A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article, designated §5-30-1, §5-30-2, §5-30-3, §5-30-4, §5-30-5, and §5-30-6, all relating to establishing the Intergenerational Poverty Task Force; giving criteria for members; establishing duties for the task force; providing for the power of the task force; creating a report to be submitted to the Joint Committee on Government and Finance; and creating a termination date.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

<u>ARTICLE 30. INTERGENERATIONAL POVERTY TASK FORCE.</u>

§5-30-1. Intergenerational Poverty Task Force created; members. 1 (a) The Intergenerational Poverty Task Force is created. The executive committee of the 2 task force shall consist of the following voting members: 3 (1) The chairpersons of the Health and Human Resources Committee of the Legislature; 4 (2) The chairpersons of the Finance Committee of the Legislature; and 5 (3) Three at-large members appointed by the Governor. 6 (4) The voting members of the executive committee shall choose a chairperson and vice-7 chairperson from among the voting members. 8 (5) The chief executive officer of the Department of Health and Human Resources or his or 9 her designee, the Department of Labor, and the Commissioner of the West Virginia Department of 10 Education shall be nonvoting, ex officio members of the executive committee of the task force. 11 (b) The remaining members of the task force shall be nonvoting members appointed by the 12 executive committee of the task force through an application and selection process, representing 13 (1) advocacy groups that focus on childhood poverty issues and education issues, (2) academic 14 experts in childhood poverty or education, (3) service providers, (4) educational institutions, (5) 15 workforce development agencies, and (6) experts in early childhood education. The members 16 appointed pursuant to this subsection shall constitute the advisory committee to the task force. Intergenerational Poverty Task Force; duties. §5-30-2.

1	The Intergenerational Poverty Task Force shall, with respect to programs, including, but
2	not limited to, the aid to dependent children program, the federal Supplemental Nutrition
3	Assistance Program established pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 2011 et seq., child-care assistance
4	programs, and other relevant programs within the West Virginia Department of Health and Human
5	Resources:
6	(1) Share, examine, and analyze data and information regarding intergenerational poverty
7	in the state with a primary focus on data and information regarding children who are at risk of
8	continuing the cycle of poverty unless outside intervention is made and develop effective and
9	efficient plans, programs, and recommendations to help such children escape the cycle of poverty;
10	(2) Encourage participation and input from academic experts, advocacy groups, nonprofit
11	corporations, local governments, and faith-based institutions in exploring strategies and solutions
12	to help children who are victims of intergenerational poverty escape the cycle of poverty;
13	(3) Study, evaluate, and report on the status and effectiveness of policies, procedures, and
14	programs implemented by other states and by nongovernmental entities that address the needs of
15	and that provide services to children affected by intergenerational poverty;
16	(4) Identify policies, procedures, and programs, including any lack of interagency data
17	sharing, lack of policy coordination, or current federal requirements, that are impeding efforts to
18	help children in the state affected by intergenerational poverty escape the cycle of poverty and
19	recommend changes to those policies and procedures;
20	(5) Create a long-range strategic plan containing:
21	(A) Measurable goals and benchmarks, including future action needed to attain those
22	goals and benchmarks, for decreasing the incidence of intergenerational poverty among the
23	state's children and increasing the number of the state's children who escape the cycle of poverty;
24	<u>and</u>
25	(B) Recommended data-supported changes to policies, procedures, and programs to
26	address the needs of children affected by intergenerational poverty and to help those children

27	escape the cycle of poverty, including the steps that will be required to make the recommended		
28	changes and whether further action is required by the Legislature or the federal government; and		
29	(6) Protect the privacy of individuals living in poverty by using and distributing the data it		
30	collects or examines in compliance with federal requirements and with relevant sections of West		
31	Virginia Code.		
32	(7) Collaborate with the advisory committee created in section four of this article to develop		
33	and monitor strategies to prevent and address adverse childhood experiences and reduce		
34	intergenerational poverty;		
35	(8) Seek input on best practices for poverty reduction from task force, service providers		
36	community-based organizations, legislators, state agencies, stakeholders, and subject matte		
37	experts; and		
38	(9) Collaborate with partner agencies and the advisory committee to analyze available		
39	data and information regarding intergenerational poverty in the state, with a primary focus on data		
40	and information regarding children who are at risk of continuing the cycle of poverty and welfare		
41	dependency unless outside intervention occurs.		
	§5-30-3. Intergenerational Poverty Task Force; powers.		
1	To accomplish its duties, the Intergenerational Poverty Task Force may:		
2	(1) Request and receive from any state or local governmental entity or institution		
3	information relating to poverty in the state, including reports, audits, data, projections, and		
4	statistics; and		
5	(2) Appoint special committees to advise and assist the task force. Members of any such		
6	special committee shall be appointed by the chairperson of the task force and may be members of		
7	the task force or individuals from the private or public sector. A special committee shall report to		
8	the task force on the progress of the special committee. Members of a special committee		
9	appointed under this section may not receive reimbursement or pay for work done in relation to the

25		(d) Each member of the advisory commit	tee is appointed for a fou	<u>ır-year term unless a</u>

26	member is appointed to complete an unexpired term. The secretary may adjust the length of term		
27	at the time of appointment or reappointment so that approximately one-half of the advisory		
28	committee is appointed every two years.		
29	(e) The secretary may remove an advisory committee member:		
30	(1) If the member is unable or unwilling to carry out the member's assigned responsibilities;		
31	<u>or</u>		
32	(2) For good cause.		
33	(f) If a vacancy occurs in the advisory committee membership for any reason, a		
34	replacement may be appointed for the unexpired term.		
35	(g) The advisory committee shall choose cochairs from among its membership. The		
36	secretary shall convene the initial meeting of the advisory committee.		
37	(h) A majority of the advisory committee constitutes a quorum of the advisory committee at		
38	any meeting and the action of the majority of members present is the action of the advisory		
39	committee.		
40	(i) The advisory committee shall:		
41	(1) Meet quarterly at the request of the task force cochairs or the cochairs of the advisory		
42	committee;		
43	(2) Make recommendations to the task force on how the task force and the state can		
44	effectively address the needs of children affected by intergenerational poverty and achieve the		
45	purposes and duties of the task force as described in this act;		
46	(3) Ensure that the advisory committee's recommendations to the task force are supported		
47	by verifiable data; and		
48	(4) Gather input from diverse communities about the impact of intergenerational poverty on		
49	outcomes such as education, health care, employment, involvement in the child welfare system,		
50	and other related areas.		
51	(j) The department shall provide staff support to the advisory committee and shall		

52	endeavor to accommodate the participation needs of its members. Accommodations may include		
53	considering the location and time of committee meetings, making options available for remote		
54	participation by members, and convening meetings of the committee in locations with proximity to		
55	available child care whenever feasible.		
56	(k) Members of the advisory committee may receive reimbursement for travel expenses.		
	§5-30-5. Intergenerational Poverty Task Force; reports; contents.		
1	(a) On or before December 1, 2024, the Intergenerational Poverty Task Force shall submit		
2	a preliminary report and on or before December 15, 2024, the task force shall submit a final report:		
3	(1) To the Governor and (2) electronically to the Joint Committee on Government and Finance.		
4	(b) The preliminary report and the final report shall:		
5	(1) Include the long-range strategic plan;		
6	(2) Describe how the task force fulfilled its statutory purposes and duties during the time		
7	period covered by the report;		
8	(3) Describe policies, procedures, and programs that have been implemented or modified		
9	to help break the cycle of poverty for children affected or at risk of being affected by		
10	intergenerational poverty; and		
11	(4) Contain recommendations on how the state should act to address issues relating to		
12	breaking the cycle of poverty for children affected or at risk of being affected by intergenerational		
13	poverty.		
	§5-30-6. Intergenerational Poverty Task Force; termination.		
1	The Intergenerational Poverty Task Force terminates on December 31, 2024.
