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11	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by
12	adding thereto a new section, designated §22A-1-40, relating
13	to notice of hazardous chemical substances and lead exposure
14	to employees of mine operators; requiring Director of Miners'
15	Health, Safety and Training to adopt a list of hazardous
16	substances by rule and to compile safety information regarding
17	hazardous substances; and providing a criminal penalty for
18	violation.
19	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
20	That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended
21	by adding thereto a new section, designated \$22A-1-40, to read as
22	follows:
23	ARTICLE 1. OFFICE OF MINERS' HEALTH, SAFETY AND TRAINING;
24	ADMINISTRATION; ENFORCEMENT.

1 §22A-1-40. Hazardous chemical substances; notice to employees; 2 notice to employees of lead exposure; reports to 3 director; penalties. (a) It is declared the policy of this state to require mine 4 operators (hereinafter employers) subject to the provisions of this 6 chapter to disclose to employees the hazards of exposure in the 7 workplace to hazardous or toxic chemical substances and materials. 8 For this purpose, the Director of the Office of Miners' Health, 9 Safety and Training shall adopt the list of toxic and hazardous 10 substances found in twenty-nine Code of Federal Regulations 11 1910.1000, 1910.1001, 1910.1020, 1910.1025, 1910.1200 and 12 1910.1201, Subpart Z, revised as of July 1, 1998, as amended, and 13 shall also maintain, by rule a list of chemical substances and 14 materials which have been determined or are suspected to be 15 hazardous or toxic to the health of employees who may be exposed to 16 them in the course of employment. In establishing and maintaining 17 this list, the director may give consideration to any list made or 18 hereafter made by the Secretary of Labor of the United States 19 identifying or proposing to identify chemical substances and 20 materials as hazardous or toxic or setting standard levels of safe 21 exposure thereto, as the same are published from time to time in 22 the federal register. The director shall publish and update, at 23 least annually, the list of substances and materials and

24 information regarding lead exposure and shall include in the

1	publication thereof, for each listed substance or material, any
2	standard levels of safe exposure published by the secretary in the
3	federal register, giving due consideration to any changes made or
4	proposed by the secretary in the secretary's list of hazardous or
5	toxic chemical substances and materials, or in any standard levels
6	of safe exposure established or proposed from time to time by the
7	secretary, as the same are published in the federal register. The
8	director shall provide a copy of the updated list and lead exposure
9	information to the Joint Committee on Government and Finance by
10	December 1 each year.
11	(b) Any employer of ten or more employees using or producing
12	any listed hazardous chemical substance or material shall
13	conspicuously post a warning notice in the work area where any such
14	substance or material is used, to read substantially as follows:
15	WARNING NOTICE

17	(Name of hazardous chemical substance or material) is used at
18	this work site.
19	Common symptoms of overexposure include the following:

21	Name of Employer
22	Any notice required to be posted with regard to a mobile work
23	site may be posted on the container or containers of the hazardous
24	substance or material or in some other conspicuous place.

1	The employer shall include in the notice those common symptoms
2	of overexposure that: (1) Are published with the standard levels
3	of safe exposure; or (2) are certified to the employer by a
4	physician employed for that purpose. Good faith reliance upon the
5	source of information will be sufficient notice of the common
6	symptoms.
7	(c) Any employer whose employees may come in contact with lead
8	as defined in twenty-nine Code of Federal Regulations 1910.1025,
9	Subpart Z, shall reasonably investigate the possibility of lead
10	exposure to employees. Upon a determination of the presence of
11	lead, the employer shall take all reasonable and necessary steps to
12	minimize exposure to employees, and the employer shall
13	conspicuously post a warning notice in the work area where any lead
14	exposure may occur, to read substantially as follows:
15	WARNING NOTICE
16	<u></u>
17	Lead has been detected at this work site. There is a
18	possibility of lead exposure at this work site and all reasonable
19	and necessary steps must be followed to minimize employee exposure
20	including the following:

22	Name of Employer
23	The Director of the Office of Miners' Health, Safety and
24	Training shall provide at the request of the employer the

- 1 reasonable and necessary steps to minimize worker exposure to lead
- 2 for inclusion on the warning notice above. Any notice required to
- 3 be posted with regard to a mobile work site may be posted in a
- 4 conspicuous place where exposure is possible.
- 5 The employer must comply with all requirements of the director
- 6 and the provisions of twenty-nine Code of Federal Regulations
- 7 1910.1025, Subpart Z regarding any known lead hazard.
- 8 (d) Any employer having notice of any incident of exposure to
- 9 a listed hazardous chemical substance or material in excess of its
- 10 standard level of safe exposure published by the director shall,
- 11 within ten days thereof, report to the director the circumstances
- 12 of the incident and provide a copy of the report to the employee.
- 13 (e) Any person or corporation that violates the provisions of
- 14 this section is quilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction
- 15 thereof, shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 for
- 16 each violation.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to require mine operators to provide notice of hazardous chemical substances and lead exposure to its employees.

This section is new; therefore, it has been completely underscored.
