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11	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by	
12	adding thereto a new article, designated §5B-2I-1, §5B-2I-2,	
13	\$5B-2I-3, $$5B-2I-4$ , $$5B-2I-5$ and $$5B-2I-6$ , all relating to	
14	creating the Jobs Impact Statement Act; requiring that the	
15	West Virginia Development Office prepare a jobs impact	
16	statement when requested by the Governor or a majority of	
17	certain leaders of either house of the Legislature for certain	
18	proposed legislation; outlining the contents of the jobs	
19	impact statement; providing that this article does not affect	
20	the validity of legislation, restrict consideration of pending	
21	legislation or otherwise alter, amend or invalidate any rule	
22	of the Senate, the House of Delegates or joint rules of the	
23	Senate and House of Delegates; and describing the manner in	
24	which copies of the jobs impact statement shall be made

- 2 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
- 3 That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended
- 4 by adding thereto a new article, designated \$5B-2I-1, \$5B-2I-2,
- 5 \$5B-2I-3, \$5B-2I-4, \$5B-2I-5 and \$5B-2I-6, all to read as follows:
- 6 ARTICLE 21. JOBS IMPACT STATEMENT.
- 7 §5B-2I-1. Short title.
- 8 This article may be cited as the "Jobs Impact Statement Act."
- 9 §5B-2I-2. Legislative findings.
- 10 The Legislature finds that to maintain and create an economic
- 11 climate which will sustain and promote the creation and retention
- 12 of jobs in the State of West Virginia and provide for employment
- 13 opportunities for as many citizens as possible, it is important to
- 14 understand the jobs impact of Acts of the Legislature. The
- 15 Legislature further finds that without appropriate information it
- 16 may enact legislation that would adversely affect employment in the
- 17 state.
- 18 §5B-2I-3. Persons empowered to request jobs impact statement;
- 19 preparation by West Virginia Development Office; time
- 20 limitations.
- 21 Upon (1) written request by the Governor, (2) written request
- 22 by any two of the following three persons: the Speaker of the
- 23 House, the Chairman of Economic Development and Small Business and
- 24 the House minority leader, or (3) written request by any two of the

- 1 following three persons: the President of the Senate, the Chairman
- 2 of Economic Development and the Senate minority leader, proposed
- 3 legislation which has an impact on the state's economy shall be
- 4 reviewed by the West Virginia Development Office, which shall
- 5 prepare a jobs impact statement. The request shall be accompanied
- 6 by one copy of the proposed legislation. In preparing a jobs
- 7 impact statement, the Director of the West Virginia Development
- 8 Office may seek assistance or data from, or contract with, any
- 9 organization or state agency which may facilitate the compilation
- 10 of the jobs impact statement. Any state agency shall provide
- 11 requested information within ten days from the date of the request.
- 12 The West Virginia Development Office shall return a jobs
- 13 impact statement to the requesting party within twenty days of the
- 14 date of the original request.
- 15 §5B-2I-4. Contents of the jobs impact statement; explanations
- required for omissions.
- 17 (a) General rule. -- The jobs impact statement, using
- 18 generally accepted methodology, shall detail both the short-term
- 19 and long-term job effects of the proposed legislation and shall
- 20 include, but is not limited to, the following information:
- 21 (1) A determination of the probable result of the legislation
- 22 in terms of the number of West Virginia jobs which will be created,
- 23 retained or eliminated;
- 24 (2) A statement of the probable net impact of the legislation

- 1 on employment levels and employment patterns in West Virginia; and
- 2 (3) A determination of the relative impact on the number of
- 3 West Virginia jobs by general industrial sector using the two-digit
- 4 standard North American Industry Classification System (NAICS)
- 5 codes as found in the current version of the Official U.S. NAICS  $\,$
- 6 Manual.
- 7 (b) Omission. -- A jobs impact statement that omits any
- 8 information required by subsection (a) of this section shall
- 9 specifically note its omission, the reason for its omission, the
- 10 importance of any relevant information so omitted to a complete and
- 11 realistic assessment of the economic impact of the legislation, and
- 12 the additional time and effort required to obtain any information
- 13 needed for the assessment.
- 14 §5B-2I-5. Lack of jobs impact statement not to affect
- consideration or validity of legislation.
- 16 If, in the opinion of the Director of the West Virginia
- 17 Development Office, a jobs impact statement cannot be prepared
- 18 within the statutory time frame, the unavailability of a jobs
- 19 impact statement does not affect the validity of legislation which
- 20 is enacted nor does the unavailability restrict consideration of
- 21 pending legislation. A provision of this article may not be
- 22 determined to alter, amend or invalidate any rule of the Senate,
- 23 rule of the House of Delegates, or joint rule of the Senate and
- 24 House of Delegates.

## 1 §5B-2I-6. Availability of copies of jobs impact statements.

- One copy of a jobs impact statement requested under section
- 3 three of this article shall be made available to the Governor and
- 4 the presiding officers of both houses of the Legislature, who shall
- 5 distribute the statement to all members of their respective houses.
- 6 Copies of the statement shall be made available to the public at
- 7 the office of the clerk of the respective houses of the
- 8 Legislature.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to require a jobs impact statement to be completed by the West Virginia Development Office for certain proposed legislation which may cause an impact on the West Virginia economy, when so requested by the Governor or leader of either House of the Legislature.

This article is new; therefore, strike-throughs and underscoring have been omitted.
