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12 A BILL to amend and reenact article 9, chapter 64 of the Code of
13 West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to authorizing the
14 Board of Osteopathic Medicine to promulgate a legislative rule
15 relating to practitioner requirements for controlled
16 substances licensure; and accessing the West Virginia
17 Controlled Substances Monitoring Program database.

18 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:*

19 That article 9, chapter 64 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931,
20 as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

21 **ARTICLE 9. AUTHORIZATION FOR MISCELLANEOUS AGENCIES AND BOARDS TO**
22 **PROMULGATE LEGISLATIVE RULES.**

23 **§64-9-1. Board of Osteopathic Medicine.**

24 The legislative rule filed in the State Register on the

1 twenty-eighth day of August, two thousand twelve, authorized under
2 the authority of section five-a, article nine, chapter sixty-a, of
3 this code, modified by the Board of Osteopathic Medicine to meet
4 the objections of the Legislative Rule-Making Review Committee and
5 refiled in the State Register on the twelfth day of December, two
6 thousand twelve, relating to the Board of Osteopathic Medicine
7 (practitioner requirements for controlled substances licensure and
8 accessing the West Virginia controlled substances monitoring
9 program database, [24 CSR 7](#)), is authorized.

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11 NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Board of
12 Osteopathic Medicine to promulgate a legislative rule relating to
13 Practitioner Requirements for Controlled Substances Licensure and
14 Accessing the West Virginia Controlled Substances Monitoring
15 Program Database.
