20	(a) The Division of Highways shall prepare and upon request
21	supply to the State Police, municipal police departments, sheriffs,
22	Division of Natural Resources, and other suitable agencies or
23	individuals, electronic or paper forms for crash reports required
24	hereunder.
25	(b) The format of the crash reports shall provide sufficiently

26 detailed information to disclose with reference to a traffic crash

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1 the cause, conditions then existing, and the persons and vehicles
2 involved.

3 (c) Every crash report required to be made shall be made in 4 the appropriate form provided by the Division of Highways and shall 5 contain all of the information required therein unless not 6 available.

7 (d) Every such report shall also contain information 8 sufficient to enable the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to 9 determine whether the requirements for security upon motor vehicles 10 is in effect in accordance with chapter seventeen-d of this code. 11 (e) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the 12 contrary, a completed crash report form is conclusive as to the 13 issue of the accident's cause, unless a court of competent 14 jurisdiction rules otherwise.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to provide that a completed crash report form is conclusive upon the issue as to causation unless a court of competent jurisdiction rules otherwise.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.

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
