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10	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$22-15A-22$ of the Code of West
11	Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to removing the ban on
12	disposing of covered electronic devices in solid waste

14	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
15	That §22-15A-22 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as
16	amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
17	ARTICLE 15A. THE A. JAMES MANCHIN REHABILITATION ENVIRONMENTAL
18	ACTION PLAN.
19	§22-15A-22. Prohibition on the disposal of certain items; plans
20	for the proper handling of said items required.
21	(a) It is unlawful to dispose of lead-acid batteries in a
22	solid waste landfill in West Virginia.
23	(b) It is unlawful to dispose of tires in a solid waste
24	landfill in West Virginia except for waste tires collected as part
25	of the department's waste tire remediation projects or other

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1 collection efforts in accordance with the provisions of this 2 article or the pollution prevention program and open dump program 3 or other state-authorized remediation or clean up programs: 4 Provided, That waste tires may be disposed of in solid waste 5 landfills only when the state agency authorizing the remediation or 6 clean up program has determined there is no reasonable alternative 7 available.

8 (c) It is unlawful to dispose of yard waste in a solid waste 9 facility in West Virginia: *Provided*, That the prohibitions do not 10 apply to a facility designed specifically to compost yard waste or 11 otherwise recycle or reuse yard waste: *Provided*, *however*, That 12 reasonable and necessary exceptions to the prohibitions may be 13 included as part of the rules promulgated pursuant to subsection 14 (f) (e) of this section.

(d) Effective January 1, 2011, covered electronic devices, as defined in section two of this article, may not be disposed of in a solid waste landfill in West Virginia.

18 (e) (d) The Solid Waste Management Board shall design a 19 comprehensive program to provide for the proper handling of yard 20 waste, lead-acid batteries, tires and covered electronic devices.

21 (f) (e) The secretary shall promulgate rules, in accordance 22 with chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, to implement and enforce 23 the program for yard waste, lead-acid batteries <u>and</u> tires. and 24 covered electronic devices designed pursuant to subsection (d) 25 (g) (f) The secretary's rule shall provide for the disposal of

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1 yard waste in a manner consistent with one or any combination of 2 the following:

3 (1) Disposal in a publicly or privately operated commercial or4 noncommercial composting facility;

5 (2) Disposal by composting on the property from which domestic 6 yard waste is generated or on adjoining property or neighborhood 7 property if consent is obtained from the owner of the adjoining or 8 neighborhood property;

9 (3) Disposal by open burning, where not prohibited; or

10 (4) Disposal in a publicly or privately operated landfill, 11 only where none of the foregoing options are available. The manner 12 of disposal shall <u>may</u> only involve small quantities of domestic 13 yard waste generated only from the property of the participating 14 resident or tenant.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to remove the ban on disposing of covered electronic devices in solid waste landfills.
