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11	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$22A-1-9$ of the Code of West Virginia,
12	1931, as amended, relating to the office of Miners' Health
13	Safety and Training; requiring the employment of diesel
14	inspectors.
15	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
16	That \$22A-1-9 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
17	be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
18	ARTICLE 1. OFFICE OF MINERS' HEALTH, SAFETY AND TRAINING;
19	ADMINISTRATION; ENFORCEMENT.
20	§22A-1-9. Mine safety instructors; diesel inspectors; eligibility;
21	qualifications; examinations; salary; provisions
22	relating to underground mine inspectors applicable to
23	mine safety instructors.
24	(a) The office shall employ a sufficient number of mine safety

- 1 instructors as the director determines to be reasonably necessary 2 in fully and effectively carrying out the applicable provisions of 3 this chapter.
- (b) To be eligible for employment as a mine safety instructor, 5 the applicant shall be: (1) A citizen of West Virginia, in good 6 health, not less than twenty-four years of age, of good character 7 and reputation, and of temperate habits; (2) a person who has had 8 at least five years of practical experience in coal mines, at least 9 two years of which has been in mines in this state: Provided, That 10 graduation from any accredited college of mining engineering may be 11 considered equivalent to two years of practical experience; (3) a 12 person who has had practical experience with dangerous gases found 13 in coal mines, and who has a good theoretical and practical 14 knowledge of mines, mining methods, mine ventilation, sound safety 15 practices and applicable mining laws and rules; and (4) a person 16 who possesses a West Virginia foreman-fireboss certification; or a 17 person who has had at least three years of experience as an actual 18 working team member of a mine rescue team, or at least three years 19 of experience as a member of a first aid team or emergency medical 20 technician team; or a person who has had at least three years of 21 experience as the safety director, or the equivalent as approved by 22 the mine inspectors' examining board, of a mine; or a person who 23 has had at least three years of experience as an active member of 24 a mine safety committee. For the purpose of this section,

- 1 practical experience means the performance of normal mining duties
- 2 requiring a person to hold a certificate of competency and
- 3 qualification as an experienced miner prior to actually performing
- 4 such duties.
- 5 (c) (1) In order to qualify for appointment as a mine safety
- 6 instructor, an eligible applicant shall submit to written, oral and
- 7 practical examinations administered by the mine inspectors'
- 8 examining board and furnish evidence of good health, character and
- 9 other facts establishing eligibility as the board may require. The
- 10 examinations shall relate to the duties to be performed by a mine
- 11 safety instructor and, subject to the approval of the mine
- 12 inspectors' examining board, may be prepared by the director.
- 13 (2) If the board finds after investigation and examination
- 14 that an applicant: (A) Is eligible for appointment; and (B) has
- 15 passed each required examination with a grade of at least seventy-
- 16 five percent or an overall combined average score of eighty
- 17 percent, the board shall add the applicant's name and grades to the
- 18 register of qualified eligible candidates and promptly certify its
- 19 action in writing to the director. The director shall then appoint
- 20 one of the candidates from the three having the highest grades.
- 21 (d) Mine safety instructors shall be paid an annual salary of
- 22 not less than \$37,400, which shall be fixed by the director, who
- 23 shall take into consideration ability, performance of duty and
- 24 experience. Mine safety instructors shall devote all of their time

- 1 to the duties of the office.
- 2 (e) Except as expressly provided in this section to the
- 3 contrary, all provisions of this article relating to the
- 4 eligibility, qualification, appointment, tenure and removal of
- 5 underground mine inspectors, as well as those provisions relating
- 6 to compensatory time and reimbursement for necessary expenses, are
- 7 applicable to mine safety instructors.
- 8 (f) The office shall employ a new diesel inspector for each
- 9 regional office and shall provide training in accordance with 196
- 10 CSR 1 §\$2, 3, 5, 26 and 27.
- 11 (g) The diesel inspector's primary duties shall include:
- 12 (1) Perform quarterly inspection of all diesel equipment in
- 13 the region they are assigned to;
- 14 (2) Verify that all registered and numbered diesel equipment
- 15 at mine sites matches the inventory records for that mine site;
- 16 (3) Any other duties the director may assign, after the
- 17 <u>inspector has completed their primary duties.</u>
- 18 (h) The starting salary for the diesel inspectors shall be
- 19 \$51,206 annually.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to require the Office of Miners Health and Safety to employ qualified diesel inspectors.
