1 A BILL to amend and reenact §11-15-9 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to  
2 amend said code by adding thereto a new section, designated §11-15-30a, all relating  
3 generally to consumers sales and services tax; eliminating the refundable exemption for  
4 road construction contractors; prohibiting the transfer of revenues collected from the  
5 state's consumers sales and service tax and the state's use tax to the State Road Fund;  
6 requiring the Tax Commissioner to transfer \$12.5 million collected pursuant to the state's  
7 consumers sales and service tax via the General Revenue Fund to the state road fund by  
8 June 15 of each fiscal year; making technical corrections; and specifying the effective  
9 date.

## **ARTICLE 15. CONSUMERS SALES AND SERVICE TAX.**

### **§11-15-9. Exemptions.**

1 (a) *Exemptions for which exemption certificate may be issued.* — A person having a right  
2 or claim to any exemption set forth in this subsection may, in lieu of paying the tax imposed by  
3 this article and filing a claim for refund, execute a certificate of exemption, in the form required by  
4 the Tax Commissioner, and deliver it to the vendor of the property or service in the manner  
5 required by the Tax Commissioner. However, the Tax Commissioner may, by rule, specify those  
6 exemptions authorized in this subsection for which exemption certificates are not required. The  
7 following sales of tangible personal property and services are exempt as provided in this  
8 subsection:

9 (1) Sales of gas, steam and water delivered to consumers through mains or pipes and  
10 sales of electricity;

11 (2) Sales of textbooks required to be used in any of the schools of this state or in  
12 any institution in this state which qualifies as a nonprofit or educational institution subject  
13 to the West Virginia Department of Education and the Arts, the ~~board of Trustees of the~~

14 ~~University System of West Virginia or the board of directors for colleges located in this state~~ Higher  
15 Education Policy Commission or the Council for Community and Technical College Education for  
16 universities and colleges located in this state;

17 (3) Sales of property or services to this state, its institutions or subdivisions, governmental  
18 units, institutions or subdivisions of other states: *Provided*, That the law of the other state provides  
19 the same exemption to governmental units or subdivisions of this state and to the United States,  
20 including agencies of federal, state or local governments for distribution in public welfare or relief  
21 work;

22 (4) Sales of vehicles which are titled by the Division of Motor Vehicles and which are  
23 subject to the tax imposed by ~~section four, article three, chapter seventeen-a~~ §11-15-3c of  
24 this code or like tax;

25 (5) Sales of property or services to churches which make no charge whatsoever for the  
26 services they render: *Provided*, That the exemption granted in this subdivision applies only to  
27 services, equipment, supplies, food for meals and materials directly used or consumed by these  
28 organizations and does not apply to purchases of gasoline or special fuel;

29 (6) Sales of tangible personal property or services to a corporation or organization which  
30 has a current registration certificate issued under §11-12-1 *et seq.* of this code, which is exempt  
31 from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986,  
32 as amended, and which is:

33 (A) A church or a convention or association of churches as defined in Section 170 of the  
34 Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended;

35 (B) An elementary or secondary school which maintains a regular faculty and curriculum  
36 and has a regularly enrolled body of pupils or students in attendance at the place in this state  
37 where its educational activities are regularly carried on;

38 (C) A corporation or organization which annually receives more than one half of its support  
39 from any combination of gifts, grants, direct or indirect charitable contributions or membership

40 fees;

41 (D) An organization which has no paid employees and its gross income from fundraisers,  
42 less reasonable and necessary expenses incurred to raise the gross income (or the tangible  
43 personal property or services purchased with the net income), is donated to an organization which  
44 is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of  
45 1986, as amended;

46 (E) A youth organization, such as the Girl Scouts of the United States of America, the Boy  
47 Scouts of America or the YMCA Indian Guide/Princess Program and the local affiliates thereof,  
48 which is organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes and has as its primary  
49 purpose the nonsectarian character development and citizenship training of its members;

50 (F) For purposes of this subsection:

51 (i) The term "support" includes, but is not limited to:

52 (I) Gifts, grants, contributions or membership fees;

53 (II) Gross receipts from fundraisers which include receipts from admissions, sales of  
54 merchandise, performance of services or furnishing of facilities in any activity which is not an  
55 unrelated trade or business within the meaning of Section 513 of the Internal Revenue Code of  
56 1986, as amended;

57 (III) Net income from unrelated business activities, whether or not the activities are carried  
58 on regularly as a trade or business;

59 (IV) Gross investment income as defined in Section 509(e) of the Internal Revenue Code  
60 of 1986, as amended;

61 (V) Tax revenues levied for the benefit of a corporation or organization either paid to or  
62 expended on behalf of the organization; and

63 (VI) The value of services or facilities (exclusive of services or facilities generally furnished  
64 to the public without charge) furnished by a governmental unit referred to in Section 170(c)(1) of  
65 the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, to an organization without charge. This term

66 does not include any gain from the sale or other disposition of property which would be considered  
67 as gain from the sale or exchange of a capital asset or the value of an exemption from any federal,  
68 state or local tax or any similar benefit;

69 (ii) The term "charitable contribution" means a contribution or gift to or for the use of a  
70 corporation or organization, described in Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986,  
71 as amended; and

72 (iii) The term "membership fee" does not include any amounts paid for tangible personal  
73 property or specific services rendered to members by the corporation or organization;

74 (G) The exemption allowed by this subdivision does not apply to sales of gasoline or  
75 special fuel or to sales of tangible personal property or services to be used or consumed in the  
76 generation of unrelated business income as defined in Section 513 of the Internal Revenue Code  
77 of 1986, as amended. The exemption granted in this subdivision applies only to services,  
78 equipment, supplies and materials used or consumed in the activities for which the organizations  
79 qualify as tax-exempt organizations under the Internal Revenue Code and does not apply to  
80 purchases of gasoline or special fuel which are taxable as provided in §11-14C-1 et seq. of this  
81 code;

82 (7) An isolated transaction in which any taxable service or any tangible personal property  
83 is sold, transferred, offered for sale or delivered by the owner of the property or by his or her  
84 representative for the owner's account, the sale, transfer, offer for sale or delivery not being made  
85 in the ordinary course of repeated and successive transactions of like character by the owner or  
86 on his or her account by the representative: *Provided*, That nothing contained in this subdivision  
87 may be construed to prevent an owner who sells, transfers or offers for sale tangible personal  
88 property in an isolated transaction through an auctioneer from availing himself or herself of the  
89 exemption provided in this subdivision, regardless of where the isolated sale takes place. The  
90 Tax Commissioner may propose a legislative rule for promulgation pursuant to §29A-3-1 *et seq.*  
91 of this code which he or she considers necessary for the efficient administration of this exemption;

92 (8) Sales of tangible personal property or of any taxable services rendered for use or  
93 consumption in connection with the commercial production of an agricultural product the ultimate  
94 sale of which is subject to the tax imposed by this article or which would have been subject to tax  
95 under this article: *Provided*, That sales of tangible personal property and services to be used or  
96 consumed in the construction of or permanent improvement to real property and sales of gasoline  
97 and special fuel are not exempt: *Provided, however*, That nails and fencing may not be considered  
98 as improvements to real property;

99 (9) Sales of tangible personal property to a person for the purpose of resale in the form of  
100 tangible personal property: *Provided*, That sales of gasoline and special fuel by distributors and  
101 importers is taxable except when the sale is to another distributor for resale: *Provided, however*,  
102 That sales of building materials or building supplies or other property to any person engaging in  
103 the activity of contracting, as defined in this article, which is to be installed in, affixed to or  
104 incorporated by that person or his or her agent into any real property, building or structure is not  
105 exempt under this subdivision;

106 (10) Sales of newspapers when delivered to consumers by route carriers;

107 (11) Sales of drugs, durable medical goods, mobility-enhancing equipment and prosthetic  
108 devices dispensed upon prescription and sales of insulin to consumers for medical purposes; ~~The~~  
109 ~~amendment to this subdivision shall apply to sales made after December 31, 2003;~~

110 (12) Sales of radio and television broadcasting time, preprinted advertising circulars and  
111 newspaper and outdoor advertising space for the advertisement of goods or services;

112 (13) Sales and services performed by day care centers;

113 (14) Casual and occasional sales of property or services not conducted in a repeated  
114 manner or in the ordinary course of repetitive and successive transactions of like character by a  
115 corporation or organization which is exempt from tax under subdivision (6) of this subsection on  
116 its purchases of tangible personal property or services. For purposes of this subdivision, the term  
117 "casual and occasional sales not conducted in a repeated manner or in the ordinary course of

118 repetitive and successive transactions of like character" means sales of tangible personal property  
119 or services at fundraisers sponsored by a corporation or organization which is exempt, under  
120 subdivision (6) of this subsection, from payment of the tax imposed by this article on its purchases  
121 when the fundraisers are of limited duration and are held no more than six times during any  
122 twelve-month period and "limited duration" means no more than eighty-four consecutive hours:  
123 *Provided*, That sales for volunteer fire departments and volunteer school support groups, with  
124 duration of events being no more than eighty-four consecutive hours at a time, which are held no  
125 more than eighteen times in a twelve-month period for the purposes of this subdivision are  
126 considered "casual and occasional sales not conducted in a repeated manner or in the ordinary  
127 course of repetitive and successive transactions of a like character";

128 (15) Sales of property or services to a school which has approval from the ~~board~~  
129 ~~of Trustees of the University System of West Virginia or the board of Directors of the state~~  
130 ~~College System~~ Higher Education Policy Commission or the Council for Community and  
131 Technical College Education to award degrees, which has its principal campus in this state  
132 and which is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the  
133 Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended: *Provided*, That sales of gasoline and  
134 special fuel are taxable as provided in §11-15-18, §11-15-18b and §11-14C-1 et seq. of this  
135 code;

136 (16) Sales of lottery tickets and materials by licensed lottery sales agents and lottery  
137 retailers authorized by the state Lottery Commission, under the provisions of §29-22-1 *et seq.*  
138 of this code;

139 (17) Leases of motor vehicles titled pursuant to the provisions of §17A-3-1 *et seq.* of this  
140 code to lessees for a period of thirty or more consecutive days;

141 (18) Notwithstanding the provisions of §11-15-18 or §11-15-18b of this code or any other  
142 provision of this article to the contrary, sales of propane to consumers for poultry house heating

143 purposes, with any seller to the consumer who may have prior paid the tax in his or her price, to  
144 not pass on the same to the consumer, but to make application and receive refund of the tax from  
145 the Tax Commissioner pursuant to rules which are promulgated after being proposed for  
146 legislative approval in accordance with chapter 29A of this code by the Tax Commissioner;

147 (19) Any sales of tangible personal property or services purchased and lawfully paid for  
148 with food stamps pursuant to the federal food stamp program codified in 7 U. S. C. §2011, *et seq.*,  
149 as amended, or with drafts issued through the West Virginia special supplement food program for  
150 women, infants and children codified in 42 U. S. C. §1786;

151 (20) Sales of tickets for activities sponsored by elementary and secondary schools located  
152 within this state;

153 (21) Sales of electronic data processing services and related software: *Provided*, That, for  
154 the purposes of this subdivision, "electronic data processing services" means:

155 (A) The processing of another's data, including all processes incident to processing of data  
156 such as keypunching, keystroke verification, rearranging or sorting of previously documented data  
157 for the purpose of data entry or automatic processing and changing the medium on which data is  
158 sorted, whether these processes are done by the same person or several persons; and

159 (B) Providing access to computer equipment for the purpose of processing data or  
160 examining or acquiring data stored in or accessible to the computer equipment;

161 (22) Tuition charged for attending educational summer camps;

162 (23) Dispensing of services performed by one corporation, partnership or limited liability  
163 company for another corporation, partnership or limited liability company when the entities are  
164 members of the same controlled group or are related taxpayers as defined in Section 267 of the  
165 Internal Revenue Code. "Control" means ownership, directly or indirectly, of stock, equity interests  
166 or membership interests possessing fifty percent or more of the total combined voting power of  
167 all classes of the stock of a corporation, equity interests of a partnership or membership interests  
168 of a limited liability company entitled to vote or ownership, directly or indirectly, of stock, equity

169 interests or membership interests possessing fifty percent or more of the value of the corporation,  
170 partnership or limited liability company;

171 (24) Food for the following are exempt:

172 (A) Food purchased or sold by a public or private school, school-sponsored student  
173 organizations or school-sponsored parent-teacher associations to students enrolled in the school  
174 or to employees of the school during normal school hours; but not those sales of food made to  
175 the general public;

176 (B) Food purchased or sold by a public or private college or university or by a student  
177 organization officially recognized by the college or university to students enrolled at the college  
178 or university when the sales are made on a contract basis so that a fixed price is paid for  
179 consumption of food products for a specific period of time without respect to the amount of food  
180 product actually consumed by the particular individual contracting for the sale and no money is  
181 paid at the time the food product is served or consumed;

182 (C) Food purchased or sold by a charitable or private nonprofit organization, a nonprofit  
183 organization or a governmental agency under a program to provide food to low-income persons  
184 at or below cost;

185 (D) Food sold by a charitable or private nonprofit organization, a nonprofit organization or  
186 a governmental agency under a program operating in West Virginia for a minimum of five years  
187 to provide food at or below cost to individuals who perform a minimum of two hours of community  
188 service for each unit of food purchased from the organization;

189 (E) Food sold in an occasional sale by a charitable or nonprofit organization, including  
190 volunteer fire departments and rescue squads, if the purpose of the sale is to obtain revenue for  
191 the functions and activities of the organization and the revenue obtained is actually expended for  
192 that purpose;

193 (F) Food sold by any religious organization at a social or other gathering conducted by it  
194 or under its auspices, if the purpose in selling the food is to obtain revenue for the functions and

195 activities of the organization and the revenue obtained from selling the food is actually used in  
196 carrying out those functions and activities: *Provided*, That purchases made by the organizations  
197 are not exempt as a purchase for resale; or

198 (G) Food sold by volunteer fire departments and rescue squads that are exempt from  
199 federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as  
200 amended, when the purpose of the sale is to obtain revenue for the functions and activities of the  
201 organization and the revenue obtained is exempt from federal income tax and actually expended  
202 for that purpose;

203 (25) Sales of food by little leagues, midget football leagues, youth football or soccer  
204 leagues, band boosters or other school or athletic booster organizations supporting activities for  
205 grades kindergarten through twelve and similar types of organizations, including scouting groups  
206 and church youth groups, if the purpose in selling the food is to obtain revenue for the functions  
207 and activities of the organization and the revenues obtained from selling the food is actually used  
208 in supporting or carrying on functions and activities of the groups: *Provided*, That the purchases  
209 made by the organizations are not exempt as a purchase for resale;

210 (26) Charges for room and meals by fraternities and sororities to their members: *Provided*,  
211 That the purchases made by a fraternity or sorority are not exempt as a purchase for resale;

212 (27) Sales of or charges for the transportation of passengers in interstate commerce;

213 (28) Sales of tangible personal property or services to any person which this state is  
214 prohibited from taxing under the laws of the United States or under the Constitution of this state;

215 (29) Sales of tangible personal property or services to any person who claims exemption  
216 from the tax imposed by this article or §11-15A-1 *et seq.* of this code, or pursuant to the provision  
217 of any other chapter of this code;

218 (30) Charges for the services of opening and closing a burial lot;

219 (31) Sales of livestock, poultry or other farm products in their original state by the producer  
220 of the livestock, poultry or other farm products or a member of the producer's immediate family

221 who is not otherwise engaged in making retail sales of tangible personal property; and sales of  
222 livestock sold at public sales sponsored by breeders or registry associations or livestock auction  
223 markets: *Provided*, That the exemptions allowed by this subdivision may be claimed without  
224 presenting or obtaining exemption certificates provided the farmer maintains adequate records;

225 (32) Sales of motion picture films to motion picture exhibitors for exhibition if the sale of  
226 tickets or the charge for admission to the exhibition of the film is subject to the tax imposed by  
227 this article and sales of coin-operated video arcade machines or video arcade games to a person  
228 engaged in the business of providing the machines to the public for a charge upon which the tax  
229 imposed by this article is remitted to the Tax Commissioner: *Provided*, That the exemption  
230 provided in this subdivision may be claimed by presenting to the seller a properly executed  
231 exemption certificate;

232 (33) Sales of aircraft repair, remodeling and maintenance services when the services are  
233 to an aircraft operated by a certified or licensed carrier of persons or property, or by a  
234 governmental entity, or to an engine or other component part of an aircraft operated by a  
235 certificated or licensed carrier of persons or property, or by a governmental entity and sales of  
236 tangible personal property that is permanently affixed or permanently attached as a component  
237 part of an aircraft owned or operated by a certificated or licensed carrier of persons or property,  
238 or by a governmental entity, as part of the repair, remodeling or maintenance service and sales  
239 of machinery, tools or equipment directly used or consumed exclusively in the repair, remodeling  
240 or maintenance of aircraft, aircraft engines or aircraft component parts for a certificated or licensed  
241 carrier of persons or property or for a governmental entity;

242 (34) Charges for memberships or services provided by health and fitness organizations  
243 relating to personalized fitness programs;

244 (35) Sales of services by individuals who babysit for a profit: *Provided*, That the gross  
245 receipts of the individual from the performance of baby-sitting services do not exceed \$5,000 in a  
246 taxable year;

247 (36) Sales of services by public libraries or by libraries at academic institutions or by  
248 libraries at institutions of higher learning;

249 (37) Commissions received by a manufacturer's representative;

250 (38) Sales of primary opinion research services when:

251 (A) The services are provided to an out-of-state client;

252 (B) The results of the service activities, including, but not limited to, reports, lists of focus  
253 group recruits and compilation of data are transferred to the client across state lines by mail, wire  
254 or other means of interstate commerce, for use by the client outside the State of West Virginia;  
255 and

256 (C) The transfer of the results of the service activities is an indispensable part of the overall  
257 service.

258 For the purpose of this subdivision, the term "primary opinion research" means original  
259 research in the form of telephone surveys, mall intercept surveys, focus group research, direct  
260 mail surveys, personal interviews and other data collection methods commonly used for  
261 quantitative and qualitative opinion research studies;

262 (39) Sales of property or services to persons within the state when those sales are for the  
263 purposes of the production of value-added products: *Provided*, That the exemption granted in this  
264 subdivision applies only to services, equipment, supplies and materials directly used or consumed  
265 by those persons engaged solely in the production of value-added products: *Provided, however*,  
266 That this exemption may not be claimed by any one purchaser for more than five consecutive  
267 years, except as otherwise permitted in this section.

268 For the purpose of this subdivision, the term "value-added product" means the following  
269 products derived from processing a raw agricultural product, whether for human consumption or  
270 for other use. For purposes of this subdivision, the following enterprises qualify as processing raw  
271 agricultural products into value-added products: Those engaged in the conversion of:

272 (A) Lumber into furniture, toys, collectibles and home furnishings;

273 (B) Fruits into wine;  
274 (C) Honey into wine;  
275 (D) Wool into fabric;  
276 (E) Raw hides into semifinished or finished leather products;  
277 (F) Milk into cheese;  
278 (G) Fruits or vegetables into a dried, canned or frozen product;  
279 (H) Feeder cattle into commonly accepted slaughter weights;  
280 (I) Aquatic animals into a dried, canned, cooked or frozen product; and  
281 (J) Poultry into a dried, canned, cooked or frozen product;  
282 (40) Sales of music instructional services by a music teacher and artistic services or artistic  
283 performances of an entertainer or performing artist pursuant to a contract with the owner or  
284 operator of a retail establishment, restaurant, inn, bar, tavern, sports or other entertainment facility  
285 or any other business location in this state in which the public or a limited portion of the public  
286 may assemble to hear or see musical works or other artistic works be performed for the enjoyment  
287 of the members of the public there assembled when the amount paid by the owner or operator for  
288 the artistic service or artistic performance does not exceed \$3,000: *Provided*, That nothing  
289 contained herein may be construed to deprive private social gatherings, weddings or other private  
290 parties from asserting the exemption set forth in this subdivision. For the purposes of this  
291 exemption, artistic performance or artistic service means and is limited to the conscious use of  
292 creative power, imagination and skill in the creation of aesthetic experience for an audience  
293 present and in attendance and includes, and is limited to, stage plays, musical performances,  
294 poetry recitations and other readings, dance presentation, circuses and similar presentations and  
295 does not include the showing of any film or moving picture, gallery presentations of sculptural or  
296 pictorial art, nude or strip show presentations, video games, video arcades, carnival rides, radio  
297 or television shows or any video or audio taped presentations or the sale or leasing of video or  
298 audio tapes, air shows or any other public meeting, display or show other than those specified

299 herein: *Provided, however,* That nothing contained herein may be construed to exempt the sales  
300 of tickets from the tax imposed in this article. The State Tax Commissioner shall propose a  
301 legislative rule pursuant to §29A-3-1 *et seq.* of this code establishing definitions and eligibility  
302 criteria for asserting this exemption which is not inconsistent with the provisions set forth herein:  
303 *Provided further,* That nude dancers or strippers may not be considered as entertainers for the  
304 purposes of this exemption;

305 (41) Charges to a member by a membership association or organization which is exempt  
306 from paying federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code  
307 of 1986, as amended, for membership in the association or organization, including charges to  
308 members for newsletters prepared by the association or organization for distribution primarily to  
309 its members, charges to members for continuing education seminars, workshops, conventions,  
310 lectures or courses put on or sponsored by the association or organization, including charges for  
311 related course materials prepared by the association or organization or by the speaker or  
312 speakers for use during the continuing education seminar, workshop, convention, lecture or  
313 course, but not including any separate charge or separately stated charge for meals, lodging,  
314 entertainment or transportation taxable under this article: *Provided,* That the association or  
315 organization pays the tax imposed by this article on its purchases of meals, lodging, entertainment  
316 or transportation taxable under this article for which a separate or separately stated charge is not  
317 made. A membership association or organization which is exempt from paying federal income  
318 taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, may  
319 elect to pay the tax imposed under this article on the purchases for which a separate charge or  
320 separately stated charge could apply and not charge its members the tax imposed by this article  
321 or the association or organization may avail itself of the exemption set forth in subdivision (9) of  
322 this subsection relating to purchases of tangible personal property for resale and then collect the  
323 tax imposed by this article on those items from its member;

324 (42) Sales of governmental services or governmental materials by county assessors,

325 county sheriffs, county clerks or circuit clerks in the normal course of local government operations;

326 (43) Direct or subscription sales by the Division of Natural Resources of the magazine  
327 currently entitled *Wonderful West Virginia* and by the Division of Culture and History of the  
328 magazine currently entitled *Goldenseal* and the journal currently entitled *West Virginia History*;

329 (44) Sales of soap to be used at car wash facilities;

330 (45) Commissions received by a travel agency from an out-of-state vendor;

331 (46) The service of providing technical evaluations for compliance with federal and state  
332 environmental standards provided by environmental and industrial consultants who have formal  
333 certification through the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection or the West  
334 Virginia Bureau for Public Health or both. For purposes of this exemption, the service of providing  
335 technical evaluations for compliance with federal and state environmental standards includes  
336 those costs of tangible personal property directly used in providing such services that are  
337 separately billed to the purchaser of such services and on which the tax imposed by this article  
338 has previously been paid by the service provider;

339 (47) Sales of tangible personal property and services by volunteer fire departments and  
340 rescue squads that are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) or (c)(4) of the  
341 Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, if the sole purpose of the sale is to obtain revenue  
342 for the functions and activities of the organization and the revenue obtained is exempt from federal  
343 income tax and actually expended for that purpose;

344 (48) Lodging franchise fees, including royalties, marketing fees, reservation system fees

349 (b) *Refundable exemptions.* -- Any person having a right or claim to any exemption set  
350 forth in this subsection shall first pay to the vendor the tax imposed by this article and then apply

351 to the Tax Commissioner for a refund or credit, or as provided in §11-15-9d of this code give to  
352 the vendor his or her West Virginia direct pay permit number. The following sales of tangible  
353 personal property and services are exempt from tax as provided in this subsection:

389 (c) *Effective date.* – The amendments to this section in 2018 shall take effect beginning  
 390 July 1, 2018, and apply to sales made on and after that date: *Provided*, That the amendments to  
 391 subdivision (6), subsection (b) of this section takes effect upon passage of this act of the  
 392 Legislature and shall be construed to prohibit on and after January 1, 2018, all transfers to the  
 393 State Road Fund established in the State Treasury pursuant to section fifty-two, article six of the  
 394 Constitution, of the taxes imposed by §11-15-1 *et seq.* and §11-15A-1 *et seq.* of this code.

**§11-15-30a. Proceeds of tax; appropriation to State Road Fund.**

1 By June 15 of each fiscal year, the Tax Commissioner shall transfer to the state road fund  
 2 \$12.5 million of the taxes collected under this article for deposit in the State General Revenue  
 3 Fund.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to eliminate the refundable exemption for road construction contractors. The bill prohibits the transfer of revenues collected from the state's consumers sales and service tax and the state's use tax to the State Road Fund. The bill requires the Tax Commissioner to transfer \$12.5 million collected pursuant to the state's consumers sales and service tax via the General Revenue Fund to the state road

fund by June 15 of each fiscal year. The bill makes technical corrections. The bill specifies the effective date.
