10 A BILL to amend and reenact article 9, chapter 64 of the Code of
11 West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to authorizing the
12 Board of Osteopathic Medicine to promulgate a legislative rule
13 relating to practitioner requirements for controlled
14 substances licensure and accessing the West Virginia
15 controlled substances monitoring program database.

16 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:*

17 That article 9, chapter 64 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931,
18 as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

19 **ARTICLE 9. AUTHORIZATION FOR MISCELLANEOUS AGENCIES AND BOARDS TO**
20 **PROMULGATE LEGISLATIVE RULES.**

21 **§64-9-1. Board of Osteopathic Medicine.**

22 The legislative rule filed in the State Register on the
23 twenty-eighth day of August, two thousand twelve, authorized under
24 the authority of section five-a, article nine, chapter sixty-a, of

1 this code, modified by the Board of Osteopathic Medicine to meet
2 the objections of the Legislative Rule-Making Review Committee and
3 refiled in the State Register on the twelfth day of December, two
4 thousand twelve, relating to the Board of Osteopathic Medicine
5 (practitioner requirements for controlled substances licensure and
6 accessing the West Virginia controlled substances monitoring
7 program database, [24 CSR 7](#)), is authorized.

9 NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Board of
10 Osteopathic Medicine to promulgate a legislative rule relating to
11 Practitioner Requirements for Controlled Substances Licensure and
12 Accessing the West Virginia Controlled Substances Monitoring
13 Program Database.
