L 5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
L 6	That §17C-15-49 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as
L 7	amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
L 8	ARTICLE 15. EQUIPMENT.
L 9	§17C-15-49. Operation of vehicles with safety belts; exception
20	penalty; civil actions; educational program by West
21	Virginia State Police.
22	(a) Effective September 1, one thousand nine hundred ninety-
23	three 2012, a person may not operate a passenger vehicle on a

1 public street or highway of this state unless the person, any
2 passenger in the back seat under eighteen years of age and any
3 passenger in the front seat of such the passenger vehicle is
4 restrained by a safety belt meeting applicable federal motor
5 vehicle safety standards. For the purposes of this section, the
6 term "passenger vehicle" means a motor vehicle which is designed
7 for transporting ten passengers or less, including the driver,
8 except that such the term does not include a motorcycle, a trailer
9 or any motor vehicle which is not required on the date of the
10 enactment of this section under a federal motor vehicle safety
11 standard to be equipped with a belt system. The provisions of this
12 section shall apply to all passenger vehicles manufactured after
13 January 1, 1967, and being 1968 models and newer.

(b) The required use of safety belts as provided herein in this section does not apply to a duly appointed or contracted rural mail carrier of the United States Postal Service who is actually making mail deliveries or to a passenger or operator with a physically disabling condition whose physical disability would prevent appropriate restraint in such the safety belt if the condition is duly certified by a physician who shall state states the nature of the disability as well as the reason such the restraint is inappropriate. The Division of Motor Vehicles shall adopt propose rules for legislative approval, in accordance with the provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, to establish

- 1 a method to certify the physical disability and to require use of 2 an alternative restraint system where feasible or to waive the 3 requirement for the use of any restraint system.
- 4 (c) Any person who violates the provisions of this section
 5 shall be fined not more than twenty-five \$15. No court costs or
 6 other fees shall Court costs or other fees may not be assessed for
 7 a violation of this section. Enforcement of this section shall be
 8 accomplished only as a secondary action when a driver of a
 9 passenger vehicle has been detained for probable cause of violating
 10 another section of this code.
- (d) A violation of this section is not admissible as evidence of negligence or contributory negligence or comparative negligence in any civil action or proceeding for damages and shall is not be admissible in mitigation of damages: Provided, That the court may, upon motion of the defendant, conduct an in camera hearing to determine whether an injured party's failure to wear a safety belt was a proximate cause of the injuries complained of. Upon such a finding by the court, the court may then, in a jury trial, by special interrogatory to the jury, determine: (1) That the injured party failed to wear a safety belt; and (2) that the failure to wear the safety belt constituted a failure to mitigate damages. The trier of fact may reduce the injured party's recovery for medical damages by an amount not to exceed five percent thereof of the medical damages. In the event the plaintiff stipulates to the

- 2 the calculations and the issue of mitigation of damages for failure
- 3 to wear a safety belt shall may not be presented to the jury. In

- 7 contrary, no points may be entered on any driver's record
- 8 maintained by the Division of Motor Vehicles as a result of a
- 9 violation of this section.
- 10 (f) Commencing the first day of July, one thousand nine
- 11 hundred ninety-three The Governor's Highway Safety Program, in
- 12 cooperation with the division of public safety West Virginia State
- 13 Police and any other state departments or agencies and with county
- 14 and municipal law-enforcement agencies, shall initiate and conduct
- 15 an educational program designed to encourage compliance with safety
- 16 belt usage laws. This program shall be focused on the effectiveness
- 17 of safety belts, the monetary savings and the other benefits to the
- 18 public from usage of safety belts and the requirements and
- 19 penalties specified in this law.
- 20 (q) Nothing contained in this section shall be construed to
- 21 abrogate or alter abrogates or alters the provisions of section
- 22 forty-six of this article relating to the mandatory use of child
- 23 passenger safety devices.
