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9	A BILL to amend and reenact §18C-7-6 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating
10	to making home-schooled students eligible for a PROMISE scholarship without taking the
11	GED test; replacing grade point average with entrance examination score as an eligibility
12	criterium for receiving the scholarship; and increasing amount of unpaid community service
13	hours preferred for prospective candidates.
14	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
15	That §18C-7-6 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted
16	to read as follows:
17	ARTICLE 7. WEST VIRGINIA PROVIDING REAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR
18	MAXIMIZING IN-STATE STUDENT EXCELLENCE
19	SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM.
20	§18C-7-6. Promise scholarship program requirements; legislative rule.
21	(a) A PROMISE scholarship annual award shall meet the following conditions:
22	(1) For a student enrolled in a state institution of higher education, the annual award is equal

- 1 to the lesser of the cost of tuition or \$4,750, except that a student who was awarded and used a
- 2 PROMISE scholarship annual award prior to January 1, 2010, shall continue to receive the annual
- 3 award calculated under the same terms and conditions that applied on the day before the effective
- 4 date of this article;
- 5 (2) For a student enrolled in an eligible institution other than a state institution of higher
- 6 education, the annual award is equal to, but may not exceed, the lesser of the cost of tuition or
- 7 \$4,750, except that a student who was awarded and used a PROMISE scholarship annual award prior
- 8 to January 1, 2010, shall continue to receive the annual award calculated under the same terms and
- 9 conditions that applied on the day before the effective date of this article;
- 10 (3) The annual award may exceed \$4,750, if the commission determines that adequate funds
- 11 are available, but in any case, may not be greater than the actual cost of tuition;
- 12 (4) The annual award shall be used by an eligible institution to supplement, but may not
- 13 supplant, a tuition and fee waiver for which the individual is eligible pursuant to section five, six-a,
- 14 seven or seven-b, article ten, chapter eighteen-b of this code.
- 15 (b) The total cost of all scholarships awarded by the commission in any year may not exceed
- 16 the amount of funds available to the commission during that fiscal year.
- 17 (c) In order to be eligible to receive a PROMISE scholarship award an individual shall:
- 18 (1) Submit a scholarship award application to the commission:
- 19 (A) Within two years of graduating completing a secondary education program in from a
- 20 public, private or home high school or within two years of acquiring a general equivalency degree
- 21 if provided instruction in the home or other approved place pursuant in compliance with to
- 22 subsection (c), section one, article eight, chapter eighteen of this code; or

- 1 (B) Within seven years of initially entering military service, and within one year of discharge
- 2 from military service, if the individual has entered the United States armed services within two years
- 3 after graduating from high school;
- 4 (2) Apply for and submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid;
- 5 (3) Obtain a score within the eightieth percentile on a nationally recognized college entrance
- 6 examination including the SAT, ACT or other entrance examination as the commission determines.
- 7 Maintain a grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 grading scale in the required core and elective
- 8 course work necessary to prepare students for success in post-secondary education at the associate
- 9 and baccalaureate degree levels as determined by the commission, if the individual has completed
- 10 not more than one semester or term at an institution of higher education, excluding credits earned
- 11 in advanced placement, international baccalaureate, dual credit and comparable courses while the
- 12 student is enrolled in high school;
- 13 (4) Maintain appropriate academic progress toward the completion of a degree at the
- 4 undergraduate education level as determined by the commission if the individual has completed
- 5 more than one semester or term at an institution of higher education, excluding credits earned in
- 16 advanced placement, international baccalaureate, dual credit and comparable courses while the
- 17 student is enrolled in high school;
- 18 (5) Be a United States citizen or legal immigrant to the United States;
- 19 (6) Meet additional objective standards the commission considers necessary to promote
- 20 academic excellence and to maintain the financial stability of the fund; and
- 21 (7) Enroll in an eligible institution. A student enrolled at an eligible institution who receives
- 22 a PROMISE scholarship award may retain and renew the scholarship to complete his or her

- 1 undergraduate education at that institution or any other eligible institution under the following 2 circumstances:
- 3 (A) The institution at which the student is enrolled loses its status as an eligible institution
- 4 pursuant to the provisions of subdivision (1), subsection (b), section three of this article; and
- 5 (B) The student meets all other renewal requirements of this code and of commission rules.
- 6 (d) It is the intent of the Legislature that the commission shall strongly encourage, and prefer,
- 7 prospective candidates for the PROMISE scholarship to perform at least twenty one hundred hours
- 8 of unpaid community service while in high school to help prepare them for success in post-secondary
- 9 education. The community service may include, but is not limited to, participation with nonprofit,
- 10 governmental or community-based organizations designed with any or all of the following purposes:
- 11 (1) Improving the quality of life for community residents;
- 12 (2) Meeting the needs of community residents; or
- 13 (3) Fostering civic responsibility.
- 14 (e) The commission shall promulgate a legislative rule in accordance with the provisions of 15 article three-a, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.
- 16 (1) The rule shall include at least the following provisions:
- 17 (A) The amount of a PROMISE scholarship award in combination with aid from all other
- 18 sources may not exceed the cost of education at the institution the recipient is attending. This
- 19 provision does not apply to members of the West Virginia National Guard, recipients of an
- 20 Underwood-Smith teacher scholarship and recipients of a West Virginia engineering, science and
- 21 technology scholarship;
- 22 (B) Additional objective standards the commission considers necessary:

- 1 (I) To promote academic excellence;
- 2 (ii) To maintain the financial stability of the fund; and
- 3 (iii) To operate the program within the limits of available funds.
- 4 (C) Provisions for making the highest and best use of the PROMISE Scholarship Program
- 5 in conjunction with the West Virginia College Prepaid Tuition and Savings Program Act set forth
- 6 in article thirty, chapter eighteen of this code;
- 7 (D) A provision defining the relationship of PROMISE scholarship awards to all other
- 8 sources of student financial aid to ensure maximum coordination. The provision shall include the
- 9 following:
- (I) Methods to maximize student eligibility for federal student financial aid;
- 11 (ii) A requirement that PROMISE scholarship awards not supplant tuition and fee waivers;
- 12 and
- 13 (iii) Clarification of the relationship between the PROMISE Scholarship Program, tuition
- 14 savings plans and other state-funded student financial aid programs;
- 15 (E) A method for awarding scholarships within the limits of available appropriations,
- 16 including circumstances when program funds are not sufficient to provide awards to all eligible
- 17 applicants. The commission may not use any of the following methods:
- (I) Providing for an annual PROMISE scholarship award that is less than the amounts
- 19 provided for in this section; or
- 20 (ii) Eliminating any current recipient from eligibility; and
- 21 (F) A method for applicants to appeal determinations of eligibility and renewal.
- 22 (2) The rule may provide for or require the following at the commission's discretion:

- 1 (A) Requiring repayment of the amount of the scholarship, in whole or in part, if a
- 2 scholarship recipient chooses to work outside the state after graduation. The rule may not require
- 3 a recipient to repay a scholarship, in whole or in part, unless the prospective recipient has been
- 4 informed of this requirement in writing before initial acceptance of the PROMISE scholarship
- 5 award;
- 6 (B) Targeting a portion of the scholarship funds to be used for applicants enrolled in an
- 7 engineering, science, technology or other designated program;
- 8 (C) Determining what other sources of funding for higher education are to be deducted from
- 9 the PROMISE scholarship award; and
- 10 (D) Providing additional criteria as determined by the commission.
- 11 (3) The Legislature finds that an emergency exists and, therefore, the commission shall file
- 12 a rule to implement the provisions of this section as an emergency rule pursuant to the provisions
- 13 of article three-a, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code. The rule is subject to the prior approval of the
- 14 Legislative Oversight Commission on Education Accountability.
- 15 (4) Any rule promulgated by the commission pursuant to previous enactments of this article
- 16 in effect on the effective date of the amendment and reenactment of this article in the year 2009
- 17 remains in effect until amended, modified, repealed or replaced by the commission.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to make home schooled students eligible for a Promise scholarship without taking the GED test; to replace grade point average with entrance examination score as an eligibility criterium for receiving the scholarship; and to increase the amount of unpaid community service hours preferred for prospective candidates.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
