[Originating in the Committee on Natural Resources; reported February 17, 2011.]

A BILL to amend and reenact §15-10-3 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; to amend and reenact §19-1A-4 of said code; and to amend and reenact §20-7-1 of said code, all relating to clarifying that Division of Forestry natural resources police officers are under the control and direction of the Director of the Division of Forestry; permitting the director to enter into memorandums of understanding with other lawenforcement agencies; and clarifying the duties of the director.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That §15-10-3 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted; that §19-1A-4 of said code be amended

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and reenacted; and that §20-7-1 of said code be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:

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ARTICLE 10. COOPERATION BETWEEN LAW-ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.

§15-10-3. Definitions.

- 1 For purposes of this article only, and unless a different
- 2 meaning plainly is required:
- 3 (1) "Criminal justice enforcement personnel" means those
- 4 persons within the state criminal justice system who are
- 5 actually employed as members of the State Police, members
- 6 of the Division of Protective Services, natural resources
- 7 police officers, chiefs of police and police of incorporated
- 8 municipalities, and county sheriffs and their deputies, and
- 9 whose primary duties are the investigation of crime and the
- 10 apprehension of criminals.
- 11 (2) "Head of a law-enforcement agency" means the
- 12 Superintendent of the State Police, the Director of the
- 13 Division of Protective Services, the chief natural resources
- $\,\,14\,\,$ police officer of the Division of Natural Resources, a chief of
- 15 police of an incorporated municipality or, a county sheriff <u>or</u>
- 16 the Director of the Division of Forestry.

17 (3) "State or local law-enforcement officer" means any duly authorized member of a law-enforcement agency who 18 19 is authorized to maintain public peace and order, prevent 20 and detect crime, make arrests and enforce the laws of the 21 state or any county or municipality thereof, other than 22 parking ordinances, and includes those persons employed as 23 campus police officers at state institutions of higher education in accordance with the provisions of section five, article 24 25 four, chapter eighteen-b of this code, although those institu-26 tions may not be considered law-enforcement agencies. The 27 term also includes those persons employed as rangers by the Hatfield-McCoy Regional Recreation Authority in accor-28 dance with the provisions of section six, article fourteen, 29 30 chapter twenty of this code, although the authority is not a 31 law-enforcement agency. 32 (4) "Head of campus police" means the superintendent or administrative head of state or local law-enforcement officers employed as campus police officers at state institu-34 tions of higher education in accordance with the provisions 35 36 of section five, article four, chapter eighteen-b of this code. (5) "Head of the rangers of the Hatfield-McCoy Regional 37 Recreation Authority" means the superintendent or adminis-38

- 40 employed as rangers by the Hatfield-McCoy Regional
- 41 Recreation Authority in accordance with the provisions of
- 42 section six, article fourteen, chapter twenty of this code.

ARTICLE 1A. DIVISION OF FORESTRY.

§19-1A-4. Additional duties of the Director of the Division of Forestry generally.

- 1 (a) The director shall:
- 2 (1) Develop, promote and advance the growth of the forest
- 3 products industries of this state:
- 4 (2) Cooperate with educational institutions, development
- 5 agencies, and private and public organizations to promote
- 6 the expansion of the forest products industries of this state
- 7 in local and global markets:
- 8 (3) Conduct research on marketing and developing forest
- 9 products and forest products industries; conserving, manag-
- 10 ing, and utilizing the state's forest land and its multiple uses;
- 11 and improving the forestry knowledge and practices of
- 12 private landowners.
- 13 (4) Compile its findings and recommendations, and dissem-
- 14 inate the results of its research to the public, the forest
- 15 products industry, the Governor and the Legislature.

- 16 (b) The director has the power to carry out and effectuate
- 17 the purposes of this article, article one-b of this chapter, and
- 18 article three of chapter twenty of this code, including the
- 19 power to:
- 20 (1) Accept and use gifts, donations or contributions from
- 21 individuals, organizations or corporations, and to acquire by
- 22 gift, lease or purchase real estate.
- 23 (2) Establish law enforcement practices and procedures to
- 24 address the law enforcement requirements of the division;
- 25 and
- 26 (3) To promulgate rules and regulations, subject to the
- 27 provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.

ARTICLE 7. LAW ENFORCEMENT, MOTORBOATING, LITTER.

PART I. LAW ENFORCEMENT.

PROCEDURES AND PENALTIES.

- §20-7-1. Chief natural resources police officer; natural resources police officers; special and emergency natural resources police officers; subsistence allowance; expenses.
 - 1 (a) The division's law-enforcement policies, practices and
 - 2 programs are under the immediate supervision and direction
 - 3 of the division law-enforcement officer selected by the

- 4 director and designated as chief natural resources police
- 5 officer as provided in section thirteen, article one of this
- 6 chapter.
- 7 (b) Under the supervision of the director, the chief natural
- 8 resources police officer shall organize, develop and maintain
- 9 law-enforcement practices, means and methods geared,
- 10 timed and adjustable to seasonal, emergency and other needs
- 11 and requirements of the division's comprehensive natural
- 12 resources program. All division personnel detailed and
- 13 assigned to law-enforcement duties and services under this
- 14 section shall be known and designated as natural resources
- 15 police officers and are under the immediate supervision and
- 16 direction of the chief natural resources police officer except
- 17 as otherwise provided. All natural resources police officers
- 18 shall be trained, equipped and conditioned for duty and
- 19 services wherever and whenever required by division
- 20 law-enforcement needs.
- 21 (c) The chief natural resources police officer, acting under
- 22 supervision of the director, is authorized to select and
- 23 appoint emergency natural resources police officers for a
- 24 limited period for effective enforcement of the provisions of
- 25 this chapter when considered necessary because of emer-

gency or other unusual circumstances. The emergency natural resources police officers shall be selected from 2728 qualified civil service personnel of the division, except in 29 emergency situations and circumstances when the director may designate officers, without regard to civil service 30 31 requirements and qualifications, to meet law-enforcement needs. Emergency natural resources police officers shall exercise all powers and duties prescribed in section four of 33 this article for full-time salaried natural resources police 35 officers except the provisions of subdivision (8) of said 36 section.

(d) The chief natural resources police officer, acting under 37 supervision of the director, is also authorized to select and 39 appoint as special natural resources police officers any full-time civil service employee who is assigned to, and has direct responsibility for management of, an area owned, leased or under the control of the division and who has satisfactorily completed a course of training established and 43 administered by the chief natural resources police officer. 44 45 when the action is considered necessary because of law-enforcement needs. The powers and duties of a special 46 natural resources police officer, appointed under this

48 provision, is the same within his or her assigned area as prescribed for full-time salaried natural resources police 50 officers. The jurisdiction of the person appointed as a special 51 natural resources police officer, under this provision, shall be limited to the division area or areas to which he or she is 52 assigned and directly manages. 53 54 (e) The chief natural resources police officer, acting under supervision of the Director of the Division of Forestry is also 56 authorized to appoint and revoke Division of Forestry as 57 special natural resources police officers any who are full-time civil service forest fire control personnel who have 58 satisfactorily completed a course of training as required by 59 the Director of the Division of Forestry. established and 60 61 administered by the chief natural resources police officer. 62 The jurisdiction of forest fire control full-time civil service personnel appointed as special natural resources police officers is limited to the enforcement of the provisions of article three of this chapter. The jurisdiction, powers and duties of Division of Forestry special natural resources police 66 67 officers are set forth by the Director of the Division of Forestry pursuant to article three of this chapter, and 68 articles one-a and one-b, chapter nineteen of this code. 69

- 70 (f) The chief natural resources police officer, with the
- 71 approval of the director, has the power and authority to
- 72 revoke any appointment of an emergency natural resources
- 73 police officer or of a special natural resources police officer
- 74 at any time.
- 75 (g) Natural resources police officers are subject to seasonal
- 76 or other assignment and detail to duty whenever and wher-
- 77 ever required by the functions, services and needs of the
- 78 division.
- 79 (h) The chief natural resources police officer shall desig-
- 80 nate the area of primary residence of each natural resources
- 81 police officer, including himself or herself. Since the area of
- 82 business activity of the division is actually anywhere within
- 83 the territorial confines of the State of West Virginia, actual
- 84 expenses incurred shall be paid whenever the duties are
- 85 performed outside the area of primary assignment and still
- 86 within the state.
- 87 (i) Natural resources police officers shall receive, in
- 88 addition to their base pay salary, a minimum monthly
- 89 subsistence allowance for their required telephone service,
- 90 dry cleaning or required uniforms, and meal expenses while
- 91 performing their regular duties in their area of primary

- 92 assignment in the amount of \$130 each month. This subsis-93 tence allowance does not apply to special or emergency
- 94 natural resources police officers appointed under this
- 96 (j) After June 30, 2010, all those full time law-enforcement
- 97 officers employed by the Division of Natural Resources as
- 98 conservation officers shall be titled and known as natural
- 99 resources police officers. Wherever used in this code the term
- 100 "conservation officer," or its plural, means "natural re-
- 101 sources police officer," or its plural, respectively.
- 102 (k) Notwithstanding any provision of this code to the
- 103 contrary, the provisions of subdivision six, subsection c,
- 104 section twelve, article twenty-one, chapter eleven of this
- $105 \quad code \ are \ in applicable \ to \ pensions \ of \ natural \ resources \ police$
- 106 officers paid through the Public Employees Retirement
- 107 System.

(NOTE: The purpose of this bill is transfer the supervision of special natural resources police officers working on forestry issues from the Division of Natural Resources to the Division of Forestry, where they are paid, housed and supervised. The bill also clarifies the jurisdiction of the Division of Forestry special natural resources police officers in the code and permits the director to enter into memorandums of understanding with other law-enforcement agencies.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
