13 certain date minimum thirty minutes instruction prior to graduation in cardiopulmonary 14 resuscitation and psychomotor skills necessary to perform CPR; defining psychomotor skills; 15 requiring CPR instruction be based on program established by American Heart Association 16 or the American Red Cross or other recognized guidelines; authorizing various persons and 17 community members by whom instruction may be given; encouraging those community 18 members to provide training and instructional resources; authorizing school districts to 19 exceed minimum requirements; and requiring authorized CPR/AED instructor for instruction 20 that results in certification being earned.

21 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That §18-2-9 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenactedto read as follows:

1 ARTICLE 2. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

2 §18-2-9. Required courses of instruction; violation and penalty.

3 (a) In all public, private, parochial and denominational schools located within this state, there 4 shall be given prior to the completion of the eighth grade at least one year of instruction in the history of the State of West Virginia. The schools shall require regular courses of instruction by the 5 completion of the twelfth grade in the history of the United States, in civics, in the Constitution of 6 7 the United States, and in the government of the State of West Virginia for the purpose of teaching, fostering and perpetuating the ideals, principles and spirit of political and economic democracy in 8 America and increasing the knowledge of the organization and machinery of the government of the 9 10 United States and of the State of West Virginia. The state board shall, with the advice of the state superintendent, prescribe the courses of study covering these subjects for the public schools. It shall 11 12 be the duty of the officials or boards having authority over the respective private, parochial and denominational schools to prescribe courses of study for the schools under their control and 13 supervision similar to those required for the public schools. To further such study, every high school 14 15 student eligible by age for voter registration shall be afforded the opportunity to register to vote pursuant to section twenty-two, article two, chapter three of this code. 16

(b) The state board shall cause to be taught in all of the public schools of this state the subject of health education, including instruction in any of the grades six through twelve as considered appropriate by the county board, on: (1) The prevention, transmission and spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and other sexually transmitted diseases; (2) substance abuse, including the nature of alcoholic drinks and narcotics, tobacco products, and other potentially harmful drugs, with special instruction as to their effect upon the human system and upon society in general; (3) the importance of healthy eating and physical activity to maintaining healthy weight; and (4) education
concerning CPR <u>cardiopulmonary resuscitation and first aid, including instruction in the care for</u>
<u>conscious choking</u>. The course curriculum requirements and materials for the instruction shall be
adopted by the state board by rule in consultation with the Department of Health and Human
Resources. The state board shall prescribe a standardized health education assessment to be
administered within health education classes to measure student health knowledge and program
effectiveness.

8 (c) An opportunity shall be afforded to the parent or guardian of a child subject to instruction 9 in the prevention, transmission and spread of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and other 10 sexually transmitted diseases to examine the course curriculum requirements and materials to be 11 used in the instruction. The parent or guardian may exempt the child from participation in the 12 instruction by giving notice to that effect in writing to the school principal.

13 (c) (d) Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor 14 and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not exceeding \$10 for each violation, and each week 15 during which there is a violation shall constitute a separate offense. If the person so convicted 16 occupy a position in connection with the public schools, that person shall automatically be removed 17 from that position and shall be ineligible for reappointment to that or a similar position for the period 18 of one year.

(e) After July 1, 2016, the required instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation in subsection
(b) of this section shall include at least thirty minutes of instruction for each student prior to
graduation on the proper administration of cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the psychomotor skills
necessary to perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation. The term "psychomotor skills" means the use

1	of hands-on practicing to support cognitive learning. Cognitive-only training does not qualify as
2	"psychomotor skills." The cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction must be based on an
3	instructional program established by the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross or
4	another program which is nationally recognized and uses the most current national evidence-based
5	Emergency Cardiovascular Care guidelines and incorporates psychomotor skills development into
6	the instruction. A licensed teacher is not required to be a certified trainer of cardiopulmonary
7	resuscitation to facilitate, provide or oversee the instruction. The instruction may be given by
8	community members such as emergency medical technicians, paramedics, police officers, firefighters
9	and representatives of the American Heart Association or the American Red Cross. These

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to modify the current required instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and first aid in any of the grades six through twelve in public school health education subjects. It adds care for conscious choking in the first aid instruction and, after July 1, 2016, requires a minimum thirty minutes instruction prior to graduation in CPR and the psychomotor skills necessary to perform it. The CPR instruction must be based on a program established by American Heart Association or the American Red Cross or other recognized guidelines. Various community organizations/members, in addition to teachers, may give the instruction and the community organization are encouraged to provide the necessary training and

instructional resources. School districts may exceed the minimum requirements, but instruction that results in a certification being earned requires an authorized CPR/AED instructor.
