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L2	A BILL to amend and reenact §60-8-3 of the Code of West Virginia
L3	1931, as amended, relating to permitting farm wineries to sell
L 4	samples and wine during the operation of fairs or festivals or
L 5	Sunday mornings.
L 6	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
L 7	That §60-8-3 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
L8	be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
L 9	ARTICLE 8. SALE OF WINES.
20	§60-8-3. Licenses; fees; general restrictions.
21	(a) No person may engage in business in the capacity of a

22 winery, farm winery, supplier, distributor, retailer, private wine

- 1 bed and breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or 2 wine specialty shop without first obtaining a license from the 3 commissioner, nor shall a person continue to engage in any such 4 activity after his or her license has expired, been suspended or 5 revoked. No person may be licensed simultaneously as a distributor 6 and a retailer. No person, except for a winery or farm winery, may 7 be licensed simultaneously as a supplier and a retailer. No person 8 may be licensed simultaneously as a supplier and a private wine bed 9 and breakfast, private wine restaurant or a private wine spa. No 10 person may be licensed simultaneously as a distributor and a 11 private wine bed and breakfast, a private wine restaurant or a 12 private wine spa. No person may be licensed simultaneously as a 13 retailer and a private wine bed and breakfast, a private wine 14 restaurant or a private wine spa.
- 15 (b) The commissioner shall collect an annual fee for licenses 16 issued under this article, as follows:
- 17 (1) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a supplier's 18 license;
- 19 (2) Twenty-five hundred dollars per year for a distributor's 20 license and each separate warehouse or other facility from which a 21 distributor sells, transfers or delivers wine shall be separately 22 licensed and there shall be collected with respect to each such

- 1 location the annual license fee of \$2,500 as herein provided;
- 2 (3) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a retailer's 3 license:
- 4 (4) Two hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine specialty
 5 shop license, in addition to any other licensing fees paid by a
 6 winery or retailer holding such a license, except for the amount of
 7 the license fee and the restriction to sales of winery or farm
 8 winery wines, a winery or farm winery acting as a wine specialty
 9 shop retailer is subject to all other provisions of this article
 10 which are applicable to a wine specialty shop retailer as defined
 11 in section two of this article;
- 12 (5) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine tasting 13 license;
- 14 (6) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine bed 15 and breakfast license, and each separate bed and breakfast from 16 which a licensee sells wine shall be separately licensed and there 17 shall be collected with respect to each such location the annual 18 license fee of \$150 as herein provided;
- 19 (7) Two hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine 20 restaurant license, and each separate restaurant from which a 21 licensee sells wine shall be separately licensed and there shall be 22 collected with respect to each such location the annual license fee

- 1 of \$250 as herein provided;
- 2 (8) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine spa
- 3 license and each separate private wine spa from which a licensee
- 4 sells wine shall be separately licensed and there shall be
- 5 collected with respect to each such location the annual license fee
- 6 of \$150 as herein provided;
- 7 (9) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine sampling
- 8 license issued for a wine specialty shop under subsection (n) of
- 9 this section;
- 10 (10) No fee shall be charged for a special one-day license
- 11 under subsection (p) of this section or for a heritage fair and
- 12 festival license under subsection (q) of this section; and
- 13 (11) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a direct shipper's
- 14 license for a licensee who sells and ships only wine and \$250 per
- 15 for a direct shipper's license who ships and sells wine,
- 16 nonfortified dessert wine, port, sherry or Madeira wines.
- 17 (12) Three hundred dollars per year for a multicapacity winery
- 18 or farm winery license which shall enable the holder to operate as
- 19 a retailer, wine specialty shop, supplier and direct shipper
- 20 without obtaining an individual license for each capacity.
- 21 (c) The license period shall begin on July 1 of each year and
- 22 end on June 30 of the following year and if granted for a less

- 1 period, the same shall be computed semiannually in proportion to 2 the remainder of the fiscal year.
- (d) No retailer may be licensed as a private club as provided 4 by article seven of this chapter, except as provided by subsection 5 (k) of this section.
- (e) No retailer may be licensed as a Class A retail dealer in 7 nonintoxicating beer as provided by article sixteen, chapter eleven 8 of this code: Provided, That a delicatessen, a caterer or party 9 supply store which is a grocery store as defined in section two of 10 this article and which is licensed as a Class A retail dealer in 11 nonintoxicating beer may be a retailer under this article: 12 Provided, however, That any delicatessen, caterer or party supply 13 store licensed in both such capacities must maintain average 14 monthly sales exclusive of sales of wine and nonintoxicating beer 15 which exceed the average monthly sales of nonintoxicating beer.
- (f) A wine specialty shop under this article may also hold a 17 wine tasting license authorizing such the retailer to serve 18 complimentary samples of wine in moderate quantities for tasting. 19 Such wine specialty shop shall organize a wine taster's club, which 20 has at least fifty duly elected or approved dues-paying members in 21 good standing. Such club shall meet on the wine specialty shop's 22 premises not more than one time per week and shall either meet at

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- 1 a time when the premises are closed to the general public, or shall 2 meet in a separate segregated facility on the premises to which the
- 3 general public is not admitted. Attendance at tastings shall be
- 4 limited to duly elected or approved dues-paying members and their
- 5 guests.
- 6 (g) A retailer who has more than one place of retail business 7 shall obtain a license for each separate retail establishment. A 8 retailer's license may be issued only to the proprietor or owner of 9 a bona fide grocery store or wine specialty shop.
- (h) The commissioner may issue a special license for the retail sale of wine at any festival or fair which is endorsed or sponsored by the governing body of a municipality or a county commission. Such special license shall be issued for a term of no longer than ten consecutive days and the fee therefor shall be \$250 regardless of the term of the license unless the applicant is the manufacturer of said wine on a winery or a farm winery as defined in section five-a, article one of this chapter, in which event the fee shall be \$50 if the event is held on the premises of the winery or farm winery. The application for such the license shall contain such information as the commissioner may reasonably require and shall be submitted to the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the first day when wine is to be sold at such the festival or

1 fair. A winery or a farm winery licensed under this subsection may 2 exhibit, conduct tastings or sell samples, not to exceed a 3 reasonable serving of three ounces, and may sell wine only samples 4 for consumption off on the premises during the operation of such a 5 festival or fair: <u>Provided</u>, That for <u>licensed</u> wineries or farm 6 wineries at a licensed festival or fair the tastings, samples and 7 off-premises sales shall occur under the hours of operation as 8 required in this article, except that on Sunday tastings, samples 9 and off-premises sales are unlawful between the hours of 2:00 a.m. 10 and 10:00 a.m. A special license issued other than to a winery or 11 a farm winery may be issued to a "wine club" as defined herein 12 below. The festival or fair committee or the governing body shall 13 designate a person to organize a club under a name which includes 14 the name of the festival or fair and the words "wine club". 15 license shall be issued in the name of the wine club. A licensee 16 may not commence the sale of wine as provided in this subsection 17 until the wine club has at least fifty dues-paying members who have 18 been enrolled and to whom membership cards have been issued. 19 Thereafter, new members may be enrolled and issued membership cards 20 at any time during the period for which the license is issued. A 21 wine club licensed under the provisions of this subsection may sell 22 wine only to its members, and in portions not to exceed eight

1 ounces per serving. Such The sales shall take place on premises or 2 in an area cordoned or segregated so as to be closed to the general 3 public, and the general public shall not be admitted to such the 4 premises or area. A wine club licensee under the provisions of 5 this subsection shall be authorized to serve complimentary samples 6 of wine in moderate quantities for tasting.

A license issued under the provisions of this subsection and 8 the licensee holding such the license shall be subject to all other 9 provisions of this article and the rules and orders of the 10 commissioner relating to such the special license: Provided, That 11 the commissioner may by rule, regulation or order provide for 12 certain waivers or exceptions with respect to such the provisions, 13 rules, regulations or orders as the circumstances of each such 14 festival or fair may require, including, without limitation, the 15 right to revoke or suspend any license issued pursuant to this 16 section prior to any notice or hearing notwithstanding the 17 provisions of section twenty-seven and twenty-eight of this 18 article: Provided, however, That under no circumstances shall the 19 provisions of subsection (c) or (d), section twenty of this article 20 be waived nor shall any exception be granted with respect thereto. 21 A license issued under the provisions of this subsection and 22 the licensee holding such the license shall not be is not subject

1 to the provisions of subsection (g) of this section.

2 (i) (A) The commissioner may issue a special license for the 3 retail sale of wine in a professional baseball stadium. A license 4 to sell wine granted pursuant to this subsection entitles the 5 licensee to sell and serve wine, for consumption in a professional this 6 baseball stadium. For the purpose of subsection, 7 "professional baseball stadium" means a facility constructed 8 primarily for the use of a major or minor league baseball 9 franchisee affiliated with the National Association of Professional 10 Baseball Leagues, Inc., or its successor, and used as a major or 11 minor league baseball park. Any special license issued pursuant to 12 this subsection shall be for a term beginning on the date of 13 issuance and ending on the next following June 30, and its fee is 14 \$250 regardless of the length of the term of the license. The 15 application for the special license shall contain information as 16 the commissioner may reasonably require and must be submitted to 17 the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the first day when 18 wine is to be sold at the professional baseball stadium. The 19 special license may be issued in the name of the baseball 20 franchisee or the name of the primary food and beverage vendor 21 under contract with the baseball franchisee. These sales must take 22 place within the confines of the professional baseball stadium,

- 1 provided that the exterior of the area where wine sales may occur 2 are surrounded by a fence or other barrier prohibiting entry except 3 upon the franchisee's express permission, and under the conditions 4 and restrictions established by the franchisee, so that the wine 5 sales area is closed to free and unrestricted entry by the general 6 public.
- (B) A license issued under this subsection and the licensee holding the license is subject to all other provisions of this article and the rules and orders of the commissioner relating to the special license: Provided, That the commissioner may by rule or order grant certain waivers or exceptions to those rules or orders as the circumstances of each such professional baseball stadium may require, including, without limitation, the right to revoke or suspend any license issued pursuant to this section prior to any notice or hearing notwithstanding sections twenty-seven and twenty-eight of this article: Provided, however, That under no circumstances may subsection (c) or (d), section twenty of this article be waived nor shall any exception be granted concerning those subsections.
- 20 (C) The commissioner has the authority to propose rules for 21 legislative approval in accordance with article three, chapter 22 twenty-nine-a of this code to implement this subsection.

1 (j) A license to sell wine granted to a private wine bed and 2 breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or a private 3 club under the provisions of this article entitles the operator to 4 sell and serve wine, for consumption on the premises of the 5 licensee, when such the sale accompanies the serving of food or a 6 meal to its members and their quests in accordance with the 7 provisions of this article: Provided, That a licensed private wine 8 bed and breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or a 9 private club may permit a person over twenty-one years of age to 10 purchase wine, consume wine and recork or reseal, using a tamper 11 resistant cork or seal, up to two separate bottles of unconsumed 12 wine in conjunction with serving of food or a meal to its members 13 and their quests in accordance with the provisions of this article 14 and in accordance with regulations promulgated by the commissioner 15 for the purpose of consumption of said wine off premises: 16 Provided, however, That for this article, food or a meal provided 17 by the private licensee means that the total food purchase, 18 excluding beverage purchases, taxes, gratuity or other fees is at 19 least \$15: Provided further, That a licensed private wine 20 restaurant or a private club may offer for sale for consumption off 21 the premises, sealed bottles of wine to its customers provided that 22 no more than one bottle is sold per each person over twenty-one

- 1 years of age, as verified by the private wine restaurant or private
 2 club, for consumption off the premises. Such licensees are
 3 authorized to keep and maintain on their premises a supply of wine
 4 in such quantities as may be appropriate for the conduct of
 5 operations thereof. Any sale of wine so made shall be subject to
 6 all restrictions set forth in section twenty of this article. A
 7 private wine restaurant may also be licensed as a Class A retail
 8 dealer in nonintoxicating beer as provided by article sixteen,
 9 chapter eleven of this code.
- (k) With respect to subsections (h), (i), (j), (o) and (p) of this section, the commissioner shall promulgate legislative rules in accordance with the provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code with regard to the form of the applications, the suitability of both the applicant and location of the licensed premises and such other legislative rules deemed necessary to carry the provisions of such the subsections into effect.
- (1) The commissioner shall promulgate legislative rules in accordance with the provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code to allow restaurants to serve wine with meals, and to sell wine by the bottle for off-premises consumption as provided in subsection (j) of this section. Each restaurant so licensed shall be charged an additional \$100 per year fee.

- 1 (m) The commissioner shall establish guidelines to permit 2 wines to be sold in all stores licensed for retail sales.
- 3 (n) Wineries and farm wineries may advertise off premises as 4 provided in section seven, article twenty-two, chapter seventeen of 5 this code.
- (o) A wine specialty shop under this article may also hold a 7 wine sampling license authorizing the wine specialty shop to 8 conduct special wine sampling events at a licensed wine specialty 9 shop location during regular hours of business. The wine specialty 10 shop may serve up to three complimentary samples of wine, 11 consisting of no more than one ounce each, to any one consumer in 12 one day. Persons serving the complimentary samples must be 13 twenty-one years of age and an authorized representative of the 14 licensed wine specialty shop, winery, farm winery or 15 representative of а distributor or registered 16 Distributor and supplier representatives attending wine sampling 17 events must be registered with the commissioner. No licensee, 18 employee or representative may furnish, give or serve complimentary 19 samples of wine to any person less than twenty-one years of age or 20 to a person who is physically incapacitated due to the consumption 21 of alcoholic liquor or the use of drugs. The wine specialty shop 22 shall notify and secure permission from the commissioner for all

- 1 wine sampling events one month prior to the event. Wine sampling 2 events may not exceed six hours per calendar day. Licensees must
- 3 purchase all wines used during these events from a licensed farm
- 4 winery or a licensed distributor.
- (p) The commissioner may issue special one-day licenses to duly organized, nonprofit corporations and associations allowing the sale and serving of wine when raising money for athletic, charitable, educational or religious purposes. The license application shall contain information as the commissioner may reasonably require and shall be submitted to the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the event. Wines used during these events may be donated by or purchased from a licensed retailer, a distributor or a farm winery. Under no circumstances may the provision of subsection (c), section twenty of this article be waived nor may any exception be granted with respect thereto.
- (q) The commissioner may issue special licenses to heritage fairs and festivals allowing the sale, serving and sampling of wine from a licensed farm winery. The license application shall contain information required by the commissioner and shall be submitted to the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the event. Wines used during these events may be donated by or purchased from a licensed farm winery. Under no circumstances may the provision of

- 1 subsection (c), section twenty of this article be waived nor may
- 2 any exception be granted with respect thereto. The commissioner
- 3 shall propose rules for legislative approval in accordance with
- 4 article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code to implement the
- 5 provisions of this subsection.

(NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit farm wineries to sell samples and wine during the operation of fairs or festivals and on Sunday mornings of those events.
