1 A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article,

designated §2-4-1, §2-4-2, and §2-4-3, all relating to establishing a policy for formal

3 recognition of Indian tribes.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

# ARTICLE 4. WEST VIRGINIA INDIAN TRIBES STATE RECOGNITION ACT.

### §2-4-1. Title.

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The title of this article is known as the "West Virginia Indian Tribes Recognition Act."

### §2-4-2. Definitions.

- As used in this article "Indian tribe" or "tribe" means any Indian group that has been
- 3 formally recognized as an Indian tribe by the Secretary of the United States Department of the
- 4 Interior, pursuant to 25 C.F.R. §83.7, by the legislature of any other state or by the appropriate
- 5 board which has been given the power of tribal recognition of any other state.

### §2-4-3. Recognition of Indian tribes.

- 6 (a) The State of West Virginia recognizes a group's status as an Indian tribe if that group
- 7 <u>has been formally recognized as an Indian tribe by the Secretary of the United States Department</u>
- 8 of the Interior, pursuant to 25 C.F.R. §83.7, by the legislature of any other state or by the
- 9 appropriate board which has been given the power of tribal recognition of any other state.
- 10 (b) The State of West Virginia does not acknowledge any group as an Indian tribe which
- 11 <u>has not been recognized as an Indian tribe by the Secretary of the United States Department of</u>
- the Interior pursuant to 25 C.F.R. §83.7, by the Legislature of any other state or by the appropriate
- 13 board which has been given the power of tribal recognition of any other state.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to establish the state's policy for formal recognition of Indian tribes.
