14	all relating to establishing protocols and protections to

16	findings with respect to concussions; defining certain terms
17	and requiring Secondary School Activities Commission rule
18	addressing concussions and head injuries; specifying certain
19	minimum provisions of rule; requiring inclusion of volunteer
20	workers and student teachers under the professional and
21	liability coverage provided to county school boards by Board
22	Of Risk and Insurance Management; including licensed health
23	care professional within term "volunteer worker" with certain

conditions and limiting civil liability; including medical assistance rendered by licensed medical professional without remuneration to youth athlete as equivalent to emergency care at scene of accident or medical emergency for protection from liability for civil damages; and including scheduled practices within term "event."

7 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

8 That section §55-7-19 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as 9 amended, be repealed; that said code be amended by adding thereto 10 a new section, designated §18-2-25a; that §29-12-5a of said code be 11 amended and reenacted; and that §55-7-15 of said code be amended 12 and reenacted, all to read as follows:

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## CHAPTER 18. EDUCATION.

 (a) The Legislature finds:

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 (1) Concussions are one of the most commonly reported injuries

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 in children and adolescents who participate in sports and

22 recreational activities. The centers for disease control and

1 prevention estimates that as many as three million nine hundred 2 thousand sports-related and recreation-related concussions occur in 3 the United States each year;

(2) A concussion is caused by a blow or motion to the head or 4 5 body that causes the brain to move rapidly inside the skull. The 6 risk of catastrophic injuries or death are significant when a 7 concussion or head injury is not properly evaluated and managed; 8 (3) Concussions are a type of brain injury that can range from mild to severe and can disrupt the way the brain normally works; 9 (4) Concussions can occur in any organized or unorganized 10 11 sport or recreational activity and can result from a fall or from 12 players colliding with each other, the ground or with obstacles; 13 (5) Concussions occur with or without loss of consciousness, 14 but the vast majority occur without loss of consciousness; 15 (6) Continuing to play or practice with a concussion or

16 <u>symptoms of head injury leaves the interscholastic athlete</u> 17 especially vulnerable to greater injury and even death; and

18 <u>(7) Even with generally recognized return to play and practice</u> 19 <u>standards for concussion and head injury, some affected</u> 20 <u>interscholastic athletes are prematurely returned to play or</u> 21 <u>practice resulting in actual or potential physical injury or death</u> 22 <u>to the athletes in the State of West Virginia.</u>

23 (b) For the purposes of this section, "interscholastic

1 <u>athlete" means any athlete who is participating in interscholastic</u>
2 <u>athletics at a high school or middle school that is a member of the</u>
3 <u>West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission, and "licensed</u>
4 <u>health care professional" means a health care provider whose</u>
5 <u>licensed scope of practice includes the ability to diagnose and</u>
6 treat an injury or disease.

7 (c) The West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission 8 shall promulgate rules pursuant to section twenty-five of this 9 article that address concussions and head injuries in 10 interscholastic athletes: *Provided*, That prior to state board 11 approval and notwithstanding the exemption provided in section 12 three, article one, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, the state 13 board shall submit the rule to the Legislative Oversight Commission 14 on Education Accountability pursuant to section nine, article 15 three-b, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.

16 (d) The rules required by this section shall include, but are 17 not limited to, the following:

18 <u>(1) Guidelines and other pertinent information and forms to</u> 19 <u>inform and educate appropriate school administrators, coaches,</u> 20 <u>interscholastic athletes and their parents or guardians of the</u> 21 <u>nature and risk of concussion and head injury including continuing</u> 22 <u>to play or practice after a concussion or head injury;</u>

23 (2) A concussion and head injury information sheet that shall

1 be signed and returned by the interscholastic athlete and the 2 athlete's parent or guardian on an annual basis before the 3 interscholastic athlete begins practice or competition;

4 <u>(3) A requirement that each head coach of an interscholastic</u> 5 <u>sport at a high school or middle school that is a member of the</u> 6 <u>West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission complete a</u> 7 <u>commission-approved concussion and head injury recognition and</u> 8 <u>return-to-play protocol course annually;</u>

9 <u>(4) An interscholastic athlete who is suspected by a licensed</u> 10 <u>health care professional or by his or her head coach or athletic</u> 11 <u>trainer of sustaining a concussion or head injury in a practice or</u> 12 <u>game shall be removed from competition at that time;</u>

13 (5) An interscholastic athlete who has been removed from play 14 or practice may not return to play or practice until the athlete is 15 evaluated by a licensed health care professional trained in the 16 evaluation and management of concussions and receives written 17 clearance to return to play and practice from the licensed health 18 care professional;

19 (6) A list of the respective categories of licensed health 20 care professionals who, if properly trained in the evaluation and 21 management of concussions, are authorized to provide written 22 clearance for the interscholastic athlete to return to play; and 23 (7) A requirement that all member schools must submit a report

1 to the West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission within 2 thirty days of an interscholastic athlete suffering or being 3 suspected of suffering a concussion or head injury in a practice or 4 game. The report must state whether an evaluation by a licensed 5 health care professional verified that a concussion or head injury 6 was actually suffered, whether the athlete received written 7 clearance to return to play or practice and, if written clearance 8 was given, the number of days between the incident and the actual 9 return to play or practice. If written clearance to return to play 10 is given after thirty days of the incident, a report update shall 11 be submitted then. The West Virginia Secondary School Activities 12 Commission shall compile and submit the reports to the appropriate 13 state and national organization or agencies to analyze and make 14 determinations on whether the rule required by this section or 15 equipment worn by interscholastic athlete needs to be amended 16 accordingly.

17 CHAPTER 29. MISCELLANEOUS BOARDS AND OFFICERS.

18 ARTICLE 12. STATE INSURANCE.

19 §29-12-5a. Liability insurance for county boards of education, 20 their employees and members, the county 21 superintendent of schools, and for employees and 22 officers of the state Department of Corrections.

1 (a) In accordance with the provisions of this article, the 2 state Board of Risk and Insurance Management shall provide 3 appropriate professional or other liability insurance for all 4 county boards of education, teachers, supervisory and 5 administrative staff members, service personnel, county 6 superintendents of schools, and school board members, volunteer 7 workers and student teachers, and for all employees and officers of 8 the state Department of Corrections: Provided, That the board of 9 Risk and Insurance Management is not required to provide insurance 10 for every property, activity or responsibility of county boards of 11 education, teachers, supervisory and administrative staff members, 12 service personnel, county superintendents of schools, and school 13 board members, volunteer workers and student teachers, and for all 14 employees and officers of the state Department of Corrections.

(b) Insurance provided by the board of Risk and Insurance Management pursuant to the provisions of subsection (a) of this reason shall cover claims, demands, actions, suits or judgments by reason of alleged negligence or other acts resulting in bodily principal injury or property damage to any person within or without any school building or correctional institution if, at the time of the alleged injury, the teacher, supervisor, administrator, service personnel employee, county superintendent, school board member, volunteer worker or student teacher, or employee or officer of the

1 Department of Corrections was acting in the discharge of his or her 2 duties, within the scope of his or her office, position or 3 employment, under the direction of the Board of Education or 4 Commissioner of Corrections or in an official capacity as a county 5 superintendent or as a school board member or as Commissioner of 6 Corrections.

7 (c) Insurance coverage provided by the Board of Risk and 8 Insurance Management pursuant to subsection (a) of this section 9 shall be in an amount to be determined by the state Board of Risk 10 and Insurance Management, but in no event less than \$1 million for 11 each occurrence. In addition, each county board of education shall 12 purchase, through the Board of Risk and Insurance Management, 13 excess coverage of at least \$5 million for each occurrence. The 14 cost of this excess coverage will be paid by the respective county 15 boards of education. Any insurance purchased under this section 16 shall be obtained from a company licensed to do business in this 17 state.

(d) The insurance policy provided by the Board of Risk and Insurance Management pursuant to subsection (a) of this section shall include comprehensive coverage, personal injury coverage, malpractice coverage, corporal punishment coverage, legal liability coverage as well as a provision for the payment of the cost of attorney's fees in connection with any claim, demand, action, suit

1 or judgment arising from such alleged negligence or other act 2 resulting in bodily injury under the conditions specified in this 3 section.

4 (e) The county superintendent and other school personnel, 5 <u>volunteer worker and student teacher</u> shall be defended by the 6 county board or an insurer in the case of suit, unless the act or 7 omission shall not have been within the course or scope of 8 employment or official responsibility or was motivated by malicious 9 or criminal intent.

10 (f) For the purposes of this section, "volunteer worker" 11 includes, but is not limited to, a licensed health care 12 professional who renders services of a medical nature to students 13 under an agreement with a county board that defines the scope of 14 his or her duties as such and for which no remuneration is demanded 15 or received. A licensed health care professional is not be liable 16 for any civil damages as a result of rendering such services, or as 17 a result of any act or failure to act in providing or arranging 18 further medical treatment, in accordance with acceptable standards 19 of care, to an extent greater than the applicable limits of the 20 professional liability insurance provided by the state Board of 21 Risk and Insurance Management pursuant to this section and in 22 effect at the time. Nothing in this subsection nullifies the 23 immunity from civil liability as granted pursuant to section

1 fifteen, article seven, chapter fifty-five of this code or federal 2 law except to the extent to which the actions are covered within 3 the applicable limits of the professional liability insurance 4 provided by the state Board of Risk and Insurance Management 5 pursuant to this section and in effect at the time.

6 CHAPTER 55. ACTIONS, SUITS AND ARBITRATION;
7 JUDICIAL SALE.
8 ARTICLE 7. ACTIONS FOR INJURIES.

9 §55-7-15. Aid to victim of accident and victim of crime; immunity 10 from civil liability.

11 No person, including a person licensed to practice medicine or 12 dentistry, who in good faith renders emergency care at the scene of 13 an accident <u>or medical emergency</u> or to a victim at the scene of a 14 crime, without remuneration, <del>shall be</del> is liable for any civil 15 damages as the result of any act or omission in rendering such 16 emergency care.

For the purposes of this section, "scene of an accident or medical emergency" also includes a youth athletic event, including a school sponsored or interscholastic athletic event, at which assistance of a medical nature is rendered in an emergency situation by a licensed medical professional, for which no remuneration is demanded or received, to an athlete injured while

## 1 participating in the event. For the purposes of this section,

## 2 "athletic event" includes scheduled practices.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to establish protocols and protections to help limit injuries to youth athletes and students and improve the treatment of them. In particular, the bill emphasizes the protocols for removal and return to play following concussions in interscholastic sports regulated by the WV Secondary School Activities Commission.

Strike-throughs indicate existing language that would be removed, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.

\$18-2-25a is new; therefore, it has been completely
underscored.

This bill was recommended for introduction and passage during the Regular Session of the Legislature by the Joint Standing Committee on Education.
