21	(a) It is unlawful to dispose of lead-acid batteries in a

23	(b) It is unlawful to dispose of tires in a solid waste

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit the disposal of electronic devices in solid waste landfills. The bill also eliminates rule-making authority for the disposal of electronic devices in solid waste landfills.
