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10	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$30-7-15a$ and $\$30-7-15b$ of the Code of
11	West Virginia, 1931, as amended, all relating to authorizing
12	the Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses to
13	govern the practice of advanced nurse practitioners; setting
14	forth the conditions under which advanced nurse practitioners
15	may prescribe drugs; eliminating the prohibition of advanced

21	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
22	That $$30-7-15a$ and $$30-7-15b$ of the Code of West Virginia,
23	1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:
24	ARTICLE 7. REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL NURSES.
25	§30-7-15a. Prescriptive authority for prescription drugs;

- collaborative relationship with physician requirements; promulgation of rules; classification of drugs to be prescribed; coordination with other boards; coordination with Board of Pharmacy.
- 6 nurse practitioner to prescribe prescription drugs in a collaborative relationship with a physician licensed to practice in 8 West Virginia and in accordance with applicable state and federal 9 laws. An authorized advanced nurse practitioner may write or sign 10 prescriptions or transmit prescriptions verbally or by other means 11 of communication. The Board of Examiners for Registered 12 Professional Nurses as set forth in section three, article seven of 13 this chapter has sole authority to govern and regulate the practice 14 of advanced nurse practitioners.
- (b) For purposes of this section an agreement to a collaborative relationship for prescriptive practice between a physician and an advanced nurse practitioner shall be set forth in writing. Verification of such agreement shall be filed with the board by the advanced nurse practitioner. The board shall forward a copy of such verification to the board of Medicine. Collaborative agreements shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

 (1) Mutually agreed upon written guidelines or protocols for

- 7 An advanced nurse practitioner who applies for authorization 8 to prescribe drugs shall:

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses to govern and regulate the practice of advanced nurse practitioners. The bill sets forth the conditions under which advanced nurse practitioners may prescribe drugs. The bill removes the prohibition of advanced nurse practitioners not being able to prescribing drugs listed in Schedules I and II of the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. The bill removes the requirement that the advanced nurse practitioner have an undergraduate degree in the sciences or arts and replaces it with the requirement that he or she have a graduate degree from an accredited nursing school. The bill also grants rulemaking authority.
