A BILL to amend and reenact §4-2A-2, §4-2A-4 and §4-2A-5 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931,
as amended; to amend and reenact §6-7-2 of said code; and to amend and reenact §182-3 of said code, all relating to reducing the compensation of all elected state officials and
members of the state Board Of Education by twenty-five percent; and providing that the
savings be used to offset the shortfall of the Public Employees Insurance Agency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That §4-2A-2, §4-2A-4 and §4-2A-5 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be
amended and reenacted; that §6-7-2 of said code be amended and reenacted; and that §18-2-3
of said code be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:

CHAPTER 4. THE LEGISLATURE.

ARTICLE 2A. COMPENSATION FOR AND EXPENSES OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE.

§4-2A-2. Basic compensation for services; proration.

1 (a) Beginning in the calendar year 2009 and for each calendar year after that, each 2 member of the Legislature shall receive as basic compensation for his or her services the sum of 3 \$20,000 per calendar year, to be paid as provided in subsection (b) of this section. In addition to 4 the basic compensation, members shall receive the additional compensations as are expressly 5 provided in sections three, four and five of this article. All other increased amounts or new 6 amounts in respect to the compensation of members of the Legislature, set forth in the resolution 7 of the Citizens Legislative Compensation Commission, dated January 9, 2007, and implemented 8 in sections two, four, six and eight of this article providing for new amounts or amounts increased 9 to new amounts greater than those in force and effect on January 1, 2007, become effective for 10 calendar year 2009 and each calendar year after that: Provided, That increased amounts or new 11 amounts in respect to the expenses of members of the Legislature, set forth in said resolution, 12 and implemented in sections six and eight of this article providing for new amounts or amounts

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13 increased to new amounts greater than those in force and effect on January 1, 2007, become effective for calendar year 2008 and each calendar year after that. 14 15 (b) The basic compensation is payable as follows: 16 (1) In the year 2009, and every fourth year after that: 17 (A) Five thousand dollars in each of February, March and April, payable twice a month; 18 and 19 (B) Six hundred twenty-five dollars in each of January, May, June, July, August, 20 September, October and November, payable once a month. 21 (2) Beginning in 2010, in all years except those described in subdivision (1) of this 22 subsection: 23 (A) Five thousand dollars in each of January, February and March, payable twice a month; 24 and 25 (B) Six hundred twenty-five dollars in each of April, May, June, July, August, September, 26 October and November, payable once a month; 27 (c) In the event of the death, resignation or removal of a member of the Legislature and 28 the appointment and qualification of his or her successor, the compensation provided in this section for the month in which the death, resignation or removal of the member of the Legislature 29 30 occurs shall be prorated between the original member and his or her successor on the basis of 31 the number of days served, including Saturdays and Sundays in the month. 32 (d) Notwithstanding any provision of this article and code to the contrary, effective on the passage of this amendment to this section, the basic compensation of each member of the 33 Legislature is reduced by twenty-five percent for the next term and thereafter. The savings shall 34 be used to offset the current shortfall of the Public Employees Insurance Agency. 35 §4-2A-4. Additional compensation for President of Senate, Speaker of House of Delegates, majority leaders, minority leaders, certain committee chairs and selected members

of both houses.

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(a) In addition to the basic and additional compensation provided in sections two and three
 of this article, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates shall each
 receive additional compensation of:

4 (1) One hundred fifty dollars per day for each day actually served during any regular,
5 extension of regular or extraordinary session as presiding officer, including Saturdays and
6 Sundays; and

7 (2) One hundred fifty dollars per day for attending to legislative business when the
8 Legislature is not in regular, extension of regular or extraordinary session and interim committees
9 are not meeting.

(b) In addition to the basic and additional compensation provided in sections two and three
of this article, the majority leaders and minority leaders of the Senate and of the House of
Delegates shall each receive additional compensation of \$50 per day for each day actually served
during any regular, extension of regular or during extraordinary session, including Saturdays and
Sundays, as the selected legislative leaders of their respective political parties.

(c) The presiding officer and majority and minority leader compensation shall be paid, from
time to time, during any such session or interim period, as the case may be, as may be prescribed
by rules established by the Legislative Auditor.

(d) In addition to the basic and additional compensation provided in sections two and three of this article, the chairpersons of the committees on finance and committees on the judiciary of the respective houses and up to six additional persons from each house, to be named by the presiding officer, shall each receive an additional compensation of \$150 per day up to a maximum of thirty days for attending to legislative business when the Legislature is not in regular, extended or extraordinary session and interim committees are not meeting.

(e) Notwithstanding any provision of this article and code to the contrary, effective on the
 passage of this amendment to this section, the additional compensation for the President of the
 Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates is reduced by twenty-five percent for the next

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27 <u>term and thereafter. The savings shall be used to offset the current shortfall of the Public</u> 28 Employees Insurance Agency.

§4-2A-5. Interim compensation for members.

(a) In addition to the basic and any additional compensation provided for in sections two,
three and four of this article, each member shall receive interim compensation of \$150 per day
for each day actually engaged in the performance of interim duties as a member of any interim
committee between regular sessions of the Legislature: *Provided*, That the total additional interim
compensation payable to any member and his or her replacement, if any, on a committee or
commission under the provisions of this subsection shall not exceed the sum of \$4,500 per
calendar year.

8 (b) In addition to the basic and any additional compensation provided for in sections two, 9 three and four of this article and subsection (a) of this section, each member shall receive interim 10 compensation of \$150 per day for each day actually engaged in the performance of legislative 11 duties at a meeting of any statutorily created legislative committee which meets between regular 12 sessions of the Legislature and outside of regular interim meetings when authorized by the 13 committee cochairs and approved by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House 14 of Delegates, not to exceed fifteen days per calendar year.

15 (c) Notwithstanding any provision of this article and code to the contrary, effective on the

16 passage of this amendment to this section, the interim compensation for each member of the

17 Legislature is reduced by twenty-five percent for the next term and thereafter. The savings shall

18 be used to offset the current shortfall of the Public Employees Insurance Agency.

CHAPTER 6. GENERAL PROVISIONS RESPECTING OFFICERS.

ARTICLE 7. COMPENSATION AND ALLOWANCES.

§6-7-2. Salaries of certain state officers.

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(a) Beginning in the calendar year 2005, and for each calendar year after that, salaries for

2	each of the state Constitutional officers are as follows:
3	(1) The salary of the Governor is \$95,000 per year;
4	(2) The salary of the Attorney General is \$80,000 per year;
5	(3) The salary of the Auditor is \$75,000 per year;
6	(4) The salary of the Secretary of State is \$70,000 per year;
7	(5) The salary of the Commissioner of Agriculture is \$75,000 per year; and
8	(6) The salary of the State Treasurer is \$75,000 per year.
9	(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, beginning in the
10	calendar year 2009, and for each calendar year thereafter, salaries for each of the state
11	Constitutional officers shall be as follows:
12	(1) The salary of the Governor shall be \$150,000 per year;
13	(2) The salary of the Attorney General shall be \$95,000 per year;
14	(3) The salary of the Auditor shall be \$95,000 per year;
15	(4) The salary of the Secretary of State shall be \$95,000 per year;
16	(5) The salary of the Commissioner of Agriculture shall be \$95,000 per year; and
17	(6) The salary of the State Treasurer shall be \$95,000 per year.
18	(c) Notwithstanding any provision of this article and code to the contrary, effective on the
19	passage of this amendment to this section, the salaries for each of the state Constitutional officers
20	are reduced by twenty-five percent for the next term and thereafter. The savings shall be used to
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21 offset the current shortfall of the Public Employees Insurance Agency.

CHAPTER 18. EDUCATION.

ARTICLE 2. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

§18-2-3. Meetings; compensation and expenses of members.

The state board shall hold at least six meetings in every year at such times and places as
 it may prescribe. It may meet at such other times as may be necessary, such meetings to be held

3 upon its own resolution or at the call of the president of the state board. The members of the state board, other than the ex officio members of the board, shall be paid \$100 per diem each day or 4 5 any part thereof spent in the performance of their duties under this article, and shall be reimbursed 6 for all reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred incident to the performance of their 7 duties. The State Superintendent of Schools, the chancellor of the board of trustees and the 8 chancellor of the board of directors shall be reimbursed for such expenses, but shall not receive 9 a per diem allowance. Upon presentation of itemized sworn statements, the per diem and 10 reimbursement payments shall be made from appropriations made by the Legislature to the state 11 board.

12 Notwithstanding any provision of this article and code to the contrary, effective on the

- 13 passage of this amendment to this section, the salary of the state superintendent of Schools and
- 14 the per diem of the members of the State Board of Education are reduced by twenty-five percent
- 15 for the next term and thereafter. The savings shall be used to offset the current shortfall of the
- 16 <u>Public Employees Insurance Agency.</u>

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to reduce the compensation of all elected state officials and members of the State Boards of Education by twenty-five percent. The bill provides that the savings be used to offset the shortfall of the Public Employees Insurance Agency.
