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10	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by	
11	adding thereto a new section, designated §18C-3-4, relating to	
12	health professionals student loan programs; creating the	
13	Nonresident Medical Student Tuition Regularization Program;	
14	legislative findings; stating a purpose of offering	
15	nonresident medical students a partial tuition waiver as a	
16	means of recruiting practicing physicians to under-served	
17	areas and to primary care and practitioner shortage fields in	
18	West Virginia; establishing eligibility; requiring nonresident	
19	medical students to commit to rendering services for one	
20	calendar year as a medical doctor or a doctor of osteopathy in	
21	this state for each academic year for which he or she	
22	participates in the program; providing a penalty for failure	
23	to satisfy service commitment; and requiring the Higher	
24	Education Policy Commission to promulgate rules to implement	
25	the program.	

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

2 That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended 3 by adding thereto a new section, designated §18C-3-4, to read as 4 follows:

5 ARTICLE 3. HEALTH PROFESSIONALS STUDENT LOAN PROGRAMS.

6 §18C-3-4. Nonresident Medical Student Tuition Regularization 7 Program.

8 (a) Findings. -- The Legislature finds as follows:

9 <u>(1) There is a critical need for additional primary care</u> 10 physicians practicing in West Virginia;

11 (2) West Virginia has an aging population, and an increasing 12 need for recruiting primary care physicians and placing primary 13 care physicians in rural areas of the state;

14 (3) West Virginia has a historically low retention rate of 15 state resident medical students following graduation;

16 (4) Efforts by the medical schools in West Virginia to 17 increase class sizes as a means of increasing the number of 18 physicians practicing in the state have been largely ineffective; 19 (5) The primary care field of practice yields a lower wage 20 than other medical specialties and maintains an extreme shortage of 21 practicing physicians, particularly in rural areas of the state; 22 (6) The high cost of nonresident medical education tuition, 23 and resulting high level of debt incurred by students, often

1 prohibit nonresident graduates who remain in the state from 2 entering a primary care practice;

3 <u>(7) Many nonresident medical students in West Virginia have</u> 4 <u>indicated that they would be willing to remain in the state as a</u> 5 <u>practicing physician if they could af</u>ford to;

6 <u>(8) A waiver of the state resident to nonresident tuition rate</u> 7 <u>differential would offset the significant student debt load</u> 8 <u>incurred by nonresident medical school graduates;</u>

9 <u>(9) Beginning a medical practice with up to four years</u> 10 <u>committed to practicing medicine in a specific area has a strong</u> 11 <u>likelihood of influencing a nonresident medical school graduate to</u> 12 <u>remain in that area following the service commitment;</u>

13 (10) Investing resources, developing professional networks, 14 and creating community ties all serve to create permanent 15 connections to an area for an individual who is not originally from 16 that area; and

17 (11) Attracting practicing physicians to rural and medically 18 under-served areas of the state will further attract related 19 health-care professionals that support a medical practice or 20 facility and will expand the economic and job-growth potential of 21 such areas. 22 (b) Purpose. - It is the purpose of this section to offer

23 nonresident medical students a partial tuition waiver as a means of 24 recruiting practicing physicians to under-served areas, and to

1 primary care and practitioner shortage fields in West Virginia.
2 (c) Program established. - There is created the Nonresident
3 Medical Student Tuition Regularization Program to be administered
4 by the Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences in cooperation with the
5 deans of the three medical schools in the state.
6 (1) Two nonresident medical students from each medical school
7 in the state are selected annually to participate in the program
8 subject to the exception provided in subsection (f) of this
9 section.
10 (2) Each student selected is charged the state resident
11 tuition rate for each academic year he or she is enrolled in the

15 (3) For each academic year that a medical student participates 16 in the program, he or she shall commit to render services for one 17 calendar year as a medical doctor or a doctor of osteopathy in this 18 state in a medically under-served area or in a primary care or 19 specialty practice or field in which there is a shortage of 20 physicians, as determined by the Division of Health at the time the 21 application for the program is submitted. The service commitment 22 begins within six months after graduation from an accredited 23 residency program.

^{24 (4)} Once selected to participate in the program, a student may

1 continue in the program for as long as he or she continues to meet 2 the eligibility criteria in subsection (d) of this section, for a 3 maximum of four academic years. (d) Eligibility. -- An individual is eligible for enrollment 4 5 or continuation in the program if he or she meets the following 6 criteria: (1) Is enrolled or accepted for enrollment at the West 7 8 Virginia University School of Medicine, the Marshall University 9 School of Medicine, or the West Virginia School of Osteopathic 10 Medicine in a program leading to the degree of medical doctor 11 (M.D.) or doctor of osteopathy (D.O.); 12 (2) Has not yet received one of the degrees provided in 13 subdivision (1) of this subsection; 14 (3) Satisfies the academic standards established by the 15 program rule; (4) Is not in default of any previous student loan; 16 17 (5) Is a nonresident student who is charged nonresident 18 tuition rates; (6) Commits to render services for one calendar year as a 19 20 medical doctor or a doctor of osteopathy in this state in a 21 medically under-served area or in a primary care or speciality 22 practice or field in which there is a shortage of physicians for 23 each academic year for which he or she participates in the program; 24 (7) Submits to the Higher Education Policy Commission:

1	(A) An application for enrollment in the program as provided
2	by the commission; and
3	(B) A sworn statement of commitment to service on a form
4	provided by the commission for that purpose; and
5	(8) Other criteria as established by the program rule.
6	<u>(e) Penalty for failure to satisfy service commitment. –</u>
7	(1) A program participant violates the service commitment if
8	he or she:
9	(A) Fails to render services as a medical doctor or doctor of
10	osteopathy in accordance with the sworn statement he or she
11	submitted to the commission. This includes failure to begin
12	serving within six months of completing an accredited residency
13	program, or failure to complete each one-year term to which he or
14	she committed to serve; or
15	(B) Fails to complete or remain enrolled in the medical
16	education program for which he or she obtained the tuition waiver.
17	(2) A program participant who violates the service commitment
18	is subject to the following:
19	(A) He or she shall repay the amount of nonresident tuition
20	charges waived plus interest at a rate of fifteen percent per
21	annum;
22	(B) The granting or renewal of a license to practice medicine
23	in West Virginia or to reciprocal licensure in another state based
24	upon licensure in West Virginia is contingent upon commencing

1 payment and continuing payment until full repayment of the 2 obligation if the recipient fails to complete the required practice 3 commitment. A license, renewal or reciprocity may not be granted 4 to an individual whose repayments are in arrears. The West 5 Virginia Board of Medicine shall inform all other states where a 6 recipient has reciprocated based upon West Virginia licensure of 7 any refusal to renew licensure in West Virginia as a result of 8 failure to repay the tuition amount. 9 (f) Rule. -- The commission shall promulgate a rule in

9 (1) Rule. -- The commission shall promutgate a rule in 10 accordance with section six, article one, chapter eighteen-b of 11 this code to implement this section. The rule shall provide for: (1) A method for selecting annually the six new students to be enrolled in the program, with priority consideration to applicants in the earliest academic years of the medical education program; (2) A method for selecting greater or fewer than two participants from a single medical school in any year where two 17 suitable applicants are not available at each school;

18 (3) A method for the applicant to select the service area or 19 specialty to which he or she commits to practice medicine;

20 <u>(4) A method for developing a mutually agreeable modification</u> 21 to the terms of a participant's service commitment regarding the 22 medically under-served area or primary care or speciality practice 23 or field in which he or she committed to serve under circumstances 24 where the Division of Health determines at the time the 1 participant's service commitment is scheduled to commence that the 2 area is no longer medically under-served or that primary care or 3 service specialty is no longer experiencing a physician shortage; 4 (5) Provisions for enforcing sanctions against a participant 5 who fails to satisfy the service commitment; and 6 (6) Such other provisions as the commission considers

7 necessary to administer the program.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to offer nonresident medical students a partial tuition waiver as a means of recruiting practicing physicians to under-served areas and to primary care and practitioner shortage fields in West Virginia.
