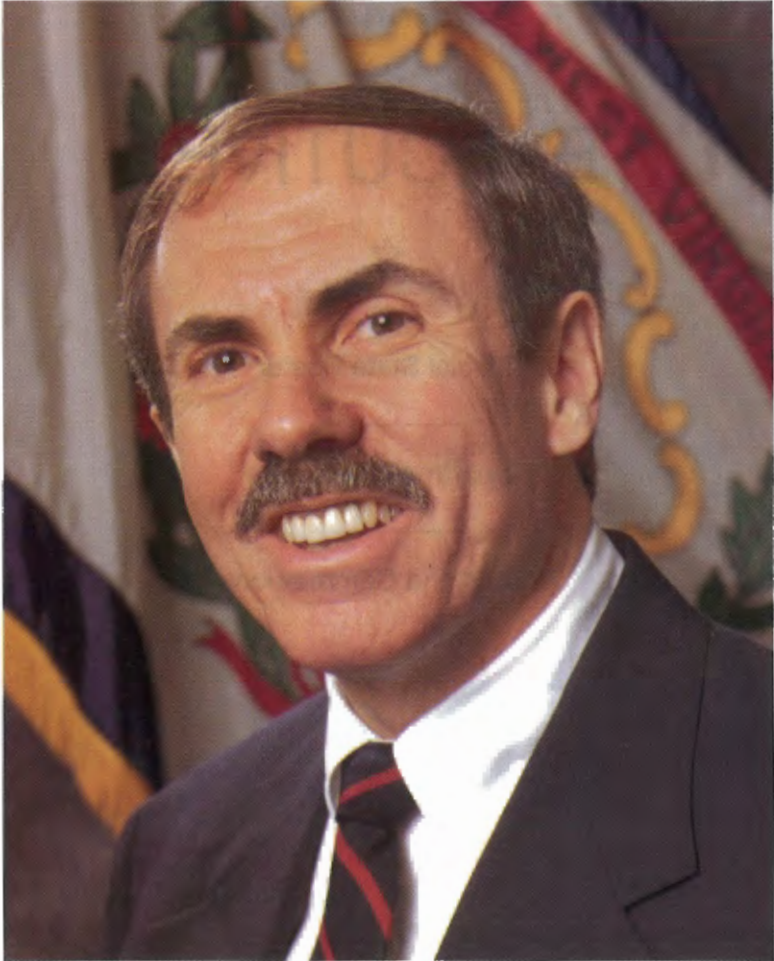

Governor of West Virginia

BOB WISE (D) of Charleston, Kanawha County, took office January 15, 2001, as West Virginia's 33rd governor. Before becoming the state's chief executive, served West Virginia's 2nd Congressional District for 18 years, having first won his seat in 1982. In Washington, was a ranking member of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee. First won elective office in 1980 when he was elected to the West Virginia State Senate. While in Congress, served in his party's leadership as an at-large whip, a regional whip and parliamentarian. Serves as chair of the Southern Governors' Association, the Southern State Energy Board, the National Governors Association Natural Resources Committee and the Council on a New Economy Southern Growth Policies Board. Grew up in Charleston, where he attended public schools. Graduate of Duke University and the Tulane University College of Law. Married to Sandy Wise; children: Robert and Alexandra.

GOVERNOR**BOB WISE****Ground Floor, Main Unit, State Capitol**

Salary: \$90,000 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article VII, Section 1, Constitution of 1863.)

The Governor is vested with the chief executive powers of the state, recommends to the Legislature, by message at the commencement of each session thereof, the passage of such measures as he deems expedient; appoints, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, certain officers of the state government, who may be removed by him for cause; may remit fines and penalties, grant reprieves, commute sentences and pardon and parole after conviction; is Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the state and, as such, may call out the National Guard to enforce laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

SECRETARY OF STATE**JOE MANCHIN III****Ground Floor, Main Unit, State Capitol**

Salary: \$65,000 per year. Elected for term of four years. (Office created by Article VII, Section 1, Constitution of 1863.)

Chief election official of the state and chief of voter registration. Ex officio member of the State Election Commission. Oversees elections throughout the state. Records official campaign financial records. Registrar of corporations and limited liability companies, both profit and nonprofit, issuing certificates of incorporation for the creation of all domestic corporations and certificates of authority to foreign corporations to transact business in West Virginia. Registrar for limited partnerships, limited liability partnerships, voluntary associations, business trusts, licensing of ministers and athlete agents, credit service organizations, and keeper of the executive journal, an official record of state government, maintaining records of all the official actions of the Governor: Member and ex officio secretary of the Board of Public Works, maintaining records of all actions of the Board of Public Works. Member and ex officio secretary of the State Armory Board. Ex officio secretary of the State Building Commission. Provides and maintains records of Emergency Interim Legislative Sessions. Publishes the State Register and the Code of State Rules. Maintains filings of all rules, grievance decisions, ethics opinions and meeting notices. Official administrator of the Uniform Commercial Code, which protects individuals and companies, and the official administrator of the Farm Lien Program. Responsible for the administration of the "Solicitation of Charitable Funds Act". Authorizes and issues licenses to private detectives, investigators and security agencies. Processes all applications of notaries public and commissioners for West Virginia. Keeper of the Great and Less Seals of the State, being the only official authorized to attach these seals to official papers. Maintains affidavits of circulation and qualifications of all newspapers in the state of West Virginia who wish to register to accept legal advertisements which are required by law or court to be made. Acts as the statutory attorney-in-fact for service of process for corporations, for limited liability companies, for limited partnerships and for state agencies. Implements the "Uniform Facsimile Signatures of Public Officials Act". Maintains a record and file of all enrolled bills originated and passed in the Legislature. Provides certified copies of all bills passed by the Legislature. The administration's "West Virginia SHARES" (Saving History and Reaching Every Student) program involves recruiting veterans, senior citizens and civic volunteers who are willing to share their life experiences with fourth, fifth and sixth grade students in an effort to educate them on the sacrifices that previous generations have had to make in order to ensure the freedoms that the students currently enjoy. The program also includes instituting mock elections as part of every school's eighth grade curriculum, designating one teacher in every high school as a voter registration volunteer and designating up to six high school seniors per school as voter registration ambassadors in an effort to ensure that every student graduating from high school will be registered to vote in the next general election.



JOE MANCHIN III (D) of Fairmont, Marion County, was sworn in as West Virginia's twenty-seventh Secretary of State on January 15, 2001. After graduation from Farmington High School in 1965, attended West Virginia University on a football scholarship. Received Bachelor's degree in Business and Economics from the university in 1970 and returned to Marion County to operate a chain of family-owned retail stores and later created and currently owns Enersystems, Inc., a privately held natural resources company. Elected in 1982 to the House of Delegates; elected to the State Senate in 1986, 1988 and 1992. While a member of the Senate, served as Chairman of the Banking and Insurance Committee, Vice Chair of the Finance Committee and Chairman of the Rule-Making Review Committee. Also was a member of the committees on Pensions, Energy, Industry and Mining, Government Organization, Rules and Health and Human Resources. As Secretary of State, created the "West Virginia SHARES" program (Saving History and Reaching Every Student), involving recruiting veterans, senior citizens and volunteers to encourage students to learn about civics and to register to vote. Married to Gayle Conelly Manchin of Beckley, Raleigh County; children: Heather, Joseph IV and Brooke; six grandchildren.

The Auditor has the Constitutional and statutory duty to examine claims presented to the state for payment and make determinations whether money is due from the state and authorized by law. After approval of a claim the Auditor issues a warrant, the state's version of a check, in either paper or electronic form, which is then funded on the Treasury. As Chief Inspector and Supervisor of Public Offices, the Auditor performs financial and compliance audits for local governmental agencies and divisions. As Securities Commissioner, ex officio, he approves, rejects, issues licenses for, and supervises the sale of securities in West Virginia. He enforces the provisions of the securities laws for the benefit of the state and its citizens. In addition, the Auditor is the state's official bookkeeper, administers the Social Security and U.S. Savings Bond programs for the state and its political subdivisions, and accepts all garnishments against state employees. The Auditor receives property taxes collected by sheriffs and collects and distributes public utility taxes for the state and counties. As Commissioner of Delinquent and Nonentered Lands, ex officio, he maintains records of land certified to the state for nonpayment of property taxes and land either sold or redeemed for delinquent taxes. The Auditor is also a member of the following: Board of Public Works, Armory Board, Board of Trustees, West Virginia Investment Management Board and Chairman of Audit Committee, Chairman of the Interstate Commerce Appeals Board, State Municipal Bond Commission, oversees Land Sales and Condominiums, and serves as Vice-Chair of the West Virginia Consolidated Public Retirement Board.

The Treasurer has responsibility for all cash management functions of state government, including establishing and monitoring state depositories; receiving and depositing all funds collected by state departments, agencies and institutions in state depositories directly or through the lockbox system; paying warrants authorized by the Auditor if sufficient funds exist by endorsing his check upon the warrants or by authorizing electronic funds transfers; paying debt service on general obligation bonds; operating the state imprest fund system; issuing statements to participants in the Consolidated Fund; filing and retaining all paid checks, bonds and coupons issued by the state; and reconciling to the state accounting system monthly. Cash management functions of the Treasurer also include collecting community corrections funds, court security funds, crime victims compensation funds, domestic violence legal services funds, family court funds, family protection shelters funds, HIV testing funds, law enforcement training funds, litter control funds, medical liability funds, parent education fund, parent education and mediation fund, probation fees, regional jail and correctional facility authority fees and timbering operations enforcement funds and remitting them to the appropriate spending units. The Treasurer disburses coal, oil and gas severance taxes, liquor taxes, and wine taxes to political subdivisions; and remits certain insurance collections to the policemen and firemen pension and relief funds in West Virginia. As Administrator under the Uniform Unclaimed Property Act, the Treasurer is custodian of all abandoned property remitted, such as stocks, bonds, insurance proceeds, cash, safety deposit boxes contents, and other similar items. In accordance with the Debt Management Act and the Debt Capacity Advisory Division Act, the Treasurer collects information pertaining to bond and other debt issuances by state entities and prepares quarterly Debt Management Reports and an annual Debt Capacity Report. Financial education programs designed by the Treasurer introduce West Virginians of all age levels to money management. Pursuant to the Financial Electronic Commerce Act, the Treasurer provides an electronic payment system for purchases of products and services offered by state agencies. The partnership of the Treasurer and the West Virginia Small Business Development Center, in cooperation with state financial institutions, enable the Linked Deposit program to assist small businesses in expanding and growing by lowering the costs of loans. The Treasurer provides administrative services to the West Virginia College Prepaid Tuition and Savings Program Board of Trustees and acts as chairman of the Board. Other memberships of the Treasurer include the Agricultural Land Protection Authority Board of Trustees, Consolidated Public Retirement Board, Council of Finance and Administration, Financial Aid Coordinating Council, Hospital Finance Authority, Housing Development Fund Board of Directors, West Virginia Investment Management Board, Lending and Credit Rate Board, Municipal Bond Commission, Pension Liability Redemption Review Committee, PROMISE Scholarship Board, Statewide Task Force on Student Financial Aid, Board of the School Fund, and Board of Public Works.

JOHN D. PERDUE (D) of Cross Lanes, Kanawha County. Elected Treasurer of West Virginia in 1996 and reelected in 2000. Entering his 30th year of public service. Began his public career with the State Department of Agriculture and attained the position of assistant commissioner. In 1989, was recruited to work on Governor Gaston Caperton's staff, where he was senior executive assistant for eight years. Native of Boone County, the son of Glen and Mary Perdue. Educated in Boone County public schools and holds B.S. degree from West Virginia University. Served as chairman of the WVU College of Agriculture and Forestry Visiting Committee, 1998-1999; President of the Northeast Region of the National Association of State Treasurers, 1999; Member, Board of the College Savings Network for which he serves as liaison with NAST; West Virginia Board of Trustees of the Leukemia Society of America. He and his wife, Robin, are the parents of two daughters.

The Commissioner of Agriculture has the responsibility for implementing legislative enactments designed to advance the interests of agriculture, horticulture, and similar industries of West Virginia and to ensure that the state's citizens are sold only wholesome, uncontaminated and unadulterated agricultural commodities and product. This includes protection against fraud by ensuring that agricultural materials and supplies are genuine as labeled and protecting against the introduction of noxious insects, weeds, and plant and animal diseases that might adversely affect agriculture, and regulating pesticides in the public interest to protect consumers and the environment to assure a healthful supply of food and fiber. This includes maintaining analytical capabilities of determining food safety and environmental compliance of agricultural industries. Distributes U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) surplus foods to schools, needy individuals and disaster areas. Accessory duties include suppressing or eradicating already introduced or endemic pests that have become or threaten to become a problem; establishing grades on agricultural products; disseminating statistical data on soils, climate, natural resources, market opportunities and advantages of the state; publishing and distributing reports and bulletins concerning all phases of agriculture and forestry; and cooperating in these and similar disciplines with other state and federal agencies. Other duties include serving on the Board of Public Works, the Air Quality Board, the Housing Development Fund, the West Virginia Conservation Committee, the State Forestry Commission and numerous committees.

GUS R. DOUGLASS (D) of Grimms Landing, Mason County, was elected to his ninth term as Commissioner of Agriculture in 2000. Elected to terms in 1964-88 and 1992-2000; was a gubernatorial candidate in 1988. Named Assistant Commissioner in 1957; operated a farm equipment and motor truck dealership. Douglass and son Tom operate a 540-acre beef cattle and grain farm. Was state and national president of Future Farmers of America; West Virginia Star Farmer; first president of the National FFA Alumni Association. Past President, National Association of State Departments of Agriculture and Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture; chaired Southern Regional Committee for Food and Agriculture under President Jimmy Carter; served on national agriculture committees and task forces, frequently called upon to give testimony on national agricultural policy. Received Gamma Sigma Delta award for Distinguished Service and Progressive Farmer Magazine's "Man of the Year". In 1990, enshrined in the Agriculture and Forestry Hall of Fame. President, Southern United States Trade Association. Chairman, NASDA Animal and Plant Industries Committee. Created under Chapter 3, Acts of the Legislature, First Extraordinary Session, 1989, as one of the cabinet level departments in the Executive Branch of State Government. The Secretary is the chief executive officer of the Department and Director of the Budget and is appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Department of Administration is responsible for implementing fiscal and administrative policies in the Executive Branch agencies. The following divisions, agencies, boards and commissions, including all the allied, advisory, affiliated or related entities and funds associated with any such division, agency, board or commission, are administered as a part of the Department of Administration: the Aviation Office, the Finance Division, which includes the Accounting Section, the Budget Section and the Financial Accounting and Reporting Section; the General Services Division; the Information Services and Communications Division; the Insurance and Retirement Division, consisting of the Consolidated Public Retirement Board, which includes the Public Employees Retirement System, the Teachers Retirement System, the Death, Disability and Retirement Fund of the Division of Public Safety, the Judges' Retirement System, the Teachers' Defined Contribution Retirement System and the Deputy Sheriff Retirement System; the Public Employees Insurance Agency, which includes the Public Employees Insurance Agency Finance Board, West Virginia Children's Health Insurance Program and the Board of Risk and Insurance Management; the Division of Personnel, which includes the State Personnel Board and the State Personnel Advisory Board; the Purchasing Division, which includes the Office of Fleet Management; the Education and State Employees' Grievance Board; the West Virginia Ethics Commission; the Public Defender Services; the Design-Build Board; the Boundary Commission; the Council of Finance and Administration; the Employee Suggestion Award Board; the Governor's Mansion Advisory Committee; the West Virginia Prosecuting Attorneys Institute; the Committee for the Purchase of Commodities and Services from the Handicapped; the Records Management and Preservation Advisory Committee; the Commission on Uniform State Laws; and the Public Employee Leave Benefit Analysis Board. The State Building Commission has been abolished by the Legislature and all of its duties and functions transferred to the Department of Administration. (Code 5F-1, 5F-2, 5A-1, 5A-6)

The Consolidated Public Retirement Board administers all public retirement plans in this state: The Public Employees Retirement System established in Code 5-10, the Teachers Retirement System established in Code 18-7A, the Teachers' Defined Contribution Retirement System created in Code 18-7B, the Death, Disability and Retirement Fund of the Division of Public Safety created by Code 15-2, the State Police Retirement System created by Code 15-2A, the Judges' Retirement System created by Code 51-9, the Deputy Sheriff Retirement System created by Code 7-14D and the voluntary deferred compensation plan created by Code 5-10B. The Board consists of fourteen members as follows: Governor or his or her designee; State Auditor or his or her designee; State Treasurer or his or her designee; Secretary of the Department of Administration or his or her designee; four residents of the state who are not members, retirees or beneficiaries of any public retirement system appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate; a member, annuitant or retiree of the Public Employees Retirement System who is or was a state employee; a member, annuitant or retiree of the Public Employees Retirement System who is not or was not a state employee; a member, annuitant or retiree of the Teachers Retirement System; a member, annuitant or retiree of the Division of Public Safety Death, Disability and Retirement Fund; a member of the Deputy Sheriff Death, Disability and Retirement Fund; and a member, annuitant or retiree of the Teachers' Defined Contribution Retirement System, all to be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate; five-year terms; Board to have all powers, duties, responsibilities and liabilities of the Public Employees Retirement System, the Teachers Retirement System, the Teachers' Defined Contribution System, the Death, Disability and Retirement Fund of the Department of Public Safety, the State Police Retirement System, the Deputy Sheriff Retirement System and the Judges' Retirement System; may promulgate rules necessary to effectuate its powers, duties and responsibilities, provided the Board may adopt any or all rules and regulations previously promulgated by retirement systems it administers; Board to elect a chairman and vice chairman; Board to appoint executive director who is chief administrative officer of all the systems but shall not be a member of the Board; to meet at least once every three months; seven voting trustees constitute a quorum; reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses. (Code 5-10D)

Created under Chapter 96, Acts, Regular Session, 1957; amended by Chapter 65, Acts, Regular Session, 1980, which changed the name to State Board of Risk and Insurance Management; amended by Chapter 19, Acts, Sixth Extraordinary Session, 2001. The Board shall be composed of five members; one shall be the vice chancellor of health sciences of the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission; four shall be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. Members receive the same compensation authorized by law for members of the Legislature for interim duties. Powers and duties of the Board include: General supervision and control over the insurance of all state property, activities and responsibilities, including acquisition and cancellation thereof; determination of amount and kind of coverage, including, but not limited to, deductible forms of insurance coverage; inspections or examinations relating thereto, reinsurance and any and all matters, factors and considerations entering into negotiations for advantageous rates on and coverage of all such state property, activities and responsibilities. Chapter 120, Acts, Regular Session, 1980, directed the Board to provide general liability insurance for the county boards of education. During the 1982 session, legislation was enacted requiring the Board to implement and administer an industrywide reinsurance fund which makes available to West Virginia policyholders property insurance for structural loss caused by the subsidence of 18 underground coal mines. Chapter 24, Acts, First Extraordinary Session, 1986, authorized the Board to provide property and liability insurance to

political subdivisions and nonprofit corporations. Chapter 87, Acts, Regular Session, 1989, required the Board to provide medical malpractice coverage for all doctors providing obstetric treatment to West Virginia Medicaid recipients. Chapter 107, Acts, Regular Session, 1990, corrected the constitutional defects. (Code 29-12)

WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF EDUCATION

Room B-351, Building 6, Capitol Complex

The West Virginia Board of Education consists of eleven members, of whom one shall be the state superintendent of schools, *ex officio*, and one of whom shall be the chancellor of the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, *ex officio*, neither of whom shall be entitled to vote. The other nine must be citizens of the state, appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate for overlapping terms of nine years. No more than five of the appointed members may belong to the same political party. No person shall be eligible for appointment to membership who is a member of any political party executive committee or holds any other public office or public employment under the federal government or under the government of the state or any of the political subdivisions or who is an appointee or employee of the board. No member of the board may be removed from office except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty or gross immorality and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the Governor of state elective officers. At least six meetings shall be held each year at such times and places as the board may prescribe. It may meet at such other times as may be necessary, such meetings to be held upon its own resolution or at the call of the president. Appointed members receive \$100 per day per meeting and are reimbursed for expenses incident to the performances of their duties. The secretary who is appointed by the board keeps a record of its proceedings and performs such other duties as the board may prescribe. Subject to and in conformity with the Constitution and laws of West Virginia, the Board of Education determines the educational policies of the elementary and secondary schools, selects the State Superintendent of Free Schools, and makes rules for carrying into effect laws and policies of the State relating to education. The State Board has general control, supervision and management of the business and educational affairs of the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind.

**DIVISION OF REHABILITATION SERVICES
Institute**

The Division of Rehabilitation Services was established by the 1945 Legislature, Acts, Regular Session, Chapter 58. As such it is authorized and directed to cooperate with the Federal Rehabilitation Services Administration to provide rehabilitation services to West Virginians with disabilities. The Governor appoints the director of the division, who recommends necessary personnel and establishes appropriate administrative units throughout the state. The director makes regulations, submits an annual report, requisitions the disbursement of all rehabilitation funds and takes such other action as necessary to provide rehabilitation services per the intent and spirit of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and its amendments. The director, under the oversight of the Secretary of Education and the Arts, operates the agency under state plans approved by the Rehabilitation Services Administration and the Social Security Administration. The director is authorized by law to receive gifts and determine eligibility for service. The director is also authorized to establish and operate rehabilitation centers and workshops and to promulgate rules for operation of such facilities in the state by public or voluntary agencies, to certify workshops as eligible to sell products to the state, and to receive federal vocational rehabilitation aid. The wide variety of services provided by Rehabilitation Services can be grouped under four broad headings: (1) Client services; (2) Program and administrative support services; (3) disability determination services; and (4) Consumer and communication services. The agency operates two primary services units: The Client Service Section and the Disability Determination Service Section. (Code 18-10A)

Housed in the Cultural Center in Charleston, the purpose and duties of the division are to advance, foster and promote the creative and performing arts and crafts, including both indoor and outdoor exhibits and performances; to identify, acquire, mark and care for historical, pre-historical, archaeological and unique architectural sites, structures and objects in the state; to coordinate all cultural, artistic and historic activities in the state government and at the state-owned facilities including Camp Washington-Carver (Clifftop, Fayette County), West Virginia Independence Hall (Wheeling, Ohio County), Grave Creek Mound (Moundsville, Marshall County), Jenkins House Plantation (Lesage, Cabell County) and The Cultural Center in the Capitol Complex; to acquire, preserve and classify books, documents and memorabilia of historical interest or importance; and, in general, to do all things necessary or convenient to preserve and advance the culture of the state. ARCHIVES AND HISTORY COMMISSION

The Archives and History Commission shall be composed of thirteen members appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for staggered terms of three years. No more than seven members may be of the same political party and must represent the following professions: Historian, architectural historian, historical architect, archaeologist specializing in historic and prehistoric archaeology, archivist, librarian and museum specialist. The commission shall elect one of its members chair. In addition to the appointed members, the president of the State Historical Society, president of the State Historical Association, director of the State Geological and Economic Survey, president of the West Virginia Preservation Alliance, Inc., the state historic preservation officer, and the directors of the archives and history, historic preservation and museums sections of the Division of Culture and History shall serve as ex officio members of the commission. Members shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses. Powers of the commission shall include: Advising the commissioner and the division's directors of archives and history, historic preservation and museums; approving and distributing grants-in-aid and awards from federal and state funds relating to the purposes of the sections; approving regulations concerning the professional policies and functions of the sections; and reviewing nominations to the state and national registers of historic places. (Code 29-1-5)

COMMISSION ON THE ARTS

Along with the Commission on Archives and History, the Commission on the Arts is one of two citizens commissions established within the Division of Culture and History. Composed of fifteen members appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for staggered terms of three years. No more than eight of the members may be of the same political party. The commission shall elect one of its members as chair and shall meet at times specified by the chair. The director of the arts section shall be an ex officio nonvoting member of the commission and shall serve as secretary. The director or a majority of the members may also call a meeting upon notice. Each member shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred. The commission has the following powers: (1) To advise the commissioner and the director of the arts section concerning the accomplishment of the purposes of that section and to establish a state plan with respect to the arts section; (2) to approve and distribute grants-in-aid and awards from federal and state funds relating to the purposes of the arts section; (3) to request, accept or expend federal funds to accomplish the purposes of the arts section when federal law or regulations would prohibit the same by the commissioner or section director, but would permit the same to be done by the commission on the arts; (4) to otherwise encourage and promote the purposes of the arts section; (5) to approve rules concerning the professional policies and functions of the section as promulgated by the director of the arts section; and (6) to advise and consent to the appointment of the director by the commissioner. (Code 29-1-3)

Created under Chapter 62, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 1963; amended, Chapter 54, Acts, Regular Session, 1967; Chapter 45, Acts, Regular Session, 1970; Chapter 48, Acts, Regular Session, 1972; Chapter 86, Acts, Regular Session, 1983; Chapter 64, Acts, Regular Session, 1989; Chapter 66, Acts, Regular Session, 1991; and Chapter 47, Acts, Regular Session, 1993; consists of eleven voting members, who shall be residents of the state, of whom one shall be the state superintendent of schools, one shall be a member of the West Virginia board of education to be selected by it annually, one shall be a member of the university of West Virginia board of trustees to be selected by it annual-

ly, and one shall be a member of the board of directors of the state college system to be selected by it annually. The other seven shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate for overlapping terms of seven years, one term expiring each year. Not less than one appointive member shall come from each congressional district; authority to elect chairman and vice chairman; to employ an executive director; serve without compensation but receive actual expenses; to perform services in behalf of noncommercial educational radio, television and related media as it may consider to be in the best interest of the state. (Statute also provides for advisory councils to the Authority). (Code 10-5)

The Department of Health, now the Bureau for Public Health, was created by the Legislature in 1915, having been preceded by a Board of Health created in 1881. In 1957, the Legislature established the West Virginia Department of Mental Health. On July 1, 1977, the Department of Mental Health and hospitals under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Institutions were incorporated in the Department of Health.

The Bureau performs a variety of health-related services and functions such as: regulating sanitary conditions of institutions, schools, food sales establishments, camps, swimming pools, mobile home parks, water supplies and systems, and sewerage facilities and systems; inspecting milk, operating industrial hygiene programs; maintaining laboratories; registering vital statistics, collecting, analyzing, and disseminating health data; conducting epidemiological studies, including the effects of environment, employment, habits and circumstances of life on the public's health; preventing and controlling diseases; conducting health planning and promotion; providing services to hemophiliacs and to veterans exposed to Agent Orange and other agents; providing maternal and child health services; supporting home health services; recruiting physicians to the State; assisting county boards of health, community health centers, and local health, school health and dental health programs; certifying personnel and promoting emergency medical services; conducting postmortem examinations;

providing licensure and certification for health care facilities; and development of an integrated management information framework which serves as a network for the exchange of information between and among public health professionals to strengthen public health.

The Commission shall encourage and endeavor to bring about mutual understanding and respect among all racial, religious and ethnic groups within the state and shall strive to eliminate all discrimination in employment and places of public accommodation by virtue of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, blindness or handicap and shall strive to eliminate all discrimination in the sale, purchase, lease, rental or financing of housing and other real property. On March 6, 1971, Governor Moore Established through Executive Order the State Developmental Disabilities Planning Council as required by the Developmental Disabilities Services and Facilities Construction Act, Public Law 91-517. The State Commission on Mental Retardation was designated on March 4, 1971, as the agency to assist the State Council in the development and subsequent revision of the State Plan and to administer the State Formula Grant Program for planning and services. The State Health Department became the administering agency for the program when the Commission was merged with the newly reorganized State Health Department on July 1, 1977. The Developmental Disabilities Planning Council was designated as an office of the Department of Health and Human Resources in the Executive Department reorganization of July 1, 1989. On December 17, 1999, Governor Underwood issued an Executive Order that renamed the Council, the "West Virginia Developmental Disabilities Council." The federal Developmental Disabilities Act has undergone several revisions which have strengthened the role and autonomy of the Council. The current DD Act is Public Law 106-402, the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000. Currently over 60 percent of the Council's 32 members must be consumers.

The Division of Corrections, formerly a major division within the Department of Public Institutions, was established under Chapter 70, Acts of the Legislature in 1977. Under the executive reorganization of 1989, Corrections became a division of the Department of Public Safety (now the Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety). The Commissioner of the Division of Corrections directs the state's adult correctional system. In November 1997, oversight of the juvenile correctional institutions was transferred to the newly created Division of Juvenile Services. The Division of Corrections' system consists of thirteen adult facilities: Mount Olive Correctional Complex at Mount Olive, Northern Regional Jail and Correctional Facility at Moundsville, Ohio County Correctional Center at Wheeling, St. Marys Correctional Center at St. Marys, Huttonsville Correctional Center at Huttonsville, Pruntytown Correctional Center at Grafton, Denmar Correctional Center at Hillsboro, Beckley Correctional Center at Beckley, Lakin Correctional Center at West Columbia, Welch Facility at Welch, and Work Release Centers at Huntington and Charleston. The agency also operates one young adult offender facility—Anthony Correctional Center at Neola. The Commissioner is also responsible for the supervision of parolees assigned to the Division's custody or accepted through Interstate Compact. The State's correctional system is responsible for approximately 4,350 incarcerated adults, 140 youthful offenders and approximately 1,700 persons under probation and parole supervision.

The voting members consist of the Secretary of Military Affairs and Public Safety, the Secretary of Administration or his/her designee, three county officials appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate (no more than two of whom may be of the same political party), and two citizens appointed by the Governor to represent the areas of law and medicine. The two nonvoting members are the Commissioner of Corrections and the Director of Juvenile Services. Board members receive no compensation, but are reimbursed for expenses. The Authority is empowered to plan, finance, construct and operate a statewide system of regional jails and is also empowered to finance and construct correctional facilities for the Division of Corrections and juvenile facilities for the Division of Juvenile Services.

The West Virginia Division of Juvenile Services, assuming responsibilities formerly charged to both the Division of Corrections and the Department of Health and Human Resources, was established under Chapter 53, Acts, Regular Session, 1997, and amended by Chapter 5, Acts, First Extraordinary Session, 1999. Designed to serve the needs of West Virginia's juveniles, the Division operates five detention centers and three correctional facilities. The detention centers are responsible for the nonadjudicated or predispositional youth. These centers are designed for the short-term secure detention of males and females between the ages of 10 and 18 years of age. The mission of the detention centers is to ensure safe, secure facilities with sufficient space and quality services and progressive programming to achieve positive outcomes for detained youths. The detention facilities provide for the general care and welfare of youths awaiting disposition of felony charges. The correctional facilities utilize a unit management approach in addressing identified needs of incarcerated youths. The Division of Juvenile Services provides for the general care and welfare of residents sentenced to indeterminate terms of incarceration as youthful offenders and those juveniles tried as adult offenders and awaiting placement in adult facilities. The Division additionally provides case management, counseling and a variety of programs designed to reduce recidivism and aid in the youths' successful transition into their respective communities. These services include classes in anger management, coping skills and problem solving. Division staff work closely with the Department of Health and Human Resources, Juvenile Probation, community care providers and education in formulating treatment plans designed to enhance the youths' probability of success in becoming responsible citizens. The West Virginia State Police is a state police department with statewide police powers, created in 1919. The West Virginia State Police shall have the mission of statewide enforcement of criminal and traffic laws with emphasis on providing basic enforcement and citizen protection from criminal depredation throughout the state and maintaining the safety of the state's public streets, roads and highways. The State Police responds to citizen requests for emergency and nonemergency police services in the nonincorporated and rural areas of the state, investigates reported criminal violations and assumes primary responsibility for patrolling the state's highways, enforcing the traffic laws and preventing motor vehicle accidents. The State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigations is charged with the identification, reduction, control and prevention of criminal activities associated with the manufacture, distribution or use of controlled substances, organized crime and other activities of a criminal nature. Additional services provided by the State Police to all law-enforcement agencies include the maintenance of centralized criminal records, analysis of forensic evidence and the operation of the West Virginia Automated Police Network (WEAPON) system. State Police personnel and resources are also available for assignment to the scene of any emergency, riot or disaster occurring within the state and to supplement the efforts of other law-enforcement agencies at their request. Salary of the Secretary of Tax and Revenue: \$75,000 per year. Appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve, at the will and pleasure of the Governor; for the term for which the Governor is elected and until a successor has been appointed and has qualified.

The Department of Tax and Revenue was created by the 1989 Legislature, which combined the following departments and agencies under the leadership of the Secretary of Tax and Revenue: Alcohol Beverage Control Administration, Retail Liquor Licensing Board, Division of Banking, Board of Banking and Financial Institutions, Lending and Credit Rate Board, Insurance Commission, Lottery Commission, Racing Commission, State Tax Division, and the Property Valuation Training and Procedures Commission. The new department began operations on July 1, 1989. The Department, through the State Tax Division, is charged with the responsibility for the enforcement of statutes relating to certain state taxes and the collection thereof, including the beer barrel tax, business and occupation tax, business franchise tax, cigarette tax, use tax, consumers sales and services tax, corporate license tax, corporation net income tax, estate tax, gasoline and special fuel excise tax, health care provider tax, motor carrier road tax, nonintoxicating beer tax, personal income tax, severance tax, soft drinks tax, telecommunications tax and wine liter tax. The responsibility for appraising industrial, natural resource and utility properties, overseeing the assessment work of county assessors, preparing the Board of Public Works tentative ad valorem property tax assessments for all public utilities operating within the state, and issuing permits for and regulating bingo occasions and charitable raffles held throughout the state also rests with the State Tax Division. The Department is charged with the administration, by the Alcohol Beverage Control Administration, of the beer, liquor and wine licenses and the responsibility for wholesale liquor sales and distribution. The Department, through the Division of Banking, administers the laws relating to the supervision of state banking institutions, industrial loan companies, building and loan associations, industrial banks, supervised lenders, credit unions and other corporations which have been or may be placed under such supervision. Through the Insurance Commission, the Department regulates and oversees the insurance industry within the state. The Department, through the Racing Commission, regulates and supervises live and simulcast horse and dog racing as well as administers and promotes the thoroughbred and greyhound breeding development funds. The operation of the state lottery, including racetrack and limited video lottery, by the Lottery Commission, is another responsibility of the Department. (Code 5F-1)

Salary of the Secretary of Transportation: \$75,000 per year. Appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve at the will and pleasure of the Governor, for the term for which the Governor is elected and until a successor has been appointed and has qualified.

The West Virginia Department of Transportation, created by the 1989 Legislature, has jurisdiction of the Division of Highways, West Virginia Parkways, Economic Development and Tourism Authority, Division of Motor Vehicles, Driver's Licensing Advisory Board, Motorcycle Safety and Education Committee, Aeronautics Commission, State Rail Authority, Division of Public Transit and Public Port Authority. (Code 5F-1)

FRED VANKIRK was appointed by Governor Wise on January 16, 2001, to the combined position of Cabinet Secretary of the West Virginia Department of Transportation/Commissioner of Highways. VanKirk began his career with the West Virginia Department of Highways in 1963 as an area planning engineer. He was promoted in 1977 to the position of Chief Engineer-Planning and charged with the responsibility of preparing and planning all roadway programs, road construction and improvement projects. In 1982, he was appointed State Highway Engineer in charge of managing of all ten field districts, together with the staff divisions involved in the planning, development and operation of the state's 35,000-mile highway system and VanKirk served in this position until 1989 when Governor Caperton appointed him to the dual position of Acting Commissioner/State Highway Engineer. Appointed by Governor Caperton in 1995 to the combined position of Transportation Secretary and Highway Commissioner, Mr. VanKirk has served on various committees and task forces for the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials and is currently a member of its Board of Directors and Standing Committee on Highways. A 1962 West Virginia University graduate with a degree in civil engineering, he presently serves as a member of the Advisory Committee for the WVU's Department of Civil Engineering.

Salary of Commissioner: \$90,000 per year. Appointed by Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Term: Four years; runs concurrently with Governor's term of office.

The West Virginia Department of Transportation's Highways Division has jurisdiction over planning, engineering, right-of-way acquisition, construction, reconstruction, traffic regulation and maintenance of 34,937 miles of designated state roads, including the administration of highway funds. The Highways Division is also responsible for 187 miles of Park and Forest Roads and 928 miles of HARP roads and can perform routine and special maintenance only on these roads. This makes a grand total of 36,052 miles that are the maintenance responsibility of the Division of Highways. Federal Aid Highways included within the State Highway System are planned and constructed with participation from the U. S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration. Other responsibilities include highway research, outdoor advertising contiguous to state roads, roadside development, safety, weight enforcement, enforcement of the Hazardous Waste Management Act (Transportation) and dissemination of highway information. The Division of Highways has also been given the responsibility of administering and monitoring to nontraditional highway programs of enhancement, scenic byway and backway, and recreational trails. (Code 17-1, 17-2A)

DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLES

Building 3, Room 317, Capitol Complex

The Division of Motor Vehicles was created by an Act of the Legislature passed March 8, 1947, and signed by the Governor. The Legislation consolidated under one administrative head the power, authority and duty to regulate driver's licenses and the titling and registration of motor vehicles (Section 1, Chapter 140, Acts of the Legislature). In 1989, the Division became a part of a newly created Department of Transportation under the authority of the Secretary of Transportation. To serve the purposes enumerated in the creating legislation, the Division is divided into Executive, Support Services, Management Services, Driver Services, Information Services, Legal Services, Vehicle Services, Investigation, Safety and Security Services, and Regional Offices Operations. (Code 17A-2)

The purpose of the board is to promulgate rules and regulations to establish the minimum qualifications for applicants for examination and licenses in specific classes of contracting; the content of the examination for these applicants; procedures for application, examination and renewal of licenses; disciplinary action; request investigation for alleged violations; and other necessary rules to carry out their responsibilities. To serve as an advisory body to the Director of Natural Resources and, as such, to study administrative methods concerning forests and their maintenance and development, protection of fish and game, beautification of the state and its highways and development of lands, minerals, waters and other natural resources; to advise with the Director concerning problems, to recommend policies and practices, investigate work of the Director and advise or make recommendations to the Governor relative to conservation policy; to fix by regulation the open seasons and the bag, creel, size, age, weight and sex limits with respect to wildlife in West Virginia. The Commission will meet on the first Monday in January, April, July and October of each year. Director of Natural Resources serves as ex officio member and chairman of this Commission. (Code 20-1)

The Authority is governed by the Water Development Board, which consists of seven members: Four appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate for terms of six years after initial appointments (no more than two appointed members shall be from the same politi-

cal party) and three ex officio members: Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection, Commissioner of the Bureau for Public Health and the state officer or employee who in the judgment of the Governor is most responsible for economic or community development. The Board elects its chairman and vice chairman and appoints its secretary-treasurer. Each appointed member receives an annual salary of twelve thousand dollars. The Director of the Water Development Authority is appointed by the Board. (Code 22C)

Created under Chapter 16, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 1991. The Commissioner is the administrative head. Citizens are served through the Bureau's four operating divisions. The Employment Service Division operates 19 local Job Service offices and two satellite Job Service offices located throughout the state. The Unemployment Compensation Division operates 20 local claims offices throughout the state and an interstate claims office located in Charleston. The Workers' Compensation Division has offices in Beckley, Charleston, Fairmont, Huntington, Logan, Martinsburg and Wheeling. The Bureau also includes a Fiscal and Administrative Management Division, a Legal Services Division, a Management Analysis Division, a Management Information Systems Division and a Research, Information and Analysis Division. Associated entities include the Compensation Programs Performance Council, Human Resources Investment Council, Unemployment Compensation Board of Review, Workers' Compensation Appeal Board and Office of Judges and Workers' Compensation Health Care Advisory Panel. Salary of Commissioner: \$70,000 per year. Appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to serve at the will and pleasure of the Governor, for the term of which the Governor is elected and until a successor has been appointed and has qualified.



ANN M. STOTTLEMYER of Charleston, Kanawha County, was appointed in 2001 by Governor Wise as Commissioner of the West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services. Has 18 years of previous experience in state government in positions such as Commissioner of Medicaid, Deputy Director of the Public Employees Insurance Agency and Deputy Director of the former Department of Health. Most recently was Director of State Services for a private, nonprofit health care quality improvement organization, West Virginia Medical Institute. First position in state government was with the Commission on Aging. Education: Bachelor's Degree from Bethany College; Master's Degree from the University of Pittsburgh.

COUNCIL ON AGING

The Bureau of Senior Services was created by Chapter 166, Acts, Regular Session, 1997, replacing the former Commission on Aging. The Bureau has a Commissioner, appointed by the Governor, who administers programs for the aging with federal funds received through the Older Americans Act and administers state funds through appropriations designated by the State Legislature for the elderly in West Virginia. The Commissioner supervises the staff of the Bureau of Senior Services and provides technical assistance to staff of area agencies on aging and county aging projects. The Commissioner collaborates and coordinates services for senior citizens with other state agencies and serves on various boards and commissions where expertise on aging issues and problems is needed. The Commissioner oversees the coordination of a West Virginia Silver Haired Legislature. The Bureau's Council on Aging consists of fifteen members: Five government members: (1) The Director of the Division of Health; (2) the Commissioner, Bureau for Medical Services; (3) one administrator designated by the Secretary, Department of Health and Human Resources; (4) one administrator designated by the Superintendent of the West Virginia State Police; and (5) the Director of the Division of Rehabilitation Services; ten members to be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. No more than five of the citizens shall belong to the same political party, and no more than six members shall be of the same gender. The members shall be selected in a manner to provide balanced geographical distribution. The designated administrators and the citizen representatives of the council shall be appointed for terms of four years each, and shall serve until their successors are appointed and qualified; the council shall elect a chair and vice chair; citizen representatives are entitled to receive travel and other necessary expenses actually incurred in the performance of official duties under the provisions of this article. (Code 16-5P)

Salary of Commissioners: \$75,000 per year for Chair; \$70,000 per year for other Commissioners. Three Commissioners appointed by Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Term: Six years. One Commissioner serves as chair at will and pleasure of Governor.

Except as limited by specific state and federal law, the Commission supervises and regulates rates, charges, services and facilities of public utilities, and common and contract carriers of passengers and property by railroads, highways, streets and water; hears and acts upon complaints against utilities and common carriers, and passes upon applications for increases in rates and for discontinuances of service of facilities, and upon applications for the privilege of installing plants and facilities; prescribes systems of accounts to be used by utilities and carriers; fixes valuations of properties of and requires the submission of reports by utilities and carriers. MISCELLANEOUS

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, Article 1 of the Code of West Virginia, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year. Each board is also given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers are authorized to administer oaths.

Each applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of \$20, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge \$5 for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof. All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board, and each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues. An applicant who has been refused a license or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked has the right to appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he or she resides.

Unless otherwise specified by law, members of boards are allowed for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or its committees and in necessary travel, an amount not less than \$35 per day but not more than the amount paid to members of the Legislature for their interim duties as recommended by the Citizens Legislative Compensation Commission and authorized by law. Members of boards are also entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January, and the secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

No more than three members shall be of the same political party. One member shall be an architect selected from three persons recommended by the board of architects, one member shall be a registered professional engineer selected from three persons recommended by the board of engineers, one member shall be the commissioner of the division of culture and history, who is chair of the commission, and two members shall be selected from the public at large; terms of four years; members serve without compensation and shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses.

The Commission shall review and approve or reject all plans recommending substantial physical changes inside or outside the state capitol building or surrounding complex, including the public meeting rooms, hallways and grounds, which affect the appearance thereof. The approval of the Commission is mandatory before a contract may be let for work which constitutes a substantial physical change, or before changes are started if the work is not done under a contract. The surrounding complex shall include the governor's mansion and other buildings used by the Governor as part of his or her residence, the state science and culture center, all state office buildings located in the immediate vicinity of the state capitol, and the roadways, structures and facilities which are incidental to such buildings. No contract or contracts which will result in physical changes to the capitol building or any approaches, structures or facilities incidental thereto shall be let, nor shall any physical changes be made not requiring a contract, until approval of the Commission has been obtained. COURT OF CLAIMS

Created by an Act of the Legislature in 1967. Consists of three judges appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each appointment is made from a list of three qualified nominees furnished by the Board of Governors of the West Virginia State Bar. Bipartisan; term, six years; Per Diem, \$160 for each day actually served, not to exceed one hundred days in any fiscal year (excluding crime victims compensation fund time), plus expenses based upon Legislative reimbursement.

The Court of Claims hears claims against the state for money damages. Awards made are subject to final approval by the Legislature. Upon request, it issues advisory opinions to state agencies. It also investigates and hears claims, made by victims of criminally injurious conduct, for awards from a crime victims compensation fund created by the Legislature in 1981 and funded by additional court costs being imposed upon every person pleading guilty or found guilty of a felony or misdemeanor other than a nonmoving traffic offense.

LARRY V. STARCHER was born in Roane County, West Virginia, September 25, 1942. Married to the former Rebecca Wiles; three children: Mollianne, Victor, and Amy. Molli is a graduate of the WVU College of Law; Victor, the WVU School of Medicine; and Amy, the WVU Masters of Public Administration program. Education: A.B. in 1964 and J.D. in 1967 from West Virginia University. Prior to being elected Circuit Judge of Monongalia County in 1976, served on the Morgantown City Council in 1970-1972, as an Assistant to the Vice President for Off-Campus Education at WVU, as Director of the North Central West Virginia Legal Aid Society, and as a private lawyer. Served as circuit judge for 20 years, 18 as chief judge. Has held all offices in the West Virginia Judicial Association, including President in 1992-93. Has been a regular instructor at judicial conferences. Has been honored by many civic and community groups, including the NAACP, Jaycees, Trial Lawyers, and Probation Officers. Member of the Martin Luther King, Jr., State Holiday Commission. Fellow of the National Endowment for the Humanities at Harvard University, 1976. Adjunct Lecturer at the WVU College of Law since 1992. Elected in November 1996 to the Supreme Court of Appeals and served as Chief Justice in 1999. He also served on the Board of Directors of the National Conference of Chief Justices in 1999-2000.

JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

ROBIN JEAN DAVIS of Charleston, Kanawha County, was born in Boone County, April 6, 1956. Married to Scott Segal; one son: Oliver. Education: B.S. from West Virginia Wesleyan College, 1978; M.A. and J.D. from West Virginia University, 1982. Engaged in the private practice of law from 1982 until 1996. Before her election to the Supreme Court of Appeals, practiced law at the six-person law firm of Segal and Davis, L.C., concentrating in the field of employee benefits and domestic relations. In 1993, became the first lawyer in West Virginia to be inducted into the American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers. Appointed in 1991 by the Supreme Court of Appeals to the seven-person West Virginia Board of Law Examiners, on which she served until 1996. Elected to the Supreme Court of Appeals in 1996; Chief Justice in 1998. Author of several articles appearing in the *West Virginia Law Review*, including, "A Tribute to Franklin D. Cleckley: A Compendium of Essential Legal Principles from his Opinions as Justice on the W. Va. Supreme Court of Appeals". Coauthor with Franklin D. Cleckley and Louis J. Palmer, Jr., of the *Litigation Handbook on West Virginia Rules of Civil Procedure*. Most senior member of the Supreme Court of Appeals. Recipient, 2000 Distinguished West Virginian Award.

ELLIOTT E. MAYNARD, a lifelong resident of West Virginia, was born in Williamson, attended schools there and graduated in 1960 from Belfry High School. Served in the United States Air Force from 1961 to 1966. Graduate of Florida Southern College with a B.S. in Psychology, 1967. Was Managing Director of the Tug Valley Chamber of Commerce from 1968 through 1970. After graduating from the West Virginia University College of Law in 1974, he began his law practice in Williamson. Elected Prosecuting Attorney of Mingo County in 1976; reelected in 1980. Appointed Judge of the Thirtieth Judicial Circuit by Governor Jay Rockefeller, 1982. Twice elected Judge of that Circuit and was thereafter elected Justice of the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals and began serving a twelve-year term on January 1, 1997. Involved for over thirty years with the Boy Scouts of America and was District Chairman of the Mingo-Pike District and Chief Cornstalk District. Served on the Board of the Buckskin Council and recently received the Silver Beaver Award, the highest volunteer award in scouting. Assumed position of Chief Justice on January 1, 2000.

WARREN RANDOLPH MCGRAW was born in Wyoming County, West Virginia, May 10, 1939. Married Peggy Shufflebarger in 1961; three children: W. Randolph, H. Suzanne and Rebecca L.; six grandchildren. Educated in Wyoming County public schools; A.B. in 1960 from Morris Harvey College (University of Charleston); attended West Virginia University Graduate School; J.D. in 1963 from Wake Forest University. Admitted to the West Virginia Bar in 1963. Elected as a West Virginia delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1972 and 1974; served as a member of the Delegate and Senatorial District Executive Committees; served as a delegate to the State Democratic Judicial Convention and the State Democratic Convention. Has been elected to a greater number of constitutional offices than any other West Virginian; served in all three branches of West Virginia government. Elected to the West Virginia House of Delegates in 1968 and 1970 and the West Virginia Senate in 1972, 1976, and 1980. He was elected the 44th President of the West Virginia Senate in 1980 and reelected in 1982. Served as Co-Chairman of the Crime Commission and a member of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors. Designated as one of the nation's outstanding legislators from Rutgers University. Featured on the National Public Television series "Bill Moyers Journal", in "If Elected", a one-hour special on local electoral process. Received the Friend of Education, Margaret Baldwin Award from the West Virginia Education Association and participated in Marshall University's Taft Lecture Series. Elected to the Wyoming County Board of Education, 1986. Elected Prosecuting Attorney of Wyoming County, 1996. Served as past President of the Jaycees; a member of the Heart Fund; a member of the Wyoming County Cancer Fund; and as past Chairman of the Wyoming County Democratic Executive Committee. Past Employment includes open hearth steel worker, U.S. Steel Corporation; chemical worker, Union Carbide Corporation; U.S. Department of Justice trial attorney (civil rights and vote fraud) Washington, D.C.; legal services attorney; instructor, West Virginia University Extension; and the private general practice of law. Member, Wyoming and Raleigh County Bar Associations; Rotary International; Board of Trustees of the Appalachian School of Law, Grundy, Virginia. Trustee, First United Methodist Church in Pineville. In November 1998, elected to the Supreme Court of Appeals, and in January 2001, elected Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

JOSEPH P. ALBRIGHT was elected to the Supreme Court of Appeals in November 2000 for a full 12-year term. Born in Wood County, November 8, 1938. Married the late Patricia Ann Deem in 1958; children: Terri Albright Cavi, Dr. Lettie Albright, Joseph P. Albright, Jr., and the late John Patrick Albright. In 1995, married the former Nancie Gensert Divvens; children: Susan Divvens Bowman, Sandy Divvens Fox and Debbie Divvens Holcomb. Education: B.S. in business administration, *cum laude*, University of Notre Dame; J.D., Notre Dame Law School. Won the Webber Prize for Appellate Advocacy and was a member of the Notre Dame law review. Practiced law in Parkersburg and surrounding counties from 1962 until September 1995. Appointed in September 1995, by Governor Gaston Caperton to an unexpired term on the Supreme Court of Appeals. Served through December 1996. After his former service on the court, resumed his practice in Parkersburg and Charleston. Since 1959, has been an officer and director of Albright's of Belpre, Inc., a family corporation which owns and operates Belpre Furniture Galleries, a retail furniture business in Belpre, Ohio. Former assistant prosecuting attorney of Wood County and former city attorney for the City of Parkersburg. Elected to the House of Delegates in 1970 and to six more terms commencing in 1974. Served as Chair of Education, 1977-78; Chair of Judiciary, 1979-84; 52nd Speaker of the House of Delegates in 1985 and 1986. Served on a number of public and quasi-public boards and commissions, including the Parkersburg Charter Board from 1969-70, when Parkersburg adopted a new city charter. Member, St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church in Parkersburg.

THE JUDICIAL INVESTIGATION COMMISSION

Created by Rules promulgated by the Supreme Court of Appeals by Order entered December 15, 1982, the Judicial Investigation Commission is authorized to receive and initiate complaints of an unethical nature concerning any Supreme Court Justice, Circuit Judge, Magistrate, Family Law Master, Mental Hygiene Commissioner, Juvenile Referee, Special Commissioner or Special Master of this state and to conduct full investigations in connection therewith; to file complaints with the Judicial Hearing Board, after presentation of a report of the investigation by Counsel for the Commission if a majority of the members of the Commission believe that probable cause exists to charge a Justice, Judge, Magistrate, Family Law Master, Mental Hygiene Commissioner, Juvenile Referee, Special Commissioner or Special Master with violation of the Code of Judicial Conduct, Code of Regulations and Standards of Conduct and Performances, or to charge that a Justice, Judge, Magistrate, Family Law Master, Mental Hygiene Commissioner, Juvenile Referee, Special Commissioner or Special Master because of advancing years and attendant physical or mental incapacity should not continue to serve.

The court adopted and promulgated a definition of the practice of law; a code of professional ethics, a code of judicial ethics and a constitution and bylaws for the government of the State Bar, effective May 1, 1947. Its membership consists of all persons lawfully admitted to the practice of law in West Virginia.

By a majority vote in 1996, the members of the State Bar consented to the payment of an annual membership fee as follows: Less than one year \$50.00; one-three years \$150.00; over three years \$195.00.

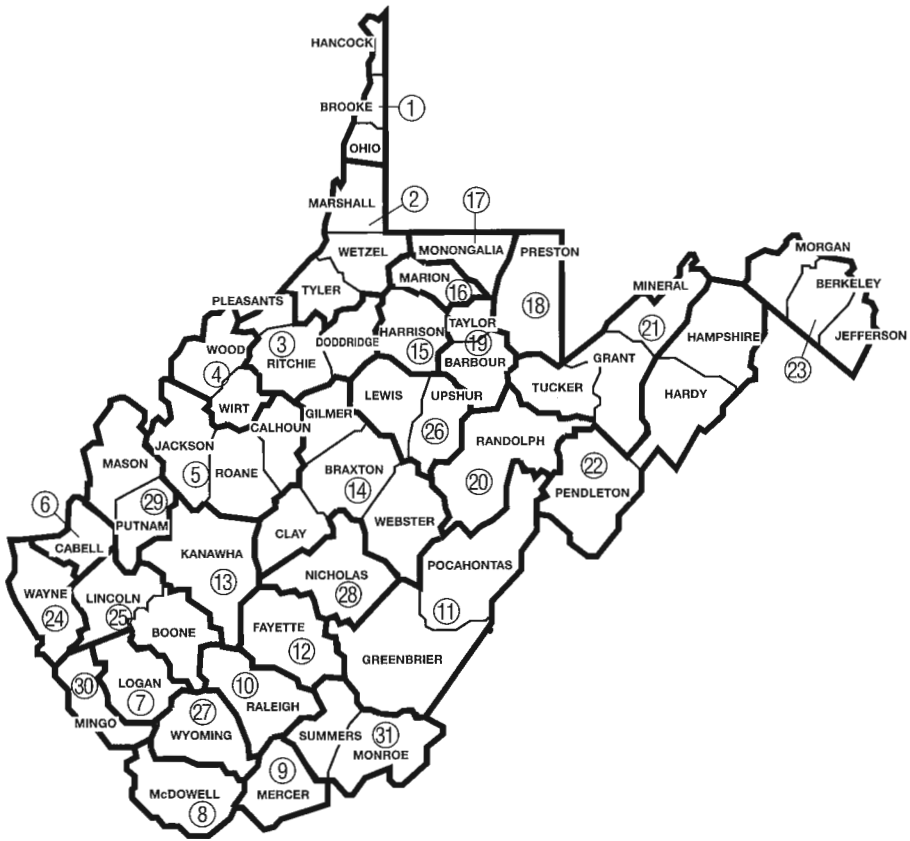
The objects of the State Bar are to protect the interests of the public; to advance the administration of justice and the science of jurisprudence; to improve the relations between the public and the Bench and the Bar; to uphold and elevate the standards of honor, integrity, competency and courtesy in the legal profession; and to encourage cordial relations among its members. It is its declared purpose to give effect to pertinent rules of the Supreme Court of Appeals and to perform the functions expressed in its constitution and bylaws. A principal duty of the State Bar is to uphold the standards of professional ethics and to diligently and vigilantly investigate and prosecute violations of these standards.

The State Bar is governed by a Board of Governors, consisting of the State Bar officers and twenty-one Governors being elected by the members of the Bar by a secret mail ballot.

CIRCUIT COURT

The Circuit Courts are West Virginia's only trial court of record, with 65 judges sitting in 31 circuits that range in size from seven judges in one county to one judge in three counties. Each county has a circuit court.

Circuit judges hear all felony criminal cases, certain misdemeanors, civil suits, appeals from magistrate courts (which they supervise), review of domestic relations cases, and various administrative judicial actions.

Judges are elected for eight-year terms. Current terms expire December 31, 2008. Salary: \$90,000, effective July 1, 1999.

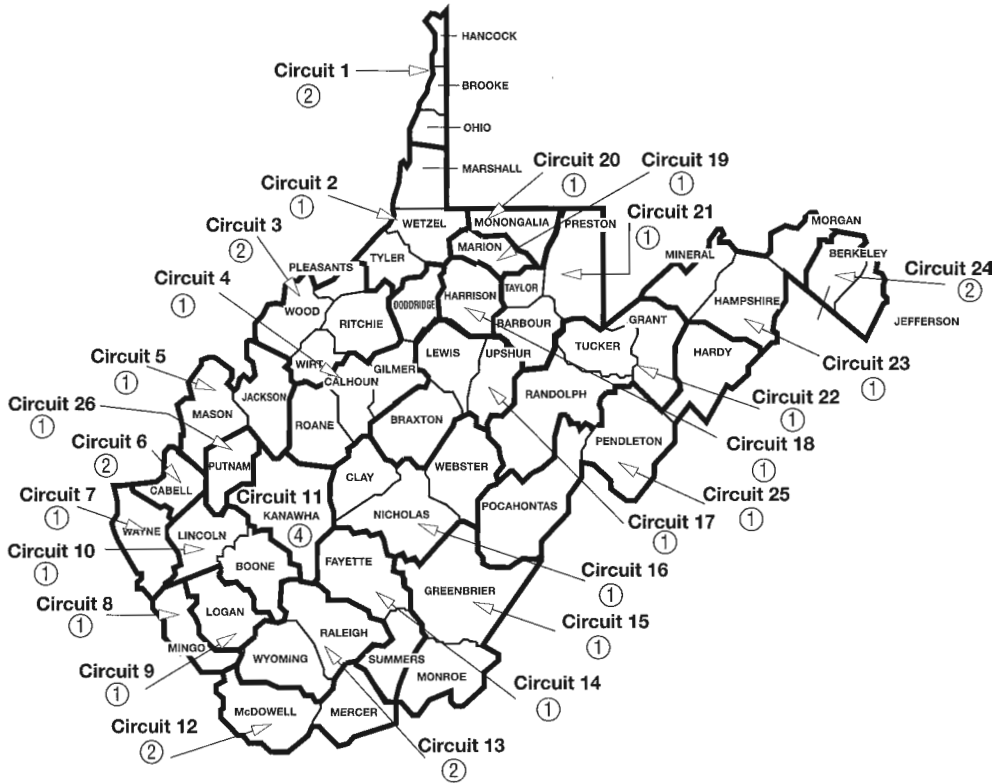

FAMILY COURT JUDGES

The Family Court System was created, in part, by a constitutional amendment ratified in November 2000, and by Chapter 5, Acts of the Legislature, Fifth Extraordinary Session, 2001, effective September 19, 2001. The Family Court System replaces the family law master system created by Chapter 2, Acts of the Legislature, Second Extraordinary Session, 1986.

Under the new system, West Virginia is divided into twenty-six family court circuits served by thirty-five court judges. The family court judges were appointed by the Governor to a one-year term to run from January 1, 2002, through December 31, 2002. During 2002, family court judges were elected for an initial term in office of six years ending December 31, 2008. Subsequent terms will run eight years. Salary: \$62,500 effective November 1, 2003.

MAGISTRATE COURTS

Magistrate Courts supplanted the justice-of-the-peace system through the 1974 Judicial Reorganization Amendment. There are 159 magistrates statewide, with at least two in every county and ten in the largest county.

Magistrates hear about 300,000 cases a year, and have jurisdiction of: Most misdemeanors including traffic and natural resource offenses; preliminary hearings in felony cases; civil cases in which \$5,000 or less is in dispute and domestic violence proceedings involving protective orders; brief commitments under mental hygiene law; and initial hearing in juvenile cases if designated as a juvenile referee.

Magistrates are elected for four-year terms. Terms expire December, 2004. Salaries, in two tiers, are \$33,625 and \$40,000, effective July 1, 2003.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

[Preamble]

WE THE PEOPLE of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this CONSTITUTION for the United States of America.¹

ARTICLE I.

Section 1.

[Legislative Powers]

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2.

[House of Representatives, How Constituted, Power of Impeachment]

The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

[Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons.]² The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New-York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3.

[The Senate, How Constituted, Impeachment Trials]

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.]³

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; [and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.]⁴

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4.

[Election of Senators and Representatives]

The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.⁵

Section 5.

[Quorum, Journals, Meetings, Adjournments]

Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behaviour, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6.

[Compensation, Privileges, Disabilities]

The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7.

[Procedure in Passing Bills and Resolutions]

All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8.

[Powers of Congress]

The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish a uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings; - And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9.

[Limitations upon Powers of Congress]

The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Section 10.

[Restrictions upon Powers of States]

No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection Laws: and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controll of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1.

[Executive Power, Election, Qualifications of the President]

The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.]⁶

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be encreased or diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: - "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2.

[Powers of the President]

The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3.

[Powers and Duties of the President]

He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4.

[Impeachment]

The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1.

[Judicial Power, Tenure of Office]

The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour; and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2.

[Jurisdiction]

The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority; - to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls; - to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction; - to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party; - to Controversies between two or more States; - between a State and Citizens of another State; - between Citizens of different States, - between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.⁷

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3.

[Treason, Proof and Punishment]

Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1.

[Faith and Credit among States]

Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2.

[Privileges and Immunities, Fugitives]

The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.

Section 3.

[Admission of New States]

New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4.

[Guarantee of Republican Government]

The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V.

[Amendment of the Constitution]

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI.

[Debts, Supremacy, Oath]

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the

supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

[Ratification and Establishment]

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.*

Done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth IN WITNESS whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names,

*The Constitution was submitted by resolution of the Constitutional Convention on September 17, 1787. It became effective on March 4, 1789, the day fixed for commencement of the operations of the government, by virtue of its ratification by the conventions of eleven states, as follows: Delaware, December 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, December 12, 1787; New Jersey, December 18, 1787; Georgia, January 2, 1788; Connecticut, January 9, 1788; Massachusetts, February 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New York, July 26, 1788.

Subsequently the conventions of North Carolina and Rhode Island ratified the Constitution on November 21, 1789, and May 29, 1790, respectively.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION*

[AMENDMENT I]

[Freedom of Religion, of Speech, and of the Press]

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

[AMENDMENT II]

[Right to Keep and Bear Arms]

A well regulated Militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

[AMENDMENT III]

[Quartering of Soldiers]

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

[AMENDMENT IV]

[Security from Unwarrantable Search and Seizure]

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

[AMENDMENT V]

[Rights of Accused in Criminal Proceedings]

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

[AMENDMENT VI]

[Right to Speedy Trial, Witnesses, etc.]

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

[AMENDMENT VII]

[Trial by Jury in Civil Cases]

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

[AMENDMENT VIII]

[Bails, Fines, Punishments]

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

[AMENDMENT IX]

[Reservation of Rights of the People]

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

[AMENDMENT X]

[Powers Reserved to States or People]

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

[AMENDMENT XI]

[Restriction of Judicial Power]

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.¹⁰

[AMENDMENT XII]

[Election of President and Vice-President]

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; - The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted; - The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. - The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have the majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of the Vice-President of the United States.¹¹

[AMENDMENT XIII]

Section 1.*[Abolition of Slavery]*

Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹²

[AMENDMENT XIV]

Section 1.*[Citizenship Rights Not to Be Abridged by States]*

All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2.*[Apportionment of Representatives in Congress]*

Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3.*[Persons Disqualified from Holding Office]*

No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4.*[What Public Debts Are Valid]*

The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.¹³

[AMENDMENT XV]

Section 1.*[Negro Suffrage]*

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹⁴

[AMENDMENT XVI]

[Authorizing Income Taxes]

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.¹⁵

[AMENDMENT XVII]

[Popular Election of Senators]

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.¹⁶

[AMENDMENT XVIII]

Section 1.*[National Liquor Prohibition]*

After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.¹⁷

[AMENDMENT XIX]

[Woman Suffrage]

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.¹⁸

[AMENDMENT XX]

Section 1.*[Terms of Office]*

The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2.*[Time on Convening Congress]*

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3.*[Death of President Elect]*

If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4.*[Election of the President]*

The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5.*[Effective Date of Sections 1 and 2]*

Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.¹⁹

[AMENDMENT XXI]

Section 1.*[National Liquor Prohibition Repealed]*

The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2.*[Transportation of Liquor into "Dry" States]*

The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁰

[AMENDMENT XXII]

Section 1.*[Terms of Office of the President]*

No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2.*[Ratification within Seven Years]*

This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.²¹

[AMENDMENT XXIII]

Section 1.*[Electors for President and Vice President in District of Columbia]*

The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²²

[AMENDMENT XXIV]

Section 1.*[Poll Tax Payment Not Required to Vote in Federal Elections]*

The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²³

[AMENDMENT XXV]

Section 1.*[Succession upon Death, Resignation or Removal of President]*

In case of the removal of the President from office or of his death or resignation, the Vice President shall become President.

Section 2.*[Vacancy in Office of Vice President]*

Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of the Vice President, the President shall nominate a Vice President who shall take office upon confirmation by a majority vote of both Houses of Congress.

Section 3.*[Declaration by President of Inability to Perform Duties]*

Whenever the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, such powers and duties shall be discharged by the Vice President as Acting President.

Section 4.*[Declaration of President's Disability by Vice President and other Officers; Determination of Issue]*

Whenever the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive departments or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting President.

Thereafter, when the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that no inability exists, he shall resume the powers and duties of his office unless the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive department or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit within four days to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office. Thereupon Congress shall decide the issue, assembling within forty-eight hours for that purpose if not in session. If the Congress, within twenty-one days after receipt of the latter written declaration, or, if Congress is not in session, within twenty-one days after Congress is required to assemble, determines by two-thirds vote of both Houses that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall continue to discharge the same as Acting President; otherwise, the President shall resume the powers and duties of his office.²⁴

[AMENDMENT XXVI]

Section 1.*[Voting by Persons Eighteen Years of Age]*

The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section 2.*[Power to Enforce This Article]*

The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²⁵

[AMENDMENT XXVII]

[Compensation for Members of Congress]

No law, varying the compensation for the services of the Senators and Representatives, shall take effect, until an election of Representatives shall have intervened.²⁶

Preamble

Since through Divine Providence we enjoy the blessings of civil, political and religious liberty, we, the people of West Virginia, in and through the provisions of this Constitution, reaffirm our faith in and constant reliance upon God and seek diligently to promote, preserve and perpetuate good government in the State of West Virginia for the common welfare, freedom and security of ourselves and our posterity.

[**Editor's note.**—This preamble was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1959, p. 659; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1960, c. 4; and ratified November 8, 1960.]

ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

§1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

§2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved to the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

§3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in time of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

Representatives to Congress

§4. For the election of representatives to Congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

§1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over, the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[**Editor's note.**—All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia, and in the Constitution of 1863 forty-four of the above-named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition, the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should that Constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising those counties. The districts adopted the Constitution, and these six counties became part of the State.

The remaining four counties mentioned above were created by Acts of the Legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; and Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871. After the ratification of the Constitution of 1872, Mingo County was created by an act of the Legislature from Logan County, on February 23, 1895, to make a total of fifty-five counties.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

§2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

§3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

§4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto, shall as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

§5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens, as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes—Penalty

§6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

“Montani Semper Liberi”—State Seal

§7. The present seal of the State, with its motto, “Montani Semper Liberi,” shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the secretary of state, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds—Indictments

§8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, “Against the peace and dignity of the State.”

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

§1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: The enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

§2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from, the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

§3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms that is the best, which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable, and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

§4. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to

answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail not Required

§5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offence. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offence committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offence.

Unreasonable Searches and Seizures Prohibited

§6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

§7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

§8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

Private Property, How Taken

§9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged for public use, or for the use of such corporation, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: Provided, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

§10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

§11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offences, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law, of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

§12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offence that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without consent of the owner; nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

§13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit in a court of limited jurisdiction a jury shall consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise reexamined in any case than according to the rule of court or law.

[**Editor's note.**—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 11, Acts, Regular Session, 1879, p. 182; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1879, c. 50; and ratified October 12, 1880.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case, be otherwise reexamined than according to the rules of common law.”

The second amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts, Regular Session, 1974, p. 946; submitted under authority of art. 11, c. 3, of the West Virginia Code, and ratified November 5, 1974.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise reexamined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.”

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Trials of Crimes — Provisions in Interest of Accused

§14. Trials of crimes, and of misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men*, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offence was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defence; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

[*See section 21 of this article, making women eligible for jury service.]

Religious Freedom Guarantee

§15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess and by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in nowise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the Legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support, such private contracts as he shall please.

Voluntary Contemplation, Meditation or Prayer in Schools

§15a. Public schools shall provide a designated brief time at the beginning of each school day for any student desiring to exercise their right to personal and private contemplation, meditation or prayer. No student of a public school may be denied the right to personal and private contemplation, meditation or prayer nor shall any student be required or encouraged to engage in any given contemplation, meditation or prayer as a part of the school curriculum.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts, Regular Session, 1984, p. 1123; and ratified November 6, 1984.]

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolable

§16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

Courts Open to All—Justice Administered Speedily

§17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

§18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, etc., Provided Against

§19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

§20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

Jury Service for Women

§21. Regardless of sex, all persons, who are otherwise qualified, shall be eligible to serve as petit jurors, in both civil and criminal cases, as grand jurors and as coroner's jurors.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts, Regular Session, 1955, p. 571; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1955, c. 22; and ratified November 6, 1956.]

Right to Keep and Bear Arms

§22. A person has the right to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and state, and for lawful hunting and recreational use.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 18, Acts, Regular Session, 1985, p. 1704; submitted in accordance with art. 11, c. 3, of the West Virginia Code; and ratified November 4, 1986.]

ARTICLE IV

Election and Officers

§1. The citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or who has been declared mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction, or who is under conviction of treason, felony or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the state and of the county in which he offers to vote, for thirty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this state by reason of being stationed therein.

[**Editor's note.**—The Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution now provides that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex. As to the appointment of women as probation officers before the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment, see State ex rel. Hall v. Monongalia County Court, 82 W. Va. 564, 96 S. E. 966 (1918). See also W. Va. Const. art. IV, §4.]

[XXVI amendment of 1971 to the United States Constitution now provides that the rights of citizens of the United States who are eighteen years of age or older shall not be denied or abridged on account of age.]

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 13, Acts, Regular Session, 1994, p. 2230, and ratified November 8, 1994.]

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“The male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who

is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.”]

Mode of Voting by Ballot

§2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be left free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

§3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads; or, except in time of war or public danger, to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office—Age Requirements

§4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any state, county or municipal office; but the governor and judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the attorney general and senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

§5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provisions for Removal of Officials

§6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general laws, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

General Elections, When Held—Terms of Officials

§7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the Legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments, in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts, 1883, p. 137; submitted by Acts, 1883, c. 43; and ratified October 14, 1884. Prior to the amendment, this section provided that the general election should be held on the second Tuesday in October and that terms of members of the Legislature began on the first day of November.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

§8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this Constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

§9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments, and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the president of the supreme court of appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature, for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

§10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

Safeguards for Ballots

§11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner, upon the ballot.

Registration Laws Provided For

§12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 19, Acts, 1901, p. 472; submitted by Acts, 1901, c. 154; and ratified November 4, 1902. The original section read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election, because his name is not, or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter.")

ARTICLE V

Division of Powers

§1. The legislative, executive and judicial departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

The Legislature

§1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

§2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members, subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[Editor's note.—The Senate is now composed of thirty-four, and the House of Delegates of one hundred members.]

Senators and Delegates—Terms of Office

§3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and delegates for the term of two years. The senators first elected, shall divide themselves into two classes, one senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one half of the senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

§4. For the election of senators, the State shall be divided into twelve senatorial districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the senatorial districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

Senatorial Districts Designated

§5. Until the senatorial districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first senatorial district; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[**Editor's note.**—There are now seventeen senatorial districts. See § 1-2-1 of the Code, as amended by c. 99, p. 540, Acts, 1982 Regular Session.]

Provision for Delegate Representation

§6. For the election of delegates, every county containing a population of less than three fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall, at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a delegate district.

After Census, Delegate Apportionment

§7. After every census the delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the state by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every delegate district, and of every county not included in a delegate district, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those delegate districts, and counties not included in a delegate district, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every delegate district and county not included in a delegate district, shall be entitled to at least one delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

§8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first delegate district, and elect three delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun, the second, and elect two delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor, the third, and elect one delegate; Randolph and Tucker, the fourth, and elect one delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster, the fifth, and elect one delegate; McDowell and Wyoming, the sixth, and elect one delegate.

Further Apportionments

§9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of delegates to the counties not included in delegate districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two delegates each.

To Kanawha county, three delegates.

To Ohio county, four delegates.

[**Editor's note.**—Many changes have been made in the apportionment. There are 40 delegate districts. For the present apportionment, see Acts, Regular Session, 1982, c. 99, p. 540.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

§10. The arrangement of the senatorial and delegate districts, and apportionment of delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such districts shall be altered, and delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted Into State

§11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the state, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Senators and Delegates Required to Be Residents of Districts

§12. No person shall be a senator or delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the district or county from which he is elected; and if a senator or delegate remove from the district or county for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

§13. No person holding any other lucrative office or employment under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; and no person who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 456; and ratified November 3, 1970.

This section prior to its amendment, read:

"No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature."

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

§14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether state, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office For Profit

§15. No senator or delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

§16. Members of the Legislature, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability"; and they shall also take this further oath, to wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator

(or Delegate) on any bill, resolution or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate).” These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a judge of the supreme court of appeals, or of a circuit court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the secretary of state shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged From Civil Arrest

§17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

Time and Place of Assembly of Legislature

§18. The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener unless convened by the governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Upon the convening of the Legislature in each odd-numbered year, each house shall proceed to organize by the election of its officers for two-year terms and both houses shall then in joint assembly open and publish the election returns delivered to the Legislature as prescribed by other provisions of this Constitution and by general law. When all of these matters have been completed in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter, the Legislature shall adjourn until the second Wednesday of February following. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-one of this article and any other provisions of this Constitution, on and after the effective date hereof, there shall be submitted by the governor to the Legislature, on the second Wednesday of February in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter, and on the second Wednesday of January of all other years, unless a later time in any year be fixed by the Legislature, a budget for the next ensuing fiscal year and a bill for the proposed appropriations of such budget.

[**Editor's note.**—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts, Regular Session, 1953, p. 612; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1953, c. 31; and ratified November 2, 1954.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“This Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government, biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the governor. This first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.”

It was amended to read:

“The Legislature shall assemble annually at the seat of government, and not oftener, unless convened by the governor. Regular sessions of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January of each year. Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Constitution, the board of public works shall, on and after the effective date hereof, submit to the Legislature an annual budget prepared as otherwise required by the Constitution.”

The second amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 456; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 22; and ratified November 3, 1970.

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Convening of Legislature By Governor

§19. The governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three fifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

§20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Other Than At the Seat of Government

§21. The governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it cannot safely assemble at the seat of government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

Length of Legislative Session

§22. The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-three and every fourth year thereafter shall, in addition to the meeting days preceding the adjournment provided for in section eighteen of this article, not exceed sixty calendar days computed from and including the second Wednesday of February, and the regular session held in all other years shall not exceed sixty calendar days computed from and including the second Wednesday of January. Any regular session may be extended by a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house determined by yeas and nays and entered on the journals.

[Editor's note.]—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1919, p. 498; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1919, c. 127; and ratified November 2, 1920.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house."

It was amended to read:

"All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days from the date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the governor and passed by a vote of four fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular session shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house."

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts, Regular Session, 1927, p. 350; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1927, c. 28; and ratified November 6, 1928.

It was amended to read:

"All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house."

The third amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts, Regular Session, 1953, p. 612; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1953, c. 31; and ratified November 2, 1954.

It was amended to read:

"The regular session of the Legislature held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-five and every second year thereafter shall not exceed sixty days, and the regular session held in the year one thousand nine hundred fifty-six and every second year thereafter shall not exceed thirty days. During any thirty-day session the Legislature shall consider no other business than the annual budget bill, except such as may be stated in a proclamation issued by the governor at least ten days prior to the convening of the session, or such business as may be stated by the Legislature on its own motion in a concurrent resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to each house. All regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to each house."

The fourth amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 456; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 22; and ratified November 3, 1970.

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Concerning Adjournment

§23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

§24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a president; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate in point of continuous service present at the assembly of the Legislature at which officers thereof are to be selected, and if there be two or more such delegates with equal continuous service the one agreed upon by such delegates or chosen by such delegates by lot, shall call the House to order, and preside over it until the speaker thereof shall have been chosen, and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate in point of continuous service present at the assembly of the Legislature at which officers thereof are to be selected, and if there be two or more such members with equal continuous service the one agreed upon by such members or chosen by such members by lot, shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a president of the Senate shall have been chosen, and have taken his seat.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a president; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate present shall call the house to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the speaker thereof shall have been chosen and has taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a president of the Senate shall have been chosen and has taken his seat."]

Authority to Punish Members

§25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offence.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

§26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety, and the undisturbed transaction of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member; for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offence, by the ordinary course of law.

Accounting for State Moneys

§27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether state, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is, or shall be, to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

§28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirement for Reading of Bills

§29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: Provided, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

Acts to Embrace But One Object—Time of Effect

§30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under this Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

§31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one house, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journals; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

“Majority” Defined

§32. Whenever the words, “a majority of the members elected to either house of the Legislature,” or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

Compensation and Expenses of Members

§33. Members of the Legislature shall receive such compensation in connection with the performance of their respective duties as members of the Legislature and such allowances for travel and other expenses in connection therewith as shall be (1) established in a resolution submitted to the Legislature by the Citizens Legislative Compensation Commission hereinafter created, and (2) thereafter enacted into general law by the Legislature at a regular session thereof, subject to such requirements and conditions as shall be prescribed in such general law. The Legislature may in any such general law reduce but shall not increase any item of compensation or expense allowance established in such resolution. All voting on the floor of both houses on the question of passage of any such general law shall be by yeas and nays to be entered on the journals.

The Citizens Legislative Compensation Commission is hereby created. It shall be composed of seven members who have been residents of this State for at least ten years prior to the date of appointment, to be appointed by the governor within twenty days after ratification of this amendment, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party. The members shall be broadly representative of the public at large. Members of the Legislature and officers and employees of the State or of any county, municipality or other governmental unit of the State shall not be eligible for appointment to or to serve as members of the commission. Each member of the commission shall serve for a term of seven years, except of the members first appointed, one member shall be appointed for a term of one year, and one each for terms ending two, three, four, five, six and seven years after the date of appointment. As the term of each member first appointed expires, a successor shall be appointed for a seven-year term. Any member may be reappointed for any number of terms, and any vacancy shall be filled by the governor for the unexpired term. Any member of the commission may be removed by the governor prior to the expiration of such member's term for official misconduct, incompetency or neglect of duty. The governor shall designate one member of the commission as chairman. The members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but shall be entitled to be reimbursed for all reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties as such members.

The commission shall meet as often as may be necessary and shall within fifteen days after the beginning of the regular session of the Legislature in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-one and within fifteen days after the beginning of the regular session in each fourth year thereafter submit by resolution to the Legislature its determination of compensation and expense allowances, which resolution must be concurred in by at least four members of the commission.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, such compensation and expense allowances as may be provided for by any such general law shall be paid on and after the effective date of such general law. Until the first such general law becomes effective, the provisions of this section in effect immediately prior to the ratification of this amendment shall continue to govern.

Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts 1919, p. 498; submitted by Acts 1919, c. 127; and ratified November 2, 1920. The only change made in this section was to increase the compensation of members, exclusive of traveling expenses, from four dollars per day to five hundred dollars per annum.

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts 1953, p. 612; submitted by Acts 1953, c. 31; and ratified November 2, 1954. It increased the annual compensation of members to fifteen hundred dollars, limited expenses of traveling to and from the seat of government to one round trip in connection to each session, and inserted a proviso relating to travel expenses in connection with party caucuses. It also increased the additional compensation of the speaker of the House and the president of the Senate from two to five dollars a day and made compensation payable upon adoption of the amendment.

The third amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, 1970, submitted by Acts 1970, c. 22; and ratified November 3, 1970. The amendment, which was designated the "Legislative Improvement Amendment," rewrote this section.]

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided For—Contracts for Printing

§34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the state, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

State Not to Be Made Defendant In Any Court

§35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof, or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1935, p. 662; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1935, c. 23; and ratified November 3, 1936. The amendment added the exception to this section.]

Lotteries; Bingo; Raffles; County Option

§36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State; except that the Legislature may authorize lotteries which are regulated, controlled, owned and operated by the State of West Virginia in the manner provided by general law, either separately by this State or jointly or in cooperation with one or more other states and may authorize state-regulated bingo games and raffles for the purpose of raising money by charitable or public service organizations or by the State Fair of West Virginia for charitable or public service purposes: *Provided*, That each county may disapprove the holding of bingo games and raffles within that county at a regular, primary or special election but once having disapproved such activity, may thereafter authorize the holding of bingo games and raffles, by majority vote at a regular, primary or special election held not sooner than five years after the election resulting in disapproval; that all proceeds from the bingo games and raffles be used for the purpose of supporting charitable or public service purposes; and that the Legislature shall provide a means of regulating the bingo games and raffles so as to ensure that only charitable or public service purposes are served by the conducting of the bingo games and raffles.

Editor's Note.—The first amendment to the section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 13, Acts, Regular Session, 1980, p. 739; submitted in accordance with art. 11, c. 3 of the West Virginia Code; and ratified November 4, 1980.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries, or gift enterprises for any purpose, and pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State."

The second amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1983, p. 1076 and ratified November 6, 1984.

This section was amended to allow the Legislature to authorize lotteries which are regulated, controlled, owned and operated by the State of West Virginia in the manner provided by general law, either separately by this State or jointly or in cooperation with one or more other states.]

Terms of Office Not to Be Extended After Election

§37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Cannot Be Increased During Official Terms

§38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due to the State: *Provided*, the Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not to Be Passed In Enumerated Cases

§39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

- Granting divorces;
- Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;
- Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;
- Locating, or changing county seats;
- Regulating or changing county or district affairs;
- Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;
- Regulating the practice in courts of justice;
- Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;
- Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;
- The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting;
- The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;
- Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;
- Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;
- Changing the law of descent;
- Regulating the rate of interest;
- Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;
- Releasing taxes;
- Releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

Home Rule For Municipalities

§39a. No local or special law shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The Legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages, and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns and villages to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs: *Provided*, That any

such charter or amendment thereto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted, shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this Constitution or the general laws of the State then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

§40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

Each House to Keep Journal of Proceedings

§41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one tenth of those present shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills to Be Specific

§42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

[**Editor's note.**—This section is superseded by the Budget Amendment of 1918 and the Modern Budget Amendment of 1968; section 51 of this article.]

Board or Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

§43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

Election of Legislative, County and Municipal Officers

§44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be *via voce*, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe—Punishment

§45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offences: *Provided*, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offence of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offences specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Liquor

§46. The Legislature shall by appropriate legislation regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[**Editor's note.**—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts 1911, p. 289; submitted by Acts 1911, c. 15; and ratified November 5, 1912. Prior to the amendment, which provided for prohibition commencing on July 1, 1914, this section authorized laws regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors.

The second amendment was proposed by Sen. Com. Sub. for Eng. House Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1933, p. 313; submitted by Acts 1933, c. 25; and ratified November 6, 1934. The amendment rewrote the section to read as set out above.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

§47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

Homestead Exemption

§48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of five thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of one thousand dollars, exempt from forced sale, subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in nowise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution and the increases in such homestead exemption provided by this amendment shall in nowise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the ratification of such amendment: *Provided, however*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in nowise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution: *And provided further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon."

Property of Married Woman

§49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

Plan of Proportional Representation

§50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the senatorial districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

Budget and Supplementary Appropriation Bills

§51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the provisions of this section.

Subsection A—Appropriation Bills

(1) Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter provided.

Subsection B—Budget Bills

(2) Within ten days after the convening of the regular session of the Legislature in odd-numbered years, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature, and on the second Wednesday of January in even-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the Legislature a budget for the next ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the fiscal year and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of each fiscal year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (a) An estimate of the revenues and expenditures for the current fiscal year, including the actual revenues and actual expenditures to the extent available, and the revenues and expenditures for the next preceding fiscal year; (b) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the state; (c) the debts and funds of the State; (d) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of the fiscal year covered by the budget; (e) any explanation the governor may desire to make as to the important features of the budget and any suggestions as to methods for reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

(3) Each budget shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations, in such form and detail as the governor shall determine or as may be prescribed by law: (a) For the Legislature as certified to the governor in the manner hereinafter provided; (b) for the executive department; (c) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the governor by the auditor; (d) for payment and discharge of the principal and interest of any debt of the State created in conformity with the Constitution, and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (e) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (f) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and in laws made in pursuance thereof.

(4) The governor shall deliver to the presiding officer of each house the budget and a bill for all the proposed appropriations of the budget clearly itemized and classified, in such form and detail as the governor shall determine or as may be prescribed by law; and the presiding officer of each house shall promptly cause the bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill". The governor may, with the consent of the Legislature, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement the budget to correct an oversight, or to provide funds contingent on passage of pending legislation, and in case of an emergency, he may deliver such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officers of both houses; and the amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of the budget bill as an addition to the items of the bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of the bill the amendment or supplement may affect.

(5) The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or decreasing any item therein: *Provided*, That no item relating to the judiciary shall be decreased, and except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or decreased during his term of office: *Provided further*, That the Legislature shall not increase the estimate of revenue submitted in the budget without the approval of the governor.

(6) The governor and such representatives of the executive departments, boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for state moneys as have been designated by the governor for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either house of the Legislature it shall be their duty, to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Subsection C — Supplementary Appropriation Bills

(7) Neither house shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following: (a) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called therein a supplementary appropriation bill; (b) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in the bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available.

Subsection D—General Provisions

(8) If the budget bill shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the governor shall issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of the bill; but no matter other than the bill shall be considered during such an extension of a session except a provision for the cost thereof.

(9) For the purpose of making up the budget, the governor shall have the power, and it shall be his duty, to require from the proper state officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state moneys and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as he shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each house, and for the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the auditor, shall be transmitted to the governor in such form and at such times as he shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

(10) The governor may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies and all institutions applying for state moneys. After such public hearings he may, in his discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments.

(11) Every budget bill or supplementary appropriation bill passed by a majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. The governor may veto the bill, or he may disapprove or reduce items or parts of items contained

therein. If he approves he shall sign it and thereupon it shall become a law. The bill, items or parts thereof, disapproved or reduced by the governor, shall be returned with his objections to each house of the Legislature.

Each house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal and proceed to reconsider. If, after reconsideration, two thirds of the members elected to each house agree to pass the bill, or such items or parts thereof, as were disapproved or reduced, the bill, items or parts thereof, approved by two thirds of such members, shall become law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. In all such cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal.

A bill, item or part thereof, which is not returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after the bill has been presented to him shall become a law in like manner as if he had signed the bill, unless the Legislature, by adjournment, prevents such return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, within five days after such adjournment, and shall become a law; or it shall be so filed within such five days with the objections of the governor; in which case it shall become law to the extent not disapproved by the governor.

(12) The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

(13) In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section nineteen of this article, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

(14) If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

Revenues Applicable to Roads

§52. Revenue from gasoline and other motor fuel excise and license taxation, motor vehicle registration and license taxes, and all other revenue derived from motor vehicles or motor fuels shall, after the deduction of statutory refunds and cost of administration and collection authorized by legislative appropriation, be appropriated and used solely for construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways, and also the payment of the interest and principal on all road bonds heretofore issued or which may be hereafter issued for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of public highways, and the payment of obligations incurred in the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of public highways.

Forestry Amendment

§53. The Legislature may by general law define and classify forest lands and provide for cooperation by contract between the State and the owner in the planting, cultivation, protection, and harvesting thereof. Forest lands embraced in any such contract may be exempted from all taxation or be taxed in such manner, including the imposition of a severance tax or charge as trees are harvested, as the Legislature may from time to time provide. But any tax measured by valuation shall not exceed the aggregate rates authorized by section one of article ten of this Constitution.

Continuity of Government Amendment

§54. The Legislature of West Virginia in order to insure continuity of State and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty (1) to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment,

the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such officers, and (2) to adopt such other measures as may be necessary and proper for insuring the continuity of governmental operations.

Revenues and Properties Applicable to Fish and Wildlife Conservation

§55. Fees, moneys, interest or funds arising from the sales of all permits and licenses to hunt, trap, fish or otherwise hold or capture fish and wildlife resources and money reimbursed and granted by the federal government for fish and wildlife conservation shall be expended solely for the conservation, restoration, management, educational benefit, recreational use and scientific study of the state's fish and wildlife, including the purchases or other acquisition of property for said purposes and for the administration of the laws pertaining thereto and for no other purposes. In the event that any such properties or facilities are converted to uses other than those specified in this section and the conversion jeopardizes the availability of the receipt of federal funds by the State, the agency of the State responsible for the conservation of its fish and wildlife resources shall receive fair market compensation for the converted properties or facilities. Such compensation shall be expended only for the purposes specified in this section. All moneys shall be deposited within the state treasurer in the "license fund" and other specific funds created especially for fish and wildlife conservation and the public's use of fish and wildlife. Nothing in this section shall prevent the Legislature from reducing or increasing the amount of any permit or license to hunt, trap, fish or otherwise hold or capture fish or wildlife or to repeal or enact additional fees or requirements for the privilege of hunting, trapping, fishing or to otherwise hold or capture fish or wildlife.

Revenues Applicable to Nongame Wildlife Resources in the State

§56. Notwithstanding any provision of section fifty-two of article six of this Constitution, the Legislature may, by general law, provide funding for conservation, restoration, management, educational benefit and recreational and scientific use of nongame wildlife resources in this State by providing a specialized nongame wildlife motor vehicle registration plate for motor vehicles registered in this State. The registration plate shall be issued on a voluntary basis pursuant to terms and conditions provided by general law for an additional fee above the basic registration and license fees and costs otherwise dedicated to the road fund. Any moneys collected from the issuance of these specialized registration plates in excess of those revenues otherwise dedicated to the road fund shall be deposited in a special revenue account in the state treasury and expended only in accordance with appropriations made by the Legislature as provided by general law for the conservation, restoration, management, educational benefit and recreational and scientific use of nongame wildlife resources in this State. All moneys collected which are in excess of the revenues otherwise dedicated to the road fund shall be deposited by the state treasurer in the "nongame wildlife fund" created especially for nongame wildlife resources in this State.

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

§1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general, who shall be *ex officio* reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices, and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

[**Editor's note.**—The first amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, Acts, First Extraordinary Session, 1933, p. 506; submitted by Acts, First Extraordinary Session, 1933, c. 30; and ratified November 6, 1934. The amendment inserted "commissioner of agriculture" in the first sentence of this section. Prior to the amendment the terms of office commenced on the fourth day of march, and the attorney general was excepted from the residence requirement of the third sentence.

Election

§2. An election for governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[Editor's note.—The first amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified November 4, 1902.

This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows:

"An election for governor, State superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, and attorney general, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts 1957, c. 19; and ratified November 4, 1958. The amendment deleted "State superintendent of free schools," and added "commissioner of agriculture."]

Certification of Election Returns—Contests

§3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the secretary of state, directed "to the speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 5, Acts, Regular Session, 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1901, c. 153; and ratified November 4, 1902. Eligibility

§4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. A person who has been elected or who has served as governor during all or any part of two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for the office of governor during any part of the term immediately following the second of the two consecutive terms. The person holding the office of governor when this section is ratified shall not be prevented from holding the office of governor during the term immediately following the term he is then serving.

"Neither the governor, State superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, nor attorney general, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."

It was amended to read:

"None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."

Chief Executive—Powers

§5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

§6. The governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

§7. The governor may, on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

§8. The governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for; and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies—How Filled

§9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate, (a majority of all the senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

§10. The governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Executive May Remit Fines and Forfeitures

§11. The governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, or punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-chief of Military Forces

§12. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called into the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Official Bond of State Officers

§13. When any state officer has executed his official bond, the governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

Governor's Approval or Disapproval of Bills Passed by the Legislature

§14. Subject to the provisions of section fifteen of this article, every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approves, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and may proceed to reconsider the returned bill. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution, any such bill may be reconsidered even if the Legislature is at the time in extended session for the sole purpose of considering the budget bill, as specified in said section fifty-one. If after any such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections of the governor to the other house, by which it may likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. If upon any such reconsideration the bill is amended and reenacted, then it shall be again sent to the governor and he shall act upon it as if it were before him for the first time. In all cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal.

Any bill which shall not be returned by the governor within five days, Sundays excepted, after it shall have been presented to him shall be a law, in the same manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by adjournment *sine die*, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the secretary of state within fifteen days, Sundays excepted, after such adjournment, or become a law.

[Editor's note.]—A budget bill or supplementary appropriation bill, disapproved by the governor, requires a vote of two thirds of the members elected to each house in order to become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. See "Modern Budget Amendment," Art. VI, § 51, Sub-section D (11).

The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 456; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 22; and ratified November 3, 1970. The amendment was designated the "Legislative Improvement Amendment."

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approves, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which house shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that house agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each house shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the secretary of state, within five days after such adjournment, or become a law."]

Governor's Approval or Disapproval of Bills Making Appropriations of Money

§15. A bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money must be submitted to the governor for his approval or disapproval to the extent and only to the extent required by section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution, and any provision therein contained as to such approval or disapproval shall govern and control as to any such bill.

[Editor's note.]—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 456; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 22; and ratified November 3, 1970.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the house in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless repassed by a majority of each house according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills."]

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

§16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the governor; the president of the Senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of governor; the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies in Other Executive Departments

§17. If the office of secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture or attorney general shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all moneys received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semiannual report thereof to the governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[Editor's note.]—The first amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 2, Acts, Regular Session, 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1901, c. 153; and ratified November 4, 1902. The amendment inserted "secretary of state" near the beginning of the section and substituted "prescribed" for "provided" near the end of the first sentence.

The second amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1957, c. 19; and ratified November 4, 1958. This amendment deleted "State superintendent of free schools" and inserted "commissioner of agriculture" in the first sentence.]

Executive Heads to Make Reports

§18. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of state institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

§19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the state treasury.

[Editor's note.]—The amendment of this section was proposed by Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1901, p. 459; submitted by Acts 1901, c. 153; and ratified November 4, 1902.

This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows:

"The governor shall receive for his services, a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite, shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The secretary of state shall receive one thousand; the State superintendent of free schools, fifteen hundred; the treasurer, fourteen hundred; the auditor, two thousand; and the attorney general, thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Power

§1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested solely in a supreme court of appeals and in the circuit courts, and in such intermediate appellate courts and magistrate courts as shall be hereafter established by the Legislature, and in the justices, judges and magistrates of such courts.

Supreme Court of Appeals

§2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of five justices. A majority of the justices of the court shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The justices shall be elected by the voters of the State for a term of twelve years, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such justices is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis.

Provision shall be made by rules of the supreme court of appeals for the selection of a member of the court to serve as chief justice thereof. If the chief justice is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, one of the justices of the court designated in accordance with the rules of the court shall serve temporarily in his stead.

When any justice is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, the chief justice may assign a judge of a circuit court or of an intermediate appellate court to serve from time to time in his stead.

Supreme Court of Appeals; Jurisdiction and Powers; Officers and Employees; Terms

§3. The supreme court of appeals shall have original jurisdiction of proceedings in habeas corpus, mandamus, prohibition and certiorari.

The court shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases at law where the matter in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, is of greater value or amount than three hundred dollars unless such value or amount is increased by the Legislature; in civil cases in equity; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land; in proceedings in quo warranto, habeas corpus, mandamus, prohibition and certiorari; and in cases involving personal freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases, where there has been a conviction for a felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be conferred upon it by law where there has been such a conviction in any other court. In criminal proceedings relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as to the defendant. It shall have such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

The court shall have power to promulgate rules for all cases and proceedings, civil and criminal, for all of the courts of the State relating to writs, warrants, process, practice and procedure, which shall have the force and effect of law.

The court shall have general supervisory control over all intermediate appellate courts, circuit courts and magistrate courts. The chief justice shall be the administrative head of all the courts. He may assign a judge from one intermediate appellate court to another, from one circuit court to another, or from one magistrate court to another, for temporary service. The court shall appoint an administrative director to serve at its pleasure at a salary to be fixed by the court. The administrative director shall, under the direction of the chief justice, prepare and submit a budget for the court.

The officers and employees of the supreme court of appeals, including the clerk and the law librarian, shall be appointed and may be removed by the court. Their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by the court.

The number, times and places of the terms of the supreme court of appeals shall be prescribed by law. There shall be at least two terms of the court held annually.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal; Scope and Form of Decisions

§4. A writ of error, supersedeas or appeal shall be allowed by the supreme court of appeals, or a justice thereof, only upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of a court and then only after the court, or a justice thereof, shall have examined and considered the record and is satisfied that there probably is error in the record, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the court.

No decision rendered by the court shall be considered as binding authority upon any court, except in the particular case decided, unless a majority of the justices of the court concur in such decision.

When a judgment or order of another court is reversed, modified or affirmed by the court, every point fairly arising upon the record shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case in which an opinion is written and in which a majority of the justices thereof concurred, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Circuit Courts

§5. The judge or judges of each circuit court shall be elected by the voters of the circuit for a term of eight years, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such judges is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis. Upon the effective date of this article, each statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction existing in the State immediately prior to such effective date shall become part of the circuit court for the circuit in which it presently exists, and each such judge of such statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction shall thereupon become a judge of such circuit court. During his continuance in office, a judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is a judge.

The Legislature may increase, or other than during term of office decrease, the number of circuit judges within any circuit. The judicial circuits in existence on the effective date of this article shall remain as so constituted until changed by law, and the Legislature, at any session thereof held in the odd-numbered year next preceding the time for the full-term election of the judges thereof, may rearrange the circuits and may increase or diminish the number of circuits. A judge of a circuit court in office at the time of any such change shall continue as a judge of the circuit in which he shall continue to reside after such change until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article.

There shall be at least one judge for each circuit court and as many more as may be necessary to transact the business of such court. If there be two or more judges of a circuit court, provision shall be made by rules of such circuit court for the selection of one of such judges to serve as chief judge thereof. If the chief judge is temporarily disqualified or unable to serve, one of the judges of the circuit court designated in accordance with the rules of such court shall serve temporarily in his stead.

The supreme court of appeals shall provide for dividing the business of those circuits in which there shall be more than one judge between the judges thereof so as to promote and secure the convenient and expeditious transaction of such business.

In every county in the State the circuit court for such county shall sit at least three times in each year. The supreme court of appeals shall designate the times at which each circuit court shall sit, but until this action is taken by the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall sit at the times prescribed by law. If there be two or more judges of a circuit court, such judges may hold court in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times.

Circuit Courts; Jurisdiction, Authority and Power

§6. Circuit courts shall have control of all proceedings before magistrate courts by mandamus, prohibition and certiorari.

Circuit courts shall have original and general jurisdiction of all civil cases at law where the value or amount in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds one hundred dollars unless such value or amount is increased by the Legislature; of all civil cases in equity; of proceedings in habeas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto, prohibition and certiorari; and of all crimes and misdemeanors. On and after January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, the Legislature may provide that all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators, and the settlements of their accounts, shall be vested exclusively in circuit courts or their officers, but until such time as the Legislature provides otherwise, jurisdiction in such matters shall remain in the county commissions or tribunals existing in lieu thereof or the officers of such county commissions or tribunals.

Circuit courts shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or supersedeas is allowed by law to the judgment or proceedings of any magistrate court, unless such jurisdiction is conferred by law exclusively upon an intermediate appellate court or the supreme court of appeals.

Circuit courts shall also have such other jurisdiction, authority or power, original or appellate or concurrent, as may be prescribed by law.

Subject to the approval of the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall have the authority and power to establish local rules to govern the court.

Subject to the supervisory control of the supreme court of appeals, each circuit court shall have general supervisory control over all magistrate courts in the circuit. Under the direction of the chief justice of the supreme court of appeals, the judge of the circuit court, or the chief judge thereof if there be more than one judge of the circuit court, shall be the administrative head of the circuit court and all magistrate courts in the circuit.

General Provisions Relating to Justices, Judges and Magistrates

§7. All justices, judges and magistrates must be residents of this State and shall be commissioned by the governor. No person may hereafter be elected as a justice of the supreme court of appeals unless he has been admitted to practice law for at least ten years prior to his election, and no person may hereafter be elected as a judge of a circuit court unless he has been admitted to practice law for at least five years prior to his election.

Justices, judges and magistrates shall receive the salaries fixed by law, which shall be paid entirely out of the state treasury, and which may be increased but shall not be diminished during their term of office, and they shall receive expenses as provided by law. The salary of a circuit judge shall also not be diminished during his term of office by virtue of the statutory courts of record of limited jurisdiction of his circuit becoming a part of such circuit as provided in section five of this article.

Any justice of the supreme court of appeals and any judge of any circuit court, including any statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction which becomes a part of a circuit court by virtue of section five of this article, in office on the effective date of this article shall continue in office until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article: *Provided*, That as to the term of any judge of a statutory court of record of limited jurisdiction which does not expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, the following provisions shall govern and control unless any such judges shall be sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article: (1) If the term would otherwise expire before the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, such term shall continue through and expire on said thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, (2) if the term would otherwise expire on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, such term shall terminate and expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, and (3) if the term would otherwise expire after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, but other than on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, such term shall continue through and expire on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred eighty-four.

No justice, judge or magistrate shall hold any other office, or accept any appointment or public trust, under this or any other government; nor shall he become a candidate for any elective public office or nomination thereto, except a judicial office; and the violation of any of these provisions shall vacate his judicial office. No justice of the supreme court of appeals or judge of an intermediate appellate court or of a circuit court shall practice the profession of law during the term of his office, but magistrates who are licensed to practice this profession may practice law except to the extent prohibited by the Legislature.

If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the office of a justice of the supreme court of appeals or a judge of a circuit court, the governor shall issue a directive of election to fill such vacancy in the manner prescribed by law for electing a justice or judge of the court in which the vacancy exists, and the justice or judge shall be elected for the unexpired term; and in the meantime, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a justice or judge shall be elected and qualified. If the unexpired term be less than two years, or such additional period, not exceeding a total of three years, as may be prescribed by law, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Censure, Temporary Suspension and Retirement of Justices, Judges and Magistrates; Removal

§8. Under its inherent rule-making power, which is hereby declared, the supreme court of appeals shall, from time to time, prescribe, adopt, promulgate and amend rules prescribing a judicial code of ethics, and a code of regulations and standards of conduct and performances for justices, judges and magistrates, along with sanctions and penalties for any violation thereof, and the supreme court of appeals is authorized to censure or temporarily suspend any justice, judge or magistrate having the judicial power of the State, including one of its own members, for any violation of any such code of ethics, code of regulations and standards, or to retire any such justice, judge or magistrate who is eligible for retirement under the West Virginia judges' retirement system (or any successor or substituted retirement system for justices, judges and magistrates of this State) and who, because of advancing years and attendant physical or mental incapacity, should not, in the opinion of the supreme court of appeals, continue to serve as a justice, judge or magistrate.

No justice, judge or magistrate shall be censured, temporarily suspended or retired under the provisions of this section unless he shall have been afforded the right to have a hearing before the supreme court of appeals, nor unless he shall have received notice of the proceedings, with a statement of the cause or causes alleged for his censure, temporary suspension or retirement, at least twenty days before the day on which the proceeding is to commence. No justice of the supreme court of appeals may be temporarily suspended or retired unless all of the other justices concur in such temporary sus-

pension or retirement. When rules herein authorized are prescribed, adopted and promulgated, they shall supersede all laws and parts of laws in conflict therewith, and such laws shall be and become of no further force or effect to the extent of such conflict.

A retired justice or judge may, with his permission and with the approval of the supreme court of appeals, be recalled by the chief justice of the supreme court of appeals for temporary assignment as a justice of the supreme court of appeals, or judge of an intermediate appellate court, a circuit court or a magistrate court.

A justice or judge may be removed only by impeachment in accordance with the provisions of section nine, article four of this Constitution. A magistrate may be removed from office in the manner provided by law for the removal of county officers.

Clerks of Circuit Courts

§9. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties, responsibilities, compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law. Whenever the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act in any matter, a clerk to act therein shall be appointed by the judge of the circuit court or the chief judge thereof, if there be more than one judge of the circuit court. Vacancies shall be filled in the manner prescribed by law. A clerk of the circuit court in office on the effective date of this article shall continue in office until his term shall expire, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

Magistrate Courts

§10. The Legislature shall establish in each county a magistrate court or courts with the right of appeal as prescribed by law. Such courts shall be courts of record if so prescribed by law.

The Legislature shall determine the qualifications and the number of magistrates for each such court to be elected by the voters of the county, and the Legislature may prescribe by law whether the election of such magistrates is to be on a partisan or nonpartisan basis: *Provided*, That any person in office as a justice of the peace of this State on the effective date of this article and who has served as a justice of the peace of this State for at least one year prior to such effective date shall, insofar as any qualifications established by the Legislature for the office of magistrate are concerned and notwithstanding the same, be deemed qualified for life to run for election as a magistrate of any such court: *And provided further*; That the Legislature shall not have the power to require that a magistrate be a person licensed to practice the profession of law, nor shall any justice or judge of any higher court establish any rules which by their nature would dictate or mandate that a magistrate be a person licensed to practice the profession of law. The magistrates of such courts shall hold their offices for the term of four years unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. The Legislature shall also determine the number of officers to be selected for each such court and the manner of their selection. During his continuance in office a magistrate or officer of such a court shall reside in the county for which he is elected or selected. The Legislature shall prescribe by law for the filling of any vacancy in the office of a magistrate or officer of such court.

The jurisdiction of a magistrate court shall extend throughout the county for which it is established, shall be uniform for all counties of the State and shall be subject to such regulations as to venue of actions and the counties in which process may be executed or served on parties or witnesses as may be prescribed by law. The times and places for holding such courts shall be designated or determined in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

Magistrate courts shall have such original jurisdiction in criminal matters as may be prescribed by law, but no person shall be convicted or sentenced for a felony in such courts. In criminal cases, the procedure may be by information or warrant of arrest, without presentment or indictment by a grand jury. Such courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases at law wherein the value or amount in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars, unless such amount and value shall be increased by the Legislature, except such civil matters as may be excluded from their jurisdiction by law; and, to the extent provided by law, in proceedings involving real estate when the title thereto is not in controversy. No judgment of a magistrate in any proceeding involving real estate or any right pertaining thereto shall bar the title of any party or any remedy therefor.

The division of the business of a magistrate court in any county in which there shall be more than one magistrate of such court between the magistrates thereof so as to promote and secure the convenient and expeditious transaction of such business shall be determined in such manner or by such method as shall be prescribed by the judge of the circuit court of such county, or the chief judge thereof, if there be more than one judge of such circuit court.

In a trial by jury in a magistrate court, the jury shall consist of six jurors who are qualified as prescribed by law.

No magistrate or any officer of a magistrate court shall be compensated for his services on a fee basis or receive to his own use for his services any pecuniary compensation, reward or benefit other than the salary prescribed by law.

Municipal Courts

§11. The Legislature may provide for the establishment in incorporated cities, towns or villages of municipal, police or mayors' courts, and may also provide the manner of selection of the judges of such courts. Such courts shall have jurisdiction to enforce municipal ordinances, with the right of appeal as prescribed by law. Until otherwise provided by law, all such courts heretofore established shall remain and continue as now constituted, and with the same right of appeal, insofar as their jurisdiction to enforce municipal ordinances is concerned; but on and after January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven, any other jurisdiction now exercised by such courts shall cease. No judge of a municipal, police or mayor's court or any officer thereof shall be compensated for his services on a fee basis or receive to his own use for his services any pecuniary compensation, reward or benefit other than the salary prescribed therefor.

Issuance and Execution of Writs, Warrants and Process; Admission to Bail

§12. The Legislature may designate the courts and officers or deputies thereof who shall have the power to issue, execute or serve such writs, warrants or any other process as may be prescribed by law, and may specify before what courts or officers thereof such writs, warrants or other process shall be returnable. The Legislature may also designate the courts and officers or deputies thereof who shall have the power to admit persons to bail. No person exercising such powers shall be compensated therefor on a fee basis.

Parts of Existing Law Effective

§13. Except as otherwise provided in this article, such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force on the effective date of this article and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of this State until altered or repealed by the Legislature.

Pending Causes; Transfer of Causes; Records

§14. Until otherwise provided by law, all matters pending in any court on the effective date of this article shall remain and be prosecuted in the court in which they are pending.

Whenever the jurisdiction, powers or duties of any court are terminated or changed, the Legislature shall provide by law for the transfer of all matters pending therein as to which the court shall not thereafter act, together with all of the records and papers pertaining thereto, to a court having jurisdiction, powers or duties as to such matters, and shall provide for the prosecution therein of such matters as if then and there pending.

All records and papers pertaining to matters already disposed of in any court shall be preserved or disposed of in a manner prescribed by law.

Offices Phased Out; Effective Date of Article; Certain Provisions to be Operable at Time Specified; Effect of Article on Certain Provisions of Constitution

§15. Notwithstanding the provisions of section one of this article, the office of justice of the peace, as heretofore constituted, shall continue until January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven. No person shall be elected to the office of justice of the peace or constable at the general election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred seventy-six, and said offices shall cease to exist as of January one, one thousand nine hundred seventy-seven.

This article shall take effect from the time of ratification, but in any case where it is specified in this article that a provision shall become operable on and after a certain date, such date shall govern and control as to the operable date of such provision.

The provisions of this article shall supersede and prevail over all other provisions of this Constitution which are expressly or impliedly in conflict or inconsistent therewith.

Family Courts

§16. There is hereby created under the general supervisory control of the supreme court of appeals a unified family court system in the state of West Virginia to rule on family law and related matters. Family courts shall have original jurisdiction in the areas of family law and related matters as may hereafter be established by law. Family courts may also have such further jurisdiction as established by law.

Family court judges shall be elected by the voters for a term prescribed by law not to exceed eight years, unless sooner removed or retired as authorized in this article. Family court judges must be admitted to practice law in this state for at least five years prior to their election. Family court judges shall reside in the circuit for which he or she is a judge.

The necessary number of family court judges, the number of family court circuits and the arrangement of circuits shall be established by law. Staggered terms of office for family court judges may also be established by law.

The supreme court of appeals shall have general supervisory control over all family courts and may provide for the assignment of a family court judge to another court for temporary service. The provisions of sections seven and eight of this article applicable to circuit judges shall also apply to family court judges.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

§1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

§2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs

§3. A person who has been elected or who has served as sheriff during all or any part of two consecutive terms shall be ineligible for the office of sheriff during any part of the term immediately following the second of the two consecutive terms. The person holding the office of sheriff when this section is ratified shall not be prevented from holding the office of sheriff during the term immediately following the term he is then serving.

[Editor's note.]—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session, 1973, p. 700; and ratified at a special election on November 6, 1973.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.”]

Malffeasance and Misfeasance in Office

§4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malffeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their office shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided For

§5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

§6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

§7. The president of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

§8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

County Commissions

§9. The office of county court or tribunal in lieu thereof heretofore created is hereby continued in all respects as heretofore constituted, but from and after the effective date of this amendment shall be designated as the county commission and wherever in this Constitution, the code of West Virginia, acts of the Legislature or elsewhere in law a reference is made to the county court of any county, such reference shall be read, construed and understood to mean the county commission.

Except as otherwise provided in section eleven or thirteen of this article, there shall be in each county of the state a county commission, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed and entered of record by the said commission. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said commissions.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

§10. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for a term of six years, except that at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for a term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years; but no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. If two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president. The commissioners of said commissions, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Powers of County Commissions

§11. The county commissions, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings,

ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: *Provided*, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. Until otherwise prescribed by law, they shall, in all cases of contest, be the judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such commissions may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. Such existing tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature to act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of county commissions in certain counties shall remain and continue as now constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established until otherwise provided by law, and they shall have and exercise the powers which the county commissions have under this article, and, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in section twelve of this article shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties, heretofore conferred on, or required of, any such tribunal or the clerk of such tribunal respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record and such other matters as are prescribed by law to be exercised and discharged by the clerk thereof.

Clerk of County Commission

§12. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county commission, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said commissions, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Commissions

§13. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county commission established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county commission created by this article. Whenever a county commission shall receive a petition signed by ten percent of the registered voters of such county requesting the reformation, alteration or modification of such county commission, it shall be the mandatory duty of such county commission to request the Legislature, at its next regular session thereafter, to enact an act reforming, altering or modifying such county commission and establishing in lieu thereof another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by such county commission, such act to take effect upon the assent of the voters of such county, as aforesaid. Whenever any such tribunal is established, all of the provisions of this article in relation to the county commission shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said commission. When such tribunal has been established, it shall continue to act in lieu of the county commission until otherwise provided by law.

The purpose of the foregoing sections 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 is to remove the county court from the Judicial Department, art. 8, as amended, and to transfer the office of county court or tribunal to art. 9, County Organization.]

ARTICLE X

Taxation and Finance

§1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including livestock, while owned by the producer; and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or *bona fide* tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the Legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates, authorized to be fixed, by the different levying bodies upon all

classes of property, by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty percent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty percent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the Legislature among the levying units of the State in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including livestock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation, incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the Legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the State now existing.

Exemptions From and Additional Adjustments to Ad Valorem Property Taxation

§1a. Notwithstanding the provisions of sections one and one-b of this article, household goods and personal effects, if such household goods or personal effects are not held or used for profit, and all intangible personal property shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation: *Provided*, That intangible personal property may be made subject to such taxation only to the extent provided by the Legislature by general law not inconsistent with this section.

The Legislature shall not impose ad valorem property taxation upon money, bank deposits and other investments determined by such law to be in the nature of deposits in a bank or other financial institution, or upon pensions, moneys or investments determined by the Legislature in such law to be in lieu of or otherwise in the nature of pensions.

The Legislature by general law may exempt from such taxation any amount of the value of all or certain intangible personal property and any type, group or class of such intangibles but such exemptions shall be uniform throughout the State. No tax imposed upon such intangibles shall be at a rate or rates in excess of the maximum rate permitted to be imposed upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture as provided in sections one, one-b or ten of this article, as the case may be, in the county wherein the intangible personal property has situs, as such situs is determined by the Legislature in such general law.

The valuations with respect to property acquired or created subsequent to any statewide reappraisal and the valuations with respect to any intangible personal property subjected to ad valorem property taxation pursuant to this section shall be allocated and phased-in over a period of years and be valued with respect to the same base year as other property subject to ad valorem property taxation in order to provide for equitable and similar treatment of such property subsequently acquired or created or such intangible personal property as compared to similarly situated previously existing property of similar value whose owner is receiving the benefit of any allocation and phase-in allowed pursuant to section one-b of this article.

Any intangible personal property which would be subject to ad valorem property taxation under prior provisions of this Constitution shall continue to be subjected to such taxation as provided by and in accordance with current statutory law for the assessment of such taxes upon such property, which laws are hereby validated for such purpose or purposes, until the first day of July in the year one thousand nine hundred eighty-five or until the first statewide reappraisal of property pursuant to section one-b of this article shall be first implemented and employed to fix values for ad valorem property taxation, whichever shall last occur, and thereafter no intangible personal property shall be subject to such taxation save for and except as provided by the Legislature by general law enacted after the ratification of the amendment of this section in the year one thousand nine hundred eighty-four.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding section, bank deposits, money, and household goods and personal effects if such household goods and personal effects are not held or used for profit, shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation."

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Property Tax Limitation and Homestead Exemption Amendment of 1982

§1b. Ad valorem property taxation shall be in accordance with this section and other applicable provisions of this article not inconsistent with this section.

Subsection A—Value; Rate of Assessment; Exceptions

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Constitution and except as otherwise provided in this section, all property subject to ad valorem taxation shall be assessed at sixty percent of its value, as directed to be ascertained in this section, except that the Legislature may from time to time, by general law agreed to by two thirds of the members elected to each house, establish a higher percentage for the purposes of this paragraph, which percentage shall be uniform as to all classes of property defined in section one of this article, but not more than one hundred percent of such value.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, for the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-two, and the first day of July of each year thereafter until the values may be fixed as a result of the first statewide reappraisal hereinafter required, assessments shall be made under the provisions of current statutory law, which is hereby validated for such purpose until and unless amended by the Legislature. Assessment and taxation in accord with this section shall be deemed to be equal and uniform for all purposes.

Subsection B—Determination of Value

The Legislature shall provide by general law for periodic statewide reappraisal of all property, which reappraisal shall be related for all property to a specified base year which, as to each such reappraisal, shall be uniform for each appraisal for all classes of property and all counties. In such law, the Legislature shall provide for consideration of (1) trends in market values over a fixed period of years prior to the base year, (2) the location of the property, and (3) such other factors and methods as it may determine: *Provided*, That with respect to reappraisal of all property upon the base year of one thousand nine hundred eighty, such reappraisals are deemed to be valid and in compliance with this section: *Provided, however*, That with respect to farm property, as defined from time to time by the Legislature by general law, the determination of value shall be according to its fair and reasonable value for farming purposes, as may be defined by general law.

The results of each statewide appraisal shall upon completion be certified and published and errors therein may be corrected, all as provided by general law. The first such statewide appraisal shall be completed, certified and published on or before the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred eighty-five, for use when directed by the Legislature.

The Legislature shall further prescribe by general law the manner in which each statewide reappraisal shall be employed to establish the value of the various separately assessed parcels or interests in parcels of real property and various items of personal property subject to ad valorem property taxation, the methods by which increases and reductions in value subsequent to the base year of each statewide reappraisal shall be ascertained, and require the enforcement thereof.

Subsection C—General Homestead Exemption

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Constitution to the contrary, the first twenty thousand dollars of assessed valuation of any real property, or of personal property in the form of a mobile home, used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this state and who is sixty-five years of age or older or is permanently and totally disabled as that term may be defined by the Legislature, shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation, subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general law.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the Legislature shall have the authority to provide by general law for an exemption from ad valorem property taxation in an amount not to exceed the first twenty thousand dollars of value of any real property, or of personal

property in the form of a mobile home, used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this state, and who is under sixty-five years of age and not totally and permanently disabled: *Provided*, That upon enactment of such general law, this exemption shall only apply to such property in any county in which the property was appraised at its value as of the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred eighty, or thereafter, as determined by the Legislature, and this exemption shall be phased in over such period of time not to exceed five years from the date such property was so appraised, or such longer time as the Legislature may determine by general law: *Provided, however*; That in no event shall any one person and his spouse, or one homestead be entitled to more than one exemption under these provisions: *Provided further*, That these provisions are subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general law.

The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by general law for property tax relief to citizens of this State who are tenants of residential or farm property.

Subsection D—Additional Limitations on Value

With respect to the first statewide reappraisal, pursuant to this section, the resulting increase in value in each and every parcel of land or interest therein and various items of personal property subject to ad valorem property taxation over and above the previously assessed value shall be allocated over a period of ten years in equal amounts annually.

The Legislature may by general law also provide for the phasing in of any subsequent statewide reappraisal of property.

Subsection E—Levies for Free Schools

In equalizing the support of free schools provided by state and local taxes, the Legislature may require that the local school districts levy all or any portion of the maximum levies allowed under section one of this article which has been allocated to such local school districts.

Within the limits of the maximum levies permitted for excess levies for schools or better schools in sections one and ten of this article, the Legislature may, in lieu of the exercise of such powers by the local school districts as heretofore provided, submit to the voters, by general law, a statewide excess levy, and if it be approved by the required number of voters, impose such levy, subject however to all the limitations and requirements for the approval of such levies as in the case of a district levy. The law submitting the question to the voters shall provide, upon approval of the levy by the voters, for the assumption of the obligation of any local excess levies for schools then in force theretofore authorized by the voters of a local taxing unit to the extent of such excess levies imposed by the state and so as to avoid double taxation of those local districts. The Legislature may also by general law reserve to the school districts such portions of the power to lay authorized excess levies as it may deem appropriate to enable local school districts to provide educational services which are not required to be furnished or supported by the state. If a statewide excess levy for the support of free schools is approved by the required majority, the revenue from such a statewide excess levy shall be deposited in the state treasury and be allocated first for the local obligations assumed and thereafter for such part of the state effort to support free schools, by appropriation or as the law submitting the levy to the voters shall require, as the case may be.

The defeat of any such proposed statewide excess levy for school purposes shall not in any way abrogate or impair any local existing excess levy for such purpose nor prevent the adoption of any future local excess levy for such purpose.

Subsection F—Implementation

In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and other provisions of this Constitution, the provisions of this section shall prevail. The Legislature shall have plenary power to provide by general law for the equitable application of this article and, as to taxes to be assessed prior to the first statewide reappraisal, to make such laws retroactive to the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-two, or thereafter.

The first amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 39, Acts, Regular Session, 1980, p. 740; and ratified November 4, 1980.

The purpose of this section is to increase the allowable homestead exemption on real property or mobile home to the first ten thousand dollars of assessed valuation of a residence occupied by the owner thereof who is sixty-five year of age or older or permanently and totally disabled.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the first five thousand dollars of assessed valuation of any real property used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this State and who is sixty-five years of age or older shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation, subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general law."

The second amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1, Second Extraordinary Session, 1982; and ratified at the General Election, November 2, 1982.

The purpose of this section is to provide for assessment of property for purposes of ad valorem taxation at sixty percent of its value upon statewide reappraisal; to provide for assessment of property under current statutory law until the results of such reappraisal and to validate such law; to provide for the determination of market value, and to permit the Legislature by a vote of two thirds of the members elected to each house to set higher percentages for all classes of property; to authorize the Legislature by general law to permit the results of any reappraisal to be phased in over such period of time after the year in which the reappraisal is completed in such manner as the Legislature may specify; to provide the Legislature with the power to protect the levies for free schools and to provide for statewide levies for such purpose; to require an exemption from ad valorem taxation amounting to twenty thousand dollars of assessed value of any real property or mobile home occupied as a resident by persons who are sixty-five years of age or older or permanently disabled; to authorize an exemption of up to twenty thousand dollars of value for owners of homes or mobile homes who are under sixty-five years of age and not disabled; and to provide for a phase-in period for the latter exemption after appraisal of property at its value as of the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred eighty or thereafter, as determined by the Legislature.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the first ten thousand dollars of assessed valuation of any real property, or of personal property in the form of a mobile home, used exclusively for residential purposes and occupied by the owner or one of the owners thereof as his residence who is a citizen of this State and who is sixty-five years of age or older or is permanently and totally disabled as that term may be defined by the Legislature shall be exempt from ad valorem property taxation, subject to such requirements, limitations and conditions as shall be prescribed by general laws: *Provided*, That the Legislature annually shall appropriate state funds in an amount sufficient to pay to each levying body in this State the amount of tax revenue lost by reason of this amendment to such body during the preceding year: *Provided, however*, That such levying bodies shall be reimbursed by the Legislature only for that portion of the ad valorem taxation exemption above and beyond the exemption for the initial five thousand dollar valuation of real property owned and occupied by a citizen who is sixty-five years of age or older."

This section was amended to read as set out above.]

Exemption From Ad Valorem Taxation of Certain Personal Property of Inventory and Warehouse Goods, With Phase In to Full Exemption Over Five-year Period

§1c. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Constitution, tangible personal property which is moving in interstate commerce through or over the territory of the State of West Virginia, or which was consigned from a point of origin outside the State to a warehouse, public or private, within the State for storage in transit to a final destination outside the State, whether specified when transportation begins or afterward, but in any case specified timely for exempt status determination purposes, shall not be deemed to have acquired a tax situs in West Virginia for purposes of ad valorem taxation and shall be exempt from such taxation, except as otherwise provided in this section. Such property shall not be deprived of such exemption because while in the warehouse the personal property is assembled, bound, joined, processed, disassembled, divided, cut, broken in bulk, relabeled, or repackaged for delivery out of state, unless such activity results in a new or different product, article, substance or commodity, or one of different utility. Personal property of inventories of natural resources shall not be exempt from ad valorem taxation unless required by paramount federal law.

The exemption allowed by the preceding paragraph shall be phased in over a period of five consecutive assessment years, at the rate of one fifth of the assessed value of the property per assessment year, beginning the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred eighty-seven.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1, Second Extraordinary Session, 1986, submitted in accordance with article eleven, chapter three of the code of West Virginia, one thousand nine hundred thirty-one, as amended; and ratified November 4, 1986.]

Capitation Tax

§2. Repealed.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was repealed by virtue of the Capitation Tax Repeal Amendment, proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 455; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 21; and ratified November 3, 1970.]

This section, prior to its repeal, read:

“The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.”]

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Moneys

§3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public moneys shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

§4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State, to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

§5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the state debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not to Be Granted in Certain Cases

§6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person. The investment of state or public funds shall be subject to procedures and guidelines heretofore or hereafter established by the Legislature for the prudent investment of such funds.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 4, Acts, Regular Session, 1997, p. 1780; and ratified at the special election held on September 27, 1997. The purpose of the amendment known as the “Modern Investment Management Amendment”, was to authorize the investment of state or public funds in common stocks and other equity investments and to further require the Legislature to establish guidelines and procedures for the prudent investment of such funds.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.”]

Appropriations and Taxation for the Benefit of Counties, Municipalities or Other Political Subdivisions of the State

§6a. Notwithstanding the provisions of section six of this article, (1) the Legislature may appropriate state funds for use in matching or maximizing grants-in-aid for public purposes from the United States or any department, bureau, commission or agency thereof, or any other source, to any county, municipality or other political subdivision of the State, under such circumstances and subject to such terms, conditions and restrictions as the Legislature may prescribe by law, and (2) the Legislature may impose a state tax or taxes or dedicate a state tax or taxes or any portion thereof for the benefit of and use by counties, municipalities or other political subdivisions of the State for public purposes, the proceeds of any such imposed or dedicated tax or taxes or portion thereof to be distributed to such counties, municipalities or other political subdivisions of the State under such circumstances and subject to such terms, conditions and restrictions as the Legislature may prescribe by law.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 18, Acts, Regular Session, 1972, p. 734; and ratified November 7, 1972.]

Duties of County Authorities in Assessing Taxes

§7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars valuation, except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, etc.

§8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax on all taxable property therein, in the ratio, as between the several classes or types of such taxable property, specified in section one of this article, separate and apart from and in addition to all other taxes for all other purposes, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years. Such tax, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal on bonds issued by any school district not exceeding in the aggregate three per centum of such assessed value, may be levied outside the limits fixed by section one of this article: *Provided*, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts 1949, p. 716; submitted by Acts 1949, c. 18; and ratified November 7, 1950. The amendment known as the "School Bond Amendment", inserted in the first sentence the provision as to property subject to the tax. It also added the part of the second sentence which precedes the proviso.]

Issuance of Bonds or Other Obligations Payable From Property Taxes on Increases in Value Due to Economic Development or Redevelopment Projects in Counties and Municipalities

§8a. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the Legislature by general law may authorize the issuance of revenue bonds or other obligations by counties and municipalities to assist in financing qualified economic development or redevelopment projects that benefit public health, welfare and safety subject to conditions, restrictions or limitations as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

The bonds or other obligations are payable from property tax revenues generated by the increases in value of property located within the development or redevelopment project area or district due to capital investment in the project. The Legislature shall prescribe by general law the manner in which these increases are determined.

The term for any bonds or other obligations issued may not exceed thirty tax years. The bonds or other obligations may not be deemed to be general obligations of the issuing county or municipality or of this state. The bonds or other obligations may provide for the pledge of any other funds as the owner of the improvements may by contract or otherwise be required to pay. Upon payment in full of the bonds, the increased tax revenues shall revert to the levying bodies authorized under the provisions of this Constitution to receive the revenues. The bonds or other obligations may not be paid from excess levy, bond levy or other special levy revenues.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 201, Second Extraordinary Session, 2002; and ratified November 5, 2002.]

Municipal Taxes to Be Uniform

§9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

School Levy and Bond Amendment

§10. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property for the support of pub-

lic schools may be increased in any school district for a period not to exceed five years, and in an amount not to exceed one hundred percent of such maximum rates, if such increase is approved, in the manner provided by law, by at least a majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates provided for tax levies by school districts on the several classes of property may be used entirely for current expense purposes; and all levies required for principal and interest payments on any bonded indebtedness, now or hereafter contracted, not to exceed five percent on the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained in accordance with section eight of this article, shall be laid separate and apart and in addition to such maximum rates, but in the same proportions as such maximum rates are levied on the several classes of property.

Notwithstanding the provisions of section eight of this article relating to a vote of the people or any other provisions of this Constitution, a county board of education may contract indebtedness and issue bonds for public school purposes as provided by law, if, when submitted to a vote of the people of the county, in the manner provided by law, the question of contracting indebtedness and issuing bonds is approved by a majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

[Editor's note.]—This section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 840; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1957, c. 17; and ratified November 4, 1958.

The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 14, Acts, 1982, p. 785; and ratified at the General Election, November 2, 1982.

The purpose of this section is to permit county school levies, indebtedness and bonds to be approved by a simple majority of the votes cast for and against the same.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

“Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property for the support of public schools may be increased in any school district for a period not to exceed five years, and in an amount not to exceed one hundred percent of such maximum rates, if such increase is approved, in the manner provided by law, by at least sixty percent of the qualified voters of the school district.

Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates provided for tax levies by school districts on the several classes of property may be used entirely for current expense purposes; and all levies required for principal and interest payments on any bonded indebtedness, now or hereafter contracted, not to exceed five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein, the value to be ascertained in accordance with section eight of this article, shall be laid separate and apart and in addition to such maximum rates, but in the same proportions as such maximum rates are levied on the several classes of property.”]

County and Municipal Excess Levy Amendment

§11. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, the maximum rates authorized and allocated by law for tax levies on the several classes of property by county commissions and municipalities may be increased in any county or municipality, as provided in section one of this article, for a period not to exceed five years.

[Editor's note.]—This section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 202, Second Extraordinary Session, 2002; and ratified November 5, 2002.]

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

§1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

[Editor's note.]—Under the Constitution of 1863, corporations were created by special acts of the Legislature.]

Corporate Liability for Indebtedness

§2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint-stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

§3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any *bona fide* contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

Rights of Stockholders

§4. The Legislature shall provide by law that every corporation, other than a banking institution, shall have power to issue one or more classes and series within classes of stock, with or without par value, with full, limited or no voting powers, and with preferences and special rights and qualifications, and that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder holding stock having the right to vote for directors, shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 5, Acts, 1957, p. 839; submitted by Acts, 1957, c. 18; and ratified November 4, 1958. The amendment inserted the provisions as to laws empowering corporations, other than banking institutions, to issue stock in classes with or without par value and with full, limited or no voting rights, and limited the provisions as to voting to stock having right to vote for directors.]

Street Railroads

§5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

§6. The Legislature may provide by general law for the creation, organization, and regulation of banking institutions.

Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, Acts, Regular Session,, 1937, p. 581; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1937, c. 7; and ratified November 8, 1938.

This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows:

“The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stocks held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing, while they are such stockholders.”]

Railroads

§7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

§8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads Public Highways

§9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall, from

time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freights, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discriminations between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations to Be Established

§10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines—Legislative Permission

§11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

§12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

§1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

Supervision of Free Schools

§2. The general supervision of the free schools of the State shall be vested in the West Virginia board of education which shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law. The board shall consist of nine members to be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for overlapping terms of nine years, except that the original appointments shall be for terms of one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, and nine years, respectively. No more than five members of the board shall belong to the same political party, and in addition to the general qualifications otherwise required by the Constitution, the Legislature may require other specific qualifications for membership on the board. No member of the board may be removed from office by the governor except for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, and then only in the manner prescribed by law for the removal by the governor of state elective officers.

The West Virginia board of education shall in the manner prescribed by law, select the state superintendent of free schools who shall serve at its will and pleasure. He shall be the chief school officer of the State and shall have such powers and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

The state superintendent of free schools shall be a member of the board of public works as provided by subsection B, section fifty-one, article six of this Constitution.

[**Editor's note.**—The amendment of this section was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, Acts, Regular Session, 1957, p. 837; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1957, c. 19; and ratified November 4, 1958. The amendment rewrote this section. Prior to the amendment this section pertained only to the State superintendent of schools.]

County Superintendents

§3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

§4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the State of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir, and of all escheated lands;

the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporations; all moneys that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities cannot be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the governor, superintendent of free schools, auditor and treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund": *Provided*, That all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[Editor's note.—The "Irreducible School Fund Amendment", ratified November 4, 1902, and set forth at the end of the Constitution, provides that the accumulation of the school fund provided for in this section shall cease, that all moneys in the fund shall be used for support of the free schools and that all money and taxes formerly payable into the treasury to the credit of the school fund shall be credited to the general school fund for the support of the free schools.]

Support of Free Schools

§5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund", the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, Acts, Regular Session, 1970, p. 455; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1970, c. 21; and ratified November 3, 1970. The amendment, which also repealed W. Va. Const. art. X, §2, was designated the "Capitation Tax Repeal Amendment".]

School Districts

§6. The school districts into which the State is now divided shall continue until changed pursuant to act of the Legislature. *Provided*, That the school board of any district shall be elected by the voters of the respective district without reference to political party affiliation. No more than two of the members of such board may be residents of the same magisterial district within any school district.

[Editor's note.—The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 6, Second Extraordinary Session, 1986; submitted in accordance with article eleven, chapter three of the code of West Virginia, one thousand nine hundred thirty-three, as amended; and ratified November 4, 1986.

This section, prior to its amendment, read:

"The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law."

Levies for School Purposes

§7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlement with the county court; which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited

§8. Repealed.

[Editor's note.—This section was repealed by virtue of the Repeal Archaic Language Amendment, proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 13, Acts, Regular Session, 1994, p. 2230; and ratified on November 8, 1994.

This section, prior to its repeal, read:

"White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school."

Certain Acts Prohibited

§9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under state control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

§10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

§11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any state normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

§12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage, moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvement; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provision for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

§1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

§2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

§3. Repealed.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was repealed by virtue of the Landowners Protection Amendment, proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 113, Acts, Regular Session, 1992, p. 1623; and ratified November 3, 1992.

This section, prior to its repeal, read:

“All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said states at sales made for the nonpayment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color of claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the state taxes thereon for any five years during such possession, or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all state taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865, and have paid all state taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.”]

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

§4. Repealed.

Former Owner's Privilege

§5. Repealed.

This section, prior to its repeal, read:

"The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to received the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable on, since the formation of the State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the cost of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter."]

Land Books—Taxes

§. 6. Repealed.

[**Editor's note.**—This section was repealed by virtue of the Landowners Protection Amendment, proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 113, Acts, Regular Session, 1992, p. 1623; and ratified November 3, 1992.

This section, prior to its repeal, read:

"It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein, entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest thereon, shall not have been charged on such land books with state, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfeited and the title vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with state, county and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or the interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein; *Provided*, That such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited."]

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments

§1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention, until, at least, one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

§2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either house of the Legislature at any regular or extraordinary session thereof; and if the same, being read on three several days in each house, be agreed to on its third reading, by two thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, at a special election, or at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published, at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. If a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately, but an amendment may relate to a single subject or to related subject matters and may amend or modify as many articles and as many sections of the Constitution as may be necessary and appropriate in order to accomplish the objectives of the amendment. Whenever one or more amendments are submitted at a special election, no other question, issue or matter shall be voted upon at such special election, and the cost of such special election throughout the State shall be paid out of the state treasury.

It added the words "but an amendment may relate to a single subject or to related subject matters and may amend or modify as many article and as may sections of the Constitution as may be necessary and appropriate in order to accomplish the objectives of the amendment."

The second amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, Regular Session, 1971, p. 1041; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1971, c. 17; and ratified November 7, 1972.]

It inserted the words "at any regular or extraordinary session" in the first sentence; provided for submitting proposed amendments to the voters at special elections as well as general elections; and added the last sentence as it appears in the section above.]

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Judicial Amendment

The supreme court of appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five, and the governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and five. The judges of the supreme court of appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund, shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the State, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for

that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

[**Editor's note.**—This amendment was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts, Regular Session, 1919, p. 502; submitted by Acts, Regular Session, 1919, c. 77; and ratified November 2, 1920.

The authority as to additional bonds granted by this amendment is revoked as of January 1, 1965, by the "Better Roads Amendment", ratified November 3, 1964, and set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing, or for the assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Fifty Million Dollar Bond Issue for Roads Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate fifty million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February fifteenth, one thousand nine hundred nineteen, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, and Senate Joint Resolution No. 17, adopted by the Legislature at the regular session, one thousand nine hundred twenty-seven, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction, or for assisting in building and constructing a system of state secondary roads and highways.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds, not to exceed in the aggregate ninety million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated solely for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of World War I and World War II. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States in World War I between the sixth day of April, one thousand nine hundred seventeen, and the eleventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred eighteen, both dates inclusive, or in World War II between the seventh day of December, one thousand nine hundred forty-one, and the second day of September, one thousand nine hundred forty-five, both dates inclusive, or in both such wars, who were *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such forces, and who within the periods specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for

each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unmarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

Korean Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of state bonds which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, for the following purposes:

(1) The paying of a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who served during the Korean conflict. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand nine hundred fifty, and the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand nine hundred fifty-three, both dates inclusive, who were *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such service and for a period of at least six months prior thereto, who were not dishonorably discharged from such service, and who within the period specified above actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such a bonus shall also be paid to any disabled veteran, otherwise qualified, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the services because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of ten dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served within the territorial limits of the forty-eight states and the District of Columbia, and fifteen dollars for each month, or major fraction thereof, served outside such limits, but such amount shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars for those who served only within the territorial limits specified above, and four hundred dollars for those who served outside such limits. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would be entitled, if living, shall be paid only to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of this State when application for payment is made: Any unmarried widow, or if none, any child or children under the age of sixteen, or if none, any dependent parent or parents.

The principal amount of bonds to be issued for the purpose provided in paragraph (1) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the ninety million dollars bonds authorized by the Veterans Bonus Amendment submitted by chapter nineteen of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia of one thousand nine hundred forty-nine, regular session, and ratified by the people of West Virginia at the general election held on the seventh day of November, one thousand nine hundred fifty (hereinafter referred to as "Veterans Bonus Amendment of One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty"), which shall not have been issued on the date of the ratification of this amendment by the people of West Virginia: *Provided, however*, That such bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (1) above may be funded or refunded at any time in the manner provided in paragraph (2) below.

(2) The funding or refunding of all or any part of the bonds heretofore issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty. Said bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty may be so funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty mature or are callable prior to maturity.

The principal amount of bonds issued under the provisions of paragraph (2) above shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

Such bonds for the purposes authorized in paragraphs (1) and (2) above may be issued from time to time as separate issues for such purposes or as combined issues for such purposes.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any two or more thereof, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds is finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds. The additional taxes on cigarettes and nonintoxicating beer and additional charges on the sale of each bottle of alcoholic liquor provided for in chapters six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, shall continue to be pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or bonds issued pursuant to this amendment to fund or refund such bonds issued pursuant to said veterans bonus amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty: *Provided, however,* That upon the funding or refunding of all outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty, or the deposit in trust of sufficient funds to pay all the principal of and interest on such outstanding bonds issued pursuant to said Veterans Bonus Amendment of one thousand nine hundred fifty to their respective dates of maturity or to the first date upon which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, the taxes and charges provided for in said chapters six, one hundred eighty-four and one hundred eighty-seven of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, regular session, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one, may be pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on any bonds issued under any of the provisions of this amendment.

Better Roads Amendment of 1964

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction of state roads and highways provided for by this Constitution and the laws enacted thereunder. Such bonds may be issued and sold in amounts not to exceed twenty million dollars in any fiscal year. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall, at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year on ly to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

The authority to issue and sell and have outstanding additional bonds granted by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people, is hereby revoked as of January 1, 1965, but said amendment shall in all other respects remain in full force and effect.

Roads Development Amendment of 1968

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate three hundred fifty million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and construction of free state roads and highways provided for by this Constitution and the laws enacted thereunder. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall, at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

Better School Buildings Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall, notwithstanding the provisions of section six, article ten of this Constitution or any other provision of this Constitution to the contrary, be distributed to such county boards of education as qualify therefor by meeting such conditions, qualifications and requirements as shall be prescribed by general law and used and appropriated by such county boards of education solely for the construction, renovation or remodeling of elementary or secondary public school buildings or facilities, the equipping of the same in connection with any such construction, renovation or remodeling and the acquisition and preparation of sites for elementary or secondary public school buildings or facilities. Such bonds may be issued and sold at such time or times and in such amount or amounts as the Legislature shall authorize. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty-four years, and all such taxes so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the legislature levying such taxes shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of the bonds.

Better Highways Amendment

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate five hundred million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the following purposes and in the following amounts:

- (1) One hundred twenty million dollars for bridge replacement and improvement program;
- (2) One hundred thirty million dollars for completion of the Appalachian highway system;
- (3) Fifty million dollars for upgrading sections of trunkline and feeder systems;
- (4) Fifty million dollars for upgrading West Virginia State Route 2;
- (5) One hundred million dollars for upgrading state and local service roads;
- (6) Fifty million dollars for construction, reconstruction, improving and upgrading of U.S. Route 52 between Huntington and Bluefield, West Virginia.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and the principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor.

Vietnam Veterans Bonus Amendment

The Legislature shall provide by law, either for the appropriation from the general revenues of the State, or for the issuance and sale of state bonds, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, or a combination of both as the Legislature may determine, for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who were in active service during the periods hereinafter described. Such bonus shall be paid to all persons who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States between the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred sixty-four, and the date determined by the President or Congress of the United States as the end of involvement of United States armed forces in the Vietnam conflict, both dates inclusive, who were *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such active service and for a period of at least six months immediately prior thereto, who have not been separated from such service under conditions other than honorable, and who, within the period specified above, actively served in such armed forces for a period of at least ninety days. Such bonus shall also be paid to any person, otherwise eligible under the preceding sentence, who rendered active service in the armed forces of the United States prior to the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred sixty-four; and who received the

Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal. Such bonus shall also be paid to any veteran, otherwise qualified under either of the two sentences next preceding, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the armed forces because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be calculated on the basis of twenty dollars per month for each month of active service, or major fraction thereof, for veterans who received the Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal or the Vietnam service medal, up to four hundred dollars, and ten dollars per month for each month of active service, or major fraction thereof, for veterans who have not received the Vietnam armed forces expeditionary medal or the Vietnam service medal, up to three hundred dollars. Not more than one bonus shall be paid to or on behalf of the service of any one veteran.

The bonus to which any deceased veteran would have been entitled, if living, shall be paid to the following surviving relatives of such veteran, if such relatives are residents of the State when such application is made and if such relatives are living at the time payment is made: Any unremarried widow or widower; or, if none, all children, stepchildren and adopted children under the age of eighteen, or, if none, any parent, stepparent, adoptive parent or person standing in loco parentis. The categories of persons listed shall be treated as separate categories listed in order of entitlement and where there be more than one member of a class, the bonus shall be paid to each member according to his proportional share. Where a deceased veteran's death was connected with such service and resulted from such service during the time period specified, however, the surviving relatives shall be paid, in accordance with the same order of entitlement, the sum of five hundred dollars in lieu of any bonus to which the deceased might have been entitled if living.

The principal amount of any bonds issued for the purpose of paying the bonuses provided for in this amendment shall not exceed the principal amount of forty million dollars, but may be funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds mature or are callable prior to maturity. The principal amount of any refunding bonds issued under the provisions of this paragraph shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

The bonds may be issued from time to time for the purposes authorized by this amendment as separate issues or as combined issues.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy and collection of an additional cigarette tax, or a tax on any other tobacco products, or an additional tax on nonintoxicating beer, or an additional charge on the sale of each bottle of wine and liquor, or an additional general consumers sales tax, or a graduated income tax, or any combination of one or more thereof, or such other dedicated tax as the Legislature may determine, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds.

The Legislature shall have the power to enact legislation necessary and proper to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Qualified Veterans Housing Bonds Amendment

I. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize the issuing and selling of general obligation bonds of the State which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore authorized. The aggregate annual amount payable on all such bonds, including both principal and interest, shall be limited such that the debt service accruing on such bonds in any fiscal year shall not exceed \$35,000,000, exclusive of any amounts payable on such bonds for which moneys or securities have been irrevocably set aside and dedicated solely for the purpose of such payment. The proceeds of the bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated to provide financing for owner-occupied residences for persons determined by the Legislature to be qualified veterans, except that (i) part of the proceeds from each separate issuance of bonds may be set aside as a reserve for the purposes of the Veterans' Mortgage Fund herein authorized and (ii) proceeds may be dedicated for the payment of principal, redemption price or interest on any such bonds to be refunded. Such bonds may be issued

and sold at such time or times and in such amount or amounts as the Legislature shall authorize. All proceeds of such bonds, and all revenues derived from the use and investment of such proceeds, shall be deposited in a separate fund of the State, designated as the Veterans' Mortgage Fund. Amounts in such fund shall be used solely for the purposes of making loans for qualified veterans, providing for the payment or redemption of such bonds and the interest thereon, and providing for the payment of necessary expenses in connection therewith. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding forty years, and all such taxes so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds until the obligation of the State with respect to the payment of such principal and interest has been discharged, and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of such bonds. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys on deposit in the Veteran's Mortgage Fund are insufficient to pay all amounts accruing on such bonds in such year.

II. The Legislature shall have the power to enact legislation to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Veterans Bonus Amendment (Persian Gulf, Lebanon, Grenada and Panama)

The Legislature shall provide by law, either for the appropriation from the general revenues of the State, or for the issuance and sale of state bonds, which shall be in addition to all other state bonds heretofore issued, or a combination of both as the Legislature may determine, for the purpose of paying a cash bonus to veterans of the armed forces of the United States who (1) served on active duty, or who were members of reserve components called to active duty by the President of the United States under Title 10, United States Code section 782(D), 783, or 783(B), during the Persian Gulf conflict, Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm, between the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred ninety and the date determined by the President or Congress of the United States as the end of the involvement of the United States armed forces in the Persian Gulf conflict, both dates inclusive; or (2) veterans, active service members, or members of reserve components, of the armed forces of the United States, who served on active duty in one of the military operations for which he or she received a campaign badge or expeditionary medal during the periods hereinafter described. For purposes of this amendment, periods of active duty in a campaign or expedition are designated as: The conflict in Panama, between the twentieth day of December, one thousand nine hundred eighty-nine, through the thirty-first day of January, one thousand nine hundred ninety, both dates inclusive; the conflict in Grenada, between the twenty-third day of October, one thousand nine hundred eighty-three, and the twenty-first day of November, one thousand nine hundred eighty-three, both dates inclusive; and the conflict in Lebanon, between the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand nine hundred eighty-two, and the twenty-sixth day of February, one thousand nine hundred eighty-four, both dates inclusive. For purposes of this amendment not more than one bonus shall be paid to or on behalf of the service of any one veteran. In order to be eligible to receive a bonus, such persons must have been *bona fide* residents of the State of West Virginia at the time of their entry into such active service and for a period of at least six months immediately prior thereto, who have not been separated from such service under conditions other than honorable. Such bonus shall also be paid to any veteran, otherwise qualified under the two sentences next preceding, who was discharged within ninety days after entering the armed forces because of a service-connected disability. The amount of such bonus shall be five hundred dollars per eligible person who was in active service, inside the combat zone designated by the President or Congress of the United States at anytime during the dates specified hereinabove. In the case of the Persian Gulf conflict, the amount of bonus shall be three hundred dollars per eligible person who was in active service outside of the combat zone designated by the President or Congress of the United States during the dates specified hereinabove. The bonus to which any deceased veteran would have been entitled, if living, shall be paid to the following surviving relatives of such veterans, if such relatives are residents of the State when such application is made and if such relatives are living at the time payment is made: Any unmarried widow or widower, or, if none, all children, stepchildren and adopted children under the age of eighteen, or, if none, any parent, stepparent, adoptive parent or person standing in loco parentis. The categories of persons listed shall be treated as separate categories listed in order of entitlement and where there be more than one member of a class, the bonus shall be paid to each member according to his proportional share. Where a deceased veteran's death was connected with such service and resulted from such service during the time period specified, however, the surviving relatives shall be paid, in accordance with the same order of entitlement, the sum of one thousand dollars in lieu of any bonus to which the deceased might have been entitled if living.

The principal amount of any bonds issued for the purpose of paying the bonuses provided for in this amendment shall not exceed the principal amount of four million dollars, but may be funded or refunded either on the maturity dates of said bonds or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity, and if any of said bonds have not matured or are not then callable prior to maturity, the Legislature may nevertheless provide at any time for the issuance of refunding bonds to fund or refund such bonds on the dates when said bonds mature or on any date on which said bonds are callable prior to maturity and for the investment or reinvestment of the proceeds of such refunding bonds in direct obligations of the United States of America until the date or dates upon which such bonds mature or are callable prior to maturity. The principal amount of any refunding bonds issued under the provisions of this paragraph shall not exceed the principal amount of the bonds to be funded or refunded thereby.

The bonds may be issued from time to time for the purposes authorized by this amendment as separate issues or as combined issues.

Whenever the Legislature shall provide for the issuance of any bonds under the authority of this amendment, it shall at the same time provide for the levy, collection and dedication of an additional tax, or enhancement to such other tax as the Legislature may determine, in such amount as may be required to pay annually the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding fifteen years, and all such taxes or charges so levied shall be irrevocably dedicated for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds until such principal of and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged and any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying such taxes or charges shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of said bonds. Any revenue generated in excess of that which is required to pay the bonuses provided herein and to pay any administrative cost associated with such payment shall be used to pay the principal and interest on any bonds issued as soon as is economically practicable.

The Legislature shall have the power to enact legislation necessary and proper to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Infrastructure Improvement Amendment

I. The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate three hundred million dollars, which shall be in addition to all other bonds heretofore authorized. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the construction, extension, expansion, rehabilitation, repair and improvement of water supply and sewage treatment systems and for the acquisition, preparation, construction and improvement of sites for economic development in this state in a manner and subject to such conditions, qualifications and requirements as shall be prescribed by general law. Such bonds may be issued and sold at such time or times and in such amount or amounts as the Legislature shall authorize. When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall, at the same time, provide for the irrevocable dedication, prior to the application of such tax proceeds for any other purpose, of an annual portion of any gross receipts tax which is then currently imposed on businesses that sever, extract and, or produce natural resources within this state which will be sufficient to pay, as it may accrue, the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof, within and not exceeding thirty years and all such taxes so levied and the additional tax hereinafter described shall be irrevocably dedicated to such purpose until such principal and interest on such bonds are finally paid and discharged: *Provided*, That when a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an additional annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years: *Provided, however*, That such additional tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys from the tax previously dedicated herein are insufficient therefor. Any of the covenants, agreements or provisions in the acts of the Legislature levying and dedicating such taxes shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction by any of the holders of the bonds.

II. The Legislature shall have power to enact legislation to implement the provisions of this amendment.

Safe Roads Amendment of 1996

(a) The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate five hundred fifty million dollars. The proceeds of said bonds hereby authorized to

be issued and sold over a five-year period in the following amounts:

- (1) The first day of July, one thousand nine hundred ninety-seven, one hundred ten million dollars;
- (2) The first day of July, one thousand nine hundred ninety-eight, one hundred ten million dollars;
- (3) The first day of July, one thousand nine hundred ninety-nine, one hundred ten million dollars;
- (4) The first day of July, two thousand, one hundred ten million dollars;
- (5) The first day of July, two thousand one, one hundred ten million dollars.

Any bonds not issued under the provisions of subdivisions (1) through (4) of this subsection may be carried forward and issued in any subsequent year.

(b) The proceeds of the bonds shall be used and appropriated for the following purposes:

- (1) Matching available federal funds for highway construction in this state; and
- (2) General highway construction or improvements in each of the fifty-five counties.

(c) When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay as it may accrue the interest on such bonds and the principal thereof within and not exceeding twenty-five years. Such tax shall be levied in any year only to the extent that the moneys in the state road fund irrevocably set aside and appropriated for and applied to the payment of the interest on and the principal of said bonds becoming due and payable in such year are insufficient therefor. Any interest that accrues on the issued bonds prior to payment shall only be used for the purposes of the bonds.

WEST VIRGINIA CORRECTIONS ACADEMY

Montgomery 25136

Director: James R. Perdue.

The West Virginia Corrections Academy was administratively created in September 1982, and began operations in Randolph County near the Huttonsville Correctional Center. In August 1987, the Academy was moved to the campus of West Liberty State College near Wheeling. It was relocated once again in August 1996, to its current location on the campus of West Virginia University of Technology in Montgomery, Fayette County.

The Corrections Academy provides a four-phase training program for sworn and civilian staff of the Division of Corrections. These phases are orientation, basic, in-service and specialized training. Corrections officers employed by county and other state agencies complete basic training and attend specialized training programs sponsored or conducted at the Academy.

Orientation training for newly hired employees occurs at the facility level and is overseen by institutional training officers supervised by the Academy's director. Basic training is conducted in a five-week residential format with a minimum of 147 hours. In-service training programs meet professional standards and hours may be obtained at the employee's facility, the academy or other approved course of study. Specialized curricula is developed and conducted pursuant to the needs of the agency, such as supervisory and management courses.

The Academy administers the Correctional Officer Apprenticeship Program. This program is approved by the U. S. Department of Labor and Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training and was initiated in November 1991. The two-year program consists of 4,000 hours of on-the-job training and 400 hours of related classroom studies. Upon successful completion, correctional officers are promoted.

In conjunction with the Apprenticeship Program and its own course work, the Academy has entered into agreements with state colleges for credit toward Associate Degrees, including WVU-Tech, Fairmont State College, Mountain State University and Bluefield State College.

BECKLEY CORRECTIONAL CENTER

Beckley 25801

Administrator: Melvin Cox. *Capacity:* 68.

Located on Pinecrest Hospital grounds in Beckley, the Beckley Correctional Center can house up to 68 offenders: Sixty males and eight females. The facility is part of the West Virginia Division of Corrections, an agency under the Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety.

Beckley Correctional Center houses minimum security inmates and provides substance abuse treatment and counseling necessary to inmates having a DUI conviction or alcohol-related charges or problems and low-end drug offenders. In addition, Beckley Correctional Center also operates a work release unit. Inmate activities are regimented and inmates are assigned approved jobs and perform at least 80 hours of community service during their stay.

WORK/STUDY RELEASE CENTERS

Work/Study Release Centers are community-based correctional facilities operated by the Division of Corrections, which is an agency under the Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety.

There are two Centers in the State, located in Charleston and Huntington, that house both male and female offenders. Each Center has the capacity to house approximately 60 inmates.

Inmates are carefully screened through a risk assessment classification method for participation in the work release program. Work release participants are nonviolent offenders who are usually serving the last third of their sentence prior to parole or discharge.

The program's primary objective is to assist the inmate in making a successful transition from incarceration to the community. This is accomplished by providing them an opportunity to take advantage of educational/vocational and work programs within the community. As they are gradually readjusting, the program's intent is to reduce anxieties and frustrations often associated with immediate release back into society. Offenders become responsible for themselves and less of a burden to West Virginia taxpayers while at work release. They are required to pay rent, medical expenses, child support, restitution and any fines they have incurred. They are also required to give back to the community by performing a minimum of 80 hours of community service work. Once community service is completed, inmates are permitted to seek employment in the local job market. Due to the demands of taking responsibility, meaningful employment is of primary importance, assuring the offender a successful work release experience. The two facilities are listed below:

MOUNT OLIVE CORRECTIONAL COMPLEX

Mount Olive 25185

Warden: Thomas McBride. *Capacity:* 980.

Built as a replacement for the aging West Virginia Penitentiary at Moundsville, the Mount Olive Correctional Complex is situated on a 120-acre site about seven miles from Smithers in Fayette County. Total construction cost was approximately \$61.8 million. Approximately 80 acres are inside the secure perimeter. Electronic and computerized security controls are used extensively throughout the complex and are coordinated by a Central Control station.

Mount Olive is a level 5 maximum security facility and was designed to operate upon the principles of unit management and direct supervision. These principles are used in the daily administration and operation of the facility. Unit management is a team approach to offender management in which a multidisciplinary team of staff is assigned to each housing unit. Direct supervision is based upon frequent, informal contact between staff and offenders, staff modeling appropriate behaviors for offenders and offenders being held accountable for their actions. The combination of up-to-date design and construction, unit management and direct supervision has increased supervision of the offender population and dramatically decreased the number of assaults by offenders on employees and other offenders in comparison to the old penitentiary.

A number of program opportunities are available to assist offenders with the adjustment to either institutional life or eventual return to society. These include substance abuse, sex offender, crime victim awareness, religious services, AA/NA and others. Educational programs are administered by the West Virginia Department of Education and the Correctional Education Association has accredited the Mount Olive Correctional Complex Education Department. A matriculation agreement is in place with the West Virginia University Institute of Technology in Montgomery. Inmate medical, dental, mental health and food services are provided or managed by contractual agreement.

Mount Olive serves the Division of Corrections in several systemic roles housing all male offenders sentenced to the custody of the Commissioner of Corrections who are in need of long-term maximum security segregation housing, those who are considered escape risks or are otherwise considered inappropriate for housing at a less secure facility, or those who have a long term need for around-the-clock medical or mental health supervision.

NORTHERN REGIONAL JAIL AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY**Moundsville 26041**

Warden: Evelyn Seifert. *Capacity:* 253. *Administrator:* James Spencer. *Capacity:* 192.

The Northern Regional Jail and Correctional Facility is located on Twelfth Street in Moundsville, Marshall County. Dedicated on August 24, 1994, this facility is unique in the aspect that it is a combined correctional facility and a regional jail, the only one in the state of West Virginia. This facility received its first inmates on the Division of Corrections side on August 31, 1994, and on the Regional Jail Authority side on October 23, 1994. On the Corrections side, the custody level is from a minimum to a maximum level. This facility has been accredited by the American Correctional Association since January 14, 1998.

OHIO COUNTY CORRECTIONAL COMPLEX**Wheeling 26003**

Associate Warden: William Yurcina. *Capacity:* 54.

The Ohio County Correctional Complex is located on 1501 Eoff Street in Wheeling, Ohio County. It opened on April 16, 1998, and currently houses 54 offenders with minimum to maximum custody levels. This facility operates under the unit management principle and offers a wide variety of treatment opportunities. It provides individual and group counseling, educational/vocational training, institutional employment and community service opportunities.

In addition to the educational and counseling services to the inmate population, this facility also maintains a 24-hour medical department that has received its NCCHC Accreditation.

DENMAR CORRECTIONAL CENTER**Hillsboro 24946**

Warden: Mark Williamson. *Capacity:* 210.

The Denmark Correctional Center is located five miles from Hillsboro in the pristine hills of Pocahontas County. The facility was opened in 1919 and used through 1957 as the tuberculosis center for black people in West Virginia. Later in 1957 the tuberculosis center was transformed into a hospital for the chronically ill. The Denmark Hospital was closed in 1990.

In February 1993, the Pocahontas County Commission conveyed the deed for the former Denmark Hospital to the West Virginia Division of Corrections for conversion to a state correctional facility. The funds were appropriated to the Division of Corrections for renovation and occupation of the facility known as the Denmark Correctional Center.

The medium security prison currently houses up to 210 adult males and employs approximately 89 persons. Inmates are housed in two- and four-man rooms.

Following their mission statement of: To provide inmates, staff and the public with a secure and safe environment, to promote responsibility to one's self and society, and to enhance the skills necessary for self-development, serving to maintain a positive and productive style of living. Denmark offers various work programs, treatment programming, counseling, education, recreation, etc., to enhance the rehabilitation of inmates housed there.

The Unit Management concept at Denmark seeks to provide a balance between punishment, deterrence, incapacitation and rehabilitation for individuals committed to the custody of the West Virginia Division of Corrections. Our rustic pastoral setting is conducive to an enriched atmosphere wherein the inmates may engage in a successful adjustment in preparation for their return to free society. The compassionate, caring staff providing quality programs in a safe and secure setting has enabled Denmark to become a true model for the adaptation and encouragement of positive, productive, spiritually enhanced living.

The various job positions that are held by our inmates include: Outside Road Crews, Correctional Industries, Laundry, Maintenance Crews, Kitchen and many more.

The various treatment programs offered include: All substance abuse programs, Aladru I, II and III, AA/NA, HOPE, sex offender therapy, group and individual counseling, as well as other programs designed to address social skills deficits, impulse control, establish a sober, legitimate lifestyle, and facilitate a smooth transition from incarceration to free society. Denmar also offers a V.O.C.A.L. (Violent Offenders Counseling and Learning) program designed to target youths in the community. Staff and offenders go out into the community and make presentations to schools, church groups, etc., on the effects of drugs and alcohol and about proper decisionmaking. There is also an Education Department that gives our inmates the opportunity to learn computer and keyboarding skills, LIFESKILLS and the chance to obtain their GED, further developing and enhancing their academic and employability skills. College classes are available through Concord College.

Recreation is also offered and includes softball and basketball teams along with other activities available with the equipment in our recreation facility.

Twenty-four hours a day medical services are provided by contractual agreement. The medical department was accredited by the National Commission of Correctional Health Care in 1999 and remains accredited today.

Denmar has added two new buildings to the Center. Those include a Multi-Purpose Building which is utilized for treatment programs, visitation, parole hearings and training issues. The second building houses Correctional Industries, two vocational classes and the Arts and Crafts program. The two new vocational classes are Industrial Electricity and Building and Grounds Maintenance. The new buildings were funded by the Regional Jail Authority.

ANTHONY CORRECTIONAL CENTER

White Sulphur Springs 24986

Warden: Scott Patterson. Capacity: 220.

The Anthony Correctional Center is located in Greenbrier County at Neola on Route 92, 15 miles north of White Sulphur Springs. The construction of a new 65,000 square foot facility was completed and opened in August 1998 on the 40-acre site. In addition, an existing dormitory was renovated to house 64 residents in a structured, intensive substance abuse program. At the present time, Anthony Correctional Center has a capacity of up to 220 offenders (male and female).

Residents are committed to the Anthony Correctional Center as a result of their sentencing judge suspending the original sentence of their specific crime and handing down a sentence of six months to two years at the Anthony Correctional Center. Those sentenced to the Anthony Correctional Center must have committed their crime (any crime other than an offense punishable by a life sentence) on or after their eighteenth birthday and sentenced prior to their twenty-third birthday. If, in the opinion of the Warden, the offender proves to be an unfit person to remain in the center, the offender is returned to the committing court to be dealt with further according to the law.

The institution provides therapeutic programming including Victim Awareness, Anger Control, Parenting and individual and group counseling, Substance Abuse programming, a comprehensive academic and vocational training curriculum, job and/or educational placement, Life Skills and Work Readiness, religious opportunities and a recreational program, all under a unit management system.

Life Skills and Work Readiness are both mandatory programs that all residents must complete prior to completing the Anthony Correctional Center program. The Keys to Innervision curriculum, which is a part of the Life Skills program, is a social skills curriculum on "change" and "goal setting", portfolio preparation, job skills development and career counseling and is mandatory for all residents.

The year-round recreational program consists of softball, horseshoes, volleyball, basketball, football and weightlifting. The spacious gymnasium makes it possible for residents to participate in indoor sports during the winter months. This program is based on 100 percent participation.

Academically, the Education Program stresses basic skill enhancement and general educational development, specific vocational skills training, job skills training and career planning with an emphasis on a student's ability to change behavior and their development of the decision-making process. The GED program is mandatory for any resident not possessing a high school diploma or GED.

Each resident at the Center must choose a vocational major in which to pursue and complete during his or her stay at Anthony Correctional Center. The vocational programs available to residents are: Auto Mechanics, General Building Construction (Drafting, Carpentry, Electricity, Plumbing, Painting/Wall Covering, Floor Covering and Roofing), Welding, Business Education and Quantity Foods. All vocational programs are taught by a certified vocational instructor, utilizing a competency-based education approach.

A local clergyman holds worship services on a weekly basis for all interested residents. He also provides individual counseling for residents when needed.

HUTTONSVILLE CORRECTIONAL CENTER

Huttonsville 26273

Warden: William S. Haines. *Capacity:* 965.

The Huttonsville Correctional Center is located on a farm near Huttonsville, in Randolph County, approximately 18 miles south of Elkins on U. S. Route 250. It was created by an act of the Legislature in 1937 to relieve overcrowding at the West Virginia Penitentiary. It remained a branch of the parent institution until 1947, at which time the Legislature established as a separate entity — the West Virginia Medium Security Prison. In 1970, the Center received its current name by legislative act.

The primary form of employment for the inmates has always been general farm work. By Act of the Legislature in 1977, the 5,000-acre farm was turned over to the Farm Management Commission with a resultant change of agricultural emphasis from labor-intensive general purpose farming to beef cattle production; the largest single inmate labor effort is community service projects.

In January 2000, two new 120-bed additions were opened which made provisions for single-cell housing. These additions increased the capabilities for segregation and intake, as well as housing long-term general population inmates. All other housing consists of military barracks-style dormitories.

A Therapeutic Community was opened which consists of 100 beds for inmates who express a sincere desire for rehabilitation. In this unit the criminogenic thinking pattern or the criminal mentality is the focus of attention. Emphasis is placed on cognitive restructuring as a means to modify behavior utilizing the power of education through social learning. Inmates live in this program intensive environment for a period of 9-12 months.

Many educational programs, both vocational and academic, are offered by the State Department of Education to interested inmates. These classes provide an opportunity to engage in rehabilitative efforts. Through the Department of Education's Adult Basic Education program, inmates are provided classes in remedial reading and are able to work toward, and obtain GED certificates. A Special Education program offers remediation to students with learning disabilities. Vocational courses include auto mechanics, auto body repair, welding, metal technology, machine shop, typing, electricity, horticulture, aquaculture, milling and cabinet making, computer repair, drafting, auto CAD. College classes are offered through Fairmont State College. The Arts and Crafts shop provides opportunities for leather working and wood working crafts and enjoys strong participation.

Correctional Industries operates a Braille transcribing program, a furniture plant, automotive parts shop and a welding shop with the utilization of inmate workers.

PRUNTYTOWN CORRECTIONAL CENTER

Grafton 26354

Warden: J. N. Liller. *Capacity:* 371.

The Pruntytown Correctional Center, formerly known as the West Virginia Industrial School for Boys, is located at Pruntytown near Grafton in Taylor County. The facility which first opened in

1891 operated as a state correctional institution for delinquent boys until January 1983, when it was closed and the juveniles were transferred to the West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth near Salem. Pruntytown remained vacant and idle until mid-year 1985.

After much renovation and remodeling, the facility was reopened as Pruntytown Correctional Center in November 1985, to house minimum security male inmates. In December 1988, the Division of Corrections began moving nearly 60 female inmates to the Pruntytown Correctional Center, creating a co-ed facility. These females had previously been housed under contract with the Federal Correctional Institution for Women in Alderson. With the addition of a new 128-bed unit in March 1999, the facility now houses a capacity of 371 inmates with all custody levels of adult females, as well as minimum and medium custody adult males.

ST. MARYS CORRECTIONAL CENTER

St. Marys 26170

Warden: William M. Fox. *Capacity:* 512.

The St. Marys Correctional Facility is located one mile north of St. Marys on State Route 2 in Pleasants County. It was formerly known as the Colin Anderson Center, which was established in 1932 by an Act of the Legislature. The Colin Anderson Center was closed in Spring of 1998, at which time funding was provided to renovate the facility as a Correctional Center.

In the early spring of 1998, the Division of Corrections began the transition to house approximately 400 adult male minimum to medium security inmates at this facility. In addition to general population offenders, the targeted population includes aging, geriatric, special needs and chronic medical offenders with lower custody classifications.

The first corrections training academy began with 25 former Colin Anderson employees on June 1, 1998.

LAKIN CORRECTIONAL FACILITY FOR WOMEN

West Columbia 25287

Warden: Dale Humphreys. *Capacity:* 240.

Lakin Correctional Facility for Women is the only all female prison in the State of West Virginia located six miles north of Point Pleasant on State Route 62.

A local family donated the land on which Lakin Correctional Facility sets to the State in the early 1920s. The cemetery behind the facility was the family cemetery of the people who donated the property. The State built Lakin State Hospital on the land in 1926. There were three buildings setting in the spot where the new Lakin Correctional Facility is now. The medical center and rehabilitation center buildings were both torn down and the activity building was incorporated into the facility, which is now the gymnasium.

Phase I construction of Lakin Correctional Facility began in February 1999 and was completed in August 2002. The facility was dedicated on September 25, 2002, and received its first female inmates in January 2003.

Lakin Correctional Facility for Women currently houses 240 minimum to maximum security adult female felons. The facility operates Special Housing Unit (SHU) housing segregation and an intake and substance abuse unit will be opening in the future.

Phase II of Lakin Correctional Facility is in its final planning stages and it will be a college dormitory style housing unit for minimum security inmates that will hold approximately 120 inmates. This phase should be completed by late 2004 or early 2005.

Also a Correctional Industries building will be built during Phase II and half of the building will be used to store paperwork for West Virginia tourism.

The Department of Education provides many educational and vocational programs for the inmate population such as GED, Life Skills, Computer Classes and Industrial Shop Classes.

CENTRAL REGIONAL JAIL

300 Days Drive Sutton 26601

Administrator: Shannon R. Markle. *Capacity:* 200; *Lieutenant:* James R. Shaver; *1st Sergeant:* Rickey L. Drake; *Director of Inmate Services:* Scott Villers; *Fiscal Clerk:* Debra V. Hamric.

The Central Regional Jail is located adjacent to the "67 Mile" marker of Interstate 79, approximately one mile from the Flatwoods exit. The facility, designed with a capacity of two hundred inmates, formally opened on February 22, 1993. It was the first of the prototype design of all the regional jails. This state-of-the-art, podular design allows for maximum security with minimum staffing through the use of the latest correctional technologies. The Central Region is composed of nine counties: Braxton, Calhoun, Clay, Gilmer, Lewis, Nicholas, Roane, Upshur and Webster.

Each housing unit, or "pod", of the jail is divided into eight separate sections of eight or sixteen beds to accommodate variable housing assignments related to the inmate population's pre-trial or sentenced status, security classification or gender. Each section has a day room, and each pod includes two secure outdoor recreation areas with a security wire-mesh cover.

The facility has a gymnasium which not only serves as an indoor recreation area but can also serve as an emergency holding area. Separate interior spaces are provided for attorney/client visits, contact and noncontact visits, an up-to-date law library, a reading library, classrooms and a chapel. The jail is equipped with extensive electronic security controls with provisions for central control of all areas in the event of an emergency.

Both indirect supervision and direct supervision are constantly in place throughout the facility. Indirect supervision is maintained in the housing areas from each pod control room while direct inmate supervision is provided by "rover" officers who maintain personal contact with inmates. Both in its design and in its operations, the facility meets or exceeds all federal and state minimum jail standards requirements.

Pursuant to West Virginia Code 17-15-4, inmates who are sentenced to the facility serve the community in a variety of work programs inside as well as outside of the jail. Substance abuse counseling, GED and Adult Basic Education programs are available to the inmates. Volunteers also work with the inmates in areas of concern such as literacy. On a voluntary basis, chaplains make full use of the jail chapel not only on Sundays but on several week nights.

The jail employs approximately 80 uniformed, administrative and support staff. An additional fourteen employees work at the jail through contractual arrangements to provide inmate medical care and food service. A clinical psychologist is contracted to serve the jail population as are medical doctors and nurses. Counselors are on staff for entry and follow-up counseling.

The Central Regional Jail has also been involved as a model facility for a video teleconferencing project for court hearings entitled "Courtroom of the Future." This project has proven itself to reduce transportation dramatically, thus saving both monetary and potential public safety costs.

EASTERN REGIONAL JAIL

The Eastern Regional Jail is located on U. S. Route 9, approximately two miles east of downtown Martinsburg, on a 14-acre tract. The facility, which replaced the old Eastern Regional Jail next door, is designed to house 300 inmates. It formally opened in August 1999. The Eastern Region is comprised of Morgan, Berkeley and Jefferson counties.

The facility houses both male and female inmates in segregated sections. Pursuant to West Virginia Code 17-15-4, inmates who are sentenced to the facility serve the community in a variety of work programs inside as well as outside of the jail. But until the Western Regional Jail is completed, inmates from nearby Putnam and Lincoln counties are housed there as well. Jackson County inmates are not being accepted by the South Central Regional Jail until space is made available by the construction of the Western Regional Jail.

The jail is designed in a podular manner. Each housing unit, or "pod", is divided into eight separate sections of eight or sixteen beds to accommodate variable housing assignments related to the inmate population's pre-trial or sentenced status, security classification or gender. Each section has a day room, and each pod includes two secure outdoor recreation areas with a security wire-mesh cover.

The facility has a gymnasium which not only serves as an indoor recreation area but can also serve as a staging area or emergency holding area. Separate interior spaces are provided for attorney/client visits, contact and noncontact visits, an up-to-date law library, a reading library, classrooms and a

The North Central Regional Jail, with a capacity of four hundred is currently the WV Regional Jail Authority's largest facility. It is located adjacent to U.S. Route 50 approximately three miles west of West Union in Doddridge County, off the Wilhelm Run Road Exit. The North Central Region is

composed of nine counties (Doddridge, Harrison, Marion, Monongalia, Pleasants, Ritchie, Tyler, Wirt and Wood). It officially opened on July 24, 2001.

The facility houses both male and female inmates in segregated sections according to their classification. Pursuant to West Virginia Code 17-15-4 inmates who are sentenced to the facility serve the community in a variety of work programs inside as well as outside of the facility. Substance Abuse Counseling, Domestic Violence Counseling and Adult Basic Education Programs are available to the inmates. Volunteers also work with inmates in areas such as literacy. A volunteer Chaplin coordinates religious services for inmates.

The facility is of a podular design with four pods, each of which is divided into eight sections. This facility meets federal and state standards. Inside the facility is a medical unit equipped with a dental office, medical cells and a negative air flow cell to house inmates who may have a contagious disease.

This facility is equipped with video arrangement capabilities. The county courts can conduct hearings through video teleconferencing where the inmate no longer needs to be transported to every court appearance. This system proves to be an effective tool in public safety.

WEST VIRGINIA INDUSTRIAL HOME FOR YOUTH

The West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth is located one mile west of Salem on old U.S. Route 50 at Industrial. It was established by an act of the Legislature on February 18, 1897, and formally opened May 5, 1899. It was built on a 61-acre tract. Eleven acres have since been returned to the city of Salem for use as a city park.

From Jones Cottage, the first building, the physical plant grew to include the following buildings: Silver Hall Cottage (1914); Sutton Cottage (1928); Ava Stanard Cottage (1942); New Jones Cottage (1961); and the Administration Building (1942).

In December 2000, a new 170-bed state-of-the-art facility was opened upon the grounds. This building comprises the latest technology in use today and provides for greater security, in-house medical services and treatment programs for all residents. This building also houses a "courtroom of the future" for hearings, legal proceedings and visitation in a video-conferencing environment. In addition, there is also telemedicine video conferencing permitting consultation and diagnosis of residents without need to leave the facility. A vocational and technical center was built as part of the expansion project. The center increases the likelihood of meaningful trade skill education for the youths' successful return to communities with valuable job skills. The facility also provides an aftercare program that follows youths back to their communities and coordinates care and support to assist youths in remaining crime free. This endeavor represents a partnership with families, education, juvenile probation, community care providers and churches to best enhance the youths' probability of success in becoming responsible citizens.

Renovation is under way to several older structures. Once completed, the West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth will have an operational capacity of 270 residents.

The West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth is a maximum security juvenile facility. The resident population consists of regular commitments, males ages 10-18 and females ages 12-18. All adjudicated juveniles committed to the Division of Juvenile Services are received at the West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth. Although some males 16 years of age or older may be transferred to Davis Center, the West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth maintains six distinct populations: Males adjudicated delinquent and committed for a rehabilitation program; males and females who have been adjudicated as adult commitments and will remain until their eighteenth birthday; and males and females who have been adjudicated delinquent and sent temporarily to the Diagnostic Center.

The facility provides a Diagnostic Center for Juveniles pursuant to West Virginia Code 49-5-13(a). The Center houses predispositional youth adjudicated delinquent and committed for not more than a 60-day period. The Center provides the committing court with a complete psychological evaluation, educational evaluation, medical evaluation and social summary for each child. A Multi-Disciplinary Team meeting is held on each diagnostic resident prior to release. The Multi-Disciplinary Team recommendations are also forwarded to the committing court.

The facility also provides a Special Programs Unit for adjudicated sexual offenders who have failed in other forms of treatment. This is an 18- to 24-month program for males ages 18 to 21.

Treatment of the West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth focuses on a Cognitive Behavior approach to changing the residents' behavior. Staff utilizes psychological evaluations and various assessments to determine each resident's individual needs. Individual and group counseling are then implemented to assist the residents in meeting their goals.

The education needs of the youths are met by the West Virginia Department of Education. The Education Department offers a traditional high school curriculum. Classes are offered in the core areas of Language Arts, Mathematics, Physical Education/Health, Science and Social Studies. Vocational classes are offered in the areas of Business Education, Technology Education and Quality Foods. In addition, students have the opportunity to earn national certification with ServeSafe through the Quality Foods program and Associated Builders and Contractors, Inc. through the Technology Education program. Students can earn a high school diploma through their home county. The General Education Diploma (GED) and American College Test (ACT) are offered to interested students.

The West Virginia Industrial Home for Youth is committed to a philosophy of helping youths learn appropriate conduct, respect for themselves and others, increase their self-esteem and discover positive alternatives for their lives.

DAVIS CENTER

Davis Center, located near the entrance to Blackwater Falls State Park in Tucker County, was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1955. It is a minimum-security facility that houses youthful male offenders between the ages of 16 and 18 who have been adjudicated delinquent by the various courts of record in the state. The period of confinement averages eight months, but can be longer if deemed advisable by the Center Superintendent.

Davis Center operates a Unit Management Concept and a Peer Group Interaction Counseling Program. Residents are placed in groups of eight to ten in which primary emphasis is directed toward developing responsibility for their actions and rebuilding their lives, compatible with socially acceptable behavior and goals. Each resident receives five weekly one and one-half hour group sessions.

A diagnostic program is offered to access each resident's strengths and weaknesses in academic, vocational and personality areas. Individual counseling and drug and alcohol classes are provided.

The education component of the Davis Center program is provided by the West Virginia Department of Education. This is an administrative change as a result of action of the Legislature in the spring of 1988. This change has greatly increased the resources available to provide a thorough education program for Center residents.

All residents are required to attend one-half day in academic school and one-half day in a vocational program. Class sizes are small, five to seven residents, and instruction in all areas is individualized to meet the needs of the learner. The academic program is designed and equipped to teach at all levels from basic remediation through post-high school. Vocational programs offered at Davis Center include auto mechanics, welding, computer science and building construction.

A full range of recreational activities is offered, including basketball, volleyball, weightlifting, swimming and softball. Recreational activities also utilize nearby state parks and the natural mountain beauty of the Monongahela National Forest. Nondenominational religious services are held each Sunday.

Through the use of the Unit Management Concept and the Peer Group Interaction Program, young men receive counseling and guidance by their peers with adult assistance. A young man's stay depends on developing responsibility for caring and concern for group members, as well as fulfilling his contract. Ultimately, a major goal is to enhance the young man's capabilities of making socially accepted choices and decisions after his release into society.

The Eastern Regional Juvenile Detention Center is a 10-bed predispositional detention center located in Martinsburg. The facility serves both male and female residents 10 to 18 years of age. In 1997, responsibility for operation of the facility was placed with the department of Military Affairs and Public Safety, Division of Juvenile Services.

The Division of Juvenile Services provides for the general care and welfare of youths awaiting disposition of felony charges. Reasonable educational opportunities are provided by the Department of Education. The Division of Juvenile Services additionally provides case management, counseling and a variety of programs designed to reduce recidivism and aid in the youths' successful transition back into their respective communities. These services include classes in anger control, coping skills and problem solving. Division staff works closely with the Department of Health and Human Resources, Juvenile Probation and community care providers in formulating treatment plans designed to enhance the youths' probability of success in becoming responsible citizens.

Reasonable educational opportunities are provided by the Department of Education. The Division of Juvenile Services additionally provides case management, counseling and a variety of programs designed to reduce recidivism and aid in the youths' successful transition back into their respective communities. These services include classes in anger control, coping skills and problem solving. Division staff works closely with the Department of Health and Human Resources, Juvenile Probation and community care providers in formulating treatment plans designed to enhance the youths' probability of success in becoming responsible citizens.

The facility has a capacity of 25 residents, male and female, 10 to 18 years of age. A replacement facility, based upon a prototypical design for regional placement of detention centers, is currently under construction at the former location for Kanawha and surrounding counties, with an anticipated completion date of 2003.

In December 2001, a 10-bed Behavior Modification Unit was implemented on the first floor of South Central Regional Juvenile Detention Center to serve residents with behavior problems in other detention centers throughout the state. This increased the capacity to 35. The unit, also, served as an overflow due to over-crowding in other facilities.

The Division of Juvenile Services provides for the general care and welfare of youths awaiting disposition of felony charges. Reasonable educational opportunities are provided by the Department of Education. The Division of Juvenile Services additionally provides case management, counseling and a variety of programs designed to reduce recidivism and aid in the youths' successful transition back into their respective communities. These services include classes in anger control, coping skills and problem solving. SOUTHERN REGIONAL JUVENILE DETENTION CENTER

The Southern Regional Juvenile Detention Center is located in Princeton and was built in 1976 and has capacity for 15 predispositional youths, male and female, 10 to 18 years of age. The facility was previously operated under the jurisdiction of the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources until the creation of the Division of Juvenile Services, Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety, in 1997. A federally funded renovation and expansion project is under way at the facility and estimated to be completed in late 2003.

The Division of Juvenile Services provides for the general care and welfare of youths awaiting disposition of felony charges. Reasonable educational opportunities are provided by the Department of Education. The Division of Juvenile Services additionally provides case management, counseling and a variety of programs designed to reduce recidivism and aid in the youths' successful transition back into their respective communities. These services include classes in anger control, coping skills and problem solving. Division staff works closely with the Department of Health and Human Resources, Juvenile Probation and community care providers in formulating treatment plans designed to enhance the youths' probability of success in becoming responsible citizens.

HEALTH FACILITIES

HOPEMONT HOSPITAL

Located near Terra Alta in Preston County, Hopemont was founded in 1913 (Hopemont Sanitarium) to provide treatment to tubercular patients. Legislation enacted in 1965 changed the name to Hopemont Hospital and designated the hospital as a long-term care facility for the chronically ill.

Hopemont is a certified nursing facility. The hospital serves indigent residents requiring long-term care. An array of services is provided: Medical, nursing, psychiatry, psychology, social work, therapeutic programming, physical and restorative therapy, leisure activities, speech therapy, podiatry, vision and dental services. Specialized programming for geriatric residents with psychiatric, Alzheimer's Disease/dementia and mental retardation is provided using therapeutic community, psychiatric rehabilitation and/or environmental structuring approaches.

Hopemont provides support services to short-term alcohol/drug abuse program.

LAKIN HOSPITAL

Lakin Hospital was founded by an Act of the Legislature in 1919 and was opened in 1926 for persons suffering from mental and nervous disorders. The name of the hospital was changed in 1954 to Lakin State Hospital, and by a 1974 Act of the Legislature to Lakin Hospital.

Located approximately eight miles north of Point Pleasant, along the Ohio River, Lakin Hospital is situated on a large level plot of land adjoining State Farm Commission land and a state tree nursery. The hospital is a 114-bed long-term care unit for geriatric persons.

Efforts are directed to enhancing the quality of life of residents by encouraging independence and responsibility when possible. Weekly sit-down dinners at area restaurants, field trips, home visits and a comprehensive activities program, which includes individual salad gardens for residents in the summer, are ways which maintain ties to life outside the institutional setting.

A program designed to meet the special needs of residents was established in February 1987. This program is conducted to train residents in personal hygiene skills, dressing skills, sensory stimulation and basic self-help skills.

The Lakin Hospital philosophy has always been one of effecting positive, progressive programs to enhance the daily living and quality of life for its residents. In accordance with this philosophy, professional consultants, in addition to medical doctors, provide expertise in all fields of the medical and therapeutic sciences. The nursing care unit is certified for Medicaid reimbursement.

MARION HEALTH CARE HOSPITAL

Located in Marion County, the original Miners Hospital #3 was built in 1899 for miners and their families. The name was changed to Fairmont Hospital #3 in 1915 by an Act of the Legislature. The facility confined its work almost entirely to treatment of persons who were accidentally injured. The name was changed again to Fairmont Emergency Hospital in 1931. A new building was built in 1980 and in 1983 the name was changed to Marion Health Care Hospital.

Marion Health Care Hospital includes a 41-bed long-term care unit and a general medical outpatient clinic. The facility provides services to all counties of West Virginia.

The outpatient clinic serves an average of 1,668 patients per month and the average daily census 39.62 in the long-term care unit with a 96.6 percent occupancy rate.

The clinic provides services to those without insurance and the underinsured by using a sliding fee scale.

The long-term care unit is certified for both skilled and intermediate care.

MILDRED MITCHELL-BATEMAN HOSPITAL

Located in Huntington, the county seat of Cabell County, Mildred Mitchell-Bateman Hospital was authorized by an Act of the Legislature in 1897.

The Hospital serves patients from the 13-county area of Boone, Cabell, Clay, Kanawha, Lincoln, Logan, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Putnam, Wayne and Wyoming counties.

Mildred Mitchell-Bateman Hospital provides a variety of treatment for a broad range of psychiatric disorders. The physical plant includes an administration building, a psychiatric treatment unit and one dedicated to adjunctive therapies. Clinical support programs include recreational therapy, social work, psychology, pharmacy, laboratory, patient advocacy and chaplaincy. Specialized treatment tracks are available for mentally ill, chemically addicted patients and for young adults age 18 to 21.

Formal affiliation with Marshall University and other institutions of learning provide teaching opportunities for health care professionals in the fields of medicine, psychology, social work, health information technology, nursing and health care administration.

Mildred Mitchell-Bateman Hospital is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), certified by Medicare (centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) and Medicaid.

PINECREST HOSPITAL

Pinecrest Hospital currently is certified as a Medicaid-approved intermediate long-term care facility with 199 certified beds. Pinecrest is also the only state facility to provide an inpatient unit with a current capacity of ten beds for tuberculosis patients.

Pinecrest Hospital serves a diverse population composed of predominantly geriatric residents by providing comprehensive services which enable the residents to maximize their potential to live their fullest lives possible. Specific nursing units, including the Alzheimer's Unit, exist to address each resident's particular needs to achieve this goal.

In an effort to eliminate unnecessary cost and duplication and to better serve the citizens of Raleigh County and the surrounding area, Pinecrest Hospital provides office space to other state and community-based agencies such as the Office of Maternal and Child Health of the Department of Health and Human Resources, the Council for Independent Living, Pine Haven Homeless Shelter and Hospice of Southern West Virginia.

Welch Community Hospital, formerly Old Miner's Hospital Number 1, and Welch Emergency Hospital, is located in McDowell County, city of Welch. The hospital was established by an Act of the Legislature in 1899 and began providing patient services in January 1902.

Welch Community Hospital completed its primary mission in 1987 with the opening of all acute care services. These services are: 24-hour emergency room, medical, surgical, outpatient and same-day surgery, day clinic, intensive care unit, obstetrics, birthing, long-term intermediate care, maternity/family planning and hearing services.

The 124-bed facility utilizes 280 full-time employees and 25 hospital-based staff physicians.

The facility is certified for participation in the federal/state Medicare/Medicaid Program. As a result of this certification, all medical insurance companies recognize Welch Community Hospital for participation and payment. The Hospital also participates as a provider in several managed care plans.

Welch Community Hospital has sole community provider status and the outpatient services designated as a Rural Health Clinic by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for acute inpatient care in McDowell County. The county's high rate of unemployment has also caused the demand for low-cost and state-supported health services to greatly increase.

The services at Welch Community Hospital are for all members of the community. Exoneration policies are available for those patients unable to pay for part or all of their care.

PUBLIC COLLEGES, UNIVERSITIES AND SCHOOLS

BLUEFIELD STATE COLLEGE

Bluefield State College, founded in 1895, is a fully accredited coeducational institution meeting educational needs of the citizens of its eleven-county service area in southeastern West Virginia. In fulfilling its mission as a regional college, Bluefield State offers a variety of programs at the certificate, associate and baccalaureate degree levels. With a career emphasis attuned to the occupational opportunities in this region, BSC's graduates have enjoyed significant success after completing their college experience.

Located on Rt. 52 in the City of Bluefield, the College's main campus has seven buildings on 40 acres of terraced land. At BSC, the atmosphere and friendly personality of a nonresidential college combines with the flexibility and vigor of a progressive institution of higher education. The College attracts large numbers of adult students with its extensive evening program and off-campus offerings (expanded through its distance learning facilities) at its sites in Beckley, Lewisburg, Summersville and Welch.

The College also has administrative oversight for New River Community and Technical College of Bluefield State College, established July 1, 2003, that includes campuses at Summersville (Nicholas County), Beckley, Lewisburg (Greenbrier Center) and Bluefield.

Fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, Bluefield State College enjoys the added distinction of having its engineering technology programs accredited by the Technology Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, the associate degree nursing program accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, the baccalaureate degree nursing program accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education and the associate degree radiologic technology program accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology. Programs in teacher education are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and approved by the West Virginia Department of Education and the associate and baccalaureate degree business programs are accredited by the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs.

The College offers instructional programs in accountancy, general business, professional office systems technology, business administration (with options in accounting, computer science, management and marketing), early/middle teacher education, architectural engineering technology, civil engineering technology, electrical engineering technology, mechanical engineering technology, mining engineering technology, computer science, commercial aquaculture, law enforcement, corrections, criminal justice administration, medical assisting, legal assisting, communications technology, liberal studies, social science, humanities, nursing, radiologic technology, applied science, general education and the Board of Regents Bachelor of Arts. Concentrations are offered in geography, history, international studies, political science, psychology and sociology.

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CONCORD COLLEGE

Concord College is a nationally accredited coeducational institution located in Athens, Mercer County, near the southern terminus of the West Virginia Turnpike. Founded in 1872 as Concord State Normal School, the name was changed in 1931 to Concord State Teachers College and to Concord College in 1943.

Enrollment for the 2002 Fall Semester was 3,015 students. There are 106 full-time faculty and professional staff members. The Concord College Beckley Center, begun in 1991, continues Concord's commitment to provide increased services to this important segment of the College's service region.

The sprawling Athens campus contains 19 buildings including the Oakey Logan Alexander Center for the Creative and Performing Arts, which consists of two multi-level units for the study of visual arts, theatre, communications and music; Leslie R. and Ruby Webb Carter Center, the physical education and athletic complex; and the J. Frank Marsh Library and Learning Resources Center. A thorough \$8.3 million renovation of Concord's main classroom facilities, the Administration Building/Science Hall, was completed in the autumn of 1990. A carillon was added in 1997 and the Administration Building was renamed Marsh Hall. Four residence halls provide a variety of living environments for up to 1,000 residential students.

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EASTERN WEST VIRGINIA COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Established by an act of the Legislature on March 21, 1999, Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College is a public-supported, comprehensive institution with administrative headquarters on Route 55 East of Moorefield. The College's service area encompasses six Potomac Highlands counties: Grant, Hampshire, Hardy, Mineral, Pendleton and Tucker.

The College is authorized to award three associate degrees: Associate in Arts (A.A.), Associate in Science (A.S.) and Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.); and the Certificate (C.P.) in career programs.

The College organizes its curriculum in five areas: Workforce Education and Training; Career-Technical Education; Developmental Education; Continuing and Community Education; and Baccalaureate Transfer. Courses in baccalaureate transfer education parallel university studies and credits are transferable to four-year institutions as fulfillment of freshman and sophomore requirements. Career-technical education courses and programs are intended to meet specific requirements in skill areas needed by employers. Continuing education offers a wide variety of job-related short-term seminars, workshops and conferences. Community education features a flexible system of responding to vocational, personal, cultural and recreational needs of individuals, organizations, employers or communities of learners throughout the District.

The College operates through a network of partnerships and joint ventures with area schools, other educational providers, business, labor and government agencies. Open access to all District citizens is provided by the College through eight strategically located access centers. At least one "Access Eastern @ Center" is located in each county.

One of the College's priorities is to develop the District's workforce through education, training and technical services. Based on documented needs assessment, the College offers customized, modularized and flexibly delivered programs and services to employers and their employees. The College houses one of the State's Small Business Development Centers and is the lead institution for the development of seamless technical education curricula through the Potomac Highlands Tech Prep Consortium. In addition, the College's Mobile Training Center provides locally accessible computer applications courses. This innovative delivery system was funded under a Workforce Initiatives Act grant through the West Virginia Council for Community and Economic Development which was matched by private contributions from local employers.

The College is authorized to enter into a partnership agreement with Southern West Virginia Community and Technical College for sponsorship of the College's curricula as it seeks regional accreditation from The Higher Learning Commission and membership with the North Central Association.

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FAIRMONT STATE COLLEGE AND FAIRMONT STATE COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Fairmont State is a comprehensive, multi-site, public, coeducational institution with two independently accredited, administratively linked academic units: Fairmont State College and Fairmont State Community and Technical College. Founded in 1865 as a private school, Fairmont State became a state institution in 1867 as a normal school. In 1931, the name was changed to Fairmont State Teachers College, and in 1943 to Fairmont State College. In 1974, a community college component was implemented. In 2003, Fairmont State Community and Technical College earned independent accreditation.

Fairmont State has a combined enrollment of more than 7,000 students and offers the advantages of two colleges in one environment, with 85 baccalaureate majors and 50 associate degrees, certificate degrees and skill-set certificates. Programs are offered in aviation, business, education, fine arts, health careers, language, science, mathematics, social science and technology.

Fairmont State Community and Technical College serves a 13-county region of West Virginia, including Barbour, Braxton, Calhoun, Doddridge, Gilmer, Harrison, Lewis, Marion, Monongalia, Preston, Randolph, Taylor and Upshur counties.

The following accrediting associations accredit Fairmont State: The Higher Learning Commission and a member of the North Central Association; the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education; and the West Virginia Board of Education. Selected programs in the schools are accredited by various other associations: The Technology Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (TAC/ABET); the National Accreditation Agency for Clinical Laboratory Services (Medical Laboratory Technology); the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (Health Information Technology); the West Virginia Board of Review Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses and the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission (Nursing); the Veterinary Medical Association (Veterinary Technology); and the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education of the American Physical Therapy Association (Physical Therapy Assistant). Fairmont State is also a member of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, American Association of State Colleges and Universities, American Council on Education, National League for Nursing, American Library Association, West Virginia Library Association and American Association of Community Colleges.

Fairmont State College and Fairmont State Community and Technical College are equal opportunity, affirmative action institutions.

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GLENVILLE STATE COLLEGE

Chartered in 1872 as the Glenville Branch of the State Normal School of West Virginia, the name of the college changed to Glenville State Normal School in 1898, to Glenville State Teachers College on May 1, 1930, and to Glenville State College in 1943.

The College is located in Glenville, Gilmer County, approximately 25 miles southwest of Weston on U.S. Route 33/119 and State Route 5 near Interstate 79.

Glenville State College operates under the supervision of the Higher Education Policy Commission of West Virginia, is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and holds program accreditation from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the Society of American Foresters.

Glenville State College offers specializations leading to a bachelor's degree in elementary education, early childhood education and special education; secondary education (fields of specialization are art, biological science, business education, chemistry, English, general science, mathematics, music, physical education, social studies). Other degree programs are Bachelor of Arts, Liberal Arts (English, chemistry, history, interdisciplinary studies); Bachelor of Science (biology, behavioral science and nursing); Bachelor of Science in business administration (accounting, computer and information systems, management, marketing); and Regents Bachelor of Arts.

Two-year associate degree programs are offered in business, general studies, criminal justice, forestry and land surveying.

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MARSHALL UNIVERSITY

Huntington 25755

Marshall University is the most metropolitan of West Virginia's public higher education institutions. The main campus is located near the heart of Huntington, the state's second largest city, situated in a Tri-State area of more than 300,000. The campus is noted for its attractiveness, level terrain and accessibility.

One of the fastest growing institutions in the region, Marshall also has a campus in South Charleston and centers across the state.

Founded as Marshall Academy in 1837, Marshall was designated a college in 1858, the state normal school in 1867 and a university in 1961. Enrollment is about 16,500 students; about 2,700 academic degrees were awarded at the 2002 Commencement. The University functions through 11 divisions: Marshall University Graduate College, the College of Information Technology and Engineering, Elizabeth McDowell Lewis College of Business, College of Education and Human Services, College of Fine Arts, College of Liberal Arts, College of Science, Community and Technical College, Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, W. Page Pitt School of Journalism and Mass Communications and College of Nursing and Health Professionals.

Four-year degrees granted are Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor Social Work and Regents Bachelor of Arts. Two-year degrees granted are Associate in Arts and Associate in Applied Science. The Graduate College awards the degrees of Master of Arts, Master of Science, Master of Business Administration, Master of Arts in Journalism, Master of Science in Nursing, Master of Arts in Teaching, Master of Science in Engineering, The Doctor of Medicine professional degree is offered as is the Ph.D. in Biomedical Sciences. A Psy.D. in Psychology, The Educational Specialist degree in Education and the Ed.D. in Educational Leadership. The Master of Forestry and the Master of Environmental Management are offered in cooperation with Duke University. The Ed.D. in Educational Administration is offered in cooperation with West Virginia University.

Marshall University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Liaison Committee on Medical Education, the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business and the American Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications. Nationally accredited academic degree programs also include: Communication Disorders, Park Resources and Leisure Services, Cytotechnology, Medical Laboratory Technician, Business and Office Technology, Health Information Technology, Engineering Technology, Athletic Training, Dietetics, Safety Technology, Music, Chemistry, Medical Technology, Legal Assistant, Nursing at Associate, Bachelor's and Master's levels and Social Work.

The main campus occupies approximately 80 acres near the center of Huntington. Married student housing is located at University Heights on the outskirts of the city. Major components of the School of Medicine are located at the Veterans Administration Medical Center and the new Marshall Medical Center at Cabell Huntington Hospital. Off-campus classes are conducted in many areas of the state.

As a result of action by the West Virginia Legislature and the University System of West Virginia Board of Trustees, several major construction projects recently completed are the John Deaver Drinko Library and Information Center, Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, the Robert C. Byrd Center for Rural Health, an addition to Memorial Student Center, the Jomie Jazz Center, a new 1000-space parking garage and 500-bed residential housing project. A new \$40 million Biotechnology Science Center is scheduled for construction beginning in the 2003-04 academic year.

Because of its terrain, accessibility and a long-standing program of cooperation with the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Marshall annually serves more than 300 students with physical disabilities. A pioneering project, the Higher Education for Learning Problems (H.E.L.P.) program, assists those with learning disabilities, attracting students from across the nation.

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**POTOMAC STATE COLLEGE
OF WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY**

Potomac State College is the only two-year residential, regional campus of West Virginia University (WVU); therefore, offering the prestige of a major school with the friendliness of a small campus. Potomac State offers 47 Associate of Arts degree programs transferable to West Virginia University or most other four-year institutions. The College also offers 18 Associate in Applied Science degree career/technical programs.

Potomac State makes it possible for adults to earn a bachelor's degree through WVU's Regents Program and with the RN to BSN Nursing Program.

Potomac State celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2001 and has maintained full, continuous and separate accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools since 1926.

The College has developed many partnerships within the community, including opening the Catamount Children's Center with the Children's Home Society of West Virginia to provide an educational-based experience for the children and for use as a learning center for the College's Early Childhood Education Program.

Another partnership is with the ATK Tactical Systems Co., in the development of the Hilltop Café, which will also serve as a learning laboratory for students majoring in Hospitality and Tourism. The College also works with the Robert C. Byrd Institute in conjunction with the Machinst Technology Program.

Through the Workforce Development and Community Education Center, the College offers training sessions for employees of local businesses as well as continuing education classes.

Potomac State's pre-baccalaureate transfer programs include agronomy, animal science, environmental education, general agriculture, horticulture, resource management, pre-veterinary medicine, biology, chemistry, computer science, English, environmental geoscience, general studies, geology, history, mathematics, modern languages, physics, political science, psychology, sociology, pre-dentistry, pre-law, pre-medical tech, pre-medicine, pre-nursing, pre-occupational therapy, pre-pharmacy, pre-physical therapy, pre-social work, business administration, economics, criminal justice studies, early childhood education, elementary education, physical education, secondary education, civil, electrical and mechanical engineering, parks and recreation, resource management, wildlife resources, wood industries and journalism.

Additionally, two-year technology programs for students desiring to develop skills and competencies for immediate employment or to upgrade skills are offered in agriculture, horticulture, accounting, general business, marketing, corrections and law enforcement, forestry technology, hospitality and tourism, microcomputer applications, microcomputer internet, microcomputer network, microcomputer programming, office specialist, including administrative assistant and medical office assistant, occupational development and technical studies.

Potomac State College continues its reputation for effective teaching, high academic standards and proven public services assuring the area of educational opportunities that are both accessible and economically feasible.

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SHEPHERD COLLEGE

Shepherdstown 25443

When the county seat of Jefferson County, West Virginia, was moved from Shepherdstown to Charles Town in July 1871, the people in the area decided to use the vacant courthouse for educational purposes. An article of incorporation for a school to be known as Shepherd College, designed to instruct students "in languages, arts, and sciences", was drawn up by the Board of Trustees. Joseph McMurrin, principal, and two assistant professors were hired to teach the 42 students who began classes in September 1871.

On February 27, 1872, the state Legislature passed an act which made the private institution a part of the state college system. In 1930 Shepherd became a four-year college dedicated to the training of teachers and it was accredited to grant the Bachelor of Arts degree. A liberal arts program was approved in 1943, and in 1950 the Bachelor of Science degree was added.

Academic programs are available in more than 70 different fields of study, and the College currently serves over 4,700 students. The College offers the following degrees: Master of Arts in Curriculum and Instruction, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education, Bachelor of Arts in Secondary Education, Bachelor of Science in Social Work, Regents Bachelor of Arts, Associate of Arts, Associate of Science in Nursing, Associate of Science and Associate of Applied Science.

In addition to the campus' 323 acres in Shepherdstown, a facility is also maintained in Petersburg to serve the needs of the residents of the South Branch Valley. Off-campus classes meet in seven counties in the Eastern Panhandle. The College is also a partner in a consortium with James Rumsey Technical Institute to promote workplace training and development.

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SOUTHERN WEST VIRGINIA COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Mt. Gay 25647-Williamson 25661

Established by the West Virginia Board of Regents as a comprehensive community college effective July 1, 1971, Southern West Virginia Community and Technical College serves Boone, Logan, Lincoln, McDowell, Mingo, Wyoming and a portion of Raleigh counties in West Virginia, and, by interstate agreement, Martin and Pike counties in Kentucky. Southern West Virginia Community and Technical College features an open-door admissions policy, offering two-year university transfer programs, occupational technical programs, continuing education opportunities, developmental foundation courses and cultural enrichment activities.

Southern is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, with specialized programs accredited by the West Virginia Board of Examiners for Professional Nurses, National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology, and the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Sciences. Associate degrees are available in University Parallel Programs, Medical Laboratory Technology, Nursing, Paramedic Science, Pharmacy Technology, Surgical Technology, Applied Industrial Management, Business Accounting, Business Administration, Office Information Technology, Criminal Justice, Automotive Power Technology, Computer Information Systems, Electrical Engineering Technology, Environmental Technology, Information Technology, Early Childhood Development and Welding Technology. Certificates are available in Health Care Technology, Criminal Justice, Drafting and Design Technology, Secretarial Science and Technical Studies. Several customized programs are also offered.

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WEST LIBERTY STATE COLLEGE

West Liberty 26074

West Liberty State College was chartered March 30, 1837, as West Liberty Academy and was operated privately until 1870 when it became West Liberty State Normal School. The name was changed to West Liberty State Teachers College in 1931 and West Liberty State College in 1943. The College, located in West Liberty on State Route 88, eight miles north of Wheeling, is a multipurpose four-year liberal arts coeducational institution.

West Liberty grants baccalaureate degrees in elementary and secondary education, arts and sciences, business administration, dental hygiene, nursing and clinical laboratory science as well as offering the associate degree in dental hygiene. The College is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools (the Higher Learning Commission), Chicago, Illinois; the American Dental Association - Commission on Dental Accreditation, Chicago, Illinois; the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, Chicago, Illinois; the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, Washington, D.C.; the West Virginia Department of Education; the National Association of Schools of Music, Reston, Virginia; the West Virginia Board of Examiners for Professional Registered Nurses; and the National League for Nursing, Inc., New York, New York. Membership is maintained in the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the American Council on Education, the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the American Assembly of College Schools of Business, and the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges.

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WEST VIRGINIA NORTHERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE

New Martinsville—Weirton—Wheeling

Established by the West Virginia Board of Regents in 1972, West Virginia Northern Community College is a tri-campus comprehensive community college located at 1704 Market Street in Wheeling (administrative headquarters) and the Hazel-Atlas Building in Wheeling, 150 Park Avenue in Weirton and 141 Main Street in New Martinsville. The campuses are linked electronically through a three-way telecommunications system allowing audio, video and data transmission.

West Virginia Northern's service area encompasses the six most northern counties of the state. Students from adjacent areas of Ohio and Pennsylvania also are served. A long-standing reciprocity agreement between West Virginia and Ohio permits residents of a nine-county area to attend a two-year institution in either state at in-state tuition rates.

West Virginia Northern offers courses in five main areas: College and university parallel studies from which credits are transferable to four-year institutions as fulfillment of freshman and sophomore years requirements; career-technical education, in which certificates and degrees are available in 29 fields; economic and workforce development and continuing education which features a flexible system of meeting short-term immediate needs of business, industry, service institutions and individuals; community education designed specifically to meet the interests of each of the three campus service areas; and programs and services for adult learners and those in need of developmental education..

West Virginia Northern offers two-year Associate in Arts (A.A.), Associate in Science (A.S.) and Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degrees and one-year Certificate of Proficiency (C.P) career-technical programs. It is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and is a member of the North Central Association, the Accreditation Review Committee for Surgical Technology Education, the American Health Information Management Association, the Commission on the Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs, the Committee on Accreditation for Respiratory Care, the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences, the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission, the West Virginia Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses/Continuing Education, the West Virginia Board of Respiratory Care and the American Culinary Federation.

Major College partnerships include the Center for Excellence in Workplace Education with Weirton Steel Corporation, which offers a variety of custom-designed education/training programs for employees; a Small Business Development Center; and the West Virginia Northern Panhandle Technical Education and Training Partnership.

WEST VIRGINIA SCHOOL OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE

Lewisburg 24901

The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine (WVSOM) was incorporated in 1972 as Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine. The Greenbrier Military School, which had been in continuous operation for 160 years, closed in May 1972 and was purchased in July by the West Virginia Society of Osteopathic Medicine. In December, a charter for the Greenbrier College of Osteopathic Medicine was obtained from the State of West Virginia, and the school opened in October 1974 as a private institution with a charter class of 36 students. In January 1976, the college was brought into the state system of higher education as the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine.

The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine educates primary care physicians for rural communities. The school is dedicated first and foremost to service for West Virginia and addresses the special health care needs of West Virginia's elderly. The WVSOM program is comprehensive—two years of basic science education, two years of clinical training, one year of rotating internship, followed by two or more years of residency training.

The WVSOM Admissions Committee reviews files of all qualified applicants. First preference for admission is given to residents of West Virginia. Historically, each class has been composed of approximately 63 percent West Virginia residents.

The WVSOM curriculum is designed to produce physicians who are competent in rural practice settings while assuring they have the education and legal status required for licensure in all states.

The West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine is accredited by the Bureau of Professional Education of the American Osteopathic Association (AOA). The AOA is recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation and the United States Department of Education as the only official accrediting agency for colleges of osteopathic medicine in America.

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WEST VIRGINIA STATE COLLEGE

Institute 25112-1000

West Virginia State College (WVSC), with an enrollment approaching 5,000, is the largest public higher education institution in the Charleston metropolitan area. Founded in 1891 as a land-grant institution, WVSC voluntarily desegregated in 1954 creating a "Living Laboratory of Human Relations". This event attracted the most racially and culturally diverse student body, faculty and staff in the state—a distinction that has been maintained to this day. The College cherishes its noble history, its reputation for safeguarding academic freedom, for being innovative in its scholastic programs, for removing barriers to education and for providing leadership opportunities for women, minorities and the handicapped.

West Virginia State College offers 23 associate degree programs, 19 baccalaureate degree programs and two master degree programs. The Bachelor of Arts degree is offered with majors in art, economics, English, history, political science, psychology and sociology. The Regents BA program allows students to earn credit for life and work experience. The Bachelor of Science degree is offered in biology, business administration, chemistry, communications, criminal justice, education, mathematics, recreation, health science and social work. Many of the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees transfer to baccalaureate degree programs. Associate in Applied Science degrees are offered in several fields, including nuclear medicine technology, electronics engineering technology and computer-aided drafting and design technology. The College also offers certificate programs in community behavioral health technology, gerontology and technology studies. Four graduate courses were offered in 2002, and in 2003, the College introduced two new masters degree programs in Biotechnology and Media Studies. The College also offers 10 collegiate certificate programs, ranging from community behavioral health technology to technical studies.

West Virginia State College is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Academic program accreditations include chemistry by the American Chemical Society; education by

the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education; recreation by the National Council of Accreditation of the National Recreation and Parks Association; social work by the Council on Social Work Education; and electronics technology by the Accreditation Board of Engineering and Technology.

The Drain-Jordan Library is a primary academic support facility, with more than 210,614 volumes and 495 current publication titles. It has a computerized catalog system with electronic search capability and automated circulation. The campus has 23 state-of-the-art computer laboratories as well as computer-equipped classrooms that make hands-on computer applications possible in almost every discipline. Campus satellite facilities permit both down-link and up-link access to communications satellites.

The Wilson College Union provides an atmosphere where commuter and resident students alike may relax. The facility houses a cafeteria, snack bar, recreational facilities, lounge, bookstore and meeting rooms for students' use. Other services provided to students are a child development facility and a variety of scholarships and other types of financial assistance. For both instructional and recreational use, students have access to a gymnasium, swimming pool, football stadium, track, bowling lanes, tennis courts and baseball and football fields. Opportunities exist to participate in music and drama groups, the student newspaper, the literary review and yearbook staff. Nineteen academic honor societies recognize outstanding academic performance.

With a consistent and determined effort since 1988, WVSC was redesignated at the federal level as one of the two land-grant institutions in West Virginia on March 28, 1994. Senator Robert C. Byrd introduced legislation in the Fiscal Year 2000 agricultural appropriations bill; and on October 22, 1999, the bill was signed by President Clinton, authorizing funding for land-grant programs related to research and extension at West Virginia State College. The beautiful 90-acre campus, with 41 buildings, is located in the suburban community of Institute, eight miles west (I-64, exit 50) of Charleston and approximately 40 miles east of Huntington.

WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY

Morgantown 26506

Established in 1867, West Virginia University is the state's major research, doctoral degree-granting, land-grant institution. WVU provides high-quality programs of instruction, offering 170 degree programs at the undergraduate, graduate and professional levels, including the state's only law school and the world's premiere degree offering in forensic identification. The University fosters basic and applied research and scholarship and engages in and encourages other creative and artistic work. A wide range of health science programs are offered at the Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center through schools of medicine, dentistry, nursing and pharmacy, including allied health programs and graduate programs in the basic health sciences.

WVU combines the breadth of academic opportunities offered by a major research institution with the atmosphere of a small school. Enrollment in one of the University's 13 colleges and schools offers students the warmth and friendliness of a small academic community.

Students at WVU may choose from among more than 300 student organizations, including 19 fraternities, 12 sororities and over 40 honor societies. In addition to extensive informal recreational opportunities and organized intramural programs, WVU has 16 intercollegiate varsity athletic programs, including a football team that regularly participates in post-season bowl games. WVU is a member of the Big East Conference, except for gymnastics and wrestling, which are associated with the Eastern Athletic Gymnastic League and the Eastern Wrestling League, respectively.

WVU's fall 2002 enrollment was 23,492. Students came from all 55 counties of West Virginia, all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and close to 100 other nations. Among WVU's proudest distinctions are the 25 students who have been chosen to receive Rhodes Scholarships to study at Oxford University, the 15 Truman Scholars who have been recognized for their public service efforts, the 24 Goldwater Scholars who have demonstrated academic excellence in the sciences, two British Marshall Scholars and two Morris K. Udall Scholars.

Operation Jump-Start is giving freshmen one of the top undergraduate experiences in the country by placing them in residence halls according to similar majors and interests. Advising, entertainment and some classes take place in the residence halls, and resident faculty leaders help serve as mentors to ensure a positive WVU experience. Professionals at the Career Success Academy explore career options with students, while WVU alumni serve as mentors. A Mountaineer Parents Club further supports students and their families. A student web portal, the MIX, connects students and faculty with each other and the internet.

The faculty at WVU is impressive; faculty members are nationally and internationally recognized experts in their fields. Eighty-seven percent of the full-time faculty hold doctorates or the highest degree offered in their fields. WVU is a Doctoral/Research University-Extensive, as classified by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. This distinction recognizes the complexity, breadth, and contribution of WVU's mission. In the last fiscal year, funding for sponsored projects and research hit the highest levels in WVU's history at \$88.7 million.

The University commits nearly \$4.5 million each year to support the WVU Scholars Program, a comprehensive scholarship program that supports approximately 3,000 students through awards ranging from one-time, \$1,000 scholarships to the full cost of a four-year education (approximately \$42,000). These awards are designed to encourage the state's outstanding students to attend college and remain in West Virginia. In addition, about 70 percent of WVU's students receive some \$145 million in financial aid.

WVU serves the state by bringing the resources of the University to all segments of society through the WVU Extension Service, through continuing education programs and through other public service activities, including a comprehensive health care delivery system and extensive economic development efforts.

WVU's libraries contain more than 3 million volumes and microforms and 100 electronic databases. The new Downtown Library Complex combines computer access with thousands of shelved books.

WVU's campuses in Morgantown combine traditional and modern architectural styles, and more than a dozen of the 170 buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. A new Student Recreation Center includes two pools, a 50-foot climbing wall, fitness equipment, and basketball, volleyball, badminton, squash, and racquetball courts. A new Life Sciences Building opened 2002. One Water-front Place, a new office complex, is located along the Monongahela River.

Parts of the campus are linked by the Personal Rapid Transit (PRT) system which consists of computer-directed, electric-powered cars that operate on a concrete and steel guideway permitting quick and easy access to major locations within the University and the downtown area of Morgantown.

WVU's programs and services are accessibly located throughout the state through regional campuses: Potomac State College of West Virginia University, West Virginia University at Parkersburg and the WVU Institute of Technology. WVU operates the Charleston Division of the Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center and the Wheeling Division of the School of Medicine. In addition, there are six Extended Learning Centers at Charleston, Clarksburg, Keyser, Parkersburg, Shepherdstown and West Liberty.

West Virginia University also operates eight experimental farms in Hardy, Jefferson, Monongalia, Monroe and Preston counties; four experimental forests in Monongalia, Preston, Randolph and Wetzel counties; a geology camp in Greenbrier County and the State 4-H Camp and museum of mid-nineteenth century life at Jackson's Mill in Lewis County.

WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

Montgomery 25136

This institution, West Virginia's only state-operated specialized technology university, was established through an act of the Legislature in 1895.

The college opened January 4, 1897, as Montgomery Preparatory School, a branch of West Virginia University and was renamed West Virginia Trades School in 1917.

In 1921, state authorities decided that a junior college was needed in the upper Kanawha Valley, especially for the training of much needed elementary school teachers. Enrollment rose in the newly named New River State School. By 1929, the school was a four-year college and had its first A.B. graduates. A name change occurred in 1931 to New River State College. By 1941, in response to demands for personnel from industries and businesses, the institution added technical and business programs. Recognizing this new role, the State Legislature renamed the college the West Virginia Institute of Technology. In 1952, the college began to offer bachelor degrees in engineering. This marked the first instance in which a West Virginia four-year college had developed a specialized role in providing educational services to its constituencies. In response to regional needs, Tech established community college programming in 1966. A master of engineering program was added in 1978.

By an act of the 1996 Legislature on July 1, 1996, the college became a regional campus of West Virginia University and was renamed West Virginia University Institute of Technology.

The school, popularly known as Tech, is a coeducational college, authorized to offer four years of studies leading to Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees and two years of studies leading to an Associate of Science and an Associate of Applied Science degree. A program for a master's degree in Control Systems Engineering is offered. The college is accredited by the North Central Association Higher Learning Commission, and individual programs are accredited as follows: Engineering Programs by the Engineering Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, Baltimore, Maryland; Engineering Technology Programs by the Technology Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, Baltimore, Maryland; Nursing BSN Program by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, Washington, D.C.; and Dental Hygiene by the Commission on Dental Accreditation of the American Dental Association, Chicago, Illinois.

The Bachelor of Science degree is offered in accounting, biology, management information systems, business management, technology management, industrial relations and human resources, printing management, athletic coaching education, chemical engineering, civil engineering, electrical engineering, electrical engineering with computer engineering emphasis, mechanical engineering, computer science, chemistry, mathematics, public services and health services administration. A two plus two bachelor's degree is offered in electronic engineering technology, engineering technology/civil, mechanical and environmental tracks and industrial technology. The master's in control systems engineering is also offered.

The Bachelor of Arts degree is offered in history and government interdisciplinary studies and the Regents Bachelor of Arts program.

The Associate of Science degree is offered in business technology (with emphasis in accounting, business supervision, computer information systems and restaurant management), general studies, dental hygiene, printing technology, office technology management, legal, executive, medical, medical assistant and medical facilities management emphasis and the following engineering technologies: Civil, computerized drafting and design, electrical and mechanical. The Associate of Applied Science is offered in Automotive Service Technology Occupational Development (Corrections and Culinary Arts), Respiratory Care Technology, Surgical Technology and Technical Studies (Statewide Information Technology and Diesel Technology). A one-year certificate may be obtained in entrepreneurship, pre-press technology and press technology and claim processing. In August 2003, U.S. News and World Report ranked Tech as follows: Number 4 among all public comprehensive universities in the south; number 49 in the nation among engineering programs; and second tier among best comprehensive colleges—bachelor's (southern region).

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WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY AT PARKERSBURG

Parkersburg 26101

West Virginia University at Parkersburg was founded in 1961 as the Parkersburg branch of West Virginia University. It became West Virginia's first comprehensive community college in July, 1971, as Parkersburg Community College. The institution assumed its current designation as a regional campus of WVU in 1989 following a reorganization of West Virginia's public higher education system.

Located four miles east of the city of Parkersburg, the college offers a blend of academic and career programs, ranging from certificate to baccalaureate programs. The Parkersburg campus serves the seven counties of Jackson, Pleasants, Ritchie, Roane, Tyler, Wirt and Wood. The Jackson County Center, an off-campus center established at Ripley in 1974, serves the educational needs of the Jackson-Roane area. As an open admission institution, WVU Parkersburg is a "close to home" entry point to higher education for area residents. The college also serves as a regional workforce development hub. Its Caperton Center for Applied Technology features a high school to college seamless curriculum unique to the region. WVU Parkersburg's Business, Industry and Development Services division works with business and industry in delivering workforce development training and programming to impact the Mid-Ohio Valley's economic vitality.

The college is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, the National Association of Realtors, National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, National League for Nursing, West Virginia Department of Education, West Virginia Real Estate Commission and West Virginia State Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses.

WEST VIRGINIA SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND THE BLIND

Romney 26757

The West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind were established by an Act of the Legislature March 3, 1870. The School for the Deaf and the School for the Blind offer comprehensive educational programs for hearing impaired and visually impaired students respectively. There is also a unit for Deaf-Blind/Multihandicapped children.

Students may be enrolled at the age of three. Students must be residents of West Virginia and have a hearing or visual loss sufficient to prevent normal progress in the usual public school setting.

In addition to the state-approved elementary and secondary curricula, courses focusing on special skills needed by hearing and/or visually impaired students are offered in accordance with their respective needs. These academic, vocational and special courses are taught by members of the staff with expertise in education of hearing and/or visually impaired students as well as certification in their subject areas which are appropriate to their teaching assignments. Preschool and other specialized programs are also offered. The school calendar is similar to that followed by county school systems.

Outreach and technical assistance services are available to county school staff providing programs to hearing and/or visually impaired students. A statewide Instructional Resource Center also provides instructional materials and equipment for visually impaired children attending county programs. The Sub-Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped of the Library of Congress, located on the campus, provides talking books and other similar reading materials to individuals with visual or physical disabilities. A captioned film library serves individuals with hearing disabilities in this region.

These schools are supervised by the West Virginia Board of Education and supported by the State of West Virginia. There are no costs to students, or parents, with the exception of clothing, transportation to the schools and other incidental expenses. Information concerning the schools or enrollment procedures may be obtained by contacting the Superintendent. Interested persons are invited to visit any time the schools are in operation.

Both schools are fully accredited by the North Central Association for Colleges and Schools at the elementary and secondary levels.

DENOMINATIONAL AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS

ALDERSON-BROADDUS COLLEGE

Philippi 26416

Alderson-Broaddus College is an accredited, renowned leader in health-related, pre-professional higher education family rooted in the liberal arts, which also offers the masters degree. Located on a 150-acre campus in Philippi, it is the picturesque site of the first land battle of the Civil War. The coeducational, independent College is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and affiliated with the West Virginia Baptist Convention and the American Baptist Churches/USA. The College is committed in charter and bylaws to three main purposes: Excellent academic instruction, a Christian environment for learning and instilling a service motivation in its students.

Its enrollment is approximately 800 students and the total full-time College faculty numbers 50.

Each field of study requires a thorough grounding in the liberal arts and sciences. Over the years, health sciences, teacher education, music and business have been the central focus of the institution.

In 1945, the College inaugurated the State's first degree program in nursing. In 1967, the school initiated the nation's first degree program for physician assistants, and inaugurated the nation's first post-baccalaureate master's degree for physician assistants in 1991. These health programs, along with other allied health majors, are enhanced by a close affiliation with West Virginia University.

Alderson-Broaddus has one of the most comprehensive computing environments of any college in the state. All faculty, staff and students (regardless of major) are granted full access to both the internet and local facilities, which are used heavily in day-to-day activities, both administrative and instructional. In addition, the College offers telemedicine training in nursing and medical science and as a Clay/Yamaha School of Music Excellence, offers dislavier pianos for music.

The College operates on a semester system, emphasizing concentration of learning, efficient utilization of facilities and enrichment for students through a number of opportunities which include: Independent study; internship opportunities with business and industry, various health and social agencies; a Salzburg international studies program; and Christian and humanitarian service projects.

Many students complete at least one term of off-campus internship as part of their graduation requirements.

About two-thirds of the students at Alderson-Broaddus are from West Virginia, with another third from Pennsylvania and Ohio, and the balance from 34 other states and six foreign countries. While the College is proud of its Baptist heritage and its active church relatedness, its religious emphasis is conceived in broad terms to serve all backgrounds with the intent of exposing rather than imposing a belief system. Total student costs for the 2003-04 academic year are \$21,225. Over 98 percent of the students receive significant scholarships, grants-in-aid and work opportunity assistance. Ninety percent of the single students are residents on campus, and married couple facilities are available in modern College-owned and -managed apartments. The College was ranked in the Top Tier of southern region liberal arts colleges by *U. S. News and World Report* in 1999, the only college in the state so ranked.

The main campus of the College occupies approximately 150 acres of land, on which are located academic, religious, administrative and auxiliary enterprise buildings. Modern academic buildings provide excellent laboratory facilities in addition to space for classrooms and offices. There are 19 major buildings, including residence halls for men and women and food service facilities. All structures in use on the campus have been completed since 1956, with most having been completed between 1967 and 2003. The most recently developed buildings on the campus include Wilcox Chapel (1976), New Main Hall (1980), the complex which houses all the major administrative operations of the College, the Robert C. Byrd Technology Center (1991) and the Erickson Alumni Center (1992). Kincaid Residence Center (1994), Benedum Hall (1997), Priestley Hall (1998), the Hamer Center (1999), and the Kemper/Redd Science Center (2004) have also recently been renovated.

Appalachian Bible College is an independent, coeducational Bible college whose central objective is to educate and equip servants for the church of tomorrow while edifying the church of today. Established in September 1950, and incorporated under the laws of the state of West Virginia, it is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges. It is approved by the West Virginia Department of Education and the Arts for the granting of the Associate of Arts degree in Bible and Theology, the Bachelor of Arts degree in Bible and Theology and the Bachelor of Theology degree. The state Department of Education has also granted approved-program status to the college's elementary education program, thus enabling graduates in this program to become state-certified teachers.

While all students major in Bible, the following vocational minors are offered: Elementary Education, Family Counseling, Youth Ministries, Missions, Music, Camping and Pastoral Studies. Four curricular programs are currently available: A four-year program consisting of 126 semester hours leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree in Bible, a program consisting of 158 semester hours leading to a Bachelor of Theology degree in Bible and Theology, a two-year program consisting of 63 semester hours leading to the Associate of Arts degree and a certificate program of 30 semester hours.

Current matriculation is approximately 300. Nearly one third of the student body comes from West Virginia. Over 35 states are represented. Students also come from more than 10 foreign countries.

The campus comprises over 120 acres located at the junction of W. Va. Route 16 and U. S. Highway 19 at the North Beckley interchange of the West Virginia Turnpike, three miles north of Beckley. The land, buildings and property are valued at approximately \$13 million. Ten major buildings on campus include a newly constructed student center/dining hall complex, chapel music hall, an administration-library building, women's dormitories, men's dormitories, classroom building a gymnasium/conference center. Appalachian Village is comprised of 24 units for married student housing. Alpine Lodge is a motel/conference facility that houses 120 persons.

Subsidized by gifts of churches and individuals, the college's cost to students is kept low. Registration, fees, tuition, plus board and room cost amounts to \$11,470 per year. Scholarships and work opportunities are available.

VETERANS FACILITY

WEST VIRGINIA VETERANS HOME

**512 Water Street
Barboursville 25504**

The West Virginia Veterans Home is located in the village of Barboursville 15 miles from downtown Huntington. This home for West Virginia veterans was authorized by an act of the Legislature in 1975 and became a reality in 1981.

Basic eligibility requirements are: Veterans must have been discharged from service with an honorable discharge or with a general discharge under honorable conditions. Veterans must be ambulatory and independent in all activities of daily living. Due to the health and welfare of residents at the Home, there are certain medical tests which must be completed prior to admission.

The Home provides a nursing department and contract physician. Medical care, including primary care, is provided by the U. S. Veterans Affairs Medical Center located in Huntington. Transportation is provided.

Most rooms available for occupancy accommodate two, three or four persons. Every effort is made to ensure compatibility between occupants. Female veterans are welcome and special lodging accommodations are provided.

A person's income is not a factor in gaining admission, although each resident is required to contribute one half of his monthly income as their maintenance contribution.

Residents may leave on a pass for up to three days or a leave of absence for up to 30 days on request.

Emphasis is placed on maintaining a warm, attractive and comfortable "home" for West Virginia veterans in need of a place to live. Visitation to the Home is encouraged and visitors may enjoy a meal with the residents at a nominal fee.

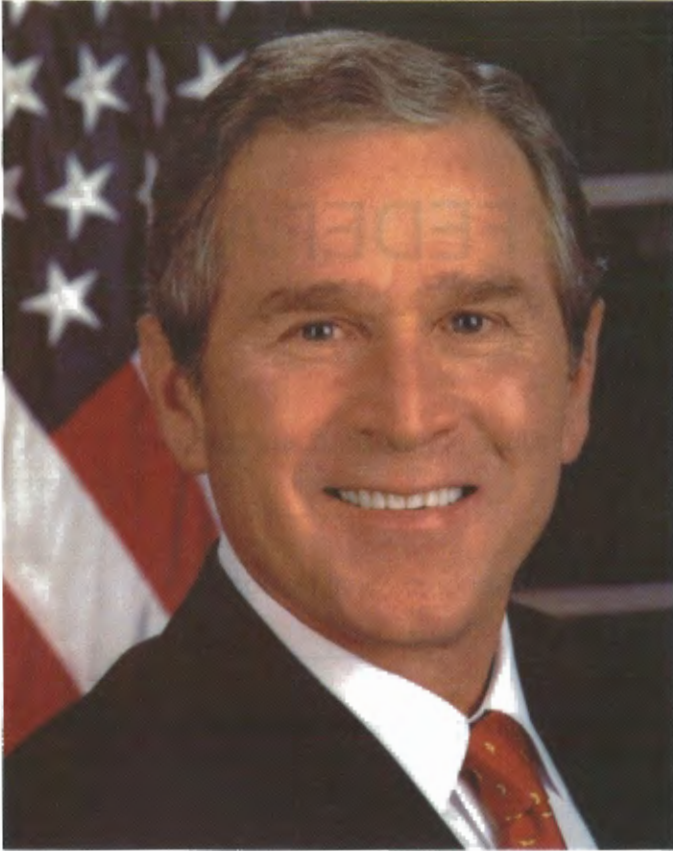

THE PRESIDENT

GEORGE W. BUSH, Republican, is the 43rd President of the United States. Formerly the 46th Governor of the State of Texas. Born July 6, 1946, and grew up in Midland and Houston, Texas. Received a bachelor's degree from Yale University and a Master of Business Administration from Harvard Business School. Served as an F-102 pilot for the Texas Air National Guard before beginning his career in the oil and gas business in Midland in 1975, working in the energy industry until 1986. After working on his father's successful 1988 presidential campaign, he assembled the group of partners that purchased the Texas Rangers baseball franchise in 1989. Served as managing general partner of the Texas Rangers until he was elected Governor on November 8, 1994, with 53.5 percent of the vote. He became the first Texas Governor to be elected to consecutive four-year terms on November 3, 1998, winning 68.6 percent of the vote. Married to Laura Welch Bush, a former teacher and librarian, and they have 19-year-old twin daughters, Barbara and Jenna.

ROBERT C. BYRD
United States Senator

ROBERT C. BYRD (D) of Sophia, Raleigh County; born in North Wilkesboro, NC, November 20, 1917; Baptist; LL.B., J.D. cum laude, American University, 1963; B.A. summa cum laude, Marshall University, 1994. Married Erma Ora James; two daughters, Mrs. Mohammad (Mona Byrd) Fatemi and Mrs. Jon (Marjorie Byrd) Moore; six grandchildren and three great-granddaughters. Has served longer in the U.S. Senate than anyone else in West Virginia's history; elected to the West Virginia House of Delegates in 1946 and reelected in 1948; elected to the West Virginia Senate in 1950; elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1952 and reelected in 1954 and 1956; elected to the U.S. Senate in 1958 and reelected in 1964, 1970, 1976, 1982, 1988, 1994 and 2000; has received the highest number of votes (566,359 in 1976) of any West Virginian in a statewide election. In the election year of 2000, he carried all but seven precincts out of 1,970 precincts in the state. Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, 1989-94; June 2001-present; Member of the Appropriations Committee, 1959-present; Member of the Committee on Armed Services, Committee on the Budget and Committee on Rules and Administration; elected secretary of the Senate Democratic Conference in January, 1967 and reelected in 1969; elected Majority Whip (Assistant Majority Leader) in January, 1971 and reelected by unanimous vote in 1973 and 1975; elected Senate Majority Leader for the 95th Congress in January, 1977 and reelected unanimously in January, 1979 for the 96th Congress; elected Senate Minority Leader by unanimous vote for the 97th Congress and reelected Minority Leader for the 98th Congress and for the 99th Congress; elected Senate Majority Leader for the 100th Congress (1987-88); elected President pro tempore of the U.S. Senate, 1989-94; and elected Senate President pro tempore in June 2001-present. Has held more leadership positions and has cast more votes in the U.S. Senate than has any other Senator of any party in Senate history; selected by the Charleston (West Virginia) *Sunday Gazette-Mail* as the West Virginian of the Year for 1974, 1977, 1990 and 2002; chosen by *U.S. News and World Report* poll of American Leaders as the most influential member of the Senate in 1979 and included in its list of the ten most influential Americans in 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1980; received the first "We the People" award from the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia (1996). In January, 1997, a ten-foot bronze statue of Senator Byrd, standing on a four-foot pedestal, was unveiled at the state capitol in honor of his fifty years of public service to West Virginia. In May, 2001, he was designated "West Virginian of the 20th Century" by the West Virginia Legislature and by proclamation of Governor Bob Wise. JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER IV (D) of Charleston, born June 18, 1937, son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller III; graduate of Phillips Exeter Academy and Harvard University, with additional studies at International Christian University in Tokyo, Japan, and Yale University; honorary degrees from West Virginia University, Marshall University, University of Cincinnati, University of Alabama, Davis and Elkins College, Salem College, West Virginia Institute of Technology, Dickinson College, Bethany College, West Liberty State College, West Virginia Wesleyan College and Wheeling Jesuit University. Married to the former Sharon Percy on April 1, 1967; four children: John, Valerie, Charles and Justin. Appointed in 1961 by President John F. Kennedy to the National Advisory Council of the Peace Corps; appointed special assistant to Peace Corps Director R. Sargent Shriver in 1962; served in the U.S. State Department in the Bureau of Far Eastern Affairs as desk officer for Indonesian Affairs and as special assistant; appointed by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy in July, 1964, to work in West Virginia with President's Commission on Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime; social worker in Emmons, West Virginia. Elected in 1966 to the West Virginia House of Delegates; elected West Virginia Secretary of State in 1968; Democratic nominee for Governor in 1972; chosen as twelfth president of West Virginia Wesleyan College in Buckhannon in 1973; resigned and announced candidacy for Governor in 1975; elected Governor in November, 1976, by largest victory margin in state's history. Re-elected Governor in November, 1980. Elected to the U.S. Senate in 1984; reelected in 1990, 1996 and 2002. Senior Democrat on the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs; Ranking Member of Health Care subcommittee of the Finance Committee; Ranking Member of the Aviation subcommittee of the Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation; member of Foreign Relations Committee; cochairman of the Senate Steel Caucus; and member of the Joint Committee on Taxation. Vice chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. In the Senate, served as Chairman of the Senate Democratic Technology and Communications Committee; National Commission on Children; United States Trade Adviser; and Bipartisan Commission on Comprehensive Health Care. The Office of the Adjutant General from 1863 to 1871 was combined with that of Quartermaster-General, under the provisions of Chapter 72, Acts of the Legislature. In 1871, the State Superintendent of Free Schools served as Adjutant General ex officio. By act passed February 17, 1877, (Chapter 37, Acts, 1877), the duties of the office were transferred to the State Librarian, and this official served as Adjutant General ex officio until the passage in 1897 of the act creating the office of Adjutant General, Chapter 61, Acts, 1897. The Adjutant General shall be appointed by the Governor for a term of four years. He shall have the rank of Major General. The Adjutant General shall be charged with the organization, administration, operation and training, supply and discipline of the military forces of the state. He shall serve as chief of staff to the Governor and commanding officer of the organized militia. (As amended and reenacted by Acts 1949, c. 105, Acts 1961, c. 113 and Acts 1982, c. 102).

Congress has delegated to the Corps of Engineers responsibility for the development, construction, operation, and maintenance of navigation facilities, flood control structures, and related improvements, and services for water resources management.

The Civil Works Program of the Corps of Engineers is divided geographically on the basis of watershed drainage areas. All of West Virginia except for the Eastern Panhandle lies within the Ohio River drainage basin. The Eastern Panhandle lies within the Potomac River Basin. The Huntington District of the Great Lakes and Ohio River Division is responsible for the areas of West Virginia that drain to the Ohio River downstream of New Martinsville in Wetzel County. The Pittsburgh District has responsibility for areas of the state that drain to reaches above New Martinsville. This includes the Monongahela River Basin. The Potomac River Basin lies entirely within the Baltimore District. Emergency Management responsibilities for the State of West Virginia rest with the Huntington District.

All military construction in West Virginia is the responsibility of the Baltimore District.

Navigation system development within the State of West Virginia presently includes three lock-and-dam structures each on the Kanawha and Monongahela rivers.

On the Kanawha River locks and dams are located at Winfield, Marmet and London. These projects, built in the 1930s, have twin 360 by 56 foot lock chambers. These lock chambers have been or will be added to or modified. A 800 by 110 foot main lock chamber has been added at Winfield. A new 800 by 110 foot main lock chamber is being added at Marmet and a 40 foot extension to an existing lock chamber at London. These three structures, along with the slackwater pool from the Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, on the Ohio River, provide a commercially navigable channel for a distance for about 90 miles along the Kanawha.

Navigation on the West Virginia portion of the Monongahela is provided by the Opekiska, Hildebrand and Morgantown lock-and-dam facilities. Each of these facilities has a single 600 by 84 foot lock. These facilities, in combination with the pool from the Pt. Marion Lock and Dam, in Pennsylvania, extend commercial navigation to the city of Fairmont (river mile 128).

Along the portion of the Ohio River bordering West Virginia, navigation is provided by eight lock-and-dam structures. All have parallel locks with dimensions of 1,200 feet by 110 feet and 600 feet by 110 feet. In river-descending order, the structures are New Cumberland Locks and Dam, at New Cumberland; Pike Island Locks and Dam, near Wheeling; Hannibal Locks and Dam, near New Mar-

tinsville; Willow Island Locks and Dam, near Waverly; Belleville Locks and Dam, near Belleville; Racine Locks and Dam, near Letart; and Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, near Apple Grove. The pool of the eighth structure, Greenup Locks and Dam, near Greenup, Kentucky, borders Kentucky, Ohio, and West Virginia and extends to the Robert C. Byrd Dam. Studies are underway to extend the auxiliary lock chamber from 600 feet to 1200 feet and to rehabilitate the main lock.

All navigation dams on the Ohio, Monongahela and Kanawha rivers serve only to contain pools of navigable depth; they have no flood control function.

Flood control projects constructed by the Army Corps of Engineers within the state include Bluestone Lake on New River at Hinton; Sutton Lake on Elk River at Sutton; Tygart Lake on Tygart Valley River near Grafton; Summersville Lake on Gauley River near Summersville; East Lynn Lake on East Fork of Twelvepole Creek near Wayne; R.D. Bailey Lake on Guyandotte River near Gilbert; Burnsville Lake on Little Kanawha River near Burnsville; Beech Fork Lake on Beech Fork of Twelvepole Creek near Huntington; Jennings Randolph Lake on North Branch Potomac River near Piedmont; and Stonewall Jackson Lake on West Fork River near Weston.

Local protection projects completed by the Corps of Engineers in West Virginia are located at Parkersburg, Pt. Pleasant, Huntington, Ceredo-Kenova, Ridgeley, Buckhannon, Elkins, Princeton, West Williamson, Williamson, Matewan and East Rainelle. Nonstructural flood damage reduction projects which include floodproofing and floodplain evacuation features are ongoing in Mingo County, Wayne County and McDowell County along the Tug Fork River. In addition, several completed smaller flood control projects and snagging and clearing projects have reduced or alleviated flood damage along smaller tributaries of main rivers within the state.

Services provided include those related to floodplain management and disaster relief assistance. The floodplain management services program provides for preparation of floodplain information reports for communities of the state upon their request, and help to any community, agency, or individual in evaluating flood hazards at individual locations.

The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division was established in February 1992 as the focal point and central repository for criminal justice information services in the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This Division, the largest within the FBI, serves as a customer-driven organization furnishing state-of-the-art identification and related information services to local, state, federal and international criminal justice organizations.

The primary responsibility of the CJIS Division is the Fingerprint Identification Program. Through the Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System, which became operational on July 28, 1999, responses to electronic criminal fingerprint submissions are made within two hours of receipt by the FBI and to civil applicant submissions within 24 hours. The CJIS Division is also responsible for the operation of the National Crime Information Center; the National Instant Criminal Background Check System; the Uniform Crime Reporting Program; and Law Enforcement On-line.

The CJIS Division operates 24 hours a day, seven days per week and employs a work force of approximately 2,550 individuals. It is located on a 986-acre site in Clarksburg. Six buildings are located on the site, which are the Main Office Building, the Computer Center, the Central Utilities Plant, the Service Center, the Visitors Centers and the Child Development Center.

FEDERAL PRISON CAMP
Glen Ray Road, Box A

The Federal Prison Camp in Alderson was originally opened in 1927 as the Federal Industrial Institution for Women. Dr. Mary B. Harris served as the first warden and under her direction, the facility was officially dedicated in 1928.

The architectural structure and with the surrounding grounds resembles that of a college or university. The facility made a later transition to the Federal Reformatory for Women and finally in November 1988 became the Federal Prison Camp (FPC). This was the first federal prison designed specifically for the confinement of female offenders and is currently the largest minimum security facility with the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Approximately 180 full-time staff members are employed at FPC Alderson, with a rated capacity of 950 inmates. The inmate population is representative of all states and several foreign countries.

Federal Prison Industries (UNICOR) is an on-site industrial sewing factory which employs 170 inmate workers. UNICOR currently manufactures sweatsuits for the U.S. military. The Mechanical Services Division employs inmates in various maintenance and construction trades to include established apprenticeship positions. The facility is primarily maintained by these inmate workers with staff supervision.

Two Unit Teams provide general oversight of 12 buildings which serve as housing units for inmate population. Education opportunities are offered in the area of Vocational Training, Apprenticeships, ABLE, GED, ESL and college-level courses with applicable accreditation. Extracurricular programs and recreational activities vary by season, but include crafting, Reading/Law Library, intermural sporting events and a music program. There is a community-based program which allows inmates to make knit and woven clothing items as gifts to underprivileged children.

BERKELEY

Second oldest county in West Virginia. Created in 1772 from the northern third of Frederick County (Virginia), and named for Norborne Berkeley (Baron de Botetourt), Colonial Governor of Virginia from 1768 to 1770.

At Bunker Hill, in this county, in 1726, Morgan Morgan founded the first permanent settlement of record in Western Virginia. In commemoration of this event, the State of West Virginia has erected a monument in Bunker Hill State Park, and has placed a marker at the grave of Morgan Morgan, which is in a cemetery near the park.

The first Episcopal church (Christ Church) in what is now West Virginia was erected at Bunker Hill by Morgan Morgan in 1740. Three years later (about 1743), the first Baptist church (Mill Creek Church) was organized at Gerrardstown.

In the course of time, early settlers began to occupy the vast, fertile lands along the mighty Ohio River. Small towns began to form. There were no settlers in this part of the valley prior to the coming of the Ebenezer Zane family in 1769.

Sometime in 1771, Captain William McMechen and his wife, Sidney Johnson McMechen, came and settled upon a vast tract of land along the Ohio River where Benwood and McMechen now stand. It was due to their son, Benjamin, for whom our town is named. Benjamin inherited several hundred acres of his father's estate and it was upon this land "Ben's Woods" that he built his homestead and farm.

Reference books indicate that this land was once occupied by Shawnee and Delaware Tribes and the Mingo branch of the Iroquois Indians.

Throughout the beginning of the industrial boom, many manufacturing companies and rail services began to spring up at an alarming rate. The beginning of midwestern railroad development reached Benwood in 1852 when the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad finally decided to bridge the Ohio at Benwood. Shortly after 1882, Benwood began to experience a remarkable change. Industrial development had brought in the largest steel mills. Thousands of workers and their families came to live within this great industrial town of its time.

Originally chartered on February 28, 1853, and incorporated on March 2, 1853, by Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Trustees of the town were William McMechen, George Blake, David B. McMechen, Dr. Smith Holloway, William H. Powell, Samuel H. Norton and A. Wilson Kelley. The assembly authorized these gentlemen to hold office until successors would be appointed by the first election that was to be held on the first Monday in April 1853. The city was again incorporated on February 25, 1882, and the final incorporation being February 22, 1895, by Acts of the West Virginia Legislature.

Construction was completed in May 1985 for a new, modern community building, located on Ballah Avenue, to be available for all community activities.

The town completed construction of a new City Park in May 1987, containing basketball and tennis courts, a jogging track, playground equipment, horseshoe pits and a picnic pavilion.

In October 1992, an 80 MW American Bituminous Project's construction was completed on the edge of Grant Town. In March 1993, it completed commercial operation performance testing and entered commercial operations the following month. This project will gradually purge its site of over 20 million tons of bituminous coal waste, or gob, left by local coal mining operations. As the project consumes the gob, approximately 1,200 pounds per day of acidic coal refuse which used to be runoff will diminish until it is no longer discharged. After combustion, the gob

is converted to a harmless ash which is returned to the abandoned underground mine or used as a building material.

Construction was complete in May of 1996 of improvements and enhancements to the Grant Town Water Distribution System which serves the Baxter-Grant Town area. Under a grant obtained from the Small Cities Block Grant Program, Grant Town obtained \$450,000 which replaced a major portion of the main water line serving the communities of Grant Town and Baxter.

Pratt's recorded history dates to 1792 when John Jones, a Revolutionary War veteran, took out a patent for acreage that included the site of the present town. Many Indian relics have been unearthed in and around the town, indicating that in an earlier age Indians roamed the land bordering Paint Creek and the south bank of the Great Kanawha River.

In the 1840s, Dickinson Morris, grandson of Kanawha Valley pioneer William Morris, purchased the land from Jones. Morris later divided his property into lots and streets so a town could be established. He designated one lot to be used as a public square as long as it benefitted the townspeople. The property continues to be used for town activities which are held in Pratt's historic Old Town Hall, built on the town square in 1875.

Originally called Clifton, then DeGo, the town adopted the surname of Charles K. Pratt at the turn of the century. Pratt's New York company owned timber and mineral rights in the area and maintained offices in the town. On June 4, 1905, Pratt was incorporated.

Gracious old homes are scattered throughout the town, each contributing significantly to Pratt's rich heritage. The town's only church, Old Kanawha Baptist, celebrated the 200th anniversary of its founding in 1993. In the hillside cemetery, weathered stones mark graves that date as far back as 1835. Many of today's residents can trace their ancestry to the town's pre-Civil War settlers.

During the mine war of 1912-13, the little town was thrust into national prominence when Mary Harris Jones ("Mother" Jones), fiery labor organizer, was imprisoned in Pratt. Tents of the state militia sent to enforce martial law dotted the open fields near the boardinghouse where "Mother" Jones was kept. When the plight of the well-known agitator was telegraphed around the country, the United States Congress was forced to take action.

Focusing on the town's role in the history of unionization, the Pratt Old Town Hall Association commissioned a play to be written about "Mother" Jones during her confinement in the town. The play is presented annually during the Pratt Fall Festival.

Because of its historic importance, a part of the town was designated a historic district in 1984 and placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

He also used it as a crude hotel for himself and his men who drove cattle from Clarksburg to the Ohio River at Marietta which was the nearest market.

Samuel Fitz Randolph purchased the property on which the village was founded in 1790. Randolph had started with a caravan of pioneer settlers from Salem, New Jersey, who crossed the mountains in 1789 and made their first stop at Woodbridgetown, Pennsylvania. Randolph, a number of Davises, some Maxsons, and others came on to what is now Salem, after a two and one-half year trek from the sea coast.

Salem was the first settlement of Seventh Day Baptists west of the mountains. It is now the

home of Salem International University, founded in 1888, and the Industrial Home for Youth, established in 1898. Glass has been a major industry. It is the birthplace of United States Senator Jennings Randolph and writer Granville Davison Hall, author of *Daughter of the Elm*, *The Rending of Virginia*, and many other historical books.

Location of the Annual Applebutter Harvest Festival held the second weekend in October, featuring crafts, foods, street square dancing, cloggers, country and western music, gospel music, Blue Ribbon Applebutter contest and Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest. The theme for the festival is "Turn of the Century".

The boxcar was filled with gifts from France and

its people, among which included french oak tree acorns, some of which were planted at Point Pleasant, West Virginia.

American Legion Post 8, sponsors the oldest, continuous running Veteran's Day Parade and Celebration which has been host to many national and state dignitaries over the years. The parade takes place in downtown Welch.

THE AMERICAN FLAG

The Flag of the United States has 13 horizontal stripes—7 red and 6 white—the red and white stripes alternating, and a union which consists of white stars of five points on a blue field placed in the upper quarter next to the staff and extending to the lower edge of the fourth red stripe from the top. The number of stars is the same as the number of States in the Union. The canton or union now contains 50 stars. On the admission of a State into the Union, a star will be added to the union of the Flag and such addition will take effect on the 4th day of July next succeeding such admission.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

STATE FLAG

Before the design of the present State Flag was officially adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1929, by Senate Joint Resolution No. 18, West Virginia had been represented by several flags which had proved impractical.

Prominently displayed on the pure white field of today's flag and emblazoned in proper colors is a Coat of Arms, the lower half of which is wreathed by Rhododendron. Across the top, lettered on a ribbon, is the constitutional designation—"State of West Virginia". The white field is bordered on four sides by a strip of blue, and for parade purposes all but the staff side are to be trimmed with gold fringe.

GREAT SEAL OF WEST VIRGINIA

The Great Seal of West Virginia, which also is the Coat of Arms, was adopted by the Legislature on September 26, 1863, and symbolizes the principal pursuits and resources of West Virginia. Described briefly, the obverse side of the Seal bears the legend, "State of West Virginia", together with the motto, "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Are Always Free); a farmer stands to the right and a miner to the left of a large ivy-draped rock bearing the date of the state's admission to the Union, in front of the rock are two hunters' rifles upon which rests a Phrygian Cap, or "Cap of Liberty".

The reverse side of the Seal is not in common use today. It was intended to be employed when the Seal was attached to documents by ribbons and suspended in the manner of a medal.

Joseph H. Diss Debar, of Doddridge County, designed the State Seal in 1863 at the request of the first West Virginia Legislature.

STATE SONGS

"THE WEST VIRGINIA HILLS", "THIS IS MY WEST VIRGINIA" and "WEST VIRGINIA, MY HOME SWEET HOME" were designated as the official State Songs of West Virginia, each ranking equally with the others in official status, by House Concurrent Resolution No. 19, adopted by the Legislature on February 28, 1963.

OFFICIAL COLORS

OLD GOLD and BLUE were designated as Official State colors by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 20, adopted by the Legislature on March 8, 1963.

STATE DAY

“West Virginia Day”

On January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln approved the Statehood Bill for West Virginia on the condition that it would gradually abolish slavery. West Virginia was proclaimed a State on April 20, 1863, with the bill becoming effective sixty days later on June 20, 1863.

“West Virginia Day” became a legal holiday by Chapter 59, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 1927. (Code 2-2-1)

STATE TREE

The Sugar Maple or ACER SACCHARUM, as it is known scientifically, was made West Virginia's official tree by House Concurrent Resolution No. 12, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1949, authorizing a vote by pupils of public schools and civic organizations. It produces an excellent wood for future as well as maple syrup. A single tree is 70 to 120 feet high and produces two to three pounds of sugar when “sugared off”; has a five-lobed leaf and produces a small wing-shaped pod.

STATE BIRD

The Cardinal or RICHMONDENA CARDINALIS, as it is known scientifically, was made West Virginia's official bird by House Concurrent Resolution No. 12, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 1949, authorizing a vote by pupils of public schools and civic organizations. The male of the species is a rich scarlet with a mask and shading of black, while the young birds and females are a less brilliant color. The adult bird measures approximately eight inches long. It can be found from New York State to the Gulf of Mexico and as far west as Oklahoma.

STATE FLOWER

The RHODODENDRON MAXIMUM of “Big Laurel” was made the official State Flower of West Virginia by House Joint Resolution No. 19, adopted by the Legislature on January 29, 1903, following a recommendation by the Governor and a vote by the pupils of public schools. It is a shrub of the heath family and may be recognized by its large evergreen leaves and delicate pale pink or white bloom, mottled with either red or yellow flecks.

STATE ANIMAL

The BLACK BEAR or URSUS AMERICANUS was selected as the official State Animal of West Virginia by a poll of students, teachers and sportsmen conducted by the Department of Natural Resources in 1954-55 and officially adopted by the Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, by House Concurrent Resolution No. 6. It is the only species of bear found in the State. While commonly referred to as the “black bear” its coloring is actually deeply tinted with brown. Its habitat in the State is primarily in the eastern mountain region. A litter usually consists of one or two cubs, rarely three, each weighing about eight ounces at birth. The adult reaches an average maximum weight of 250 pounds.

STATE FISH

The BROOK TROUT was designated the State Fish by House Concurrent Resolution No. 6, adopted during the Regular Session, 1973, following a poll of sportsmen who favored the Brook Trout. The Brook Trout is a native West Virginia species.

STATE FRUIT

The GOLDEN DELICIOUS APPLE was designated as the official State Fruit by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 7, adopted by the Legislature on February 20, 1995. This apple variety was discovered by Anderson Mullins in Clay County, West Virginia, in 1905. The plain apple had been previously designated as the official State Fruit by House Concurrent Resolution No. 56, adopted March 7, 1972.

STATE BUTTERFLY

The MONARCH BUTTERFLY was declared the official butterfly of West Virginia by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11, adopted by the Legislature on March 1, 1995.

STATE SOIL

The official State Soil was declared to be MONONGAHELA SILT LOAM by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 5, adopted by the Legislature on April 2, 1997.

STATE INSECT

The HONEY BEE was declared the official insect of West Virginia by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 9, adopted by the Legislature on March 7, 2002.

Big Sandy River

Formed by the junction of Tug Fork and Levisa Fork at Fort Gay, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio at Kenova, Wayne County, West Virginia.

Cheat River

Formed by the junction of Black Fork at Parsons, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Monongahela River at Point Marion, Pennsylvania.

Coal River

Formed by the junction of the Little Coal River and Big Coal River in central part of Raleigh County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at St. Albans, Kanawha County.

Elk River

Formed in western part of Pocahontas County by the junction of Big Spring Fork and Old Field Fork. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at Charleston, Kanawha County.

Gauley River

Formed in western part of Pocahontas County by the junction of North Fork and Middle Fork. Mouth, junction with New River at Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Greenbrier River

Formed in northern part of Pocahontas County by junction of East Fork and West Fork. Mouth, junction with New River south of Hinton in Summers County.

Guyandotte River

Formed in southern part of Raleigh County by the junction of Winding Gulf and Devils Fork. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Huntington, Cabell County.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers north of Kanawha Falls in Fayette County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Point Pleasant, Mason County.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County. Mouth, junction with Ohio River in Parkersburg, Wood County.

Monongahela River

Formed by the junction of Tygart Valley and West Fork Rivers in Fairmont. Mouth, junction with the Allegheny River at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to form the Ohio River.

New River

Source in southern part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois.

Pocatalico River

Source in the southeastern part of Roane County. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River in Putnam County.

Potomac River

Formed by the junction of the North and South Branches near Green Spring, Hampshire County. Mouth, Chesapeake Bay.

North Branch Potomac River

Source near Fairfax Stone which today marks corners of Grant, Preston and Tucker counties. Mouth, junction with South Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County.

South Branch Potomac River

Source near Hightown, Highland County, Virginia. Mouth, junction with North Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County.

Tug Fork

Source in southeastern part of McDowell County. Mouth, junction with Levisa Fork to form Big Sandy River at Louisa, Kentucky.

Tygart Valley River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County. Mouth, junction with West Fork River at Fairmont to form Monongahela River.

West Fork River

Formed in western part of Upshur County by the junction of Crooked Run and Whites Camp Fork. Mouth, junction with Tygart Valley River at Fairmont to form Monongahela River.

INLAND WATERWAYS—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by Department of the Army)

Ohio River: Improvement of the Ohio River for navigation, as authorized by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of 1910, provides for a minimum channel depth of nine feet in the entire 981 miles of river by the construction of locks and dams and open channel work. The original system, completed in 1929, and major modifications completed in 1937, resulted in 46 lock and dam structures.

In 1953, a modernization and replacement program was begun, to reduce the total number of navigation projects to 20, providing higher dams, larger locks and deeper pools. Projects adjoining West Virginia include the pool of Greenup Locks and Dam, completed in 1962, between Kentucky, West Virginia and Ohio; an improvement of Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam, formerly Gallipolis Locks and Dam, near Apple Grove; Racine Locks and Dam near Letart, completed in 1970; Belleville Locks and Dam, completed in 1969; Willow Island Locks and Dam near Waverly, West Virginia, completed in 1975; Hannibal Locks and Dam, at New Martinsville, completed in 1975; Pike Island Locks and Dam, completed in 1965 near Wheeling; and New Cumberland Locks and Dam, completed in 1962 near New Cumberland.

Kanawha River, West Virginia: Three high-lift dams on the Kanawha River and the Robert C. Byrd Locks and Dam on the Ohio River provide a minimum channel depth of nine feet on the Kanawha River for 91 miles, from the mouth to the community of Deepwater. Each Kanawha River dam has twin locks, and the Kanawha Valley Power Company has a hydroelectric plant at each site. The two upstream dams, London and Marmet, were completed in 1934, Winfield Dam in 1937, and Gallipolis Dam on the Ohio River in 1937. Construction of an additional 800' x 110' main lock chamber at Winfield was completed in late 1997. Construction is underway for an additional 800' x 110' lock at Marmet.

Monongahela River, West Virginia and Pennsylvania: The existing Monongahela navigation system includes nine locks and dams, affording slack-water navigation from Pittsburgh to above Fairmont, West Virginia, a distance of 128.7 miles. The controlling depth is nine feet and the navigable width varies from 250 feet in the upper reach to practically the full width at the mouth of the River.

Modernization of the Upper Monongahela River was completed with the construction of the Morgantown, Hildebrand and Opokiska Locks and Dams. In the middle portion of the river, the Maxwell Locks and Dam are the reconstruction of Dam No. 4 combined to eliminate Locks and Dams 5 and 6. Replacement of Lock and Dam 7 and Lock 8 is under way and will complete the modernization program in the upper two thirds of the river.

MULTIPLE-PURPOSE LAKES—FEDERAL

(Data furnished by Department of the Army)

Completed Projects:

Beech Fork Lake: Creation of a lake on Beech Fork of Twelvepole Creek, near Huntington, was authorized by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1962. Construction of the dam was completed in February 1977. Additional public use development, some in conjunction with a proposed State lodge complex, remains to be accomplished. The dam is an earth fill, with a maximum height of 86 feet and a top length of 1,000 feet. The lake controls the runoff from a drainage area of 78 square miles. A minimum pool with a surface area of 720 acres is maintained during the summer for recreation purposes. The remaining capacity is used for flood control.

Bluestone Lake: Bluestone Lake, located on New River near Hinton, was authorized by presidential executive order in 1935 and approved by Congress in the Flood Control Acts of 1936 and 1938. Construction of the project was begun early in 1941, suspended in 1942 because of the war emergency, resumed in 1946, and completed for operational purposes in 1949. The dam, of concrete construction, is 165 feet high and 2,048 feet long. The lake regulates the runoff of a drainage area of 4,565 square miles. During periods of low and normal flows in New River, the elevation of the lake varies about four feet, with a minimum pool 9.5 miles in length and an area of 1,800 acres. The remaining capacity is reserved for the impoundment of floodflows. Work is ongoing to bring the dam up to current safety standards by raising the dam an additional eight feet, installing anchors and adding blocks for stability. Other activities include construction of a multi-level intake tower to pass drift and debris through the dam as part of the Bluestone Drift and Debris Management Study.

Burnsville Lake: Construction of the Burnsville Lake project was begun in the summer of 1972 and the dam was completed in September 1976. The project controls the runoff from a drainage area of 165 square miles. The dam is a rockfill embankment rising 84.5 feet above the streambed. Top elevation is 839 feet above sea level, and the crest length 1,400 feet. A gated spillway is located in the left abutment. The outlet works are located in the spillway section. The minimum pool is maintained at elevation 776 with a surface area of 550 acres. The summer pool is at elevation 789 and has a surface area of 968 acres. The flood control pool is at elevation 825 with a surface area of 1,900 acres.

East Lynn Lake: East Lynn Lake, located on East Fork at Twelvepole Creek, was authorized by Congress in the 1938 Flood Control Act. Construction of the dam was completed in 1972. The dam is an earthfill structure with a maximum height of 113 feet and a crest length of 652 feet. The lake controls the runoff from a drainage area of 133 square miles. A minimum pool with a surface area of 823 acres is maintained during the winter, while the higher summer pool has a surface area of 1,005 acres. The remaining storage is for flood control.

Jennings Randolph Lake: The Bloomington Dam project (Jennings Randolph Lake) was authorized by Congress in 1962 as a unit of the comprehensive water resource development plan for the Potomac River basin. The damsite is in Mineral County, West Virginia, and Garrett County, Maryland, on North Branch Potomac River about eight miles upstream from the mouth of Savage River. The dam is a rolled earth and rockfill structure with a maximum height of 296 feet and a top length of 2,130 feet. The lake will control runoff from a drainage area of 263 square miles. The project provides low-flow augmentation, water quality control, flood control, water supply and recreation. Construction was begun in 1971 and was completed in 1981.

R. D. Bailey Lake: The R. D. Bailey Lake is located on Guyandotte River in Wyoming County. The dam was dedicated in August 1980. The dam is 310 feet high and with a top length of 1,370 feet. A minimum pool with a surface area of 440 acres is maintained in the winter months. A seasonal pool for recreation and water quality control with a surface area of 630 acres is maintained during the summer. The remaining storage capacity is for flood control.

Stonewall Jackson Lake: The Stonewall Jackson Lake project was authorized by the Flood Control Act of 1966 for the purposes of flood control, water quality control, water supply and recreation. The project, benefiting primarily the West Fork and upper Monongahela River valleys, is a unit in the comprehensive plan for flood control in the Ohio River basin; to improve water quality in the West Fork, Monongahela and Ohio Rivers; to provide storage for water supply; and for general and fish and wildlife recreation. The dam was completed in late 1986. It is located on West Fork River at Brownsville, Lewis County. The maximum summer pool for water quality control, water supply and recreation will be at elevation 1,072 feet above sea level, with a surface area of 2,650 acres. The lake opened in 1990.

Summersville Lake: Built between 1960 and 1966, Summersville Lake is situated on Gauley River near Summersville. The dam is a rockfill type, with a maximum height of 390 feet and a top length of 2,280 feet. The drainage area above the dam is 803 square miles. It provides a maximum capacity of 390,800 acre-feet of storage for flood water, of which 163,400 acre-feet may be used for low-flow augmentation in the Kanawha River in summer. The summer recreation pool is 13.7 miles long and 2,723 acres in area. Fall drawdown provides optimum whitewater release during September and October.

Sutton Lake: Sutton Lake, located on the Elk River near Sutton, was authorized by Congress in the Flood Control Act of 1938. Work on the dam started in 1956. Construction was completed in 1961. The dam is of concrete, 210 feet high and 1,178 feet long. The lake controls the runoff from a drainage area of 537 square miles. A minimum pool of 5.9 miles in length, with a surface area of 270 acres is maintained during the winter. A seasonal pool with a maximum length of 14.5 miles, surface area of 1,520 acres is maintained for low-flow augmentation and recreation. The remaining capacity is utilized for flood control storage.

Tygart Lake: Tygart Dam, on the Tygart Valley River 2.25 miles upstream from Grafton, was authorized by the Public Works Administration in 1934 and approved by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of 1935. The concrete gravity dam is 1,921 feet in length at the top and rises 230 feet above the riverbed. It is operated as a unit in the reservoir system for the protection of Pittsburgh and the Monongahela and Upper Ohio River valleys. In addition to flood control, Tygart Lake provides for low-water discharge regulation by the gradual release of stored spring flood waters during the summer-fall period to assure a river flow of 340 cubic feet per second at Lock and Dam No. 8 on the Monongahela River. Storage of about 100,000 acre-feet of water is allotted for this purpose. The potential of developing hydro power at the project is currently being studied.

Local Flood Protection Projects:

All completed major flood protection projects in West Virginia, except at Ridgeley, are units in the comprehensive plan for flood control in the Ohio River basin. The local protection projects have been constructed so that, acting alone, they provide a degree of flood protection which in most places is equal to protection against the maximum flood of record in the project localities. Each locality along the Ohio River with local protective works also receives additional protection from a coordinated system of upstream dams designed to reduce flood flows on the Ohio River and to contribute to the reduction of floods on the lower Mississippi River.

Completed lake and local flood protection projects in West Virginia have already made a major contribution toward reduction of flood damages; flood control benefits from their operation through September 1998 have exceeded \$3.4 billion.

Ohio River Projects: Local protection works have been completed for Ceredo-Kenova, Huntington, Parkersburg and Point Pleasant. The projects consist of concrete walls and earth levees to prevent entrance of flood waters, pumping stations to discharge sewage and internal drainage during flood periods, and gated openings to permit unobstructed movement to traffic during normal (non-flood) river conditions. Operation and maintenance are local responsibilities.

Buckhannon LPP: A project in the vicinity of Buckhannon completed in 1969 provides channel improvement along Buckhannon River for 4.6 miles.

Elkins LPP: The principal elements are a cutoff channel and dikes, located about 1.5 miles above the city, which divert floodflows from the loop of Tygart Valley River on which Elkins is located. The project was completed in 1949 and is unique in that the Federal Government has the responsibility for maintaining the dimension features of the improvement.

Princeton LPP: Principal features of the protection works are 3.9 miles of channel improvement along Brush Creek. The project was completed in 1961.

East Rainelle LPP: The project consists of 4.3 miles of channel improvement on Meadow River and Sewell and Boggs creeks. The project was completed in 1962.

Ridgeley, West Virginia and Cumberland, Maryland: Ridgeley, in Mineral County, is located on the south bank of North Branch Potomac River, opposite Cumberland, Maryland. Protective works for these communities include about 3.3 miles of channel improvements on North Branch and its tributary, Wills Creek, supplemented by a system of earth levees and concrete floodwalls. The project includes three pumping stations with related interior drainage facilities and eight pressure conduits totaling 11,800 feet in length. An industrial watersupply dam, three highway bridges and a railroad bridge were reconstructed. The project was completed in 1959. Additional channel improvement on North Branch Potomac River was completed in 1964.

Williamson LPP: The business section of Williamson is protected by a project consisting of 4,100 feet of floodwall, 2 pumping stations and 5 gated closures completed in 1992. The West Williamson floodwall, completed in 1990, consists of 6,240 feet of floodwall, a pumping station and 2 gated closures.

Matewan LPP: The business section of Matewan is protected by the 2,650-foot floodwall. The project has one pump station and seven gated structures. The project was completed in 1997. The project also included a 30-lot housing site along Mate Creek and a five-acre undeveloped area created by placing fill in low areas. The new housing and commercial areas are within the area protected by the floodwall.

Barboursville Bank Protection Project: The project consisted of repairing and restoring a bank of Guyandotte River in the vicinity of Water Street in Barboursville. The work consisted of placing dumped rockfill on the right bank of the river for the prevention of erosion and channel excavation on the opposite bank. Construction was completed in 1965.

Tug Fork of Big Sandy River: Under authority of Section 202 of the Energy and Water Development Appropriation Act of 1981 (PL 96-367), the Corps was directed to provide flood protection measures to communities along the Tug Fork of the Big Sandy River. Local protection projects are proposed, in progress or completed at several West Virginia communities along the Tug Fork including Williamson and Matewan. In addition to floodwall projects, the protection measures include nonstructural alternatives such as permanent evacuation of the floodplain to flood-safe subdivisions and flood-proofing of floodplain structures by raising-in-place. Nonstructural projects are underway in Mingo, Wayne and McDowell counties.

Local Protection Work Under Special Continuing Authority: Small flood control projects under authority provided to the Corps of Engineers by Section 205 of the Flood Control Act of 1948 include channel improvement work completed along North Branch Potomac River at Blaine and Bayard and along Middle Fork Mud River in the Griffithsville-Yawkey area.

Projects under the authority provided to the Corps of Engineers to snag and clear streams for flood control by Section 208 of the Flood Control Act of 1954 include projects completed at Berwind on Dry Fork, a tributary of Tug Fork of Big Sandy River; Bramwell and Montcalm on Bluestone River; Cairo on North Fork Hughes River; Colliers on Harmon Creek; Huntington on Fourpole Creek; Pine Grove on Fishing Creek; Jacksonburg and Smithfield on South Fork Fishing Creek; Richwood on Cherry River; Stonewood and Nutter Fort on Elk Creek; West Virginia Union on Middle Island Creek; West-on on Polk Creek and Stonecoal Creek; Wyatt on Bingamon Creek; Pax on Paint Creek and Ripley on Mill Creek.

Projects under authority provided to the Corps of Engineers for streambank protection by Section 14 of the Flood Control Act of 1946, include projects completed at Warwood, Chester, Sistersville, Williamstown, Parkersburg, New Haven and Point Pleasant along the Ohio River, on the Kanawha River at Chesapeake and Dunbar, and on the Little Kanawha River at Glenville.

STATE PARKS AND FORESTS

WEST VIRGINIA'S RECREATION PARADISE

West Virginia's State Park and Forest System is a living legacy of recreation, cultural, and vacation opportunities for all citizens and for growing numbers of vacationers from other states. For the past 73 years, the system has been maintained and expanded to provide quality recreation that our citizens appreciate as a major ingredient of the "good life."

The system began in 1929 with the establishment of the site of a major state Civil War engagement, Droop Mountain, as the first state park area. Shortly afterwards, during the years of the Great Depression, major emphasis was placed on creation of a system of parks and vacation lands in the Mountain State. By the mid-1930's parks such as Cacapon, Lost River, Babcock, Holly River, and Watoga were begun. The development of vacation cabins, roads, trails, lakes and swimming pools was undertaken by the state, in cooperation with the old Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and the National Park Service. It was the beginning of the fine system that has continued to rank at the top nationally among state park facilities.

Vacation cabins became one of the most popular attractions from the first. To this day, most park and forest cabins are booked to capacity months before the traditional summer vacation season. Now, with the expansion of winter sports facilities, longer vacation periods, and public awareness of a four-season concept of recreation, cabins are filled at many parks year-round. Cabins, whether the old-time log style or of modern construction, provide quality family outdoor lodging as well as the perfect choice for those persons on a budget.

The greatest period of demand for recreational facilities followed World War II. While most states had the opportunity of developing a basic park system in the 1930's, only a very few, among them West Virginia, chose to expand and develop to meet the growing demand for more parks, more acres, and more facilities for their accommodation.

By the mid-1950's, the parks boasted of year-round public facilities, with the completion of dozens of modern cabins, and lodges at Blackwater Falls and Cacapon state parks. Funds to build these facilities came from the state's first revenue bond program, whereby money was borrowed for construction and repaid over a score of years from earnings through public rental.

Blackwater Falls State Park is a typical example. The region was ravaged in the early 1900's by logging, then by a series of disastrous forest fires, and further by exploitation and strip mining which occurred during the unregulated demand for coal during World War II. The lodge and 25 modern cabins formed the nucleus of a major state park, which preserved for all time the rich natural beauty of a portion of the deep gorge of Blackwater River, the famous falls of which are a natural landmark in West Virginia, and provided miles of trails for hiking and riding. By 1970, the park was one of the leading year-round facilities in the entire park system.

In the early 1960's the older, but highly popular, log vacation cabins throughout the park system which were largely constructed by hand as the final example of mountain skill at stonemasonry and log home building were totally remodeled. The biggest addition at this time was the construction of modern kitchens. Many state forest cabins were also upgraded in a similar manner, but at two forests—Kumbrabow and Seneca—the older facilities were left intact for those family visitors who wanted to share the traditional mountain heritage of kerosene lighting and water pumped from a well.

By 1963, it was evident that the emergence of the Appalachian region as a vacationland was only a matter of time. Demands on the public and private sector of recreation were unprecedented, but development had not occurred. Accordingly, an agreement was reached between the federal and state governments for a demonstration program. The multi-million dollar program was designed, in part, to demonstrate to the private sector that recreation was a major future source of jobs, and that this industry would eventually emerge as a major factor in the State's highlands region. The "State Parks for the 1970's" program, as it was termed, eventually added three new state parks to the system and provided for major expansion to three others.

By 1968, a major expansion program was completed at the Cass Scenic Railroad. This old logging line, remnant of thousands of miles of such railway which crisscrossed the mountains, became a state park facility in 1961. From 1963 through 1967 it operated only on a four-mile segment. Beginning in 1968, as a result of renovation of trackage, the full 11 mile line to the area of Bald Knob (West Virginia's second highest point) was opened to public use. Additional public facilities included a 300-car parking lot. Funds to accomplish this project were borrowed and repaid through income from the sale

of tickets to ride the old logging trains. Now the entire town of Cass is managed by the state, and 13 of the company houses have been restored and made into guest cabins.

Hawks Nest, a spectacular overlook high atop the famed New River Gorge, has long been one of the Mountain State's most popular park attractions. Under the "State Parks for the 1970's" program this park was greatly expanded. New facilities include a 30-room lodge overlooking the canyon, new overlook at Lovers' Leap, a marina and boat dock on the lake at the bottom of the deep chasm, and a unique aerial cable tramway to carry visitors from the rim to the bottom of the gorge.

Pipestem Resort State Park has become one of the leading state park recreational attractions in eastern America. Breathtaking in almost every dimension, Pipestem is set along a rolling plateau overlooking the rugged and undeveloped Bluestone River Gorge near Hinton and Princeton.

The park features two comfortable lodges—the 113-room McKeever Lodge perched on the edge of the river canyon and Mountain Creek Lodge, a secluded 30-room facility at the bottom of the deep gorge. The Mountain Creek facility is accessible *only* via the park's canyon aerial tramway system which sweeps over a thousand feet down into the valley from the visitor center. Conference facilities for 600 people are available at the McKeever Lodge.

Other recreational facilities include a challenging 18-hole championship golf course and an enjoyable par-3 course. Clubhouse facilities rank second to none and highlight golf as a major attraction of state parks.

The visitor center, also features a native West Virginia arts and crafts demonstration and sales center which is a major outlet for Appalachian crafts. Nearby is a 550-seat outdoor amphitheater where outdoor drama and music concerts are performed regularly, Olympic-size outdoor swimming pool, indoor swimming and saunas, and indoor recreation rooms.

Remaining major facilities include an overlook atop Pipestem Knob, highest peak of the region, an 82-unit, completely equipped campground, archery range, nature center, horse riding stable and the park information and headquarters building.

Twin Falls Resort, near Mullens and Pineville, provides year-round recreation in the state's southern highlands for the first time. The park features a 20-room guest lodge and 13 comfortable, heated guest cottages for year-round occupancy. Other highlights are an 18-hole regulation golf course, archery and a recreation center building that includes a large swimming pool.

Canaan Valley Resort, located in a deep, high mountain valley near Blackwater Falls State Park, is one of the premier winter sports centers in the east. The valley, which exceeds 3000 feet in average elevation, is surrounded by 4000-4500 foot high mountain peaks.

Accommodations available at Canaan Valley include a 250-room lodge, with deluxe conference center which offers a wide variety of meeting rooms, indoor pool and fitness area, restaurant with a seating capacity of 500 and gift shop, 23 modern cabins, and 34 deluxe campsites. The lodge overlooks the scenic valley and the park's 18-hole championship golf course.

The park's winter sports center includes miles of ski trails, most serviced by snow-making equipment. Another very popular facility located at the ski area is a tube park. One quad chair and two triple chair ski lifts are operated all winter and also in summertime as a scenic tourist attraction. The ski center includes a retail shop, restaurant, skiers' pub, lounge, and other public facilities.

West Virginia state parks provide a varied and widespread set of attractions statewide. The Cacapon Resort State Park 18-hole championship golf course is attracting thousands of golfers to this fine year-round eastern panhandle attraction. Eight year-round guest cabins, more campsites and handicapped hiking trails are available at North Bend, the State's major Ohio Valley parkland.

Of historical interest is the reconstruction of a grist mill on Glade Creek at Babcock State Park. The mill, completed in 1976, was created by combining parts and pieces from several old mills which once dotted the state. The basic structure of the mill, originally the Stoney Creek Grist Mill, was moved to Babcock from a spot near Campbelltown, Pocahontas County. From the Spring Run Grist mill near Petersburg, Grant County, the overshot water wheel was acquired; several other parts came from the Roaring Creek Grist Mill near Onego, Pendleton County. Cornmeal and buckwheat flour are ground at the Glade Creek Mill and may be purchased there.

West Virginia frontier life of the late 1700's is the main attraction at Prickett's Fort State Park. The fort was reconstructed to look as it was believed to have looked in 1774, the date of its original comple-

tion. There are 16 one-room cabins, a meeting hall and storehouse within the fort, demonstrating the lifestyle of the settlers who relied upon the security of its sturdy walls to protect them from Indians. Visitors can view demonstrations of 18th Century crafts including open hearth cookery and baking; carding, spinning and weaving of wool; basket making, candle dipping and wood lye soap making; horn and leatherworking; gunsmithing, blacksmithing and coopering.

Other unique features of the park system are the Greenbrier River Trail and the North Bend Rail Trail. Though not actually referred to as a state park, the 1980 session of the West Virginia Legislature designated an abandoned rail-line of the Chesapeake and Ohio System, the Greenbrier River Trail, and allowed the Division of Parks and Recreation to acquire the land for the purpose of developing a hiking-biking trail. The rails and ties were removed, and 76 miles of the trail resurfaced with finely crushed limestone. As well as for backpacking and biking, the trail may be used as access to the Greenbrier River by fishermen and canoers, and as a cross-country ski trail in the winter. Motorized vehicles are not allowed. Camping areas, lean-to-shelters, water and sanitary facilities, and interpretive signing are being developed. The North Bend Rail Trail, designated in 1990, covers 77 miles from Parkersburg in Wood County to Wilsonburg in Harrison County.

By the end of 1999, another major phase of state park development was completed. This included new conference centers at Pipestem, Cacapon, and Blackwater Falls, 22 new cabins systemwide; three new swimming pools; new utility infrastructure; substantial building modifications to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act; lake and pond sediment removal, dam repairs, and many other projects. All of this was financed by a \$44,000,000 bond sale. In addition, a new conference center funded from this bond sale for Chief Logan State Park was completed in 2002.

Stonewall Jackson Lake is one of the newest entries into the West Virginia State Park system. Upon full completion, this park will be a major vacation complex. The Arnold Palmer signature golf course, lodge/conference complex, and 10 cabins were open by 2002 and complemented the already present 374-slip marina, houseboat and pontoon rentals, boat rentals, snack bar/bait shop, hiking trails, picnic shelter and 34-site campground.

West Virginia's recreation system is a source of pride and enjoyment to West Virginians and other visitors. Millions of tourists visit West Virginia parks and forests each year for quality family recreation in the scenic outdoors.

DIRECTORY OF STATE PARKS

AUDRA

(Barbour County) A beautifully wooded tract along a fine boulder strewn stream. Picnicking facilities, swimming, bathhouse, refreshment stand, children's playground, 65-site campground, fishing and hiking trails. Acreage, 355. Post Office, Buckhannon.

BABCOCK

(Fayette County) On U.S. Route 19, 4 miles south of U.S. 60. Adjacent to New River Canyon. Twenty-eight cabins and 51 campsites. Features include: Reconstructed grist mill on Glade Creek featuring freshly ground cornmeal and buckwheat flour; swimming pool, picnic area, fishing, trails, and scenic overlooks; children's playground, tennis, volleyball, badminton, riding stables, horseshoe pits. Acreage, 4,127. Post Office, Clifftop.

BEARTOWN

This natural area, just off U.S. 219 on the Pocahontas-Greenbrier County border, is unique due to its outstanding rock formations. Boardwalks and trails are available for the purpose of self-guided tours. Acreage, 110.

BEECH FORK

(Cabell County) Beech Fork offers 275 campsites with electric hookups, picnicking, trails, sports fields, game courts. Six cabins, and a swimming pool. A visitor's center/park headquarters is located at the Bowen entrance to greet park guests. Acreage, 3,981. Post Office, Barbourville.

BERKELEY SPRINGS

(Morgan County) Berkeley Springs State Park is located in the Town of Bath near Berkeley Springs. It offers baths which utilize the warm and medicinal water of Berkeley Springs as well as therapeutic massage. History of the colonies mentioned the qualities of the water as early as 1736, and prior to that, American Indians, who were subject to rheumatism knew of its medicinal qualities and called it the "healing waters". It was the first health and pleasure resort in the colonies. The temperature of the spring water is 74.3 degrees and is invariable.

The springs have been expanded to include a modern open air swimming pool with dressing facilities, and bathhouse with Roman Baths. For the convenience of patrons, the bathhouse is open seven days a week the year round. There are hotel, motel, and restaurant facilities in the surrounding area for those who visit Berkeley Springs and, in particular, nearby Cacapon Resort State Park.

George Washington and Lord Fairfax were among the many famous personalities who visited the resort during its more than 230 years of history. Listed in the National Park Service Register of Historic Places. Acreage, 4. Post Office, Berkeley Springs.

BLACKWATER FALLS

(Tucker County) Located one mile west of Davis off W. Va. Route 32. Contains the State's finest waterfalls and scenic canyon. Overlook development at falls and along canyon rim, includes paved level "Gentle Trail" for use by disabled, wheelchair-bound and elderly visitors and the famous Lindy Point vista for hikers. Excellent picnic facilities. Vacation amenities include 26 cabins and 55-room lodge, expanded conference facilities accommodating 225 guests, indoor pool and sauna available year-round and a fitness center. Facilities: Lake swimming, boating, horseback riding, hiking trails, 65-site campground, playgrounds, game courts, and trading post. Catch and release trout fishing can be found in the canyon. Golf is played at nearby Canaan Valley Resort State Park. Elevation, 2,500 to 3,200 feet. Acreage, 2,188. Post Office, Davis.

BLANNERHASSETT ISLAND

(Wood County) Blennerhassett Island Historical State Park is located at Parkersburg, West Virginia, and is divided into two facilities: One, a four-story museum located at Second and Juliana Streets, which houses relics ranging from the prehistoric Indian era to the mid twentieth century; and two, the 500-acre Blennerhassett Island located in the Ohio River approximately 1.8 miles west of Parkersburg. Visitors are taken to the Island by sternwheelers May through October to see the reconstructed

Blennerhassett Mansion (originally built 1800 and burned 1811) famous as the headquarters of Aaron Burr's 1806-07 military expedition to the Southwest. Also, on the Island are horsedrawn wagon rides, bicycle rental, tours of the Blennerhassett Mansion, gift shop, snack bar and picnic facilities. Acreage, 500. Post Office, Parkersburg.

BLUESTONE

(Summers County) Located near Hinton on the Bluestone Reservoir. Offers excellent boating and fishing. Facilities include 26 vacation cabins, 87 campsites, boat docks, game courts and swimming pool. Golf at nearby Pipestem Resort State Park. Acreage, 2,155. Post Office, Hinton.

CACAPON RESORT

(Morgan County) located 10 miles south of Berkeley Springs. 32 cabins, 49-room lodge with restaurant and expanded conference facilities accommodating 250 guests. Facilities: Supervised lake swimming, boating, fishing, picnic areas, horseback riding, 18-hole golf course with proshop and snack bar, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, restaurant. Elevation, 825 to 2,300. Acreage, 6,115. Post Office, Berkeley Springs.

CAMP CREEK

(Mercer County) Located between Princeton and Beckley, just off U.S. 19 and 21, via I-77 (the West Virginia Turnpike). Camp Creek offers 37 tent and trailer campsites. Facilities: Tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and toilet facilities. Other features include picnic shelters, children's playgrounds, scenic hiking trails, and games. Wild turkey may be found along with many other species of game in the adjacent forest acreage and Camp Creek is stocked with trout in the spring. Acreage, 5,300. Post Office, Camp Creek.

CANAAN VALLEY RESORT

(Tucker County) Canaan Valley located south of Davis on W. Va. Route 32. 250-room lodge, 23 modern cabins. The first major ski facility in the state, features three chairlifts, tube park, and delivers a full array of skier services from dining for 500 people to ski rental and lessons. Canaan Valley also features an 18-hole golf course with snack bar and gift shop, a heated swimming pool, six lighted tennis courts, a lighted ice skating rink, hiking trails, fishing, a 34-unit campground, conference center, indoor pool and fitness area, and a restaurant. Nearby Blackwater Falls State Park offers additional attractions. Acreage, 6,015. Post Office, Davis.

CARNIFEX FERRY BATTLEFIELD

(Nicholas County) Situated 12 miles southwest of Summersville on State Route 129. Picnicking facilities, playground for children, museum, and speaker's stand arrangements for commemorative gatherings. Area noteworthy as a Civil War battlefield. Acreage, 156. Post Office, Summersville.

CASS SCENIC RAILROAD

(Pocahontas County) Features an 11-mile scenic trip up Back Allegheny Mountain to Bald Knob, the second highest point in the state at 4,842 feet, aboard on old time logging train powered by standard gauge, Shay steam locomotives that were used in early logging days. Accommodations include 13 historic cottages, restaurant, souvenir shops, museums, picnicking, scenic overlook, nature trails, nearby camping. Snowshoe ski resort is just a few miles away. Acreage, 1,089. Post Office, Cass.

CATHEDRAL

(Preston County) On U.S. 50 near Aurora. Purchased in 1942. Hiking trails, picnicking. This park preserves a small sample of the splendid virgin forest which once dominated most of West Virginia. The "Centennial Hemlock", the largest of its species found in West Virginia, can be seen there. Elevation, 2,600 feet. Acreage, 132. Post Office, Aurora. Designated by the National Park Service as a Natural History Landmark.

CEDAR CREEK

(Gilmer County) Leave U.S. 33 at the Junction with W. Va. secondary Route 17, 3 miles south of Glenville. Follow Route 17 for 4 miles to park entrance. Picnicking, 48-site campground, swimming, tennis, playground, fishing, one-room school house museum, swimming pool and recreation building. Construction of a 12- to 14-site campground addition is to begin in 2003. Acreage, 2,443. Post Office, Route 1, Glenville.

CHIEF LOGAN

(Logan County) A 25-site campground is featured along with picnicking, miniature golf, riding stable, wildlife exhibit, hiking trails, swimming pool with waterslide and restaurant. Home to "Aracoma Story" outdoor drama. A 600-seat conference center and restaurant was opened in 2002. A lodge is planned for this park. Acreage, 3,303. Post Office, Logan.

DROOP MOUNTAIN BATTLEFIELD

(Pocahontas County) Scene of the State's largest Civil War engagement. On U.S. 219 between Marlinton and Lewisburg. Facilities: Picnic area, trails, scenic overlooks. Acreage, 287. Post Office, Hillsboro.

GRAVE CREEK MOUND

(Marshall County) Located in Moundsville, the National Historic Landmark is the most famous and certainly the largest of the adena burial mounds. Constructed in successive stages from about 250-150 B.C., the mound is 69 feet high with a diameter of 295 feet, and must have been a massive undertaking as the total effort required the movement of over 60,000 tons of earth. Artifacts and exhibits interpreting the lifestyle of the Adena people are displayed in the Delf Norona Museum adjacent to the 2,000 year old mound. Other facilities in the museum include a gift shop and theater. Acreage, 7. Post Office, Moundsville. Grave Creek Mound is operated by the West Virginia Division of Culture and History.

HAWKS NEST

(Fayette County) On U.S. 60 (The Midland Trail) 1½ miles west of Ansted; 31-room lodge, tennis courts and swimming pool; aerial tramway to New River and the marina below; picnic area with fireplaces and tables; picnic shelter, museum, trails; and scenic overlook with a very splendid view of the New River Gorge. A seasonal Christmas lights display can also be seen. A nearby privately owned 9-hole golf course is operated by the park under a lease arrangement. Elevation, 670 to 1,530 feet. Acreage, 276. Post Office, Ansted.

HOLLY RIVER

(Webster County) On W. Va. 20 near Hacker Valley. Accommodations include 10 cabins and 88 campsites with electric. Other features are a swimming pool, fishing, picnic area, children's playground, trails with scenic overlooks and waterfalls, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, tennis, lawn games, restaurant and activities building. Acreage, 8,292. Post Office, Hacker Valley.

LITTLE BEAVER

(Raleigh County) Formerly a county recreation area with a small boating and swimming lake, Little Beaver was acquired in 1971 as a state park facility. Facilities: Boating, swimming, activities building, fishing, hiking trails, fitness trail, picnicking and Christmas light display. A campground is being built and is projected to open by 2004. Acreage, 562. Post Office, Beaver.

LOST RIVER

(Hardy County) Located 4 miles west of W. Va. 259 at Mathias. Twenty-six cabins. Facilities: Swimming pool, picnic areas, horseback riding, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, tennis, volleyball, horseshoes, archery, lawn games, recreation building and the historic Lee Cabin. Acreage, 3,712. Post Office, Mathias.

MONCOVE LAKE

(Monroe County) Formerly a portion of Moncove Lake Wildlife Management Area, the 50-unit campground and recreational facilities were designated a state park by the 1991 West Virginia Legislature. A picturesque 144-acre lake surrounded by evergreens provides the backdrop for a swimming pool and bathhouse, fishing and rental paddle and rowboats. Acreage, 896. Post Office, Gap Mills.

NORTH BEND

(Ritchie County) Located between Cornwallis and Harrisville. A 29-room lodge with a restaurant and meeting rooms provides excellent accommodations. Eight modern cottages. Other features: 73 campsites, swimming pool, tennis, miniature golf, picnic area, play equipment, trails, fishing and

interpretive trail. By 2004 the adjacent North Fork of Hughes Lake and a new campground will be added to the park's major recreational attractions. Acreage, 1,405. Post Office, Cairo.

PINNACLE ROCK

(Mercer County) This day-use park is located along U.S. 52 about 5 miles northwest of Bluefield. Picnicking facilities, shelter, drinking water and a lake of 12 acres can be found. Area noted for the rock outcrops which jut from this mountain top. Acreage, 364. Post Office, Bluefield.

PIPESTEM RESORT

(Summers and Mercer Counties) A major vacation state park resort just off W. Va. 20 between Hinton and Athens. In operation year-round, this park has two lodges with 143 rental units, meeting space, dining rooms, lounges and many other fine features including a 650-seat convention center. There are 26 modern cottages, 82 campsites, an 18-hole championship golf course, a 9-hole par-three golf course, tennis courts, riding stables, boating, fishing, swimming, an amphitheater, craft center, nature center, daycare center and year-round nature/recreation program. A seasonal aerial tramway is in operation from the upper rim of Bluestone canyon to the valley floor, a vertical drop of approximately 1,200 feet. Acreage, 4,023. Post Office, Pipestem.

PRICKETT'S FORT

(Marion County) Route 3, Fairmont, West Virginia, near Fairview. This historical area is located on the site of one of the early forts in West Virginia. Features include: Reconstructed fort, museum, exhibits, arts and crafts, demonstrations and picnicking facilities. As a result of the Opekiska Dam on the Monongahela River, an embayment was formed on Prickett's Creek that forms an excellent access by boat to the Monongahela River. There is a boat launching and docking site in the embayment. Acreage, 188. Post Office, Fairmont.

STONEWALL JACKSON LAKE

(Lewis County) The state's newest park is still under development to full resort park status. An 18-hole Arnold Palmer golf course was opened on June 1, 2002. Ten (10) modern cottages were opened in the fall of 2001. A new lodge with 186 rooms, conference facilities, spa, indoor/outdoor pool and hot tubs, and gourmet dining facilities was opened in the fall of 2002. A 34-unit campground and 374-slip marina are open and fully operable. Other facilities include hiking and fitness trails, snack bar/bait shop, boat rentals, houseboat rentals, launching ramp, fishing pier accessible to the physically impaired, and picnicking. Acreage, 2,000+. Post Office, Roanoke.

TOMLINSON RUN

(Hancock County) On W. Va. 2, park entrance lies one mile northeast of New Manchester. Picnic tables, fireplaces, modern sanitary facilities, group camp, 30-acre lake, swimming pool, water slide, and bathhouse, boating, fishing, miniature golf, rent-a-tent camping and a 54-site campground. Acreage, 1,399. Post Office, New Manchester.

TU-ENDIE-WEI STATE PARK

(Mason County) Point Pleasant, Historical marker. The Mansion House Museum has been preserved in its original form and now contains many relics of the Revolutionary era. Park is located at the confluence of the Kanawha and Ohio rivers. Acreage, 4.

TWIN FALLS RESORT

(Wyoming County) Near Pineville and Mullens. The park has 14 modern cottages, lodge with 20 guest rooms, conference rooms, dining room. There is an 18-hole golf course, golf clubhouse, swimming pool, tennis courts, a reconstructed pioneer homestead, trails, 50 campsites and picnic grounds. Acreage, 3,776. Post Office, Mullens.

TYGART LAKE

(Barbour and Taylor Counties) Located on Tygart River Reservoir about 5 miles south of Grafton. Eleven modern cabins, 40 campsites. Twenty-room lodge, lake swimming, picnicking, marina, gift shop, restaurant, boating, fishing, game courts, nearby golf course. Acreage, 2,134. Post Office, Grafton.

VALLEY FALLS

(Marion and Taylor Counties) Located between Fairmont and Grafton at the Great Falls on the Tygart Valley River, provides day use recreation. Facilities include picnicking, fishing, playground and hiking trails. Acreage, 1,145. Post Office, Fairmont.

WATOGA

(Pocahontas County) Located 10 miles south of Huntersville. Has an 11-acre lake. Thirty-five cabins. Eighty-eight campsites. Facilities: Swimming pool, boating, fishing, picnic areas, horseback riding, children's playground, trails, scenic overlooks, games courts, tennis, restaurant. Acreage, 10,100. Post Office, Marlinton.

WATTERS SMITH MEMORIAL

(Harrison County) Located between Lost Creek and West Milford. Day use only. Facilities: Picnicking, children's playground, game courts, swimming and a pioneer farm and museum. Acreage, 532. Post Office, Route 1, Lost Creek.

FAIRFAX STONE HISTORICAL MONUMENT

(Grant and Tucker Counties) Located on the Grant and Tucker County line. Historical marker. One of the most noted landmarks in West Virginia, which marked the western boundary of the Lord Fairfax estate and which played an important part in determining the final state boundary. Acreage, 4.

GREENBRIER RIVER TRAIL

(Greenbrier and Pocahontas Counties) Although not actually referred to as a state park, this trail is an important part of the park system. Originally a part of the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad system, this 76 mile portion has been turned into a trail running from North Caldwell to Cass, West Virginia. Other uses of the trail include bicycling, backpacking, hiking, horseback riding, access for fishermen and canoers, and cross-country skiing in winter. Camping sites, water and sanitary facilities are available. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the trail which has now achieved Federal Millennium Legacy status. Acreage, 936. Post Office, Caldwell.

NORTH BEND RAIL TRAIL

(Wood, Ritchie, Doddridge and Harrison Counties) Adjacent to North Bend State Park, this trail affords exciting hiking, biking and equestrian opportunities to the outdoor enthusiast. Stretching 72 miles from Parkersburg in Wood County to Wilsonburg in Harrison County, this scenic trail passes by several quaint towns, through 12 tunnels and over 32 bridges on its way. Formerly an abandoned spur of the CSX system, the trail is also a part of the 5,500-mile, coast-to-coast American Discovery Trail and is being extended eastward to Clarksburg.

DIRECTORY OF STATE FORESTS

CABWAYLINGO

(Wayne County) Located on Twelpepole Creek in Wayne County, 25 miles south of the city of Wayne. Facilities include 14 vacation cabins, campground, children's playground, hiking, picnicking, biking, swimming pool, game courts and a 100-person group camp. Hunting and fishing is available during regular seasons. Acreage, 8,123. Post Office, Dunlow.

CALVIN PRICE

(Pocahontas-Greenbrier Counties) Located 9 miles south of Huntersville, adjoining Watoga State Park. Cal Price State Forest is a primitive area utilized mainly by sportsmen. Facilities: primitive campground. The forest is famous for excellent hunting of turkey, deer and bear; and for the fishing in the Greenbrier River which forms the forest's western boundary. Acreage, 9,482. Post Office, Marlinton.

CAMP CREEK

(Mercer County) Located between Princeton and Beckley, just off U.S. 19 and 21, via I-77 (the West Virginia Turnpike). Fishing, hunting, hiking and biking are available. Wild turkey may be found along with many other species of game and a variety of nongame species. Acreage, 5,300. Post Office, Camp Creek. This forest is adjacent to Camp Creek State Park.

COOPERS ROCK

(Preston County) Located off I-68, eight miles west of Bruceton Mills and 13 miles east of Morgantown, it is the site of the famous Henry Clay Iron Furnace and the West Virginia University Experimental Forest. Features include scenic hiking trails with overlook, biking, picnic sites and a 25-unit campground with electric hookups with hot showers, toilets and laundry facilities; boating, cross-country skiing, hunting and fishing, two small trout streams and a six-acre trout lake. Elevation, 2,100. Acreage, 12,713. Post Office, Bruceton Mills.

GREENBRIER

(Greenbrier County) Located on Harts Run 11/2 miles off U.S. Route 60 between Lewisburg, host city for the West Virginia State Fair, and world famous White Sulphur Springs. Historic Kate's Mountain lies within the forest boundaries, and there are 13 completely equipped vacation cabins, a 16-unit tent and trailer camping area with electric hookups, hot showers, laundry and toilet facilities; scenic hiking trails, biking, picnic areas with tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and toilet facilities; swimming pool and playgrounds, hunting and fishing are permitted during regular seasons. Elevation, 2,000 feet. Acreage, 5,130. Post Office, Caldwell.

KANAWHA

(Kanawha County) Located 7 miles south of Charleston on Davis Creek, Kanawha State Forest features picnicking, horseback riding and mountain biking as the main recreation activities. There is also a 46-unit campground with fireplaces, hot showers, laundry and toilet facilities. Hiking trails, biking, playground facilities, picnic areas, and hunting and fishing in season are also available. Acreage, 9,320. Post Office, Charleston.

KUMBRABOW

(Randolph County) Located 24 miles south of Elkins off U.S. Route 219. Noted for its rugged natural beauty and highland terrain. Kumbrabow State Forest offers excellent hunting and fishing. Native brook trout fishing is excellent and deer, bear, and turkey abound on the forest and in surrounding woodland. There are six completely furnished rustic vacation cabins, picnic sites and a 14-site campground with fireplaces, firewood, drinking water, tables and toilet facilities; scenic hiking trails; biking and children's playgrounds. Acreage, 9,474. Post Office, Huttonsville.

PANTHER

(McDowell County) Located six miles south Iaeger off U.S. Route 52. Features include swimming pool, hiking trails, picnic sites and tent campground with tables, fireplaces, firewood, drinking water and pit toilet facilities; children's playgrounds; and horseshoe pits; hunting and fishing during regular seasons, hiking and biking. Group camp. Acreage, 7,810. Post Office, Panther.

SENECA

(Pocahontas County) Located approximately 20 miles northeast of Marlinton, on State Route 28, along the Greenbrier River. Hunting is excellent, with deer, turkey and bear attracting most of the sportsmen. There are eight completely furnished rustic vacation cabins, picnic areas and a 10-unit tent campground with fireplaces, firewood, drinking water, tables and toilet facilities; scenic hiking trails, fishing and biking. Acreage, 11,684. Post Office, Dunmore.

DIRECTORY OF WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

ALLEGHENY

(5,690 acres) Mineral County. Located four miles southwest of Keyser by county Route 4 (Pinnacle Road) and Route 220/2 (Pine Swamp Road). Allegheny WMA offers hunting and year round trout fishing in Jennings Randolph tailwaters. Camping is prohibited.

AMHERST/PLYMOUTH

(7,061 acres) Putnam County. Located between Bancroft and Hometown on state Route 62. Amherst Plymouth WMA offers hunting for deer, turkey and small game. Shore fishing is popular in Guano Creek and along the Kanawha River. Camping is prohibited.

ANAWALT

(1,792 acres) McDowell County. Located 2 miles south of Anawalt via county Route 8. Anawalt WMA offers a 7-acre lake providing warmwater fisheries for largemouth bass, bluegill, and channel catfish. Camping is prohibited.

BEAR ROCK LAKES

(242 acres) Ohio County. Located off of U.S. Route 40 near Valley Grove, 13 miles east of Wheeling and two miles from the Dallas Pike interchange of I-70. Hunting is limited due to the size of the area. Four lakes are located on the area: Bear Lake, 8 acres; Rock Lake, 4 acres; Baker Lake, 3.4 acres; and Wood Pond, .5 acres, which has a handicapped access. Camping is prohibited.

BECKY CREEK

(1,930 acres) Randolph County. Located nine miles south of Huttonsville, access is via county Route 43 from state Route 219. Becky's Creek WMA offers hunting opportunities for deer, turkey, and bear. Primitive camping is available in designated areas.

BEECH FORK LAKE

(7,531 acres) Cabell and Wayne counties. Located five miles south of Huntington, the area can be accessed from the west via state Route 152 and from the northeast via state Route 10 and Heath Creek Road. Hunting opportunities for deer, turkey, squirrel, raccoon, grouse, fox, rabbit, woodcock, mourning dove, and waterfowl. Beech Fork Lake, 720 acres, provides fishing opportunities for a variety of warmwater fish. Campgrounds are available.

BERWIND LAKE

(18,093 acres) McDowell County. Located 12 miles south of Welch on state Route 16 and 12/4. Berwind Lake WMA offers hunting, and a 20-acre small impoundment provides fishing for warmwater species and trout. Primitive camping is available.

BIG DITCH

(388 acres) Webster County. Located one-half mile from Cowen on state Route 30, 15 miles southwest of Webster Springs. Hunting is limited due to size of the area. Warmwater fishing is featured on 55-acre Big Ditch Lake.

BEURY MOUNTAIN

(3,061 acres) Fayette County. Access by state Route 41 south of Clifftop to county Routes 19/33 and 19/25. Hunting available for most game species.

BLUESTONE LAKE

(18,019 acres) Summers, Mercer, and Monroe counties. Located one mile east of Hinton on state Route 20, or four miles west of Pipestem State Park on state Route 20. Bluestone Lake WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in a 1,970-acre lake, and camping.

BRIERY MOUNTAIN

(1,057 acres) Preston County. Located off state Route 7, approximately 1.5 miles south of Kingwood. Briery Mountain WMA provides hunting opportunities for turkey, deer, squirrel, and grouse. There is no developed recreational facility A free hunting permit is required. Contact DNR in Fairmont (304-367-2720).

BURCHES RUN LAKE

(54 acres) Marshall County. Access is by state Route 14, approximately six miles south of Wheeling. Burches Lake WMA offers fishing in a 16-acre lake. Hunting is limited due to size of the area.

BURNSVILLE LAKE

(12,579 acres) Braxton County. Located three miles east of Burnsville off exit 79 of I-79 or 11 miles north on U.S. Route 19 from exit 67 of I-79. Burnsville WMA offers hunting, fishing in a 968-acre lake and camping.

CASTLEMAN RUN LAKE

(486 acres) Brooke and Ohio counties. Located off U. S. Route 40 near Potomac Settlement in Brooke County. Fishing opportunities in a 22-acre lake. Hunting is limited due to area size. Camping is prohibited.

CECIL H. UNDERWOOD

(2,072 acres) Marshall County. Located along U.S. Route 250 south of Cameron. Hunting available for most species. Camping is prohibited.

CENTER BRANCH

(974 acres) Harrison County. Located along state Route 20 at Stonewood and county Route 25. Forest game species such as deer, turkey, grouse and squirrel are abundant on the area. Camping is prohibited.

CHIEF CORNSTALK

(11,770 acres) Mason County. Located by Nine-Mile road traveling westward from state Route 35 near Southside. Chief Cornstalk WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in a 5-acre lake, and 25 rustic tent or small sites are available.

CONAWAY RUN LAKE

(630 acres) Tyler County. Located off Route 18 approximately 10 miles south of Middlebourne. Conaway Run Lake offers hunting, fishing in a 30-acre lake, public shooting range, and 11 campsites.

CROSS CREEK

(2,081 acres) Brooke County. Located along county Route 7 west of Virginville. Hunting for most game species. Camping is prohibited.

DECKERS CREEK

(56 acres) Preston County. State Route 7 north of Reedsville. Warmwater fishing in two lakes. Limited hunting due to small area. Camping is prohibited.

DUNKARD FORK

(470 acres) Marshall County. Access is by Route 15 from Majorsville and U.S. Route 250 to Route 48 and 15 from Moundsville. Dunkard Fork WMA offers hunting and fishing in a 49-acre lake. Camping is prohibited.

EAST LYNN LAKE

(22,928 acres) Wayne County. Located 15 miles southeast of Wayne, access to the area by county Routes 37 and 152. East Lynn Lake WMA offers hunting, fishing in a 1,005-acre lake, and 174-site campground and some 15 primitive campsites.

EDWARDS RUN

(397 acres) Hampshire County. Located two miles north of Capon Bridge on state secondary Route 15 and reached by turning north on state Route 15 from U. S. Route 50 at Capon Bridge. Edwards Run WMA offers hunting, fishing in a section of Edwards run and a 2-acre lake, and small primitive camping area near the lake.

ELK RIVER

(18,225 acres) Braxton County. Exit 67 of I-79 at the Flatwoods interchange and travel south on state Routes 4 and 19. Approximately two miles to secondary Route 15 and proceed east following DNR signs to the Holly River section. Elk River WMA offers hunting, fishing in 1,440 acre Sutton Lake and Elk River, two shooting ranges, and camping areas.

FORK CREEK

(7,000 acres) Boone County. Located one mile northwest of Nellis off county Route 2. Fork Creek WMA offers hunting, fishing on Fork Creeks small stream and one-acre pond, a shooting range and 25 campsites.

FORT MILL RIDGE

(217 acres) Hampshire County. Located two miles southwest of Romney off of U.S. Route 50. Fort Mill Ridge WMA offers hunting and fishing for warmwater species in the South Branch River on the east side of the area. Camping is prohibited.

FROZEN CAMP

(2,735 acres) Jackson County. Located east of Ripley and south of state Route 33 at Marshall. Frozen Camp WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, and fishing in two small impoundments of 22-acres and 20-acres. Camping is prohibited.

GREEN BOTTOM

(1,096 acres) Cabell and Mason counties. Located 16 miles north of Huntington, access via state Route 2. Green Bottom WMA is bordered by the Ohio River-the state's largest and most productive fisheries. Primary game species include deer, rabbit, mourning dove and waterfowl. Deer hunters are required to use primitive weapons—muzzleloading firearms and bows. All other firearms must be shotguns with shotshell ammunition. Camping is prohibited.

HANDLEY

(784 acres) Pocahontas County. Located off Route 17 from U. S. 219, approximately three miles north of Marlinton. Handley WMA offers hunting, fishing in the Williams River, which borders 1.25 miles, two small ponds and a 5-acre lake. This lake is restricted to children under 12 and Class Q handicapped individuals from March through May. Thirteen campsites with well water are available.

HILBERT

(289 acres) Lincoln County. Located approximately 2 miles northwest of Sod, via state Route 124 and Joe's Creek Road. Hunting prospects include deer, squirrel, grouse, and fox. Camping is prohibited and fishing facilities do not exist on the area.

HILLCREST

(2,212 acres) Hancock County. Located off state Route 8 along Smith Road, Gas Valley Road, and Middle Run Road. Hillcrest WMA offers hunting for an abundance of farm game species. A 100-yard shooting range is located on the area. Tomlinson Run State Park, located 1.5 miles southwest of the area, offers camping facilities for a nominal fee.

HORSE CREEK

(48 acres) Wyoming County. Located 3 miles west of Baileysville, access via state Route 97 and Delta Route 36. Horse Creek 12-acre lake provides warmwater fisheries for largemouth bass, bluegill, and channel catfish. Trout are stocked once each month from February through May. Limited hunting opportunities due to size of the area.

HUGHES RIVER

(10,000 acres) Ritchie and Wirt counties. Located on both sides of state Route 47, 15 miles east of Parkersburg. Hughes River WMA offers hunting, fishing in the Little Kanawha and Hughes rivers. A section has been designated for disabled hunter access for Class Q license holders. Camping is prohibited.

HUTTONSVILLE

(2,720 acres) Randolph County. Located just south of Huttonsville via state Route 219 and state Route 250. Huttonsville WMA offers hunting, fishing in three small impoundments and along the Tygart Valley River.

LANTZ FARM AND NATURE PRESERVE

(540 acres) Wetzel County. State Route 20 west of Jacksonburg. Hunting available for most game species. Joins Lewis Wetzel WMA. Camping is prohibited.

LAUREL LAKE

(12,854 acres) Mingo County. Located 12 miles northeast of Lenore off state Route 65. Laurel Lake WMA offers hunting (archery only for deer), regulation skeet range, fishing in 29-acre Laurel Lake. Camping is prohibited.

LEWIS WETZEL

(13,388 acres) Wetzel County. Located 3/4 mile south of Jacksonburg on Buffalo Run Road. Lewis Wetzel WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in the North and South Fork from Pine Grove to Smithfield, and 20 campsites for tents or campers. A 100-yard shooting range is located on the area.

McCLINTIC

(3,655 acres) Mason County. Located five miles north of Point Pleasant or eight miles south of Mason off state Route 62. McClintic offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in 35 small impoundments, and nine rustic campsites. A 100-yard shooting range is located on the area.

MEADOW RIVER

(2,374 acres) Greenbrier County. Located at Dawson and Sam Black Church off I-64. Meadow River WMA is primarily wetland habitat. Waterfowl, woodcock, deer, turkey, grouse and squirrel are available for hunting.

MILL CREEK

(1,470 acres) Cabell County. Located three miles north of Milton. Access is via county Route 13 (John's Branch Road). Steep terrain. Mill Creek WMA provides hunting opportunities for deer, turkey, grouse, squirrel, raccoon and fox. Camping is prohibited.

MONCOVE LAKE

(775 acres) Monroe County. Located by following state Route 3 from Union east to Gap Mills, then north on state Route 8 for six miles. Moncove Lake WMA offers hunting, fishing in 144 acre Moncove Lake, and 50 camp sites.

MORRIS CREEK

(9,874 acres) Clay and Kanawha counties. Located east of Clendenin access by county routes 4/1, 67, 50, and 65. Good hunting opportunities for most game species. Camping is prohibited.

NATHANIEL MOUNTAIN

(8,875 acres) Hampshire County. Located via U.S. Route 50 just east of Romney, then south on state Route 50/10 (Grassy Lick Road). Nathaniel Mountain WMA offers hunting, fishing for native brook trout in Mill Run and eight primitive camping areas are available for a nominal fee.

PLEASANT CREEK

(3,030 acres) Barbour and Taylor counties. Located along routes 119 and 250, six miles north of Philippi and nine miles south of Grafton. Pleasant Creek WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in Tygart Lake and River, and Pleasant Creek and Doe Run small impoundments, and a campground with 40 tent and trailer sites and eight tent-only sites. A 200-yard rifle range is located on the area.

PLUM ORCHARD LAKE

(3,201 acres) Fayette County. Located off West Virginia Turnpike (1-77) at the Pax or Mossy interchange and following state Route 23 and 23/1. Plum Orchard offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in 202-acre Plum Orchard Lake, and rustic camping facilities include 25 sites at Beech Bottom and 19 sites at the dam.

PRUNTYTOWN

(1,764 acres) Taylor County. Located 1/2 mile west of Pruntytown off U.S. Route 50. Pruntytown WMA offers hunting opportunities for deer, wild turkey, ruffed grouse, rabbit and mourning dove. Camping is prohibited.

R. D. BAILEY LAKE

(17,280 acres) Mingo and Wyoming counties. Located 15 miles west of Pineville on state Route 97. R. D. Bailey Lake WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in 630-acre R. D. Bailey Lake, and 169-site camping area.

RITCHIE MINES

(2,300 acres) Ritchie County. Located on MacFarlan Creek. Access is by county Routes 17 and 17/4 at Mellin or via county Route 30 from Macfarlan. Ritchie Mines WMA offers hunting and Class Q accommodations. The remains of a historically significant asphalt mine are located on the area. Camping is prohibited.

SAND HILL

(967 acres) Wood and Ritchie counties. Located on both sides of U.S. Route 50 east of Parkersburg. Hunting for most game species. Fishing available in nearby Mountwood Park. Camping is prohibited.

SHANNONDALE SPRINGS

(1,566 acres) Jefferson County. Located four miles east of Charles Town on state Route 9. Shannondale Springs WMA offers hunting and fishing in the Shenandoah River. Camping is prohibited.

SHORT MOUNTAIN

(8,005 acres) Hampshire County. Located by traveling from U.S. Route 50 turn south at Augusta onto Fort Hill Road, approximately eight miles and turn left at the Short Mountain WMA sign. Short Mountain WMA offers hunting, fishing in the North River, and six primitive campgrounds.

SLEEPY CREEK

(22,928 acres) Berkeley and Morgan counties. Located six miles southeast of Berkeley Springs and 11 miles west of Martinsburg. Access via state Routes 8/2 (Highland Ridge) and 13/5 (Greenwood Road) in Morgan County or state Route 7/9 (Jones Springs and Shanghai) in Berkeley County. Sleepy Creek WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in 205-acre Sleepy Creek Lake, and 75 camping sites.

SMOKE CAMP

(252 acres) Lewis County. Located on right fork of Freemans Creek Road. Access via county Route 9/5. Smoke Camp WMA offers hunting for deer, turkey, squirrel, ruffed grouse and rabbits. Camping is prohibited.

SNAKE HILL

(2,000 acres) Monongalia County. Located 3 miles north of Dellslow and accessed by state Routes 75 and 75/2, across the Cheat River from Coopers Rock overlook. Property was purchased by WVDNR to protect the prestigious area from development and provide a quality WMA. Principal game species are deer, turkey, squirrel, and ruffed grouse. Camping is prohibited.

SOUTH BRANCH

(1,093 acres) Hardy and Hampshire counties. Access is off county Route 6, the trough road, six miles north of Moorefield. The area provides limited deer, turkey and small game hunting, as well as fishing and boating access to the South Branch of the Potomac River. Camping is prohibited.

SPRINGFIELD

(5,367 acres) Hampshire and Mineral counties. Composed of multiple separate tracts, access via state Routes 28, 1, 28/1, and 28/6. Springfield WMA offers hunting opportunities for squirrel, ruffed grouse, turkey, and white-tailed deer. Camping is prohibited.

STONECOAL LAKE

(3,000 acres) Lewis and Upshur counties. Located south of U.S. Routes 33 and 119 between Weston and Buckhannon. Access via state Routes 15, 36 and 7. Stonecoal Lake WMA offers hunting, fishing in 550-acre Stonecoal Lake, and camping facilities are located nearby.

STONEWALL JACKSON LAKE

(18,289 acres) Lewis County. Located off I-79 by using exits 96 and 91. Stonewall Jackson Lake WMA offers hunting, public shooting range, fishing in 2,650-acre Stonewall Jackson Lake, and camping facilities.

STUMPTOWN

(1,674 acres) Calhoun and Gilmer counties. Located south of Route 33 at Stumptown on Lower Run. Stumptown WMA offers hunting for deer, turkey, raccoon, squirrel, and grouse. Fishing prospects are extremely limited. Camping is prohibited.

SUMMERSVILLE LAKE

(5,974 acres) Nicholas County. Located three miles south of Summersville on U.S. Route 19. Summersville Lake WMA offers hunting, public archery range, fishing in 2,790-acre Summersville Lake, hiking areas, picnic areas, and camping facilities.

TATE LOHR

(576 acres) Mercer County. Located 2 miles south of Oakvale and is accessible by U.S. Route 460 and county Route 219/6, 219/8, and 219/9. Limited hunting opportunities due to size of area. Camping is prohibited.

TETER CREEK LAKE

(136 acres) Barbour County. Located three miles east of Meadowville, near Belington. Access via state Route 92 at Meadowville. Teter Creek WMA offers limited hunting opportunities due to the size of the area, fishing in 35-acre Teter Creek Lake, and 20-site campground.

THE JUG

(2,068 acres) Tyler County. Located 1.5 miles east of Middlebourne off State Route 18, 46 from Centerville or state Route 7 from Middlebourne. The Jug WMA offers hunting, and fishing in Middle Island Creek. Camping is prohibited.

THORN CREEK

(522 acres) Pendleton County. Located on county Route 20 off of U.S. Route 220 south of Franklin. Hunting is limited due to small size of the area. Fly fishing only native brook trout fishing. Camping is prohibited.

TUG FORK

(2,308 acres) McDowell County. Located along county Route 7 west of Welch. Hunting available for most game species. Camping is prohibited.

TURKEY RUN

(64 acres) Jackson County. Located along state Route 68 north of Ravenswood. Limited hunting due to size of area. Warmwater fishing in 15-acre Turkey Run Lake. Camping is prohibited.

UPPER MUD RIVER

(1,725 acres) Lincoln County. Located approximately seven miles south of Hamlin off county Route 7. Upper Mud River WMA offers hunting and fishing in a 306-acre lake. Camping is prohibited.

VALLEY BEND WETLANDS

(31 acres) Randolph County. Located off U.S. Routes 219 and 250 south of Elkins. Managed for waterfowl and migratory birds. Hunting opportunities are limited to waterfowl and dove. Fishing opportunities for trout and smallmouth bass along the Tygart River. Camping is prohibited.

WALLBACK

(11,757 acres) Clay, Kanawha, and Roane counties. Located off I-79 at exit 34. Wallback WMA offers hunting and limited fishing to a short stretch of Elk River along state Route 4 in Clay and Kanawha counties. Camping is prohibited.

WIDMEYER

(422 acres) Morgan County. Located via state Route 9/11 off state Route 9 approximately three miles north of Great Cacapon. Widmeyer offers good hunting opportunities for squirrel, grouse, turkey, and deer. Camping is prohibited.

WOODRUM

(1,700 acres) Jackson County. Located off the Middle Fork off the Pocatalico River, Woodrum WMA can be reached from I-77 either by state Route 42 at Romance or by state Route 19 at Kentuck. Woodrum WMA offers hunting and fishing in the 240-acre Woodrum Lake. Camping is prohibited.

**ACCOMMODATIONS IN STATE PARKS AND FORESTS
LODGE AND CABIN RESERVATIONS**

Lodge, cottage or cabin reservations may be made by calling or writing a park or forest directly or by calling (toll free) 1-800-CALL-WVA and requesting the park or forest of your choice. This toll free line may be used in West Virginia, any other state in the continental United States and Canadian provinces in the Eastern time zone and is open Monday from 8:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.; Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; and Sunday, 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Eastern time, (most federal holidays excluded).

When making cabin reservations for four nights or more, a deposit of one half the rental fee is required with the remainder due upon arrival; the full rental fee is required for three nights or less. For any lodge room, the first night's charge is required as deposit. If you make your reservation by telephone, you will have ten days in which to make payment, unless it is a last minute reservation. In case of cancellations, deposits will be returned (except for a \$15 handling fee for cabins) if notice is given at least 30 days in advance for cabins and 48 hours in advance for lodge rooms. All major credit cards are accepted.

Only weekly cabin reservations are taken at most areas from the second Monday in June through Labor day. Weekend reservations in most of the more popular areas must be for a minimum of two days on the busier weekends.

CAMPING RESERVATIONS

Up to 50% of the sites at Pipestem Resort, Chief Logan, Babcock, Beech Fork, Blackwater Falls, Bluestone, Camp Creek, Canaan Valley Resort, Cedar Creek, Holly River, North Bend, Stonewall Jackson Lake, Tomlinson Run, Twin Falls Resort, and Watoga State Parks and Greenbrier and Kanawha State Forests are available for reservation during the summer season. Other state park and forest campsites are rented on a first come, first served basis.

Reservations may be made by mail, phone, or in person up to two days in advance, and must be secured by payment of a deposit for the entire rental fee, plus a \$5 handling charge. Mail-in reservations must be postmarked on or after February 15 and are accepted from February 15 through March 14. Should February 15 fall on a Sunday or legal holiday those postmarked the 15th will be batched with those postmarked on the next subsequent day on which post offices are open for business. A maximum of three reservation forms per envelope will be accepted. Beginning March 15, phone reservations are accepted during regular park office hours. Beginning April 1, walk-in reservations are taken and filled subject to availability. Mail-in, call-in, and walk-in reservation forms are accepted after April 1. A minimum of two nights, up to a maximum of 14 nights, is required when making a campsite reservation on Fridays and Saturdays. One night only reservations will be accepted the remainder of the week. Reserved campsites that are accessible to persons with disabilities are held for such individuals to reserve from February 15 through March 14.

The Monongahela National Forest was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on April 28, 1920, under the Weeks Law. This law of 1911 provides for the cooperation by states with the United States, and the protection of watersheds of navigable streams. In West Virginia, the National Forest was established for flood protection in the Ohio and Potomac River valleys. It is one of a system of 156 National Forests. The Clark-McNary Act of June 7, 1924, broadened the objectives to provide for reforestation and production of timber. The Multiple Use Act of June 12, 1960, provides that National Forests shall be managed for outdoor recreation, range, timber, watershed, hunting and fishing. The Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area Act of September 28, 1965, established the 100,000 acre National Recreation Area on the Forest and authorized land acquisition and an accelerated program of outdoor recreation facilities. On January 3, 1975, Public Law 93-622 made Dolly Sods and Otter Creek parts of the National Wilderness Preservation System and the Monongahela National Forest became responsible for the management of these Wilderness Areas. On January 13, 1983, Public Law 97-466 added the Cranberry and Laurel Fork Wilderness Areas to the National Wilderness Preservation System.

The Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (the Resources Planning Act) authorized a national assessment of Forest resources and set up a system of long range plans to assure that the American People enjoy adequate supplies of water, recreation, forage, timber and wildlife in the decades ahead. The National Forest Management Act of 1976 strengthened the planning process and updated the authorization for resource management. The Forest is currently operated under the 1986 Forest Land Management Plan. The Plan is undergoing revision. The newly revised Plan is expected to be completed in 2005. Planning on the Monongahela National Forest is an interdisciplinary process that includes involvement of the public.

This public forest is dedicated to the long-term protection, development and management of all its resources.

Within the proclaimed boundary and authorized purchase units of the Monongahela National Forest there are 1,673,700 acres of which 910,155 are owned by the United States as of September 2001. There are also 109 acres of other land acquired and administered as part of the National Forest. Directly in charge of the National Forest is the Forest Supervisor. In the National Forest are four Ranger Districts, each administered by a District Ranger.

MONONGAHELA NATIONAL FOREST
RECREATION ATTRACTIONS

Special areas of interest include *Seneca Rocks*, a 900 foot Tuscorora Sandstone formation which rises above the North Fork Valley near the community of Seneca Rocks. Besides its appeal to sight-seers, Seneca Rocks is considered by many climbers to be the best rock climb in the East. The Seneca Rocks Discovery Center is located in the area along with picnic and camping facilities. Exhibits and programs are provided for public enjoyment at the Visitor Center.

Spruce Knob, the highest point in West Virginia, rises 4,861 feet above sea level. It is an area of windblown red spruce and rock outcrops and is accessible by road. It affords excellent views to the east and west. Visitors will enjoy the Spruce Knob Observation Tower and interpretive trail and nearby Spruce Knob Lake.

The *Smoke Hole* is a rugged scenic canyon through which the South Branch of the Potomac River flows for about 20 miles. Over half of the distance is flanked by a narrow scenic road. In the Smoke Hole are located the Big Bend Campground and the Smoke Hole picnic area.

The *Dolly Sods Wilderness*, 10,215 acres, is located in the northeastern portion of the Forest, and is comprised of the rich second-growth hardwood forests of the Red Creek drainage.

The *Otter Creek Wilderness* comprises 20,000 acres and is located in the northwestern section of the Forest. It includes almost the entire drainage of Otter Creek and contains rich hardwood stands intermingled with patches of red spruce and eastern hemlock. A large bog is also situated within the area.

The *Laurel Fork Wilderness* contains 12,200 acres in two sections north and south of the Laurel Fork Campground on the Greenbrier Ranger District. It includes the upper drainage area of the Laurel Fork and a rich northern hardwood forest.

The *Cranberry Wilderness* contains 35,600 acres and is located on the Gauley Ranger District. It is the largest Wilderness on the Monongahela National Forest and contains a rich mixture of hardwood trees interspersed with red spruce on the higher elevations.

The *Cranberry Glades Botanical Area* contains four bogs whose plant and animal life is similar to that found in the Canadian bogs or "muskegs" of the North. A boardwalk trail with interpretive signs has been constructed for visitor enjoyment and to protect the fragile ecology.

The *Cranberry Mountain Nature Center* is located a few miles from Cranberry Glades along the Highland Scenic Highway. Exhibits and programs are provided for the visitors' benefit.

Seneca Shadows Campground provides a wide variety of campsites, including electrical hookups. Located south of Seneca Rocks on Rt. 33.

Stuart Recreation Area, east of Elkins, contains extensive day use activities, including a swimming beach and pavilions, as well as a campground with electrical hookups.

The *Gaudineer Scenic Area* is a remnant of a vast virgin spruce forest. These spruce trees attain a height of 100 feet and grow to 35 inches in diameter. This 140 acre primeval stand is over 250 years old. Adjacent is the Gaudineer picnic area, located in a stand of second growth red spruce.

The *Lake Sherwood Recreation Area* contains a man-made lake covering 164 acres. In addition to camping and picnicking facilities, there is a boating site and rental boats, swim site with beach and bath house, and a network of hiking trails near the campground.

The *Highland Scenic Highway* runs from the outskirts of Richwood to U.S. Highway 219 at the top of Elk Mountain, a distance of about 45 miles. This route is a designated national scenic byway and takes the visitor through a remote section of the high Allegheny Mountains and offers a variety of scenic views. Located along the highway are four overlooks, with accessible toilet facilities. Summit Lake Recreation Area, North Bend Picnic Ground, Falls of Hills Creek and Cranberry Glades Scenic Views and the Cranberry Mountain Nature Center.

The *Spruce Knob Lake Recreation Complex* located in Randolph County contains a 25-acre impoundment stocked with trout. A trail and boardwalk circles the lake. Only non-motorized boating is permitted. A 43-family unit rustic campground is also available.

The *Lake Buffalo Impoundment* located in Pocahontas County contains 22 acres. It is principally stocked with trout. No camping facilities are available at the lake. Only non-motorized boating is permitted.

The *Summit Lake Recreation Complex* located in Greenbrier County contains a 45-acre impoundment principally stocked with trout. Only non-motorized boating is permitted. A 33-family unit campground is adjacent to the lake.

The *Falls of Hills Creek Scenic Area* in Pocahontas County comprises 114 acres, including a narrow gorge through which Hills Creek rushes over three waterfalls. An exciting trail and boardwalk takes visitors over 330 stairs to the base of the lower falls. The trail to the upper falls is paved and accessible to wheelchairs.

DEPARTMENT OF TAX AND REVENUE COLLECTION OF REVENUE

CORPORATION INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Corporation Net Income Tax, Chapter 11, Article 24, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a conformity statute which imposes a tax on the net income of corporations and similar business organizations. The tax rate is 9.000 percent. Being a statute correlated to the Federal Internal Revenue Code will simplify preparation of state corporation net income tax returns by taxpayers, improve enforcement and aid in interpretation of the law through increased use of federal judicial and administrative determinations and precedents.

The tax is paid in four equal installments, the taxpayers preparing an annual declaration of estimated tax and reconciling the same through the filing of an annual return. The due date of the declaration is the fifteenth day of the fourth month of the tax year. The following quarterly payments are due on the fifteenth day of the sixth, ninth and twelfth months of the taxable year. The annual return is due on the fifteenth day of the third month following the close of the taxable year.

BUSINESS FRANCHISE TAX

The West Virginia Business Franchise Tax, Chapter 11, Article 23, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied on corporations and partnerships for the privilege of engaging in business in West Virginia. The measure of the tax is the greater of 0.70 percent of capital (net equity) apportioned to the state or \$50.

BUSINESS AND OCCUPATION TAX

The Business and Occupation Tax, Chapter 11, Article 13, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied on public utilities, electric power producers and gas storage.

The measure of tax in this category is either gross income, kilowatt hours of electricity, kilowatts of taxable capacity, or net dekatherms of natural gas. Business classifications and their rates are as follows:

An annual exemption tax credit of \$500 (\$41.67 per month) is provided under the Business and Occupation Tax Law for each person, as defined by statute, engaging in business in the State. Fiscal year taxpayers shall compute their annual exemption by using the applicable monthly exemption for each month in their fiscal year.

Note: Repeal of the Tax

The Business and Occupation Tax was repealed effective July 1, 1987, for all taxpayers except utilities (currently taxable under Section 2d of the Business and Occupation Tax) and taxpayers generating electric power (currently taxable under Section 2o of the Business and Occupation Tax).

SEVERANCE TAX

The Severance Tax, Chapter 11, Article 13A, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied for the privilege of engaging in the business of severing, extracting and/or producing natural resource products within West Virginia.

The tax is levied on gross proceeds of sales. However, a person subject to the Severance Tax, who purchases raw natural resources and processes them into commercially usable products, pays tax only on the value added in the processing of such resources.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS TAX

The Telecommunications Tax, Chapter 11, Article 13B, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a tax levied for the privilege of engaging in the business of Telecommunications within West Virginia. The term "telecommunications" means all telephone, radio, light, light wave, radio telephone, telegraph and other communication, or means of communication, whether used or voice communication, computer data transmission, or other encoded symbolic information transfers. The term does not include commercial broadcast radio or television, cable television or amateur or citizen's band radio.

The tax is equal to 4 percent of intrastate gross income and apportioned interstate gross income. Gross income is equivalent to the receipts received from the provision of local exchange or long distance voice or data communications services, but does not include receipts from the provision of network access, billing or similar services. Interstate gross income is apportioned to West Virginia according to the length of communication pathways both within and without the State. Gross income subject to tax does not include gross receipts from commodities or services which are determined by the Public Service Commission of West Virginia to be subject to competition.

PERSONAL INCOME TAX

The West Virginia Personal Income Tax Act (West Virginia Code, Chapter 11, Article 21) was enacted by the 1961 Regular Session of the Legislature on February 10, 1961, and signed by the Governor on February 14, 1961. The provisions of the Act applied to all taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1961, including that part which elapsed prior to the effective date of the Act.

Description of the Tax. The West Virginia Income Tax Act imposes a personal income tax on the taxable income of all resident individuals, and resident estates and trust, irrespective of income derived from West Virginia sources. Corporations and partnerships are not subject to the West Virginia Personal Income Tax. A trust or other unincorporated organization which by reason of its activities is exempt from Federal Income Tax is also exempt from West Virginia Personal Income Tax.

The nature of the Act was to adopt for West Virginia Personal Income Tax the provision of the Federal Income Tax laws relating to the determination of income. As adopted, it can be stated that the West Virginia Income Tax Act is a conformity statute. The same general concepts of income, gain and loss are employed in the West Virginia Act as are employed in the Federal Income Tax Law. The method used to make reference to the federal law is general in scope. With the exception of several modifications generally described hereinbelow, West Virginia adjusted gross income is Federal adjusted gross income. Amendments made to the Federal Income Tax Law which affect income, gain and loss are reflected in the West Virginia Tax Law by periodic legislative enactments. The conformity with the Federal Income Tax Law was adopted to simplify preparation of state income tax returns, to improve enforcement of the State Income Tax through better use of information obtained from federal income tax audits, and to aid interpretation of the state tax law through increased use of federal and administrative determinations and precedents.

Modifications to Income. West Virginia adjusted gross income is determined by applicable modifications increasing or decreasing Federal adjusted gross income. Among the modifications which reduce Federal adjusted gross income are items that benefit persons who are sixty-five years of age or older and individuals receiving benefits under certain retirement systems.

Deductions. There is no provision for either itemized or standard deductions in the West Virginia Personal Income Tax Law of 1987.

Personal Exemptions. An individual, resident or nonresident is allowed an exemption of \$2,000 for each exemption to which he is entitled for federal income tax purposes. A husband and wife who file a joint federal return but separate West Virginia returns may each claim only the exemptions to which he or she would have been entitled if separate federal returns had been filed. The exemption for an estate or trust is \$600. Persons claimed as dependents on another's return are allowed a \$500 exemption.

Low Income Exclusion. Individuals with federal adjusted gross income below \$10,000 (\$5,000 for married filing separate taxpayers) may exclude up to 100% of earned income from tax.

Rate of Tax. For all taxable years or portions thereof ending prior to January 1, 1963, the West Virginia Income Tax rate was six percent of the Federal Income Tax which would have been imposed on an identical amount of federal taxable income. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1963, and before January 1, 1970, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed on West Virginia taxable income at rates graduated from 1.2% to 5.5%. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1970, and before January 1, 1971, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed at rates graduated from 1.65% to 7.6%. For taxable periods beginning on or after January 1, 1971, and before April 1, 1983, West Virginia Income Tax was imposed at rates graduated from 2.1% to 9.6%. Effective April 1, 1983, the rates were changed to graduate from 2.1% to 13.0%. Between April 1, 1983, and June 30, 1985, a 12% surtax was imposed on all individuals, estates, trusts and heads of households with taxable incomes over \$10,000 and all married taxpayers filing jointly with taxable incomes over \$20,000. For taxable years beginning before January 1, 1983, the West Virginia Tax Act provided only two rate schedules; one for joint returns and one for individuals, estates, trusts and heads of households. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1983, three rate schedules are provided; one for individuals, estates and trusts, one for joint returns and one for heads of households. Beginning on or after January 1, 1987, the West Virginia Income Tax rate graduated from 3.0% to 6.5%. Two rate schedules are provided: one for joint returns, individuals, heads of household, estates and trusts; and one for married taxpayers filing separate returns.

CONSUMERS SALES AND SERVICE TAX

The Consumers Sales and Service Tax, Chapter 11, Article 15, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is a general sales tax that applies to all sales and leases of tangible personal property and the furnishing of certain service consummated within West Virginia for use, consumption or any other purpose. Services rendered by an employee to his employer, services furnished by public service businesses and professional or personal services are exempt. Most rentals, excluding those of real estate, are taxable as though they were sales. The measure of the tax is based upon the total sales price of all articles and services purchased during a particular transaction with the rate of tax being derived from a sales bracket system. Prior to January 1, 2004, the following sales tax bracket system applies:

1. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from six cents to sixteen cents, both inclusive, one cent;
2. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from seventeen cents to thirty-three cents, both inclusive, two cents;
3. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from thirty-four cents to fifty cents, both inclusive, three cents;

4. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from fifty-one cents to sixty-seven cents, both inclusive, four cents;
5. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from sixty-eight cents to eighty-four cents, both inclusive, five cents;
6. On each sale, where the monetary consideration is from eighty-five cents to one dollar, both inclusive, six cents;
7. If the sale price is in excess of one dollar, six cents on each whole dollar of the sale price and upon any fractional part of a dollar in excess of whole dollars, as follows: one cent on the fractional part of the dollar if less than seventeen cents; two cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of sixteen cents but less than thirty-four cents; three cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of thirty-three cents but less than fifty-one cents; four cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of fifty cents but less than sixty-eight cents; five cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of sixty-seven cents but less than eighty-five cents; and six cents on the fractional part of the dollar if in excess of eighty-four cents. For example, the tax on sales of one dollar and one cent to one dollar and sixteen cents, both inclusive, is seven cents; on sales of one dollar and seventeen cents to one dollar and thirty-three cents, both inclusive, eight cents; on sales of one dollar and thirty-four cents to one dollar and fifty cents, both inclusive, nine cents; on sales of one dollar and fifty-one cents to one dollar and sixty-seven cents, both inclusive, ten cents; on sales of one dollar and sixty-eight cents to one dollar and eighty-four cents, both inclusive, eleven cents; on sales of one dollar and eighty-five cents to two dollars, both inclusive, twelve cents.

Separate sales, such as daily or weekly deliveries, shall not be aggregated for the purpose of computation of the tax even though such sales are aggregated in the billing or payment therefor. Notwithstanding any other provision, coin-operated amusement and vending machine sales shall be aggregated for the purpose of computation of this tax.

Individual sales of six cents or less are exempt from tax; however, the purchase of two six cent articles at the same time is a taxable transaction.

Beginning on or after January 1, 2004, the sales tax bracket system is replaced with a simple rounding methodology. For all sales, the six-percent tax rate is multiplied by price and rounded to the nearest cent based upon the third place decimal value. Third place decimal values equal to five or more are rounded up, and values equal to four or less are rounded down. For example, the application of the six-percent rate on \$12.92 yields \$0.775 [i.e., 77.5 cents], or a sales tax of 78 cents. However, the application of the six-percent rate on \$12.91 yields \$0.774 [i.e., 77.4 cents], or a sales tax of 77 cents. No tax applies to sales of eight cents or less.

The law provides that the vendor shall collect the tax due from the purchaser at the time of sale and that the purchaser shall pay such tax unless he presents to the vendor a properly executed certificate of exemption or his direct pay permit number. Should either party fail to comply with the law in this regard, the liability becomes a personal debt due the State, and if the taxpayer is an association or corporation, its officers are personally liable jointly and severally in case of default.

Consumers Sales Tax is to be paid by ultimate consumers; sellers collect the tax and remit their collections to the Tax Department. Only one collection of Consumers Sales Tax should occur in the channel from production to ultimate consumption for any consumer good or service. Any seller who fails to collect the Consumers Sales Tax must pay the tax himself unless the sale was exempt.

Exempt sales are three main types:

1. Exemption because of the nature of the buyer to whom the sale is made;
2. Exemption because of the nature of the article which is sold; and
3. Exemption because of the nature of the sale.

There are several distinct methods by which the exemptions must be claimed. Based on the method by which the exemption must be claimed, exemptions are categorized into three classifications: Per se exemptions, exemptions for which exemption certificates are required, and refundable exemptions.

“Per se” exemptions are those for which no separate exemption document is required as proof of the exempt status. The following sales and services are exempt “per se” from Consumers Sales Tax:

1. *Advertising.* Sales of radio and television broadcasting time, preprinted circulars and outdoor advertising space, and newspaper and magazine advertising space;
2. *Artistic Services or Performances.* The charges to the owner or operator of an entertainment facility for the artistic performances of an entertainer or performing artist pursuant to a contract if the contract amount does not exceed \$3,000;
3. *Burial Charges.* Charges for the services of opening and closing burial lots;
4. *Camp Dawson.* Sales of goods made by a canteen or snack bar facility on a state reservation or state training facility under the jurisdiction of the adjutant general (i.e., Camp Dawson);
5. *Child Care Services.* Charges for babysitting services provided by individuals who babysit for profit if the gross income of the individual from babysitting service does not exceed \$5,000 in a taxable year (all charges or fees over the \$5,000 limit are taxable);
6. *College Room and Board.* Sales of room and board by public or private colleges or universities if the sale is for more than thirty consecutive days and is on a contract basis to students enrolled at the school;
7. *Contracting.* The construction, alteration, repair, improvement or decoration of real property when the work done results in a “capital improvement” to the real property, including services of a construction manager (all other construction activities are subject to the tax unless otherwise exempt);
8. *Day Care Centers.* Sales of tangible personal property or services by licensed day care centers;
9. *Educational Summer Camp Tuition.* Tuition charges made for attending educational summer camps (sales of tangible personal property or food by the camps are taxable);
10. *Electronic Data Processing Services.* Sales of electronic data processing services and software related to such purchases to another company, including sales of Internet access service by an Internet access service provider (sales of data processing equipment, material and supplies are taxable);
11. *Employees.* Services provided by an employee to his or her employer if the services are within the scope of the employment contract;
12. *Farm Products.* Sales of livestock, poultry and other farm products in their original state by producers of those products or members of their immediate family when the sales are made to the public in instances when the producer is not otherwise engaged in making retail sales;
13. *Federal and State Law.* Sales to or sales by certain organizations, including federal or state chartered credit unions, regional transit authorities, county ambulance authorities and nonprofit health care corporations;
14. *Food Sales.* Exempt food sales are as follows:
 - a. Food sold by public or private schools, school-sponsored student organizations or school-sponsored parent-teacher organizations to students enrolled in such school or to employees of the school during normal school hours;
 - b. Sales of food by public or private colleges or universities or by officially recognized student organizations to students enrolled at such college when such sales are made on contract basis;
 - c. Sales of food by a nonprofit organization or a governmental agency to low-income persons at or below cost;
 - d. Food sold in an occasional sale by a charitable, nonprofit or religious organization if the purpose of the sale is to obtain revenue for the functions and activities of the organization and the revenue so obtained is actually expended for that purpose; and
 - e. Sales of food by little leagues, scouting groups, band boosters and similar organizations if the purpose of the sale is to obtain revenue for the functions of the organization and the revenue so obtained is actually used for such functions;

15. *Food Stamps.* Sales of food lawfully purchased with federal food stamps or with drafts issued by the West Virginia special supplemental food program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC);
16. *Fraternalities and Sororities.* Room and board charges made by fraternities or sororities to their student members;
17. *Fundraising Sales.* Fundraising sales by:
 - a. Churches;
 - b. Elementary and secondary schools;
 - c. Organizations that receive more than half their support from gifts, grants, direct or indirect charitable contributions or membership fees;
 - d. Organizations that have no paid employees and whose gross income from fundraising is donated to an organization that is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code; and
 - e. Youth Organizations, such as the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts or YMCA Indian Guide/Princess Program, which are operated exclusively for charitable purposes and whose primary purpose is character development and citizenship training for its members;

If the organization has a current Business Registration Certificate and the organization is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code and these fundraising events are limited to six events (eighteen events by volunteer fire departments and volunteer school support groups) per year and each event lasts no more than eighty-four hours;

18. *Governmental Services and Materials.* Sales of governmental services or governmental materials by county assessors, county sheriffs, county clerks, circuit clerks and/or governmental agents of these county officials in the normal course of local governmental operations;
19. *Health and Fitness Organizations.* Sales of membership or services provided by health and fitness organizations for personalized fitness programs;
20. *Intangible Property.* Sales of intangibles, such as copyrights, royalties, notes and bonds;
21. *Isolated Transactions.* Sales of tangible personal property or taxable services by persons who are not in the business of making such sales, such as individuals selling their used furniture, if the person or business holding the sale holds no more than four in one year and each sale lasts no more than forty-eight hours, and sales of taxable services by persons who are not routinely engaged in the business of providing taxable services, such as teenagers who occasionally mow lawns, babysit or do odd jobs (persons who routinely sell odd items at yard sales, flea markets or along the roadside are engaged in the business of selling and must register with the State Tax Department as a business);
22. *Libraries.* Sales of services by public libraries, libraries at academic institutions, or libraries at institutions of higher learning;
23. *Lottery Tickets.* Sales of West Virginia lottery tickets and materials by authorized lottery retailers, including sales of Powerball tickets and materials;
24. *Manufacturing Representatives.* Commissions received by a manufacturer's representative.
25. *Membership Organizations.* Charges to a member by a membership organization that is exempt from paying federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code for:
 - a. Membership in the association or organization;
 - b. Newsletters prepared by the association or organization primarily for distribution to members;
 - c. Continuing education seminars, workshops, conventions, lectures or courses put on or sponsored by the association or organization, including charges for related course materials prepared by the association or organization or by the speaker for use during the continuing education seminar, workshop, convention, lecture or course, not including separate charges for meals, lodging, entertainment or transportation;
26. *Motor Vehicles.* Sales of motor vehicles and recreational vehicles titled by the West Virginia Division of Motor Vehicles and on which the Motor Vehicles Privilege Tax is paid and leases of motor vehicles if the lease agreement is for thirty days or more;

27. *Music Instructional Services.* Sales of music instructional services by a music teacher;
28. *Newspapers.* Sales of newspapers when delivered to consumers by route carriers (other newspaper sales are taxable);
29. *Nonprofit organizations.* Sales of otherwise taxable services by 501(c)(3) organizations, except nonprofit hospitals, if the organization meets the following criteria:
 - a. The corporation or organization must be organized and operated primarily for charitable or educational purposes;
 - b. The activities and programs of the organization must contribute to promoting the general welfare of youth, families and the aged, improving health and fitness and providing recreational opportunities to the public;
 - c. The corporation or organization must offer membership or participation in its programs and activities to the public;
 - d. The charges, fees and dues of the organization must be arranged so that its programs and activities are accessible by a reasonable cross-section of the community; and
 - e. The corporation or organization must offer financial assistance on a regular and ongoing basis to individuals who are unable to afford the organizations membership dues or fees;
30. *Personal Services.* Personal services, such as barbering, hairstyling, manicuring and massages;
31. *Prescriptions.* Sales of drugs dispensed upon prescription and sales of insulin to consumers for medical purposes;
32. *Primary Opinion Research Services.* Sales of primary research opinion services when such services are provided to an out-of-state client by means of interstate commerce for use by the client outside West Virginia;
33. *Professional Services.* Sales of services recognized as "professional services" under West Virginia law, such as those provided by doctors, lawyers, engineers, architects, certified public accountants and licensed auctioneers;
34. *Public Services.* Sales of services that are subject to regulation by the West Virginia Public Service Commission, including sales of gas, steam or water delivered to consumers through mains or pipes, sales of electricity, most telephone services and services provided by regulated public or common carriers, bus or taxi services (mobile telephone and paging services that may not be regulated are taxable);
35. *Real Property.* Sales of real property (land, houses, buildings and other structures attached to the land), leases or rentals of real property to the same person for thirty or more consecutive days (rentals of less than thirty days are taxable);
36. *School Activities.* Sales of tickets for activities sponsored by elementary and secondary schools located in West Virginia;
37. *State Publications.* Direct or subscription sales by the Division of Natural Resources of *Wonderful West Virginia* magazine and by the Division of Culture and History of *Goldenseal* and *West Virginia History*, but not newsstand sales;
38. *Textbooks.* Sales of textbooks required to be used in any of the schools of the State whether the books are sold directly to the school or to students, including written course materials and audio and video materials if they are a required text of the school;
39. *Transportation.* Charges for transporting passengers in interstate commerce, such as airline and bus tickets, if the trip begins or ends outside the State; and
40. *Travel Agencies.* Commissions received by travel agencies from an out-of-state vendor.
41. Services and sales of associated property by certified environmental and industrial consultants involving technical evaluation for compliance with state and federal environmental standards.
42. Sales made by volunteer fire departments for fundraising purposes.
43. United States regulation size flag or West Virginia regulation size flag.
44. Lodging franchise fees imposed by a lodging franchise as a condition of the franchise agreement.

Some exemptions must be claimed by using a current tax exemption certificate. If a vendor fails to obtain a properly completed exemption certificate from the purchaser or if the purchaser refuses to provide a certificate, the vendor must collect the tax and purchaser must pay the tax. The following is a list of the exemptions for which an exemption certificate is required:

1. *Aircraft Repair.* Aircraft repair, remodeling and maintenance services for licensed carriers of persons or property or for a governmental entity; sales of component parts affixed or attached to such aircraft during repair, remodeling and maintenance services, and sales of tools and equipment directly used to do such services;
2. *Car Wash Soap.* Sales of soap to be used at car wash facilities;
3. *Controlled Groups.* Purchases of services by one corporation, limited liability company or partnership from another corporation, limited liability company or partnership when both entities are members of the same controlled group;
4. *Food.* Food purchased by a nonprofit organization or governmental agency that provides meals to low-income persons at or below cost;
5. *Livestock.* Sales of livestock sold at public sales sponsored by the breeder's or registry associations or at livestock auction markets;
6. *Mobile Homes.* Sales of mobile homes to be used by purchasers as their principal year-round residence are taxed at a 3 percent rate rather than 6 percent;
7. *Movies.* Sales of motion picture films to motion picture exhibitors when the sales of tickets or the charge to view the film are taxable;
8. *Purchases by an Exempt Commercial Agricultural Producer.* Purchases of tangible personal property or taxable services for use or consumption in the commercial production of an agricultural product, including the purchase of fencing and nails used for the construction of fencing, and purchases of propane for use in heating poultry houses;
9. *Purchases by Certain Nonprofit Organizations.* Purchases by a corporation or organization that has a current registration certificate, is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code, receives more than half its support from gifts, grants, direct or indirect charitable contributions and membership fees, and:
 - a. Is a youth organization, such as the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts; or
 - b. Is a church, convention or association of churches as defined in 26 U.S.C. §170; or
 - c. Is an organization with no paid employees whose gross income from fundraisers is donated to 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) organization;
10. *Purchases by Churches.* Purchases of services, equipment, supplies, food for meals and material directly used or consumed by churches that make no charge at all for the services they render;
11. *Purchases by Governments.* Purchases by the federal government and governmental units of West Virginia or another state, if that state grants a sales tax exemption to governmental units of West Virginia (purchases by employees while on government business are not exempt unless such purchases are directly billed to and paid for by the government entity);
12. *Purchases by Producers of Materials Used in the Production of Certain Value-Added Products from Raw Agricultural Products.* Sales of property or services to persons for direct use in the production of a "value-added product" for a period of no more than five years by such persons engaged exclusively in such production activity for the following:
 - a. The conversion of lumber into furniture, toys, collectibles and home furnishings;
 - b. The conversion of fruit into wine;
 - c. The conversion of honey into wine;
 - d. The conversion of wool into fabric;
 - e. The conversion of raw hides into semi-finished or finished leather products;
 - f. The conversion of milk into cheese;
 - g. The conversion of fruits or vegetables into dried, canned or frozen products;
 - h. The conversion of feeder cattle into commonly acceptable slaughter weights;
 - i. The conversion of aquatic animals into dried, canned, cooked or frozen products; and
 - j. The conversion of poultry into dried, canned, cooked or frozen products;

13. *Purchases by Schools.* Purchases by a school that has its principal campus in this State and has approval from the board of trustees of the university system of West Virginia or the board of directors of the state college system to award degrees;
14. *Purchases for Resale.* Purchases of tangible personal property or taxable services intended for resale or for use in performing taxable services when such property becomes a component part of the property upon which the services are performed and will be actually transferred to the purchaser; and
15. *Video Arcade Games.* Sales of coin-operated video arcade machines or video arcade games to a person who provides such machines to the public for a charge upon which the tax is imposed.

For purchases for which there are no per se exemptions or for which no exemption certificate may be issued, the purchaser must pay the Consumers Sales Tax and Use Tax unless he has a direct pay permit number from the State Tax Department. Each business with a direct pay permit must keep a record of taxable and exempt purchases and remit any tax due directly to the State Tax Department. Those without a direct pay permit may either credit the tax paid for items that qualify for a refundable exemption against sales or use tax due and owed on nonexempt purchases or apply for a refund of the tax paid. Refundable exemptions are allowed for the following classifications:

1. *Charitable Organizations.* Purchases by bona fide charitable organizations that make no charge at all for the services they render;
2. *Communications Businesses.* Purchases made for direct use or consumption in the activity of communications, such as telephone, telegraph, commercial broadcast radio and television, and cable television (purchases whose use or consumption is only incidental or convenient to the communications activity are taxable);
3. *Fraternal or Social Organizations.* Purchases by nationally chartered fraternal or social organizations for the sole purpose of free distribution in public welfare or relief work;
4. *Housing.* Purchases of building materials or building supplies by organizations that are exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code when such are to be installed in buildings or structures used as permanent low-income housing, transitional housing, emergency homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters or emergency children and youth shelters when such are owned or operated by organizations listed above;
5. *Manufacturing Businesses.* Purchases of equipment, supplies, materials and services intended for direct use or consumption in the activity of manufacturing (purchases whose use or consumption is only incidental or convenient to the manufacturing activity are taxable);
6. *Natural Resource Production Businesses.* Purchases for direct use or consumption in the activity of producing natural resources (purchases whose use or consumption is only incidental or convenient to the natural resource production activity are taxable), including purchases for the construction, installation or fabrication of ventilation structures, mine shafts, slopes, boreholes, dewatering structures, including associated facilities and apparatus, by the producer or others, including contractors and subcontractors, at a coal mine or coal production facility;
7. *Transportation and Transmission Businesses.* Purchases made for direct use or consumption in the activity of transportation by businesses who are engaged in the activity of hauling or delivering goods for others (purchases whose use or consumption is only incidental or convenient to the transportation or transmission activity are taxable); and
8. *Volunteer Fire Departments.* Purchases of fire fighting or station house equipment, construction and automotive equipment by volunteer fire departments organized and incorporated under the laws of the State of West Virginia.
9. *Research and Development.* Purchases made for direct use or consumption in the activity of research and development after June 30, 2002. "Research and development" is defined as systematic scientific, engineering, or technological study and investigation in a field of knowledge in the physical, computer or software sciences, often involving the formulation of hypotheses and experimentation, for the purpose of revealing new facts, theories or principles, or increasing scientific knowledge, which may reveal the basis for new or enhanced products, equipment or manufacturing processes.

USE TAX

The Use Tax, Chapter 11, Article 15A, West Virginia Code of 1931, as amended, is imposed upon the use within West Virginia of tangible personal property and services which are bought or leased outside West Virginia for use or consumption within this State. The tax is levied at the rate of six percent of the purchase price.

Out-of-state vendors engaging in business in this State are required to collect Use Tax from their West Virginia customers. The State Tax Commissioner is empowered to authorize certain foreign retailers to collect Use Tax at the time a sale is made. Collected tax must be remitted on a quarterly basis. Any person who uses any tangible personal property upon which the tax has not been paid to the seller is personally liable for such tax and is required to remit on a quarterly basis the tax imposed on all such property directly to the State Tax Commissioner.

The use in West Virginia of the following tangible personal property is exempt from the tax:

- (1) All articles of tangible personal property brought into the State of West Virginia by a nonresident individual for his or her use or enjoyment while within the State;
- (2) Tangible personal property and services, the gross receipts from the sale of which are exempted from the Consumers Sales Tax by the terms of Article 15, Chapter 11 of the Code of West Virginia of 1931;
- (3) Tangible personal property and services, the gross receipts or the gross proceeds from the sale of which are required to be included in the measure of the tax imposed by Article 15, Chapter 11 of the Code of West Virginia of 1931;
- (4) Tangible personal property and services the sale of which in this State is not subject to the West Virginia Consumers Sales Tax;
- (5) Sales of mobile homes to be utilized by purchasers as their principal year-round residence and dwelling: Provided, that these mobile homes shall be subject to tax at the three-percent rate.
