SB450 HFA Manchin, Fleischauer, Pasdon, Marshall, Barill, Reynolds, Skaff & Craig 3-05 #1

Delegates Manchin, Fleischauer, Pasdon, Marshall, Barill, Reynolds, Skaff & Craig move to amend the bill on page one, immediately after the enacting clause, by striking the remainder of the bill and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

- 1 That §60-1-5 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
- 2 be amended and reenacted; and that §60-8-3 of said code be amended
- 3 and reenacted, all to read as follows:
- 4 CHAPTER 60. STATE CONTROL OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS.
- 5 ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.
- 6 §60-1-5. Definitions.
- 7 For the purposes of this chapter:
- 8 "Alcohol" shall mean ethyl alcohol whatever its origin and
- 9 shall include synthetic ethyl alcohol but not denatured alcohol.
- "Beer" shall mean any beverage obtained by the fermentation of
- 11 barley, malt, hops or any other similar product or substitute, and
- 12 containing more alcohol than that of nonintoxicating beer.
- "Nonintoxicating beer" shall mean any beverage, obtained by
- 14 the fermentation of barley, malt, hops or similar products or
- 15 substitute, and containing not more alcohol than that specified by
- 16 section two, article sixteen, chapter eleven of this code.
- 17 "Wine" shall mean any alcoholic beverage obtained by the
- 18 fermentation of the natural content of fruits, or other

- 1 agricultural products, containing sugar.
- 2 "Spirits" shall mean any alcoholic beverage obtained by
- 3 distillation and mixed with potable water and other substances in
- 4 solution, and includes brandy, rum, whiskey, cordials and gin.
- 5 "Alcoholic liquor" shall include alcohol, beer, wine and
- 6 spirits, and any liquid or solid capable of being used as a
- 7 beverage, but shall not include nonintoxicating beer.
- 8 "Original package" shall mean any closed or sealed container
- 9 or receptacle used for holding alcoholic liquor.
- 10 "Sale" shall mean any transfer, exchange or barter in any
- 11 manner or by any means, for a consideration, and shall include all
- 12 sales made by principal, proprietor, agent or employee.
- "Selling" shall include solicitation or receipt of orders;
- 14 possession for sale; and possession with intent to sell.
- 15 "Person" shall mean an individual, firm, partnership, limited
- 16 partnership, corporation or voluntary association.
- "Manufacture" means to distill, rectify, ferment, brew, make,
- 18 mix, concoct, process, blend, bottle or fill an original package
- 19 with any alcoholic liquor.
- 20 "Manufacturer" shall mean any person engaged in the
- 21 manufacture of any alcoholic liquor, and among others includes a
- 22 distiller, a rectifier, a wine maker and a brewer.
- 23 "Brewery" shall mean an establishment where beer is
- 24 manufactured or in any way prepared.

- 1 "Winery" shall mean an establishment where wine is 2 manufactured or in any way prepared.
- "Distillery" shall mean an establishment where alcoholic 4 liquor other than wine or beer is manufactured or in any way 5 prepared.
- "Public place" shall mean any place, building or conveyance to 7 which the public has, or is permitted to have access, including 8 restaurants, soda fountains, hotel dining rooms, lobbies and 9 corridors of hotels and any highway, street, lane, park or place of 10 public resort or amusement: Provided, That the term "public place" 11 shall not mean or include any of the above-named places or any 12 portion or portions thereof which qualify and are licensed under 13 the provisions of this chapter to sell alcoholic liquors for 14 consumption on the premises: Provided, however, That the term 15 "public place" shall not mean or include any legally demarcated 16 area designated solely for the consumption of beverages and freshly 17 prepared food that directly connects and adjoins any portion or 18 portions of a premises that qualifies and is licensed under the 19 provisions of this chapter to sell alcoholic liquors for 20 consumption thereupon: Provided further, That the term "public 21 place" shall also not include a facility constucted primarily for 22 the use of a Division I college that is a member of the National 23 Collegiate Althletic Association, or its successor, and used as a 24 football, basketball, baseball, soccer or other Division I sports

- 1 stadium which holds a special license to sell wine pursuant to the
- 2 provisions of section three, article eight of this chapter, in the
- 3 designated areas of sale and consumption of wine and other
- 4 restrictions established by that section and the terms of the
- 5 special license issued thereunder.
- 6 "State liquor store" shall mean a store established and
- 7 operated by the commission under this chapter for the sale of
- 8 alcoholic liquor in the original package for consumption off the
- 9 premises.
- 10 "An agency" shall mean a drugstore, grocery store or general
- 11 store designated by the commission as a retail distributor of
- 12 alcoholic liquor for the West Virginia Alcohol Beverage Control
- 13 Commissioner.
- "Department" shall mean the organization through which the
- 15 commission exercises powers imposed upon it by this chapter.
- 16 "Commissioner" or "commission" shall mean the West Virginia
- 17 Alcohol Beverage Control Commissioner.
- "Intoxicated" shall mean having one's faculties impaired by
- 19 alcohol or other drugs to the point where physical or mental
- 20 control or both are markedly diminished.
- 21 ARTICLE 8. SALE OF WINES.
- 22 §60-8-3. Licenses; fees; general restrictions.
- 23 (a) No person may engage in business in the capacity of a
- 24 winery, farm winery, supplier, distributor, retailer, private wine

- 1 bed and breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or
- 2 wine specialty shop without first obtaining a license from the
- 3 commissioner, nor shall a person continue to engage in any activity
- 4 after his or her license has expired, been suspended or revoked.
- 5 No person may be licensed simultaneously as a distributor and a
- 6 retailer. No person, except for a winery or farm winery, may be
- 7 licensed simultaneously as a supplier and a retailer. No person
- 8 may be licensed simultaneously as a supplier and a private wine bed
- 9 and breakfast, private wine restaurant or a private wine spa. No
- 10 person may be licensed simultaneously as a distributor and a
- 11 private wine bed and breakfast, a private wine restaurant or a
- 12 private wine spa. No person may be licensed simultaneously as a
- 13 retailer and a private wine bed and breakfast, a private wine
- 14 restaurant or a private wine spa.
- 15 (b) The commissioner shall collect an annual fee for licenses
- 16 issued under this article, as follows:
- 17 (1) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a supplier's
- 18 license;
- 19 (2) Twenty-five hundred dollars per year for a distributor's
- 20 license and each separate warehouse or other facility from which a
- 21 distributor sells, transfers or delivers wine shall be separately
- 22 licensed and there shall be collected with respect to each location
- 23 the annual license fee of \$2,500 as herein provided;
- 24 (3) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a retailer's

- 1 license;
- 2 (4) Two hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine specialty
- 3 shop license, in addition to any other licensing fees paid by a
- 4 winery or retailer holding a license, except for the amount of the
- 5 license fee and the restriction to sales of winery or farm winery
- 6 wines, a winery or farm winery acting as a wine specialty shop
- 7 retailer is subject to all other provisions of this article which
- 8 are applicable to a wine specialty shop retailer as defined in
- 9 section two of this article;
- 10 (5) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine tasting
- 11 license;
- 12 (6) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine bed
- 13 and breakfast license, and each separate bed and breakfast from
- 14 which a licensee sells wine shall be separately licensed and there
- 15 shall be collected with respect to each location the annual license
- 16 fee of \$150 as herein provided;
- 17 (7) Two hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine
- 18 restaurant license, and each separate restaurant from which a
- 19 licensee sells wine shall be separately licensed and there shall be
- 20 collected with respect to each location the annual license fee of
- 21 \$250 as herein provided;
- 22 (8) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a private wine spa
- 23 license and each separate private wine spa from which a licensee
- 24 sells wine shall be separately licensed and there shall be

- 1 collected with respect to each location the annual license fee of
- 2 \$150 as herein provided;
- 3 (9) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a wine sampling
- 4 license issued for a wine specialty shop under subsection (n) of
- 5 this section;
- 6 (10) No fee shall be charged for a special one-day license
- 7 under subsection (p) of this section or for a heritage fair and
- 8 festival license under subsection (q) of this section; and
- 9 (11) One hundred fifty dollars per year for a direct shipper's
- 10 license for a licensee who sells and ships only wine and \$250 per
- 11 for a direct shipper's license who ships and sells wine,
- 12 nonfortified dessert wine, port, sherry or Madeira wines.
- 13 (12) Three hundred dollars per year for a multicapacity winery
- 14 or farm winery license which shall enable the holder to operate as
- 15 a retailer, wine specialty shop, supplier and direct shipper
- 16 without obtaining an individual license for each capacity.
- 17 (c) The license period shall begin on July 1 of each year and
- 18 end on June 30 of the following year and if granted for a less
- 19 period, the same shall be computed semiannually in proportion to
- 20 the remainder of the fiscal year.
- 21 (d) No retailer may be licensed as a private club as provided
- 22 by article seven of this chapter, except as provided by subsection
- 23 (k) of this section.
- (e) No retailer may be licensed as a Class A retail dealer in

- nonintoxicating beer as provided by article sixteen, chapter eleven of this code: *Provided*, That a delicatessen, a caterer or party supply store which is a grocery store as defined in section two of this article and which is licensed as a Class A retail dealer in nonintoxicating beer may be a retailer under this article: *Provided*, *however*, That any delicatessen, caterer or party supply store licensed in both capacities must maintain average monthly sales exclusive of sales of wine and nonintoxicating beer which exceed the average monthly sales of nonintoxicating beer.
- 10 (f) A wine specialty shop under this article may also hold a 11 wine tasting license authorizing the retailer to 12 complimentary samples of wine in moderate quantities for tasting. 13 Such wine specialty shop shall organize a wine taster's club, which 14 has at least fifty duly elected or approved dues-paying members in 15 good standing. Such club shall meet on the wine specialty shop's 16 premises not more than one time per week and shall either meet at 17 a time when the premises are closed to the general public, or shall 18 meet in a separate segregated facility on the premises to which the 19 general public is not admitted. Attendance at tastings shall be 20 limited to duly elected or approved dues-paying members and their 21 quests.
- 22 (g) A retailer who has more than one place of retail business 23 shall obtain a license for each separate retail establishment. A 24 retailer's license may be issued only to the proprietor or owner of

1 a bona fide grocery store or wine specialty shop.

(h) The commissioner may issue a special license for the 3 retail sale of wine at any festival or fair which is endorsed or 4 sponsored by the governing body of a municipality or a county 5 commission. Such special license shall be issued for a term of no 6 longer than ten consecutive days and the fee therefor shall be \$250 7 regardless of the term of the license unless the applicant is the 8 manufacturer of said wine on a winery or a farm winery as defined 9 in section five-a, article one of this chapter, in which event the 10 fee shall be \$50 if the event is held on the premises of the winery 11 or farm winery. The application for the license shall contain 12 information as the commissioner may reasonably require and shall be 13 submitted to the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the 14 first day when wine is to be sold at the festival or fair. 15 winery or a farm winery licensed under this subsection may exhibit, 16 conduct tastings or sell samples, not to exceed a reasonable 17 serving of three ounces, and may sell wine samples for consumption 18 on the premises during the operation of a festival or fair: 19 Provided, That for licensed wineries or farm wineries at a licensed 20 festival or fair the tastings, samples and off-premises sales shall 21 occur under the hours of operation as required in this article, 22 except that on Sunday tastings, samples and off-premises sales are 23 unlawful between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. A special 24 license issued other than to a winery or a farm winery may be

1 issued to a "wine club" as defined herein below. The festival or 2 fair committee or the governing body shall designate a person to 3 organize a club under a name which includes the name of the 4 festival or fair and the words "wine club". The license shall be 5 issued in the name of the wine club. A licensee may not commence 6 the sale of wine as provided in this subsection until the wine club 7 has at least fifty dues-paying members who have been enrolled and 8 to whom membership cards have been issued. Thereafter, new members 9 may be enrolled and issued membership cards at any time during the 10 period for which the license is issued. A wine club licensed under 11 the provisions of this subsection may sell wine only to its 12 members, and in portions not to exceed eight ounces per serving. 13 The sales shall take place on premises or in an area cordoned or 14 segregated so as to be closed to the general public, and the 15 general public shall not be admitted to the premises or area. 16 wine club licensee under the provisions of this subsection shall be 17 authorized to serve complimentary samples of wine in moderate 18 quantities for tasting.

A license issued under the provisions of this subsection and 20 the licensee holding the license shall be subject to all other 21 provisions of this article and the rules and orders of the 22 commissioner relating to the special license: *Provided*, That the 23 commissioner may by rule, regulation or order provide for certain 24 waivers or exceptions with respect to the provisions, rules,

- 1 regulations or orders as the circumstances of each festival or fair 2 may require, including, without limitation, the right to revoke or 3 suspend any license issued pursuant to this section prior to any 4 notice or hearing notwithstanding the provisions of section twenty-5 seven and twenty-eight of this article: *Provided*, *however*, That 6 under no circumstances shall the provisions of subsection (c) or 7 (d), section twenty of this article be waived nor shall any 8 exception be granted with respect thereto.
- 9 A license issued under the provisions of this subsection and 10 the licensee holding the license is not subject to the provisions 11 of subsection (g) of this section.
- 12 (I) (A) The commissioner may issue a special license for the 13 retail sale of wine in a professional baseball stadium. A license 14 to sell wine granted pursuant to this subsection entitles the 15 licensee to sell and serve wine, for consumption in a professional this subsection, 16 baseball stadium. For the purpose of 17 "professional baseball stadium" means a facility constructed 18 primarily for the use of a major or minor league baseball 19 franchisee affiliated with the National Association of Professional 20 Baseball Leagues, Inc., or its successor, and used as a major or 21 minor league baseball park. Any special license issued pursuant to 22 this subsection shall be for a term beginning on the date of 23 issuance and ending on the next following June 30, and its fee is 24 \$250 regardless of the length of the term of the license.

1 application for the special license shall contain information as
2 the commissioner may reasonably require and must be submitted to
3 the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the first day when
4 wine is to be sold at the professional baseball stadium. The
5 special license may be issued in the name of the baseball
6 franchisee or the name of the primary food and beverage vendor
7 under contract with the baseball franchisee. These sales must take
8 place within the confines of the professional baseball stadium,
9 provided that the exterior of the area where wine sales may occur
10 are surrounded by a fence or other barrier prohibiting entry except
11 upon the franchisee's express permission, and under the conditions
12 and restrictions established by the franchisee, so that the wine
13 sales area is closed to free and unrestricted entry by the general
14 public.

(B) A license issued under this subsection and the licensee holding the license is subject to all other provisions of this article and the rules and orders of the commissioner relating to the special license: *Provided*, That the commissioner may by rule or order grant certain waivers or exceptions to those rules or orders as the circumstances of each professional baseball stadium may require, including, without limitation, the right to revoke or suspend any license issued pursuant to this section prior to any notice or hearing notwithstanding sections twenty-seven and twenty-eight of this article: *Provided*, *however*, That under no

- 1 circumstances may subsection (c) or (d), section twenty of this 2 article be waived nor shall any exception be granted concerning 3 those subsections.
- 4 (C) The commissioner has the authority to propose rules for 5 legislative approval in accordance with article three, chapter 6 twenty-nine-a of this code to implement this subsection.
- (j) A license to sell wine granted to a private wine bed and 8 breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or a private 9 club under the provisions of this article entitles the operator to 10 sell and serve wine, for consumption on the premises of the 11 licensee, when the sale accompanies the serving of food or a meal 12 to its members and their quests in accordance with the provisions 13 of this article: Provided, That a licensed private wine bed and 14 breakfast, private wine restaurant, private wine spa or a private 15 club may permit a person over twenty-one years of age to purchase 16 wine, consume wine and recork or reseal, using a tamper resistant 17 cork or seal, up to two separate bottles of unconsumed wine in 18 conjunction with serving of food or a meal to its members and their 19 quests in accordance with the provisions of this article and in 20 accordance with regulations promulgated by the commissioner for the 21 purpose of consumption of said wine off premises: Provided, 22 however, That for this article, food or a meal provided by the 23 private licensee means that the total food purchase, excluding 24 beverage purchases, taxes, gratuity or other fees is at least \$15:

- 1 Provided further, That a licensed private wine restaurant or a
 2 private club may offer for sale for consumption off the premises,
 3 sealed bottles of wine to its customers provided that no more than
 4 one bottle is sold per each person over twenty-one years of age, as
 5 verified by the private wine restaurant or private club, for
 6 consumption off the premises. Such licensees are authorized to
 7 keep and maintain on their premises a supply of wine in quantities
 8 as may be appropriate for the conduct of operations thereof. Any
 9 sale of wine so made shall be subject to all restrictions set forth
 10 in section twenty of this article. A private wine restaurant may
 11 also be licensed as a Class A retail dealer in nonintoxicating beer
 12 as provided by article sixteen, chapter eleven of this code.
- (k) With respect to subsections (h), (I), (j), (o) and (p) of this section, the commissioner shall promulgate legislative rules in accordance with the provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code with regard to the form of the applications, the suitability of both the applicant and location of the licensed premises and other legislative rules deemed necessary to carry the provisions of the subsections into effect.
- 20 (1) The commissioner shall promulgate legislative rules in 21 accordance with the provisions of chapter twenty-nine-a of this 22 code to allow restaurants to serve wine with meals, and to sell 23 wine by the bottle for off-premises consumption as provided in 24 subsection (j) of this section. Each restaurant so licensed shall

- 1 be charged an additional \$100 per year fee.
- 2 (m) The commissioner shall establish guidelines to permit 3 wines to be sold in all stores licensed for retail sales.
- 4 (n) Wineries and farm wineries may advertise off premises as 5 provided in section seven, article twenty-two, chapter seventeen of 6 this code.
- (o) A wine specialty shop under this article may also hold a 8 wine sampling license authorizing the wine specialty shop to 9 conduct special wine sampling events at a licensed wine specialty 10 shop location during regular hours of business. The wine specialty 11 shop may serve up to three complimentary samples of wine, 12 consisting of no more than one ounce each, to any one consumer in 13 one day. Persons serving the complimentary samples must be twenty-14 one years of age and an authorized representative of the licensed 15 wine specialty shop, winery, farm winery or a representative of a 16 distributor or registered supplier. Distributor and supplier 17 representatives attending wine sampling events must be registered 18 with the commissioner. No licensee, employee or representative may 19 furnish, give or serve complimentary samples of wine to any person 20 less than twenty-one years of age or to a person who is physically 21 incapacitated due to the consumption of alcoholic liquor or the use The wine specialty shop shall notify and secure 23 permission from the commissioner for all wine sampling events one 24 month prior to the event. Wine sampling events may not exceed six

- 1 hours per calendar day. Licensees must purchase all wines used 2 during these events from a licensed farm winery or a licensed 3 distributor.
- 4 (p) The commissioner may issue special one-day licenses to 5 duly organized, nonprofit corporations and associations allowing 6 the sale and serving of wine when raising money for athletic, 7 charitable, educational or religious purposes. The license 8 application shall contain information as the commissioner may 9 reasonably require and shall be submitted to the commissioner at 10 least thirty days prior to the event. Wines used during these 11 events may be donated by or purchased from a licensed retailer, a 12 distributor or a farm winery. Under no circumstances may the 13 provision of subsection (c), section twenty of this article be 14 waived nor may any exception be granted with respect thereto.
- (q) The commissioner may issue special licenses to heritage fairs and festivals allowing the sale, serving and sampling of wine from a licensed farm winery. The license application shall contain information required by the commissioner and shall be submitted to the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the event. Wines used during these events may be donated by or purchased from a licensed farm winery. Under no circumstances may the provision of subsection (c), section twenty of this article be waived nor may any exception be granted with respect thereto. The commissioner shall propose rules for legislative approval in accordance with

1 article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code to implement the 2 provisions of this subsection.

(r) (1) The commissioner may issue a special license for the 3 4 retail sale of wine in a college stadium. A license to sell wine 5 granted pursuant to this subsection entitles the licensee to sell 6 and serve wine for consumption in a college stadium. For the 7 purpose of this subsection, "college stadium" means a facility 8 constructed primarily for the use of a Division I college that is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, or its 10 successor, and used as a football, basketball, baseball, soccer or 11 other Division I sports stadium. A special license issued pursuant 12 to this subsection shall be for a term beginning on the date of its 13 issuance and ending on the next following June 30, and its fee is 14 \$250 regardless of the length of the term of the license. The 15 application for the special license shall contain information as 16 the commissioner may reasonably require and must be submitted to 17 the commissioner at least thirty days prior to the first day when 18 wine is to be sold. The special license may be issued in the name 19 of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division I college 20 or university or the name of the primary food and beverage vendor 21 under contract with that college or university. These sales must 22 take place within the confines of the college stadium: Provided, 23 That the exterior of the area where wine sales may occur are 24 surrounded by a fence or other barrier prohibiting entry except

- 1 upon the college or university's express permission, and under the
- 2 conditions and restrictions established by the college or
- 3 university, so that the wine sales area is closed to free and
- 4 unrestricted entry by the general public.
- 5 (2) A license issued under this subsection and the licensee
- 6 are subject to the other requirements of this article and the rules
- 7 and orders of the commissioner relating to the special license:
- 8 Provided, That the commissioner may by rule or order grant certain
- 9 waivers or exceptions to those rules or orders as the circumstances
- 10 of each the college stadium may require, including, without
- 11 limitation, the right to revoke or suspend any license issued
- 12 pursuant to this section prior to any notice or hearing
- 13 notwithstanding sections twenty-seven and twenty-eight of this
- 14 article: Provided, however, subsection (c) or (d), section twenty
- 15 of this article may not be waived, nor shall any exception be
- 16 granted concerning those subsections.
- 17 (3) The commissioner may propose rules for legislative
- 18 approval in accordance with article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of
- 19 this code to implement this subsection.
