and cabins. Acreage, 3,860. Post Office, Barboursville.

BERKELEY SPRINGS

(Morgan County) Berkeley Springs State Park is located in the Town of Bath near Berkeley Springs. It offers baths and swimming pools which utilize the warm and medicinal waters of Berkeley Springs. History of the colonists mentioned the qualities of the water as early as 1736, and prior to that, American Indians, who were subject to rheumatism knew of its medicinal qualities and called it the "healing waters." It was the first health and pleasure resort in the colonies. The temperature of the spring water is 74.3 degrees and is invariable.

The springs have been expanded to include a modern open air swimming pool with dressing facilities, and bath house with Roman Baths. For the convenience of patrons, the bath house is open 7 days a week the year round. There are adequate hotel, motel, and restaurant facilities in the surrounding area for those who visit Berkeley Springs.

George Washington and Lord Fairfax were among the many famous personalities who visited the resort during its more than two hundred and thirty years of history. Listed in the National Park Service Register of Historic Places. Post Office, Berkeley Springs. Acreage, 7.

BLACKWATER FALLS

ROBERT JOHNSON, Superintendent

(Tucker County) Located one mile west of Davis off W. Va. Route 32. Contains the State's finest waterfalls and scenic canyon. Overlook development at falls and along canyon rim, includes paved level "Gentle Trail" for use by handicapped, wheelchair-bound and elderly visitors. Excellent picnic facilities. Vacation accommodations including 25 cabins and 55-room lodge available year round. Facilities: Lake swimming, boating, horseback riding, hiking trails, camping grounds, playgrounds, game courts, and trading post. Golf at nearby Canaan Valley State Park. Elevation, 2,500 to 3,200 feet. Acreage, 1,688. Post Office, Davis.

BLUESTONE

P. KEITH COOPER, Superintendent

(Summers County) Located near Hinton on the Bluestone Reservoir. Offers excellent boating and fishing. Facilities include 25 vacation cabins, 87 camp sites, boat docks, game courts, restaurant and swimming pool. Golf at nearby Pipestem Resort. Acreage, 2,146. Post Office, Hinton.

CACAPON

PHILLIP A. DAWSON, Superintendent

(Morgan County) Near Shenandoah and South Branch valleys 10 miles south of Berkeley Springs. Thirty cabins, 55-room lodge. Facilities: supervised lake swimming, boating, fishing, picnic areas, horseback riding, golf course, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, restaurant. Elevation, 825 to 2,300. Acreage, 6,115. Post Office, Berkeley Springs.

CANAAN VALLEY

WILLIAM E. MOON, Superintendent

(Tucker County) Canaan Valley located south of Davis on W. Va. Route 32. 250-room lodge, 15 deluxe cabins. The first major ski facility in the state, Canaan Valley features an 18-hole golf course with snack bar and gift shop, a heated swimming pool, six lighted tennis courts, a lighted ice skating rink, hiking trails, fishing, a 34-unit campground, conference center, and a restaurant. Boating, horseback riding, and more scenic views are featured at nearby Blackwater Falls State Park. Elevation, 3,100 to 4,600 feet. Acreage, 6,015. Post Office, Davis.

CARNIFEX FERRY BATTLEFIELD

RANDALL M. RICE, Superintendent

(Nicholas County) Situated 12 miles southwest of Summersville on secondary road. Picnicking facilities, playground for children, refreshment stand, museum, and speaker's stand arrangements for commemorative gatherings. Area noteworthy as a Civil War battlefield. Elevation, 1,500 to 1,630. Acreage, 156. Post Office, Keslers Cross Lanes.

CASS SCENIC RAILROAD

RICHARD DALE, Superintendent

(Pocahontas County) Features a 12-mile scenic trip up Cheat Mountain to Bald Knob, the second highest point in the state, aboard an old time logging train powered by standard gauge, Shay steam locomotives that were used in early logging days. Accommodations include five six-person standard cabins, restaurant, souvenir shops, museums; picnicking, scenic overlook, nature trails, nearby camping. Elevation, 2,452 to 4,832. Acreage, 1,079. Post Office, Cass.

CATHEDRAL

IVAN NEWBERRY, JR., Superintendent

(Preston County) On U. S. 50 near Aurora. Purchased in 1942. Hiking trails. This park preserves a small authentic sample of the splendid timber which once dominated most of West Virginia. Elevation, 2,600 feet. Acreage, 132. Post Office, Aurora. Designated by the National Park Service as a Natural History Landmark.

CEDAR CREEK

THOMAS L. SHRIVER, Superintendent

(Gilmer County) Leave U. S. 33 at the Junction with W. Va. secondary Route 17, 3 miles south of Glenville. Follow Route 17 for 4 miles to park entrance. Picnicking, camping, swimming, tennis, playground and fishing. Acreage, 2,397. Post Office, Route 1, Glenville.

CHIEF LOGAN

GLENN A. ASHER, Superintendent

(Logan County) A day use recreation area, offering picnicking, swimming, hiking trails and an activities building with cafeteria. Acreage, 3,303. Post Office, Logan.

DROOP MOUNTAIN BATTLEFIELD

MICHAEL SMITH, Superintendent

(Pocahontas County) Scene of the State's most important Civil War engagement. On U. S. 219 between Marlinton and Lewisburg. Facilities: Picnic area, trails, scenic overlooks. Elevation 3,000 to 3,100 feet. Acreage, 287. Post Office, Hillsboro.

GRANDVIEW

HUNTER BOGGS, Superintendent

(Raleigh County) Located 11 miles north of U. S. 19-21 at Daniels. Noted for view of New River Gorge. Site of Cliffside Amphitheater in which the historical dramas "Honey In The Rock" and "Hatfields and McCoys" are presented each summer. Trails and picnicking facilities with tables, benches, fireplaces, and parking area. Elevation, 1,500 to 2,555 feet. Acreage, 891. Post Office, Beaver.

HAWK'S NEST

CHARLES C. PARKS, Superintendent

(Fayette County) On U. S. 60, 1½ miles west of Ansted; 31-room lodge, tennis courts and swimming pool; aerial tramway to New River and the marina below; picnic area with fireplaces and tables; picnic shelter, museum, trails; and scenic overlook with a very splendid view of the New River Gorge. Elevation, 670 to 1,530 feet. Acreage, 259. Post Office, Ansted.

HOLLY RIVER

JOSEPH HICKMAN, Acting Superintendent

(Webster County) On W. Va. 20 near Hacker Valley. Accommodations include nine cabins and 88 campsites. Other features are a swimming pool, fishing, picnic area, children's playground, trails with scenic overlooks and waterfalls, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, tennis, lawn games, restaurant and an excellent rhododendron display. With the acquisition of the Potato Knob Mountain Area in 1976, slightly more than 103 acres were added to the park. Elevation, 1,450 to 2,500 feet. Acreage, 8,102. Post Office, Hacker Valley.

LITTLE BEAVER

ERNEST W. ADKINS, Superintendent

(Raleigh County) Formerly a county-wide recreation area with a small boating and swimming lake, Little Beaver was acquired in 1971 as a State Park facility. Facilities: Boating, fishing and picnicking. Acreage, 562. Post Office, Beaver.

LOST RIVER

DAVID L. JONES, Superintendent

(Hardy County) Located 4 miles west of W. Va. 259 at Mathias. Close to fishing areas of South Branch and Cacapon Rivers. Twenty-four cabins. Facilities: supervised swimming, picnic areas, riding, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horse-shoes; archery, lawn games, restaurant and recreation building. Elevation, 1,800 to 3,200 feet. Acreage, 3,712. Post Office, Mathias.

NORTH BEND

ROBERT ROGERS, Superintendent

(Ritchie County) Located between Cornwallis and Harrisville. A 31-room lodge with restaurant provides excellent accommodations. Eight deluxe cabins. Other features: 55 campsites, swimming pool, tennis, miniature golf, picnic area, play equipment, trails, and fishing. Acreage, 1,405. Post Office, Cairo.

PINNACLE ROCK

FRED BYRD, Caretaker

(Mercer County) Day-use park is located along U. S. 52 about 5 miles northwest of Bluefield. Picnicking facilities, shelter, drinking water. Water impoundment, 12 acres. Area noted for the rocky outcrops which jut from this mountain top. Elevation, 2,350 to 3,100 feet. Acreage, 245. Post-Office, Bramwell.

PIPESTEM

DOUGLAS D. RITCHEY, Superintendent

(Summers and Mercer Counties) A major vacation state park resort just off W. Va. 20 between Hinton and Athens. In operation year-round, this park has two lodges with 143 rental units, meeting space, dining rooms, lounges and many other fine features. There are 25 vacation cabins, 50 campsites, an 18-hole championship golf course, a 9-hole par-three golf course, tennis courts, riding stables, boating, fishing, swimming, ice skating, an amphitheater, country stores and craft center. An aerial tramway is in operation from the upper rim of Bluestone canyon to the valley floor, a vertical distance of approximately 1,200 feet. Acreage, 4,023. Post Office, Pipestem.

PRICKETT'S FORT

(Marion County) Route 3, Fairmont, West Virginia, near Fairview. This historical area is located on the site of one of the early forts in West Virginia. Features include: reconstructed fort, museum, exhibits, arts and crafts, demonstrations and picnicking facilities. As a result of the Opekiska Dam on the Monongahela River an embayment was formed on Prickett's Creek that forms an excellent access by boat to the Monongahela River. There is a boat launching and docking site in the embayment. Acreage, 188. Post Office, Fairmont.

TOMLINSON RUN

DOUGLAS BAKER, Superintendent

(Hancock County) On W. Va. 2, park entrance lies one mile northeast of New Manchester on highway. Picnic tables, fireplaces, modern sanitary facilities, group camp, 30-acre lake, swimming pool and bathhouse, boating and fishing. This park's newest additions are a 50-site campground and tennis courts. Elevation, 750 to 1,270 feet. Acreage, 1,399. Post Office, New Manchester.

TWIN FALLS

A. SCOTT DURHAM, Superintendent

(Wyoming County) Near Pineville and Mullens. The park has 13 vacation cabins, lodge with 20 guest rooms, dining room, meeting space. There is an 18-hole golf course, golf clubhouse, swimming pool, tennis courts, a reconstructed pioneer homestead, trails, 50 campsites and picnic grounds. Plans have been completed for construction of additional lodge and meeting rooms. Elevation, 1,750 to 2,700 feet. Acreage, 3,776. Post Office, Mullens.

TYGART LAKE

RONALD KEITH SIMMONS, Superintendent

(Barbour and Taylor Counties) Located on Tygart River Reservoir about 5 miles south of Grafton. Ten vacation cabins, 40 campsites. Twenty-room lodge. Swimming, picnicking, boating, fishing, game courts, nearby golf course. Acreage, 2,133. Post Office, Grafton.

VALLEY FALLS

ALFRED DEAN, JR., Superintendent

(Marion and Taylor Counties) Located between Fairmont and Grafton at the Great Falls on the Tygart Valley River, provides day use recreation, is in the acquisition and planning stages. Elevation, 998 to 1,500 feet. Post Office, Fairmont. Acreage, 1,145.

WATOGA

WALTER SHUPE, Superintendent

(Pocahontas County) Located 10 miles south of Huntersville. Has an 11-acre lake. Thirty-three cabins. Eighty-eight campsites. Facilities: Supervised swimming, boating, fishing, picnic areas, riding, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, game courts, tennis, restaurant, nearby golf course. Elevation, 2,000 to 3,264 feet. Acreage, 10,110. Post Office, Marlinton.

WATTERS SMITH MEMORIAL

HERMAN FREEMAN, Superintendent

(Harrison County) Located between Lost Creek and West Milford. Day use only. A replica pioneer cabin is now being restored. Facilities: Picnicking, children's playground, game courts, swimming, and a pioneer farm museum. Acreage, 532. Post Office, Route 1, Lost Creek.

FAIRFAX STONE HISTORICAL MONUMENT

(Grant and Tucker Counties) Located on the Grant and Tucker County line. Historical marker. Site of the most noted landmark in West Virginia, which marked the western boundary of the Lord Fairfax estate and which played an important part in determining the final state boundary. 4 acres.

POINT PLEASANT BATTLE MONUMENT

ROBERT KAYSER, Caretaker

(Mason County) Point Pleasant, Historical marker. The Mansion House Museum has been preserved in its original form and now contains many relics of the Revolutionary era. 4 acres.

GREENBRIER RIVER TRAIL

CRAIG ACKERMAN, Superintendent

(Greenbrier and Pocahontas Counties) Although not actually referred to as a state park, this trail is the newest addition to the park system. Originally a part of the Chesapeake and Ohio rail system, this 76 mile portion has been turned into a backpacking trail running from North Caldwell to Cass, West Virginia. Other uses for the trail include bicycling, access for fishermen and canoers, and cross-country skiing in winter. Camping sites, water and sanitary facilities, and interpretive signing are proposed future developments. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the trail. Acreage, 936. Post Office, Caldwell.

DIRECTORY OF STATE FORESTS**CABWAYLINGO**

LACY H. JARRELL, Superintendent

(Wayne County) Located on Twelvepole Creek in Wayne County, 25 miles south of the city of Wayne. Facilities include 13 vacation cabins, campground, children's playground, hiking, picnicking, croquet, badminton, volleyball, horseshoe pits, and a 100-person group camp. Hunting and fishing is available during regular seasons. Elevation, 1,500 feet. Acreage, 8,123. Post Office, Dunlow.

CAL PRICE

(Pocahontas-Greenbrier Counties) Located 9 miles south of Huntersville, adjoining Watoga State Park, Cal Price State Forest is a primitive area utilized mainly by sportsmen. Campers may pitch their tents on the primitive campground, but the less hearty visitors stay in Watoga's vacation cabins. The forest is famous for excellent hunting of turkey, deer, and bear; and for the fishing in the fabulous Greenbrier River which forms the forest's western boundary. Elevation, 3,800. Acreage, 9,482. Post Office, Dunmore.

CAMP CREEK

DAVID E. BOBBS, Superintendent

(Mercer County) Located between Princeton and Beckley, just off U. S. 19 and 21, via the West Virginia Turnpike. Primarily a day-use area, although rustic campsites are provided, including tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and toilet facilities. Other features include picnic shelters, children's playgrounds, scenic hiking trails, and games. Hunting and fishing are allowed during regular seasons. Native wild turkey may be found along with many other species of game. Elevation, 2,900 feet. Acreage, 5,897. Post Office, Camp Creek.

COOPERS ROCK

ALFRED KERNS, Superintendent

(Preston County) Located on State Route 73, 8 miles west of Bruceton Mills and 13 miles east of Morgantown, it is the site of the famous Henry Clay Iron Furnace and the West Virginia University Experimental Forest. Features include scenic hiking trails with overlook, picnic sites and campground with tables, firewood, drinking water, hot showers, toilet and laundry facilities; boating, ice skating, skiing, hunting and fishing, two trout streams and a six-acre trout lake. Elevation, 2,100 feet. Acreage, 12,713. Post Office, Bruceton Mills.

GREENBRIER

CRAIG ACKERMAN, Superintendent

(Greenbrier County) Located on Harts Run 1½ miles off U. S. Route 60 between Lewisburg, host city for the West Virginia State Fair, and world famous White Sulphur Springs. Historic Kate's Mountain lies within the forest boundaries, and there are 12 completely equipped vacation cabins, tent and trailer camping area with hot showers, laundry and toilet facilities; scenic hiking trails; picnic areas with tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and toilet facilities; swimming pool and playgrounds, hunting and fishing are permitted during regular seasons. Elevation, 2,000 feet. Acreage, 5,130. Post Office, Caldwell.

KANAWHA

TOMMY MURDOCK, Superintendent

(Kanawha County) Located 7 miles south of Charleston on Davis Creek, Kanawha State Forest is a multiple use area with swimming, picnicking and horseback riding as the main recreation activities. There is also a 45-unit campground with tables, fireplaces, firewood, hot showers, laundry and toilet facilities. Hiking trails, playground facilities, picnic areas, hunting and fishing in season are also available. Elevation, 980 feet. Acreage, 9,052. Post Office, Charleston.

KUMBRABOW

RONALD YOUNG, Superintendent

(Randolph County) Located 24 miles south of Elkins off U. S. Route 219. Noted for its rugged natural beauty and highland terrain. Kumbrabow State Forest offers excellent hunting and fishing. A natural trout stream is stocked during the season, and deer, bear, turkey, and ruffed grouse abound on the forest and in surrounding woodland. There are 5 completely furnished rustic vacation cabins, picnic sites and campground with fireplaces, firewood, drinking water, tables and toilet facilities; scenic hiking trails; and children's playgrounds. Elevation, 3,800. Acreage, 9,474. Post Office, Huttonsville.

PANTHER

ROBERT BEANBLOSSOM, JR., Superintendent

(McDowell County) Located six miles south of Iaeger off U. S. Route 52. Features include swimming pool, hiking trails, picnic sites and tent campground with tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and toilet facilities; children's playgrounds; shuffle board, croquet, badminton, and horseshoe pits; hunting and fishing during regular seasons. Group camp. Elevation, 2,100. Acreage, 7,810. Post Office, Panther.

SENECA

FRED FROMHART, Superintendent

(Pocahontas County) Located approximately 7 miles northeast of Marlinton, off U. S. Route 219, along the Greenbrier River. Hunting is excellent, with deer, turkey, and bear attracting most of the sportsmen. There are 7 completely furnished rustic vacation cabins; picnic areas and tent campground with fireplaces, firewood, drinking water, tables and toilet facilities; children's playgrounds; and scenic hiking trails. Elevation, 3,631. Acreage, 11,684. Post Office, Dunmore.

RESERVATION OF LODGING ACCOMMODATIONS IN STATE PARKS AND FORESTS

Reservations are made by calling or writing the park or forest direct, or by calling a toll free number to reach the central office in Charleston. From the central office, the caller is given a direct connection to the park or forest so that the reservation can be made. The toll free number for West Virginia residents is: 1-800-642-9058.

The toll free telephone number for the surrounding states of Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, western New York, Maryland, Virginia, New Jersey, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina, and the District of Columbia is: 1-800-624-8632.

For states not covered by the toll free line, the central office may be reached by dialing: (304) 348-2766.

All lines will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except state and national holidays.

When making cabin reservations for four nights or more, a deposit of one half the rental fee is required with the remainder due upon arrival; for three nights or less, the full rental fee is required. For any lodge room, the first night's charge is required as a deposit. If you make your reservation by telephone, you will have ten days in which to make payment, unless it is a last minute reservation. In case of cancellations, deposits will be returned (except for a \$15 handling fee for cabins) if notice is given thirty days in advance for cabins and forty-eight hours in advance for lodge rooms.

Reservations for any cabin or lodge room may be made a year in advance for West Virginia residents and 10 months in advance for out-of-state residents.

CAMPING RESERVATIONS

While most campsites are reserved on a first come, first served basis, up to 25% of the sites at Babcock, Beech Fork, Blackwater Falls, Holly River, North Bend, Pipestem and Watoga State Parks are available for reservations. Accepted in writing only, reservations must be made at least 14 days in advance and for a minimum of two, but not to exceed a maximum of 14 nights. In addition to the usual fee, a \$5.00 handling fee will be charged. For further information and reservation forms, contact the aforementioned parks directly.

The Monongahela National Forest was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on April 28, 1920, under the Weeks Law. This law of 1911 provides for the cooperation by states with the United States, and the protection of watersheds of navigable streams. In West Virginia, the National Forest was established for flood protection in the Ohio and Potomac River valleys. It is one of a system of 155 National Forests and the only National Forest wholly in West Virginia. The Clark-McNary Act of June 7, 1924, broadened the objectives to provide for reforestation and production of timber. The Multiple Use Act of June 12, 1960, provides that National Forests shall be managed for outdoor recreation, range, timber, watershed, hunting, and fishing. The Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area Act of September 28, 1965, established the 100,000 acre National Recreation Area on the Forest and authorized land acquisition and an accelerated program of outdoor recreation facilities. On January 3, 1975, Public Law 93-622 made Dolly Sods and Otter Creek parts of the National Wilderness Preservation System and the Monongahela National Forest became responsible for the management of these Wilderness Areas. On January 13, 1983, Public Law 97-466 added the Cranberry and Laurel Fork Wilderness Areas to the National Wilderness Preservation System.

The Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (the Resources Planning Act) authorized a national assessment of Forest resources and set up a system of long range plans to assure that the American people enjoy adequate supplies of water, recreation, forage, timber, and wildlife in the decades ahead. The National Forest Management Act of 1976 strengthened the planning process and updated the authorization for resource management. Planning on the Monongahela National Forest is an interdisciplinary process that includes involvement of the public.

This public forest is dedicated to the protection, development, and management of all its resources for the greatest good to the greatest number over the long run.

Within the proclaimed boundary and authorized purchase units there are 1,673,700 acres of which 860,107 are owned by the United States. Directly in charge of the National Forest is the Forest Supervisor. In the National Forest are six Ranger Districts, each administered by a District Ranger.

**MONONGAHELA NATIONAL FOREST
RECREATION ATTRACTIONS**

Special areas of interest include *Seneca Rocks*, a 1,000 foot quartzite formation which rises above the North Fork Valley near the community of Seneca Rocks. Besides its appeal to sightseers, Seneca Rocks is considered by many climbers to be the best rock climb in the East. The Seneca Rocks Visitor Center is located in the area along with picnic facilities. Exhibits and programs are provided for public enjoyment at the Visitor Center.

Spruce Knob, the highest point in West Virginia rises to over 4,800 feet above sea level. It is an area of windblown red spruce and rock outcrops and is accessible by road. It affords excellent views to the east and west. Visitors will enjoy the Spruce Knob Observation Tower and interpretive trail.

The *Smoke Hole* is a rugged scenic canyon through which the South Branch of the Potomac River flows for about 20 miles. Over half of the distance is flanked by a narrow scenic road. In the Smoke Hole is located the Big Bend Campground and Smoke Hole Campground and Picnic Area.

The *Dolly Sods* Wilderness containing 10,215 acres appears like a bit of Canada transplanted on top of Allegheny Mountain. It is located in the northeastern portion of the Forest.

The *Otter Creek* Wilderness comprises 20,000 acres and is located in the northwestern section of the Forest. It includes almost the entire drainage of Otter Creek and contains rich hardwood stands intermingled with patches of red spruce and eastern hemlock. A large bog is also situated within the area.

The *Laurel Fork* Wilderness contains 12,200 acres in two sections north and south of the Laurel Fork Campground on the Greenbrier Ranger District. It includes the upper drainage area of the Laurel Fork and a rich northern hardwood forest.

The *Cranberry* Wilderness contains 35,600 acres and is located on the Gauley Ranger District. It is the largest Wilderness on the Monongahela National Forest and contains a rich mixture of hardwood trees interspersed with red spruce on the higher elevations.

The *Cranberry Glades* Botanical Area contains four bogs whose plant and animal life is similar to that found in the Canadian bogs or "muskegs" of the North. A boardwalk trail with

interpretive signs has been constructed for visitor enjoyment and to protect the fragile ecology.

The *Cranberry Mountain Visitor Center* is located a few miles from Cranberry Glades along the Highland Scenic Highway. Exhibits and programs are provided for the visitors' benefit.

The *Falls of Hills Creek Scenic Area* contain three waterfalls, the most spectacular of which is 65 feet high. There is a scenic forest trail leading down the gorge to the falls.

The *Gaudineer Scenic Area* is a remnant of a vast virgin spruce forest. These spruce trees attain a height of 100 feet and grow to 35 inches in diameter. This 140 acre primeval stand is over 250 years old.

The *Lake Sherwood Recreation Area* contains a man-made lake containing 164 acres. In addition to camping and picnicking facilities, there is a boating site and rental boats, swim site with beach and bath house, and a network of hiking trails near the campground.

The *Highland Scenic Highway* runs from the outskirts of Richwood to U. S. Highway 219 at the top of Elk Mountain for a distance of about 45 miles. This route takes the visitor through a remote section of the high Allegheny Mountains and offers a variety of scenic views.

The *Spruce Knob Lake Recreation Complex* located in Randolph County contains a 25 acre impoundment stocked with trout. Only non-motorized boating is permitted. It also contains a 43 family unit rustic campground.

The *Lake Buffalo Impoundment* located in Pocahontas County contains 22 acres. It is principally stocked with trout. No camping facilities are available at the lake. Only non-motorized boating is permitted.

The *Summit Lake Recreation Complex* located in Greenbrier County contains a 45 acre impoundment principally stocked with trout. Only non-motorized boating is permitted. It contains a 33 family unit campground adjacent to the lake.

TAX DEPARTMENT

COLLECTION OF REVENUE

BUSINESS AND OCCUPATION TAX

The Business and Occupation Tax, Chapter 11, Article 13, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied for the privilege of engaging in business in West Virginia. The tax is measured by the application of rates against values of products, gross proceeds of sales, or gross income according to the classification of the business activity in which the taxpayer is engaged. Despite the commonly supplied erroneous name, "Gross Sales Tax", it is not a sales tax. Neither is it a transaction tax in the sense that once it is paid on a particular article or service or activity it need not again be paid. It is not, strictly speaking, an income tax, although in most instances the gross income is the measure of the tax. Under the production and manufacturing classifications the measure of the tax is the value of the article produced or manufactured as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof, provided the proceeds of sale are indicative of the true value of the article. If more than one person engages in a single activity or transaction, as in the case of the contractor and sub-contractor, each must pay a tax measured by his entire income regardless of the tax paid by the other.

The business classifications under the Business and Occupation Tax Law are as follows:

A. Production of Coal and Other Natural Resource Products. The tax is measured by the value of the articles mined or reported as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the producer, the rates being applied against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

B. Manufacturing, Compounding or Preparing for Sale. The tax is measured by the value of the articles manufactured, compounded or prepared for sale in West Virginia, as shown by the gross proceeds derived from the sale thereof by the manufacture or person compounding or preparing the same. The rate, 80 cents on each \$100.00 value, applies against the value of the entire production in West Virginia, regardless of the place of the sale or the fact that deliveries are made to points outside the State.

C. (1) Business of Selling Tangible Property at Retail. There is levied a tax of 52.25 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

(2) Business of Selling Tangible Property at Wholesale. There is levied a tax of 25.65 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

D. Public Service or Utility Business. The tax rates set forth hereinbelow are levied on the gross income of the following businesses:

E. Contracting. There is levied a tax of \$2.09 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

G. Amusement. There is levied a tax of 67.45 cents on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

H. Service Business or Calling Not Otherwise Specifically Taxed. There is levied a tax of \$1.0925 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

I. Business of Furnishing Property for Hire. There is levied a tax of \$1.0925 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business.

K. Banking and other Financial Institutions: There is levied a tax of \$1.0925 on each \$100.00 of gross income, as defined by the statute, for this type of business. Effective June 1, 1983 a fifteen percent (15%) temporary surtax is imposed on banking and other financial business. *This surtax expires June 30, 1985.*

M. Sales of Electric power not taxed as a public utility activity:
Domestic and Exported \$3.80 per \$100.00

An annual exemption of \$400.00 (\$33.00 per month) is provided under the Business and Occupation Tax Law for each person, as defined by statute, engaged in business in the State effective July 1, 1984. Effective July 1, 1985, the exemption rises to \$500.00 (\$41.67 per month). Note: If reporting on a calendar year basis the maximum exemption that can be claimed is \$350.00 for 1984 and \$450.00 for 1985. Fiscal year taxpayers shall compute their annual exemption by using the applicable monthly exemption for each month in their fiscal year.

CARRIER INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Carrier Income Tax Ch. 11, Art. 12A, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is an annual tax on incomes of certain carriers. This article repealed the former "privilege tax on certain carrier corporations" and is imposed on every motor vehicle carrier operating on the public highways of this State and every railroad car carrier, railroad carrier, express company, pipeline company, telephone and telegraph company, airline company and any person operating a steamboat or other watercraft, for the transportation of passengers or freight, doing business in the State. The law provides that the foregoing taxpayers shall pay to the State an annual tax for each calendar year. This tax shall be equal to the gross income from all business beginning and ending within the State.

In addition to the tax imposed on gross intrastate income, the tax is imposed on the net income earned within the State.

CORPORATION NET INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Corporation Net Income Tax, Chapter 11, Article 24, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a conformity statute which imposes a tax on the net income of corporations and similar business organizations. The tax rate is six percent on taxable income up to and including \$50,000 and seven percent on the portion of income in excess of \$50,000. Being a statute correlated to the Federal Internal Revenue Code will simplify preparation of state corporation net income tax returns by taxpayers, improve enforcement and aid in interpretation of the law through increased use of federal judicial and administrative determinations and precedents.

The tax is paid in four equal installments, the taxpayer preparing an annual declaration of estimated tax and reconciling the same through the filing of an annual return. The due date of the declaration is the fifteenth day of the fourth month of the tax year. The following quarterly payments are due on the fifteenth day of the sixth, ninth and twelfth months of the taxable year. The annual return is due on the fifteenth day of the third month following the close of the taxable year.

CONSUMERS SALES AND SERVICE TAX

The Consumers Sales and Service Tax, Chapter 11, Article 15, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a general sales tax that applies to all sales of tangible personal property or services consummated within West Virginia for use, consumption, or any other purpose, except, (1) sales for resale, (2) sales of certain exempt commodities, (3) sales to certain exempt persons, (4) interstate sales, (5) sales of professional or personal services, and (6) services provided by persons subject to the control of the West Virginia Public Service Commission. The measure of the tax is based upon the total sales price of all articles purchased during a particular buying episode, with the rate of tax being derived from a sales bracket system as follows:

- (1) on each sale, where the monetary consideration is from six cents to twenty cents, both inclusive, one cent;
- (2) on each sale, where the monetary consideration is from twenty-one cents to forty cents, both inclusive, two cents;
- (3) on each sale, where the monetary consideration is from forty-one cents to sixty cents, both inclusive, three cents;
- (4) on each sale, where the monetary consideration is from sixty-one cents to eighty cents, both inclusive, four cents;
- (5) on each sale, where the monetary consideration is from eighty-one cents to one dollar, both inclusive, five cents;
- (6) if the sale price is in excess of one dollar, five cents on each whole dollar of sale price, and upon any fractional part of a dollar in excess of whole dollars, as follows: One cent on the fractional part of the dollar if less than twenty-one cents; two cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of twenty cents but less than forty-one cents; three cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of forty cents but less than sixty-one cents; four cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of sixty cents but less than eighty-one cents; and five cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of eighty cents. For example, the tax on sales from one dollar and one cent to one dollar and twenty cents, both inclusive, six cents; on sales from one dollar and twenty-one cents to one dollar and forty cents, both inclusive, seven cents; on sales from one dollar and forty-one cents to one dollar and sixty cents, both inclusive, eight cents; on sales from one dollar and sixty-one cents to one dollar and eighty cents, both inclusive, nine cents; on sales from one dollar and eighty-one cents to two dollars, both inclusive, ten cents.

Separate sales, such as daily or weekly deliveries, shall not be aggregated for the purpose of computation of the tax even though such sales are aggregated in the billing or payment therefor. Notwithstanding any other provision, coin-operated amusement and vending machine sales shall be aggregated for the purpose of computation of this tax.

Individual sales of five cents or less are exempt from tax; however, the purchase of two five cent articles at the same time is a taxable transaction.

The law provides that the vendor shall collect the tax due from the purchaser at the time of sale and that the purchaser shall pay such tax unless he can present to the vendor a properly executed certificate of exemption. Should either party fail to comply with the law in this regard, the liability becomes a personal debt due the State, and if the taxpayer is a corporation, its officers are personally liable jointly and severally in case of default.

Consumers Sales Tax is to be paid by ultimate consumers; sellers collect the tax and remit their collections to the Tax Department. Only one collection of Consumers Sales Tax should occur in the channel from production to ultimate consumption for any consumer good or service. Any seller who fails to collect the Consumers Sales Tax must pay the tax himself unless the sale was exempt. Exemptions from Consumers Sales Tax are:

- (1) Sales of gasoline, taxable under article 14, chapter 11 of the Code of 1931;
- (2) Sales of gas, steam and water delivered to consumers through mains or pipes, and sales of electricity;
- (3) Sales of textbooks required to be used in any of the schools of this state;

- (4) Sales of property or services to the state, its institutions or subdivisions, and to the United States, including agencies of federal, state or local governments for distribution in public welfare or relief work;
- (5) Sales of motor vehicles which are titled by the department of motor vehicles which are subject to the tax imposed by section 4, article 3, chapter 17-a of the Code;
- (6) Sales of property or services to churches and bona fide charitable organizations who make no charge whatever for the services they render or sales of property or services to corporations or organizations qualified under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or under section 501(c) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, who make casual and occasional sales not conducted in a repeated manner or in the ordinary course of repetitive and successive transactions of like character, or sales of property or services to persons engaged in this state in the business of contracting, manufacturing, transportation, transmission, communication, or in the production of natural resources: *Provided, however,* That the exemption herein granted shall apply only to services, machinery, supplies and materials directly used or consumed in the businesses or organizations named above;
- (7) An isolated transaction in which any tangible personal property is sold, transferred, offered for sale, or delivered by the owner thereof or by his representative for the owner's account, such sale, transfer, offer for sale or delivery not being made in the ordinary course of repeated and successive transactions of like character by such owner or on his account by such representatives;
- (8) Sales of tangible personal property and services rendered for use or consumption in connection with the conduct of the business of selling tangible personal property to consumers or dispensing a service subject to tax under this article or which would be subject to tax under this article but for the exemption for food provided in section eleven of this article and sales of tangible personal property and services rendered for use or consumption in connection with the commercial production of an agricultural product the ultimate sale of which will be subject to the tax imposed by this article or which would have been subject to tax under this article but for the exemption for food provided in section eleven of this article: *Provided,* That sales of tangible personal property and services to be used or consumed in the construction of or permanent improvement of real property shall not be exempt;
- (9) Sales of tangible personal property for the purpose of resale in the form of tangible personal property;
- (10) Sales of property or services to nationally chartered fraternal or social organizations for the sole purpose of free distribution in public welfare or relief work;
- (11) Sales and services, fire fighting, or station house equipment, including construction and automotive, made to any volunteer fire department organized and incorporated under the laws of the state of West Virginia;
- (12) Sales of newspapers when delivered to consumers by route carriers;
- (13) Sales of drugs dispensed upon prescription and sales of insulin to consumers for medical purposes;
- (14) Sales of radio and television broadcasting time, newspaper and outdoor advertising space for the advertisement of goods or services;
- (15) Sales and services performed by day care centers;
- (16) Casual and occasional sales of property or services not conducted in a repeated manner or in the ordinary course of repetitive and successive transactions of like character by corporations or organizations qualified under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or under section 501(c) (4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended;
- (17) Bank safety deposit boxes;
- (18) Sales of property or services to a school which has approval from the West Virginia board of regents to award degrees, which has its principal campus in this state, and which is exempt from federal and state income taxes under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended;

- (19) Sales of mobile homes to be utilized by purchasers as their principal year-round residence and dwelling: *Provided*, That these mobile homes shall be subject to tax at the three percent rate;
- (20) Sales of food intended for human consumption made on or after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-one;
- (21) Sales of goods and services by owners, trainees or jockeys when activities are essential to the effective conduct of a horse or dog racing meeting taxed under provisions of Article 23, Chapter 19 of the West Virginia Code;
- (22) Sales of professional services by certain persons recognized by the Tax Department as being professional;
- (23) Sales of personal services performed by one individual upon the person of another, and;
- (24) Sales of lottery tickets and materials by licensed lottery sales agents and lottery retailers authorized by the State Lottery Commission.

USE TAX

The Use Tax, Chapter 11, Article 15A, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is imposed upon the use within West Virginia of tangible personal property which is bought or leased outside West Virginia and then furnished or delivered for use or consumption within this State. The tax is levied at the rate of five percent of the purchase price.

The State Tax Commissioner is empowered to authorize certain foreign retailers to collect use tax at the time a sale is made and remit the tax on a quarterly basis. Any person who uses any tangible personal property upon which the tax has not been paid to the seller is personally liable for such tax and is required to remit the tax imposed on all such property directly to the State Tax Commissioner.

The use in West Virginia of the following tangible personal property is exempt from the tax:

- (1) All articles of tangible personal property brought into the state of West Virginia by a nonresident individual for his or her use or enjoyment while within the state;
- (2) Tangible personal property, the gross receipts from the sale of which are exempted from the retail sales tax by the terms of Article 15, Chapter 11 of the Code of West Virginia of 1931;
- (3) Tangible personal property, the gross receipts from the sale of which are derived from the sale of machinery, supplies and materials to contractors, or to persons engaged in the business of manufacturing, transportation, transmission, communication or in the production of natural resources in this state: *Provided*, That the exemptions granted in this subdivision three are hereby suspended, nullified and made inoperative during the period from the first day of April, 1969, to midnight of March 31, 1970: *Provided further*, That after midnight of March 31, 1970, the exemptions granted in this subdivision three shall again be in full force and effect as if they had not been suspended, nullified and made inoperative as hereto provided;
- (4) Tangible personal property, the gross receipts or the gross proceeds from the sale of which are required to be included in the measure of the tax imposed by Article 15, Chapter 11 of the Code of West Virginia of 1931;
- (5) Tangible personal property the sale of which in this state is not subject to the West Virginia consumers sales tax;
- (6) Sales of mobile homes to be utilized by purchasers as their principal year-round residence and dwelling: *Provided*, That these mobile homes shall be subject to tax at the three percent rate.

PERSONAL INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Personal Income Tax Act (West Virginia Code, Chapter 11, Article 21) was enacted by the 1961 Regular Session of the Legislature on February 10, 1961, and signed by the Governor on February 14, 1961. The provisions of the Act applied to all taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1961, including that part which elapsed prior to the effective date of the Act.

Description of Tax. The West Virginia Income Tax Act imposes a personal income tax on the taxable income of all resident individuals, and resident estates and trusts, irrespective of where such income is earned. Nonresident individuals, estates and trusts are taxed only upon income derived from West Virginia sources. Corporations and partnerships are not subject to the West Virginia Income Tax. A trust or other unincorporated organization which by reason of its activities is exempt from Federal Income Tax is also exempt from West Virginia Income Tax.

The nature of the Act was to adopt for West Virginia Personal Income Tax the provisions of the Federal Income Tax laws relating to the determination of income. As adopted, it can be stated that the West Virginia Income Tax Act is a conformity statute. The same general concepts of income, gain, loss and deduction are employed in the West Virginia Act as are employed in the Federal Income Tax Law. The method used to make reference to the federal law is general in scope. With the exception of several modifications generally described hereinbelow, West Virginia adjusted gross income is federal adjusted gross income. Amendments made to the Federal Income Tax Law which affect income, gain, loss and deduction are reflected in the West Virginia Income Tax Law by periodic legislative enactments. The conformity with the Federal Income Tax Law was adopted to simplify preparation of state income tax returns, to improve enforcement of the State Income Tax through better use of information obtained from federal income tax audits, and to aid interpretation of the state tax law through increased use of federal judicial and administrative determinations and precedents.

Modifications to Income. West Virginia adjusted gross income is determined by applicable modifications increasing or decreasing Federal adjusted gross income. Among the modifications which reduce Federal adjusted gross income are items that benefit military personnel, persons who are sixty-five years of age or older and individuals receiving benefits under certain retirement systems. Some of the modifications that increase Federal adjusted gross income are interest from all saver certificates, the deduction for two-wage earners and varying percentages of accelerated cost recovery depreciation.

Deductions. An individual, resident or nonresident, may use the West Virginia standard deduction on his state return, regardless of whether he used the standard deduction or claimed itemized deductions on his federal return. The West Virginia standard deduction for an individual is ten (10) percent of his West Virginia adjusted gross income or \$1,000, whichever is less. A resident or non-resident individual may elect to use itemized deductions in computing his West Virginia taxable income only if he claimed itemized deductions for the same year on his federal return. Itemized deductions for residents are the same as federal deductions, with the exception of two modifications; nonresidents' deductions must be attributed to or connected with West Virginia sources.

Personal Exemptions. An individual, resident or nonresident, is allowed an exemption of \$800 for each exemption to which he is entitled for federal income tax purposes. A husband and wife who file joint federal return but separate West Virginia returns may each claim only the exemptions to which he or she would have been entitled if separate federal returns had been filed. The exemption for an estate or trust is \$600.

Rate of Tax. For all taxable years or portions thereof ending prior to January 1, 1963, the West Virginia Income Tax rate was six (6) percent of the Federal Income Tax which would have been imposed on an identical amount of federal taxable income. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1963, and before January 1, 1970, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed on West Virginia taxable income at rates graduated from 1.2% to 5.5%. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1970, and before January 1, 1971, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed at rates graduated from 1.65% to 7.6%. For taxable periods beginning on or after January 1, 1971, and before April 1, 1983, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed at rates graduated from 2.1% to 9.6%. Effective April 1, 1983, the rates were changed to graduate from 2.1% to 13.0%. Between April 1, 1983, and June 30, 1985, a 12% surtax will be imposed on all individuals, estates and trusts and heads of households with taxable incomes over \$10,000 and all married taxpayers filing jointly with taxable incomes over \$20,000. For taxable years beginning before January 1, 1983, the West Virginia Income Tax Act provided only two rate schedules; one for joint returns and one for individuals, estates, trusts and heads of households. For taxable year beginning on or after January 1, 1983, three rate schedules are provided; one for individuals, estates and trusts, one for joint returns, and one for heads of households.

Credits Against Tax. The West Virginia Income Tax Act provides credits against the personal income tax for: (1) Business and Occupation Tax imposed against the taxpayer; (2) Carrier Income Tax imposed against the taxpayer; (3) West Virginia Income Tax withheld from the individual's wages or salary; (4) estimated income tax payments made by the individual; (5) income taxes paid by residents to other states; and income taxes paid by nonresidents to their state of residence, except for certain states with which West Virginia has a reciprocal agreement or practices reciprocity.

EXCISE AND LICENSE TAXES DIVISION

The Division of Excise & License Taxes is responsible for the administration of excise and license taxes of the Tax Department. The Division has six sections and all deal directly with the taxpayer.

Taxes administered by this division are the Gasoline and Special Fuel Excise Tax, the Motor Carrier Road Tax, the Cigarette Tax, the Soft Drinks Tax, the Business Franchise Registration Tax, the Corporate Charter License Tax, and the Consumers Sales Tax on Gasoline and Special Fuel. The Division of Excise and License Taxes also administers the Consumer Protection Act, the Collection Agency Act and the Drug Paraphernalia Act and issues bingo and charitable raffle licenses.

GASOLINE AND SPECIAL FUEL EXCISE TAX

The Gasoline and Special Fuel Excise Tax (Code 11-14) has been a part of the revenue laws of West Virginia since 1923. This statute has been amended and reenacted several times, but its overall features are generally similar. The basic elements of the statute are:

- (1) An excise tax of 10.5 cents per gallon is levied on each gallon of gasoline or special fuel;
- (2) The tax is imposed on any distributor or producer on all actual metered gallons of gasoline or special fuel withdrawn from his storage in West Virginia and; on any retail dealer, importer or user on all actual metered gallons of gasoline or special fuel received into his storage in West Virginia and not already taxed, and on any other person who is not a distributor, producer, retail dealer, importer or user on all actual metered gallons of gasoline or special fuel subject to Gasoline Tax and not already included in the measure of tax by him or another person;
- (3) Exemptions from this tax are allowed for certain uses, in general, nonhighway and nonvehicle use, and for certain users, generally governmental units. An exemption is also allowed if the gasoline or special fuel is exported from the State;
- (4) As set out under West Virginia Code 11-14-10 and 11-14-11 refunds of Gasoline and Special Fuel Excise Tax can be made because of
 - (a) certain nonhighway uses
 - (b) casualty losses of gasoline
 - (c) certain exportation
 - (d) evaporation losses
 - (e) changes in the value of inventory which result from changes in the rate of the tax
 - (f) erroneous or illegal collection of the tax.

Partial refunds are granted to operators of urban and suburban bus lines when certain conditions are met. Neither refunds nor partial refunds can be made unless all statutory and administrative requirements with regard to such conditions as form and timeliness of petition are met.

Gasoline, for tax purposes, is defined as any product commonly or commercially known as gasoline, regardless of classification, suitable for use as fuel in an internal combustion engine, except special fuel.

The term special fuel means any gas or liquid, other than gasoline, used or suitable for use as fuel in an internal combustion engine. The term includes products commonly known as natural or casinghead gasoline, but does not include any petroleum product or chemical compound such as alcohol, industrial solvent, heavy furnace oil, lubricant, etc., not commonly used nor practicably suited for use as fuel in an internal combustion engine.

MOTOR CARRIER ROAD TAX

The Motor Carrier Road Tax Law, Chapter 11, Article 14A of the West Virginia Code, was enacted in 1959. This tax must be paid on each gallon of gasoline or special fuel used in motor carrier operations within West Virginia at a rate required to be equivalent to the rate per gallon of gasoline taxed under the Gasoline Tax. The current Gasoline Tax rate is 10.5 cents per gallon. Every taxpayer subject to the Motor Carrier Road Tax is entitled to a credit accrued for gallons of gasoline or special fuel purchased in this State but consumed outside the State.

Motor carrier vehicles operated in West Virginia are also subject to a mandatory registration fee of \$5 per vehicle plus a surtax of \$5 per motor carrier operated with a gross weight of 8,001 pounds or over. Recreational and farm vehicles are exempt from the surtax.

A "motor carrier" is defined as every person, firm or corporation who operates or causes to be operated on any highway in this State any passenger vehicle that has seats for more than nine passengers in addition to the driver, or any road tractor, or any tractor truck or any truck having more than two axles.

**CONSUMERS SALES AND USE TAX ON
GASOLINE AND SPECIAL FUELS**

The Consumers Sales and Use Tax Laws (Code 11-15 and 11-15A) were amended effective April 1, 1983 to impose a Consumers Sales and Service tax on the sale of gasoline and special fuel, generally at the wholesale level by distributors and importers and an Excise tax on use or consumption within West Virginia on gasoline and special fuel purchased outside West Virginia.

The tax is based on the average wholesale price of gasoline and special fuel as determined by the State Tax Commissioner annually. Each January 1, the Tax Commissioner will determine the average wholesale price for the annual period on the basis of sales data gathered for the preceding period of July 1 through October 31. However, the average wholesale price of gasoline and special fuel will never be deemed to be less than 97 cents per gallon. For 1984, the average price per gallon has been determined to be 97 cents per gallon, and the tax rate has been set at .0485¢ per gallon. This is determined by multiplying the average price per gallon by 5 percent (the Consumers Sales and Use Tax rate).

The sales tax is levied on all gallons of gasoline and special fuel (including heating fuel) except sales to:

- Federal Government and agencies
- State Government and agencies
- County Government and agencies
- Municipal Government and agencies
- Exports to other states
- By special act of Congress
- Sales to West Virginia licensed distributors
- Gallons previously taxed (tax paid purchases by this Statute)

BUSINESS FRANCHISE REGISTRATION CERTIFICATE TAX

The Business Franchise Registration Certificate Tax (Code 11-12) was adopted in 1970 in replacement of the General License Tax and the Store Tax and Fees. The tax was primarily designed and instituted to provide information on business activity in the State which would aid in the administration of all taxes administered by the Tax Department; the statute is administered by the Division of Excise and License Taxes.

Who Is Covered By The Act?

Anyone in business. "Business" shall mean any business, whether a person engaged expressly or impliedly holds himself out as engaged in business or supplying his products or a commodity or service to the public as a class or a limited portion of the public or sells any goods, wares, merchandise of any kind or provides a service of any kind.

Who Is Exempt From The Act?

That "business" shall not include sales of products of the farm, garden, or dairy by the producer or grower thereof; occasional sales by societies acting for charitable, religious or benevolent purposes; judicial sales directed by law or court order; or any business the gross income of which is less than four thousand dollars per license year. "Gross income" shall mean the gross receipts of the business received as compensation for personal services and from trade, commerce, or sales and the value accruing from the sale of tangible property (real or personal), or service, or both, without any deduction on account of the cost of property sold, materials used, labor costs, taxes or any other expense whatsoever.

Persons exempt are requested to register; however, they are not required to pay the fee of \$15.00.

What Is Required of Anyone Going Into Business Or In Business?

Every person is required to register prior to going into business, and renew the registration each fiscal year July 1 to June 30 thereafter, and pay a fee of \$15.00 for each business location a person holds himself out to engage in or transact business therefrom. Anyone doing business in West Virginia is presumed to have a business location for the purpose of this Act.

Penalty Or Fine

Anyone engaging in or prosecuting any business activity who fails to register with the State Tax Department may be penalized \$50.00 per month.

Does This Act Affect Other License Issued By the State?

No, in other words, registration or license required by the Banking Commission, Beer Commission, Insurance Commission, etc., are not affected by this Act.

SOFT DRINKS TAX

The Soft Drinks Tax Act (Code 11-19) has been a part of West Virginia Revenue laws since 1951. This provision imposes an excise tax upon the sale, use, handling or distribution of bottled soft drinks and soft drink syrups, including all powder bases prepared for mixing soft drinks.

The law has been amended several times, most significantly in 1958 when many items for domestic use were removed from taxation and a provision for the tax on commercial consumption at soda fountains and restaurants was reinstated. This statutory amendment also specifically provides for taxing soft drink powders such as kool aid, oh boy drinks, tip top, miracle aid and all other similar products both domestically and commercially consumed.

Effective July 1, 1980 the Tax Commissioner is authorized to refund soft drink tax to wholesalers when the tax stamps, crowns, soft drinks, powders or syrups upon which tax has been paid are destroyed by fire, lightning or flood and when the soft drinks, syrups or powders upon which tax has been paid are exported from this State. Refund or credit can only be for the amount of tax paid to the Tax Commissioner.

Application for the refund or credit must be filed within 180 days from the date the tax stamps or crowns were destroyed or the soft drink product upon which tax was paid were destroyed or exported from West Virginia.

This tax was imposed to be used solely for the construction, maintenance and operation of the four-year school of medicine, dentistry and nursing at West Virginia University.

CIGARETTE TAX

The Cigarette Tax (Code 11-17) was originally enacted in 1947 and has been subsequently amended and reenacted in 1951, 1956, 1958, 1961, 1962, 1970, 1974, and 1978. This statute, administered by the Division of Excise and License Taxes imposes a tax upon the sale of cigarettes at the rate of seventeen cents per package of twenty (20) cigarettes, with the intent that the tax be paid by the ultimate consumer. Revenues collected from this tax are deposited into the General Revenue Fund.

COLLECTION AGENCY ACT

The Collection Agency statute (Code 47-16) is enforced by the Division of Excise and License Taxes. The act requires that no persons, firm, corporation or association shall conduct within the State a collection agency without having first obtained a Business Franchise Certificate, nor shall any person, firm, corporation or association establish or operate a collection agency or the business of a collection agency, unless they maintain an office within the State of West Virginia. A license is required for each collection agency, including each principal office and all branch offices thereof. Each applicant shall file with the Tax Commissioner a continuing surety bond executed by a corporation licensed to transact business in West Virginia in the amount of \$5,000. A separate bond needs to be filed for each agency including the principal office and each branch office.

The term "collection agency" does not mean nor include:

- (1) regular employees of a single creditor or of a collection agency licensed hereunder;
- (2) banks;
- (3) trust companies;
- (4) savings and loan associations;
- (5) buildings and loan associations;
- (6) industrial loan companies;
- (7) abstract companies doing an escrow business;
- (8) duly licensed real estate brokers or agents when the claims or accounts being handled by such broker or agent are related to or in connection with such brokers' or agents' regular real estate business;

- (9) express and telegraph companies subject to public regulation and supervision;
- (10) attorneys at law handling claims and collections in their own names and not operating a collection agency under the management of a layman; or
- (11) any person, firm, corporation or association acting under the order of any court of competent jurisdiction.

CONSUMER PROTECTION ACT

The Consumer Protection Act, Article 7, Chapter 46A, became effective June 9, 1974. The Excise and License Division of the State Tax Department is charged with the responsibility of maintaining a file on those persons that designate that they issue consumer credit or consumer loans.

Generally speaking, all persons who make credit sales of real or personal property or services to private individuals and the amount financed is under \$25,000.00 must give notification to the Tax Department. This includes doctors and lawyers who impose a finance charge on their payment plans. It also includes government agencies and national banks.

DRUG PARAPHERNALIA

This law became effective June 11, 1982, and is administered by the State Tax Department, Division of Excise and License Taxes. The law (Code 47-19) requires a license fee of \$150.00 for any person selling any item, effect, paraphernalia, accessory or thing which is designed or marketed for use with controlled substances as defined in Chapter 60A of the West Virginia Code. Applications must be accompanied by affidavit that each and every employee authorized to sell drug paraphernalia has never been convicted of a drug related offense. Institutions authorized by Chapter 60A to distribute controlled substances may also sell items, such as syringes, which are designed and marketed for lawful use, either with controlled substances or with over the counter medicine such as insulin. Even though these items may also facilitate the illegal use of controlled substances, authorized institutions are not required to obtain drug paraphernalia licenses so long as the institutions sell only the items designed and marketed for legal use with controlled substances.

DIVISION OF EXCISE AND LICENSE

General Information for Securing Bingo License and Conducting of Bingo Games in West Virginia, Chapter 47, Article 20, effective August 15, 1981 (Amended March 10, 1983)

How to apply: Application forms for a bingo license may be obtained from the State Tax Department, Division of Excise and License Taxes, P.O. Drawer 2666, Charleston, West Virginia 25330, Telephone (304) 348-2511.

When to apply: The application must be filed at least 60 days prior to the date scheduled for the first Bingo game. Each application must be accompanied by an Internal Revenue Service determination letter. If not, the Division of Excise and License will return the application.

Who is eligible: Charitable or public service organizations, which have been in existence two years prior to filing an application and which operate not for profit, which hold a tax exempt status from the United States Department of Internal Revenue, and are benevolent, educational, philanthropic, humane, patriotic, civic, religious, fraternal, eleemosynary, incorporated or unincorporated associations or organizations, or volunteer fire departments, rescue units or other similar volunteer community service organizations or associations.

License privileges and fees: Annual license—Licensee may conduct two Bingo occasions per week for 52 weeks, each occasion not to exceed six hours. Fee \$100 except that senior citizens organizations fee \$50. Holders of annual license may not hold joint Bingo occasions. All occasions shall be open to the general public and no person under 18 years of age may directly or indirectly participate in the conduct of a Bingo game.

Limited license—Licensee may conduct one Bingo occasion every 24 hours for a period not to exceed two weeks. Each occasion may not exceed 12 hours. Fee is \$25 and limited license is valid only for the time period specified in the application. Two or more organizations may hold a joint Bingo occasion providing that each has been granted a limited occasion license.

State Fair license—Net proceeds of Bingo are considered used for charitable or public service purposes. License fee for State Fair is \$500.00 and must include a copy of the agreement between the State Fair and applicant. Limits on prizes, regulations, or concessions, compensation of Bingo personnel and expense limits do not apply to State Fair. All occasions shall be open to the general public and no person under 18 years of age may directly or indirectly participate in the conduct of a Bingo game.

Expenses, concessions, and prizes: Total expenses may not exceed ten percent of gross receipts during license period. They may include rent, custodial services, supplies, advertising, security personnel and prizes.

Rent for use of premises:

- (a) No owner or lessee of premises rented to holders of annual Bingo licenses may receive rent for more than two Bingo occasions per week or 104 occasions per year on his premises. No owner or lessee of premises rented to holder of limited Bingo licenses may receive rent for more than 42 Bingo occasions per year on his premises.
- (b) No licensee may receive any remuneration whatsoever for its premises to be used by any other organization to hold Bingo occasions.
- (c) Such owners or licensees may, however, be paid for reasonable recessing and actual expenses incurred by such use not to exceed \$50.00.

No person may receive compensation of any nature for his work in the conduct of Bingo occasions, except in certain circumstances concessionaires may be compensated.

Concessions: Licensee may allow concessions to be operated by others in conjunction with his Bingo occasion under certain conditions which include: (a) the licensee meets or holds functions other than Bingo on a regular basis; (b) the concession to be operated at the Bingo occasion must be the same which operates at regular meetings; (c) the terms in effect at the Bingo concession and the regular meeting must be the same. A copy of this agreement must be filed with the license application. Any charitable or public service organization approved for licensing may operate a concession provided all net proceeds are used for the charitable or public service purposes of that organization. In no case may the sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages or nonintoxicating beer be permitted in any area where Bingo is being played.

Prizes: Total prizes awarded during the license period may not exceed in value 75 percent of gross proceeds or \$175,000, whichever is less. Total prizes awarded for any one Bingo occasion is \$7,500 in money and/or merchandise at fair market value at time of purchase. Prizes may not include beer, nonintoxicating beer, wine, spirits or alcoholic liquor.

Records and reports: All licensees are required to maintain a separate bank account and separate bookkeeping system of all Bingo transactions. Records must be retained for at least three years and are subject to inspection and audit by the Tax Commissioner.

Violations: Any person who knowingly conducts or participates in a fraudulently conducted Bingo game with intent to defraud is guilty of a felony and upon conviction shall be fined \$500 to \$10,000 and/or imprisoned from one to five years.

Any person who knowingly obtains or assists another person to obtain a license fraudulently is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined \$500 to \$10,000.

Prohibited acts: Any individual or organization convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor for a gambling offense is prohibited from obtaining a Bingo license, operating a concession, or leasing premises to a licensee within ten years of that conviction.

Equipment: A licensee may use only equipment which it owns, borrows without compensation, or leases for a reasonable amount from another licensee.

Requirements of other state agencies: Unless exempt, every charitable or public service organization that obtains a Bingo license must file an annual registration statement with the Secretary of State under the Solicitation of Charitable Funds Act (Code 29-19).

General information: Information provided herein is of a general nature and should be used only as a reference and not as a substitute for Bingo laws or regulations. Charitable Raffle Licenses

Raffle licenses can be issued to qualified charitable and public service organizations, including the State Fair Board, by the State Tax Commissioner through the Division of Excise and License Taxes. License fees are as follows:

Annual license	\$ 50
Limited license	\$25
State Fair license	\$500

All organizations intending to conduct a raffle must complete an application. However, if the gross proceeds of the organization from raffles for a calendar year does not exceed \$7,500 and the value of any prize does not exceed \$1,000, the organization is exempt from obtaining a license.

In order to qualify to conduct a raffle, an organization must have been in existence in West Virginia for one year and the net proceeds from the raffle must be devoted to a charitable or public service activity or endeavor.

Prizes awarded may not exceed \$7,500 per occasion, and total prizes awarded during the license period must not exceed the lesser of \$100,000 or 65 percent of the gross proceeds. Total expenses for any raffle occasion may not exceed 10 percent of the gross proceeds.

No compensation can be given to individuals conducting a raffle occasion, and no licensee may receive rent or any other fee for use of its premises to conduct a raffle occasion. However, a licensee may receive reimbursement for actual and reasonable expenses incurred, not to exceed \$50.

All organizations holding raffle occasions are required to keep records for three years and may be audited by the State Tax Department. Each organization holding an annual, limited or State Fair license must file a financial return within 30 days of the expiration of such a license.

INHERITANCE AND ESTATE TAXES

Due to changes in the tax laws during the 1985 legislative session, the Inheritance Tax will be imposed on all estates of decedents dying before July 1, 1985, while estates of decedents dying after June 30, 1985, will be subject to the Estate Tax. Both of these taxes are imposed on the estates of resident decedents and the estates of nonresident decedents owning real estate or tangible personal property in West Virginia.

Inheritance Tax

The Inheritance and Transfer Tax, Chapter 11, Article 11, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is imposed on the privilege of acquiring property by inheritance or succession, transfers made in contemplation of death or intended to take effect in possession or enjoyment at or after the death of the decedent, trusts and property payable to a beneficiary on the death of the decedent, annuity payments, general powers of appointment, and joint tenancy with right of survivorship.

The tax is imposed on the market value of property as of the date of the transferor's death. Although the tax is due and payable to the Tax Commissioner at the death of the transferor, a

3 percent discount is allowed if the liability is satisfied within ten months from the date of death. Interest and penalty accrue on any tax not paid within 11 months from date of death.

All transfers to the State, or to any county, a school district or municipal corporation of the State for public purposes are exempt from tax. All transfers from a decedent to a transferee which have a combined total value of \$200.00 or less are exempt.

Estate Tax

The West Virginia Estate Tax is a transfer tax on the estates of resident decedents and nonresident decedents owning real or tangible personal property in West Virginia. All estates with a gross value exceeding \$400,000 are required to file in 1985. In 1986 the filing requirement increases to \$500,000, and the requirement will be \$600,000 in all years after that. Also subject to the tax are estates of nonresident decedents having real estate or tangible personal property with actual situs in West Virginia and intangible personal property physically present in this State at the time of death.

The West Virginia Estate Tax is equal to the credit for State Death Taxes computed for federal estate tax purposes. In the case of nonresident decedents, the tax is apportioned based on the value of the West Virginia estate in relation to the total estate. The tax is also apportioned for resident decedents whose estates include real or tangible personal property with actual situs outside West Virginia.

The tax is due and payable to the Tax Commissioner within nine months after the decedent's death, and interest and additions to tax accrue on any tax not paid within nine months of the date of death.

Inheritance and Transfer Tax Rates

All exemptions are deducted from the \$0—\$50,000 tax bracket. Using the following chart the tax rate is then applied to determine the amount due:
