## INTRODUCTION

The question of determining just what subject-matter should be included in the Blue Book is one of much concern always to the editor. What would probably be of interest to one class or group might be of no interest whatsoever to another, but all of the people are more or less interested in some subjects that pertain to the state as a whole and even to separate parts thereof. And so, in this volume, it has been sought to include matter that may prove not only interesting but helpful generally to all those who use the book.

The arrangement varies but little from last year, the main headings, wherever practicable, being inserted in alphabetical order. Many new subjects have been added and a great many of those embraced in the 1933 book omitted. The greatest of care has been exercised in the revision and correction of state, county and municipal registers and directories, both copy and proof being combed for errors in names and designations.

Through the cooperation of the various county clerks over the state, it has been possible to include the unofficial returns of the general election held on November 6, 1934. The data was compiled after the official canvass of returns by county courts, but before certification to the Secretary of State.

Again, with deep appreciation, acknowledgment is made of the aid given the editor by federal, state, county and municipal officials, members of the press, chairmen of political committees and other men and women actively identified with the business and professional life of the state who have willingly and cheerfully contributed much toward the compilation of the 1934 edition of the Blue Book.

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### WEST VIRGINIA STATE FLAG

The design for the West Virginia state flag was adopted by the legislature March 7, 1929. The proportions are the same as those of the United States ensign.

The field is pure white, upon the center of which is emblazoned in proper colors the coat-of-arms of the state, upon which appears the date of the admission of West Virginia into the Union and the motto "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Always Freemen).

Above the coat-of-arms of the State of West Virginia there is a ribbon lettered, "State of West Virginia," and a wreath of rhododendron maximum in proper colors is arranged appropriately around the lower part thereof. The field of pure white is bordered by a strip of blue on four sides.

When used for parade purposes, the flag is trimmed with gold colored fringe on three sides, and when used on ceremonial occasions with the United States ensign it is trimmed and mounted in similar fashion to the United States flag.

## STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

### GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, article one, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration, are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year.

Each board is given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers have power to administer oaths.

Every applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of twenty dollars, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge five dollars for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof.

All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board.

Each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificates it issues.

An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked, has the right of appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Members, unless otherwise specified, are allowed ten (\$10.00) dollars per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and are entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January.

The secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

(References are to the 1931 code.)

### BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF ACCOUNTANTS

Created 1911; non-partisan; composed of three certified public accountants who have been in active practice in West Virginia for at least five years; appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate; term, three years; elects own officers; members eligible for reappointment; duties, to conduct examinations of applicants for certificates as certified public accountants; self-sustaining from examination fees. (Code 30-9.)

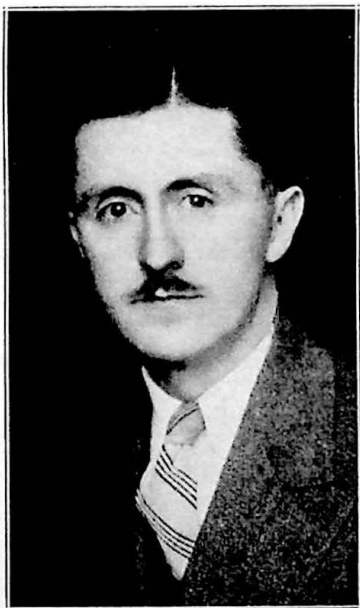

## THE FIRST CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

### Wheeling, 1861

Pursuant to proclamation issued by Governor Francis H. Pierpont, the first constitutional convention of West Virginia assembled in Wheeling on the twenty-sixth day of November, 1861, and organized by electing officers as follows: President, John Hall, of Mason County; Secretary, Ellery R. Hall, of Taylor County; and Sergeant-at-Arms, James C. Orr, of Ohio County.

At an election held on April 3, 1862, the constitution was adopted by a vote of 18,862 to 514, a majority of 18,348.

Section 7, Article XI, of the constitution, provided that "No slaves shall be brought, or free person of color be permitted to come into this State for permanent residence."

The Congress of the United States required a change in this section so as to provide for the gradual but complete abolition of slavery, proposing that the section be amended to read as follows:

"The children of slaves born within the limits of this State after the fourth day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, shall be free and that all slaves within the said State who shall, at the time aforesaid, be under the age of ten years, shall be free when they arrive at the age of twenty-one years; and all slaves over ten, and under twenty-one years, shall be free when they arrive at the age of twenty-one years; and no slave shall be permitted to come into the State for permanent residence therein."

In order to take action upon the demand made by Congress, the constitutional convention again assembled at Wheeling on February 12, 1863. Abram D. Soper was elected president to succeed John Hall, resigned. The amendment proposed by Congress was agreed to on February 17th, and the convention adjourned *sine die* on February 20th.

The amendment was submitted to a vote of the people on March 26, 1863, and was adopted by a vote of 27,899 to 572, a majority of 27,327.

## THE SECOND CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

### Charleston, 1872

The second constitutional convention assembled in Charleston on Tuesday, January 16, 1872. The following officers were elected: President, Samuel Price, of Greenbrier County; Secretary, G. J. Butcher, of Lewis County; Sergeant-at-Arms, Jacob V. Cunningham, of Hardy County; and Doorkeeper, G. J. Wetzel. A constitution was adopted, and the convention adjourned *sine die* on April 9, 1872.

The question of the adoption of the constitution was submitted to a vote of the people on August 22, 1872, and was adopted by a majority of 4,406. The total vote was 42,154 for ratification and 37,748 for rejection.

**THE CONSTITUTION OF WEST VIRGINIA**

RATIFIED IN 1872

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**ARTICLE I**

**RELATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES**

1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

**INTERNAL GOVERNMENT AND POLICE**

2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to this State or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved to the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

**CONTINUITY OF CONSTITUTIONAL OPERATION**

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in times of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

**REPRESENTATIVES TO CONGRESS**

4. For the election of representatives to congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

## ARTICLE II

## THE STATE

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over, the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became part of the state.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871, Mingo County, erected since the adoption of the constitution and not included in the above list of Counties, was erected from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

## POWERS OF GOVERNMENT IN CITIZENS

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

## REQUISITES OF CITIZENSHIP

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

## EQUAL REPRESENTATION

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto shall, as far as practicable, be preserved.

## PROVISIONS REGARDING PROPERTY

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens, as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

## TREASON, WHAT CONSTITUTES—PENALTY

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

## "MONTANI SEMPER LIBERI"—STATE SEAL

7. The present seal of the State with its motto, "*Montani Semper Liberi*," shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

## WRITS, COMMISSIONS, OFFICIAL BONDS—INDICTMENTS

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, "Against the peace and dignity of the State."

## ARTICLE III

## BILL OF RIGHTS

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

## MAGISTRATES SERVANTS OF PEOPLE

2. All power is vested in and consequently derived from, the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

## RIGHTS RESERVED TO PEOPLE

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms that is the best, which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such a manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

## WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS

4. The privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, *ex-post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

## EXCESSIVE BAIL NOT REQUIRED

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offence. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

## UNREASONABLE SEARCH AND SEIZURES PROHIBITED

6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

## FREEDOM OF SPEECH AND PRESS GUARANTEED

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

## RELATING TO CIVIL SUITS FOR LIBEL

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

## PRIVATE PROPERTY, HOW TAKEN

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporations, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: *Provided*, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

## SAFEGUARDS FOR LIFE, LIBERTY AND PROPERTY

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

## POLITICAL TESTS CONDEMNED

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves of their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law, of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

## MILITARY SUBORDINATE TO CIVIL POWER

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

## RIGHT OF JURY TRIAL

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interests and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 182, and adopted at the next election. Prior to being amended the section read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law."]

## TRIALS OF CRIMES—PROVISIONS IN INTEREST OF ACCUSED

14. Trials of crimes, and misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the

character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GUARANTEED

15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contract as he shall please.

RIGHT OF PUBLIC ASSEMBLY HELD INVIOULATE

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

COURTS OPEN TO ALL—JUSTICE ADMINISTERED SPEEDILY

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

CONVICTION NOT TO WORK CORRUPTION OF BLOOD OR FORFEITURE

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

HEREDITARY EMOLUMENTS, ETC., PROVIDED AGAINST

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

PRESERVATION OF FREE GOVERNMENT

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

ARTICLE IV

ELECTIONS AND OFFICERS

1. The male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

MODE OF VOTING BY BALLOT

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

\*Stricken out by adoption of Federal female suffrage amendment.

### VOTER NOT SUBJECT TO ARREST ON CIVIL PROCESS

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as sutor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads; or, except in time of war or public danger, to render military service.

### PERSONS ENTITLED TO HOLD OFFICE—AGE REQUIREMENTS

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any State, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

### OATH OR AFFIRMATION TO SUPPORT THE CONSTITUTION

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

### PROVISIONS FOR REMOVAL OF OFFICIALS

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general laws, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

### GENERAL ELECTIONS, WHEN HELD—TERMS OF OFFICIALS

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments, in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, Acts 1883, p. 137, and ratified at the next election. The original section provided that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of State officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. As a consequential amendment the term of office of members of the Legislature was made to begin on the first day of December instead of the first day of November, as in the original article.]

### FURTHER PROVISIONS REGARDING STATE'S OFFICERS AND AGENTS

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

## IMPEACHMENT OF OFFICIALS

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment, shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

## FIGHTING OF DUELS PROHIBITED

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in, or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

## SAFEGUARDS FOR BALLOTS

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot.

## REGISTRATION LAWS PROVIDED FOR

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 472, and adopted at the next election. The original section read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election, because his name is not, or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."]

## ARTICLE V

## DIVISION OF POWERS

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

## ARTICLE VI

## LEGISLATURE

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

## COMPOSITION OF SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty, and the House of Delegates of ninety-four members.]

## SENATORS AND DELEGATES—TERMS OF OFFICE

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected, shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one-half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

## DIVISION OF STATE INTO SENATORIAL DISTRICTS

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial Districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

[There are now fifteen senatorial districts, as provided by Acts 1901, Ch. 101.]

## SENATORIAL DISTRICTS DESIGNATED

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy Grant, and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1901 (Acts 1901, ch. 10), the number of Senatorial Districts was increased to fifteen, the number of Senators to thirty, and the counties re-arranged into districts.]

## PROVISION FOR DELEGATE REPRESENTATION

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three-fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall, at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a Delegate District.

[By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. Since the general election of 1916, the House of Delegates consists of ninety-four members, each county having at least one member. See Ch. 30, p. 270, Acts 1915, Regular Session.]

## AFTER CENSUS, DELEGATE APPORTIONMENT

7. After every census the Delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every Delegate District, and of every county not included in a delegate district, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate



District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District and county not included in a Delegate District, shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

#### DESIGNATION OF DELEGATE DISTRICTS

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now no delegate districts, each county having at least one member.]

#### FURTHER APPORTIONMENTS

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three delegates.

To Ohio County, four delegates.

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment. Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has eight delegates.]

#### ARRANGEMENT OF SENATORIAL AND DELEGATE DISTRICTS

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

#### ADDITIONAL TERRITORY MAY BE ADMITTED INTO STATE

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

#### SENATORS AND DELEGATES REQUIRED TO BE RESIDENT OF DISTRICTS

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or county from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

#### ELIGIBILITY TO SEAT IN LEGISLATURE

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

**BRIBERY CONVICTION FORFEITS ELIGIBILITY**

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

**SENATORS AND DELEGATES NOT TO HOLD CIVIL OFFICE FOR PROFIT**

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

**OATH OF SENATORS AND DELEGATES**

16. Members of the Legislature, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, to wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

**MEMBERS OF LEGISLATURE PRIVILEGED FROM CIVIL ARREST**

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

**TIME OF ASSEMBLY OF LEGISLATURE**

18. The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government, biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1876, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.

**CONVENING OF LEGISLATURE BY GOVERNOR**

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three-fifths of the members elected to each house.

## SEAT OF GOVERNMENT

20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

## PROVISIONS FOR ASSEMBLING OF LEGISLATURE OTHER THAN AT THE SEAT OF GOVERNMENT

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

## \*LENGTH OF LEGISLATIVE SESSION

22. All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

## CONCERNING ADJOURNMENT

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

## RULES GOVERNING LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and have taken his seat.

## AUTHORITY TO PUNISH MEMBERS

25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offence.

\*[This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House."]

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, (Acts 1919, p. 498), at the general election in November, 1920, it was amended to read: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days, from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular sessions shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house."

Under Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts 1927, page 350, at the general election in November, 1928, this section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment (1928): For ratification 275,374; against ratification 85,123; majority, 190,251.]

**PROVISIONS FOR UNDISTURBED TRANSACTION OF BUSINESS**

26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety, and the undisturbed transactions of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

**ACCOUNTING FOR STATE MONIES**

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is or shall be to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

**ORIGINATION OF BILLS**

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

**REQUIREMENT FOR READING OF BILLS**

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: *Provided*, In all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

**ACTS TO EMBRACE BUT ONE OBJECT—TIME OF EFFECT**

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under the Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

**HOW BILLS MAY BE AMENDED**

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one House, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journals; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

**"MAJORITY" DEFINED**

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either house of the Legislature," or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS

33. \*The members of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of five hundred dollars per annum and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate, shall each receive an additional compensation of two dollars per day for each day they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever.

[\*The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by joint resolution of January 13, 1919, Acts 1919 p. 456, and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. The only change made in section 33 was to strike out the words "four dollars per day" and insert "five hundred dollars per annum."]

DISTRIBUTION OF LAWS AND JOURNALS PROVIDED FOR—CONTRACTS FOR PRINTING

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

STATE NOT TO BE MADE DEFENDANT IN ANY COURT

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity.

LOTTERIES PROHIBITED

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

TERMS OF OFFICE NOT TO BE EXTENDED AFTER ELECTION

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

SALARIES OF OFFICIALS CANNOT BE INCREASED DURING OFFICIAL TERM

38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due the State: *Provided*, The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

LOCAL LAWS NOT TO BE PASSED IN ENUMERATED CASES

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

Granting divorces;

Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;

Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;

Locating, or changing county seats;  
 Regulating or changing county or district affairs;  
 Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;  
 Regulating the practice in courts of justice;  
 Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;  
 Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;  
 The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting;  
 The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;  
 Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;  
 Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;  
 Changing the law of descent;  
 Regulating the rate of interest;  
 Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;  
 Releasing taxes; releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

#### LIMITING POWERS OF COURT OR JUDGE

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

#### EACH HOUSE TO KEEP JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one-tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

#### APPROPRIATION BILLS TO BE SPECIFIC

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

#### BOARD OR COURT OF REGISTRATION OF VOTERS PROHIBITED

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

#### ELECTION OF LEGISLATIVE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be *visu voce*, and be entered on its journals.

#### BRIBERY AND ATTEMPT TO BRIBE--PUNISHMENT

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or failing to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold

as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses: *Provided*, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

#### MANUFACTURE AND SALE OF LIQUOR PROHIBITED—EXCEPTIONS

46. On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: *Provided, however*, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, securities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Laws may be passed regulating or prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State." The amendment as above set forth was proposed by Senate joint resolution No. 6 adopted February 9, 1911, Acts 1911, p. 289, (see also Acts 1911, ch. 15), and was adopted at the general election in 1912.]

#### INCORPORATION OF RELIGIOUS DENOMINATIONS PROHIBITED

47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

#### HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. *Provided*, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and *Provided, further*, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

#### PROPERTY OF MARRIED WOMEN

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

#### PLAN OF PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

#### THE BUDGET SYSTEM

51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

## SUB-SECTION A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

## SUB-SECTION B

*First:* Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the sessions at which the budget is to be submitted, the board of public works, which shall consist of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of free schools and commissioner of agriculture, shall submit to the Legislature two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years. Each budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) the revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as to the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the board of public works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

*Second:* Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations; (1) for the Legislature as certified to the board of public works in the manner hereinafter provided; (2) for the executive department; (3) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

*Third:* The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations," and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The board of public works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each House the budgets and a bill for all the proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each House shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The board of public works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct and oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officer of both Houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiciary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein; *Provided, however,* That the salary or compensation of any public officers shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both houses shall be a law immediately without further action by the governor.

*Fourth:* The governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the board of public works for this purpose, shall have the



right, and when requested by either House of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

SUB-SECTION C—  
SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION BILLS

Neither House shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenues available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each house by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall be presented to the governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of section ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

SUB-SECTION D—GENERAL PROVISIONS

*First:* If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the governor may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such bill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

*Second:* The board of public works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each House, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the board of public works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The board of public works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

*Third:* The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

*Fourth:* In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratified by the people, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature,

as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

[This section—added to Article VI—was authorized to be submitted by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 adopted May 23, 1917 (Acts 1917, p. 69, ex. sess.) and was ratified by a vote of the people at the general election held on the fifth day of November, 1918, as an amendment to the Constitution known as "The Budget Amendment."]

## ARTICLE VII

### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

1. The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be, *ex-officio* Reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office, respectively, shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General, reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

### ELECTION

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 459, and adopted at the next election. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."]

### CERTIFICATION OF ELECTION RETURNS—CONTESTS

3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed "to the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and ratified at the next election. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed."]

### ELIGIBILITY

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and adopted at the next election. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall be ineligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."]

## CHIEF EXECUTIVE--POWERS

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

## GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subjects to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

## EXTRAORDINARY LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

## GOVERNOR TO NOMINATE CERTAIN OFFICERS

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for; and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

## RECESS VACANCIES--HOW FILLED

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

## GOVERNOR'S POWER OF REMOVAL

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

## EXECUTIVE MAY REMIT FINES AND FORFEITURES

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

## GOVERNOR COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF MILITARY FORCES

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called in the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

## OFFICIAL BOND OF STATE OFFICERS

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

## HOW BILLS BECOME LAWS

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the House in which it originated, which House shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that House agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that House, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each House shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

## RESPECTING APPROPRIATIONS OF MONIES

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the House in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each House according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

## VACANCY IN GOVERNORSHIP, HOW FILLED

16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

## VACANCIES IN OTHER EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officer of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed,

and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and ratified at the next election. The only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line, and by substitution of the word "prescribed" for the word "provided."]

#### EXECUTIVE HEADS TO MAKE REPORTS

18. The subordinate officers of the Executive Department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

#### SALARIES OF OFFICIALS

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution adopted February 13, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 459, and ratified at the next election. This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services, a salary or twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred; the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand, and the Attorney General thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."]

### ARTICLE VIII

#### JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by joint resolution of March 6, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 175, and ratified at the next election.]

#### SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of \*four judges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

[\*The supreme court of appeals consists of five judges, by the provisions of the "Judicial Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution, and Acts 1903, ch. 19, amending and re-enacting section 1 of chapter 113 of Warth's Code of 1899.]

#### SCOPE OF JURISDICTION

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, and prohibition. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the

matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment or qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator; or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy tolls or taxes; and, also, in cases of *quo warranto*, *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *certiorari*, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has been a conviction for felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

#### BINDING AUTHORITY OF DECISIONS

4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

#### REVERSAL OR AFFIRMANCE OF JUDGEMENTS

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

#### WRIT OF ERROR, SUPERSEDEAS AND APPEAL

6. A writ of error, *supcrsedeas*, or appeal shall be allowed only by the supreme court of appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the supreme court of appeals.

#### PROVISIONS FOR FILLING SUPREME COURT VACANCIES

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the supreme court of appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

#### OFFICERS OF SUPREME COURT

8. The officers of the supreme court of appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

#### TERMS OF SUPREME COURT

9. There shall be at least two terms of the supreme court of appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

#### CIRCUIT COURTS

10. The State shall be divided into \*thirteen circuits. For the circuit hereinafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other

[\*Now twenty-four.]

circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuits in which they may respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the supreme court of appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportioned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

#### TERMS OF CIRCUIT COURT

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

#### CIRCUIT COURT JURISDICTION

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by *mandamus*, prohibition and *certiorari*. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of *habeas corpus*, *mandamus*, *quo warranto* and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or *supersedecas* may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whether supervisory, original, appellate or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

#### DIVISION OF STATE INTO CIRCUITS

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marion and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth; the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth.

[By various acts of the legislature, authorized by section 14 following, the above division has been changed and the number of circuits increased to twenty-four.]

#### RE-ARRANGEMENT OF STATE INTO CIRCUITS

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any such session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

#### SPECIAL TERMS AND JUDGES OF CIRCUIT COURTS

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit courts, where from any cause the judge shall fail to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

## SALARIES OF AND LIMITATIONS ON JUDGES

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The \*salary of a judge of the supreme court of appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: *Provided*, That Ohio county may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowance shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession of law or hold any other office, appointment or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

## HOW JUDGES MAY BE REMOVED

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodily infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two-thirds of all the members elected to each House must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each House. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

## GENERAL PROVISIONS

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

## COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly in the supreme court of appeals.

## REGARDING PARTICIPATION IN CIVIL WAR

20. No citizen of the State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable in any proceeding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgments or decrees heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

[\*Under the judicial amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts, 1901, page 462, and ratified in 1902, the salaries of the judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals were fixed by legislative enactment at ten thousand dollars per annum; however, under the provisions of section 5-C of chapter 20 of the Acts of 1932 (extraordinary session), such salaries were fixed at eight thousand dollars per annum.]



## PARTS OF COMMON LAW EFFECTIVE

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of the State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

## COUNTY COURTS

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

## TERMS OF OFFICE OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, except at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

## POWERS OF COUNTY COURTS

24. The county courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: *Provided*, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall in all cases of contest judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the regular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature under and by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in

the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

#### REMOVAL OF CAUSES

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect, together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in, tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

#### CLERK OF COUNTY COURT

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

#### DISTRICTING OF COUNTY

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

#### JURISDICTION OF A JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpsit, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest, does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend throughout their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgment of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

#### RE-FORMATION OF COUNTY COURTS

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county

voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such case all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

#### INCOMPATIBLE OFFICES

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

### ARTICLE IX

#### COUNTY ORGANIZATION

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

#### CONSTABLES, CORONERS AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

#### SHERIFFS—CONSECUTIVE TERMS PROHIBITED

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

#### MALFEASANCE AND MISFEASANCE IN OFFICE

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

#### COMMISSIONING OF OFFICERS NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

#### COMPENSATION—DEPUTIES

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

## CONSERVATORS OF THE PEACE

7. The President of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

## FORMATION OF NEW COUNTIES

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

## ARTICLE X

## TAXATION AND FINANCE

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the state, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including live stock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty per cent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty per cent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the legislature among the levying units of the state in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including live stock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the state now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property may, by law, be exempted from taxation. The

Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations."

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 10th, 1932, Acts, 1932 (extraordinary session), chapter 9, page 16, and was ratified at the general election in 1932.

#### CAPITATION TAX

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools, Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

#### RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF PUBLIC MONIES

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor; nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

#### LIMITATION ON CONTRACTION OF STATE DEBT

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State, to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

#### POWER OF TAXATION

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

#### CREDIT OF STATE NOT TO BE GRANTED IN CERTAIN CASES

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

#### DUTIES OF COUNTY AUTHORITIES IN ASSESSING TAXES

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars' valuation, except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

#### BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF COUNTIES, ETC.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be

ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: *Provided*, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

#### MUNICIPAL TAXES TO BE UNIFORM

9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

### ARTICLE XI

#### CORPORATIONS

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

#### CORPORATE LIABILITY FOR INDEBTEDNESS

2. The Stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

#### EXCLUSIVE PRIVILEGES PROHIBITED

3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any *bona fide* contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

#### RIGHTS OF STOCKHOLDERS

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

#### STREET RAILROADS

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

## BANKS

6. The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders.

## RAILROADS

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

## ROLLING STOCK CONSIDERED PERSONAL PROPERTY

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any railroad company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

## RAILROADS PUBLIC HIGHWAYS

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discriminations between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

## STATIONS TO BE ESTABLISHED

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accomodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

## COMPETING LINES—LEGISLATIVE PERMISSION

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

## RIGHT OF EMINENT DOMAIN

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

## ARTICLE XII

## EDUCATION

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

## STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF FREE SCHOOLS

2. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor: *Provided*, The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.

## COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS

3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

## EXISTING PERMANENT AND INVESTED SCHOOL FUND

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the state of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir; and of all escheated lands: the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporations; monies that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund"; *Provided*, That all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

## SUPPORT FOR FREE SCHOOLS

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

## SCHOOL DISTRICTS

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

## LEVIES FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under



such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlement with the county court; which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

#### MIXED SCHOOLS PROHIBITED

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

#### CERTAIN ACTS PROHIBITED

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law; *Provided*, That nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

#### CREATION OF INDEPENDENT FREE SCHOOL DISTRICTS

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

#### APPROPRIATION FOR STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

#### LEGISLATURE TO FOSTER GENERAL SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvements; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provisions for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

### ARTICLE XIII

#### LAND TITLES

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

#### LAND ENTRY PROHIBITED

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

#### FORFEITED LANDS

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said States at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has,

or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all State taxes charges or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865, and have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

#### WASTE AND UNAPPROPRIATED LANDS

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

#### FORMER OWNER'S PRIVILEGE

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter.

#### LAND BOOKS—TAXES

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with State tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vested in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with State tax on any part of the land, such part thereof shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

## ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENTS

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention, until, at least, one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

### HOW AMENDMENTS ARE MADE

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either House of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each House, be agreed to on its third reading, by two-thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published, at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

## Amendments to the Constitution

### THE JUDICIAL AMENDMENT

(House Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1901, p. 462. Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on this amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; Majority, 29,966.)

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

### THE IRREDUCIBLE SCHOOL FUND AMENDMENT

(House Joint Resolution No. 28, Acts 1901, p. 465. Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,694; against ratification, 24,763; Majority, 31,931.)

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of the

free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund, shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

#### THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT OF 1920

(Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1919, p. 502. Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689; against ratification, 130,569; Majority, 118,120.)

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the state, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

#### THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT OF 1928

(Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17, Acts 1927, p. 361. Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; against ratification, 92,885; Majority, 267,712.)

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing, or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

## VOTE BY COUNTIES ON CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

### 1880—1932

Since the second constitution was adopted in 1872, twenty-nine amendments have been submitted to a vote of the people, fifteen of which were adopted and fourteen rejected.

The first amendments were adopted at the general election in 1880. These were "the judicial system amendment" to Article VIII, and the amendment to Section 13, Article III, relating to trial by jury in justices' courts. The last amendment—"tax limitation"—was adopted in 1932.

1880-1884

The amendment to Article VIII, proposing a reorganization of the judicial system, was adopted at the general election in 1880.

At the same election, the amendment to Section 13, Article III, relating to trial by jury in justices' courts, was adopted.

In 1884, section 7, Article IV, was amended so as to provide that general elections should be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November instead of on "the second Tuesday in October."

The salary amendment to section 19, Article VII, providing for the payment of such salaries to officials as may be established by law, was also adopted in 1902.

The judicial amendment, ratified at the general election in 1902, provides that the Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges, who shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law.

The irreducible school fund amendment, also ratified at the general election in 1902 modifies section 4, Article XII, relating to the permanent and invested school fund.

The state prohibition law, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating malt, vinous or spirituous liquors was adopted at the general election in 1912.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS REJECTED****1888**

The amendment to section 13, Article III, submitted at the general election in 1888, relating to right of trial by jury, was rejected by a vote of 62,443 to 47,963, a majority of 14,480.

The prohibition amendment to section 46, Article VI, submitted at the general election in 1888, prohibiting forever the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors within the state, was rejected by a vote of 76,555 to 41,668, a majority of 34,887.

The legislative amendment to section 22, Article VI, submitted at the general election in 1888, providing that no session of the legislature should continue longer than sixty days without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, was rejected by a vote of 79,631 to 30,445, a majority of 49,186.

**1908**

The qualification amendment, submitted at the general election in 1908, eliminating appointive officials from the provisions of section 4, Article IV, was rejected by a vote of 40,626 to 39,162, a majority of 1,464.

The amendment to section 23, Article VIII, submitted at the general election in 1908, providing for an increase in compensation for county commissioners, was rejected by a vote of 51,445 to 31,059, a majority of 20,386.

**1910**

The qualification amendment to section 4, Article IV, submitted at the general election in 1910, providing for the appointment of female citizens to certain offices within the state, was rejected by a vote of 45,044 to 44,168, a majority of 876.

The supreme court amendment to section 2, Article VIII, submitted at the general election in 1910, increasing the number of supreme court judges to seven, was rejected by a vote of 52,578 to 36,427, a majority of 16,151.

**1916**

The county court amendment to section 23, Article VIII, submitted at the general election in 1916, providing for increase in compensation for county commissioners, was rejected by a vote of 130,023 to 80,674, a majority of 49,349.

**1926**

The budget amendment to section 51, Article VI, submitted at the general election in 1926, was rejected by a vote of 134,842 to 126,125, a majority of 8,717.

The property qualification amendment to section 1, Article X, submitted at the general election in 1926, providing for collection of taxes on money, notes, accounts receivable and bonds at a rate not to exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars actual value, was rejected by a vote of 159,653 to 111,927, a majority of 47,726.

**1930**

The amendment to sections 1 and 16, Article VII, submitted at the general election of 1930, providing for the election of a lieutenant-governor, was rejected by a vote of 172,703 to 48,781, a majority of 123,922.

The amendment to Article VIII by the addition of section 31, submitted at the general election in 1930, providing for the appointment of a probate commissioner in each county, was rejected by a vote of 173,447 to 50,674, a majority of 122,773.

The budget amendment to section 51, Article VI, submitted at the general election in 1930, was rejected by a vote of 171,464 to 50,226, a majority of 121,238.

The circuit court amendment to section 10, Article VIII, submitted at the general election in 1930, providing for the division of the state into circuits by the legislature, was rejected by a vote of 170,220 to 49,902, a majority of 120,318.

### PROHIBITION REPEAL AMENDMENT

That section forty-six of article six of the constitution of the state of West Virginia, be and the same is hereby repealed and the following inserted in lieu thereof:

Section 46. The Legislature shall, by appropriate legislation, regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this state, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

The foregoing amendment shall, if ratified, become effective on the first day of March, one thousand nine hundred thirty-five.

### CAPITATION TAX AMENDMENT

That section two, article ten of the constitution of the state be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each inhabitant of the state who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools, and the payment of such capitation tax and the presentation of a receipt therefor may be made a qualification for voting in all elections in such manner and form as the legislature may by law direct.

Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the constitution the provisions of this section shall prevail.

### LAME DUCK AMENDMENT

That section one of article seven of the constitution of the state be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, secretary of state, state superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general, who shall be, *ex-officio*, reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices, and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

### LAND BOOK ASSESSMENT AMENDMENT

That section six of article thirteen of the constitution of West Virginia be amended to read as follows:

Section 6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein, entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with state, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfeited and title vested in the state. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with state, county and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who

shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all state and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the years one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and every year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: *Provided*, That such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

## RULES OF THE SENATE

1. The President of the Senate may appoint a President *pro tempore*, who during the absence of the President shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. The President having taken the chair, and a quorum being present the journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end that any mistake may be corrected that may have been made in the entries.

2. The presiding officer of the Senate may call a member to the chair who shall exercise his functions for the time being, but no member by virtue of such appointment, shall preside for a longer period than three days.

3. The presiding officer of the Senate shall have the regulation of such parts of the Capitol and of its passages as are, or may be, set apart for the use of the Senate, its officers and committees.

4. No person except members of the House of Delegates, their Clerks, the heads of the executive departments, the Governor's private secretary, ex-members of the Legislature, Judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals, and Circuit Court Judges shall be admitted within the Senate Chamber.

### Duties of the Clerk

5. The Journal of the Senate shall be daily drawn up by the Clerk and after being examined by the President shall be read the succeeding day. It shall be printed under the supervision of the clerk and delivered to the members without delay. After the printed journal has been approved and fully marked for corrections the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith, and from the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto ten copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy weight bond paper, with blank lines at the end of each day's proceedings for the signature of the President and the Clerk, and these shall be the official Journals of the Senate. They shall be bound in flexible bindings and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the Senate of West Virginia," with designation of regular or extra session and the year. After being signed by the proper officers two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History and one with the Clerk of the House of Delegates.

6. The Clerk of the Senate shall not suffer any records or papers to be taken from the table, or out of his custody, by any person except a chairman of a committee but he may deliver any bill or paper, directed to be printed, to the printer of the Senate, or to any member of the Senate on taking his receipt for the same.

7. The Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates may interchange messages between the hours of adjournment and that of meeting on the following day, so that said message may be read immediately after the usual order of the day.

### Powers of the Senate Over its Members

8. A majority of the Senators shall be necessary to proceed to business; two members may adjourn, and three members may order a call of the Senate, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the Senate, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been twice called.

9. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund. And this rule shall apply, as well to the first convention of the Senate at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session, after the hour has arrived to which the Senate stood adjourned.

10. No Senator shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the

Committee on Privileges and Elections, and reported to the Senate, unless by order of the President of the Senate.

11. The Senate may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)

12. The Senate may punish by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 26.)

### Privileges of Members

13. Every member, when speaking, shall stand in his own place, and address the President and when he has finished, take his seat.

14. Every member within the Bar, when a question is put, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the Senate excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting must be made before the Senate divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.

15. If a member be called to order, for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the Senate for words spoken in debate, if any member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exceptions to them have been taken.

16. No member of the Senate, or other person except the Clerk and his assistants, shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called or counted.

17. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject, without leave of the Senate; nor more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

18. While the President is reporting or putting a question none shall entertain private discourse, read, stand up, walk into, out of, or across the Senate Chamber.

19. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Chair, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his views, in preference to any other member.

20. While the President is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

21. During any debate, any Senator, though he has spoken to the matter, may arise and speak to the orders of the Senate. If they be transgressed, in case the President does not; but if the President stands up at any time, he is first to be heard.

22. If any member of the Senate absent himself from the service thereof without leave, except in case of his sickness or other unavoidable cause which may prevent his attendance, the Senate may by order or resolution, direct his absence to be entered on the Journal.

23. No member of the Senate shall absent himself from its service without leave first obtained.

24. At the commencement of each session the following standing committees shall be appointed, to consist of not less than five nor more than nine members, except the Committees on Forestry and Conservation and on Public Buildings and Humane Institutions which shall each consist of not less than eleven, and not more than fifteen members, the Committee on Roads and Navigation which shall consist of seventeen members and the Committees on Judiciary and on Finance, which shall each consist of eighteen members.

And there shall also be appointed on the part of the Senate five members of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills.

25. All standing committees shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, unless otherwise directed, and the chairman of each committee shall be designated by the President of the Senate.

The chairman of each standing committee of the Senate shall cause to be kept for the purpose, a record of every meeting of such committee, wherein shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each committee meeting, and every hearing had before the committee.
- (b) The attendance of members of the committee at each meeting thereof.
- (c) The name of any person appearing before the committee, and the interest represented by him.

Any member of such standing committee may cause a notation to be made upon the record aforesaid of the reason for his absence at any former meeting of the committee; and in the absence of any such explanatory note, the presumption shall be that his absence was without reasonable cause.

All meetings of the committee, other than executive sessions, shall be open to the public.

On the adjournment of each session of the Legislature, the chairman of the respective committees shall deliver to the Clerk of the Senate the record book herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of such Clerk to preserve the same among the archives of his office.

26. Select committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members unless the Senate shall direct otherwise.

27. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall report in all cases of privileges and contested elections, the principles and reasons on which their resolutions are founded.

28. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall examine the oaths taken by each member, and the evidence of their election, and report to the Senate.

29. The Committee to Examine the Clerk's Office shall see that all papers belonging thereto are properly filed, labeled and put away in the presses, and the books belonging to the office are chronologically arranged, and shall make report thereof to the Senate at each session.

### Committee of the Whole

30. When the Senate shall resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the chair and appoint a chairman to preside in the Committee.

31. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the Senate. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in the Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the Senate, except so far as reported to the Senate by the chairman of the committee.

### Order of Business

32. The first two hours of each daily session of the Senate after the sixth order of business, to-wit: The consideration of unfinished business of the preceding day and resolutions lying over from the previous day, shall be called the "afternoon hour," and shall be devoted to the consideration of the business then on the calendar, unless the Senate, by a two-thirds vote of all the members present, suspend this rule.

- I. To read the Journal.
- II. To dispose of Communications from the House of Delegates and the Executive.
- III. To receive reports from Standing Committees.
- IV. To receive reports from Select Committees.
- V. To receive bills, resolutions, motions and petitions.
- VI. To act upon unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, and no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
- VII. Senate and House Bills on third reading.
- VIII. Senate and House Bills on second reading.
- IX. Senate and House Bills on first reading.

33. All bills originating in the Senate shall be read on three separate days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays, on each bill, this rule be dispensed with.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

34. In the title of all bills to amend chapters or sections of the Code, or acts passed since the Code was adopted, the several committees to whom they are referred, or by whom they originated, shall insert the subject matter of the chapter.

35. All engrossed bills shall be fully and distinctly read when put upon their passage.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

36. All bills or business originating in the Senate, shall be considered in the order in which they are introduced and all bills and resolutions received from the House of Delegates shall be introduced in the order in which they are received, unless in either case the Senate otherwise directs.

37. All joint resolutions and all other resolutions, except those requiring a committee to inquire and report, shall lie on the table one day at least, after they are introduced.

38. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 42.)

40. All bills reported from the House of Delegates shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading. All bills introduced on leave shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry, and if the committee report a bill different from the one introduced such bill shall be received and treated by the senate as the original bill, and shall be read a first time and printed, unless in any of the aforesaid cases the Senate shall direct otherwise.

41. Before reading each bill the Clerk shall state whether it is the first, second or third reading of the bill.

42. On the demand of any two members when a bill is being read for amendment, it shall be read section by section, and when the amendments which may

be moved shall be disposed of, the question, unless the Senate otherwise order, shall be taken on ordering the bill to be engrossed and read the third time. If a bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments thereto have been made, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform to the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted, and shall be the engrossed bill. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill. All Senate bills so ordered shall be jacketed, endorsed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the House and returned to the Senate without amendments, or if amended, and the amendments should be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a House bill on second reading if the same be amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full in typewriting on slips of paper, and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the House, and all amendments shall appear in the Senate Journal.

43. When a bill or resolution of the House of Delegates is passed or rejected by the Senate, the fact of its passage or rejection, with the bill or resolution, shall be communicated to the House of Delegates.

### Petitions

44. No petition of a private nature, having been once rejected, shall be acted on a second time, unless it be supported by new evidence, nor shall any such petition, after a third rejection, be again acted upon.

45. No petition shall be received claiming a sum of money or praying the settlement of unliquidated accounts, unless it be accompanied with a certificate of disallowance from the Executive or Auditor, containing the reason why it was rejected. But this order shall extend to no person applying for a pension.

46. When any petition, or bill founded on one, is rejected, such petition shall not be withdrawn, but the petitioner or member presenting the petition, or any member from the county or corporation in which the petitioner resides, may, with leave, withdraw any document filed therewith, and a list of all the documents so withdrawn shall be preserved by the Clerk. All petitions not finally acted on may, with the accompanying documents, be in like manner withdrawn after the expiration of the session at which they were presented.

47. No petition shall be read in the Senate unless particularly required by some member, but every member presenting one shall announce the name of the petitioner and the nature of the application, and that, in his opinion, no similar application had been previously made by the same petitioner. He shall also endorse on the back of his petition his own name, as a pledge that it is drawn in respectful language, whereupon it shall be delivered to the Clerk, by whom it shall be laid before the proper committee.

### Messages

48. Messages may be introduced in any stage of business except when a question is being put by the presiding officer, while the yeas and nays are being called by the Clerk, or while the ballots are being counted.

### Motions

49. When a bill or joint resolution is put upon its passage, the President shall propound the question, "Shall the bill (or joint resolution as the case may be) pass?" On the passage of every bill or joint resolution the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and be entered on the Journal. When the bill is on a second reading, and the question is upon striking out, the President shall propound the question: "Shall these words be stricken out?"

50. When the question is pending, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, for the previous question, to lie on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to adjourn the question to a different day, to commit or amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.

51. On the first reading of a bill, no motion shall be in order except to reject the bill, and if the committee shall have reported adversely to the bill, the President, immediately after its first reading, shall propound the question: "Shall the bill be rejected?" When the Senate refuses to reject the bill the question shall be: "Shall the bill be ordered to its second reading?" This question shall be duly put by the chair and acted upon by the Senate.

52. The question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the Senate, and cannot during the session be drawn again into debate unless reconsidered, and it shall be in order to reconsider any vote only within two legislative days next after the one upon which such vote was taken. A motion to reconsider shall be in order only when made by a Senator who voted with the prevailing side, and when the vote was not taken by ayes and nays all Senators will be conclusively presumed to have voted with the prevailing side.

53. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question in reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

### Division of the Question

54. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided; but on motion to strike out and insert, it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question, but the rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition; nor prevent a subsequent motion to simply strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

55. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

### Previous Question

56. There shall be a motion for the previous question, which being ordered by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been asked and ordered. The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions or may be made to embrace and authorize motions and amendments and include the bill to its engrossment and third reading and then, on renewal and second of said motion, to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order pending a motion for or after the previous question shall have been ordered on its passage, for the President to entertain and submit a motion to commit with or without instructions to a standing or select committee; and a motion to lay upon the table shall be in order on the second and third reading of a bill.

A call of the Senate shall not be in order after the previous question is ordered, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a quorum is not present.

All incidental questions or orders arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether an appeal or otherwise, without debate.

### Yeas and Nays

57. When the yeas and nays are ordered, or a call of the Senate is directed, the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order.

58. The yeas and nays on any question shall, at the desire of one-tenth of the members present, be entered on the Journal and any member may enter any protest on the Journal upon the determination of any question. After the yeas and nays shall have been taken, and before they are counted or entered on the Journal, the Clerk shall read over the names of those who voted in the affirmative and those who voted in the negative, at which time any member shall have the right to correct any mistake committed in enrolling his name.

59. When a bill or joint resolution passed by the Senate shall be amended by the House of Delegates, the question on agreeing to the bill or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on by yeas and nays in the Senate, and



the result entered upon its Journal. In all such cases the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)

60. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)

61. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote shall be *viva voce*, and be entered upon the Journal.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 44.)

### Executive Session

62. When nominations shall be made in writing by the Governor to the Senate, a future day shall be assigned, unless the Senate unanimously direct otherwise, for taking them into consideration.

63. When acting on the nominations of the Governor, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Clerk, his assistants, the Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper, and all such officers shall be sworn to secrecy.

64. All confidential communications made by the Governor to the Senate and all proceedings thereon, shall be by the members thereof kept secret until the Senate shall, by unanimous affirmative vote of the members present, remove the injunction of secrecy.

65. All information and remarks touching the character or qualification of any person nominated by the Governor to office, shall be kept secret. The Legislative proceedings and the executive proceedings of the Senate shall be kept and recorded in separate books.

### Constitutional Amendment

66. When an amendment to be proposed to the Constitution is under consideration, the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate shall not be requisite to decide any question for amendments, or extending to the merits, being short of the final question.

### Adjournment

67. When the Senate adjourns each day, it shall stand adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m. the next day, unless the Senate otherwise direct.

68. When the Senate adjourns each day, every member shall keep his seat until the President leaves the chair.

### Parliamentary Practice

69. The Rules of Parliamentary Practice comprised in "A Manual of General Parliamentary Law, with Suggestions for General Rules," by Thos. B. Reed, shall govern the Senate in all cases not provided for by the rules of the Senate or in the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Delegates. In any case not governed by the said manual of said rules, the Senate shall be governed by the practice in the Congress of the United States.

70. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate present.

71. Any bill, resolution or business may, by a vote of the majority of the members present, be withdrawn from the committee to which it had been referred or be taken from the table, and placed upon the regular or special calendar of the Senate in such order of business as the Senate may direct.

## IN MEMORIAM



DR. P. D. ARBOGAST, (D), of Morgantown, member of the House of Delegates from Monongalia County, who departed this life March 31, 1934, was born at Barton, West Virginia, March 19, 1867, son of Adam and Sarah McDaniel Arbogast; graduated at University of Virginia in 1901 with degree of M. D.; married January 30, 1894, to Hodie J. Burner; Methodist; practiced his profession of physician and surgeon at Morgantown for twenty-two years; served two terms as mayor of Durbin, West Virginia; elected to the House of Delegates at the general election in 1932.

**RULES OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES**

**Absence from the House**

1. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend, but any member who conscientiously believes that the seventh day of the week ought to be observed as the Sabbath shall be excused from attending upon the House on that day.

**Adjournment**

(a) Motion to adjourn, and to fix time to which the House shall adjourn always in order.—*Rule 65.*

(b) Motion to adjourn put without debate.—*Rule 66.*

**Amendment of Rules**

(a) One day's notice required.—*Rule 66.*

**Amendments**

2. No motion on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

3. A motion to amend a pending amendment may be received, but until it is disposed of no other motion to amend will be in order. But pending such amendment, a motion to amend in the nature of a substitute, and a motion to amend that substitute, may be received, but shall not be voted upon until the original matter is perfected.

4. If a substitute for a bill or resolution be offered, a motion to amend the original bill, or resolution shall have precedence.

5. If a motion be made to strike out part of a bill or resolution, a motion to amend the part proposed to be stricken out shall have precedence.

6. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time proposed shall be first put, and the question shall be put on names in the order they were nominated.

7. No amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill after engrossment.

8. After commitment of a bill and report thereof to the House, it may be amended; but the amendments (if any) reported by the committee, shall be disposed of before any other amendment is considered, unless it be an amendment to an amendment.

9. When a House bill or House joint resolution shall be amended by the Senate, the question on agreeing to the bill or resolution as amended shall be again voted on by yeas and nays, and the result entered on the Journal, and in such a case the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)

(a) When bill recommitted and amended, question shall again be put on the engrossment of the bill.—*Rule 15.*

(b) Reading of bill for amendment on second reading.—*Rule 19.*

(c) If a motion to strike out certain words be lost, it shall not preclude a motion to strike out part of the same words or a motion to amend, or strike out and insert.—*Rule 45.*

**NOTE**—Laying on the table a motion to amend the Journal, does not carry the Journal with it.

### Appeals

Debate upon, limited.—*Rule 88.*

### Ayes and Nays

May be demanded by one-tenth of members.—*Rule 96.*

### Ballots

No ballot permitted.—*Rule 48.*

### Bills

10. Bills may be introduced by any member on leave being granted, or by any standing committee of the House at any time during the session of the Legislature, in conformity with the order of business regulating the procedure of the House.

11. All bills introduced by motion for leave shall be referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and all such bills shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry. If the committee report a bill different from one so introduced, such bill shall be received and treated by the House as the original bill, but the committee report and the Journal of the House shall show the bill amendment in committee by a re-draft thereof.

12. Before any bill is read by the Clerk, he shall state to the House whether it is on first, second or third reading.

13. A bill may be recommitted at any time before its passage. Should such recommitment take place after its engrossment, and an amendment be reported and agreed to by the House, the question shall be again put on the engrossment of the bill.

14. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with. Upon any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill may be read twice or three times on the same day, and upon the first or second reading of any bill, there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill, may, upon such reading, be read by its title. *Provided*, in all cases, that there be readings on each bill, and that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

15. In the passage of a bill by the House, a motion may be made that it take effect from its passage, or at some time other than ninety days after its passage;



and if said motion be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to the House, taken by yeas and nays, the Clerk shall communicate that fact to the Senate along with the bill.--(Const., art. 6, sec. 30.)

(a) No amendment by way of rider.—*Rule 7.*

(b) Amendments after commitment.—*Rule 8.*

### Bills—First Reading

16. The first reading of a bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be, "Shall the bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, it shall be regarded as ordered to its second reading, unless the House otherwise specially direct. All bills reported from the Senate shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading.

17. On the first reading of a bill, it may at any stage of the reading be rejected on motion. If the committee to which the bill was referred shall have reported adversely to the bill, the Speaker shall, immediately after the same is reported by its title, propound the question, "Shall the bill be rejected?"

### Bills—Second Reading

18. No bill shall be put upon its second reading until the same shall have been printed and delivered to the members of the House at least one day previous to such reading, unless in cases of emergency.

19. On the second reading of a bill on the demand of any two members, it shall be read section by section for amendment, and when the amendments as may be moved are disposed of, the question, unless the House otherwise order, shall be, if a House bill, "Shall the bill be engrossed and ordered to the third reading?" If a House bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments have been made thereto, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform with the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted and shall be the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. All House bills ordered to their engrossment and third reading shall be jacketed and engrossed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the Senate and returned to the House without amendment, or if amended and the amendment or amendments be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a Senate bill on second reading, if the same be amended by the House and passed on as amended, the amendment, or amendments shall be noted in full on slips of paper in typewriting and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the Senate, and all amendments shall also appear in the House Journal.

### Clerk

20. It shall be the Clerk's duty to read to the House all papers ordered to be read; to call the roll and note and report the absentees, when a call of the House is ordered; to call the roll and note the answers of members, when a question is taken by yeas and nays; to assist, under the direction of the Speaker, in taking the count when any vote of the House is taken; to notify committees of their appointment and the business referred to them; to superintend the execution of all printing ordered by the House, and to report to the Speaker, to be submitted to the House, every failure of the printer to execute the same properly and promptly.

21. The Clerk shall have the custody of all records and papers of the House, and shall not allow them to be taken from the table or out of his possession without the leave of the House, unless to be delivered to committees to whom they may have been referred. He shall endorse on bills and papers brief notes of proceedings had thereon by the House and preserve the same in convenient files for reference.

### Committee of the Whole

22. When the House shall resolve to go into the Committee of the Whole the Speaker shall leave his chair and appoint a Chairman to preside in the Committee.

23. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the House. The rules of the House shall be observed by the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rules limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the House except so far as reported to the House by the Chairman of the Committee.

### Committees

24. The following standing committees, to be appointed at the commencement of each session, shall consist of not less than five nor more than fifteen members, except the Committee on Taxation and Finance, which shall consist of twenty-one members, and the Committee on Roads, which shall consist of seventeen members, namely:

- On Elections and Privileges.
- On the Judiciary.
- On Federal Relations.
- On Taxation and Finance.
- On Military Affairs.
- On Prohibition and Temperance.
- On Education.
- On Counties, Districts and Municipal Corporations.
- On Banks and Corporations.
- On Roads.
- On Forfeited and Unappropriated Lands.
- On Claims and Grievances.
- On Humane Institutions and Public Buildings.
- On Printing and Contingent Expenses.
- On the Executive Offices and Library.
- On Forestry and Conservation.
- On Arts, Science and General Improvements.
- On the Penitentiary.
- On Mines and Mining.
- On Agriculture.
- On State Boundaries.
- On Railroads.
- On Labor.
- On Medicine and Sanitation.
- On Game and Fish.
- On Insurance.
- On Rules.
- On Redistricting.

25. The Committee on Elections and Privileges shall examine and report upon all the certificates, and other evidences referred to them, touching the right of persons claiming to have been elected members of this House, or to any office for the State at large; and also upon other petitions and matters touching elections and returns, or relating to the privileges of members and officers of the House, or witnesses attending the House or any committee thereof, as shall be referred to them.

26. The Committee on Taxation and Finance, shall, as soon as possible, after the commencement of the regular session, report the general tax and appropriation bill with an estimate of the probable revenue and expenditures of the two years, and of the public debt. They shall from time to time report such measures for equalizing and reducing taxation, supplying revenue and facilitating the collection thereof, reducing the public expenditure, and providing

for the principal and interest of the public debt as may seem to them expedient; and they shall further examine into and report upon all matters and propositions relating to taxation and finance as shall be referred to them by the House.

All motions directing payment of money to be referred to Committee on Taxation and Finance.—*Rule 68.*

27. All claims against the State, which may be presented to the House, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims and Grievances, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

28. The Committee on Executive Offices and Library shall examine the several public offices and library, and report whether their books and accounts are properly kept; whether the public money has been disbursed according to law; and diligence used in the collection of revenue; and whether the money received is properly accounted for. They shall report from time to time such measures as may seem to them necessary to add to the economy of the executive offices and the accountability of their officers.

29. Every committee, by a majority of their number, may elect a chairman, but if no such election be made, the first named member of the committee, if it be appointed by the Speaker, shall act as chairman.

30. Every committee shall meet at such time as they may appoint, or on the call of the chairman or any two of its members.

31. The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. All committees shall submit their reports to the House in writing.

32. No committee shall sit without special leave while the House is in session.

33. Special committees shall consist of five members, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

34. A majority of a committee shall be a quorum thereof.

35. The Speaker shall name the members who are to serve upon committees, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

### Debate

36. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Speaker, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his view in preference to any other member.

37. When a member is about to speak to debate, or deliver any matter to the House he shall first rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid all personalities and indecorous or disrespectful language.

38. When a member arises and addresses the Chair, the Speaker shall recognize him by name; but no member in debate shall designate another by name.

39. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the person to speak; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.

40. No one shall disturb or interrupt a member who is speaking, without his permission, except to call to order if he be transgressing the rules.

41. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the House.

42. When the Speaker is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter, may speak to the question before the negative is put.

### Division of House

43. When the question is put and the Speaker shall have doubt as to the result of the vote, or a division be called for, the House shall divide, and those in the affirmative of the question shall rise from their seats and remain standing until they are counted, and afterwards those in the negative. The count may be made by the Speaker, or if he so desires, by the Clerk, or two members, one from each side, to be named for that purpose by the Speaker. When the result is ascertained the Speaker shall rise and state the decision of the House. Any member may call for a division.—*Rule 97.*

### Division of Question

44. Any member may call for a division of any question pending, before the vote thereon is taken, if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition will remain for the decision of the House, but the member calling for the division of a question shall state in what manner he proposes it shall be divided.

45. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed divisible, and though a motion to strike out be lost, it shall not preclude a motion to strike out part of the same words or a motion to amend or to strike out and insert.

### Doorkeeper

46. The doorkeeper shall attend the House while in session, and under the direction of the Speaker execute the orders of the House respecting the admission and the exclusion of persons from the Hall. He shall, when required by the Speaker, aid in the enforcement of order.

### Election of Officers

47. The House, at the commencement of each session, shall elect its Speaker, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper.

48. In the election of officers by the House, the vote shall be given *viva voce*, and a majority of the whole number of votes given shall be necessary to elect. If, upon any vote there be no election, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped, and any votes thereafter given to such person shall not be taken into the counting to affect the result in any way. But if two or more have the lowest and equal number of votes they may be voted for again. No question before the House, or in committee of the whole, shall be voted on by ballot.

### Floor

Who entitled to privilege of.—*Rule 72.*

### Indefinite Postponement

49. When a question is postponed indefinitely, the same shall not be acted on again during the session.

50. The Janitor, under the direction of the Speaker, shall have care of the Hall and committee rooms of the House, and keep the same, at all times, in a neat and proper condition.

### Journal

51. The Clerk of the House, under the direction of the Speaker, shall keep a full and correct Journal of the proceedings; and it shall be the duty of the Speaker to examine the Journal daily before it is read and cause all errors and omissions therein to be corrected.

52. When the Journal has been read to the end that any mistake made in the entry may be corrected, if no objection is made, it shall stand approved, but if objections be made the first question of the House shall be to dispose of the same, and when such objections are disposed of and the Journal corrected, as the House may order, it shall stand as approved. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for correction, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith. From the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto six copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy weight bond paper, with blank lines at the end of each day's proceedings for the signatures of the Speaker and Clerk, and these shall be the official Journal of the House. They shall be bound in flexible binding, and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the House of Delegates of West Virginia," with designation of regular or special session, as the case may be, and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the Senate.

53. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to furnish a copy of each day's proceedings of the Journal to the printer, to be printed and distributed without delay.

54. Every written motion made to the House shall be inserted in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn on the same day it is submitted.

#### Lie on the Table

- (a) Motion to lie on the table not debatable.—*Rule 66.*
- (b) When a resolution is presented containing no reference of subject to committee it shall lie on the table for one day.—*Rule 67.*
- (c) When motion to take from table in order.—*Rule 76.*

#### Manual and Rules

55. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "A Manual of General Parliamentary Law with Suggestion for General Rules" by Thomas B. Reed, shall govern the House of Delegates in all cases not provided for by the Rules of the House, or in the joint rules of the House and Senate. In any case not governed by said rules or Manual, the House shall be governed by the practice in the House of Representatives of the United States.

56. No standing rule or order of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, unless the same is reported by the Committee on Rules when either may be done by a majority vote of the members present.

#### Meeting of the House

57. The House, unless it shall be otherwise directed by special order, shall meet every day, except Sunday, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

58. There shall be appointed by the Speaker an Official Chaplain of the House whose duty it shall be to be present at the convening of each day's session for the purpose of opening the House with prayer. His compensation shall be fixed by the Committee on Taxation and Finance.

#### Messages

59. The Speaker shall take the chair and call the House to order precisely at the hour of meeting, and, if a quorum be present, cause the Journal of the preceding day to be read.

60. When a message from the Executive or the Senate is announced, other business shall be suspended until it is received, unless the House be at the time actually engaged in taking a vote on some question, in which case it shall be received as soon as the result of the vote is announced. When received, it shall lie on the table to be disposed of in its turn, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

#### Motions and Resolutions

61. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a specific day, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely, which motions shall severally have precedence in the order in which they are here arranged.

62. When a motion is made it shall be stated by the Speaker, or being in writing, shall be handed to the Chair, and read aloud by the Clerk, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the House; it may be withdrawn by the mover before any order of the House respecting the same has been made.

63. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any member desires it.

64. When a motion is made to commit any subject to a special committee, a motion to commit the same to the Committee of the Whole, or a standing committee, shall have precedence.

65. A motion to adjourn, and a motion to fix the time to which the House shall adjourn, shall always be in order if the mover be entitled to the floor.

66. The motion to adjourn and to lie on the table shall be put without debate.

67. When a resolution is presented, containing no reference of the subject thereof to a committee, it shall lie on the table for one day, to come up under the eighth order of business, unless a majority of the House order otherwise.

68. Every motion or resolution directing the appropriation or payment of money shall, unless otherwise ordered by the House, be referred without debate, to the Committee on Taxation and Finance.

### Oaths

69. The Speaker or Clerk shall have authority to administer any oaths required by the business of the House.

### Resolutions Lying Over

Resolutions, not of inquiry, shall lie over one day.—*Rule 67.*

### Order and Decorum

70. While the Speaker is putting any question, or ascertaining the result, no one shall walk out of or across the House, nor when a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.

71. If a member speaking or otherwise transgress the rules of the House, the Speaker, shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed, if any member object, without leave of the House, and if the case require it, shall be liable to the censure of the House.

72. No member or other person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called; and no person, except members, ex-members and officers of the Judiciary, shall be admitted upon the floor of the House, except by permission of the Speaker.

73. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table. And no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the exception to them was taken.

Speaker to preserve order.—*Rule 87.*

### Order of Business

74. The order of business for each day shall be:

- I. To read, correct and approve the Journal.
- II. To receive and consider reports of standing committees.
- III. To receive and consider reports of select committees.
- IV. To receive and consider messages from the Executive.
- V. To receive messages from the Senate, and consider amendments, proposed by the Senate, to bills passed by the House.
- VI. To receive resolutions and petitions.
- VII. Bills introduced on motion for leave and referred to appropriate committees.
- VIII. To act on unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, but no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
- IX. House and Senate Bills on third reading.
- X. House and Senate Bills on second reading.
- XI. House and Senate Bills on first reading.
- XII. The order of the day, unless a subject was made the order of the day for a particular hour, in which case it may be called for by any member when the hour arrives.
- XIII. Miscellaneous Business.

75. All questions relating to priority of business shall be decided without debate.

76. A bill or resolution laid on the table may be taken up by a vote of the House at any time after the seventh order of business is disposed of.

### Petitions

77. The member who presents a petition or memorial, or offers a resolution on which a vote of the House is taken, shall be named in the Journal.

### Previous Question

78. If the previous question be demanded by not less than seven members, the Speaker shall without debate, put the question, "Shall the main question be now put?" If this question be decided in the affirmative by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, all further debate shall cease and the vote be at once taken on the proposition pending before the House. When the House refuses to order the main question, the consideration of the subject shall be resumed as if the previous question had not been demanded.

79. The previous question shall not be admitted in the Committee of the Whole.

### Printing Documents

80. Documents printed by order of the House shall be printed in pages of the same size as those of the Journal; and a copy of every such document, bound up with one Journal, shall be furnished by the printer to each member of the House at the close of the session, or as soon as possible thereafter; and twenty additional copies bound as aforesaid, shall be delivered to the Clerk of the House, to be distributed as the House may order.

Printing of bills before second reading.—*Rule 18.*

### Reconsideration

81. A question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the House and cannot again be drawn into debate during the same session, unless reconsidered. But it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding legislative day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such a motion, if seconded, shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, and shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House; and if the House decides to reconsider, any member may thereafter call the subject up for consideration.

82. When a majority of members present vote in the affirmative on any question, but the question be lost because it is one in which the concurrence of a greater number than a majority of a quorum is necessary to an affirmative decision, any member may move for a reconsideration.

### Resolutions

See "Motions and Resolutions."

### Rules

See "Manual and Rules," and Rules 55 and 56.

### Sergeant-at-Arms

83. The Sergeant-at-Arms shall give bond, with surety, in the penalty of two thousand dollars, payable to the State of West Virginia, and conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of his office; such bond to be approved by the Speaker and filed with the Clerk of the House for safe keeping.

84. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the House while in session; to aid in the enforcement of order, under the direction of the Speaker; to execute the commands of the House, from time to time, together

with all such process issued under its authority as may be directed to him by the Speaker.

85. The Sergeant-at-Arms, under the direction of the Speaker, shall superintend the distribution by the pages of all documents and papers to be distributed to the members.

86. It shall also be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to keep the accounts for pay and mileage of members, officers and attaches, to prepare and sign warrants or requisitions for the same, and if required by any member, who shall endorse his warrant or requisition for that purpose, to draw the money thereon and pay over the same to the member entitled thereto.

### Speaker

87. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to preserve order and decorum while the House is in session; to enforce the rules and orders of the House, to prescribe the order in which business shall come up for consideration, subject to the rules and orders of the House; to announce the question of business before the House when properly requested by any member; to receive all messages and other communications; to put to vote all questions which are properly moved; to announce the result of all votes and to authenticate, when necessary, the acts and proceedings of the House.

88. The Speaker shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House. He may speak to questions of order in preference to other members, and may make the concluding speech on any appeal from his decision, notwithstanding he may have before spoken on the question; but no other member shall speak more than once on such appeal without leave of the House.

89. When properly requested by a member, he shall inform the House upon any point of order or practice pertinent to the business before it.

90. If there be any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the Speaker or Chairman of the Committee of the Whole may order the same to be cleared.

91. The Speaker, subject to the orders of the House, may assign convenient seats within the bar to stenographers and reporters wishing to take down the proceedings.

92. The Speaker may name any member to perform the duties of the Chair, but no one by virtue of such appointment, shall act as Speaker for more than three days.

93. If the Speaker be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the House, it shall be called to order by the Clerk, and a Speaker *pro tem* appointed by the House.

94. The Speaker shall, as soon as practical after his election, appoint for the House such number of Committee Clerks, Floor Pages, Journal Pages and other attaches as the House may by resolution direct, and may at his discretion, remove any person so appointed and appoint another in his stead. He may also appoint, without resolution, a Private Secretary, and a stenographer to himself.

The Clerk of the House in addition to the Assistant Clerks, provided for by section 18 of chapter 12 of the Code, may appoint a stenographer to himself, and such other assistants as the House may by resolution direct and shall have power at any time to remove such appointees from office and appoint others in their stead at his discretion.

All resolutions relating to the appointment of persons mentioned in this section, or prescribing the salary or pay of such persons, shall originate in and come from the Committee on Rules.

95. The Speaker may, from time to time, designate such times as he may deem necessary for the consideration of bills of a local nature, and such bills shall be placed on a special calendar.

### Voting

96. On the passage of every bill, and joint resolution, and when the yeas and nays on any question are called for by one-tenth of those present, the Speaker shall direct the roll to be called, and every member shall answer aye or no, when his name is called. Before the result is announced the Clerk shall read to the



House the names of those who voted in the affirmative, and then those who voted in the negative, at which time any member may correct a mistake committed in taking down his vote. The result shall then be announced, and the yeas and nays entered on the Journal, but if the House so orders, the announcement of the result and the entry of the yeas and nays entered upon the Journal may be postponed to the succeeding day, with liberty to absent members at any time before the result is announced by the Speaker, to appear and vote aye or no, in the presence of the House; and any member may, in the presence of the House, change his vote before the result is announced.

97. Upon calls of the House, in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the members, shall be called alphabetically.

98. Every question shall be first put in the affirmative and then in the negative; each member present shall vote on every question, and the Speaker shall declare whether the yeas or nays have it, which declaration shall stand as the judgment of the House, unless a member call for a division, in which event the Speaker shall divide the House.

99. Every member within the bar, when a question is put, shall vote, unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the House excuses him. A motion to excuse a member from voting must be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.

100. No member shall vote on any question in the result of which he is immediately and particularly interested; and, except in the case provided for in the ninety-sixth rule, no member shall vote if he was not within the bar when the question was put, unless leave be given him by the House.

(a) Voting for officers.—*Rule 48.*

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## JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

### Messages Between the Houses

1. When a message is sent by one house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the Doorkeeper thereof, if it be in session, and then be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person by whom it may be sent, but no message shall be received during a call of the roll. But the Clerk of one house may communicate a message to the Clerk of the other after adjournment, and any message so sent shall be received by the house to which it is sent whenever it may be in session.

### Introduction of Bills

2. No bill, other than an appropriation bill, shall be introduced in either House after the fiftieth day of the session unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill, and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each House present and voting.

### Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills

3. After a bill has been passed by both houses, the type from which it was originally printed shall be corrected as to any typographical errors that may not theretofore have been corrected and to meet any amendments that may have been made by either house since the last printing of the bill, and after the type has been so corrected fifty copies of the bill shall be printed (except charter bills, of which only twenty-five of each bill shall be printed), on eight by ten heavy bond paper for the use of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, one of which copies, when properly authenticated, shall become the Enrolled Bill. The Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the presiding

officer of each house, whose duty it shall be to compare carefully all bills and joint resolutions passed by both houses, with the enrollment thereof, and to correct any errors or omissions they may discover and to make report to their respective houses each day of the correctly enrolled bills or joint resolutions. They shall be authenticated by the signature of the chairman of the House Committee and the chairman of the Senate Committee, composing such Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, but in the absence of such chairman another member of the committee may act in his stead, and they shall require all bills and joint resolutions before such authentication to be free from interlineations or erasures and destroy any previous enrollment containing any interlineations or erasures. After enrolled bills and joint resolutions are authenticated as aforesaid, they shall be signed by the Speaker of the House and by the President of the Senate.

### Bills and Joint Resolutions

4. It shall be in order for the Committee on Enrolled Bills to report at any time.

5. After a bill shall have thus been signed in each house, it shall be presented by the said committee to the Governor, for his approbation (it being first endorsed on the back of the roll, certifying in which house the same originated, which endorsement shall be signed by the clerk of the house in which the same originated and the date it takes effect, which endorsement shall be signed by the Clerk of the House of Delegates), and shall be entered on the Journal of each house. The same committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor; which time shall also be carefully entered on the Journal of each house.

6. Where a bill or joint resolution, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed.

7. After each house shall have adhered to their disagreement the bill or resolution respecting which they have disagreed shall be lost.

8. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the Capitol building for refreshments and like purposes, when the Legislature is in session.—(Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts 1881.)

### Action of Governor on Bills

9. Every bill disapproved by the Governor shall be returned by him to the house in which it originated, with his objections thereto unless the Legislature shall, by its adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after said adjournment.

10. Every bill approved by the Governor shall, within five days after it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State and the fact of said approval communicated by the Governor to the house in which said bill originated.

11. Every bill which shall be neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor, shall immediately after the expiration of five days from the time it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall forthwith engross thereon a certificate to the following effect: "I certify that the foregoing act, having been presented to the Governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the legislature in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the State, has become a law without his approval," and shall date and sign the same.

12. Upon each bill returned to either house of the Legislature with the objections of the Governor, the Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates shall engross the action of their respective houses on the reconsideration and passage of said bill, and sign the same.

### Manner of Printing the Journal and Bills

13. In printing the daily Journals of the proceedings of each house there shall be printed at the top of each page, except the first, the date of the Journal and on the last page of each day's Journal shall be printed the calendar for the next day.

14. At the top of the first page of each bill, preceding the title and number thereof, there shall be printed the name of the person by whom or the committee by which it was introduced, and the date when introduced; and at the top of each page, except the first, shall be printed the number of the bill.

### Counting Votes for State Officers

15. As soon as the Senate is informed that the House of Delegates is ready to proceed, as provided by section three of article seven of the Constitution, to open and publish the returns of the elections for State officers, the Senate, preceded by their president and other officers, shall repair in a body to the hall of the House of Delegates. Upon their arrival the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Delegates, shall announce the presence of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall then address the Speaker of the House, stating that a majority of the Senate have assembled in the hall of the House of Delegates to be present at the opening and publishing of the returns of the elections for State officers, held on the.....day of..... The Speaker of the House of Delegates shall invite the President of the Senate to a seat upon his right, and the other members of the Senate and officers thereof to take seats assigned them, and after announcing that a majority of the House of Delegates is present, shall then open and publish the returns of said election, proceeding by counties in alphabetical order, the Clerks of the two houses each taking down the returns as announced by the Speaker, to be entered upon the Journal of the House; and when completed and estimated, the Speaker shall announce the votes received by each person voted for, for each of said offices, and those receiving the largest number of votes shall be by him declared duly elected; and the Senate shall then return to its hall; and if any two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the two houses shall immediately proceed to choose one of such persons for said office by a joint vote, as provided by Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution.

# LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS

## SECOND EXTRAORDINARY SESSION, 1933

(The second extraordinary session of the legislature convened November 21, 1933, and adjourned March 24, 1934. During the session, 148 bills were introduced in the Senate and 399 in the House, 176 being passed by both Senate and House. Of this number, four were vetoed by the Governor.)

### Adjudication of Validity of Indebtedness

Chapter 64, page 128, Acts (House Bill No. 274, by Mr. Hiner)—Provides for the adjudication of the validity or invalidity of indebtedness, not bonded, of counties, magisterial districts, municipalities, etc.

### Appropriations

Chap. 1, page 1, Acts (Senate Bill No. 149, by Mr. Abbot)—Legislative Appropriation Bill for second extraordinary session.

Chap. 2, page 5, Acts (Senate Bill No. 111, by Mr. Abbot)—Supplementary appropriation for current expenses of the Public Service Commission.

Chap. 3, page 6, Acts (Senate Bill No. 123, by Mr. Hodges)—Provides for the expenditure of \$250,000.00 from state road fund for the relief of destitution.

### Land Book Assessment Amendment

Chap. 72, page 193, Acts (Senate Bill No. 84, by Mr. Hodges, by request)—Submits "land book assessment amendment."

### Levies

The West Virginia state law library, consisting of law books and legal periodicals only, is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the capitol building.

The library is in charge of the state law librarian, appointed by the Supreme Court.

The books of the library consist of text-books purchased, and reports of other states as well as many foreign countries, all except text books coming in by exchange for West Virginia reports provided for by the state law librarian, as consecutive volumes of the reports of West Virginia and elsewhere are published.

The state law librarian, from West Virginia reports furnished him by the superintendent of public printing, supplies all judges of courts, state officers and some of the other law libraries of the state with copies of these reports.

The law governing the state law library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the supreme court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers, and members and officers of the legislature during the session of that body.

It is also provided that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the place where the library is kept.

The law further provides that no book or paper shall be taken from the library until the person authorized to take the same shall sign a receipt therefor in a book to be kept by the state law librarian for that purpose.

A provision is also made, that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library at the place where it is kept."

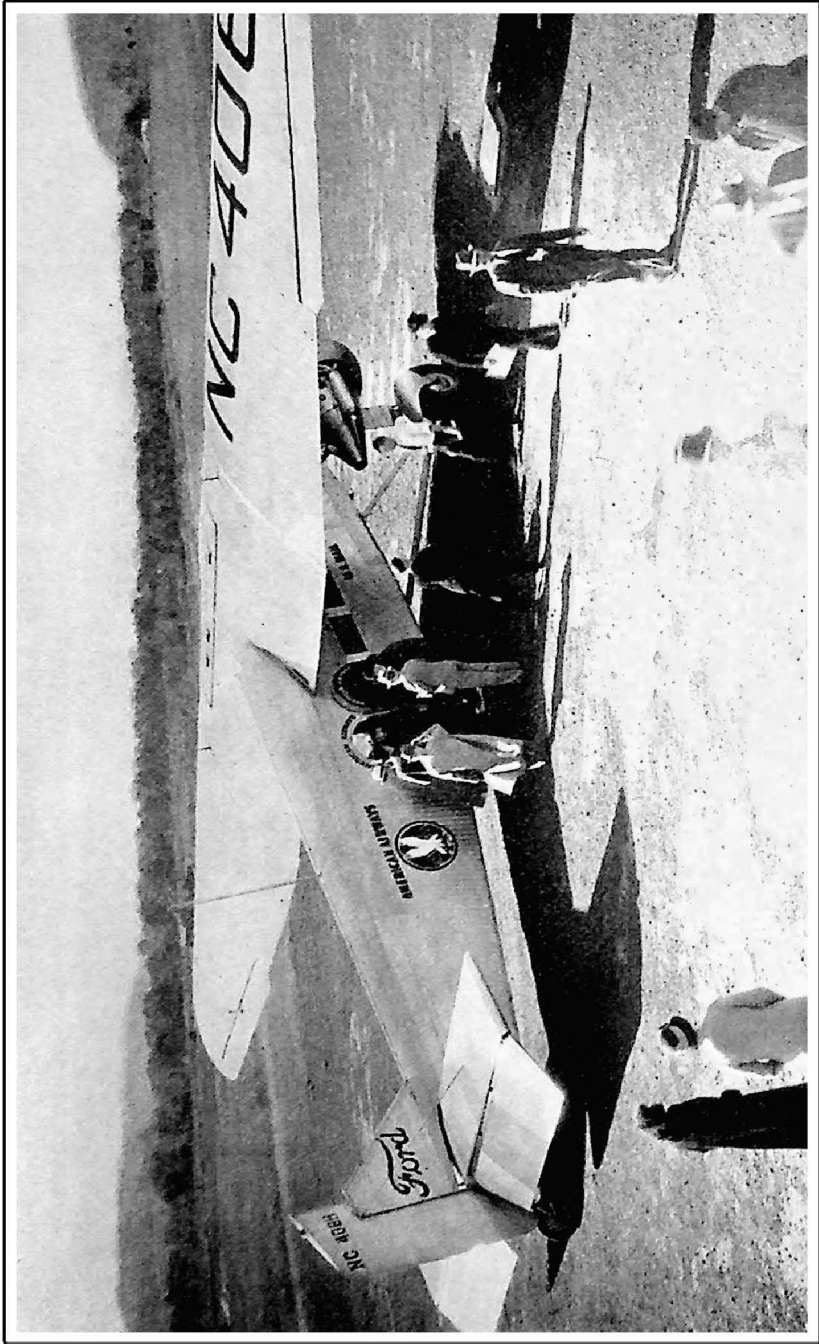

## AERONAUTIC PROGRESS IN WEST VIRGINIA DURING THE YEAR 1934

The year 1934 has brought to the State of West Virginia greater aeronautic development than any previous year—certainly, from the standpoint of growth, of regularly scheduled passenger and mail transport and by the construction of airports and emergency fields.

On October 14, 1933, West Virginia took her place on the air map of the United States when the American Airways, Inc., extended their Chicago-Cincinnati route on through to Washington, D. C., crossing the state and establishing Charleston as a passenger terminal and refueling point. This service brought Charleston within approximately two hours of the Nation's Capitol and within four hours of Chicago, and also correspondingly close to other points all over the United States.

We were still, however, one of the four states in the country without air mail. With a carrier available, previous efforts of business men for this service were renewed vigorously; delegations presented our case to the postal authorities and with the united support of our congressional delegation, the post office department saw fit to designate this as an air mail route (AM25). It was one of those on which bids were taken in the spring of 1934. The award was made to the American Airlines, Inc., the low bidder, then operating on passenger and express basis. The mail service became effective on June 10th, 1934.

This route across the state has been designated by the Bureau of Air Commerce as a Federal Airway. Suitable intermediate fields have been constructed and approval has been given for installation of radio beam stations and possibly beacon lights if night mail service is inaugurated at a later date.

Coincident with the establishment of this air route came the opportunity for West Virginia to develop a much needed system of airports and emergency fields through the airport program of the Civil Works Administration.

Prior to the initiation of this program there were not over three or four airports in the state of adequate size and with proper servicing facilities. This condition was largely responsible for the slow development of aviation in this state as compared with other parts of the country.

The State Relief Administration, recognizing this situation, gave the airport construction program its full support and, with the cooperation in technical matters of the federal Bureau of Air Commerce and the State Board of Aeronautics, will complete, by the close of 1934, the following eighteen airport projects meeting federal requirements:

Some of these projects consist of enlargements and improvements to existing fields, but for the most part they represent entirely new locations.

The prerequisites for consideration as an Airport Work Project under the C. W. A. were:

1. That site be owned or leased by a municipality for 5 years, with option to purchase, by a Municipality.
2. That physical characteristics of site permitted the construction of a field meeting specifications of the Bureau of Air Commerce.

Sites were located with a view to serving centers of population, from a local standpoint, and at the same time becoming part of a network to serve as intermediate fields on existing federal airways as well as probable future airways.

The topography of West Virginia does not lend itself readily to large, level fields desirable for airports, and for the most part our fields are of the "landing strip" type. These strips vary from 300 to 600 feet in width and from 2000 to 4000 feet in length with smoothly graded surfaces and with clear approaches from the air at both ends. The larger airports usually have two of these strips, intersecting at right angles. Where only one runway is available it is located in the direction of the prevailing wind.

These fields represent an engineering undertaking of a magnitude not realized on casual examination. The excavation involved in all of the projects will total between one and one-half and two million cubic yards and the manner in which the work has been carried out is a tribute to the efficiency of the Works Division of the Emergency Relief Administration.

A project is also being carried on to "air mark" the roofs of buildings in about 200 towns and cities in the state. These markers serve as positive identification of a town to the aviator and are of value in checking air navigation as well as reassuring the pilot flying over strange country.

This program of fields and markings should serve as a nucleus of a state airport system and may be added to as the continued development of aviation warrants. It will certainly stand as a monument to the foresight of Governor H. G. Kump and his associates of the West Virginia Relief Administration, under the able guidance of Mr. C. K. Payne, chairman.

BLUEFIELD on hangar. Hills to N. and S.; college building to S. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

**CHARLESTON.** Wertz Field, municipal, rating ..... Nine miles W. on Kanawha River. Altitude, 600 feet. Rectangular, 3,000 by 2,500 feet, sod, level,

natural drainage; three cindered and rock base runways, 2,800 feet N./S., 2,800 by 100 feet E./W., and 2,000 feet NW./SE. WERTZ FIELD, CHARLESTON, on hangar roof. Power lines to W., water tower on E. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day and night. Radio-receiving set. Entire surface of field available.

**CRAIGSVILLE:** Selman Air Service, Inc., Airport, auxiliary. South of center of town, on Route No. 94. Altitude, 1,400 feet. Nearly square, 1,700 by 1,500 feet, shell, level, artificial drainage; one runway, NW./SE. 1,200 by 150 feet; entire field available. Parking space on W; house, office and hangar to NW. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

**ELKINS:** Harper's Field, municipal, rating ..... Three miles S. Altitude, 1,921 feet. Rectangular, 3,100 feet NW./SE.; 2,800 feet E./W.; 2,500 feet N./S.; 1,700 feet NE./SW. Sod, level, natural and artificial drainage; four runways, directions and lengths as above; entire field available. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only. Radio-receiving set.

**FAIRMONT:** Arnettsville Field, auxiliary. Seven and one-half miles N. of Fairmont, on U. S. Route No. 19. Altitude, 1,000 feet. Irregular, sod, level, natural drainage; two landing strips, E./W., 1,000 by 300 feet, NE./SW., 900 by 40 feet. House to SE. and NE.; hay stacks on field in summer. Aviation fuel by request.

**HUNTERSVILLE:** Huntersville Airport, auxiliary. Eight miles SW. of Huntersville, S. of Camp Watoga. Altitude, 2,500 feet. Rectangular, 2,600 by 350 feet, sandy clay, level, natural drainage; entire field available. Trees at both ends, about 80 feet high, cattle sometime wander on field. No servicing facilities.

**HUNTINGTON (CHESAPEAKE, OHIO):** Huntington Airport, commercial, rating ..... Two miles W. on Ohio side of Ohio River, between Chesapeake, Ohio, and Dam 28. Altitude, 570 feet. Rectangular, 2,000 by 1,600 feet, sod, level, natural drainage. HUNTINGTON AIRPORT on hangar. Pole line and U. S. Highway 52 on N.; house and trees to S. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day or night.

**MARTINSBURG:** Shepherd Field, municipal, rating ..... Four miles S. Altitude, 540 feet. Irregular L-shaped, sod, level, natural drainage; three landing strips, N./S., 1,815 feet, E./W., 2,103.75 feet, NE./SW., 2,495.6 feet. SHEPHERD FIELD on barn to SE. Water tower and low pole line to E.; hangars, operations office, and low spot in NW. corner. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

**MORGANTOWN:** Morgan Field, auxiliary. Two miles NW. on E. bank of river. Altitude, 1,000 feet. Cross shape, sod, level, natural drainage; two landing strips, 1,700 by 150 feet, NW./SE., and 900 by 125 feet, NE./SW. Pole line to E. and SE., trees to E. No servicing facilities.

**MOUNDSVILLE (GLENDALE):** Old Fokker Field, auxiliary. Adjoins Glendale on W.; two and one-half miles N. of Moundsville; Ohio River on W. Altitude, 675 feet. Rectangular, 4,000 by 350 feet, sod, level, artificial drainage. GENERAL AVIATION, GLENDALE, WEST VIRGINIA, on building roof to NE. Water tower, 100 feet high, at S. end of building to NE. of field; houses and trees to N. No servicing facilities.

**SUMMERSVILLE:** Craig Field, auxiliary. One mile NE. Altitude, 2,000 feet. Rectangular, 1,500 by 300 feet, sod, level, natural drainage. No servicing facilities.

**WESTON:** Slato 4-H Airport, State. Three miles N. of Weston; sixteen miles S. of Clarksburg; on Westfork River. Altitude, 996 feet. Rectangular, 1,800 by 1,400 feet, sod, natural drainage; one landing strip, 1,800 by 200 feet N./S. Hill to E. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

**WHEELING:** Scott Field, commercial, rating ..... Three miles NW. of city across Ohio River; two miles N. of Martins Ferry, Ohio, and three-quarters

mile S. of Yorkville, Ohio. Altitude, 650 feet. Rectangular, 2,500 by 1,200 feet, sod, level, natural drainage; one runway, 2,500 by 500 feet N./S.; entire field available. SCOTT on hangar roof. Pole line on E. Two approach lights, green, at N. and S. ends of field. One green electric blinker light on tower in NW. corner. Field subject to overflow during periods of heavy spring rains. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day and night.

**WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS:** Greenbrier Airport, commercial, rating ..... One and five tenths miles SW. of city, on State Highway 60, one mile SW. of Greenbrier Hotel. Altitude, 1,795 feet. Irregular, 5,000 by 2,500 feet, turf, level, natural and artificial drainage. Pole line to NW., woods to N., trees along creek to S. and W.; hangar and Administration Building NE. corner of field. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

**WILLIAMSON:** Morris Airport, commercial, rating ..... Five miles NW. of Williamson, in valley between Tug River and double railroad tracks. Altitude, 600 feet. Irregular, sod, level, artificial drainage. MORRIS AIRPORT, WILLIAMSON, W. VA., on hangar. Hills on each side, pole line crosses river, 1,200 feet S. of field. Facilities for servicing aircraft, day only.

## AGRICULTURAL ACTIVITIES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The West Virginia Department of Agriculture, in continuing and expanding its normal work schedule during the past twelve months, has also joined forces with the federal government in putting into operation programs certain to have far-reaching beneficial effects on agriculture in West Virginia.

A campaign for the eradication of Bang's Disease, or contagious abortion, in dairy cattle possibly is the single largest instance of cooperative work undertaken by the department during the past twelve months. This campaign, launched in the summer of 1934, is designed to stamp out a disease which annually costs many thousands of dollars in West Virginia, and at the same time threatens the health of the consuming public. Bang's Disease is transmissible to humans, where it appears in the form of undulant fever.

The department's program will be continued in its present intensive form until December 31, 1935, and during that time the federal government will expend approximately \$250,000 in financing and in indemnities to herd owners whose cattle are found infected and are destroyed. It is believed that by the time the campaign is closed, this state will be free of this dangerous disease.

Another unforseen task was undertaken by the state department when the federal government gave West Virginia farmers an opportunity to furnish pasture for cattle shipped in from the drought areas of the west. As Commissioner of Agriculture, refused to allow these cattle to enter the state before being inspected, and my regulations in this respect were rigidly enforced. This action eliminated the danger of spreading disease among the cattle of West Virginia, only healthy cattle being admitted to the state.

Another new activity of the state department was to join with representatives of all divisions of the dairy industry within the state in a study of problems which had placed the dairying industry in a precarious economic situation. As a result of this study, remedies were suggested and these remedies were adopted voluntarily in many marketing areas of the state. The department entered into this program with the end in view of raising health standards and increasing protection for the consuming public.

The department has continued with its program of supervising milk testing throughout the state, and holds direct supervision over 140 milk plants and receiving stations where this work is done. The department's milk testing program is of much value to those interested financially in the dairying industry and its worth to the public at large, measured in terms of health, is greater.

The department's assistance in the control of poultry diseases is in increasing demand by poultry raisers, farmers, and hatcherymen of the state. During the past two years 49,250 individual tests, autopsies, or other examinations were made. Instructions regarding disease control measures were given or personally supervised by members of the department.

Shipping point inspection service for fruit and vegetables has been provided and this is proving of much value in the marketing of West Virginia farm products. This inspection is voluntary in West Virginia but is available to all interested persons who desire to make application. A small fee is charged for the service to defray expenses. Inspection certificates issued by the department are accepted as *prima facie* evidence in all courts of the United States as to

quality and condition of the fruit or vegetables at time of loading. Of total inspections made by the department, less than one per cent have been reversed on the receiving market.

Advantages of shipping-point inspection are that market risks are decreased, unjust rejection in terminal markets is prevented, sales are facilitated, new market outlets opened, collection of claims for losses and damage in transit is aided, and production is improved by putting a premium on well-grown products.

The department continued with its program of advertising the natural resources of West Virginia, one of the duties entrusted to it by state law, and during the past twelve months has entered new fields in this phase of its activity.

The West Virginia exhibit at A Century of Progress, for which no legislative appropriation was made for 1934, was continued through subscriptions from private sources. Thousands of letters requesting information concerning West Virginia, received by the department, attested the efficiency of this form of state advertising.

Information on travel and scenery and on the state's natural resources have appeared in newspapers and some national magazines. A national association's magazine devoted an entire section to West Virginia in its August, 1934, convention number, no other state being thus honored. Material for this section was provided by the department of agriculture. No cost to the department was involved.

A series of broadcasts over a national radio chain (NBC) in the fall of 1934, detailing interesting events in West Virginia, was arranged without expense to the department.

A canvass of users of the free advertising columns of the Market Bulletin, published by the department, made during the summer of 1934, showed that in the twelve months just preceding, the readers of the Bulletin had disposed of a large quantity of farm products and had netted an amount in cash in return estimated at more than one million dollars. A total of 381 advertisers reported cash sales of \$70,312.86.

The department undertook another advertising project which has since proved its worth in broadcasting the desirability of West Virginia calves as "feeders." Through an arrangement with the Ohio State Experiment Farm at London, Ohio, two groups of West Virginia calves were entered in an experiment in competition with calves from the middle and far west. West Virginia calves showed a better rate of improvement than any of the others and eventually were sold at auction at the Ohio State Fair at Columbus, one group bringing next to top figures in competition with the best in the country, and the other being near the top.

The experiment brought inquiries from cattle buyers from all over the east and middle west, and the large crowd of out-of-state buyers at the recent series of feeder calf sales held in this state attest to the interest being taken in the products of West Virginia pastures. In the five feeder calf sales in which the department of agriculture and extension division of the state university were interested during 1934, there were 620 head of stock sold. The sales were held at Jackson's Mill, Pennsboro, Spencer, Huttonsville and Dunbar. Top price of \$37.50 per head was paid for a lot of eight hereford steers at Jackson's Mill.

The department believes that its state advertising program is of great value to the people of West Virginia in that it brings in many tourists and vacationists who spend their "vacation money" within the state. The American Automobile Association has estimated that tourists spent more than \$35,000,000 in West Virginia in 1934, of which only 28.8 per cent went to hotels, garages and gas stations. The AAA also pointed out that of this 28.8 per cent, a large share went into wages and local purchases.

The department of agriculture has been called upon to undertake supervision of legalized horse racing in the state. Up to November 1, 1934, there had been only two regular race meetings in the state and four two-day and three-day meets in connection with fairs. From these two meets and the four smaller race events the state was paid a total of \$64,180.28.

A total of 24,308 cattle from drought-stricken states of the middle-west and west was brought into West Virginia to be pastured for periods of from one to approximately four months, after which the cattle were removed to beef-canning plants where the meat was prepared for distribution during the winter months to the needy unemployed.

Farmers were paid from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per month per head of cattle, for which he furnished pasture, the payment depending on the age of the animal. While official figures are not available as this is written, it is estimated that more than \$150,000 was paid West Virginia farmers by the federal government for providing pasture for these western beef cattle which otherwise would have been lost. As the western animals were sent to canneries within the state, they had no effect on the fresh meat market for West Virginia beef cattle.

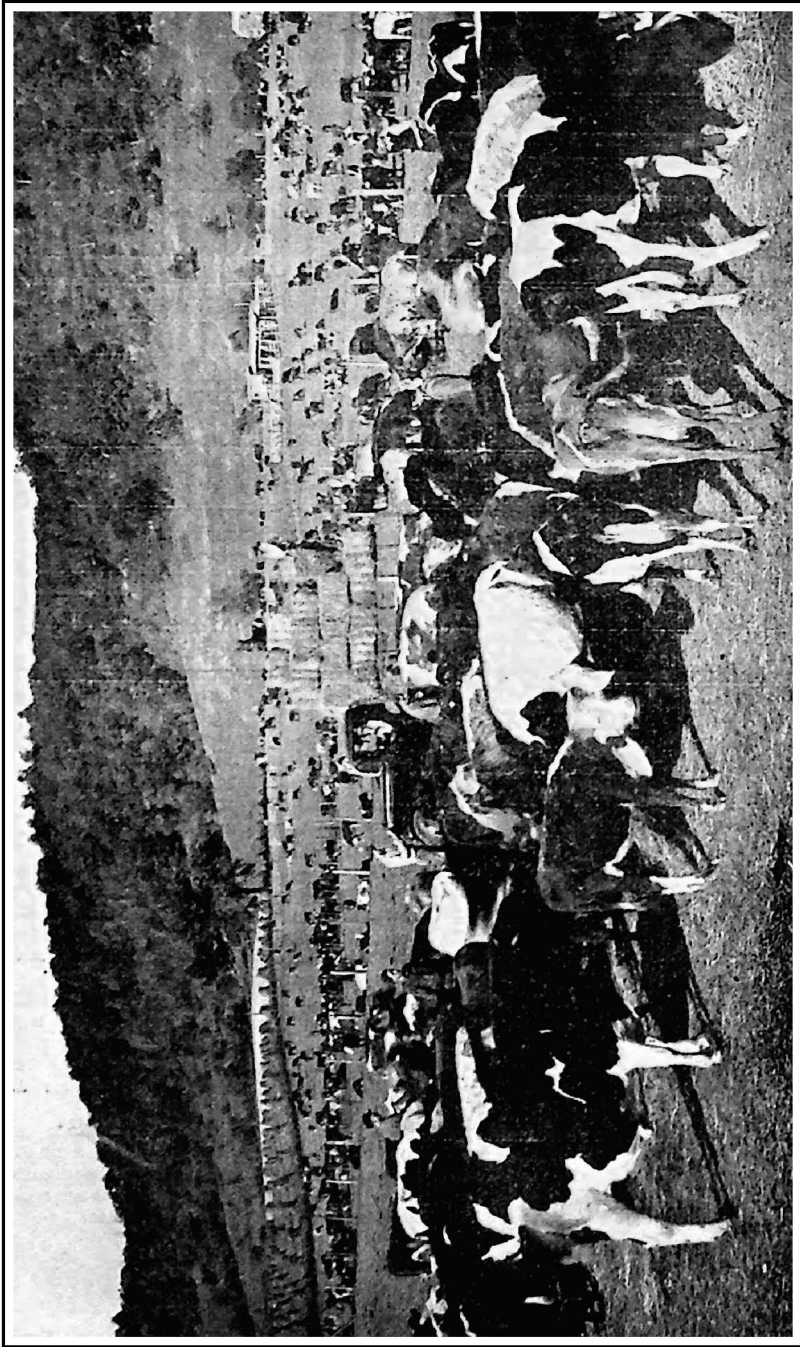
Milk cows to be used by federal relief administrations in the various counties in subsistence projects were, almost without exception, purchased within the state from owners who wished to decrease their herds. A total of 3,359 milk cows were bought and turned over to families within the state who had facilities to care for them, as part of subsistence programs designed to make these families more self-supporting and at the same time provide them with a valuable supply of food. Eventually, these families will be required to reimburse the relief organization for the cows they obtained.

During the fiscal year which closed June 30, 1934, the tuberculosis eradication program carried on cooperatively by the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the respective counties, reached a high point when the work was completed in every county, the entire state becoming a modified accredited area, the 13th state to achieve this distinction.

Much other work was done in the way of animal disease control in the state, and the animal and plant pathology laboratory was active.

The department has been active in plant disease and insect control, of which nursery inspection is a part. Registration with the Commissioner of Agriculture of seeds to be sold within the state has done much to eliminate low quality seed from the state's markets. Seed and fertilizer control work has been carried on by the department also to the end that the consumer, dealer and honest wholesaler and manufacturer might be protected.

On May 1, 1934, a new crop reporting agreement between the state and federal departments of agriculture was signed by which the activities of this service were enlarged at no increase in cost. In addition to regular monthly crop reports, this division is now able to make state-wide surveys covering specific needs of the dairy, fruit, livestock and other farm industries.

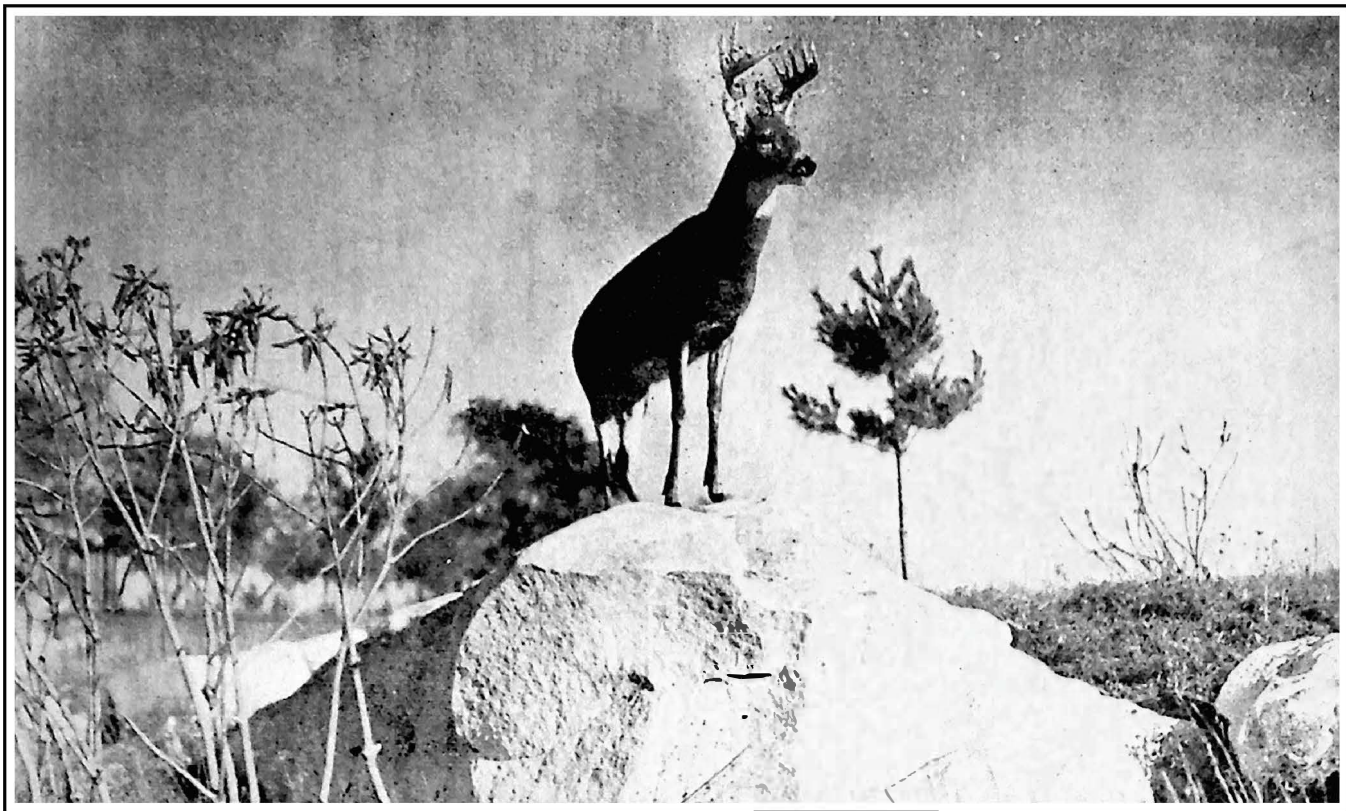

# CONSERVATION

## FORESTS AND PARKS OF WEST VIRGINIA

West Virginia, a mountain land of rugged beauty, possesses publicly owned and publicly administered forests and parks which represent and typify all phases of the picturesque formations with which nature so richly endowed us. These publicly owned and publicly administered areas will serve the threefold purpose of growing an ultimate crop of merchantable timber, provide outdoor recreational facilities for our citizens and visitors and, meanwhile, serve to a considerable extent as game preserves from which to repopulate adjacent public shooting grounds.

In order to differentiate in the mind of the layman between state forests and state parks, the following definitions are offered.

A state forest is a wooded area, administered by a public agency, with the primary objective of growing a crop of timber, meanwhile serving as a playground and woodland recreational center and as a game preserve. Its major objective is utilitarian.

A state park is a wooded area administered by a public agency, dedicated chiefly to recreational use, although it may function to grow timber for future use and may serve as a game refuge. In the development and administration of a state park, chief emphasis is placed upon esthetic and recreational features.

West Virginia, through the medium of her Civilian Conservation Corps Camps, has derived much benefit from the cooperation of the United States Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture in the development and improvement of her state forests and has received similar aid and cooperation in the development of her state parks from the National Park Service of the Department of the Interior.

¶

State ownership and administration of public forests and parks is in its infancy in the Mountain State and our forests and parks fall far short of the holdings of other eastern states if compared as to area and extent. However, they are not lacking in qualities which attract and hold the traveler within our borders, and additional forested areas will probably be acquired within the comparatively near future to round out a state-wide system of forests and parks whose objective shall be the creation of means for recreation and outdoor pleasures for our present generation, and both pleasure and profit for our posterity. Every West Virginian has an interest and an equity in these areas of the public domain.

Below follows a list and brief description of West Virginia's present Federal and State forest holdings:

### FORESTS

#### Monongahela National Forest

Situated in Grant, Tucker, Randolph, Pendleton, Pocahontas, Nicholas, Webster and Greenbrier Counties. When present acquisition plans are completed it will embrace a total area of more than 1,600,000 acres and a net forested area of more than one million acres—the largest national forest east of the Mississippi river. The primary objective of this huge area under the administration of the United States Forest Service is to grow trees for future consumption, according to the needs of man, and to provide adequate forest cover and protection for the headwaters of navigable streams which have their origin within its borders; but

roads, trails, camp sites, cabins and other recreational facilities are projected and under construction, which will serve to make it a great playground as well as a potentially magnificent forest. It possesses many miles of trout streams and thousands of acres of excellent game cover. In cooperation with the Conservation Commission of West Virginia, certain areas will be set aside for game refuges.

### Seneca State Forest

In Pocahontas County. Nearly 11,000 acres of state forest and game preserve under the administration of the Conservation Commission of West Virginia. Lands adjacent to this area are noted for excellent deer hunting. The forest now possesses a good system of roads and trails, a small lake, four attractive cabins for use by outdoor enthusiasts for which a small rental is charged. Situated at an altitude of some twenty-five hundred feet above sea level, it presents picturesque scenery and a delightful summer climate. Good bass fishing may be found in the Greenbrier river which borders the forest on the west.

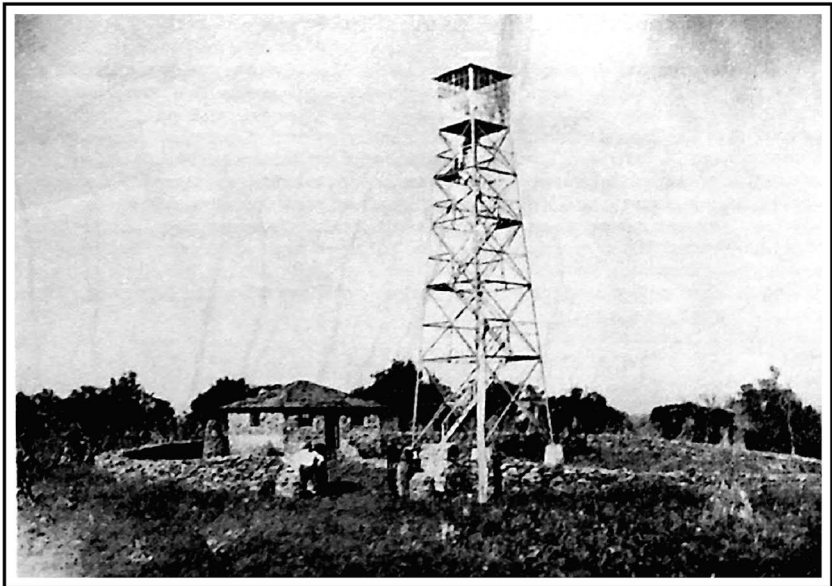
## STATE PARKS

### Watoga State Park

This embraces some 10,000 acres of land typical in conformation of the Allegheny mountains east of the Greenbrier river in Pocahontas county. It is under development as a state park and will offer to the public when completed, within twelve months, an eleven-acre lake for boating, bathing and fishing, a number of artistically built and well-furnished cabins, camp sites, picnic grounds, and a system of motor roads, foot trails and bridle paths. Good fishing and hunting may be found in nearby streams and upon lands adjacent to the park, which in itself constitutes an excellent game preserve.

### Babcock State Park

Located in Fayette county near the village of Clifftop, it embraces an area of some thirty-five hundred acres, which includes a New River Canyon in

miniature. This area, with its rugged craglike cliffs and turbulent rushing waters, will present a challenge to the hardier and more adventurous travelers of the woods who seek something a little rougher and a little more difficult than is to be found in the ordinary course of travel and events. No motor roads will be constructed into the canyon itself. A good system of foot and horse trails, together with appropriate shelters and lookouthouses, will be available. An adequate administration building and a number of attractive cabins designed by skilled landscape architects will provide shelter amid attractive surroundings for guests of the park.

### Lost River State Park

Located in Hardy county upon the watershed of Lost river, an area of more than three thousand acres, presents a varied panorama of scenery typical of the more rugged sections of the eastern panhandle. The development of this park area centers about the Lee Sulphur Springs, patronized as a summer resort more than fifty years ago. Easily accessible by good motor roads, opportunities will present themselves upon every side for the hiker, the sightseer and the rider of fascinating trails, and the lover of magnificent sweeping vistas. Good hunting and good fishing may be obtained within a few miles distance by automobile. It is probable that a lodge-hotel of some twenty-five rooms will provide comfortable and attractive lodging facilities for those guests who prefer the services of an inn to light-housekeeping in one of the several attractive cabins.

### Capon State Park

Situated in the hills of Morgan county near a sweeping bend of the majestic Potomac, a wooded and rugged area of some four thousand acres will provide a number of artistic and comfortable cabins, a skyline motor road, commanding sweeping views of valley, river and mountain, together with ample and adequate picnic grounds and camp sites.

### Hawks Nest State Park

A small area situated upon the Midland Trail between Gauley Bridge and Ansted, centering about a rough-hewn pinnacle of weathered stone, commanding a great sweep of the New river. Heretofore, under private commercial management, this area will in time be converted into a state park which will attract thousands of visitors traveling the Midland Trail. It will become one of the state's free institutions. An appropriate lodge and observation tower will be constructed. Adequate safety for the public will be provided at the brink of the precipice. Other facilities for the comfort and convenience of the visitors will be provided.

### Blackwater Falls Park

An area of some four hundred acres surrounding the Blackwater Falls, one of West Virginia's outstanding scenic features, has been leased by the Conservation Commission of West Virginia for a long period of years. Inasmuch as the land is leased and not owned, erection of permanent structures is not justified. However, this area, easily accessible by a good motor road recently constructed by the State Road Commission, will be patrolled, policed, beautified to some extent, and made attractive to the visitor and tourist. The Blackwater Falls and the precipitous canyon of the Blackwater river below the falls present a picture well worth the time and effort involved in viewing it.

## THE MONONGAHELA NATIONAL FOREST

The Monongahela National Forest as extended by action of the National Forest Reservation Commission, August 30, 1933, follows the Allegheny mountains from a point near the Maryland line in Preston county to Alvon, near White Sulphur Springs, in Greenbrier county.

Approximately 1,700,000 acres, lying in the counties of Preston, Tucker, Grant, Pendleton, Randolph, Pocahontas, Greenbrier, Nicholas and Webster in West Virginia, and the Virginia counties of Highland and Bath, are embraced within the boundaries of the unit in which purchases of land are being made for forestry purposes.

Known as the birthplace of rivers, this high country, topped by Spruce Knob, which has an elevation of 4,860 feet above sea level, is the origin of one of the most distant heads of the Ohio river and contains the source of the Potomac and James. The Tygart and the Cheat from their tributaries in the Monongahela National Forest form the Monongahela, which meets the Allegheny at Pittsburgh to form the Ohio, while the Gauley and the Greenbrier swell the waters of the Kanawha.

Within this vast central West Virginia area lie fertile agricultural valleys and rich limestone grazing lands which are much more valuable for agriculture and stock raising than for forestry purposes. On these lands the neighbors of the Monongahela National Forest live and will continue to contribute to the agricultural wealth of the state. Of this area, the federal government should ultimately own approximately one million acres of the type of land which is better suited to the growing of a forest crop than any other purpose.

The objectives of the ownership and administration by the Federal Forest Service of this unit are streamflow control, timber production, propagation of fish and game in cooperation with the state, and the recreational development of this great potential vacation land. The purchased acreage of the Monongahela National Forest is 608,528 acres, and 75,000 additional acres are now under option.

The Monongahela is one of the several forest units making up region seven of the United States Forest Service. The headquarters of this region are at Washington, D. C., while the Monongahela National Forest is administered from the headquarters at Elkins, West Virginia.

## BYWAYS OF WEST VIRGINIA

An attempt has been made by the Conservation Commission to catalogue and briefly describe points of unusual scenic or historic interest lying off the beaten paths of the arterial highways of the state. No points, however attractive or interesting, are included in the list submitted if situated upon state or federal routes or located in towns along such routes. No industrial installations however important are listed in the present article. Questionnaires were mailed to all county clerks, editors of all weekly newspapers, and to all gamewardens. Several counties have failed to respond to the questionnaires and therefore no points of interest on the byways can be herein set forth. Situated amid winding valleys and crumpled folds of mighty mountains in West Virginia are many points of more than ordinary interest to native and tourist, which would attract the passer-by if their locations and approaches were made known to the traveling public.

### Berkeley County

*Prospect Rock* provides a wonderful view of the Potomac Valley and is located on a side road from route 29 about two miles up Cacapon Mountain.

### Brooke County

On the Washington Pike is the only monument in the world erected to an apple. It commemorates the successful development of the Grimes Golden Apple.

### Doddridge County

*"The Devil's Tea Table,"* a huge stone, stands near the edge of Blue Stone Creek, a tributary of Middle Island Creek, one-fourth mile south of West Union, on route 18.

### Gilmer County

*"Job's Temple,"* located on the Little Kanawha River, twelve miles below Glenville, is one of the best preserved pioneer churches of West Virginia. It is a log structure that still contains the peg-legged hand hewn seats and benches. The candle shelves are still on the wall and the crude pulpit remains. This church was the social center in the valley in the postwar days.

### Greenbrier County

*"The Cliffs of Greenbrier"* tower some six hundred feet out over the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway and Greenbrier River and provide a magnificent view of the surrounding mountains and the river gorge. Turn east at Frankford from route 24 for two and one-half miles.

*"Alvon Springs"* are located 20 miles north of White Sulphur. Millions of gallons of pure sparkling water flow daily from seven springs. The water from these springs is served on all Chesapeake and Ohio trains.

### Grant County

*Flowing Springs* presents a freak of nature in that the water gushes forth for a period of about three minutes, then ceases for ten minutes when it flows forth again. This spring is one mile north of Petersburg on the Welton Farm.

### Hampshire County

*Ice Mountain* is located two miles off of route 29 near Slanesville. Ice can be found here at all times during the year.

*Caudy's Castle* on Great Capon River, three miles off route 29 near the forks of Capon, is a historical spot of interest. When pursued by Indians, Caudy and his comrades took refuge on this rock and stationing themselves on the narrow pathway shoved the Indians over the steep cliffs as they came along.

*Pivot Rock*, a freak of nature about ten by fifteen feet, rests on a small pivot. It is located one mile east of Springfield and just below Raven Rocks.

### Kanawha County

On the south side of the Kanawha River, nearly opposite Campbell Creek, was the home of Daniel Boone for nearly ten years.

### Lewis County

*Jackson's Mill* is the finest and largest Four-H Camp in the United States. The camp occupies the boyhood home site of General T. J. (Stonewall) Jackson. It is located on a hard surface district road, five miles from Weston, off of U. S. 19.

### Marion County

Two miles off U. S. Route 19, on a secondary road leaving the main thoroughfare at the north edge of Rivesville, is the site of the David Morgan monument. It was here, in 1779, that David Morgan, in his sixtieth year, had his famous fight with two Indians, killing one with a bullet from his flintlock and overcoming the other in hand to hand combat.

### Mineral County

The birthplace of Nancy Hanks, mother of Abraham Lincoln, is located about ten miles from Burlington on Mike's Run. Accessible by good dirt road from Ridgeville on U. S. Route 50, via Antloch.

Fort Ashby is the only remaining Indian Fort south of the Potomac River. It was built in 1755 by order of Colonel George Washington. A marker is placed in the town square of the town of Fort Ashby on route 23 pointing to the location of the Fort. The old Fort together with the ground on which it stands is now owned by Potomac Valley Chapter D. A. R., of Keyser.

### Monongalia County

Within the borders of Monongalia County can be found numerous old forts dating from revolutionary days. Fort Martin has been marked by the D. A. R. with an appropriate marker. It is in Cass District on the Marshall J. Garlow farm.

Fort Pierpont was located between the village of Easton and Cheat River and a marker has been erected by the D. A. R.

Raven Rocks are of scenic importance and are located on the road up Boose Creek from route 56.

Picture Rocks, so named from the tradition that crude figures were carved on them by the Indians, can be seen about five miles from Morgantown, on route 56.

Cheat View presents a scene of unusual beauty overlooking the Cheat River. It can be reached on the unimproved road between Isaac's Ferry and Mason-town.

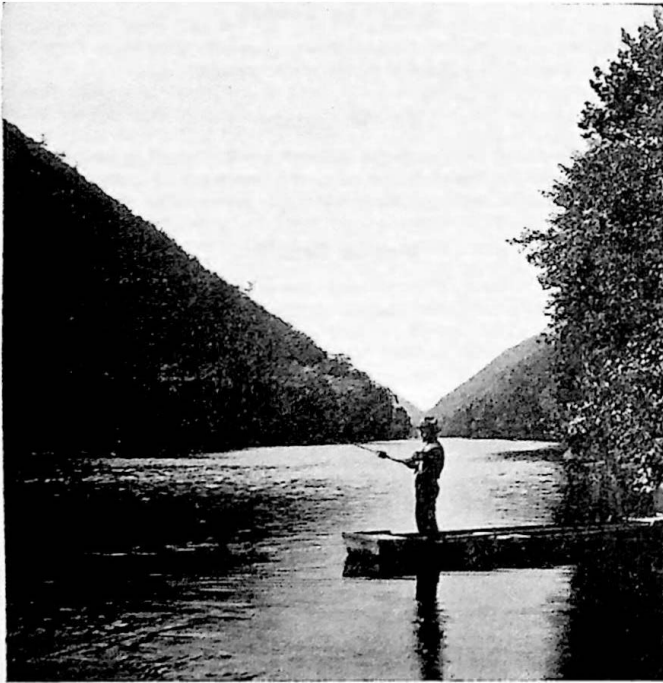
### Monroe County

Old Rehobeth Church, east of Union, just off route 3, was the first Methodist Church west of the Allegheny mountains and dedicated by Bishop Asbury one hundred and fifty years ago.

Sweet Springs Valley, Route 3, Gap Mills to Virginia line. Unbroken mountain chain of 44 miles from Peterstown. Old Sweet Springs, founded by Oliver Burns, has been a famous resort since 1780.

### Morgan County

*Sir John's Run*, once the headquarters of Sir John Sinclair, Quartermaster of General Braddock's army. Here also was built the first steam boat in America by James Rumsey in 1784, the model of which was demonstrated before General Washington at "Bath," now Berkeley Springs, September 6, 1748.

### Pendleton County

Where Seneca Creek empties into North Fork River is found beautiful Seneca Rocks, a massive formation of rocky crags soaring to a height of 960 feet. Sunlight playing on the rocks gives it much the appearance of a painted desert color scheme.

The Smoke Hole section of Pendleton County is noted for its beautiful mountain scenery, fine fishing streams and good hunting. This section is reached from Petersburg over route 28 to Upper Tract and a secondary road from that point.



### Pocahontas County

Cranberry Glades present a typical section of Arctic tundra isolated in the mountains of West Virginia. It is noted for rare specimens of both flora and fauna. The Glades are rather inaccessible but can be reached from route 24 at Millpoint by going up Stramping Creek to end of road and walking approximately five miles.

### Preston County

Cornwell Cave of limestone formation has passages from three to thirty feet in height. This cave has never been fully explored but certainly offers opportunities for those interested in such explorations. Located about five miles below Albright, on the west side of Cheat River.

On the old plantation of Colonel John Fairfax near Reedsville is the first Federal Homestead Project established in the United States. The personal interest of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of the President, is no doubt principally responsible for its establishment.

Camp Dawson at the foot of Caddell mountain along the Cheat River is one of the most picturesque military camps to be found in the tri-state area. It is the home of the 201st Infantry, West Virginia National Guards.

### Raleigh County

Huff's Knob, on the Mercer-Raleigh-Summers county line, just off federal routes 19-21, about midway between Beckley and Princeton and within ten minutes' walking distance from Flat Top post office, rises to a height of approximately thirty-eight hundred feet above the sea, and from its crest the lover of scenic beauty may feast his eyes on a panorama scarcely to be excelled by any in the state. There is this distinction to be made between the view from this summit and scenic attractions found elsewhere in the state: Huff's Knob is the hub of a complete circle of natural beauty rather than a mere vantage point from which one may survey an arc of horizon. It overlooks the more magnificent portions of Raleigh, Summers and Mercer counties, and the only limits to what may be surveyed from its summit are imposed by the eyesight of the beholder and the curvature of the earth.

Grandview, in Raleigh County, the views from Hawks Nest, Lover's Leap and Sewell Mountain, in Fayette, and from the summit of East River Mountain above Bluefield in Mercer, are among this section's natural beauty spots that are better known than Huff's Knob. Each has its own peculiar charm, but in variety and expanse of view, in sheer vastness of prospect, Huff's Knob is without a peer among them.

### Randolph County

Bickles Knob, about six miles from Elkins, on route 5, is some 4000 feet high and commands a view of this whole mountainous section. A good dirt road has been constructed to its summit by the federal government. A forest fire tower is located at this point.

Fort Milroy, fifteen miles east of Huttonsville, at the top of Cheat Mountain, on the old Staunton and Parkersburg turnpike, was built by Union forces during the Civil War to control the road to Virginia. The rocks and enclosure remain today and are well preserved.

### Ritchie County

About a mile east of Smithsville there lives a cliff dweller. Burleigh S. McNeill, known as the "Old Man of the Hills," has cut three large rooms in solid stone. He has carved several images representing prehistoric faces. On the top of the cliff he has built a large mound which has been transformed into a beautiful flower garden.

### Summers County

The B. L. Kesler log home at Lowell shows the port holes in the walls made during the Indian wars. A Graham girl was stolen from this house by the Indians, one of whom she afterwards married, refusing to return to her people.

### Wayne County

Tower Rock stands out from a cleft of rocks with a large stone poised across the top forming a cap or cover. Leave route 52 to Missouri Branch, thence up Twelve Pole Creek.

### Wood County

Blennerhassett Island, located four miles below Parkersburg in the Ohio River, is not only a beautiful spot but is noted as the setting for the Aaron Burr conspiracy.

### Wyoming County

Burning Rock, located at the head of Big Cub Creek, derives its name from the fact that warm air or gas issues from the subterranean depths which prevents snow lying on rocks. This point is also the site of a state forest fire tower.

**SCHOOL PROGRESS IN WEST VIRGINIA**

In the darkest days of the depression when passing through a reorganization period, the school organization in West Virginia was without money and without form. In fact, for nearly two months there was no public school system within the state save that represented by county superintendents and the state superintendent. I am now pleased to be able to report progress.

This condition was brought about by the passage of an act by the legislature on May 22, 1933, that abolished all independent and magisterial districts as of that date and set up a new organization under the county unit system to begin on July 1, 1933. By this act the number of districts within the State were reduced from 398 to 55; the number of board members and secretaries, from 1600 to 275. The cost of boards of education was reduced in approximately the same proportion as the number of members. In addition to reducing costs, this bill placed the control of school affairs in the hands of men who, through their courage and business acumen, reduced maintenance costs, lifted schools from local politics, selected better teaching corps, appointed able assistant county superintendents, and administered financial affairs on a sane and intelligent basis. School supervision was extended from 112 districts of the former 398, to all the counties in the state.

About the same time a new school fund bill was enacted. This bill changed the method of distribution of state money from the basis of need to that of pupil-teacher load, and thereby substituted for the former plan that encouraged scheming for state money, a method that encouraged thrift and economy. Formerly the more teachers employed, the more money the respective districts secured. Under the new plan an increased number of teachers increases the cost of the local units. This inducement led to a reduction of 1,066 elementary teachers in the state within one year, and the schooling of 8,000 additional high school pupils with only 124 more teachers than were employed last year. Under ordinary circumstances this inducement might be too strong. Under the strain of financial depression, however, it helped to save the school system of the state.

Under the new organization the cost of schools has been shifted from direct to indirect taxes. Under the old plan the state paid from indirect tax three to five per cent of costs. Under the new, it pays fifty-three to sixty per cent. As the amount that can be raised from direct tax for elementary and high schools is limited, the indirect tax will pay a greater percentage of the costs as expenditure for education increases.

For the first time in the history of the State nine months of school was provided for all counties, thus giving the rural child a term equal to that of the city child. With lengthened term through reduced expenditure, the cost of

the year was reduced from the cost of the previous year by approximately \$1,500,000.

Salaries of elementary teachers were reduced in 1933 approximately 15 per cent. Financial conditions reduced high school salaries from 30 per cent to 50 per cent except in counties where additional funds were available. Legislative action in January, 1934, restored the 15 per cent reduction for elementary teachers, and increased high school salaries approximately the same percentage.

The distribution bill encourages the employment of better prepared teachers by requiring the state to pay a greater part of the salary of those better prepared. As a result of this bill and increased standards by boards of education, the percentage of teachers holding certificates of standard normal rank or above, was increased from 39 per cent in the year 1932-33, to 49.1 per cent in 1933-34.

Reports at the time of the writing of this article, September 14, 1934, indicate further increase in the preparation of the teacher personnel, and a larger enrollment in the high schools for 1934-35 than for 1933-34. Some boards of education employed for this year normal school graduates only. Others dropped all teachers with certificates of the second grade. Many counties have reported an increased enrollment. The largest to date for this year comes from the Clay County High School in which the enrollment for last year was 176. The enrollment for this year is 354.

## THE STATE FLOWER

During the administration of Governor Albert Blakesley White, the Rhododendron (*rhododendron maximum*), was named as the official state flower under the provisions of the following joint resolution adopted by the legislature of West Virginia January 23, 1903:

"WHEREAS, Many of our sister states have adopted some floral emblem; and

"WHEREAS, Our present chief executive, the governor of the State, and his immediate predecessor, have each recommended the rhododendron, or big laurel, and the pupils of the public schools of the State, under direction of the state superintendent, have voted for this flower; therefore be it

*"Resolved by the Legislature of West Virginia:*

*"That said rhododendron, or big laurel, be and it is hereby designated as the official State flower, to be used as such at all proper times and places."*

# GEOLOGICAL

## WEST VIRGINIA GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

The purpose of the Geological Survey is clearly set out in the title of the act, passed by the legislature at the regular session in 1903, amending the act passed in 1897, viz:

"An Act to establish a State Geological and Economic Survey and to make provisions for the preparation of reports and maps to illustrate the natural resources of the State, together with the necessary investigations preparatory thereto."

### PROGRESS MADE BY THE SURVEY TO DATE

The Geological Survey has attempted to carry out the purposes for which it was intended. Just how well it has succeeded can be determined from the amount of work completed and from the projects that are soon to be under way.

Our state is a storehouse of vast natural resources. We were fortunate in having the late I. C. White, geologist of international reputation, to direct the work of the Survey for many years. During his superintendency, much was accomplished toward making available accurate information concerning our natural resources. Our Survey stands near the head of the list among state geological surveys in the amount of work done and is much farther advanced in this work than some of our bordering states.

In cooperation with the United States Geological Survey, 135 topographic maps, in the form of quadrangles covering one-quarter of a degree of latitude and longitude on a scale of 1-62,500 (about one mile to the inch) covering the entire state, have been prepared. It is now possible to obtain an accurate topographic map on the above scale showing elevation above sea of roads, streams, towns, state, county, district and corporate boundaries, schools, churches, homes, cemeteries, locks, dams, etc., for any area in the state. When the Greenbrier county report is finished, the greater part of the field work will have been completed. A detailed geologic and economic report, with accompanying geologic and topographic maps, will be available for every county in the state. Along with these, numerous general reports have been prepared, covering such natural resources as coal, oil, gas, salt, sandstone, limestone, iron ore, clay and forests. Also thousands of coal analyses and well records have been made available in permanent form in numerous Survey publications. Finally, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture and the West Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station, soils reports and maps have been either published or the field studies completed for every county in the state except Greenbrier.

### THE FUNCTIONS OF THE SURVEY

The functions of the Geological Survey at the present time can be grouped under three main divisions. These are, (1) administrative, (2) field studies and reports and (3) chemical laboratory. A fourth, educational extension, should be added.

#### Administrative

Well equipped offices, chemical laboratory and library are maintained by the Survey. During the existence of the Survey over fifty publications have been

prepared. In order that these volumes reach only those who will make use of them, a nominal charge is made. The handling of this service requires daily administrative attention.

During each year, hundreds of mineral samples are submitted to the Survey for analysis. Where a superficial examination shows that there is no commercial value, a report to that effect is submitted without delay. If the sample suggests commercial value, a more thorough chemical analysis or assay is made.

Under administration may also be included services to the state government. These services are available and often utilized by members of the legislature, governor's office, state board of control, auditor, attorney general, department of agriculture, public service commission, department of banking, department of health, department of mines, state road commission, and conservation commission.

During the last year requests from the various National Recovery Act groups have been many. The vast amount of information contained in the several Survey volumes has been of inestimable value to the different federal surveys that are being made in the state. Many of these projects deal directly with conservation and development of natural resources. In fact, practically all of the federal groups have asked and received services and information from the West Virginia Geological Survey which could not have been obtained from any other source. Topographic maps and soil survey maps and publications were distributed. Services of personnel have extended from locating water and fuel supplies for homestead projects to advice concerning federal and municipal dams. The National Planning Commission has been furnished with complete information concerning the mineral and allied industries of West Virginia, and complete and authoritative information has also been furnished the various code authorities.

#### Field Studies and Reports

This division of the Geological Survey is the most fundamental. In order that a particular geological survey may be conducted with efficiency to a degree that will satisfy its purpose, methods of execution should be adopted to that end.

To accomplish this means that the geologist must classify his purpose and plan his method accordingly. It is convenient to distinguish reconnaissance, general and special surveys.

The purpose of a reconnaissance survey is to obtain data on which to plan a more detailed investigation. As a rule it is a rapid survey of a region too large to be covered thoroughly.

A general survey is supposed to include all aspects of the local geology. It differs from reconnaissance in that it is all inclusive. Good examples of this class include practically all of the Geological Survey publications of the past. It differs from the work the Survey is now proposing to do, since it is the aim of the surveys to follow to carry on the investigation of the assembled facts as a research into their more fundamental relations and causes.

Special surveys are those which have for their object some special phase of the geology, rather than a comprehensive mapping of all the features. They are generally economic in character, and have for their purpose the possible commercial development of the particular resource that is being studied. A special survey, as the name implies, requires some special knowledge on the part of the geologist, i.e., he must be a specialist in the phase of the subject covered by the problem.

### Chemical Laboratory

In our well equipped chemical laboratory, thousands of complete analyses of coal, limestone, iron ores, glass sand, clays, manganese, waters, etc., have been made, as well as possibly equally as many qualitative tests for various minerals, samples of which have been submitted by land owners. The Survey is now beginning a series of chemical surveys including mineral water and brines.

### Educational Extension

An educational extension division should be created for the purpose of informing the citizens of the state regarding the results of the researches of the Survey on the geology, mineral resources, and products of the state, and for the purpose of making available to the teachers of the state, through field conferences and educational field trips, the information obtained by the Survey from its field studies.

### NEW PROBLEMS

An examination of the work that has been done in the past points the way for the future. With the completion of the topographic base maps covering the state, and the several general volumes on our major natural resources, and a detailed geologic and economic report of each of the fifty-five counties, we are now ready and properly prepared for detailed studies and reports on special problems. Aside from further research on our major resources, coal, oil and gas, more attention should be given to our so-called lesser resources. Those which have been neglected include building stone, road materials, brines, mineral waters, refractory and non-refractory clays, limestones, glass sand and iron ores.

### Coal

The demand for more accurate detailed information on our coals, with particular reference to their chemical composition, fusing point of ash and heating value, for special purposes, is rapidly increasing. A report on the chemical analyses of our numerous coals by seams and counties, including the entire producing area, is needed.

### Oil and Gas

The recent discovery of oil in commercial quantities in the Oriskany sand (oldest producing horizon in the state) in Kanawha county emphasizes the need of a special study on the stratigraphy, structure, character and position of these older possible horizons.

### Brines

In spite of the fact that the basis for a large part of the chemical industry in the Kanawha valley is found in salt brines, no special study has been made of these saline waters. Salt brines are known to occur in hundreds of oil and gas wells. The value of some of the salts present, other than sodium chloride, is sufficient cause for more accurate information on the exact chemical composition of these fossil sea waters. Such a study is now under way and will be pushed to completion as rapidly as facilities permit.

### Mineral Waters

Mineral waters, both from the medicinal and resort standpoint, represent another of West Virginia's important resources. In comparison with other minerals, little attention has been given them. There is not a county in the eastern part of the state that does not have one or more valuable mineral springs, with some counties having as many as eight. These springs are for the most part located in areas that have few other mineral resources such as coal, oil and gas, but invariably are in areas with scenic background and recreational environment. The populous centers of the east are ready markets for bottled spring water. Waters from Capon Spring in Hampshire, Berkeley Springs in Morgan, Dunmore and Minnehaha in Pocahontas and Alvon in Greenbrier, as well as some others, are being shipped to Washington, Philadelphia, and other cities throughout the country. An accurate survey of our mineral springs showing location, history, geology, temperatures and chemical analyses is now under way and will be pushed to completion.

### Building Stone and Construction Materials

There is probably no state in the Union that possesses more natural building stone, especially native sandstones, than West Virginia. At the present time what little use is made of them is confined chiefly to foundations, bridge abutments, retaining walls and an occasional residence. There is no construction material more durable or pleasing in appearance than that of well selected native stone.

Large scale road building and road maintenance along with dam construction, has called for enormous quantities of suitable materials. Such a material survey including quality and quantity of building stone, sand and gravel (crushed and stream) would be of inestimable value to the state.

### Iron Ore

West Virginia contains large deposits of iron ore but not of sufficient thickness to compete with the large and favorably located Lake Superior deposits which are used for ordinary smelting purposes. However, some iron ore has other uses, especially for pigments. A special study of our iron ores may prove them to be of value for such purposes.

### Limestone

The uses to which limestone are put are many. These include building stone both for exterior and interior, crushed stone for road ballast, road metal, and concrete aggregate, fluxing agents, chemical purposes and agricultural lime, rock wool, etc. For some purposes, limestone of a specific chemical composition is necessary. Vast deposits of limestone of varied thickness and purity are found in the state, principally in the eastern panhandle. No comprehensive study showing exact location and quantity of limestone according to chemical composition has been made.

### Clays

A good demand for high grade refractory clays will continue. It is certain that parts of the state contain such clays. The exact location and quantities are not known. The real value of our clay will not be known until such a study, including the important firing and other physical tests, is made.

## OTHER STUDIES

The above mentioned studies are only some of the many that may be profitably undertaken. Others for research that suggest themselves are stream pollution, coal land classification for taxation purposes, water run-off and flood control, land use and land classification, etc.

Many of these problems have a direct relationship with the functions of other state commissions, and might well be carried out in a cooperative study. For example, materials survey with the State Road Commission; stream pollution (in part) and gassy mines with the Department of Mines; forests, land classification and land use, points of geologic and scenic interest including caverns and stream pollution, with the Conservation Commission and the West Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station.

The West Virginia Geological Survey is one of the few state organizations that directly creates taxable values. For over 35 years this Survey has shown to industry and capital the way to mineral and industrial expansion. The state now ranks fifth among the states of the Union in value of mineral production.

*Volume IV, Iron Ores, Building Stones and Other Minerals*, by G. P. Grimsley, 603 pages, cloth, issued under date of September 25, 1909. This volume gives descriptions and analyses of the principal Iron Ore deposits of the state together with a history of the old charcoal furnace industry. The main building stones of the state are described and elaborate tests given of their strength and crushing limit, together with chemical analyses, petrographic determinations, etc. The Glass-Sands, Salt Industry and Brines of the state are also described and analyses given.

*Volume V, Forestry and Wood Industries*, by A. B. Brooks, 500 pages, handsomely illustrated with 58 page plates, and accompanying forest map folded in pocket of cover and showing in separate colors the virgin forest, cut-over, and farm lands of the state, issued under date of February 1, 1911.

*Volume V (A), The Living and Fossil Flora of West Virginia*, issued under date of June 1, 1913, 491 pages + XIII. *Part I, The Living Flora*, by Dr. C. F. Millspaugh. *Part II, The Fossil Flora*, by Dr. David White, gives a complete list of the fossil plants associated with each of the great coal beds, thus constituting a splendid guide to correlation.

*Bulletin No. 1, Bibliography and Cartography*, 85 pages; published under date of July 15, 1901. Author, Samuel B. Brown.

*Bulletin No. 2, Levels and Coal Analyses*, by I. C. White, published under date of December 1, 1910, 385 pages + XVI. Part I contains a list of railway profiles, distance tables and elevations along all the railways and principal

rivers of the state in a much more detailed and accurate manner than ever heretofore published. Part II takes up the coal beds of the state and collects together all the analyses heretofore made by the Survey of each coal bed in regular order from the oldest or Pocahontas group to the highest and youngest.

*Bulletin No. 3, The Cheat Mountain Coal Field of Randolph County, W. Va.*, by David B. Reger, issued under date of June 2, 1923, containing 34 pp. (paper binding) and large one-color map. Preliminary description of important coal territory.

*Detailed County Report on Ohio, Brooke and Hancock Counties*, by G. P. Grimsley.

*Detailed County Report on Marshall, Wetzel and Tyler Counties*, by Ray V. Hennen.

*Detailed County Report on Pleasants, Wood and Ritchie County*, by G. P. Grimsley. Edition exhausted.

## COAL

### WEST VIRGINIA COAL

West Virginia is the most important bituminous coal producing state in the Union. Not only does it lead in annual production and in the extent and quantity of the unmined deposits, but the seams mined are of exceptional quality and include many which are superior to any found in other producing areas.

Investigations by the West Virginia Geological Survey indicate that the total coal, 3 feet and over, economically recoverable under present methods originally amounted to approximately 50,000,000,000 tons. Estimated production from the state to the end of 1933 was approximately 2,860,000,000 tons, leaving 47,140,000,000 mineable tons still remaining in the ground, a quantity sufficient to provide production at present rates of mining for a period of approximately 400 years.

In addition to the above, the thinner seams will provide a probable total of 12,000,000,000 tons, which would be recoverable under improved systems of mining, or improved economic conditions.

Of the 24,479 square miles contained within its limits, 9,500 square miles or 38.8% is underlaid with coal. This area covers all or a portion of 43 of the 55 counties, and coal is mined in commercial quantities in 34 counties.

The coal deposits are found in nearly one hundred separate seams of which 60 presents mineable possibilities and 41 are of present mineable thickness. At present, production is obtained from 30 seams.

### History

The first discovery of coal in West Virginia is attributed to John Peter Salley, who crossed the Allegheny mountains from Augusta county in 1742 and found coal on a river which he named "Coal River."

In 1802 Dr. F. A. Michaux records the discovery of coal in the Panhandle area.

Undoubtedly many of the early settlers knew something of the properties of coal, but no records exist of its use in the state before 1810, when Conrad Cotts opened a mine near Wheeling and produced coal for blacksmithing and domestic purposes.

In 1817 coal was used as fuel for the salt furnaces in the Kanawha Valley, and by 1840 production for this purpose had increased to 200,000 bushels, or 8,000 tons.

In 1843 small quantities were shipped from Piedmont over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, but this road was not completed across the state to Wheeling until December 24, 1852.

Prior to the building of the railroads, mines were opened along navigable streams and coal was shipped by water. Such shipments were made from Mason County as early as 1847, and about 1855 mines were opened on Big Coal river and shipments were made by way of the Kanawha. About the same time, Aaron Stockton discovered a seam of cannel coal near the present site of Montgomery and built an oil refinery to recover the rich deposits of mineral oil contained in this type of coal, and coal and oil were flatboated to Cincinnati from this operation.

The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway completed its lines to Huntington by the first of the year 1873, and Jo L. Beury is credited with having made the first shipment of coal from the Quinimont seam. About the same time John Nuttall opened the Sewell seam at Nuttallburg.

Coal operations were not begun in the southern portion of the state until 1882, when the Norfolk and Western reached Pocahontas.

The first shipments from the Bluestone river were made the same year.

The Western Maryland Railway reached the mining area along the Potomac river in the northeastern portion of the state in 1881 and shipments from this area were immediately begun.

The advent of the railroads stimulated activity in the coal mining industry and production increased sharply.

Statistics of production in West Virginia are available from 1863, when 444,648 short tons were reported. The first report made by the West Virginia Mine Department was in 1883 when 3,142,340 short tons were reported as production from 118 mines. Production increased steadily thereafter, reaching a peak of 146,088,121 tons in 1927 from 1,159 mines.

Since that time, and particularly during the depression years, production has declined, and production for 1933 amounted to 94,130,508 tons, which was 28.7% of the 327,940,000 tons produced in the United States.

### Employment

Statistics showing the comparative activity of the coal mining industry with other industries of the state are not available for each year. However, according to the 1930 census the coal mining industry employed 107,832 persons or nearly 19% of the 570,452 persons gainfully employed throughout the state.

Due to the hazardous nature of the employment, together with the occurrence of disastrous explosions, the mining of coal has exacted a heavy toll of lives.

Technical research by the United States Bureau of Mines, and systematic mine inspection and investigations by the State Department of Mines, has been instrumental in ascertaining the underlying causes of explosions and accidents, and methods have been devised by which they may be combated. This, together with the educational courses of the Mine Extension School of the University of West Virginia and the co-operation of the operators and employees, has been decidedly effective in reducing the rate of accidents and fatalities.

Better mining methods have been introduced, ventilation has been made more efficient and effective, rock dusting has diminished the cause and effect of dust and gas explosions, permissible explosives have reduced the hazards of blasting, improved electrical and mechanical equipment have reduced the inherent hazards of explosions, transportation, cutting and preparation. Closed lights and protective clothing have also been introduced. These measures have resulted in a steady increase in the number of tons produced per fatal accident. In 1933, 378,034 tons were produced per single fatal accident. This is graphically shown in Fig. 1.

During this same period, vast strides have been made to increase the general efficiency of the employee. Coal was first mined with a pick and iron wedges. Upon the introduction of explosives, the coal was blasted from the solid faces. Later, it was undercut by pickwork before it was blasted. The undercutting machine has done much to increase the production per miner, and today large and increasing tonnage is loaded by various mechanical devices. In 1883 the yearly production per inside employee was 437 tons, which increased steadily until a peak of 1,898 tons was recorded for 1925. Due to increased periods of idleness, the tonnage per inside employee in 1933 was 1,157 tons.

### The Uses of Coal

Coal has contributed more to our civilization than any other single product. It would be difficult to visualize our existence without its benefits. Its use has made possible the development of our railways, and steel, electrical, textile and other major industries. It furnishes the base for many of our chemical products.

For many years coal was converted into coke for the iron and steel industry by the use of beehive ovens and the valuable volatile substances were permitted to escape into the air. Coke production at the mines steadily increased, reaching a peak of 4,217,380 tons in 1910.

A growing recognition of the value of the by-products by this time attracted capital for the building of by-product ovens, and ammonia liquor, benzol, tar and gas were thus saved in the manufacture of coke. According to reports by the United States Bureau of Mines, the total receipts realized in 1932 for the sale of by-products from a ton of coal was 87% greater than the average price of coal at the mines.

These by-products are of considerable importance to our modern life and have contributed greatly to the development of our chemical industries. They are used for road-making and in the manufacture of roofing products, steel, paints, oils, fertilizers, making soda, medicines, explosives, dyes, fruit preservatives, soaps, oil stains, perfumes, washing powder, water proofing, wood

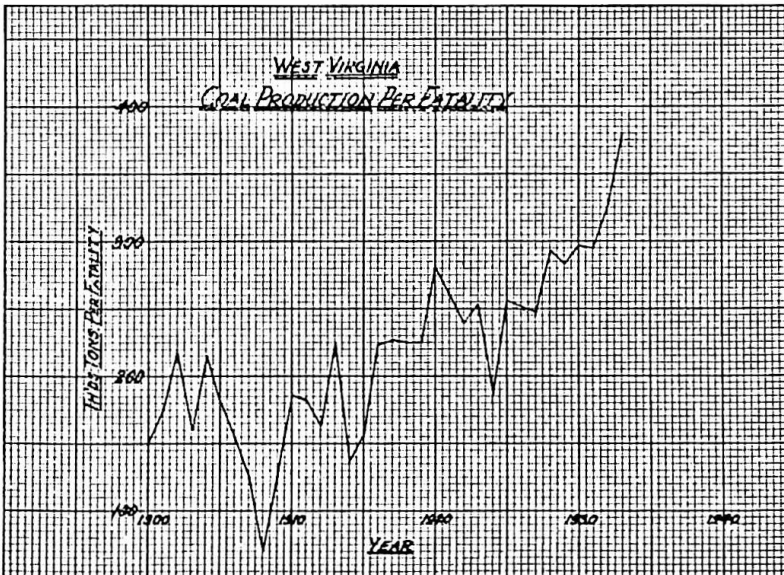

preservatives, paint thinners, photographic supplies, insulating, glass making, illuminating gas and chemical supplies.

As most of the by-product ovens were built outside the state and at present approximately 97% of the coke manufactured comes from these ovens, production in this state has shown a steady decline since 1910 and production from bee hive ovens in 1933 amounted to but 113,082 tons.

Approximately one-fourth of the bituminous output is used by the railroads, the greater portion of the remainder being used by the iron and steel industry, for electrical production, the manufacture of coke, the manufacture of gas, and general industry. Domestic consumption amounts to approximately 15%.

For many years consumption kept pace with the increasing trend of industry, but the perfection of more efficient combustion and the development of the gas, fuel oil and water power resources have to a great extent reduced the proportionate demand.

High prices of fuel during the war resulted in the perfection of fuel-saving devices and more efficient use of coal. It is estimated that such saving alone has resulted in a 33% reduction in bituminous consumption since 1917.

The United States Bureau of Mines estimates that the various sources of power for all the energy supply used in 1932 were distributed as follows:

It is anticipated that continued and intensive developments of water power resources by governmental and other agencies will result in a still lower proportionate use of bituminous coal.

Apparently the only bright spot in the immediate future of the bituminous industry is the continued increase in the use of domestic coke.

Decreases in consumption demand and increased efficiency of production have produced a highly competitive situation which has depressed prices under normal costs of production and many operators have existed solely on the hope of improved conditions. Capital investments and conditions of existing leases have contributed to an overhead charge which could not be met with an idle mine, and in many cases it was considered that losses could be curtailed by producing at a loss.

Prices of coal at the mines from 1929 to the end of 1932 showed a continual decline. Freight rates in the meantime remained practically stationary and price decreases, due to intensive competition, fell entirely on the coal industry. In 1932 the average price of coal at the mine was but 60% of the freight rate.

The consequent chaotic condition is at variance with the importance of the industry to the general welfare and is not conducive to the proper conservation of our resources.

### Markets

It is seldom appreciated that the bulk of bituminous consumption, estimated over 70%, is confined to the small portion of our country north of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers and east of the Mississippi, due to the high degree of industrial concentration within this area. West Virginia coals have established an enviable reputation in the markets of this area, to which the greater portion of the production is shipped. In addition, the special quality of many of the coals has gained markets extending to the great northwest and the central west.

West Virginia coals have long been favored by the United States Government for bunkering purposes and they have favorable outlets in coastwise trade and for export to foreign countries.

### Origin

Coal is composed of the vegetation of primeval forests accumulated in marshy lands, successively covered by layers of mud and sand, and slowly

converted into coal throughout the ages by a metamorphism created by pressure and heat.

Below the coal measures, limestone, deposited from the waters of prehistoric seas, is found in great quantities. These measures form the great limestone belt along the southeastern tier of counties which parallel the upheaval of the Allegheny Mountains. Superimposed upon these measures and dipping toward the northwest across the state are the Carboniferous Measures containing the alternate coal seams.

In ascending order these coal seams are grouped into what are known as the Pottsville, the Allegheny, the Conemaugh, the Monongahela and the Dunkard Series.

Originally the deposits were made on a more or less horizontal plane, but movements of the earth's crust tipped them towards the northwest and erosion exposed the edges of the seams. These exposures are called outcrops.

The Lower or Pocahontas Group of the Pottsville Series outcrop along the western edge of Mercer, Summers, Greenbrier, Pocahontas and Randolph counties, and reach a depth of approximately 1,000 feet below the Ohio Valley.

The other series outcrop in successive order at intervals along the same general line across the state, the Monongahela Series outcropping along or near a line extending from the northern portion of Wayne to the northern edge of Braxton and thence to the eastern portion of Monongalia county.

The seams of coal as a general rule thin with increasing depth until they consist of mere traces and production is confined to those outcropping in the hills or at comparatively shallow depths below the valleys.

### Character of Coals

The Pottsville Series contain three different groups of coals named, in ascending order, the Pocahontas, the New River and the Kanawha Groups.

The Pocahontas and New River coals are similar in structure and chemical characteristics and constitute what may probably properly be classified as the finest group of its class in the entire world. The quality equals that of the finest Welsh coals. These coals, due to their low volatile and high carbon content, are classified as "smokeless" or semi-bituminous.

The structure is soft and columnar, the ash and sulphur content is low and the B. T. U. content averages above 15,000 per pound of coal. For coking, steaming or domestic use they acknowledge no superior, with the possible disadvantage that, due to their soft nature, the graded sizes do not stand rough transportation as well as the harder coals. The most important of the seams in these groups, due to their great abundance, are the No. 3 Pocahontas, the Sewell and the Beckley. The original estimated amount of recoverable coal from these groups mineable under present mining rate indicates that these coals will be the first to be exhausted.

The Kanawha group contains a wide variety of coals, ranging from soft coking and gas in the lower seams, through the semi-splint and gas in the middle seams, to the hard splint and block coals in the upper seams. All are properly classified as "high volatile" or bituminous, and while they are not quite as pure or as high in B. T. U. as the Pocahontas or New River coals, they are the equal if not the superior of any other coals of their kind. The physical structure and characteristics vary greatly not only between the various seams, but in the seams themselves according to geographical location, and it is difficult to generalize as to their fitness for individual markets.

The lower beds of the group to and including the Alma are generally soft in structure and similar in appearance to the Pocahontas and New River coals and are essentially high grade, all-purpose fuels, being in demand for gas producing, coking, steaming and domestic use. The Powellton and Eagle coals are particularly noted for their coking qualities.

The middle seams, with the Cedar Grove to the Chilton, inclusive, are generally semi-splint in structure, stand shipments well because of their hardness and are favored for steaming, gas and domestic use.

The upper seams, including the Stockton and Winifrede, are essentially hard splint coals and are particularly favored for gas producing, steaming and

domestic use, being marketed as the famous "Kanawha Splint." In various isolated and irregular portions of the seam these coals occur as cannel coal, which, being rich in mineral oils, were first mined for their coal content.

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Above the Pottsville Series are found the coals of the Allegheny Series. These coals occur over a wider area than the Pottsville coals. Essentially they are high grade coking and steaming coals, but as they range higher in ash and sulphur than the coals of the Pottsville Series, their use for coking purposes is limited by the extent of their impurities, but when the impurities are low the quality of coke is excellent. Their B. T. U. content is high and for steaming and domestic use, their quality is unquestioned.

Their volatile content varies greatly and they are classified as low volatile or semi-bituminous in the North Potomac basin, changing to bituminous to the west and the south.

The most important seam is the Lower Kittanning or No. 5 Block which occurs in three district types, viz:

1. Semi-bituminous in the Potomac basin.
2. Bituminous in the western areas.
3. Block or splint in the southwestern areas, where it is mined as "Kanawha Splint."

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The next in ascending order is the Conemaugh Series which contains but two seams of present commercial importance, the Bakerstown and the Elk Lick.

These coals are mined in the North Potomac basin where they are low in volatile and are classed among the Semi-Bituminous although they change to Bituminous towards the westward.

The coals are essentially coking and steaming quality and average well in B. T. U. content, but the ash and sulphur are too high for them to be used for coking to any great extent.

The Elk Lick coal contains more impurities than the Bakerstown and, except in favorable sections, but little is produced.

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The Monongahela Series lying above the Conemaugh contains the Pittsburg seam, which, because of its wide distribution and its uniform high quality, ranks as the most important seam in the state. This coal is bituminous and, although it is higher in ash and sulphur and is not quite as high in B. T. U. content as the bituminous coals of the Pottsville Series, it holds an enviable position as a steam and domestic fuel, is unexcelled as a gas producer and makes good quality of coke with proper care to exclude the sulphur bearing portions. The sulphur content, being inorganic, volatilizes to a large extent in the ovens and the remaining sulphur in the coke as a rule is not as great as the analysis of the coal would indicate.

The Redstone and Sewickley coals grade as high quality fuels for steaming and domestic purpose but are too high in ash and sulphur for cooking purposes.

The Waynesburg coal of this series is too high in ash, moisture and sulphur to be of much commercial importance at the present.

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The overlying Dunkard Series contain but one seam, the Washington, which is thin, high in ash and sulphur and of no present commercial value.

# HISTORICAL

## BATTLEFIELDS OF WEST VIRGINIA

West Virginia cannot, of course, lay claim to being designated as a land of "battlefields" in the sense that the term might be applied to some of the earlier settled sections of the United States, more especially those that lay more directly in the path of the American Civil War. Yet there has been war waged over most of her territory at various times, dating to the advent of the first white settler, a passing series of conflicts of a military or semi-military nature, touching almost three-fourths of the counties in the state.

The date of the appearance of the first white settler in what is now West Virginia is unknown. Recently discovered records in England indicate that probably pioneers had crossed the Potomac and located on or near the site of Shepherdstown as early as 1719. Morgan Morgan was recorded as a settler near Bunker Hill, Berkeley County, by 1726. From this approximate period until 1756, the white settlers were more or less at peace with the American Indian who viewed with suspicion the encroachment of the English along the Atlantic seaboard and the invasion of the French from the region of the Saint Lawrence.

Out of the groups of French and English settlers, and the struggle between them, came the French and Indian War. In this took place the first armed conflict on West Virginia soil. Among the participants were many who had reared their humble cabins beside the streams of the Eastern Panhandle. Dunmore's War followed in which the pioneers took a part, serving at the battle of Point Pleasant at the mouth of the Great Kanawha, in October, 1777, and in the expedition into the heart of the wilderness of Ohio, where at Camp Charlotte, preliminaries were agreed upon with the Indians, out of which grew the treaty of Pittsburg by which the Indians were kept quiet until 1777. This action had a profound influence upon permitting operations of the frontier soldiery in the Continental Army in the east, and gave impetus to the conquest of the Illinois country by General George Rogers Clark.

In the American Revolution, no region sent more patriotic men to the east under Washington and his subcommanders, or did more valliant defense of the "back door" of the embryonic United States, than did the men from Berkeley, Hampshire, District of West Augusta, and Botetourt counties, then embracing all of present West Virginia. These hectic days found the pioneers forced to wage war against the British from the sea and the Indians from beyond the Ohio. Indeed from the west the closing days of the Revolution blended into the so-called later Indian wars which only ended at the battle of Fallen Timbers, August 20, 1794, where General Anthony Wayne broke the power of the savage. Several conflicts at arms took place on West Virginia soil.

In the Whiskey Insurrection of 1794, hundreds of "west" Virginians rendezvoused at Moorefield, preparatory to marching into Pennsylvania. In the War of 1812 many men marched to Norfolk to defend the shores of Virginia from the English. A brigade of fifteen hundred men collected at Point Pleasant and marched across the state of Ohio, to serve in the Maumee River region under General Benjamin Harrison. In the War with Mexico, West Virginians responded to the call of the Governor of Virginia for volunteers and several hundred saw service in and around Mexico City, including a young man named Thomas J. Jackson, from Weston, who emerged from the Civil War as "Stonewall" Jackson. In October, 1859, five companies from Jefferson and

Berkeley counties saw service in the John Brown "Insurrection." In none of the episodes, however, from 1782 until 1861, did any armed engagements take place in West Virginia.

With the opening of the Civil War in 1861, active military operations and armed conflicts became quite the order for four years. Almost the first engagement of the war took place at Philippi, on June 2, 1861. Skirmishes, battles, and other affairs at arms were in evidence almost continuously until the spring of 1865. West Virginia was credited with the services of 31,884 men in the Federal army. No definite data is available as to the number in the Confederate army, but it certainly exceeded 8,500 men.

In the Spanish-American War, two or more regiments had a part, but aside from camps in the state no military operations took place. The same is true of the operations during the World War.

The following list covers all known military engagements that took place in the area now embraced in West Virginia. It is compiled from official records, and is believed to be correct:

### French and Indian War

*Battle of Great Cacapon River.*—This engagement took place on April 18, 1756, in what is now Bloomery District, Hampshire county, between a detachment of one hundred men under Captain John Mercer, from Colonel George Washington's Virginia Regiment, and a body of French and Indians.

*Battle of Lost River.*—This engagement took place in the spring of 1756, in present Lost River District, Hardy county, between a company of Virginia Frontiersmen under Captain Jeremiah Smith, and a company of fifty Indians commanded by an unknown French officer.

*Battle of the Trough.*—This engagement took place in Moorefield District, Hardy county, in 1756, between a body of seventy Indians and the Colonial Militia garrison located at Fort Pleasant.

*Attack and Massacre of Fort Seybert.*—Fort Seybert was located twelve miles northeast of Franklin, Pendleton county, on the South Fork of the South Branch of the Potomac. It was attacked on April 28, 1758, by Shawnee Indians under Captain Killbuck, and twenty-one of the defenders were killed.

### Pontiac's War

*Attack and Massacre at Muddy Creek.*—This attack took place in 1763, when Shawnee Indians commanded by Cornstalk attacked and cut off the white settlements on Muddy Creek, in what is now Blue Sulphur District, Greenbrier county.

### Dunmore's War

*Battle of Point Pleasant.*—This engagement was fought October 10, 1774, on the site of Point Pleasant, at the junction of the Great Kanawha and the Ohio Rivers, between a Virginian army commanded by General Andrew Lewis, and the warriors of the Confederated Indians Nations, under Chief Cornstalk. Regarded by many as the first battle of the American Revolution.

### During the Revolutionary War

*Attack on Fort Henry.*—This engagement took place August 31, 1777, at Fort Henry, on the site of Wheeling. The fort was defended by a Virginia garrison commanded by David Shepherd, county lieutenant of Ohio county. It was attacked by a force of three hundred and fifty Shawnee, Mingo and Wyandott Indians, who were repulsed.

*Defeat of Captain William Foreman.*—On September 27, 1777, a company of militia from Hampshire county, located at Fort Henry, and commanded by Captain William Foreman, was ambushed at the "narrows" below McMechen, and many were killed.

*Engagement at Fort Randolph.*—This engagement took place in December, 1777 at Fort Randolph, which had been erected on the site of Fort Blair, on the site of Point Pleasant. A detachment under Lieutenant Moore was attacked by a body of Shawnee Indians.

*Siege and Attack on Fort Randolph.*—This engagement took place in May, 1778, between the state garrison at Fort Randolph, under Captain William McKee, and a large body of Shawnee Indians.

*Attack on Fort Donnally.*—In May, 1778, Fort Donnally, located near present Williamsburg, Greenbrier county, was attacked by a body of Shawnee Indians, many of whom were in the attack on Fort Randolph. The fort was successfully defended by the garrison and a detachment from the fort at Lewisburg commanded by Colonel John Stuart.

*Second Siege and Attack on Fort Henry.*—This engagement took place on September 10, 1782, on the site of Wheeling. The fort was defended by Colonial militia and frontier settlers under Captain Silas Zane. It was attacked by a detachment of the Queen's Rangers from Detroit, under a Captain Pratt, and about three hundred Indian warriors, who were repulsed. Regarded as the last battle of the American Revolution.

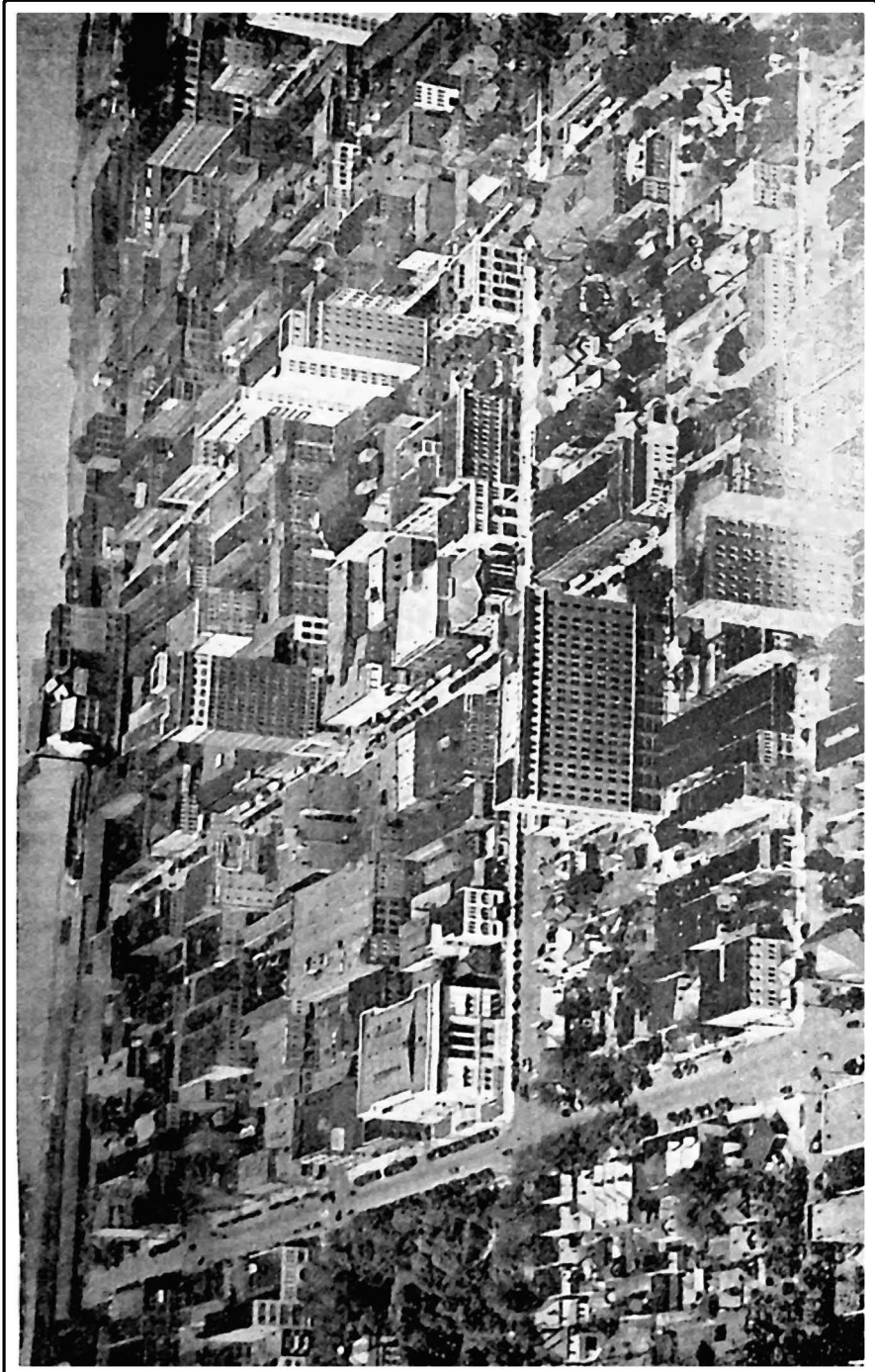

# POPULATION

## ESTIMATES OF POPULATION, WEST VIRGINIA 1934

(Compiled from data furnished by the United States Bureau of the Census)

West Virginia, originally a part of Virginia, was admitted to the Union as the thirty-fifth State in June, 1863. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 1,779,205, which represents an increase of 265,504, or 18.1 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. On July 1, 1934, the population was estimated at 1,786,000. The total land area of the State, is 24,022 square miles; water, 148 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 72, as compared with 60.5 in 1920.

The following table shows the population of West Virginia from 1870 to 1934, inclusive, together with the increase in each decade. The population at each census prior to 1870 of that part of Virginia which was later taken to form West Virginia, was as follows: 1860, 376,688; 1850, 302,313; 1840, 224,537; 1830, 176,924; 1820, 136,803; 1810, 105,460; 1800, 78,502; 1790, 55,873.

### WEST VIRGINIA MUNICIPALITIES

Cities of 10,000 or more.—There are 10 cities in the State which had a population of 10,000 or more in 1930. Huntington, with a population of 75,572, is the largest city in the State. Wheeling, with a population of 61,659, is the second city in West Virginia, and is closely followed by Charleston, the capital, with a population of 60,408. Other important cities in the order of their population are Parkersburg, Clarksburg, Fairmont, Bluefield, Morgantown, Martinsburg, and Moundsville. The combined population of Bluefield, W. Va., and the neighboring town of Bluefield, Va., is 23,245.

In comparing this percentage of increase with that shown for the decade 1910-1920, allowance should be made for the fact that the period between the censuses of 1910 and 1920 was less than a full decade, and that the period between the 1920 and 1930 censuses was more than a full decade. An increase of 16.1 per cent for 123 months (the time between January 1, 1920, and April 1, 1930) is equivalent to 15.7 percent for exactly ten years; and, the 1920 increase for 116½ months (the time between April 15, 1910, and January 1, 1920) is equivalent to 15.4 percent for 120 months. Making this adjustment, the rate of increase for the decade ending in 1930 is only slightly higher than that for the preceding decade.

Thus it becomes necessary to give equal weight to full-time and part-time wage earners in calculating the average, and therefore the average overstates somewhat the amount of full-time employment. For this reason the quotient obtained by dividing the amount of wages by the average number of wage earners can not be accepted as representing the average wage received by full-time wage earners. In making comparisons between the figures for 1931 and those for earlier years, the likelihood that the proportion of part-time employment was larger in 1931 than in former years should be taken into account.

## WHOLESALE TRADE, WEST VIRGINIA, 1933

### SUMMARY OF SALES, EMPLOYMENT, SALARIES AND WAGES

In 1933, there were 1,158 wholesale establishments in West Virginia, with net sales of \$170,269,000. These businesses employed 7,325 men and women on a full-time basis and 709 as part-timers. The total payroll distributed by the wholesale establishments of the state during the year amounted to \$11,016,000, of which \$317,000 was paid to part-time employees.

## SPEED LIMITS

The speed limit for automobiles on open country highways in West Virginia is 45 miles per hour; on suburban streets, 25 miles per hour; and, on city streets, 20 miles per hour.

An operator of a motor vehicle must be at least 15 years of age. The fee for an operator's license is one dollar, and the license is good unless and until revoked for cause.

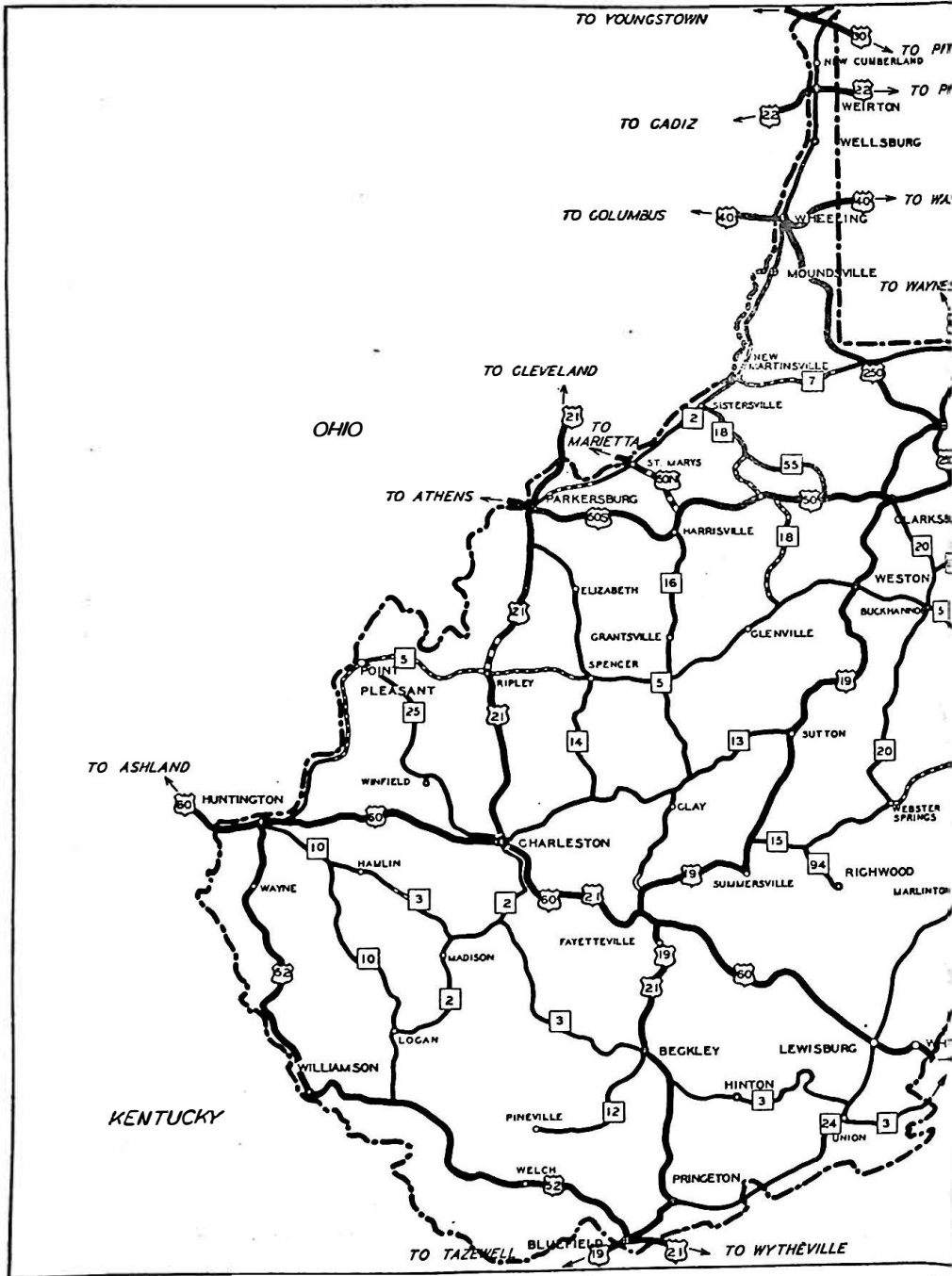

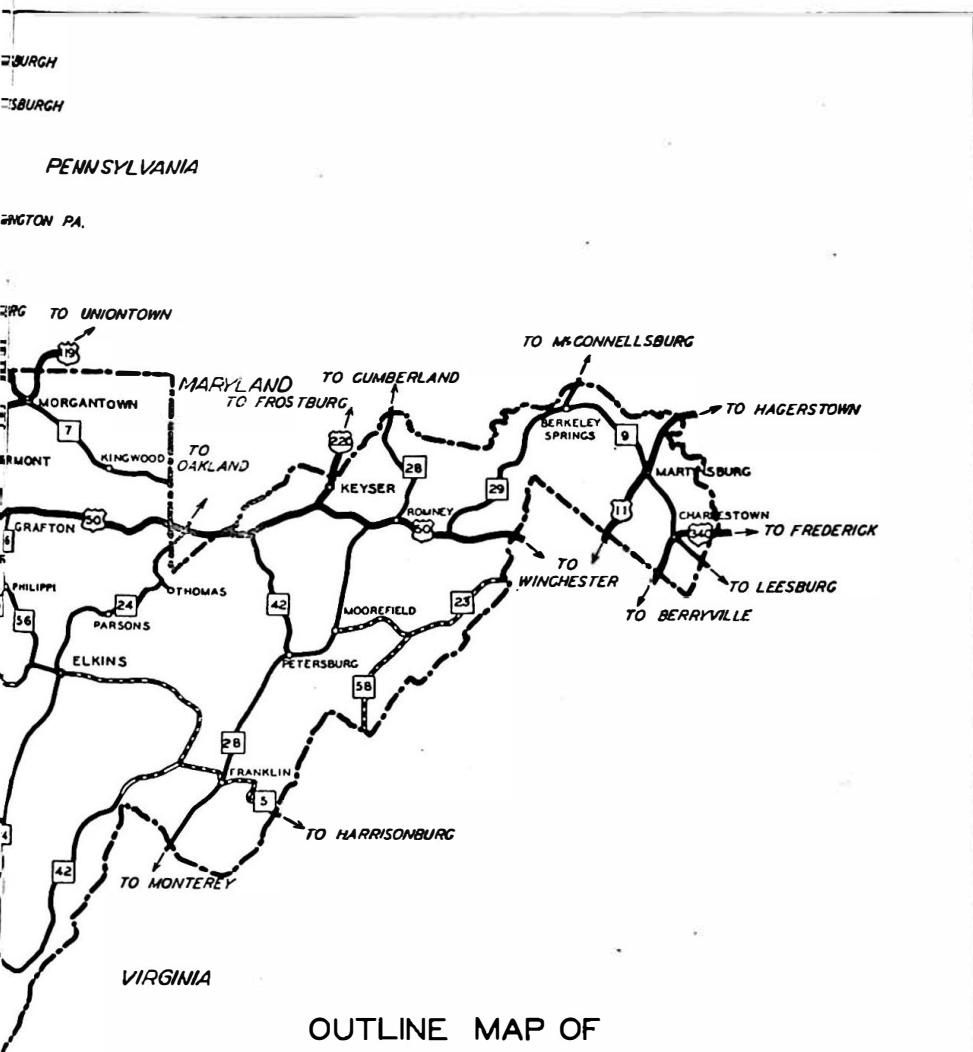

# TAXATION

## FIRST AID TO TAXPAYERS

Proof that West Virginia's system of taxation had broken down prior to the adoption by the voters of a constitutional limitation on tax rates in 1932 is contained in the list of delinquent taxpayers for the year 1932 which represented 17.9% of all real estate on the land books in West Virginia.

When the delinquencies and forfeitures of years prior to 1932, remaining unredeemed, are considered, it is a safe estimate that \$12,500,000.00 in unpaid taxes was due the state, counties, districts and municipalities. The delinquencies approximated 300,000 tracts.

The situation was crucial indeed. The mounting percentages of delinquencies and forfeitures threatened the continuance of orderly governmental functions in many parts of the state.

Cognizance was first taken of this alarming situation by the 1931 legislature which placed a moratorium on the sale by the state of property forfeited for nonpayment of taxes for the years 1929, 1930 and 1931, which moratorium extended until June 3, 1933. This action was one merely to protect the property owners, and it remained for the 1933 legislature to initiate steps looking to the relief of these overburdened citizens.

The 1933 legislature proposed a relief measure (House Bill No. 12, known as the Dyer Relief Bill) which was approved and made effective for the period of one year beginning on June 3, 1933, and included only such properties as were frozen in the State Auditor's office in the moratorium provided by the 1931 legislature on 1929, 1930 and 1931 taxes. The relief measure provided that the delinquent taxpayer might redeem during this one-year period by the payment of the face of the original tax ticket, all interest, fees and penalties being set aside.

So prompt was the response on the part of the taxpayers to take advantage of this relief plan that the 1933 legislature, in extraordinary session, not only extended the moratorium set up by the previous legislature, but granted additional relief under the provisions of House Bill No. 18, approved and made effective February 14, 1934, which extended the period of relief from June 3, 1933, to June 30, 1934, and included not only the unpaid taxes for 1929, 1930 and 1931, but the unpaid taxes for 1932 and all prior years. At the same session, the legislature extended a moratorium on sale by the state until June 3, 1935, and placed a similar moratorium on sale to private individuals for a like period.

Taxpayers faced with the loss of their homes and farms gave ready response to this relief afforded them and to date the State Auditor's office has issued redemption certificates to more than 40,000 taxpayers, and at this writing approximately 10,000 additional requests are pending in the Auditor's office on which statements are going out daily. The 40,000 redemptions already granted represent approximately 70,000 separate home sites and tracts of land.

In tax dollars, these 40,000 redemptions have brought into the state treasury to date \$2,122,889.50, which amount has been deposited by the State Auditor's office with the State Treasurer. The State Auditor's office estimates that 30,000 additional tax statements have been sent out on which no remittance has been made.

The relief measure provided for monthly distribution to the proper taxing units of these delinquent tax monies by the State Auditor, and to date the following distribution has been made: State, \$148,142.98; counties, \$1,672,863.60; municipalities, \$301,882.92.

In answer to the objection that has been raised that moratoriums and relief measures merely place a premium on delinquencies, it might be well to point out that delinquencies in 1933 are a little more than half what the delinquencies were for 1932.

Aside from the primary object of this relief measure which was a relief to the overburdened taxpayers by permitting them to regain possession of their homes and farms, the benefits have been many and varied.

Outstanding among these benefits are the following:

(a) Restoration to the tax books for taxing purposes tens of thousands of tracts of land representing millions of dollars which tends to relieve the load of taxes on properties already on the tax books by providing lower rates of taxation.

(b) Saving to the state and counties thousands of dollars in the cost of publication, which publication would have been necessary had not these tracts been redeemed in the State Auditor's office.

(c) Permitting the counties and municipalities to retire a large part of their floating indebtedness by the application of these delinquent tax monies to their unpaid obligations.

(d) Contributing to the stability of government and maintaining the morale of our citizens by making it possible for them to continue as property owners, providing means of sustenance, and preventing many of them from going on the relief rolls.

At the time of the adoption of the Constitutional Tax Limitation Amendment, more than twenty per cent of the tangible property in the state was off of the land books, which caused the remaining eighty per cent to bear the unreasonable burden in governmental costs. Every tract of land restored to the tax books tends to lighten this burden by making it possible for taxing bodies to meet their budget on a lower rate of taxation.

Every tract of delinquent and forfeited property not redeemed prior to the expiration of the moratorium on June 3, 1935, must be certified by the State Auditor to the sheriffs of the several counties where it must first be advertised before being offered for sale. Every tract so redeemed prior to June 3, 1935, means a saving in the cost of publication and when it is pointed out that there are some 225,000 tracts still unredeemed, the possibilities for saving are readily seen. At the second extraordinary session of the legislature in 1933, an act was passed, providing that the proceeds of delinquent tax collections must be applied by the counties and municipalities to their floating indebtedness other than bonded indebtedness and the relief measure has made available more than \$2,000,000.00 for this purpose, rendering it possible for most of the counties and the municipalities to retire all their outstanding contractual obligations.

The pleasing results obtained in the relief period ending June 30, 1934, have led me to the conclusion that since there is a moratorium on the sale of these properties extending until June 3, 1935, it would be a matter of wisdom for the incoming legislature, which convenes in January, to enact a new relief measure running concurrently with the moratorium and expiring on the date the moratorium ends in June, 1935.

It is possible for the state, counties and municipalities to recover an additional \$1,500,000.00 by the enactment of such a relief measure. In addition, there would be a great saving in publication costs and other expenses incident to disposing of these properties at tax sale.

## GASOLINE TAX

On April 27, 1923, the Legislature of West Virginia passed an Act effective July 26, 1923, imposing a tax of two cents per gallon on gasoline sold in West Virginia.

At the extraordinary session of 1925, on June 4th, a new gasoline tax law was passed, effective July 1, 1925, imposing a license tax on producers and sellers of gasoline—\$25.00 annually for wholesalers or distributors, and \$5.00 annually for retailers; and also an excise tax at the rate of three and one-half cents per gallon on gasoline sold or used in West Virginia. This act repealed the 1923 Act, the former act remaining effective only for the collection of all taxes and penalties accruing thereunder up to and including June 30, 1925.

On April 25, 1927, the Legislature of 1927, at the regular session, passed a new gasoline tax law, in effect from passage, which increased the excise tax from three and one-half to four cents per gallon, effective July 1, 1927. This act reduced the annual license tax on wholesalers or distributors from \$25.00 to \$5.00, and the license tax on retail dealers from \$5.00 to \$1.00. It also repealed the 1925 Act, but left that act in full effect for the collection of all taxes and penalties accruing thereunder up to and including June 30, 1927.

Under the provisions of these acts collections have been made and requisitions for refund have been issued as follows:

NOTE—The foregoing statement contains complete detailed information relating to gasoline tax collections based on cash receipts and disbursements. Payments are credited to the months in which deposited and refunds are debited to the months in which the requisitions are issued. Payments are due within thirty days after the close of the month. Payments in most cases are mailed on or about the last of the month. If they are not received until after the close of the month, they become receipts for the following month. To illustrate: A payment on sales in July is due August 30th. The remittance is mailed August 30th and received September 1st. In this statement the remittance is credited to September.

In some previous editions of the West Virginia Legislative Hand Book the figures given were based on accruals. Where that basis is used the tax is credited to the month or year during which the gasoline was sold regardless of when collected.

## WEST VIRGINIA FINANCES

The financial operations of the State of West Virginia may be compared to those of a large corporation with various departments, each large department having an executive officer familiar with the peculiar type of work done by his department. The elective state officers constitute the Board of Public Works, which board corresponds in a great measure to the board of directors of a corporation, the Governor of the state being ex-officio president of the corporation.

All financial operations of the state center in the office of the state treasurer. Funds of all kinds received by the various state departments are sent to the treasury department, which in turn deposits them in banks which have qualified as state depositories by executing and filing bonds which have been approved as to their sufficiency by the Board of Public Works, and as to their form by the attorney general. The Board of Public Works sets a limit on the amount which the Treasurer may deposit in any particular bank under its depository bond, this limit being determined by the penalty of the bond furnished by the bank and the value of the collateral pledged, or the worth of the individual signers of the bond.

The volume of work done by the treasurer's office has greatly increased during the last year due to the great number of additional items when this department is required to handle by virtue of the enactment of the consumer's sales tax and the gross income tax laws, and the payment by the state of workers on secondary roads, which payments are also handled by this department, these secondary road payrolls formerly being handled by the county courts of the fifty-five counties in the state. In addition to receiving all state revenue from all departments of the state government, and depositing the same in the various depository banks, the treasury department issues monthly an average of more than thirty thousand checks.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the investments of the workmen's compensation commission, the irreducible school fund, the board of control, the sinking fund commission, and the securities deposited by certain insurance and investment companies. The total of these securities is over forty-two million dollars.

All expenditures made by the state are limited to the amount appropriated by the legislature for particular purposes. Before any sums can be paid from the state treasury, the original invoice or pay-roll sheet must be submitted to the state auditor who determines whether or not the amount requested is a legal expenditure. If the requisition is regular in every way, the auditor issues a state warrant for the amount, which he signs and sends to the treasury department. The treasurer then signs the warrant and designates the bank thereon which is to pay the warrant after determining that the balance in the appropriation on which the warrant is drawn is sufficient. The amount of each warrant is charged against the proper appropriation account, and credited to the designated bank account.

The general supervision of the outstanding bond issues of the state of West Virginia also devolves upon the treasury department. The exchange of coupon bonds for registered bonds of the state can be arranged only in this department. Interest checks are mailed semi-annually to all holders of registered bonds of the state.

The state had outstanding, as of June 30, 1934, par value of bonds to the total value of \$87,279,400, divided as follows:

The state road bonds were issued for the purpose of constructing a permanent road system in West Virginia.

The first state road bonds were issued as of July 1, 1921, under authority of an amendment to the constitution approved in 1920, and pursuant to an act of the legislature of 1921. The total amount authorized to be outstanding at any one time under this amendment is fifteen million dollars. Any issue under this amendment must mature within thirty years from the date of issue. Maturing bonds issued under authority of the amendment may be reissued. The total amount now outstanding is \$46,892,000. Certain of the outstanding bonds mature each year until 1957.

The people of the state ratified an amendment to the constitution in 1928 which authorized the issuance of an additional thirty-five million dollars in road bonds. The first bonds under this amendment were issued as of January 1, 1929. All bonds mature serially each year until 1956, and, unlike the bonds under the fifty million dollar amendment, cannot be reissued. The total amount of this issue now outstanding is \$31,850,000.

The issuance of revenue refunding bonds was authorized by the legislature at the first extraordinary session, 1933, and the proceeds therefrom were used for the payment and discharge of indebtedness of the state existing by reason of casual deficits in the treasury to the account of the "General Revenue" and "Capitol Building" funds, occurring during that and prior fiscal years. The original issue was \$5,000,000 par value. The interest is payable semi-annually and one-twentieth of the original issue, or \$250,000, must be retired each year, beginning on July 1, 1934.

The Virginia Debt bonds were issued by the state of West Virginia in order to pay its share of an old debt of the state of Virginia existing at the time West Virginia was formed. The Supreme Court of the United States in 1911 set the sum that West Virginia should assume, and, in 1919, bonds to the value of \$13,500,000 were sold to pay this debt. The sum of \$675,000 of the principal must be paid annually until 1939, when the final payment on this issue will be made.

In addition to funded indebtedness, the state occasionally has outstanding short term notes, usually running from two to six months, issued to meet casual deficits in the revenue. These notes are executed by the Governor under authority of the constitution of West Virginia conferring upon him the power to borrow money to meet "casual deficits" for a term not exceeding eighteen months. Such notes are greatly desired by banking institutions and usually bear a low rate of interest.

A study of the sources from which the state derives its chief revenue is interesting, and there is given below a brief list of the amounts estimated to be received annually under the tax laws of the state in effect at this time:

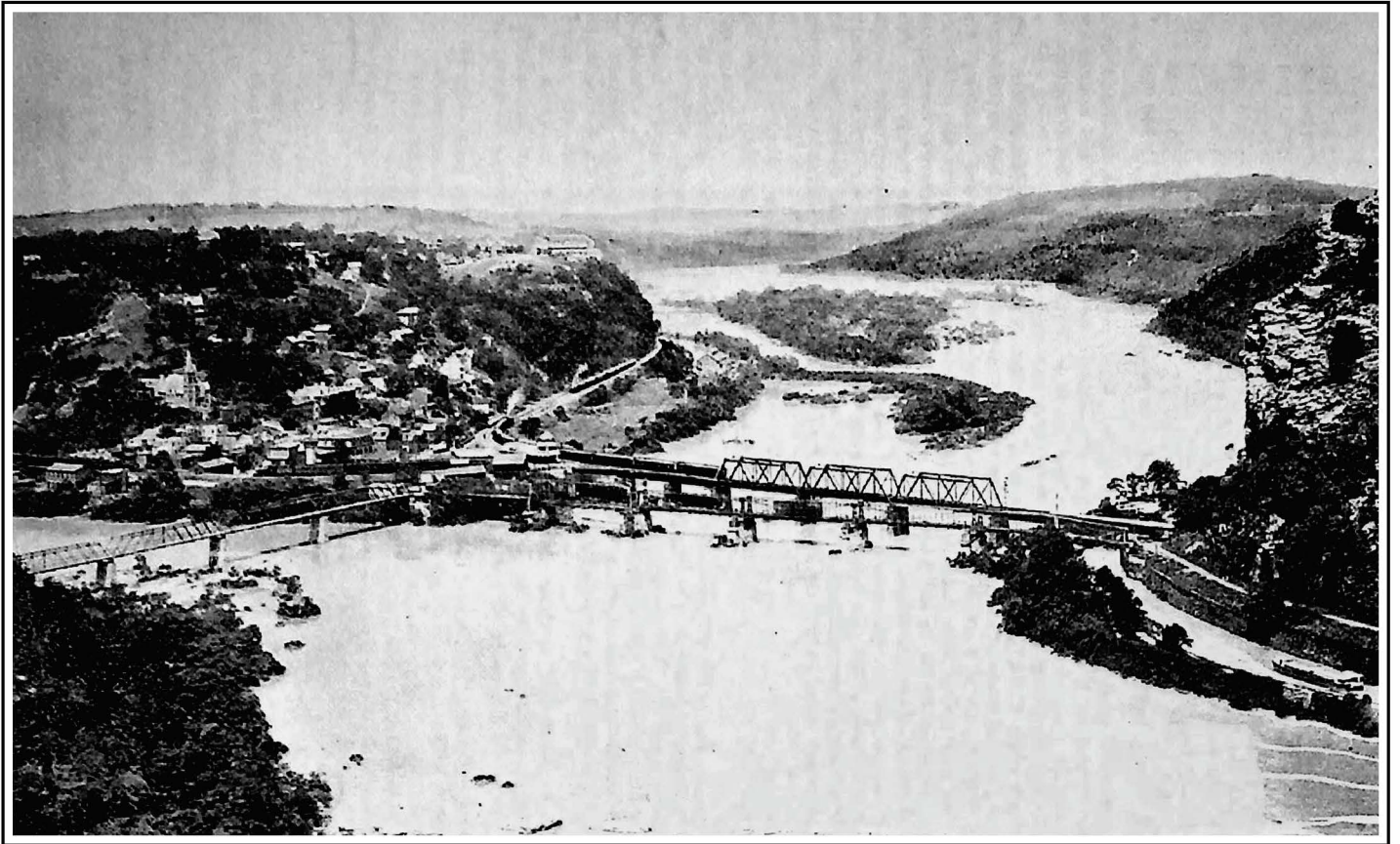

The figures given above are only estimates, and though not intended as a balance sheet of the exact status of the state's finances, they are considered substantially correct, and will give the citizens of the state a brief picture of the receipts and disbursements of our state government.

We are glad to be able to state, with justifiable pride and gratification, that the financial problems of the state have been met in a reasonably satisfactory manner, and our government is now operating with a balanced budget. The credit of the state is outstanding among conservative investors, as evidenced by the investment of trust funds of eastern states, life insurance companies, etc., in West Virginia state bonds. All West Virginia state bonds are now quoted above par in the eastern bond markets. Our state occupies a unique distinction among the states of the union in that none of our state, county, district or municipal bonds are in default either as to principal or interest. We are informed that only one other state in the union can match this record.

#### APPORTIONMENT ACT OF 1863

By an act of the legislature passed September 10, 1863, the State of West Virginia—for the purposes of congressional representation—was divided into three districts, as follows:

*First District*—Hancock, Brooke, Ohio, Marshall, Wetzel, Tyler, Pleasants, Doddridge, Harrison, Ritchie, Wood, Wirt, Gilmer, Calhoun and Lewis counties.

*Second District*—Taylor, Marion, Monongalia, Preston, Tucker, Barbour, Upshur, Webster, Pocahontas, Randolph, Pendleton, Hardy, Hampshire, Berkeley and Morgan counties.

*Third District*—Kanawha, Jackson, Mason, Putnam, Cabell, Clay, Wayne, Logan, Boone, Braxton, Nicholas, Roane, McDowell, Wyoming, Raleigh, Fayette, Mercer, Monroe and Greenbrier counties.

### NATIONAL REEMPLOYMENT SERVICE

The National Reemployment Service is an emergency agency in the United States Employment Service, Department of Labor, financed exclusively by the federal government. It was inaugurated to perform certain duties authorized by the Special Board for Public Works.

During the period of activity of the Civil Works Administration from November 20, 1933, to March 31, 1934, the number of offices and their employed personnel greatly increased. With the discontinuance of that program on March 31, 1934, a reorganization of the National Reemployment Service in the field was instituted, consolidating county offices into district offices. Each county outside the one in which is located the district office is served by a clerk sent to the county from the district office for such temporary period as may be required by a public-works project.

# FEDERAL HOMESTEADS

## ARTHURDALE HOMESTEADS

(The federal government's first subsistence homestead project is now beginning to operate. The location is at Reedsville, West Virginia.)

Fifty miners, who suffered much during the peak of the depression, are at Arthurdale, in Preston county, where these men, their wives, and children are living in modern, well equipped houses which they are buying from the government. A few years ago they called dingy, poorly furnished mining camp shacks "homes," but today the story is a different one.

When the Arthurdale homestead project is in full swing, 200 families will be living in homes located on five-acre plots of rich farm land. By next summer, according to plans of the Interior Department, the next 150 houses will be ready for use.

The Government is selling the homesteaders houses and land at an average cost of \$4,500, the payments over a 20-year period averaging \$19.50 a month. No interest is added, and it is interesting to note that the cost of buying a homestead is little more than the amount of house rent that is usually paid by a miner living in West Virginia.

What is the homesteader buying? He receives a house of five to seven rooms, five acres of improved land, fertilized and planted last spring; individual well with electric pump to supply running water; modern sewage system and septic tank; surfaced road leading to house; basement in house, with hot air furnace and laundry facilities; and home furnishings.

"Reedsville Experimental Community," as Arthurdale is officially known at Washington, is one of more than 60 homestead projects in various stages of development, but none has been given more attention by the Interior Department than the one in Preston County. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's personal interest in a plan to assist jobless miners in Northern West Virginia to become better citizens has caused thousands of tourists to visit the No. 1 homestead community. During the past summer, records at Arthurdale show, more than 50,000 persons from every state in the union and 10 foreign countries visited the farm.

Plans for the operation of one or two private factories are now being considered by the administration, and when these plants are in operation the 200 homesteaders will be provided part-time work which will give them cash to be used to make payments on their homes and land, and to buy necessities. Food will not be a problem, since the fertile soil at Arthurdale will produce garden and farm crops in abundance. This year, the 50 families now living on the project have been able to preserve an average of a thousand quarts of home-grown vegetables.

Until the factories are in operation, the homesteaders will be given work on construction crews that will erect the next 150 houses. More roads will be built, and additional land will be drained and prepared for farming by the summer of 1935.

The Arthurdale Homestead project was located in Preston County for two reasons; first, because more than two years ago, a group of West Virginia University Extension Division workers and relief leaders in Monongalia county,

which adjoins Preston county, saw the need of a back-to-the-land movement; and, second, because Mrs. Roosevelt, while on a trip through the Monongalia mining sections, was convinced that the miners who were willing to help themselves should be given an opportunity to improve their living conditions.

Nat T. Frame, former dean of the College of Agriculture of West Virginia University, with the assistance of Bushrod Grimes of Morgantown, now representative of the Interior Department in charge of the Arthurdale agricultural program, relief organizations, including the American Friends, and several far-sighted Morgantown business and professional men decided to launch a back-to-the-farm movement for the benefit of men who had, during the boom times, worked in the coal mines.

So it was that this rehabilitation movement now being carried on by the government was launched by those leaders who did not two years ago have any idea where they would obtain the land necessary to complete the picture they hoped to paint.

Garden clubs were formed in Monongalia county, with Mr. Grimes as the leader. The purpose, other than making it possible for unemployed miners to provide themselves with the necessities of life, was to determine which men could "make good" if placed on the land under proper supervision. Several hundred were interviewed by relief workers who were coached in the art of asking questions about farming by experts connected with the Extension division.

After the interviews were completed and the men had been examined to determine their capabilities, a list of more than 500 men, all with families, was compiled by Mr. Frame and Mr. Grimes. These 500 persons they decided could, if given the opportunity and placed on fertile soil, rehabilitate themselves.

Being informed that President Roosevelt planned to have the Interior Department assist financially in a national homestead movement, the Morgantown leaders listed more than 200 tracts of land in North Central West Virginia which would be available for the purpose.

This data, and many other facts, was presented to the First Lady when she visited Monongalia County, as the guest of a mining company superintendent, during the summer of 1933. She was impressed, so much so, in fact, that she

went directly to the President and explained the work that had been done by those interested in the new event in Monongalia county.

Realizing that the homesteading movement should be under way, and pleased that at least one community was in position to allow the government to cooperate, Mr. Roosevelt directed Secretary Ickes of the Interior Department to carry out the initial back-to-the-land movement in West Virginia, for the benefit of the miners in Monongalia and nearby counties.

Stranded because of the shifts in the coal mining industry in West Virginia, the settlers will be fortunate in having agricultural experts on hand to advise them how best they can make their land yield the most. Many of them already have been through two seasons of subsistence gardening which saved them and their families from privation after their prospects of reemployment in the soft coal mines vanished.

The Arthurdale project will be financed out of a fund of 25 million dollars set up by Congress in the public works section of the National Recovery Act. It will be the start of a government movement to measure the possibilities of decentralizing industry where over-urbanization has been emphasized during the depression.

All work and no play? No! There will be one or more community churches at Arthurdale, and the men, women and children will be taught to entertain themselves. West Virginia noted for its 4-H club activities, its farm women's clubs and other organizations of a similar type will teach the settlers modern recreation methods.

Instead of providing a community motion picture theater, some of the homesteaders will be taught how to produce plays for the entertainment of the others. There will be a part of the more rugged sections of the land set aside as a park to be shared by all of the men and their families. In short, Arthurdale Homesteads will be a model town, with its schools, places of worship, and out-door recreation playspots.

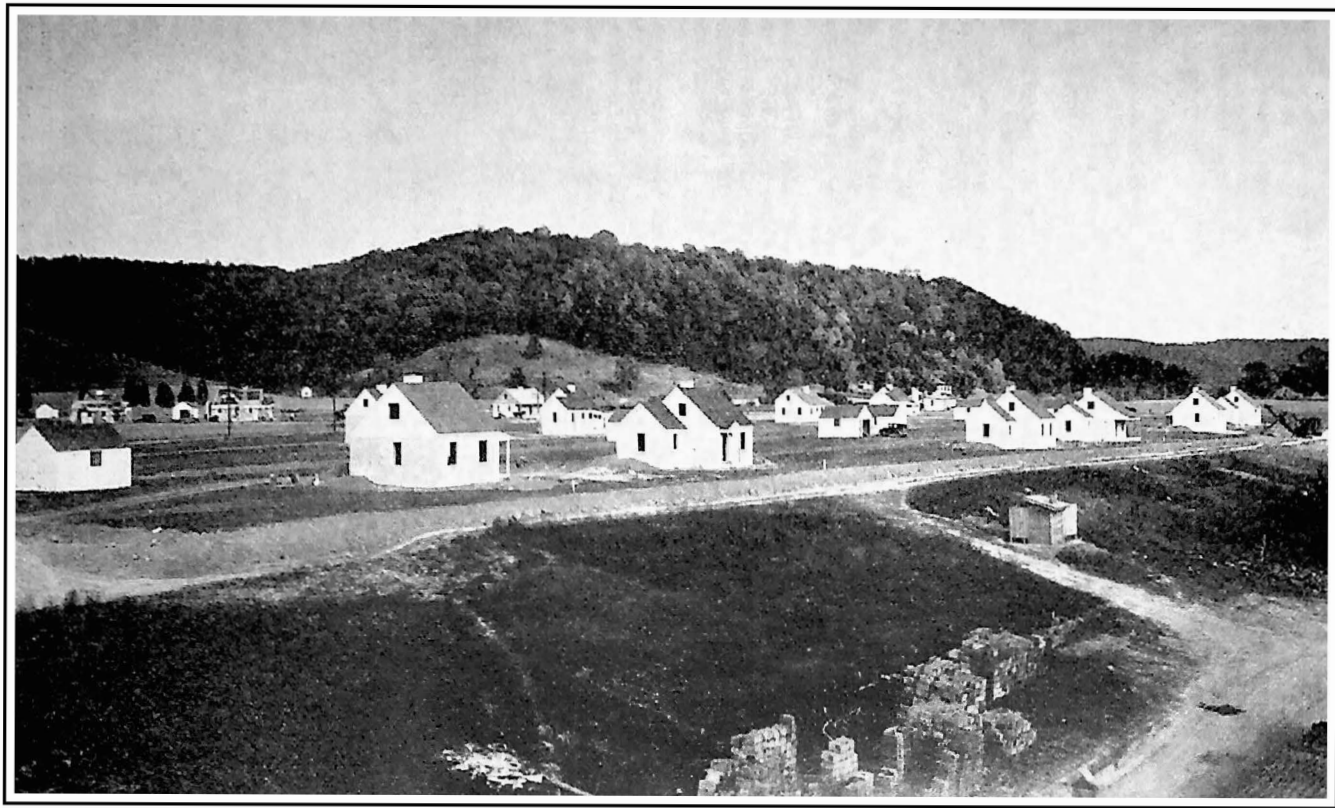
When the Arthurdale plan was first worked out, it was believed by some Federal officials that a high fence should be placed around the entire 1,132 acres, marking it "Government Property." However, it has been definitely decided to build Arthurdale into Preston and surrounding counties, such as has been the case at Jackson's Mill, in Lewis County, the nerve center of many rural activities in West Virginia, and Oglebay Park, near Wheeling, which is rapidly developing into West Virginia's leading recreation spot.

The influence of Arthurdale, it is believed, will be of great benefit to the surrounding rural territory, and every effort will be made to make it impossible for non-homesteaders to look upon the land as government property being utilized by miners and their families who once were on the verge of starvation.

A discussion of the back-to-the-land movement would not be complete without an explanation of Mrs. Roosevelt's visit to Monongalia county last summer. The First Lady, coming to West Virginia unannounced and unheralded by advance publicity, inspected many mines and homes of the men who remove the black diamonds from West Virginia's rich hills, and thoroughly checked the relief projects carried on in the many camps during the years of the depression.

It has been reported in many newspapers that Mrs. Roosevelt went to West Virginia, found thousands of miners starving and requested the President to start the homesteading movement without delay in North Central West Virginia. Such, however, was not the case. The miners, although jobless, were not starving. Their wives and children were not being deprived of the necessities of life. Relief organizations not only had been spending much money to relieve suffering, but they had been carrying out programs of self-help. Land being plentiful in and near the mining camps, the families were taught how to plant and raise garden stuffs.

Mrs. Roosevelt, when informed that these men, jobless and broken in spirit by long months of idleness, were willing to help themselves, immediately realized that such persons deserved assistance. She felt certain that a friendly administration at Washington could be called upon to lend a hand and would not refuse.

Next year, with Arthurdale as a center, and with the State University at Morgantown cooperating, subsistence gardening will be emphasized more than in the past. Idle farms will be leased, and if the hopes of those in charge of the project are carried out some of the families will be given opportunities to purchase a few acres of land. The government is expected to work out a plan to make it possible for the back-to-the-land movement to be carried on by individuals who are not able, because of lack of space, to be moved to Arthurdale or one of the other homesteads yet to be established.

Some critics of the Arthurdale movement have been heard to remark that it is just "another pipe dream," and that with the changing of administrations in Washington it will be wiped out because of the lack of interest on the part of future government authorities. However, under the plan the government will gradually withdraw its attention from the homesteads; Uncle Sam will help these families to begin their tasks of rehabilitation, and once the homesteaders start to make payments on their homes and land they can be counted upon to become independent of any government assistance.

The homesteaders have proved, through their garden club activities and other projects, that they are capable of helping themselves if given the opportunity. It is the belief of those who are devoting their efforts to make Arthurdale a model community, not only next year but during the years to come, that the Mountain State miners will develop their homesteads into a community that will become an example to be followed by similar groups in West Virginia and other states.

The eyes of those interested in the rehabilitation of Americans unfortunate enough to have been buried in the slough of desperation for several years are focused on Arthurdale Homesteads. Just as early pioneers fought their way to independence, it is certain that those West Virginia miners who are being lifted from their camp shacks by a real group of friends in Washington will succeed in their pioneering movement that will become a memorial to a group of people who may have been down for the count of nine but are able to come back for a glorious finish that will insure them a life of happiness and health during the coming years.

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## PUTNAM COUNTY HOMESTEADS

In the Spring of 1934, plans were approved by the federal government for a rehabilitation housing community to be located in Putnam county, West Virginia, about twenty-eight miles northwest of Charleston. The undertaking is part of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration program. It won the approval of the government by its soundness as a self-liquidating proposition. The eventual return of every dollar advanced by the government to finance the project is assured. One of the outstanding factors in the scheme is the rehabilitation of 150 families who have heretofore been entirely dependent on some form of public relief. Maximum opportunity will be afforded each homeseeker and his family to build and establish a more satisfactory and productive life under conditions which mean a decided improvement over those of the past.

The federal government will lend to the state, through the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, funds necessary to finance the project; the state, in turn, will lend these funds to a corporation known as The West Virginia Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, which will own and control the community and homes until they are paid for in full by the homeseekers. Payments will extend over a period of fifteen years.

The utmost care is being used in selecting the prospective homeseekers. Today more than half the homeseekers already selected are living on the project during the construction period, engaged in skilled and common labor, their earnings being apportioned between credits towards home ownership and the actual maintenance of themselves and families. The permanency of each homeseeker

as part of the community is contingent upon his taking advantage of the opportunities offered and obtaining reasonable results in whatever line of production he is to take part. A close supervision is being kept of those already selected with regard to their industry and adaptability to community life. Those who do not evince a disposition to avail themselves of the opportunity to earn a home and to cooperate in community life will be replaced. Already the policy of having the homeseekers live on the project and take part in the construction of the houses and help with the preliminary farm work is serving as a test by which undesirables may be eliminated in the early stages of the project.

By the time the project is completed and functioning as an independent community, those whose main object is disclosed as seeking an easy berth and a donation from the government will have been weeded out and only those will remain who have undoubtedly demonstrated an earnest desire and a fixed determination to establish themselves in the community and earn a living that will be commensurate with the effort expended. In the natural course of events, during the period of amortization of the homestead indebtedness, there will undoubtedly be further eliminations of those originally selected. Such credits as may have been built up during the tenancy of those eliminated will be applied as rental and such mutual obligations between the homeseeker and the government as may have accrued will be adjusted upon an equitable basis.

Another important factor entering into the question of the eventual liquidation of the project is the type and design and construction of the houses. In an effort to improve over the usual frame structures, and with an eye to economy in both initial and upkeep costs, cinder concrete block is being used for all walls, exterior and interior, the outside being waterproofed as well as decorated by a thin coat of white cement, and the interior given a most attractive finish by slightly tinted cement sprayed on the block. This type of building, besides being better insulated against adverse weather conditions, is more satisfactory to the occupants, and will result in a much less rapid depreciation than would be inevitable with wood construction. Provision has also been made to increase the size of the houses at a minimum cost.

Thirty of the houses have two rooms and bath, thirty have four rooms, and ninety have three rooms. All have a large loft, or attic, accessible by stairs, floored, ventilated by windows and made habitable in summer or winter by insulation board. From two to three rooms can be finished in this space at any time with very small effort. In addition to this, each house, as originally built, is a unit nucleus designed for adding one or more rooms when desired. A part of the prospective labor activity will be assigned to the building of these additions. Two units of the plant which has been turning out the cinder concrete block for the original house construction will be retained by the community as one of the outside industries which are proposed, and this will furnish to the residents, at cost, the material which will quickly and economically convert the small original house units into larger and more commodious homes. In this way there is every provision made for an increase in the value of the homes instead of the usual expected depreciation.

Of course, once the desirability of the type of house is assured, a further problem is that of enabling the homeseeker to earn enough to meet the expense of buying and maintaining it. This matter has also been given careful consideration. A plot of ground, one acre in size, is included with every house, and upon this the homeseeker will be encouraged to raise whatever garden produce and fruit that may be needed. Each home will have a storage barn, adaptable to use as a garage also if occasion demands, and an 8x10 chicken house. Every opportunity is afforded, therefore, for raising the bulk of the food requirements and storing surplus for the winter months. All of which, however, will be in addition to some regular form of employment provided for every man in the community.

As one approaches the community from any one of the three lines of transportation, namely, by boat on the Kanawha River, train on the New York Central Railroad, or bus or automobile on State Route No. 25, it is seen at once that the community consists of more than simply the 150 one-acre farms. It contains about 2200 acres of comparatively flat land, extending a mile and one-half along the highway, and stretching from the river into the lovely wooded



hills. That part of the land which extends into the hills will be gradually cleared, as is found desirable, for grazing land. The fertile river bottom land edging the Kanawha River and consisting of about 500 acres is ideal for cultivation and is to be used for a community farm which will employ approximately fifty of the men during the farming season. This section has been planted with soy beans and rye for turning under to further enrich the land and next year will be devoted to the raising of vegetables, berries, etc., including a small nursery to supply the needs of artistry in the landscape. A fifty-acre semi-circle bordering about one-half mile on the highway will be kept attractively green by successive plantings of alfalfa for feeding the cattle. An agricultural expert has been at work for three months, and under his direction 1,200 tons of lime already have been used in scientific preparation of the ground for future beneficial results.

A dairy of sufficient capacity to care for the needs of the community will be built and maintained, giving employment to community members. Besides the community cattle, hogs will also be raised.

All produce in excess of the current needs of the community will be sent to the community canning plant which will employ others of the residents and insure an all-year supply of food for the community.

In addition to the cinder concrete block plant and the stores, barber shop, moving picture theatre, etc., several other productive agencies providing employment are under consideration, but details have not yet been worked out. Ample provision is being made, therefore, to allow the residents of the community to be as industrious as their inclination dictates. Those who do not show the proper disposition toward work will be removed to make room for more ambitious homeseekers, and all will be rewarded in proportion to their labors. A system of credits and allowances will be in effect by which the families will receive remuneration in some form for all work performed, the payments on the houses having priority, of course, over any other expenditures. Any who fail to earn the minimum amount required to meet these reasonable payments (averaging between \$16.00 and \$25.00 a month) under normal conditions, will be eliminated.

It is apparent, then, that the government investment has been thoroughly safeguarded. Nevertheless, all this is naturally dependent upon the success of the community as a happy environment of fulfillment and self-realization on the part of its inhabitants. Plans contributing toward this end have been considered. First of all, the men who are joining the community are being removed from charity lists and given a fair chance to reestablish their self-respect by entering into a fair competitive economical life with others of their own class. The government experts who will be in charge of the community farm, dairy, stock farm, canning plant, cinder concrete block plant, etc., will give instructions to the homeseekers which will enable them to develop efficiency in their new tasks. The same will also be true of the outside industries. The opportunity to learn, which is always one that gives personal satisfaction as well as providing practical advantages, will not be limited to the industrial occupations. Besides the day school for children, which Putnam County is to build, arrangements are being made for classes in adult instruction, beginning with reading and writing and supplementing such limited education as has previously been attained.

Inspection of the community will convince even the most critical that nothing has been neglected which would contribute to the comfort, contentment, and welfare of the homeseekers. Effective landscaping of the individual plots, as well as the community as a whole, contributes to the attractiveness of the surroundings. The community building and shops, centrally located, are of artistic design, of the early American period, as are the school, dairy building, cannery and other industrial buildings. The neat little white houses with their brightly colored shutters are of similar harmonizing design, no two exactly alike.

A glimpse inside the houses discloses the same artistic simplicity. There will be found plain batten doors with black iron "strap" hinges, ceilings which are uncovered joists and floor boards of the loft above, stained and suggesting the old fashioned beamed ceilings, and wide board chestnut floors. Kitchens and bathrooms are equipped with modern fixtures, all houses having the convenience of hot and cold water obtained and pumped from two large community wells.

via an adequate storage tank. A modern sewerage system has been constructed, electricity provided and gas made available from wells on the property. Surely such complete and artistic homes cannot fail to stir a sense of satisfaction, appreciation and pride in the hearts of their prospective owners.

A large athletic field will afford a meeting place where the community spirit may be further instilled into the lives of all residents. Athletics of all kinds will be encouraged in community life and in competition with other communities.

It is apparent, therefore, that the entire program for insuring both the self-liquidation of the project and the successful rehabilitation of needy West Virginians has been painstakingly worked out. Pride in the ultimate results should extend not only to the West Virginia Emergency Relief Administration, under whose direction the work has been carried on, the West Virginia Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, which has given its support and counsel, but to all West Virginians who have pride in seeing their home state assume such an important part in this great Federal humanitarian experiment.

# RESUME OF 1934

The year 1934 goes into history as the proving ground, or period, for the history-making accomplishment in government of hectic 1933. It began, it is true, with the governmental structure which was designed in 1933 still incomplete, but ten months out of the year's twelve were lived under the accomplished structure and only the first two were required to carry out the work of the revision of 1933.

The year began with the 1933 legislature still in session, carried over from before Christmas, and with the tremendous task of writing a valid tax-enabling act still before it. Twice during 1933 the legislative enactments for the collection of direct taxes under the tax limitation amendment had been declared unconstitutional. On September 19th of that year, the supreme court ruled invalid an act that permitted excess levies for debts, and just before Christmas it likewise invalidated a second act permitting the state to assume the bonded indebtedness of local government.

As 1934 arrived, the state and every county, district and municipality in it was still without the legal means of collecting the direct revenue to sustain its government. Governments were operating on credit, the legislature seemed to have exhausted all the ideas upon the subject that were at hand, and the crisis that had existed from the time of the adoption of the tax amendment was intensified with each passing day. It was a discouraging beginning, but the break was not long in coming. Embodying the principle of the first enabling act, but with modifications, an act was drawn allocating 70 per cent of the maximum revenues collected to current expenses of the several governments—county, state and municipal—and 30 per cent to the payment of their debts. The act was similar to the original act in that it permitted excess levies, over the 30 per cent, where they were required for debt services; but the theory was that the spirit of the amendment had been carried out in holding current expense levies to 70 per cent of the total available. It was pointed out, furthermore, that on a state-wide basis, the ratio of current expense and debt requirements was 70-30.

The act was passed by the legislature with the hope that it would stand up under the exacting scrutiny of the supreme court. It did, and the task for which the legislature had been in session many long weeks was accomplished.

There was another epochal enactment by the legislature in those early days of 1934 which was part of the solution to the tax problem. It was the two per cent consumers sales tax, which was ultimately to have the most curious history of any tax in the annals of the state. The law went through the legislature to the accompaniment of the direst of warnings from all sides of both houses of reprisals at the hands of the voters. It was freely stated that the sales tax ranked first among all objectionable laws. It was enacted only in realization of the pressing needs of the state, and went into effect April 1st. The results were amazing. Revenue poured in from the pennies collected on every retail sale over five cents, averaging better than half a million dollars a month. And, the people liked it. So slight was the protest against the extra tax, so universal was its acceptance, that it soon became known as the most popular as well as one of the most productive the state has ever had. Its greatest benefit, of course, was that it made possible the prompt payment of teachers' salaries (the purpose for which it was imposed), and for the first time in months the school teachers were not threatened with payless paydays.

Another indirect revenue measure, enacted in 1933, went into effect in 1934. It was the gross income tax, and its history was somewhat the opposite of the sales tax record. It has not been productive of any great amount of revenue,

and has apparently been unpopular from the beginning. The constitutionality of the law was attacked in the courts, but its legality was upheld by the supreme court of appeals of West Virginia and the United States Supreme Court.

As has been said, the year 1934 was a proving ground for the enactments of the legislature of 1933. With a tax collection act at last approved and in operation and the necessary indirect revenue measures on the books, the legislature finally adjourned and the state settled back to live under its remade government. Funds flowed in from direct and indirect revenues, the state began to pay its debts, the school and road systems functioned smoothly and after months of turmoil and uncertainty there was, at last, a period of peace and fiscal tranquility.

For a period of about three months after the legislature adjourned, late in March, people thought little about politics and less about government. By late June, the political breezes were blowing and by the time that month was out the storm signals were flying from all points. With the off-year primary election scheduled for early August, one race stood out from all the rest. It was, of course, the contest for the Democratic nomination for United States senator, with seven candidates in the field.

As the primary election drew near, the race narrowed down to Rush D. Holt against the field. It is history, of course, that Holt won the nomination by a resounding majority to enter the campaign for election against Senator Henry D. Hatfield, whom the Republicans had renominated without serious opposition. Running on the Democratic ticket with Mr. Holt were all six incumbent congressmen from West Virginia, each opposed in his respective district by a Republican nominee.

The election campaign was fought throughout the state, as it was throughout the nation, on the issue of the New Deal. With distinct liberal tendencies, Mr. Holt campaigned on a platform of 100 per cent support for the policies of President Roosevelt. Senator Hatfield, a known opponent of the New Deal, scarcely needed to reiterate his position. The issue was clear-cut, but no more so than the outcome was decisive. Going to the polls some 600,000 strong, the electorate gave to Mr. Holt a majority of about 68,000 and reelected each incumbent Democratic representative. The Democratic victory extended into nearly every local contest, and, with the coming of 1935, when the newly elected candidates take office, Democratic control of the government throughout West Virginia will probably be more complete than ever before in the state's history. The legislature, of course, remained heavily Democratic in both branches as a result of the election, although the Democrats lost a few seats in the house. Its majority of 24 to 6 in the senate remains unchanged.

There were other results of the election, one of them of the greatest importance. This was the repeal, by a margin of over 39,000 votes, of the state's 20-year-old prohibition amendment and the substitution for it of an amendment directing the legislature to make laws for the sale and manufacture of liquor. The amendment forbids saloons or public drinking places, but otherwise leaves with the legislature full power for enacting a liquor-control system. As the year closed, it was one of the major problems confronting the legislature that soon was to meet.

Two other amendments to the constitution were adopted by the voters, and a third was defeated. One of the two adopted provides that the state's seven elective officers take office on the second Wednesday in January instead of on March 4, and also makes of the commissioner of agriculture a constitutional instead of a statutory officer. The other amendment is the land book assessment amendment, which provides for separate assessment of undivided interests in property. The defeated amendment would have levied a capitation tax on women, and would have given to the legislature the right to make payment of the capitation tax a requirement for voting.

What else happened in 1934?

There was the continuing problem of unemployment and the continuing operation of the government's vast system of relief. The CWA, which was the work-relief system when the year began, was abandoned in favor of a simpler system of relief and work-relief, not entirely dissimilar from the CWA. There was, meanwhile, an effort among relief agencies to make as many families as possible

self-supporting. Wherever possible, families on the relief rolls were required to have a "subsistence garden," while rural rehabilitation was a part of the program that became increasingly important. Many new and interesting projects were launched to provide work for the unemployed and at the same time, to provide the necessities of life to the impoverished. It was a sincere effort to put relief on a sounder basis, and those in charge of the system worked day and night to transform their vast structure into a well-planned and smoothly-functioning machine.

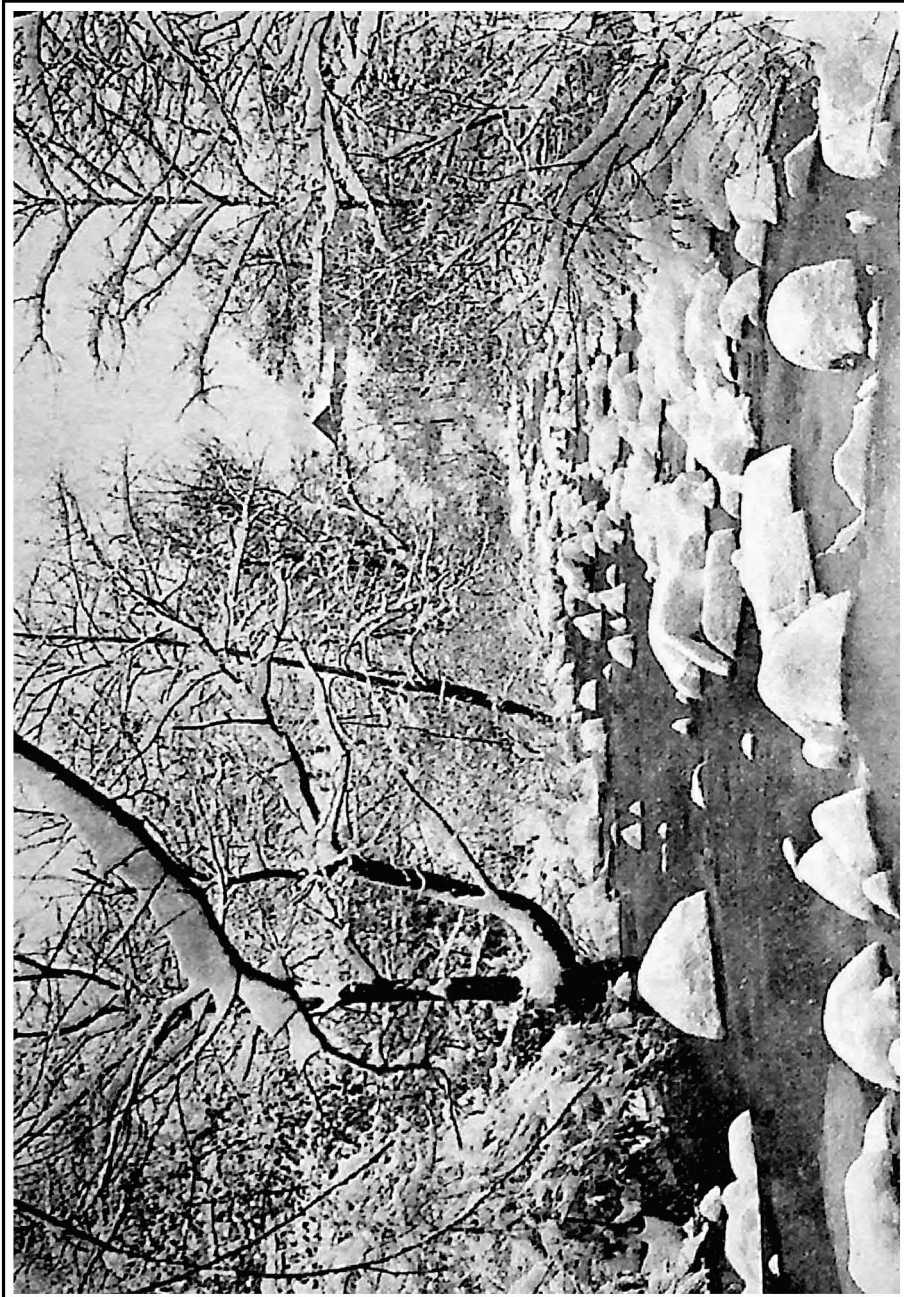
The recovery agencies, too, represented another arm of the government that toiled unremittingly through 1934 in West Virginia. Operating under the general direction of a central office at Charleston they aided businesses in putting into effect the codes of fair competition, loaned money to home owners, provided grants for public improvements, aided in the improvement of homes and performed other functions under the New Deal. To the state, incidentally, came the honor of being the scene of the celebration of the first anniversary of the NRA. In a ceremony arranged through the efforts of the state NRA compliance director, F. W. McCullough, and his aides, at which General Hugh S. Johnson, then administrator, and Donald R. Richberg were guests of honor, the anniversary was fittingly commemorated at Charleston.

There was another interesting venture of the federal government in the field of relief and recovery in which 1934 will be an important year. This was the launching of the homestead projects, one at Reedsville and another at Red House, in Putnam County. The former project was completed during the year, and the latter, begun about mid-year, was nearing completion as 1934 drew to a close. Model communities, they are planned as settlements for "stranded populations," *i. e.*, families from industrial centers who are out of work. On the homesteads, it is believed they will be self-supporting.

Business in West Virginia maintained during 1934 the general improvement that came in 1933. The coal industry struck a fair average for the year and manufacturing likewise kept its head well above the water, but the real gains were in retail business. With higher prices and an improved volume, the 1934 sales records were expected to show the best year in the last half dozen.

Death during the year laid a heavy hand upon the state senate of West Virginia. Early in the year, while the legislature was still in session, Senator Kenna K. Hyre died at his home in Ripley following an operation. Later in the year, some months after adjournment, Senator John C. Myers died after a long illness at his home in Moundsville. Both had been popular and useful members of the senate, and their deaths were deplored. A sequel to Senator Hyre's death was the appointment of his widow, Mrs. Hazel Y. Hyre, to serve in his place. She served the few days until adjournment, the first woman ever to occupy a seat in the senate, but did not seek election to the post, and her term expires January 1, 1935.

Thus the year 1934. Begun with the problems of 1933 still much in evidence, it saw their solution and witnessed tranquility in the state government supplant confusion. It was a history making election, and the end of state prohibition. The year ends with the outlook for 1935 even brighter than 1934's horizon had been when 1933 faded into history.
