**Sec. 8. Awards for claims against the state.** — There are hereby appropriated for fiscal year 2025, from the fund as designated, in the amounts as specified, general revenue funds in the amount of \$1,647,648 special revenue funds in the amount of \$32,521, and state road funds in the amount of \$386,856 for payment of claims against the state.

Sec. 9. Appropriations from general revenue fund surplus accrued. — The following items are hereby appropriated from the state fund, general revenue, and are to be available for expenditure during the fiscal year 2025 out of surplus funds only, accrued from the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this section

It is the intent and mandate of the Legislature that the following appropriations be payable only from surplus as of July 31, 2024 from the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, only after first meeting requirements of W.Va. Code §11B-2-20(b).

In the event that surplus revenues available on July 31, 2024, are not sufficient to meet the appropriations made pursuant to this section, then the appropriations shall be made to the extent that surplus funds are available as of the date mandated to meet the appropriations in this section and shall be allocated first to provide

the necessary funds to meet the first appropriation of this section and each subsequent appropriation in the order listed in this section.

- **Sec. 12. Special revenue appropriations.** There are hereby appropriated for expenditure during the fiscal year 2025 special revenues collected pursuant to general law enactment of the Legislature which are not paid into the state fund as general revenue under the provisions of W.V. Code §12-2-2 and are not expressly appropriated under this act: Provided, That none of the money so appropriated by this section shall be available for expenditure except in compliance with the provisions of W.V. Code §12-2-1 et seq., W.V. Code §12-3-1 et seq., and W.V. Code §11B-2-1 et seq., unless the spending unit has filed with the Director of the Budget and the Legislative Auditor prior to the beginning of each fiscal year:
- (a) An estimate of the amount and sources of all revenues accruing to such fund; and
- (b) A detailed expenditure schedule showing for what purposes the fund is to be expended: *Provided, however*, That federal funds received by the state may be expended only in accordance with Sections (6) or (7) of this Title and with W.V. Code §4-11-1, *et seq. Provided further*, That federal funds that become available to a spending unit for expenditure while the Legislature is not in session and the availability of such funds could not reasonably have been anticipated and included in this act may be only be expended in the limited circumstances provided by W.V. Code §4-11-5(d): *And provided further*, That no provision of this act may be construed to authorize the expenditure of federal funds except as provided in this section.
- Sec. 13. State improvement fund appropriations. Bequests or donations of nonpublic funds, received by the

Governor on behalf of the state during the fiscal year 2025, for the purpose of making studies and recommendations relative to improvements of the administration and management of spending units in the executive branch of state government, shall be deposited in the state treasury in a separate account therein designated state improvement fund.

There are hereby appropriated all moneys so deposited during the fiscal year 2025 to be expended as authorized by the Governor, for such studies and recommendations which may encompass any problems of organization, procedures, systems, functions, powers or duties of a state spending unit in the executive branch, or the betterment of the economic, social, educational, health and general welfare of the state or its citizens.

**Sec. 14. Specific funds and collection accounts.** — A fund or collection account which by law is dedicated to a specific use is hereby appropriated in sufficient amount to meet all lawful demands upon the fund or collection account and shall be expended according to the provisions of Article 3, Chapter 12 of the Code.

# Sec. 15. Appropriations for refunding erroneous payment. — Money that has been erroneously paid into the state treasury is hereby appropriated out of the fund into which it was paid, for refund to the proper person.

When the officer authorized by law to collect money for the state finds that a sum has been erroneously paid, he or she shall issue his or her requisition upon the Auditor for the refunding of the proper amount. The Auditor shall issue his or her warrant to the Treasurer and the Treasurer shall pay the warrant out of the fund into which the amount was originally paid.

**Sec. 16. Sinking fund deficiencies.** — There is hereby appropriated to the Governor a sufficient amount to meet any deficiencies that may arise in the Mortgage Finance Bond Insurance fund of the West Virginia Housing Development Fund which is under the supervision and control of the Municipal Bond Commission as provided by W.V. Code §31-18-20b, or in the funds of the Municipal Bond Commission because of the failure of

any state agency for either general obligation or revenue bonds or any local taxing district for general obligation bonds to remit funds necessary for the payment of interest and sinking fund requirements. The Governor is authorized to transfer from time to time such amounts to the Municipal Bond Commission as may be necessary for these purposes.

The Municipal Bond Commission shall reimburse the State of West Virginia through the Governor from the first remittance collected from the West Virginia Housing Development Fund or from any state agency or local taxing district for which the Governor advanced funds, with interest at the rate carried by the bonds for security or payment of which the advance was made.

- **Sec. 17. Appropriations for local governments.** There are hereby appropriated for payment to counties, districts, and municipal corporations such amounts as will be necessary to pay taxes due counties, districts, and municipal corporations and which have been paid into the treasury:
  - (a) For redemption of lands;
  - (b) By public service corporations;
  - (c) For tax forfeitures.
- **Sec. 18. Total appropriations.** Where only a total sum is appropriated to a spending unit, the total sum shall include personal services and employee benefits, annual increment, current expenses, repairs and alterations, buildings, equipment, other assets, land, and capital outlay, where not otherwise specifically provided and except as otherwise provided in TITLE I GENERAL PROVISIONS, Sec. 3.
- **Sec. 19. General school fund.** The balance of the proceeds of the general school fund remaining after the payment of the appropriations made by this act is appropriated for expenditure in accordance with W.V. Code §18-9A-16.

#### TITLE III – ADMINISTRATION

**Sec. 1. Appropriations conditional.** — The expenditure of the appropriations made by this act, except those appropriations made to the legislative and judicial branches of the state government, are conditioned upon the compliance by the spending unit with the requirements of Article 2, Chapter 11B of the Code.

Where spending units or parts of spending units have been absorbed by or combined with other spending units, it is the intent of this act that appropriations and reappropriations shall be to the succeeding or later spending unit created, unless otherwise indicated

Sec. 2. Constitutionality. — If any part of this act is declared unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, its decision shall not affect any portion of this act which remains, but the remaining portion shall be in full force and effect as if the portion declared unconstitutional had never been a part of the act.

Following discussion,

The question being on the adoption of Senator Tarr's amendment to the bill, the same was put and prevailed.

On motion of Senator Weld, the Senate concurred in the House of Delegates amendment, as amended.

Engrossed Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 200, as amended, was then put upon its passage.

So, a majority of all the members elected to the Senate having voted in the affirmative, the President declared the bill (Eng. Com. Sub. for S. B. 200) passed with its title.

Senator Weld moved that the bill take effect from passage.

So, two thirds of all the members elected to the Senate having voted in the affirmative, the President declared the bill (Eng. Com. Sub. for S. B. 200) takes effect from passage.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk communicate to the House of Delegates the action of the Senate and request concurrence therein.

A message from the Clerk of the House of Delegates announced the amendment by that body, passage as amended with its House of Delegates amended title, and requested the concurrence of the Senate in the House of Delegates amendments, as to

Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 841, Setting amount of unemployment taxes and benefits.

On motion of Senator Weld, the bill was taken up for immediate consideration.

The following House of Delegates amendments to the bill were reported by the Clerk:

On page one, following the enacting clause, by striking out the remainder of the bill and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

#### ARTICLE 1A. DEFINITIONS.

#### §21A-1A-28. Wages; average annual wage; threshold wage.

- (a) "Wages" means all remuneration for personal service, including commissions, gratuities customarily received by an individual in the course of employment from persons other than the employing unit, as long as such gratuities equal or exceed an amount of not less than \$20 each month and which are required to be reported to the employer by the employee, bonuses and the cash value of all remuneration in any medium other than cash except for agricultural labor and domestic service. The term "wages" includes remuneration for service rendered to the state as a member of the state National Guard or Air National Guard only when serving on a temporary basis pursuant to a call made by the Governor under §15-1D-1 and §15-1D-2 of this code.
  - (b) The term "wages" does not include:
- (1) That part of the remuneration which, after remuneration equal to \$8,000 \$9,500 or, after the amendment and reenactment of this section during the 2009 legislative session, the threshold wage is paid during a calendar year to an individual by an employer or his or her predecessor with respect to employment during any calendar year, is paid to such individual by such employer during such calendar year unless that part of the remuneration is subject to a tax under a federal law imposing a tax against which credit may be taken for contributions required to be paid into a state unemployment fund. For the purposes of this section, the term "employment" includes service constituting employment under any unemployment compensation law of another state; or which as a condition for full tax credit against the tax imposed by the federal Unemployment Tax Act is required to be covered under this chapter; and, except that for the purposes of §21A-6-1, §21A-6-10, §21A-6-11, and §21A-6-13 of this code, all remuneration earned by an individual in employment shall be credited to the individual and included in his or her computation of base period wages: Provided, That the remuneration paid to an individual by an employer with respect to employment in another state or other states upon which contributions were required of and paid by such

employer under an unemployment compensation law of such other state or states shall be included as a part of the remuneration equal to the amounts of \$8,000 \$9,500. or, after the amendment and reenactment of this section during the 2009 legislative session, the threshold wage herein referred to In applying such limitation on the amount of remuneration that is taxable, an employer shall be accorded the benefit of all or any portion of such amount which may have been paid by its predecessor or predecessors: Provided, however, That if the definition of the term "wages" as contained in Section 3306(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, is amended to include remuneration in excess of \$8,000 \$9,500 or, after the amendment and reenactment of this section during the 2009 legislative session, the threshold wage paid to an individual by an employer under the federal Unemployment Tax Act during any calendar year, wages for the purposes of this definition shall include remuneration paid in a calendar year to an individual by an employer subject to this chapter or his or her predecessor with respect to employment during any calendar year up to an amount equal to the amount of remuneration taxable under the federal Unemployment Tax Act;

- (2) The amount of any payment made (including any amount paid by an employer for insurance or annuities, or into a fund, to provide for any such payment) to, or on behalf of, an individual in its employ or any of his or her dependents, under a plan or system established by an employer which makes provision for individuals in its employ generally (or for such individuals and their dependents), or for a class or classes of such individuals (or for a class or classes of such individuals and their dependents) on account of: (A) Retirement; or (B) sickness or accident disability payments made to an employee under an approved state workers' compensation law; or (C) medical or hospitalization expenses in connection with sickness or accident disability; or (D) death;
- (3) Any payment made by an employer to an individual in its employ (including any amount paid by an employer for insurance or annuities, or into a fund, to provide for any such payment) on account of retirement:

- (4) Any payment made by an employer on account of sickness or accident disability, or medical or hospitalization expenses in connection with sickness or accident disability to, or on behalf of, an individual in its employ after the expiration of six calendar months following the last calendar month in which such individual worked for such employer;
- (5) Any payment made by an employer to, or on behalf of, an individual in its employ or his or her beneficiary: (A) From or to a trust described in Section 401(a) which is exempt from tax under Section 501(a) of the federal Internal Revenue Code at the time of such payments unless such payment is made to such individual as an employee of the trust as remuneration for services rendered by such individual and not as a beneficiary of the trust; or (B) under or to an annuity plan which, at the time of such payment, is a plan described in Section 403(a) of the federal Internal Revenue Code;
- (6) The payment by an employer of the tax imposed upon an employer under Section 3101 of the federal Internal Revenue Code with respect to remuneration paid to an employee for domestic service in a private home or the employer of agricultural labor;
- (7) Remuneration paid by an employer in any medium other than cash to an individual in its employ for service not in the course of the employer's trade or business;
- (8) Any payment (other than vacation or sick pay) made by an employer to an individual in its employ after the month in which he or she attains the age of 65 <u>years</u> if he or she did not work for the employer in the period for which such payment is made;
- (9) Payments, not required under any contract of hire, made to an individual with respect to his or her period of training or service in the armed forces of the United States by an employer by which such individual was formerly employed; and
- (10) Vacation pay, severance pay or savings plans received by an individual before or after becoming totally or partially unemployed but earned prior to becoming totally or partially unemployed: *Provided*, That the term totally or partially

unemployed does not include: (A) Employees who are on vacation by reason of the request of the employees or their duly authorized agent, for a vacation at a specific time, and which request by the employees or their agent is acceded to by their employer; (B) employees who are on vacation by reason of the employer's request provided they are so informed at least 90 days prior to such vacation; or (C) employees who are on vacation by reason of the employer's request where such vacation is in addition to the regular vacation and the employer compensates such employee at a rate equal to or exceeding their regular daily rate of pay during the vacation period.

- (c) The reasonable cash value of remuneration in any medium other than cash shall be estimated and determined in accordance with rules prescribed by the commissioner, except for remuneration other than cash for services performed in agricultural labor and domestic service.
- (d) "Average annual wage" means the state's average annual wage which is computed on or before September 30 of the year immediately preceding the rate year and is the total remuneration paid by employers as reported on contribution reports on or before that date with respect to all employment during the four consecutive calendar quarters ending on June 30 of that year divided by the average monthly number of individuals performing services in employment during the same four calendar quarters as reported on the contribution reports.

"Threshold wage" means the wage amount the employer pays unemployment taxes on for each person in his or her employ during a calendar year. On and after the effective date of the amendment and reenactment of this chapter by the Legislature in 2009, the threshold wage will be \$12,000: Provided, That when the moneys in the unemployment fund reach \$220 million on February 15 of any year, the threshold wage thereafter will be reduced to \$9,000: Provided, however, That each year thereafter the threshold wage shall increase or decrease by the same percentage that the state's average wage increases or decreases

(d) The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.

#### ARTICLE 6. EMPLOYEE ELIGIBILITY; BENEFITS.

#### §21A-6-1. Eligibility qualifications.

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits only if the commissioner finds that:

- (1) He or she has registered for work at and thereafter continues to report at an employment office in accordance with the regulations of the commissioner;
- (2) He or she has made a claim for benefits in accordance with the provisions of article seven of this chapter §21A-7-1 *et seq.* of this code and has furnished his or her Social Security number, or numbers if he or she has more than one such number;
- (3) He or she is able to work and is available for full-time work for which he or she is fitted by prior training or experience and is doing that which a reasonably prudent person in his or her circumstances would do in seeking work actively seeking work as defined in §21A-6-1d of this code;
- (4) He or she has been totally or partially unemployed during his or her benefit year for a waiting period of one-week prior to the week for which he or she claims benefits for total or partial unemployment;
- (5) He or she has within his or her base period been paid wages for employment equal to not less than \$2,200 and must have earned wages in more than one quarter of his or her base period or, if he or she is not eligible under his or her base period, has within his or her alternative base period been paid wages for employment equal to not less than \$2,200 and must have earned wages in more than one quarter of his or her alternative base period; and
- (6) He or she participates in reemployment services <u>as defined</u> in §21A-6-1d of this code, such as job search assistance services, if the individual has been determined to be likely to exhaust regular

benefits and needs reemployment services pursuant to a profiling system established by the commissioner, unless the commissioner determines that:

- (A) The individual has completed such services; or
- (B) There is justifiable cause for the claimant's failure to participate in such services.

The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.

#### §21A-6-1d. Jobs and Reemployment Act.

- (a) In addition to compliance with all other eligibility requirements, an individual shall be eligible, and shall remain eligible, for unemployment benefits only if he or she actively seeks, and continues to seek, work by conducting at least four work search activities weekly, defined as:
- (1) Registering for work with the state's labor exchange system, placement firm, temporary work agencies, or educational institution with job placement offices;
- (2) Logging on and looking for work in the state's labor exchange or other online job matching system;
- (3) Using reemployment services in job centers or completing similar online or self-service activities, including, but not limited to, obtaining and using labor market and career information, participating in Reemployment Services and Eligibility Assessment activities, participating in skills assessment for occupational matching, instructional workshops, or other specialized activities;
- (4) Completing job applications for employers that have, or are reasonably expected to have, job openings, or following through on job referrals or job development attempts, as directed by Workforce West Virginia staff;

- (5) Applying for or participating in employment and training services provided by partner programs in job centers;
- (6) Participating in work-related networking events, such as job clubs, job fairs, industry association events, or networking groups;
- (7) Making contacts with, or in-person visits to, employers that have, or are reasonably expected to have, job openings;
  - (8) Taking a civil service examination;
- (9) Going on interviews with employers, either in-person or virtually; or
- (10) Performing any other work search activities prescribed or allowed by rules promulgated by Workforce West Virginia.
  - (b) The commissioner may:
- (1) Require an individual, at the time of application for unemployment benefits and weekly thereafter, to provide proof of all his or her work search activities;
- (2) Verify submissions of proof of work search activities by individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits; and
- (3) Determine any individual who fails to perform work search activities or provide proof of work search activities as required by this section, ineligible to receive unemployment benefits unless the individual can reasonably explain his or her failure to do so or timely remedy the failure to provide proof of his or her work search activity.
- (c) The commissioner shall have discretion to determine the sufficiency of the proof of work search activities submitted, the explanation of a failure to submit such proof, the provision of such proof after an inaccuracy in the proof provided is identified, and whether an individual has otherwise complied with the requirements of this section.
  - (d) The commissioner shall, utilizing existing resources:

- (1) Establish a process by which Workforce West Virginia will share open positions submitted to, or posted by, the Division of Personnel or any other state-administered job board by employers directly with individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits; and
- (2) Establish a process by which, for the purpose of helping individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits secure suitable work, Workforce West Virginia shall refer individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits to such open positions, including facilitating contact between employers and those individuals, and monitoring whether those individuals are sufficiently responsive to a referral.
- (e) An individual applying for or receiving unemployment benefits who receives referrals from Workforce West Virginia to a job or jobs considered to be suitable, as that term is defined in this chapter, shall apply for that job or those jobs within one-week of receiving the referrals and accept employment in suitable work if offered.
- (f) Employers shall report the refusal of any individual who is receiving unemployment benefits and who receives job referrals from Workforce West Virginia to accept an offer of employment to the commissioner and also report those that accept employment and either leave or are dismissed from that employment within six weeks of the start date of that employment. The report shall be made in writing in a manner prescribed by the commissioner and shall be signed by the employer. The report shall become part of the file of the individual's claim for benefits.
- (g) Individuals receiving unemployment benefits who accept a referral to a part-time open position or otherwise accept part-time employment for which the wages are less than his or her weekly benefit rate, shall continue to receive unemployment benefits without reduction for those wages for the duration of his or her benefits period.
- (h) With the exception of individuals who have received or been served with a summons for jury duty or are serving on a jury

in any court of this state, the United States, or any state of the United States; are receiving vocational training as described in the provisions of §21A-6-4 of this code; are partially unemployed and are receiving low-earnings reports from their employer; are eligible to receive short-time compensation under a work-sharing plan as described in §21A-6B-5 of this code; or who are members in good standing of a union that refers its members to employment from a union hall; all individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits shall be subject to the requirements of this section, including, but not limited to, individuals who are seasonally unemployed or laid off subject to recall by their employer.

- (i) Workforce West Virginia shall notify individuals seeking benefits, at the time an initial claim is filed and at any other time during the benefit year that the requirements substantively change, of the obligation to actively seek work. Delivery of the notification shall be made by the method selected by the individual seeking benefits, and may include United States mail, email, online mailbox, or text message. The notification shall include, at a minimum, the types of work search activities that are acceptable; the number of work search activities that are required in any week; the requirement that work search activities be documented; and the requirement to apply, and accept if offered, suitable jobs referred by the agency.
- (j) The commissioner shall promulgate rules for legislative approval in accordance with the provisions of §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code.
- (k) The provisions of this section shall become effective July 1, 2024.

# §21A-6-10. Benefit rate — total unemployment; annual computation and publication of rates.

(a) Each eligible individual who is totally unemployed in any week shall be paid benefits with respect to that week at the weekly rate appearing in Column (C) in the benefit table in this section, on the line on which in Column (A) there is indicated the employee's wage class, except as otherwise provided under the term "total and

partial unemployment" in §21A-1A-27 of this code. The employee's wage class shall be determined by his or her base period wages as shown in Column (B) in the benefit table. The right of an employee to receive benefits shall not be prejudiced nor the amount thereof be diminished by reason of failure by an employer to pay either the wages earned by the employee or the contribution due on such wages. An individual who is totally unemployed but earns in excess of \$60 as a result of odd job or subsidiary work, or is paid a bonus in any benefit week shall be paid benefits for such week in accordance with the provisions of this chapter pertaining to benefits for partial unemployment.

- (b) (1) The maximum benefit for each wage class shall be equal to twenty six 26 times the weekly benefit rate.
- (2) The maximum benefit rate shall be 66 and two thirds percent of the average weekly wage in West Virginia as determined by the commissioner.
- (c) On July 1 of each year, the commissioner shall determine the maximum weekly benefit rate upon the basis of the formula set forth above and shall establish wage classes as are required, increasing or decreasing the amount of the base period wages required for each wage class by \$150, establishing the weekly benefit rate for each wage class by rounded dollar amount to be 55 percent of one fifty second of the median dollar amount of wages in the base period for such wage class and establishing the maximum benefit for each wage class as an amount equal to twenty six times the weekly benefit rate. Provided, That the commissioner shall may not increase or decrease the maximum weekly benefit rate for the period beginning on the effective date of the amendment and reenactment of this section in the regular session of the Legislature in 2009 until the threshold wage is reduced to \$9,000, as required by \$21A-1A-28(d) of this code The maximum weekly benefit rate, when computed by the commissioner, in accordance with the foregoing provisions, shall be rounded to the next lowest multiple of \$1.

- (d) After he or she has established such wage classes, the commissioner shall prepare and publish a table setting forth such information.
- (e) Average weekly wage shall be computed by dividing the number of employees in West Virginia earning wages in covered employment into the total wages paid to employees in West Virginia in covered employment, and by further dividing said result by 52, and shall be determined from employer wage and contribution reports for the previous calendar year which are furnished to the department on or before June 1 following such calendar year. The average weekly wage, as determined by the commissioner, shall be rounded to the next higher dollar.
- (f) The computation and determination of rates as aforesaid shall be completed annually before July 1 and any such new wage class, with its corresponding wages in base period, weekly benefit rate, and maximum benefit in a benefit year established by the commissioner in the foregoing manner effective on July 1 shall apply only to a new claim established by a claimant on and after July 1, and does not apply to continued claims of a claimant based on his or her new claim established before said July 1.

(a) For individuals with base period wages of \$62,650 or more, the weekly benefit amount shall be \$662.

(b) An individual who is totally unemployed but earns in excess of \$60 as a result of an odd job, a non-payrolled job or work from a non-covered employer or is paid a bonus in any benefit week,

shall be paid benefits for such week in accordance with the provisions of §21A-6-11 of this code pertaining to benefits for partial unemployment.

- (c) If a balance of benefits remains after an individual receives 26 weeks of unemployment benefits, due to partial unemployment as defined in §21A-6-11 of this code, the individual may receive benefit payments at the same weekly benefit rate as the most recent week, until the maximum benefit balance is exhausted.
- (f) The right of an employee to receive benefits shall not be prejudiced, nor the amount thereof be diminished by reason of failure by an employer to pay either the wages earned by the employee or the contribution due on such wages.
- (g) The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.

#### ARTICLE 6A. EXTENDED BENEFITS PROGRAM.

#### §21A-6A-4. Weekly extended benefit amount.

The weekly extended benefit amount payable to an individual for a week of total unemployment in his eligibility period shall be an amount equal to the weekly benefit payable to him the eligible individual during his the eligible individual's applicable benefit year: *Provided*, That for any week during a period in which federal payments to states under section 204 of the Federal-State Extended Unemployment Compensation Act of 1970 are reduced under an order issued under section 252 of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, the weekly extended benefit amount payable to an individual for a week of total unemployment in his eligibility period shall be reduced by a percentage equivalent to the percentage of the reduction in the federal payment. Such reduced weekly extended benefit amount, if not a full dollar amount, shall be rounded to the nearest lower full dollar amount

The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.

### §21A-6A-5. Total extended benefit amount.

The total extended benefit amount payable to an eligible individual with respect to his or her applicable benefit year shall be the least of the following amounts:

- (1) Fifty percent of the total amount of regular benefits which were payable to him or her under this chapter in his or her applicable benefit year;
- (2) Thirteen times his or her weekly benefit amount which was payable to him or her under this chapter for a week of total unemployment in the applicable benefit year: Provided, That an individual filing for extended benefits through the interstate benefit payment plan and residing in a state where an extended benefit period is not in effect shall be limited to payment for only the first two weeks of such extended benefits: Provided, however, That during any fiscal year in which federal payments to states under section 204 of the Federal-State Extended Unemployment Compensation Act of 1970 are reduced under an order issued under section 252 of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, the total extended benefit amount payable to an individual with respect to his or her applicable benefit year shall be reduced by an amount equal to the aggregate of the reductions under section four, article six a of this chapter §21A-6A-4 of this code in the weekly amounts paid to the individual.
- (3)(A) For weeks beginning in a high unemployment period, subdivision (1) of this section shall be applied by substituting 80 percent for 50 percent, and subdivision (2) of this section shall be applied by substituting 20 for 13.
- (B) For the purposes of this article, the term "high unemployment period" means any period during which the provisions of subdivision (3), section one of this article §21A-6A-1(3) of this code would result in a "state >on' indicator" if subdivision (3), section one of this article §21A-6A-1(3) of this code were applied by substituting eight percent for six and one-half percent.

(4) The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.

## ARTICLE 6B. SHORT TIME COMPENSATION PROGRAM.

#### §21A-6B-6. Benefits

- (a) The short-time compensation weekly benefit amount shall be the product of the regular weekly unemployment compensation amount for a week of total unemployment <u>as defined in §21A-6-10</u> multiplied by the percentage of reduction in the individual's usual weekly hours of work.
- (b) An individual may be eligible for short-time compensation or unemployment benefits, as appropriate: *Provided*, That no individual shall be eligible for combined benefits in any benefit year in an amount more than the maximum entitlement established for regular unemployment benefits: *Provided, however*, That no individual shall be paid short-time compensation benefits for more than 26 weeks under a plan.
- (c) Provisions applicable to unemployment benefits claimants shall apply to short-time compensation claimants to the extent that they are not inconsistent with the program's provisions. An individual who files an initial claim for short-time compensation benefits shall receive a monetary determination.
- (d) An employee who is not provided any work during a week by the short-time compensation employer, or any other employer, and who is otherwise eligible for unemployment benefits shall be eligible for the amount of regular unemployment compensation to which he or she would otherwise be eligible.
- (e) An employee who is not provided any work by the shorttime compensation employer during a week, but who works for another employer and is otherwise eligible, may be paid unemployment benefits for that week subject to the disqualifying income and other provisions applicable to claims for regular unemployment benefits.

- (f) An employee who has received all of the short-time compensation or combined unemployment benefits and short-time compensation available in a benefit year shall be considered an exhaustee for purposes of extended benefits and, if otherwise eligible under those provisions, shall be eligible to receive extended benefits
- (g) The amendments made to this section during the 2024 Regular Session shall become effective July 1, 2024.;

And,

By striking out the title and substituting therefor a new title, to read as follows:

Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 841—A Bill to amend and reenact §21A-1A-28 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; to amend and reenact §21A-6-1 and §21A-6-10 of said code; to amend said code by adding thereto an new section, designated §21A-6-1d; to amend and reenact §21A-6A-4 and §21A-6A-5 of said code; and to amend §21A-6B-6 of said code; all relating to the amount of unemployment taxes and benefits; removing definitions; modifying the calculation of the taxable wage base; modifying the maximum benefit rate; requiring work search activities to qualify for unemployment benefits; defining what constitutes work search activities; mandating submittal of proof of work search activities; providing for verification of work search activities; granting commissioner of Workforce West Virginia discretion in verification of work search activities; mandating establishment of process to refer individuals seeking unemployment benefits to job opportunities; requiring individuals receiving referrals to suitable work to apply for and accept that work; mandating employers to report refusal of offer of employment to commissioner and other matters; allowing individuals who accept part-time non-suitable employment to receive unemployment benefits without reduction for wages under certain circumstances; making certain individuals applying for or receiving unemployment benefits exempt from work search requirements; establishing process for notification of work search activity requirements; requiring rulemaking; setting internal

effective dates; modifying the total extended benefit amount; and modifying the short-time compensation weekly benefit amount.

Senator Weld moved that the Senate concur in the House of Delegates amendments to the bill.

Following discussion,

The question being on the adoption of Senator Weld's aforestated motion, the same was put and prevailed.

Engrossed Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 841, as amended by the House of Delegates, was then put upon its passage.

Pending discussion,

The question being "Shall Engrossed Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 841 pass?"

On the passage of the bill, the yeas were: Azinger, Barrett, Clements, Deeds, Hunt, Jeffries, Karnes, Martin, Maynard, Nelson, Oliverio, Phillips, Plymale, Queen, Roberts, Rucker, Smith, Stover, Swope, Tarr, Taylor, Trump, Woodrum, and Blair (Mr. President)—24.

The nays were: Caputo, Chapman, Grady, Hamilton, Stuart, Weld, and Woelfel—7.

Absent: Boley, Maroney, and Takubo—3.

So, a majority of all the members elected to the Senate having voted in the affirmative, the President declared the bill (Eng. Com. Sub. for S. B. 841) passed with its House of Delegates amended title

*Ordered*, That the Clerk communicate to the House of Delegates the action of the Senate.

A message from the Clerk of the House of Delegates announced the amendment by that body, passage as amended with its House of Delegates amended title, and requested the concurrence of the Senate in the House of Delegates amendments, as to

**Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 614**, Relating to elementary behavior intervention and safety.

On motion of Senator Weld, the bill was taken up for immediate consideration

The following House of Delegates amendments to the bill were reported by the Clerk:

On page 1, after the enacting clause, by striking out the remainder of the bill and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

#### ARTICLE 5. AUTHORITY; RIGHTS; RESPONSIBILITY.

- §18A-5-1. Authority of teachers and other school personnel; exclusion of students having infectious diseases; suspension or expulsion of disorderly students; corporal punishment abolished.
- (a) The teacher shall stand in the place of the parent(s), guardian(s), or custodian(s) in exercising authority over the school and has control of all students enrolled in the school from the time they reach the school until they have returned to their respective homes, except where transportation of students is provided, the driver in charge of the school bus or other mode of transportation shall exercise such authority and control over the students while they are in transit to and from the school.
- (b) Subject to the rules of the state Board of Education board, the teacher shall exclude from the school any student known to have, or who is suspected of having, any infectious disease, or any student who has been exposed to any infectious disease and shall immediately notify the proper health officer or medical inspector of the exclusion. Any student so excluded may not be readmitted to the school until he or she has complied with all the requirements of the rules governing those cases or has presented a certificate of health signed by the medical inspector or other proper health officer.

(c) This subsection is subject to the requirements of subsections (j), (k), and (l) of this section. The teacher may exclude from his or her classroom or school bus any student who is guilty of disorderly conduct; who in any manner interferes with an orderly educational process; who behaves in a manner that obstructs the teaching or learning process of others in the classroom; who threatens, abuses, or otherwise intimidates or attempts to intimidate a school employee or a student; who willfully disobeys a school employee; or who uses abusive or profane language directed at a school employee. Any student excluded shall be placed under the control of the principal of the school or a designee. The excluded student may be admitted to the classroom or school bus only when the principal, or a designee, provides written certification to the teacher that the student may be readmitted and specifies the specific type of disciplinary action, if any, that was taken. If the principal finds that disciplinary action is warranted, he or she shall provide written and, if possible, telephonic notice of the action to the parent(s), guardian(s), or custodian(s). When a student is excluded from a classroom or a school bus two times in one semester, and after exhausting all reasonable methods of classroom discipline provided in the school discipline plan, the student may be readmitted to the classroom or the school bus only after the principal, teacher, and, if possible, the parent(s), guardian(s), or custodian(s) of the student have held a conference to discuss the student's disruptive behavior patterns, and the teacher and the principal agree on a course of discipline for the student and inform the parent(s), guardian(s), or custodian(s) of the course of action. Thereafter, if the student's disruptive behavior persists, upon the teacher's request, the principal may, to the extent feasible, transfer the student to another setting. The Legislature finds that isolating students or placing them in alternative learning centers may be the best setting for chronically disruptive students. The county board shall create more alternative learning centers or expand its capacity for alternative placements, subject to funding, to correct these students' behaviors so they can return to a regular classroom without engaging in further disruptive behavior.

(d) When a grade six through 12 teacher, excluding an elementary school teacher, determines that the behavior of the

student is disorderly conduct, is interfering with an orderly educational process, or obstructs the teaching or learning process of others in the classroom:

- (1) The student may be excluded from that teacher's classroom and if excluded may not re-enter that teacher's classroom for at least the remainder of the instructional day;
- (2) If the student is excluded pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection;
- (A) The principal shall communicate with the teacher within 24 hours of the student being excluded from the teacher's classroom about the exclusion;
- (B) The teacher has 24 hours to create an electronic record and place the report of this action into the West Virginia Education Information System (WVEIS), without any repercussion to the teacher; and
- (C) If the student is removed from a classroom a total of three times in one month for one or more of the behaviors set forth in this subsection, the student shall receive as determined by the principal an in-school suspension, an out-of-school suspension, or may be considered for placement in an alternative learning center if one is available within the school district.
- (d) For purposes of this section, nothing herein may be construed to be in conflict with the provisions of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. §1400, et seq. or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. §794.
- (e) The Legislature finds that suspension from school is not appropriate solely for a student's failure to attend class. Therefore, a student may not be suspended from school solely for not attending class. Other methods of discipline may be used for the student which may include, but are not limited to, detention, extra class time, or alternative class settings.
- (f) Corporal punishment of any student by a school employee is prohibited.

(g) Each county board is solely responsible for the administration of proper discipline in the public schools of the county and shall adopt policies consistent with the provisions of this section to govern disciplinary actions. These policies shall encourage the use of alternatives to discipline practices, provide for the training of school personnel in alternatives to discipline practices, and provide for encouraging the involvement of parent(s), guardian(s), or custodian(s) in the maintenance of school discipline. To promote a teaching and learning environment free from substantial classroom disturbances, each county board shall ensure that each school implements a tier system policy, with teacher input, to provide a framework for student behaviors and punishments. The policy shall be clear and concise with specific guidelines and examples. The principal shall support the teacher in the discipline of the students if proper cause and documentation is provided following the schoolwide discipline policy. The teacher may not be reprimanded if their actions are legal and within the structure of the county board's policy for student behavior and punishment. The county board policies shall also include an appeal procedure whereby a teacher may appeal to the county superintendent if a school principal refuses to allow the exclusion of a student from the classroom or if a teacher believes the school principal has prematurely ended the exclusion of a student from the classroom. The county boards shall provide for the immediate incorporation and implementation in schools of a preventive discipline program which may include the responsible student program and a student involvement program, which may include the peer mediation program, devised by the West Virginia Board of Education state board. Each county board may modify those programs to meet the particular needs of the county. The county boards shall provide in-service training for teachers and principals relating to assertive discipline procedures and conflict resolution. The county boards also may establish cooperatives with private entities to provide middle educational programs, which may include programs focusing on developing individual coping skills, conflict resolution, anger control, self-esteem issues, stress management and decision making for students, and any other program related to preventive discipline.

- (h) For the purpose of this section:
- (1) "Student" includes any child, youth, or adult who is enrolled in any instructional program or activity conducted under board authorization and within the facilities of, or in connection with, any program under public school direction: *Provided*, That, in the case of adults, the student—teacher relationship shall terminate when the student leaves the school or other place of instruction or activity;
- (2) "Teacher" means all professional educators as defined in §18A-1-1 of this code and includes the driver of a school bus or other mode of transportation; and
- (3) "Principal" means the principal, assistant principal, vice principal, or the administrative head of the school, or a professional personnel designee of the principal or the administrative head of the school.
- (i) Teachers shall exercise other authority and perform other duties prescribed for them by law or by the rules of the state board not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter and Chapter 18 of this code.
- (j) A grade kindergarten through six teacher may remove a student only under the following circumstances:
- (1) Through documentation by the teacher that the student's behavior falls under one or the following two categories:
- (A) A student who is repeatedly interfering with the teacher's instruction and classmates' ability to learn, only if the teacher determines that the student has consistently shown unruly, disruptive, or abusive behavior. "Unruly" and "disruptive" behavior by the student is defined as a behavior that seriously and materially interferes with a teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in a class, with the ability of the student's classmates to learn, or with the operation of school or a school-sponsored activity. For purposes of removal from the classroom under this section, "unruly" or "disruptive" behavior does not include normal or anticipated actions by the student commensurate with his or her respective grade level.

- (B) A student showing violent and aggressive behaviors, causing or intending to cause physical harm, to the teacher or the students in the classroom setting, as further set forth in sections (k) and (l) below.
- (2) The student may not be returned to that teacher's classroom without the teacher's consent unless the discipline committee, established by each individual school, determines that such placement is the best or only alternative available. If the student was removed from the teacher's class due to any physically harming behaviors or the intent to physically harm, the student may not be returned to the teacher's class without the teacher's consent and the teacher may not be coerced to consent.
- (3) Not later than the third day of class after the day on which a student is removed from class by the teacher under this section, or by the school principal or other appropriate administrator under this section, the school discipline team shall schedule a conference including the teacher who requested removal of the student, parent or the guardian of the student, and principal. The student may not be returned to the regular classroom pending the conference. Following the conference, and whether or not each requested person is in attendance after valid attempts to require the persons attendance, the school discipline team shall take consideration of the factors under this section and shall order the placement of the student for a period consistent with the schoolwide discipline policy.
- (4) Before ordering the suspension, expulsions, removal to a disciplinary alternative education program, or placement in another classroom, the school discipline team shall consider whether the student acted in self-defense, the intent or lack of intent at the time the student engaged in the conduct, the students disciplinary history, and whether the student has a disability that substantially impairs the students capacity to appreciate the wrongfulness of the students conduct regardless of whether the decision of the behavior coordinator concerns a mandatory or discretionary action.
- (5) In instances when the behavior of the student is violent, threatening, or intimidating toward staff or peers, or creates an

unsafe learning environment or impedes on other students' ability to learn in a safe environment, the student may be removed through the provisions set forth in subsections (k) and (l) below.

- (k) When a grade kindergarten through six teacher in an elementary setting determines that the behavior of the student is violent, threatening, or intimidating toward staff or peers, or creates an unsafe learning environment or impedes on other students' ability to learn in a safe environment, the student shall be placed in a behavioral intervention program the county has established, has partnered with another county board to establish, or has gained access to for its students through an agreement with another county board for the purpose of addressing such behaviors: *Provided*, That if the county board has not established, partnered with another county board to establish, or gained access through an agreement with another county board to a behavioral intervention program:
- (1) The student shall be removed from the classroom immediately after the incident and removed from the presence of other students for the remainder of the school day;
- (2) The parents shall be notified and shall pick the student up from school preferably immediately, but by the end of the day at the latest;
  - (3) The student may not ride the bus;
- (4) If the student is not picked up by the end of the day, the principal or other district employee may notify law enforcement;
- (5) The student shall be suspended for the next one to three school days while alternative learning accommodations are made;
- (6) The student shall be evaluated under Child Find and shall be referred for a Functional Behavior Analysis pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. §1400, et seq.;
- (7) The student shall receive his or her education through the alternative learning accommodations and may not return to school until a risk assessment is done;

- (8) After the risk assessment, the student's return to school shall be on a provisional basis for a period of five to 10 days. If another incident as described in this subsection occurs within that time frame, the student shall be placed in an alternative learning environment for the remainder of that grading period;
- (9) If the virtual school option is the agreed upon method of alternative education, then the student can begin the program at such time the decision is made; and
- (10) Whether a student's behavior falls under the requirements of this subsection and whether the student is to be placed in an alternative learning environment for the remainder of the grading period pursuant to subdivision (6) of this subsection shall be at the discretion of the student's classroom teacher and principal or vice principal. If the principal or vice principal disagree with the teacher, the teacher may provide documentation and appeal to the county superintendent.
- (l) When a grade six through 12 teacher, excluding an elementary school teacher, determines that the behavior of the student is disorderly conduct, is interfering with an orderly educational process, or obstructs the teaching or learning process of others in the classroom:
- (1) The student may be excluded from that teacher's classroom and, if excluded, may not re-enter that teacher's classroom for at least the remainder of the instructional day; and
- (2) If the student is excluded pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection:
- (A) The principal shall communicate with the teacher within 24 hours of the student being excluded from the teacher's classroom about the exclusion;
- (B) The teacher has 24 hours to create an electronic record and place the report of this action into the West Virginia Education Information System without any repercussion to the teacher; and

(C) If the student is removed from a classroom a total of three times in one month for one or more of the behaviors set forth in this subsection, the student shall receive, as determined by the principal, an in-school suspension, an out-of-school suspension, or may be considered for placement in an alternative learning center if one is available within the school district.:

And,

By striking out the title and substituting therefor a new title, to read as follows:

Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 614—A Bill to amend and reenact §18A-5-1 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, generally relating to the process of removal of students from the classroom setting; providing for elementary behavior intervention and safety; clarifying that nothing herein may be construed to conflict with certain federal laws; providing for the removal of students in grades kindergarten through six for unruly, disruptive, or abusive behavior; providing definitions for unruly and disruptive behavior; clarifying that normal or expected behavior by a student is not classified as unruly or disruptive behavior; specifying requirements applicable to when a grade kindergarten through six teacher in an elementary setting determines that the behavior of a student is violent, threatening, or intimidating toward staff or peers, or creates an unsafe learning environment, or impedes on other students' ability to learn in a safe environment; providing that a student removed from the classroom for violent, threatening, or intimidating behavior may not ride the bus; authorizing the principal or other district employee to notify law enforcement if the student is not picked up from school by the end of the day; requiring an evaluation of the student under Child Find; requiring a referral for a Functional Behavior Analysis pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act; providing that the student shall receive his or her education through alternative learning accommodations; requiring a risk assessment before the student may return to school; and providing guidelines for the removal of students in grades six through twelve.

On motion of Senator Takubo, the following amendments to the House of Delegates amendments to the bill (Eng. Com. Sub. for S. B. 614) were reported by the Clerk, considered simultaneously, and adopted:

On pages 5 and 6, section one, lines 102 through 142, by striking out all of subsection (j) and inserting in lieu thereof a new subsection (j), to read as follows:

- (j) A grade kindergarten through six teacher in an elementary setting may remove a student pursuant to this subsection upon documentation by the teacher that the student is repeatedly interfering with the teacher's instruction and classmates' ability to learn if the teacher determines that the student has consistently shown unruly or disruptive behavior. "Unruly" and "disruptive" behavior by the student is defined as a behavior that seriously and materially interferes with a teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in a class, with the ability of the student's classmates to learn, or with the operation of school or a school-sponsored activity. For purposes of removal from the classroom under this section, "unruly" or "disruptive" behavior does not include normal or anticipated actions by the student commensurate with his or her respective grade level.
- (1) The student may not be returned to that teacher's classroom without the teacher's consent unless the school discipline team, established by each individual school, determines that such placement is the best or only alternative available.
- (2) Not later than the third day of class after the day on which a student is removed from class by the teacher under this subsection, or by the school principal or other appropriate administrator under this subsection, the school discipline team shall schedule a conference including the teacher who requested removal of the student, the parent or the guardian of the student, and the principal. The student may not be returned to the regular classroom pending the conference. Following the conference, and whether or not each requested person is in attendance after valid attempts to require the persons attendance, the school discipline team shall take consideration of the factors under this subsection

and shall order the placement of the student for a period consistent with the schoolwide discipline policy.

- (4) Before ordering the suspension, expulsions, removal to a disciplinary alternative education program, or placement in another classroom, the school discipline team shall consider the students disciplinary history and whether the student has a disability that substantially impairs the student's capacity to appreciate the wrongfulness of the students conduct.
- (5) In instances when the behavior of the student is violent, threatening, or intimidating toward staff or peers, or creates an unsafe learning environment or impedes on other students' ability to learn in a safe environment, the student may be removed through the provisions set forth in subsection (k) of this subsection.;

And,

By striking out the title and substituting therefor a new title, to read as follows:

Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 614—A Bill to amend and reenact §18A-5-1 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, generally relating to the process of removal of students from the classroom setting; providing for elementary behavior intervention and safety; clarifying that nothing herein may be construed to conflict with certain federal laws; providing for the removal of students in grades kindergarten through six for unruly and disruptive behavior; providing definition for unruly and disruptive behavior; clarifying that normal or expected behavior by a student is not classified as unruly or disruptive behavior; prohibiting return of student to classroom without teacher's consent or the school discipline team determining such placement is the best or only alternative available; requiring school discipline team to schedule a conference; requiring the school discipline team to order the placement of the student for a period consistent with the schoolwide discipline policy; requiring consideration of specified factors; specifying requirements applicable to when a grade kindergarten through six teacher in an elementary setting determines that the behavior of a student is violent, threatening, or

intimidating toward staff or peers, or creates an unsafe learning environment, or impedes on other students' ability to learn in a safe environment; requiring placement in behavioral intervention program; providing alternative requirements applicable when county doesn't have access to a behavioral intervention program; providing that the student may not ride the bus; authorizing the principal or other district employee to notify law enforcement if the student is not picked up from school by the end of the day; requiring suspension for the next one to three days while alternative learning accommodations are made; requiring an evaluation of the student under Child Find; requiring a referral for a Functional Behavior Analysis; providing that the student shall receive his or her education through alternative learning accommodations; requiring a risk assessment before the student may return to school; and requiring return to school be on provisional basis.

## §60A-4-416. Drug delivery resulting in death; failure to render aid.

- (a) Any person who knowingly and willfully delivers a controlled substance or counterfeit controlled substance in violation of the provisions of §60A-4-401 of this code for an illicit purpose and the use, ingestion, or consumption of the controlled substance or counterfeit controlled substance alone, or in combination with one or more other controlled substances, proximately causes the death of a person using, ingesting, or consuming the controlled substance, is guilty of a felony and, upon conviction thereof, shall be imprisoned in a state correctional facility for a determinate sentence of not less than three nor more than 15 years.
- (b) Any person who, while engaged in the illegal use of a controlled substance with another <u>person</u>, who knowingly fails to seek medical assistance for such other person when the other person suffers an overdose of the controlled substance or suffers a significant adverse physical reaction to the controlled substance and the overdose or adverse physical reaction proximately causes the death of the other person, is guilty of a felony and, upon

conviction thereof, shall be imprisoned in a state correctional facility for not less than one year nor more than five years.

#### (c) As used in this section:

- (1) The phrase "engaged in the illegal use of a controlled substance with another person" means being in the physical presence of a person engaged in illegal drug use and participating with him or her in illegal drug use, or while in the presence of a person engaged in illegal drug use knowingly facilitating illegal drug abuse by the other person so engaged.
- (2) "Seek medical assistance" means contacting the 9-1-1 emergency system, a poison control facility, any type of first responder, a medical facility or medical professional capable of treating an overdose and in the case of an opioid overdose to administer or cause the administration of a commercially produced and medically recognized opioid antagonist.

any charges ultimately dismissed by way of full and successful completion of any deferred adjudication be expunged for violations of §61-2-28(a), §61-2-28(b), §61-2-9(a), §61-2-9a, §61-2-9(b), or §61-2-9(c) of this code where the alleged victim is a family or household member as defined in §48-27-204 of this code: Provided, further, That any person who has previously been convicted of a felony may not file a petition for expungement pursuant to this section. The term records as used in this section includes, but is not limited to, arrest records, fingerprints, photographs, index references, or other data whether in documentary or electronic form, relating to the arrest, charge, or other matters arising out of the arrest or charge. Criminal investigation reports and all records relating to offenses subject to the provisions of §15-12-1 et seq. of this code because the person was found not guilty by reason of mental illness, mental retardation intellectual disability, or addiction are exempt from the provisions of this section

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

### Secretary Warner:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section Fifty-One, Article VI of the Constitution of West Virginia, I hereby return Enrolled Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 200, passed March 9, 2024, approved with the following objections:

My first objection is to an incorrect fund number ("fund 2440") to which an appropriation is directed to be transferred in item 31, page 27, lines 2 and 3, which lines state as follows:

"The above appropriation for Directed Transfer (fund 0204, appropriation 70000) shall be transferred to the Information Services and Communication Fund (fund 2440)."

The correct fund number for the Information Services and Communication Fund is "fund 2220" and I have therefore deleted the incorrect reference to "(fund 2440)" in the bill.

My second objection is to a directed transfer of \$300,000 in item 80, page 58, lines 41 and 42, which lines state as follows:

"From the above appropriation of Current Expenses (fund 0403, appropriation 13000), \$300,000 shall be used for Green Acres Regional Center, Inc."

The line item for fund 0403, appropriation 13000, was reduced by \$1,214,190, which is anticipated to potentially result in a loss of federal matching dollars north of \$650,000. The Department of Human Services believes this \$300,000 can be more impactful for West Virginians if it is otherwise utilized by the Department and not directed to this entity, which can and does bill the State for its services, setting it on a level field with other, similar businesses. I am therefore deleting the language in its entirety, page 58, lines 41 and 42.

My third objection is to items 439 through 443, in their entirety, on pages 216 and 217. These appropriations are to only certain of our institutions of higher education to the exclusion of others. In 2022, the Legislature passed and I signed House Bill 4008, mandating a performance-based funding formula be developed for our colleges and universities. Section 1 of the budget bill does include formula-based appropriations for all of our higher education institutions, except for an inflationary component of that formula. These items 439 through 443 appear to be appropriations for the inflationary component excluded from the Section 1 appropriations but only to certain institutions. The inclusion and exclusion of certain institutions is not the result of objectively applying the formula, and the decision to include and exclude certain institutions wasn't made at the recommendation of or in consultation with the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, the state agency with expertise in this subject matter. If we are to follow a truly performance-based formula for funding our great colleges and universities, then this should be done on a fair and objective basis transparent to all.

There are also certain clerical errors that should be addressed when the Legislature is convened for other important budgetary matters, prior to the end of the fiscal year.

For the reasons stated herein, I have approved, subject to the above objections, Enrolled Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 200.

Pursuant to Section Fifty-One, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled House Bill 5014. This bill appropriates two million dollars to "West Virginia University Health System for the Federal Food and Drug Administration Pilot Program" and four million dollars to "Hospital Grants and Research Programs."

While I wholeheartedly support our hospitals and medical centers and the advancement of vital medical care for the citizens of West Virginia, these two appropriations direct the grant of large sums of money with little context or direction for the use of such funding. The language of the bill is ambiguous as to the Legislature's intent and just what types of research may be funded from this appropriation, and no context or background has been provided to date to my Office regarding this appropriation. I believe it is imperative that we take a prudent approach and address important outstanding questions regarding the State's budget for the next fiscal year before making discretionary supplementary appropriations such as this. The Legislature will need to convene prior to the end of the fiscal year to address budgetary matters, and this supplementary appropriation may be considered along with other priorities for funding at that time. Accordingly, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled House Bill 5014.

Pursuant to Section Fourteen, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled House Bill 5528. This bill would increase the incremental generating capacity of renewable electric-generating facilities.

While I have always said that West Virginia is an "all-of-the-above energy state" and we continue to pursue new energy development opportunities throughout the Mountain State, it is very important that we are careful not to cripple our great coal-fired energy industry in the process. West Virginia is an energy powerhouse and always has been, providing the coal that powered and built this Nation. Bringing in new energy development technologies certainly provides a good opportunity for our State and our citizens. In recent years, however, it seems that the power companies servicing our State are being incentivized at the corporate and federal levels to drastically reduce and eliminate, specifically, coal-generated power. Not only will this arbitrary reduction in coal-powered energy end up costing consumers more, but this drastic change can only further endanger our nation's energy security and put West Virginians at the mercy of the national power grid to ensure we keep the lights on at home.

I fear this well-intentioned bill will further encourage these companies to drop coal-generated power and continue to turn toward more expensive options outside of West Virginia. The ripple effect of such drastic and rapid change could lead to West Virginians paying more on their power bills, as these entities try to pass their cost increases down the chain to the consumer; it could also lead to job loss by putting coal mines and coal generating facilities out of business quickly. All of this ultimately leads to harm for our critizens. Accordingly, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled House Bill 5528.

During those 100 years, the WVBOM has provided the practice of osteopathic medicine with effective oversight at no additional cost to our citizens because of the WVBOM's self-sustaining financial model.

These are two separate and distinct categories of the medical profession and should be treated as such, in order to best uphold the values and principles of each. Pursuant to Section Fourteen, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled Committee Substitute for House Bill 5105, which seeks to expand exemptions for vaccination requirements for West Virginia school students.

Since this legislation was passed, I have heard constant, strong opposition to this legislation from our State's medical community. The overwhelming majority that have voiced their opinion believe that this legislation will do irreparable harm by crippling childhood immunity to diseases such as mumps and measles. West Virginia historically has seen very few instances of these the vaccines at issue have been required in this State for decades and have kept our communities safe. Our surrounding states, however, have seen spikes in such illnesses recently. These spikes, we are advised, are the result of the lesser vaccine requirements in those states. The image below shows surrounding states with reported measles cases as of March 21, 2024, highlighted in blue.



Additionally, we have heard from many private and parochial institutions all around the State, likewise requesting this bill be vetoed. We have heard from this community that they see this bill as purely divisive and, if signed into law, requiring consideration of adopting policies that will result in parents pulling their children from their schools.

I have always and will always defend our freedoms as West Virginians and as Americans. I hear how strongly people believe in one side or the other on this subject, and I respect all opinions. But I must follow the guidance of our medical experts on this subject. Our medical community in West Virginia serves our people every single day, helping protect our people from disease and poor health. Their wisdom should not be ignored—especially when it comes to the health and safety of our children.

West Virginia is way ahead of the pack in protecting our children from preventable diseases like the measles, and in this matter, I will defer to our licensed medical professionals who have come forward overwhelmingly to say this bill could and likely would result in reduced immunity and harm to West Virginia's kids. Our kids are our future. They are our most important resource, and I will protect them with everything I have. Accordingly, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled Committee Substitute for House Bill 5105.

We stand ready to work with the bill's sponsors and the stakeholders involved to help craft a bill that will help our State's businesses and protect our citizens.

Secretary Warner:

Pursuant to Section Fourteen, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled Committee Substitute for House Bill 5604 for the reasons set forth herein. The bill would raise the dollar amount threshold for agency-delegated purchases of technical infrastructure from \$50,000 to \$250,000 and would direct the approval of at least two IT marketplace portals for use by state spending units, among other changes.

Under the bill, the threshold for "agency-delegated" purchases is raised from \$50,000 to \$250,000 for all spending units of the State, which includes all departments, bureaus, divisions, offices, boards, commissions, authorities, agencies, and institutions of the State. The bill would allow each individual unit of government to seek out technical infrastructure (defined to mean "all information systems, information technology, information technology, information technology, equipment, telecommunications, and technology services") through a marketplace portal, and make purchases of hardware, software, licenses, and so forth, without coordination of such contracts across spending units. Currently, purchases over \$50,000 must be reviewed by the Purchasing Division to ensure spending units aren't duplicating costs or entering into contracts where a better value for the State exists through a different contract solution. This is an important check that creates efficiencies across spending units and, thus, saves the taxpayers money.

The individual spending units of the State also don't generally have subject-matter expertise in information technology, but would be, under the bill, the primary drivers of purchases of information technology. In this complex area, in particular, we need to involve our experts early in the process to help our agencies know what they actually need in terms of technology to better their systems and services to the citizens of West Virginia. The bill does, in a limited way, involve the State's subject-matter expert agency, the Office of Technology, but only in that the Chief Information Officer "shall determine if the procurement of technical infrastructure through an IT marketplace portal is advantageous for the State of West Virginia." Rather than the piecemeal approach to technology purchases contemplated in the bill, we

should continue to use our experts at the Office of Technology and our Chief Information Officer to strategically guide decision-making for information technology purchases for the State. This, too, results in efficiencies across spending units and saves West Virginia taxpayers money.

I encourage the bill's sponsors and staff to meet with my Office and our Office of Technology to work through the issues raised in this letter to ensure we continue to mind the store as best we can, while enabling State agencies to procure the information technology they truly need.

For these reasons, I hereby disapprove and return Enrolled Committee Substitute for House Bill 5604.

# REMARKS OF HONORABLE LAURA WAKIM CHAPMAN

Wednesday, January 10, 2024

SENATOR CHAPMAN: Thank you, Mr. President.

According to the West Virginia Human Trafficking Task Force, human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery in which traffickers use force, fraud, or coercion to control victims for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or labor services against their will. Victims can be any age, gender, nationality, or race, and come from any socioeconomic class.

Human trafficking is the second largest worldwide criminal enterprise trailing only drug trafficking. It is the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the world. There is an estimated 25 million victims of human trafficking worldwide and an estimated \$150 billion annual global industry.

Victims can be anyone. Traffickers can be anyone.

It would be pertinent to look at legislation to increase awareness of the signs of human trafficking.

Perhaps we should look at ways to train medical professionals, educators, ride share companies like Uber, and taxi drivers, hotel workers, bankers, CDL drivers, and others to recognize the signs and inform the proper authorities of suspected human trafficking.

Perhaps we should also look at the education and prevention at the middle and high school levels. If children are able to recognize the signs of human trafficking, especially when done through Internet and social media, we can save lives.

We are West Virginians. We look out for one another. We help one another.

I ask the public to have awareness of the signs of human trafficking and to report suspected trafficking to the authorities.

The Fusion Center has information on their website regarding human trafficking awareness. There is an app "YOU CAN Stop Human Trafficking" that they have put into the public.

I implore businesses to place fliers in their businesses listing the resources available to report human trafficking.

I want to thank Mr. President and my fellow senators for the unanimous support for this truly important resolution. I also want to thank everyone who remembered to wear blue which is the color of human trafficking awareness.

We need to take a close look at our current laws and how to strengthen the fight against human trafficking.

With that, I request the yeas and nays so that we can show the public just how serious we take this issue.

I am crazy about just this. I'm crazy about serving. You know, our forefathers stepped up. And I think an awful lot of you are doing exactly the same thing. You're on the cusp right now of being away from your families, for all practical purposes, for 60 days. And what you're paid is nothing. Absolutely, at the end of the day, I can't thank you enough.

Now I'll tell you this job at times can be pretty doggone tough.

And there's days that it is plenty lonely.

And there's days that you're tired and you feel beat up.

And lo and behold out of the clear blue sky, you know, there's more and more days that you see families that are devastated with floods or whatever it may be and there's not maybe anything you can do.

You absolutely see our heroes. Our heroes are the first that we all call. That maybe we've lost

And you sat briefing after briefing after briefing, and you read the names of 7,000 plus people that was lost. Now we don't read the names do we? We read the age and the sex, and a county. It's terrible, absolutely terrible.

Because I know so well what each and every one of those families were going through. It was really tough.

I see the pain, at times, that my family has. And would tell you just this though: a thousand, a thousand, a thousand times over, I'd do it again. And a thousand, a thousand, a thousand times over, they would too.

Now, let me just read a couple lines to you. When the first time you saw me, I stood before you pledging to fight for the soul of our state. We were staring down a dark tunnel. Our state was bankrupt. Our jobs and our people were leaving and our spirit was broken.

Do you remember those days? Do you remember what that was like? It wasn't any fun was it?

Now I would also tell you that oftentimes, things come in really odd looking packages. And I'm it. You know you got a big guy, and for crying out loud, he's got a bulldog too.

With all that being said, the big guy brought whiteboards in the beginning. Sweat was running off of him in every direction known to man while I was running back and forth and trying to get this written and this written and this written. The big guy's creative and the big guy's got big, big, big dreams.

I do have a ton of energy that God has given me and a lot, a lot, a lot of enthusiasm. I believed that there was real hope and I believed it. I believe, first and foremost overwhelmingly, that God above was at play in all of our hearts right here with us each and every day.

It didn't matter to me that we were absolutely the benefactors of decades after decades after decades on who was going to be 50th in this country. It didn't matter to me.

I knew, I knew just how good you really are. And I knew it. And I believed it.

I asked you to close your eyes at that point in time, a long way back and think of the place, the place that is within a rock's throw of two thirds of the population. And has four unbelievable seasons and all these natural resources and the real treasure: you.

You, the greatness of the people.

I'll ask you before I'm done tonight to close your eyes one more time.

I came in at the first State of the State and I said just these and think about just this for a second. I said we need to make education our centerpiece. We need to grow tourism. We need to diversify our economies. We need to never, never forget our coal miners, our gas workers and our fossil fuels.

We need to absolutely change our standard of life. We need to pass Roads to Prosperity and we need to change our image.

Nothing changed. Nothing changed. From the first crack out of the box. Nothing changed. Just think about it.

You know we absolutely stepped up to the plate in regard to education. We've sure got a long way to go. We've got parents now that can choose where they want to go and what they want to do.

Absolutely. We've grown tourism off the bloomin chart. And every dadgum dollar that you put in tourism, you don't put enough, and you don't put enough, and you don't put enough because every dollar you put in it comes riffing back to us instantaneously.

Absolutely. I said diversify the economy. We could not just depend on one industry all the time.

My family's been in the coal business forever. But we couldn't depend on the one industry all the time. But we don't forget, do we?

And you know what happened? Because us putting another stake in the sand and saying we're not going to forget our fossil fuels, and for those crazies that are out there in lala land that believe we can do without fossil fuels today, go back to your crazy stuff. You know, to be perfectly honest, I don't want to starve to death in the dark.

Now, when you're thinking about standard of life, you got to be thinking about two things. About people coming to West Virginia. What did they ask? How's the schools, how's the roads? How's the schools, how's the roads? Over and over and over and over. Same thing.

Well, think about it.

Granted, our schools have got a ways to go. Granted we do. But you know I think you should always, all, never forget just this – Jim's in the schools all the time. All the time. Why would I tell you anything but the truth? I challenge the media every day over and over and over and over and over and over. Find something that knowingly I've told you is not true.

Politicians do it nonstop. Find something that Jim Justice has told you that's not true. You can't do it. You can't do it. Now, with all that being said, think about that standard of life and think about our schools.

Now here's the next thing I'll absolutely challenge you to do. Go pick a school – I don't care what the school is. Pick a middle school, pick an elementary school. Go to the school, walk into the fourth grade class, do this, please do this. Walk into the fourth grade class and it may be Miss Lilly's class and ask Miss Lilly to come out in the hall and leave her out in the hall just a sec, and go back in and say to the kids, what do y'all think of Miss Lilly?

And I'll bet you overwhelmingly they say "we love Miss Lilly." And then, go out and ask Miss Lilly what she thinks of her students and you'll get the same answer.

And then, go downtown and say what do you think of Cameron Elementary School?

What do you think of Paden City? What do you think? And here's the answer – we love our school.

We love our school. And it means everything to our community. And we got stuff to improve. But for God's sake alive, and if the kids love the teacher, and the teacher loves the kids, and the community loves the school. We got a lot going on in a good way too.

Our Roads to Prosperity launched us, and we had, whether you liked it or didn't like it, we had to change our image. Today, of all things, and if I could say it in slang, who could have ever thunk it.

Think about it, in world travel magazines, in countries so far away we don't even have any idea where they are, they're saying "West Virginia is the place you ought to go."

You're seeing it all around you. You're seeing it everywhere. Absolutely. We're a different place today. With all that together. What happened? Then the rocket ship took off, didn't it?

Now, I'm gonna read just a couple more lines to you.

We've climbed that mountain together. We've pulled the rope together. Every step of the way and the view from the top is breathtaking.

Think about that.

If I could just touch on just a couple more. It all started like I said with the Roads to Prosperity program. You know, our roads are anything but just steel and concrete.

The roads absolutely are arteries that are pumping life back into our very towns and cities. Every mile we pave is a mile closer to new horizons, to jobs that are coming home and to families that can stay home.

And speaking of families, we stepped up. We stepped up for our Troopers. We stepped up for our teachers and our public servants. We absolutely stepped up when they were having a tough time. We delivered pay raise after pay raise.

Our schools now have new life. Our streets are safer. And our state runs like a well-oiled machine at this time pumping out pride and not desperation.

Remember the taxes we paid, the regulations that burdened our businesses. We slashed them together. Together all of us, we cut the red tape and what happened? Businesses are absolutely booming and jobs are multiplying. And West Virginia has become a magnet for dreams, not dust.

Our revenue surpluses have reached heights nobody could have ever dreamed of.

That's all there is to it. And we're returning those dollars to you. But it's not all about dollars and cents is it? When it really boils right down to it, it's about the soul of this state. We protected our coal miners, our gun rights and our unborn babies

I could not be more proud.

We fought for our faith, did we not? Our families, our freedoms.

We stood tall in West Virginia and West Virginia strong we were – through COVID, fires, floods and storms. And the world is seeing the West Virginia grit that we've got.

Now I'm going to lay aside what we've done because my dad would say to me over and over and over. Again, at one time believe it or not, I was skinny and had brown hair and I was a hottie tottie golfer.

I won our state junior amateur a couple of times and I went all over the place playing in tournament after tournament with Sam Snead. It was something. He actually thought I was a pretty good player.

With all that being said, my dad would have said to me a thousand, thousand times, son, the only shot in golf that matters, is the next shot.

If your last shot went dead in the middle of the swamp, what can you do about it? If the last shot was a hole in one, what does it matter?

The only shot, in life, in many situations, is the next shot.

So with that being said, I would say to you, we're a long way from being done in West Virginia. We've got jobs to create, schools to enhance, and communities to lift. So let's make this last year that I have, and then the decades to come, better and better and better and better. Please, let's do just that.

If I could talk just a second about Economic Development. Here's what I'd say to you. How does it feel? How does it feel to go to the plate today? And every single time you go to the plate, you're hitting a home run?

That's how it feels, for God's sakes-a-living, and you can't imagine the businesses that are calling over and over and over and the opportunities for jobs and goodness that other states had, that we never had.

It's real. It's absolutely real.

These are numbers that I've been given and everything but, since 2017: We've created 12,591 jobs. We have retained 20,155 jobs, and there's 240 companies in the mix somewhere.

We do have a seat at the table now. And in my words, we are the seat. Do you get that? For God's sakes-a-living, and of all things. West Virginia is the seat. We're competing on that world stage and we're winning.

There are seven new businesses that I'm going to announce to you and I'm gonna go through them pretty quickly.

Watt Fuel Cell is coming to the Bridgeport airport with an investment of \$64 million and 203 new jobs. Clean Seas is coming to Quincy with 40 new jobs and a \$50 million investment. We have an expansion to retain the business of Alcon in Cabell County that's spending \$70 million and keeping 500 jobs. Gestamp is expanding in South Charleston with a \$70 million investment and 120 new jobs. SMR Technologies is coming to Nicholas County with 40 new jobs. No, I'm sorry, with 75 jobs, retaining more than 100 and \$23 million in investment. Mountaintop Beverage is expanding Morgantown with \$90 million of investment, 210 retained jobs, and 140 more jobs that are being added.

Please give all these folks your heartfelt applause.

Amazon is coming to West Virginia again. But this time, Amazon is coming with AWS. You know we can't even run the internet without AWS.

It is amazing that partnerships are beginning to happen with our schools. A lot, lot, lot to still be put forth in regard to this. But we have two people and I think they're here tonight. But is Kim Majerus with us. Kim, are you here? Okay, there's Kim, please give her a big round of applause and Faisal Hanafi, is he here? There he is

Think about this, and you deserve so much credit: tax cuts. We've cut taxes in West Virginia 23 times since I walked in the door. Twenty-three different times and delivered on the biggest tax cut, the biggest tax cut in state history, hands down. I would tell you just this, the faster that we can get rid of the taxes on the individuals, the better we'll be.

We can't do it all on day one. We got to mind the store properly. That's all there is to it. You've got to mind the store properly. You can't do it all on day one. But it doesn't mean that we don't see the beacon and we don't drive ourselves there as fast and as hard as we can possibly go to get

Tonight, I'm proposing two more. I'm proposing the total elimination of Social Security tax on all, on all.

I'm proposing a Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit where folks that are struggling with daycare can at least write them off your taxes against your revenue. We need this and we need this very badly and we need it right now.

As far as a budget goes. This for all practical purposes is the six, is a six year where we've absolutely had, for all practical purposes, a flat budget.

You know I want to say this and I say this pretty profoundly, you know I don't want to sound braggadocious about anything, but my administration does not believe in growing government. And my administration does not believe in dipping into our rainy day fund and using our rainy day fund. We use surpluses. We use earnings to absolutely make choices to do projects to grow this state but we've got to do it while minding that store that I refer to all the time

Tonight I have a few things that I'm adding based on earnings and dollars that we've got. And these few things are first just this. We have Dr. Eric Cage with us here. And if you could please stand. This may surprise you, but absolutely that is one whale of a school in my book. And I absolutely grew up and cut my teeth, from a business standpoint, running an ag operation and it grew, and it grew and it grew. We need a state-of-the-art ag lab and I am proposing we put \$50 million in a new state-of-the-art ag lab and locate it at West Virginia State University.

We need to stand behind our moms, don't we? I'm proposing \$3 million for crisis pregnancy centers.

We need to stand behind our seniors. Absolutely, the very people that brung us to the dance. The very people that in oftentimes we run away from and we think "oh they'll be okay." No, they won't be okay. \$20 million to our senior centers. \$15 million to our state parks. \$5 million to absolutely never forget our firemen, our EMS's and their agencies. We need to fund them with \$10 million.

This is a pile of money. But, we have grown this state to have a pile of money. So instead of just sitting there, staring at a pile of money, let's put the money at work.

Let's make the money work for us.

\$2 million for the very, very people that we owe everything in life to, to the state's veterans home. \$5 million for seed money to start charter schools. \$150 million is a gigantic investment to the School Building Authority. \$50 million for flood resiliency.

You know I've gone over and over and over and seen bad, bad things happen. And maybe they didn't cost all the money in the world. And the folks absolutely didn't qualify for FEMA. And there they were. There they were with the end loader at the end of the street, picking up all their memories and everything and throwing them in the back of a dump truck. And off they went. Tough, really tough. And when you've got to just sit there and put your arm around them and say there's nothing I can do. Then I think about dad. Absolutely, there's always something you can do. And this will help a lot of folks.

You know, our West Virginia hospitals, all across our land, step up for us over and over and over and over and over and over. I know this is not all the money in the world. But I want to propose that we spend \$100 million, listen to all of our hospitals, let probably Ann Urling figure this out, because Ann can make \$3 go from here to Texas and back

And where all this leaves us today, you may think by gosh a living, all this money.

Where this leaves us today is with \$310 million in the income tax fund. And \$1,200,000,000 in a rainy day fund. \$1,500,000,000 in this state. It still leaves us right where I said. Mind the store. Mind the store.

So, I want to put \$10 million back in the Posey Perry fund because we have now spent \$9.5 million of the \$10 million we had last year. And some way, somehow, all of you have got to realize, and all you've got to do is go with Cathy Justice, and Communities in Schools or whatever. All you've got to do is go to the school.

Go and be with the kids. And what you're going to see, is you're going to see in a lot of

situations that maybe, just maybe, it may be the parents' fault, but the kids are suffering. The kids are hungry too.

Go somewhere to a senior center to see somebody that's really having a hard time. They're having a hard time getting to, getting food to. We have got, with all our bountiful harvest that God above has given us, we have got to stop hunger in this state.

So I tell you just this: there's a man with us tonight. His name is Larry Lester. Larry works this food bank, where my uncle, his name was Posey Perry. He was a coal miner and after he retired from the coal mines for 30 years. He died when he was 94. For 30 years he worked the food bank at Huff Creek. Thirty-nine. Is that Larry? Stand up, please. Larry now has the reins and has been there a long time himself. He knows what hunger really is all about. We've got to stop it. We've got to stop it.

I am proposing an across-the-board 5% pay raise for the fifth time, for the fifth time, to all of our teachers and service personnel and all those in government. Hopefully this will more, more than cover, and it will, it will more than cover the PEIA extra cost. And with all that, at the end of the day, what we wanted to do is not cover. We wanted to cover and those folks put some money in their pocket.

The EMS Answer the Call initiative. Think about this: in 2021, 542 and 2023, 938. It is amazing. Amazing. So many West Virginians are now working and have become EMTs and we need them and we needed them so badly.

We have a gentleman with us tonight. I am proposing that \$10 million to where we can continue funding this through my budget, and this program is unbelievable. There's a fellow with us tonight. His name is Darrin Crosier and I absolutely, I want to read to you a quote that Darrin said. The glare on this is giving me a little bit of fit but I'll hold it here. It says "I'm so thankful to be a part of something like this, to see tax dollars going to the betterment of West Virginians. We do this because we love West Virginia and we love our communities. This training has helped me in so many ways. It gave me a career and great health benefits for myself, my wife and my three children. This was very rewarding and it taught me that I could learn again."

Please give a great big round of applause to again, one of our heroes, Darrin Crosier.

Think about nursing. Think about what we did.

We decided, you know, because we had extra dollars, we figured it all out and everything. We put \$48 million into an absolute situation to be able to train and to retain and attract nurses the state of West Virginia. It worked, didn't it? It worked. We had 810 new nursing students enrolled in the first year. I am proposing that we add \$30 million to this great program and continue the funding. And Genevieve, I think it's Layne-Johnson, is with us tonight and if you could give her a great big round of applause. She is a graduate, she is working at WVU Medicine-Thomas

And she graduated five months early. You know, I can't ever say I graduated five months early. To be perfectly honest, when a lot of report cards people are talking about A's and B's, you know, I was very fortunate to make an A or B. Sometimes it wasn't an A or B.

You know, our foster care system needs us to continue to step up, doesn't it? That's all there is to it. The kids need us so badly.

We made a move in dividing up DHHR. We have three great, great Secretaries now. There's still tons of work to do. Tons and tons and tons of work to do.

We need CPS workers. We need more dollars. There's been real improvement made. You know we've gone from vacancy numbers of 33% down to 17%. We've gone from youth services workers from 45 needed, that were vacancies, to 9. Sounds great, doesn't it? But there's so much more to do. At the end of the day, we need to do all we possibly can to help these families and help these kids and we're going to do it.

Jobs and Hope is the same kind of story. What first started out as Jim's dream, went to Jobs and Hope and everything. You know, there's been 5,024 that have gone through the Jobs and Hope program and gotten jobs. 1,765 have gotten their driver's license back. 1,244 aren't on SNAP payments anymore.

There's a fella with us right now here tonight. His name is James Braswell. James was a graduate. James absolutely founded a solar design and installation company. A graduate, and founded a new company in the state and has hired two other additional people that went

through Jobs and Hope. James, please stand. Let's give you a great round of applause.

Corrections. Corrections were in the papers all the time. Absolutely, with all in us, we know. We all know we've got work to do there. We all know the simple, simple thing that happened. I mean for God's sakes-a-livin, let's just call it like it is. What happened was, you know, absolutely, everybody said, maybe subconsciously, but said, you know, we got to do this and we got to do this. And those folks did bad stuff.

And really, at the end of the rainbow. Maybe they were the last to get fed. We got to do stuff. And so we have, we have tried to step up and we've tried to do amazing, amazing work right now

We have recently graduated 227 graduates that can now work in our jails all across the state.

You know, we are immediately effective as we speak. Downsizing the National Guard in our facilities. And, it is my hope beyond belief that by the end of the summer, the National Guard will be out of our facilities and we will have solved this problem in many ways.

There's a Corporal with us tonight. His name is James Hamilton. And absolutely I congratulate him in many, many, many different ways. You know, he worked at Mount Olive, he was in our National Guard and then decided the pasture is greener somewhere else because of lots of different factors.

And then all of a sudden, you know, we had pay raises, and we pushed the right buttons here and there. And he's come home. And so he's doing great work. And absolutely he has been honorably discharged from the National Guard. And he's working full time at Mount Olive and he's with us tonight. So James, please stand wherever you are.

Do this just while you're standing and everything I want to hear you at the top of the realms and everything from the standpoint of just showing your appreciation and your love and your thanks for our National Guard. It is unflat-believable what they do.

I've told you this a million times. I've said over, and over and over. We owe every single thing we have, everything we have, first and foremost to God above. But secondly to our veterans. We do, and all those that are serving in our active military today. You know, this world today is spooky place.

That's all there is to it.

But we have two people, Jamie and Gehan Springston.

They absolutely came back and seeked education and they came back as veterans to West Virginia. Jamie is enrolled at Marshall right now. And he heads up the student vets chapter. Absolutely, these folks came back, why did they come back? Or why did they pick, rather, West Virginia? I'll tell you why. They picked West Virginia. They picked West Virginia because there's no personal income tax on their pensions. They absolutely picked West Virginia because they see us on a pathway to eradicating the income tax on them. We've made a big move at 21 and a quarter. We need to continue to make more, and more and more moves and they chose us. They could have gone anywhere. Absolutely, as they propagate this message through all the grapevines, it brings more and more super-qualified people to us. Our veterans. So Jamie and Gehan wherever you are, please stand.

I'm gonna stick with the veterans. I'm gonna go quickly. I'm gonna stick with the veterans here for a minute, but I am announcing a bill tonight to give our all of our veterans, nobody's going to pay out-of-state tuition. We're going to pay in-state tuition in the state of West Virginia. In addition to that, two more initiatives. I want to spend \$5 million to supercharge the Ascend program in West Virginia, and \$2.5 million from a joint initiative recruitment of our big bases all across the land to bring more veterans to West Virginia. You know we truly, truly, truly do love and appreciate our vets. And absolutely, West Virginia has made the contributions and stepped up more than any other per capita state in the land

We absolutely owe them, owe them, and so please support those initiatives.

I want to talk to you just a second about Cathy and Communities in Schools.

You know, in all fairness, we started down a path and the beginnings where there wasn't any money. There wasn't any money to do anything. In all honesty, I remember, just remember, when they gave me the books the first go round and we looked, and for God's sakes-a-living and we were halfway through the year. Like you'll give

a new Governor, you know, sometime about this time next year. What if that Governor got something that halfway through the year and he was told then you're going to be \$217 million short. What are you gonna do?

What are you gonna do? You have a constitutional amendment to have a balanced budget. What in the world is this about? And then they say that that's not the bad news. The bad news into your first year . . . (Brief audio feed outage)

Cathy, you deserve so much credit, that's all there is to it. There's a wealth of people behind this but I am telling you, and you can put it in the bank, Jim Justice, if you believe anything he tells you in the world, you better believe this. I have been in school, after school, after school, after school, after school, after school, and work, and work, and work and work.

There's a fellow with us tonight, his name is Will Meadows.

He was at Huntington high school not long ago and his dad was a nurse at Kanawha County EMS. His dad died and Will probably didn't know where in the world to turn. And things weren't going well at all for Will. All of a sudden, the coordinator at the school and Will connected. Today, Will is a marketing major at Marshall University. And today he's with us and the other thing that Will has done that will blow you away, is as soon as he got there, he loved photography. And he went to the athletic department and told him that he could take all these great pictures of the athletes and everything. And today, today he's looked on and counted on as one of their shining stars in the athletic department. So wherever Will is please stand and give him a great big round of applause.

I'm calling and asking for you to continue to fund this effort. They need \$10 million. \$10 million is a drop in the bucket for the amount of kids that we have touched in this program. I would like to tell you just one more thing real quick.

Cathy came up with the idea of bringing therapy dogs to schools. There's 19 now in the schools, and there's call after call after call every day of schools wanting a dog.

Absolutely. You may not think it's much but it absolutely commits us to nurturing learning in lots of ways.

I can tell you this story real quickly. If this doesn't touch your heart I don't know what does. Little kid, I think the kid is at Pineville Elementary. He has real problems, real real problems and everything. He's in a wheelchair. He didn't want to come to school. He didn't want to come to school. He didn't want to come to school. And he got the dog all of a sudden he started coming to the school and he'd read to the dog.

This is a kid in elementary school. And then someone came to him and said, and he would hardly talk, and someone said to him how's your day today you know what his words were?

"Best day ever."

Doing a lot of good stuff.

Our Teacher of the Year is with us tonight, Sharon Cole. She's a 34-year veteran educator and she's teaching the second grade at Ceredo-Kenova Elementary and it is the first time we have a winner from Wayne County. If Sharon Cole could stand please, give her a giant round of applause.

Our 2024 School Service Personnel of the Year winner is with us. His name is Gary Brydie and Gary is from Cabell County. He's a school bus operator. And I am telling you if you don't think for a second that we need all of our service personnel, you're out in left field. These people are educators. These people are moms and dads, these people are everything to our kids. Where is Gary?

In the gallery we have sponsors Highmark, Blue Cross Blue Shield and Toyota are with us and everything tonight. Are y'all here anywhere?

Well, we're clapping for you anyway. No, there you are.

Okay, now I'm moving along. And I don't have very far to go, but I just tell you just this, I'm gonna be really serious with you and you know me, I don't blow smoke at people. I don't have time to do it. And I don't know how to tell you this any more point blank than just this: high school sports in this state's really important.

Really, really, really important. It binds communities together. It does all kinds of really good stuff.

I know. I know with the transfer rule and everything that you were trying to do the right thing, because we want choice. We want choice for our parents. I get all that. I get every bit of it, but if you don't watch out, what's going to happen and you gotta listen to a guy now this coach.

I tried to tell you before, but absolutely when you've got teams that are losing 93 to seven and 86 to nothing in football. It's got to stop.

And we have made this situation to where we are going to absolutely, if we don't watch out, we are going to ruin, and I said ruin, high school sports in West Virginia.

It's going to really hurt us. Now I don't know exactly what the right solution is. But I'm telling you there's dadgum smart people in this room. And today I am absolutely pleading with you to figure it out. Get this back on the right kilter. It's really important. You may absolutely not thin for a second, well, what in the world, for crying out loud. My kids are grown and gone and everything else. Mine are too.

But I go and I go to be a coach and the reason I go to be a coach is because you see, before I tried to tell you, I don't go on vacations. I don't go anywhere. Because I think we live in the greatest place on the planet. That's all there is to it. You don't have to send me on any trips. I don't need your dollars. I don't need to go anywhere.

I love West Virginia and all the greatness that we have all around us. You got to listen to me on this. Some way, somehow we've got to resolve this. And we've got to stop this. The last thing I would tell you is just this, if this isn't enough, I don't know what is.

Those kids had to go to school the next day.

You realize that? You just went on the football field and got beat 93 to 7, and you had to go to school the next day. What do you think those other kids in that school were saying to those kids? Kids can be tough. Now they really can. And they can be cruel.

We've got to fix this.

Helping kids, dual enrollment, 6,500 students have utilized. I am proposing \$1.6 million of additional funding. I commend Fairmont State, Fairmont State, for stepping up and helping with our foster kids, giving an ability for high school students and everything to come to Fairmont

State and study and get college credits and everything over and over and over. So many people are stepping up.

I'm really, really proud when we signed West Virginia Invest to have free community college. Since that time, 4,500 students have worked and worked with that grant. It's good stuff.

I'll talk to you just one second about dilapidated structures. You know, we passed Senate Bill 368. We've gotten rid of 500 structures that were just eyesores and problems and coke houses and whatever it may be.

You've helped it, but in total, in total, I think the DEP is projecting that we'll do another 1,500 or have 1,500 total. I don't know what exactly it is, by the end or the summer of 2025.

We got a lot more.

Every time we make this move. We make us better. That's all there is to it. We show ourselves off and make West Virginia shine even more.

I got to talk to you just a second about tourism. Tourism, I mean, good gracious, I could talk till the cows come home. I said to you earlier, I said, any time you're thinking about it, any time you have the opportunity to spend \$1 on tourism, especially with the great Secretary Chelsea Ruby at hand, if you could spend \$1, \$1 on tourism, do it.

The world has awakened. The world has awakened to all that's going on. I mean, just think, when I said close your eyes, one of the things, close your eyes. Think of the four unbelievable seasons. And the fact that two thirds of the population of our country can drive to us in a day.

Think about the money we spent on our State Parks. Did it work? Are you kidding me? You can hardly get in our state parks and think about the celebration of a new state park that we have. Absolutely right there in Summersville. So much going on. It is unbelievable.

In 2017, Chelsea told me we had four straight years of tourism spending dropping in West Virginia.

Boy is that ever changed. So Chelsea, wherever you are, thank you so much. Keep it up.

We've got 40 more elk on the way to West Virginia. How about that?

Now that's really good news. There's some bad news with this. And this is not good. But one of our folks was down there and they were, I don't know exactly what they're doing, I don't know all the details. But I wasn't going to bring this up but I've got to tell you this and everything but one of our folks is down there, you know, working these elk and everything and getting ready for transport and had a tranquilizer gun, in some way, somehow, ended up shooting himself in the leg with it. Now that's not a good day. Because, because the elk is a 500 pound animal and you just took a tranquilizer dart for a 500 pound animal and you may weigh 150 pounds. Not a good day at all. We were scared to death that we're gonna lose him. We really, really thought we were gonna lose him. And now I think I can report to you that he's in Nashville in the hospital. And he's doing pretty good and I think it's gonna be okay.

Before I close, let me go back to just this, I want to talk to you for just a second about roads. You know, again, when I first walked into the Governor's office, and they handed me those books, and they were tough, really tough. And I don't know many things in this world but I'm a business guy and I know when somebody's bankrupt, and if we weren't bankrupt. I'd tell you you were crazy.

Literally from that, and this is where I really truly believe that God always shows up. Always. You see, may not be on our timetable, but some way, somehow, God always shows up.

Of all things, it's not a very pretty sight, block this out of your mind. But I was in the shower. Block it out of your mind. Now we're good with that being way out of your mind.

And I thought what are we gonna do? What in the world are we gonna do?

And then it just hit me. I said, I wonder what it would cost every breathing West Virginian if we let every road job that we had even remotely on the books, if we let them all go tomorrow, what would it cost? And that's where the idea of Roads to Prosperity started. And off we went. And absolutely with that, whether it be the Grand Street Bridge or the bridges in Wheeling. You know, whether it be just getting yourself to the convenient mart because you couldn't get there without tearing your car up before.

It's unbelievable. Think about this number. In five years, we have done road work to, get this, to 485,333 miles of roads. In the Roads to Prosperity program, we've done 1,200 projects. It's unbelievable.

And before I leave you I would tell you again, absolutely with all in you finish Corridor H. We're really close. We just approved another award today, we're getting really close. Finish it, and absolutely finish the Coalfield Expressways and the King Coal Highway. Finish them.

The Coalfield. The Coalfield Expressway and the King Coal Highway will bring southern West Virginia the world. And Corridor H, my gracious sakes-a-living in linking that up to DC and all the population and everything will bring us jobs like you can't imagine.

Think about this, just one second.

In 2017, we very courageously came up and said we're going to spend \$1.4 billion and then in 2020, it plummeted up another \$5.1 billion. And by the end of 2023 stood at \$11.5 billion.

And in 2024, we're representing that we're going to spend another \$2 billion in projects.

These men and women from our highway department, you know I had to bring you something out here. But they have, they have a banner, but in, get this: So in total, that's over \$13.4 billion in cumulative infrastructure investment in West Virginia during my administration.

And I want you to look, I want you to look at the number of projects and where they are. They're everywhere. They're blooming everywhere. And these folks are making it happen. Please give them a monstrous round of applause.

Good stuff, good, good stuff.

I've been good up to now.

I've been good after now except a little, little kid at Pineville Elementary.

Now, let me just tell you this, now I probably could use your prayer just a little bit because this is really tough on me right here.

You know, I've got a story to tell you but I've got this to tell you and this is, this is where we end this. You know, I'm a real believer just like I said, God always shows up.

I've been so blessed. How in the world?

How in the world did I come up with the idea of Roads to Prosperity. How on earth did I come up with it? Do you think there is any way that Jim Justice believes that he's good enough to have come up with that idea? No way. No way.

In all honesty, I was given that idea. Absolutely. We have been blessed beyond all good sense.

And we should absolutely, always never forget that. Let me tell you a story real quick.

My basketball team, most of them that are up there.

Y'all stand up. Now, just stand there. This is gonna be really hard on you, but you can make it. Last year, we played Princeton twice in the regular season. Now we're not used to losing at Greenbrier East.

But then we played them in a tournament. And, it just so happened Woodrow had the number one seed and so two and three had to play each other. And we played Princeton at our place. We were the two seed. Well, when we had played them in our place before, we'd won really big, but we played a really close game with Princeton not long ago and it was at Princeton.

So they came in and they played a really nice game, and we lost. And gosh, I was just fit to be tied. And probably all of them were pretty sad.

You know, this is hard to believe, but really for the most part when we're on the floor, we have one junior, a whole bunch of sophomores and a whole bunch of freshmen and that's what we got. Now, so last year that a lot of them that were sophomores now were freshmen then.

But anyway, I'm on the way to Charleston the next day and I can't get out of my mind, you know, how it went last night and it went terrible and we were out of the whole deal then, we were just gone.

It was over. And for a lot of kids. I mean, they're just you know, they just feel like what in the world just happened?

And I walked in my office. Remember, I said just a minute ago. God always shows up.

So I walked in my office and Rebecca, who gives me letter, after letter, after letter. And lots of times there's no way to keep up with reading all the letters, after letters, after letters, but we try. We try to read just every one we can get.

So Rebecca said, I don't have any idea who this is. But you may want to read this.

So in comes this letter to the Honorable Jim Justice.

It says, Dear Coach, I was recently on a run with my two sons, and they started complaining about being tired. When they asked if we could walk instead of run, I told them to keep sawing the wood. After we completed the run, they asked me what did that phrase mean? While explaining it meant (and this very small print, so it's hard for me to see it) but, while explaining it meant to persevere through adversity by continuing to make steady progress, I was reminded of when I first heard you use that phrase.

While facing a large halftime deficit in the Sweet 16 tournament of the AAU National Tournament against the team from Ohio, you told me and the rest of the West Virginia All Stars to keep sawing the wood.

We had played very poorly in the first half and the beginning of your halftime speech was one of only a few times I ever saw you express crude disappointment in our effort. However, you reminded us that we could come back, just as we did, if we'd just keep sawing the wood. As you already know, we came back and won that game and went on to advance to the quarterfinals of the National AAU Tournament.

Then he says, although we won this specific game, and many others, the life lessons we learned while playing basketball for you were far more important than the outcome of the game.

When I was at Army Ranger school or on a military deployment, I reminded myself daily to keep sawing the wood.

Now, I apply it in the business world and as a father. Thank you for your leadership you provided during my youth, and more broadly for your leadership to the great State of West Virginia. With only a few days or months left

remaining as Governor, I encourage you to keep sawing the wood. Please send my regards to Cathy and Jay and Jill. Below is my current contact information if you would like to contact me. Note I currently reside in Germany.

I have with us tonight, a real American hero, one of many, many, many. A West Point graduate, Matt Fitzwater. And, get this, he served as an Army officer in the field artillery branch. He obtained the rank of captain. He completed three combat deployments to Iraq. He won the Bronze Star or was awarded the Bronze Star, the combat action badge, the Ranger tab, the Parachute Badge and the Air Assault badge.

It's amazing. I had not heard from Matt Fitzwater in 25 years and there was his letter. And it stood for every single thing that I stand for. You see, I believe that God always shows up. And I believe in my life that what we all, every last one of you, should be doing is trying to make things better. Trying to make things better in every way you possibly can.

You see, if I'm coaching a basketball team, I'll put my record up against anybody, anywhere, anytime, because we want to win just as much as anybody wants to win.

But, I'm going to tell you right now, when those kids leave me, if all I can give them is the ability to dribble the basketball better, then I haven't done much.

You absolutely can do so much for this great state, it's unbelievable.

Some way, right here with this is Matt Fitzwater and his family, his mom and dad Donna and Randy and I want the roof to come off of this, because it's a great American hero.

And absolutely, I don't know where you are, Matt, but wherever you are, stand up.

Matt's team, a little ragtag bunch of kids from Beckley, West Virginia, Jay, one of them, my son right here. Unbelievable experience, wasn't it Matt?

But all that being said, Matt was a point guard. With all that being said, I'll ask you right now to do what I asked you to do, just a little while ago, I told you I was gonna ask you to do.

I want you to just close your eyes. Just one second. Just one second.

And imagine that place that abounds in natural resources beyond belief, like I said before, is close to two thirds of the population of the country, has four unbelievable seasons and the greatest people on the planet.

But imagine the state is booming job after job, company after company, hope and belief beyond belief. Travel guides say West Virginia of all places is the place to be.

And now open your eyes and know that place is us, is West Virginia.

I would say to each and every one of you keep sawing the wood.

### Commemorating 150th anniversary of Keyser

(Adoption of Senate Resolution 3)

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE RANDY E. SMITH

Thursday, January 11, 2024

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President.

As I said earlier, today is Mineral County Day. Earlier on the Senate floor we read the resolution, you know, for Keyser celebrating 150 years. That's a . . . you know, that's a milestone. One hundred fifty years . . . that's almost as old as our state.

Keyser was formed by land grants, including Lord Fairfax . . . he granted to Christopher Beelor in 1752. It's went through various names such as Paddy Town, Irish Settlement, and New Creek Station; and its final designation was Keyser . . . was named after William Keyser, a distinguished Baltimore and Ohio Railroad official

The town's history is intertwined with the expansion of transportation infrastructure, including the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which both has played a big role in the growth of Keyser

which went through many changes over 150 years.

Its resiliency was demonstrated during the Civil War when it became a battleground during the Civil War because of its strategic location with the railroad, and the canal, and the north. It sits on the north fork of the Potomac River.

Keyser became the county seat of the newly formed Mineral County in 1866 which set the stage for further development and the incorporation of Keyser as a city was done in November 16, 1874. When that happened, the headquarters for the railroad . . . and, of course, the railroad brought in repair shops . . . . So, basically, like many other small towns in West Virginia the railroad built the city of Keyser, basically. I mean it was the economical machine for the city.

And it has several different historical landmarks down there because, you know, the Civil War, of course, and then probably one of the biggest ones are the Thomas R. Carskadon—I think I messed that up, but I think it's Carskadon—and the Mineral County Courthouse which both of them are on the National Register of Historic Places.

You know, they have struggles just like any other small town but it's a group of people that . . . . I've been their senator, this is my eighth year representing them and they're people that . . . they don't—I'm not saying they never come and ask for money—but they're the type of people that come and look for guidance or a situation on how they can raise the money or how they can come about the money. So, they're pretty self-sufficient.

I have a lot of good friends in Mineral County and the Keyser area. And I appreciate them. They're very vocal. We have our townhall meetings down there and they're usually well attended and people get involved. They have some pretty good sports teams every now and then. Used to dominate, but . . . . Probably one of their biggest problems they have there now because they border the State of Maryland and they have a problem, you know, with teachers, getting teachers because of the pay, you know, over in Maryland. But they persevere all the time.

And they're a great bunch of people and I'm honored to recognize the city of Keyser for their 150-year anniversary and I urge passage.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. OLIVERIO II

Thursday, January 11, 2024

SENATOR OLIVERIO: Thank you, Mr. President.

I wanted to just rise today and recognize the life and service of former Senator John Pat Fanning.

He passed away this weekend and had been a long-time member of this body . . . serving 30 years in the West Virginia State Senate.

Senator Fanning was a Finance chairman and held a host of other leadership positions during his time in the Senate.

He was a kind man. A very funny man. And a person who I really enjoyed serving with. Fourteen years of my Senate service overlapped with the time that he was here. And all of us enjoyed both him and his wife, Kathryn.

His day job was as a funeral director. He owned three funeral homes in southern West Virginia. There were occasions when a family would come to the funeral home with very little or no dollars for a burial and he, many times, absorbed the cost of that.

He was the bank president of the small bank in McDowell County, Pioneer Community Bank. And, as the bank president, there were times when he made it possible for a family to be able to obtain financing to purchase a home and made an enormous difference in those individuals lives.

And I just didn't want the week to pass without us pausing for a moment and recognizing his service.

My wife hails from southern West Virginia, close to McDowell County, and he was always especially kind to her and made her feel welcome. He always addressed her as Missy—her name is Melissa, but, in the south, it's Missy—and had a special relationship with our family.

So, I just wanted to pause this moment, recognize his service, and ask the Senate to remember his family in your thoughts and prayers.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE CRAIG BLAIR

Friday, January 12, 2024

MR. PRESIDENT: Thank you, Mr. President.

I want to take a few moments to finish up where the Minority Leader started. I was up there taking notes the whole time because . . . . Until you and I were on the radio show the other day, I never realized that anybody had a problem with what we were doing. So, I think it's about time for me to stand up here and explain to the State of West Virginia and the public what we're doing. And what we're doing is . . . .

Sixty-day session is a very, very short period of time. Doesn't seem like it when we get started but by the time we get done here . . . .

And I can remember when they used to have runners going up and down the hall running the bills and everything waited til the last day of the session to be able to get things done.

Still, today, even though we've improved our efficiencies there are things that just don't make it across the finish line. And whenever you folks decided to make me the Senate President, I looked at how we could do things better instead of traditionally doing things. How to do things in a way that would expedite the process, would actually find efficiencies in what we do, because we're asking for that from all the other state agencies out here. We're asking that from our government employees. We should ask that from ourselves. And we have.

Now, this is low hanging fruit. And the reason for it is, if it didn't make it across the finish line on the other end of the building before the end of the year, is there . . .? And we voted unanimous or near unanimous . . . . There was two "no" votes on all those bills that we did in here this morning. Two. I might be off one. I know there's not 36 members. I had a little hard time there keeping my composure after that but

But what I'm getting at is, is that we don't wait til—on this end of the building—if House bills come over from the other side, we don't wait til Day 45 to start running their bills. Everybody, the chairs know, everybody in this chamber knows that if that's a good idea and we can do it, we put it on the agenda and we get it moving forward.

Now, I've had discussions with the Speaker on what's going on and they're working their bills through the committee process and we're going to be getting their bills—very similar to what we've done—in a two-week period. And it's a migration. They're dealing with more people. We're a closer collective so to speak because, well, we're one-third the size to begin with

But I'm encouraging them to do this because one of things that happens is, is that . . . and I've seen this . . . .

And, again, I think what we did this year is better than last year. Yes, I've been ill for the last couple days so I didn't have to go through rule suspension, after rule suspension, after rule suspension that makes it so that you lose your voice to begin with. But this was a better process. And this is a migration of what we've done and I applaud staff and everybody that put this together to have it so that we can then demonstrate to West Virginia, to businesses that are locating in West Virginia that we operate at the speed of businesses in this state, not the speed of government.

I use that over, and over, and over but this is a demonstration. This is a demonstration that there's no need to drive the automobile five miles an hour on a 55 mile an hour road . . . or a 70 mile an hour road.

We got 60 days to do the work of the people of West Virginia. And you guys demonstrate that you're willing to press down on the accelerator and make a difference for the people in the State of West Virginia.

So, Senator from Cabell, I could care less what the press has got to say because what happens is, is that what we do here is working. It's working. And they're looking for things that .... They don't know what they're talking about. And, if they want to do this job, then they need to run for public office and then understand that what we're taking on here is the work of the people.

. . .

And I'm very proud of every one of us in here and how we work together and how we get the job done.

So, thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me to vent.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE ROBERT H. PLYMALE

Friday, January 12, 2024

SENATOR PLYMALE: Thank you, Mr. President.

I've heard the criticism over the last year from people and I have defended what we have done in the Legislature in, you know, what would be considered fast tracking bills.

But, to be honest with you, I think the process we took this year is a lot better process. I think vetting it over three days is a good thing. It's one that, I think, fits in with the realm of what we're doing, in particular, on the first day. I have no problem with suspending rules in certain situations . . . and I've done that over a number of times and over a number of years. I do think that this process, the way that we've done it this year, is much better. And I applaud you all for making the change from last year to this year.

But, once again, I defended last year. I defended it back home. I defended it back home with the people that didn't like it . . . even some people that were former legislators that came to me and said this. And I said . . . one thing I asked them, "Did you ever suspend the rules on a bill when you were up here?" "Well, of course I did it." So, I said, "What's the difference?"

# REMARKS OF HONORABLE CRAIG BLAIR

Monday, January 15, 2024

MR. PRESIDENT: Thank you, Mr President.

As an all of the above energy state, West Virginia clearly recognizes and appreciates the need for the regulatory environment that fosters and encourages energy production. However, the federal government's permitting process is a system of unnecessarily complex, redundant, and uncertain . . . thereby discouraging investment and job creation in the energy sector. Delays caused by this permitting inefficiencies inhibit the essential components low cost and modern energy that are needed to support the economic competitiveness and also threaten domestic exports towards national security.

Failure to reform the federal permitting laws is already resulting in fewer jobs, reduced security, and higher prices for Americans without providing additional benefits for the environment and making the United States less competitive.

Now, I want to take a break from that statement there and explain to everybody in here. I think most of you know that I'm the new chair for SLC (Southern Legislative Conference). And that's 15 states. The states go from Florida to Texas, up to West Virginia. And all those southern states is tied in together. And as the chair, one of the things that is new that we're doing—and to be quite honest with you, it's my idea, but I've got a lot of support in other states—is that we pass a resolution in each state picking an issue like this one because what we've done so far when we've been dealing with the federal government . . . it falls on deaf ears.

And West Virginia should applaud themselves right now because our rule-making review process goes through a check and balance system . . . . We'll do a rules bundle here today that's going on . . . . But the federal government has advocated that . . . and to the agencies . . . . It has gummed up the works to the point where nothing gets done.

Now, this is an energy resolution. But this is an all of the above energy resolution as well. So, fossils included with it.

But there is so many problems and delays in the permitting processes that it deters the investment for our own national security. And so by our state being at the forefront of this, and with my leadership—with CSG South, SLC—we're attempting to take and send a clear message to the federal government that the federal government exists for the purposes of the states. The states do not exist for the purpose of the federal government.

This resolution gives us that flexibility and it will be the beginning of 14 other states being tied in with this.

And I've got a prediction for you . . . you'll see another 30 states that will join us. My math's wrong, another 15 to 20 states join us in this process. May not work, but I can tell you what's not working, and that's the current environment that we have right now.

So I would encourage everybody strongly, strongly encourage, to vote "yes" on this and it's going to set the path where West Virginia, once again, is leading the way for this state and it's going to make all the difference when it comes to dealing with the federal government.

## Displaying official US motto in public schools

The committee substitute for this bill requires that a public elementary school, or secondary school, or a state institution of higher education display in a conspicuous place in each classroom of the school or institution a durable poster or framed copy of the U.S. national motto "In God We Trust" if the framed copy or poster is donated for display at the school or institution or purchased from private donations and made available to the school or institution, or if it contains a representation of the U.S. flag centered under the national motto and a representation of the state flag and does not depict any words, images, or information.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Chairman yield?

Thank you Madam Chair.

I talked to you briefly about this a little bit yesterday and some of the concerns I have—I don't know if it was thought out in committee so maybe you can enlighten me—it says every classroom whether it's secondary, elementary, or college. Do we know how many classrooms that involves in the State of West Virginia? I mean, that's got to be thousands.

SENATOR GRADY: I'm sure it's a lot. I don't have an exact number on the classrooms that that would be

SENATOR CAPUTO: But the way I read this—and correct me if I'm wrong, Madam Chair—that you can't just do one classroom. If you do it, you have to do it in every classroom. And that could be—I don't know, in my eyes—that could be very burdensome for the institution.

Did you all talk about that in committee I guess is my question?

SENATOR GRADY: We discussed a little bit—and I can't recall if this was committee, I'm sorry, or if it was a discussion outside, you know, similar to what we had on the floor yesterday . . .

#### SENATOR CAPUTO: Sure.

SENATOR GRADY: . . . that the number of classrooms and if that was feasible. And so we discussed it and we thought about it being donated by private companies, or just donations . . . where we weren't requiring the schools to purchase them. That makes it a lot easier because those donations . . . And just hanging a poster, a sign . . . that's not burdensome at all, you know . . . and we do those every day.

But that would be the issue, is just the donation part. Now, if we required them to fund it and to hang 'em, I can see that being an issue because that would cost a lot of money. But with donated items or donations, not an issue at all.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Well, let's talk about the donations for just a second if I might. Was there any discussions that maybe the donations should be restricted to certain groups? Can donations be accepted or rejected? I mean, what concerns me and where I'm going with this is what if, you know, some hate group, I guess, says I want to donate all these to Elkview

Elementary School. Let's say it's the KKK, for lack of a better term.

There's nothing in here that I read—and correct me if I'm wrong—that would restrict them from donating that and that would be common knowledge—I know they can't put it on the poster the way I read it—but would be common knowledge who donated that and that would be, in my opinion, very hurtful and troublesome. Was there any discussion about that?

SENATOR GRADY: With schools now in accepting donations, those things are thought out as well. So it wouldn't only affect this, but any donations that schools accept, they think about that as well. They think about the organization that's trying to donate and there are rules around whether or not you should accept things from certain organizations. So, that would apply in this case in the same manner.

SENATOR CAPUTO: There are rules around that now or laws around that? Because if there are. I'm not aware of that.

SENATOR GRADY: Not laws, but there are, maybe I should say, it's a general idea of who you should and shouldn't accept donations from. And I can't name one time when a school has accepted a donation from somebody or some organization that has represented, let's say, the KKK. Can you name a time when a school has said hey yes, I'll take that donation from your organization? I would think that that would be something that the school would absolutely say no, we don't . . . we don't want any association with that

SENATOR CAPUTO: Yeah, I can't. I can't. I'm just trying, you know . . . you know, think ahead, I guess. You know, maybe, some group that a teacher or a principal is very familiar with and likes versus some group they maybe don't like. And I didn't know if there was any way to sort through that or not.

And maybe I'm overthinking it. I'm not trying to, you know, be . . .

SENATOR GRADY: I know you aren't. And I understand. But I want you to think about classrooms daily and teachers who get donations from individuals and organizations. Those individuals have different beliefs, organizations have different beliefs. We take donations from churches all the time. Somebody could argue that that would be against somebody's beliefs

because you're taking in donations from churches. I mean that argument could be made in any aspect because we do get donations from all kinds of places. But, you know, in that specific case, I would hope, and I think, that the school would say no thank you, you know . . because this would not supersede using your common sense and making sure that none of your students are offended.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Well, one more question on that. Do you know of any donations that were not accepted because of, you know, the sentiment of the person or group wanting to donate it?

SENATOR GRADY: In my personal . . .

SENATOR CAPUTO: And if you don't, that's fine.

SENATOR GRADY: Right.

SENATOR CAPUTO: I'm just, you know . . .

SENATOR GRADY: In my personal experiences, I don't.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Okay.

SENATOR GRADY: But I teach in a very small area. So, you know, we could reach out and ask others but I haven't heard of any.

SENATOR CAPUTO: And one other question and then I'm done, I promise. Was there any discussion about the size of the poster. I mean, it just says . . . it just says a poster or framed copy. I mean, that could be an 8X10 or that could be a mural the way I read that. I mean, I don't know that there's any restrictions. There's no uniformity, I guess, for lack of a better term, that I read in this bill to say it can't be bigger than an 8X10 or 11X14. It could be any size. Correct?

SENATOR GRADY: Right. It doesn't specify that. It could be a post-it note. It could be the size of a post-it note or the size of a mural the way the wording is . . . the language is in the bill.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Okay. Alright, well thank you for answering my questions. You have been very helpful. I appreciate it.

SENATOR GRADY: Absolutely. Thank you.

## Displaying official US motto in public schools

(Passage of Eng. Com. Sub. for Senate Bill 152)

SENATOR GRADY: Thank you. Okay.

"In God We Trust". A lot of times that's determined, Mr. President, as a religious statement, but it's not. It has been challenged in court on several occasions and it's always come across that it's constitutional.

It's printed on the back of every coin. And I see  $\dots$  I have a dollar bill, turn it over, guess what it says, "In God We Trust". I have a five dollar bill, turn it over, guess what it says, "In God We Trust". I have a 10 dollar bill, turn it over, guess what it says, "In God We Trust". I have a 20 dollar bill, turn it over, it says, "In God We Trust". I would have a hundred dollar bill but I'm a poor teacher and I don't carry those with me, so that's as far as I can go.

But my point is, if "In God We Trust" is a religious sentiment and it shouldn't be in our schools, what do we use to fund our schools, Mr. President? Dollar bills. So, if we're going to remove the motto of the United States of America from our classrooms, should we consider removing the funding as well? We'd be getting into a lot of trouble then, wouldn't we?

The committee substitute for this bill provides that no public school board, school superintendent, or school principal shall prohibit a public school classroom teacher from discussing or answering questions from students about scientific theories of how the universe and/or life came to exist.

I'm happy to answer any questions, Mr. President.

REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. WOELFEL AND HONORABLE AMY N. GRADY

Tuesday, January 23, 2024

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President.

This is a very interesting bill to me.

I see that some of my good, good friends are sponsors of the bill. I know the bill was well intended

So, little background of my perspective on this bill. I had the benefit of 12 years of education from the sisters of St. Joseph. I don't know if that shows very often but I did.

When I pick up a rosary, the first paragraph, the first sentence of the first prayer—and believe it or not, I did have that rosary out last night—has to do with my belief that there is the creator of heaven and earth. I mean, I believe that.

So, my religion has also taught me, my Catholic training, that when I take an oath, it's an important, important thing. So, when I walked into this chamber I took an oath to uphold the Constitution. So I have to do that. And that's why I rise and I'm going to ask some questions about the bill.

The First Amendment of the Constitution has in it what's called the Establishment Clause. And the law in this country for many, many, many years has told us that the teaching of Genesis, the book of Genesis—took a look at that last night, too, Mr. President, you might want to check that out—the book of Genesis, basically, is not permitted to be taught in public classrooms by public school teachers. I think that's very clear to everyone. We could have that debate, I guess, if we needed to.

So, with that having been said, I'm wondering if the Education Chair will yield to some questions?

Thank you, thank you . . . thank you, senator.

So, my first question is  $\dots$  I don't see any  $\dots$  is there a definition in this bill for scientific theory?

SENATOR GRADY: There is not. There is not. The reason for that is because we do not want to discourage students from asking questions about theories. The definition for theory is that there is some data that proves something to be true but it doesn't have to be proven entirely true.

Even with Darwin's theory of evolution there are scientists who doubt that based on evidence of fossils, fossil records they find that show there are more intricate designs than what follows Darwin's theory.

So, that prompts scientists to think about other options and other theories. And so we want to make sure that students and teachers can have that open discussion so we can promote learning and we can promote students to ask questions.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. We always want the students to ask questions.

SENATOR GRADY: Absolutely.

SENATOR WOELFEL: I mean, it seems like a student might say something like, "If we're descended from apes, how come there's still apes?" Something like that. Is that the kind of question you might get in a classroom? Ever had that one?

SENATOR GRADY: I guess we probably

#### SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay.

So, yeah, we want to encourage students to participate but I'm really focused on the teachers. I'm focused on how the teachers are going to ... what the teachers are going to do.

Can you explain to me what intelligent design is?

SENATOR GRADY: So intelligent design... it's ... a lot of times people make that synonymous with creationism, senator. And it's not synonymous with creationism and what you were describing with the Book of Genesis and things that you were talking about and taught, and you were looking at ... that would be creationism

With intelligent design it's just a theory that scientists have that state that there is a more intelligent being, or a more intelligent something, that would create life. So, when we follow Darwin's theory, as I just mentioned, even great scholars and scientists will look at that and they can question, "Well, if Darwin's theory of evolution says this, then what causes a lot of those really intricate details in a lot of things?" And they don't have an answer for that.

So, just allowing that discussion of there could be something else that caused that to happen can promote thinking amongst our students. And we don't want to suppress thinking. And I know we agree on that.

We don't want to suppress students to be thinking for themselves because that's how we develop. Right? We want to make sure they're questioning things. We teach them in all kinds of classes to always question, don't just accept that this is the answer.

I'll use math class as an example because that's what I like to teach. I hear all the time from parents about this new math. . . this new math. And it's not new math, it's just a lot of different strategies to learn. You know, three plus two is five, but there are probably 10 different ways that a student can come up with that answer. And those are all different mathematical theories, or mathematical practices.

Same thing with science and scientific theories is that you have to accept that there is a possibility. And, if a student asks you a question, you wouldn't want your hands to be tied where you can't answer that question, promote their learning, and to make them think outside the box, or think, "Well, this doesn't fit. I want to determine for my own self how I feel about that"

SENATOR WOELFEL: Well, the teacher doesn't get to determine for they're . . . . They gonna be . . .

SENATOR GRADY: No, the student.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Let me ask you this.

SENATOR GRADY: The student.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Yeah. I agree with you on the student part. It's the teacher part that I'm trying to focus on, what the teachers are going to instruct.

And . . . third graders . . . we're talking about third graders. Right?

SENATOR GRADY: I don't think you would discuss this in third grade science class. This would . . .

SENATOR WOELFEL: I just saw in the history . . . . I mean, basically, in something that was handed out from the . . . . That it'd go from age . . . . This wouldn't be taught in the third grade?

SENATOR GRADY: It wasn't handed out from me or the committee. I don't know what you'd be referring to.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. Let me just strike that. It was just something I was presented with today.

So, third graders wouldn't be taught intelligent design, right?

SENATOR GRADY: No. They're not . . . . They're not . . . . This doesn't tell teachers to teach intelligent design. This . . . this bill allows teachers to discuss theories. In the bill you do not see the words intelligent design anywhere because we want to promote the discussion of theories and the discussion of different ideas . . . not to where a teacher's hands are tied.

I'll give you an example, senator. I've had teachers reach out to me in support of this bill because they have felt like in their science classes when they're discussing different types of theories, that they cannot answer questions from students. A student might ask them, "Well, what about this? What about that?" And they have to say, "I can't . . . . " They don't feel comfortable going there.

So, as teachers—and as a teacher myself—my job is to make sure that my students are always thinking, they're always learning, and that I give them everything that has been presented. And you can't stand here and say that we'll just say intelligent design is a theory—and it is—you can't stand here and say that that is not something that we couldn't look up right now that scientists do not support. Because there are scientists who do support that theory much like the big bang theory. There are scientists who support that and other scientists who don't.

So, we want our teachers to be able to discuss all those possibilities, not pushing one or the other, but all those possibilities, "Okay. I'm discussing evolution. This is how most scientists believe but, if you ask me this question about something else, I am okay to say, yes, some scientists believe in other theories and these are the theories that they have. Now, go out and do your research and make your own determination."

### SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay.

My next question is . . . you're talking about scientific theories, not just theories, right?

We all have theories about a lot of things but this bill goes to scientific theories, is that right?

#### SENATOR GRADY: Yes.

SENATOR WOELFEL: I've been able to identify at least seven scientific theories that are beyond Darwinism, or what we might think of in the nineteenth century from Charles Darwin.

So . . . does there have to be any generally accepted scientific principles that are followed to come up with a theory? Is that in the bill?

SENATOR GRADY: I think you are .... I think you are mistakenly assuming that this bill says teachers must teach all theories ...

SENATOR WOELFEL: I'm not assuming that.

SENATOR GRADY: . . . that have ever been . . . .

SENATOR WOELFEL: I've read the bill.

SENATOR GRADY: Okay.

SENATOR WOELFEL: It's like two sentences. I've certainly . . .

SENATOR GRADY: Yes . . . very easy.

SENATOR WOELFEL: I've read the bill. Just assume that I understand the bill.

SENATOR GRADY: Mm-hmm.

SENATOR WOELFEL: What I'm asking you is there anything in the bill . . . . Are there definitions that go with this bill in terms of defining the term "scientific theories"?

SENATOR GRADY: No.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Is intelligent design permitted to be taught in the classroom under your bill?

SENATOR GRADY: It would be permitted to be discussed in the classroom. Yes.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Is it permitted to be taught in the classroom by a teacher . . . intelligent design under this bill?

SENATOR GRADY: The words taught are not, or must teach or teach, are not in the bill. It's discussion . . . open discussion is what we're talking about. We're talking about having a discussion with your students, being able to openly answer questions provided by your students.

SENATOR WOELFEL: I'm going ask it one . . . respectfully, I'm going to ask my question. I'm going to keep asking it.

SENATOR GRADY: I'll keep answering.

SENATOR WOELFEL: I know but I'd like you to answer my specific question.

SENATOR GRADY: Sure.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Specifically, is intelligent design permitted to be taught in a classroom under your bill?

SENATOR GRADY: Would it be permitted to be taught . . . taught . . . in a classroom under the bill?

I'm going to confer with counsel . . .

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you.

SENATOR GRADY: . . . for just a second so I can make sure . . .

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you.

SENATOR GRADY: ... I do not answer this incorrectly.

Senator, thank you for waiting.

Based on the counsel's determination, I do not believe that it will prevent them from teaching it.

SENATOR WOELFEL: So, let me ask you, respectfully, another time, is it permissible for a teacher in West Virginia under your bill to teach intelligent design?

SENATOR GRADY: I believe so. Yes.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR GRADY: You're welcome.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Speak to the bill?

MR. PRESIDENT: Proceed.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President.

And I have all the respect in the world for the Education Chair and that committee.

However, there is plenty of case law out there from Republican judges—the Kitzmiller case jumps out at me—that intelligent design has been struck down as impermissible to be taught in public schools because . . . because the creative, the prime being, the God, the supernatural, creationism is outside the realm of established, recognized scientific theories.

Now, I'm not going to change anybody's vote on this bill. What we're doing is making some legislative history here for when the case goes to court.

So, intelligent design, now that we've learned that it's permitted to be taught under this bill, is going to render the bill, in my view, unconstitutional.

But there's a bigger problem that hasn't been discussed yet. And I appreciate your indulgence this morning. It's an important bill to me.

In 2012, Chief Justice John Roberts' court unanimously overturned an FCC rule because it was vague. It was the case of Fox Television versus the FCC. The FCC had rules that were vague, that were general, that were not defined, that were not specific and the Roberts' court, in 2012, cited a 200-year recognized constitutional theory that's existed in our law that says: If your bill is vague, it may be determined unconstitutional for its vagueness.

Best example I can give other than the FCC Fox case would be when Dr. King was arrested in Montgomery, Alabama, for loitering. What does loitering mean? Well, we know what it was used for there. It was a pretext. So, loitering is too vague, unconstitutional . . . thrown out.

So, forget about all the religious aspects of this. Again, I personally don't have a problem with it, you know, with the beliefs that are sincerely held in this chamber by people. What I do have a problem with is the Constitution which says: If you have a bill, it's got to be specific. It can't be vague. People need to know what the bill says so they can follow the bill.

So, for those reasons, I'm going to be a "no" vote because I believe a court will hold this bill to be unconstitutional based on vagueness.

SENATOR TARR: Thank you, Mr. President.

I just want to rise briefly in support of the bill and differ with my good friend across the aisle there. I think this is very, very clear.

There's nothing in here that is affirmative that you're going to teach intelligent design in the classroom. What it does say is that a teacher can discuss and answer questions from a student. And those students can bring those questions of anything that they wish.

I think it's very clear. I don't think that there's a question about intelligent design in this bill. I think the question is whether or not a teacher can discuss scientific theories with their students.

And I rise in support of the bill.

SENATOR GRADY: Mr. President, I enjoyed the questioning from the Minority Leader over there. I knew they were coming; I would have been disappointed if he had not.

What I want to say about this bill is that it's often . . . the discussion is often turned to intelligent design. And that's not what the bill is about. The bill is about encouraging our students to think, encouraging our students to ask questions, encouraging our teachers to be able to answer them.

I, between last session and this session, I had a lot of teachers—I wasn't anticipating—reach out to me and say, "Listen, thank you. Thank you for discussing this because often we have questions from our students and I don't feel comfortable answering because I don't know if I

can or can't." This bill clarifies that for them. This says if a student asks you a question about a theory that they've read about, or they've heard about, and maybe it's not a popular theory, but a theory, you can discuss it. You can say something about it. Right now they don't feel comfortable doing that.

And I think it just promotes learning. It promotes learning and it promotes our students to think. And that's what we want. That's what creates thinking adults . . . thinking students, right? We definitely want that.

So, we want to make sure that that's what we're allowing to do. We're just untying the hands of our teachers. And we hear that all the time: Our teachers' hands are tied. What can we do to allow them to teach? What can we do? Just let them teach. Quit giving them so many things that they have to think about. This does that. This lets them teach. This promotes healthy discussion and I encourage everybody in this body to please vote "yes" on this bill.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE ROBERT H. PLYMALE

SENATOR PLYMALE: Thank you, Mr. President.

I'm going to not be brief; I'm going to talk a little bit about this.

You know, our family is from southern West Virginia—both families. My wife's great-grandfather Neely was from Mercer and Summers County. And if you look at where Pipestem State Resort is, her great-grandfather and great-grandmother lived there and gave to it. Very typical of southern West Virginia. He had a nickname, his name was "Buttermilk" Neely. You know, her mother grew up in Davy, West Virginia, in McDowell County. Both of our mothers graduated from Welch High School. My wife was born in Pineville in Wyoming County. My grandfather Hamer was born in Pigeon Creek in Mingo County. My grandfather Plymale from Shoals. A lot of people that don't know Wayne County, that's in Wayne County . . . Shoals, West Virginia. And that's on Plymale Branch Road. And my mother and father were both born in Kenova.

I say that because, you know, I am southern West Virginia and I'm proud of it. We both are, my wife and I have always talked about that. That's our roots

Senate Bill 354 was developed by professionals from these counties. And one person, Senator from Mercer, was deeply involved in the creation of this as we were looking at it. But I do need to name a couple of other people. Jim Spencer. Jim Spencer is the head of Redevelopment in Bluefield. And Jim Spencer is the one that helped bring Intuit to Bluefield. Great professional. He is the Chair. Leasha Johnson—one that I've worked with for a long time—is the head of the Redevelopment Authority of Mingo County. And that's one of the best redevelopment authorities, development authorities, in this state, Greatly structured well. And she has been involved in this, David Lieving from HADCO, Terry Sammons—I'll talk about him a little later—who was our environmental engineer when I worked for Buck Harless. And he went on to law school at Harvard and was, you know, in environmental law. So he is, by far, one of the best experts that you can have. And many others contributed to this vision.

Several meetings and visits occurred on the creation of this authority in this bill. And others contributing was Heather Vanater, who works with Appalachian Power; Jason Roberts; Chris Chiles; Paul Maddox; Brie Salmons; Brandon Dennison; and Kent Sowards. These are many of the ones that I work with on a daily basis.

Now, how many areas in West Virginia have an interstate proposed in this state? How many areas have that? There's only one. That's why we have to get behind this.

Our state has sometimes complained that we're not able to contribute, design, or plan our future. This bill not only allows us but empowers us to create our future opportunities.

I have been blessed, very blessed, to work for many people with vision and compassion about our state and our region of southern West Virginia, in particular. Buck Harless, Fred Shewey, Mike Whitt, Jim Hamer . . . my cousin, Marshall Reynolds, and Mike Perry, each of these West Virginians have contributed to this vision in one or more ways. This bill allows the Authority to create the twenty-first century infrastructure necessary to compete in a global economy, work regionally with our neighboring counties, allow regional revenue projects with multi-county jurisdictions, promote private investments, utilize existing and future coal projects and reclamation to create opportunities, and, as Terry Sammons has said, this approach addresses the issue and concepts with legitimacy.

Site development planning along the roadway, we are open to all energy that includes coal, nuclear, natural gas and will implement the TEAM concept of technology, engineering, advanced manufacturing, realizing that the "T" stands also for transportation.

We are asking for your vote today to allow us, the future we envision, for the next generation.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President.

I'll be brief.

It seems like we've had bills over in the House and here in the Senate that some would argue take us back to the 1950s. And I don't think that's necessarily a good idea.

Now, yesterday, over in the House, House Bill 4793 (*Relating to moonshine*) passed and it's on its way to us.

Now, bear in mind that our child poverty rate is 25 percent and it's rising . . . so, we have so many problems. Last or nearly last in workforce development, on and on.

And so what we're going to be focused on next week from the House, on this House bill, we go back to the 1930s with moonshine. Now we're going to be legal to have in a household 50 gallons of moonshine per year . . . you could make for personal consumption.

Now, I'm Irish-German by ancestry. So, I've got a predisposition to drink alcohol, but I'm quite sure I can't drink, or consume, personally, 50 gallons of moonshine in a year.

So, anyway, this will help us market our state. I mean, I guess we can go back to maybe not "Almost Heaven" but "Almost Sober West Virginia".

I just . . . I just . . . it just shocks me that we're spending time on a bill like this. I wonder in the House whether we've got . . . we just basically have the personification, Mr. President, of artificial intelligence over there.

### Supporting preservation of Charleston USPS Processing and Distribution Center

(Adoption of Senate Resolution 16)

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE ERIC NELSON, JR.

Friday, January 26, 2024

SENATOR NELSON: Yes, thank you, Mr. President.

We have had a fair amount of, I guess, press and discussion of the postal service here in Kanawha County. The postal service that's located out at Southridge employs 800 people and it provides the central processing for postal services for the State of West Virginia; and it has been in that location providing those services since 1993

The unfortunate thing that we have heard lately is that the postal service people, if you will, out at D.C. are considering moving that facility up to Pennsylvania. That could be very detrimental to this community, to our state, and delivery of services.

When you look at the central processing center of this facility, they handle so many goods for not only our businesses and residences, but think of all of our seniors and disabled. The medications that come through the mail and the timely aspect of that.

What would happen if all of a sudden our mail has to go a couple days up to Pennsylvania, come back? And the delay that our citizens . . . would be . . . I mean, it'd be detrimental, not only in our businesses but our citizens.

We've talked about so many economic benefits of new jobs here in the last three to four years. Well, let's talk about job retention . . . 800 jobs and their families and those that they touch.

So, what this resolution is there to say is that we, as the Senate—and the House will be adopting a very similar resolution—but it's giving our strong encouragement that we as stakeholders want to come together with other citizens, and other partners, to say we need to have this facility remain here and, in fact, there are opportunities to grow this facility and truly deliver better services to our citizens as we grow and retain these jobs.

One final point, this coming Tuesday at the Charleston Coliseum, the federal group from the Postal Service is coming in . . . and it's currently scheduled at 2:30 . . . that may be later. But let's keep our ears and eyes open for that. We need full participation and support to let the U.S. Postal Service know how important this facility is.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MIKE CAPUTO

Thursday, February 1, 2024

SENATOR CAPUTO: Thank you very much, Mr. President.

Today, as I mentioned earlier, is Black Lung Day in the capitol and this is something that we all should take very seriously if we are true West Virginians.

You know, there's been more than 76,000 people since 1968 who have died from this horrific disease. I don't know, doing a quick math check that's about 1,400 people a year, about 26 people a week. That's not counting the ones who go undiagnosed that we don't even know about or don't want to go to hear the horrible news and they just . . . just fight through it.

These aren't people we don't know. Most of these people, particularly if you live in a coalfield community, are your friends, and they're your neighbors.

It's something that happens predominantly in Appalachia because of the high number of coal miners that we have. The prevalence of black lung in West Virginia is quite significant, Mr. President. Many, many are diagnosed with this horrible disease and it's being found to reach its highest levels right now in the last two decades which is quite alarming.

We fight every day to keep dust standards in these coal mines to a minimum. Putting respirators on coal miners is not the answer. Keeping the dust levels to a minimum and making operators do the right thing is the best answer that we can come up with.

This disease can lead to significant respiratory impairment and it absolutely reduces the quality of life for people that you love. This is your dad's, this is your brother's, this is your sister's, some cases this is your mom's . . . it's not your grandpa's disease anymore. Young miners now are reaching black lung levels like we've never seen. This disease decreases life expectancy by over 12 years when you contract black lung.

And, like I said, younger workers now are . . . we're seeing an uptick in younger workers contracting this disease. Some believe—and I agree with that—that the coal we're mining today is not the low-hanging fruit we once had. It's not the easy coal. It's not the easy seams. We're getting into thinner seams of coal which has more rock, more silica, and it's making life difficult for coal miners.

It's a constant fight. It has been a fight since Coal Mine Health and Safety Act of 1969 was passed and it's a fight today. There was a time that coal operators said black lung didn't even exist . . . and they had doctors to testify that ididn't even exist. They called it miner's asthma. They said in some instances it could be good for your lungs . . . it will scrub your lungs. That's the fight coal miners have had since the beginning of recognizing this disease.

Black lung benefits are extremely hard to get. Extremely hard to get. I read somewhere that less than seven percent of those that apply for these benefits actually get compensated for it. And when they do, today it's still a fight. The coal companies fight us every step of the way. They appeal it until they can't appeal it no more. Sometimes we're successful, sometimes we're

not. And, unfortunately, sometimes the ones we leave behind, get that. And that's sad and it's a . . . . What's less fortunate is that they don't get it. That their spouse died of this horrible disease and they can't be compensated for it.

This disease should not be political. This discussion should not be political because one thing I know about black lung, Mr. President, it doesn't discriminate. It doesn't care if you're a Democrat. It doesn't care if you're a Republican It doesn't care if you're black or if you're white It doesn't care if you're black or if you're when It doesn't care if you're a male or if you're female. If you work long enough in an unsafe atmosphere, it's going to get you. It's just absolutely going to get you.

Most of us in this room has never seen someone suffer and die from black lung. I have. I've had family members . . . If you live in the coalfields, you've witnessed it. Anybody here that lives in the coalfields has witnessed that. Anybody that's worked in a coal mine has witnessed that.

We need to have this discussion. We can't just let this go without recognizing the fact that it's real, and it's affecting our friends and neighbors.

It's a horrible death, Mr. President. It's a fish out of water death. It's something like you've never witnessed before. I know our Majority Leader deals with these kind of diseases and he sees them first hand. And I know there's one thing we'll agree on: There's no more horrible death. There is no more horrible death than dying of this dreaded disease.

These folks are here to raise awareness. And I want to encourage all my colleagues, particularly those that don't live in a coalfield and don't see this like those of us do on a daily basis, just stop out and have a little chat with them. The experts are there. Look at their information. Look at the numbers that's hitting our great state. Not only all Appalachia, but all of our friends and neighbors here in West Virginia, you really need to see for yourself what's happening out there.

You know, this is campaign year, Mr. President—and I ran 13 straight campaigns—and everybody in this room talks about how we love our coal miners. I don't care whether they're union mine or non-union mine, that doesn't make any difference of what we're talking about today. We talk about how we love our coal miners. We need to show a little love. And we need to talk about what's killing our coal miners

and recognizing the fact that we can do something to make life better for them, make sure they get compensated if they do contract this dreaded disease, Mr. President.

So, I just want to close by saying please, stop out and talk to these fine people. Talk to the experts that see it every day. Just take five minutes. You owe it to West Virginia.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE CHARLES S. TRUMP IV

Monday, February 12, 2024

SENATOR TRUMP: Thank you, Mr. President.

We don't want to get out of here before this day ends without remembering we have a birthday to celebrate today, Mr. President. It's February twelfth. Today is Mr. Lincoln's birthday.

So, I'm sure everybody in the room just went, "Ahhh, not again." Yes, again.

I think it's important that we pause on Mr. Lincoln's birthday and think about him. Think about what he did for this state, you know, the author of our statehood. What he did for this country in its darkest hour. He saved it, you know, this grand experiment started in North America two and half centuries ago in self-government, in its greatest hour of darkness and peril, not Lincoln alone, but Lincoln more than any other.

So, we're going to be hearing from Mr. Lincoln in a little bit and I'm going to be quoting from his inaugural addresses as I love to do on his birthday.

I want to talk a little bit about Mr. Lincoln, the lawyer.... Abraham Lincoln as a lawyer.

When he was elected in November of 1860, between the election and the inauguration, South Carolina first and then other southern states passed so-called acts or ordinances of secession ... announcing they were leaving the Union. Mr. Lincoln addressed that head-on in his first

inaugural address and he did it, you know . . . . . His remarks, his first inaugural address was largely, I think, designed to speak to the people of the southern states, those which had already seceded. But, he made the legal argument, Mr. President, about why secession was impossible. And so, it's not part of his first inaugural address that's often quoted, but I'm going to quote it today and, if you listen to the words, you can hear the mind, the wheels turning of, you know, a great lawyer, a great analysis of this.

Bear with me.

As part of his first inaugural address in March of 1861, he said, "I hold that in contemplation of universal law and of the Constitution the Union of these States is perpetual. Perpetuity is implied, if not expressed, in the fundamental law of all national governments. It is safe to assert that no government proper ever had a provision in its organic law for its own termination. Continue to execute all the express provisions of our National Constitution, and the Union will endure forever, it being impossible to destroy it except by some action not provided for in the instrument itself

"Again: If the United States be not a government proper, but an association of States in the nature of [a] contract merely, can it, as a contract, be peaceably unmade by less than all the parties who made it? One party to a contract may violate it—break it, so to speak—but does it not require all to lawfully rescind it?"

That's Lincoln, the lawyer.

He continued, "Descending from these general principles, we find the proposition that in . . . contemplation the Union is perpetual confirmed by the history of the Union itself. The Union is much older than the Constitution. It was formed, in fact, by . . . Articles of Association in 1774. It was matured and continued by the Declaration of Independence in 1776"

I'm going to skip a little bit. He said, "And finally, in 1787, one of the declared objects for ordaining and establishing the Constitution was 'to form a more perfect Union.'

So, he made the case, the legal case, that you can't just withdraw.

He continued, "But if destruction of the Union by one or by a part only of the States be lawfully possible, the Union is less perfect than

before the Constitution, having lost the vital element of perpetuity.

"It follows from these views that no State upon its own mere motion can lawfully get out of the Union; that resolves and ordinances to that effect are legally void, and that acts of violence within any State or States against the authority of the United States are insurrectionary or revolutionary, according to [the] circumstances."

So, in that first inaugural address he made... he was making the case why it's legally impossible for a state to leave the Union unless all the states agree to that.

And then he made the emotional appeal. He made the emotional appeal to the citizens of the south which, you know, I just . . . I love to read. It's some of the most beautiful language, you know, ever written in English.

"My countrymen, one and all, think calmly and well upon this whole subject. Nothing valuable can be lost by taking time. If there be [any] object to hurry any of you in hot haste to a step which you would never take deliberately, that object will be frustrated by taking time; but no good object can be frustrated by it. Such of you as are now dissatisfied still have the old Constitution unimpaired, and, on the sensitive point, the laws of your own framing under it; while the new Administration will have no immediate power, if it would, to change either. If it were admitted that you who are dissatisfied hold the right side in the dispute, [there's] still . . . no single good reason for precipitate action. Intelligence, patriotism, Christianity, and a firm reliance on Him who has never yet forsaken this favored land are still competent to adjust in the best way all our present difficulty.

"In your hands, my dissatisfied fellowcountrymen, and not in mine, is the momentous issue of civil war. The Government will not assail you. You can have no conflict without being yourselves the aggressors. You have no oath registered in heaven to destroy the Government, while I shall have the most solemn one to 'preserve, protect, and defend it."

He ended with these words which, if . . . you know, sometimes when I read them, I just cry. But, I'm going to try to get through them without . . . without crying.

He said, "I am loath to close. We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies.

Though passion may have strained it must not break our bonds of affection. The mystic chords of memory, stretching from every battlefield and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land, will yet swell the chorus of the Union, when [touched again], as surely they will be, by the better angels of our nature."

And, of course, those conciliatory words failed, you know. The south's response to that was Fort Sumter. And what followed was four years of the bloody, bloody conflict in which Mr. Lincoln endured and, ultimately, preserved . . . preserved this great experiment in self-government that we have here and that we continue and cherish. And part of that, during that period of time, was the authorship and the creation of this state that we all love, West Virginia.

So, Mr. President, I thank you and the Senate for the indulgence on this, Mr. Lincoln's birthday, and I hope that as we move forward today with committees and all of our work, we'll keep in mind the burdens and trials borne by him, you know, and ours will, by comparison, seem light.

### Recognizing William Schwertfeger, decorated combat veteran of US Army, on his 100th birthday

(Adoption of Senate Resolution 34)

REMARKS OF HONORABLE RYAN W. WELD

Tuesday, February 13, 2024

SENATOR WELD: Thank you, Mr. President.

It is my distinct honor to present this resolution on Mr. Schwertfeger's one hundredth birthday . . . today, February thirteenth.

Mr. Schwertfeger is someone that I've gotten to know very well over the past number of years and it's an honor to be able to call him a friend. I visited with him this past weekend and presented him with a number of items from the Senate, and the Governor's office, from our U.S. Senator, as well as a number of other items.

You know, why today? We have birthdays all across the State of West Virginia. And so why today is a day worth celebrating? And in my mind, this just isn't a celebration of Mr. Schwertfeger's life and his century milestone, but a celebration, Mr. President, of all World War II veterans. 16.1 million people served in World War II in the United States of America. And of that, we have approximately 119,000 left. That's less than one percent. And so, this isn't just a celebration of his birthday but a celebration of those who are still with us.

Just three months shy of his graduation from Follansbee High School, Mr. Schwertfeger left school to join the U.S. Army. And several months later his mom walked across the stage for him and received his diploma on his behalf. And, in his own words, "A lot of friends a year older than me were getting draft notices. I couldn't wait, so I volunteered."

And he was assigned to the 34th Infantry Division. And he fought through Italy for 20 months. Of that fighting, it's been written, "No outfit has fought harder and longer, and the slow, steady, costly advance of the Red Bull Division from November 1942 to May 1945 [and] is a typical example of grim infantry warfare over terrain so rugged that the foot soldier was the only consistently usable means of waging war."

Mr. Schwertfeger served in the Naples Foggia Campaign, the Rome-Arno Campaign, the North Apennines Campaign, and the Po Valley Campaign, which actually resulted in the German and Italian forces surrendering in May of '45.

And in that time, he often thought of everybody back in Follansbee: His brother that was serving in the Navy and, like many of us who have deployed overseas, about his mom, especially. And in his own words, he said, "I'm sure all mothers suffered and worried. I give them a lot of credit. The things they loved most were over there and being shot at."

However, it was the events of February 5, 1945, that came to define his war experience and also, in my mind, the type of man that Mr. Schwertfeger is.

And I'm going to read here. This is the citation that was issued by the United States Army for his Bronze Star—what he was being awarded in that photo that is in front of us all:

For heroic achievement and action on February 5, 1945, in Italy, Sergeant Schwertfeger and a comrade left the comparative safety of their position and crawled some 100 yards over terrain subjected to heavy artillery fire to the aid of the wounded man. Reaching the position, they placed the severely wounded man on an improvised litter and again crossed the exposed area under the continuous shelling until they reached the safety of a building. The heroic action of Sergeant Schwertfeger and his comrade undoubtedly saved the life of their wounded comrade and reflects the high traditions of the military service.

I asked him once, I said, "Did you know the guy that you crawled over a hundred yards under heavy artillery fire to go and get?" And he said, "No." Said he didn't know him.

That's a 21-year-old boy in that picture. And that is what this country asks to go and save the world from . . . from fascism. Twenty, 21-year-old young men . . . boys really.

In his own words, he said, "He got hit and he was screaming. When you hear a man screaming for help, it's kind of hard not to help." And how many of us would risk our lives to save the life of a man that we didn't know? But that's what we asked an entire generation of people to do.

He came home after being gone for a total of two years, one month, and 13 days. That's worth repeating: Two years, one month, and 13 days that he didn't see his family, his hometown of Follansbee, his brother that was serving, and his friends

And in his words, "It changed a boy into a man in this case."

And Mr. Schwertfeger came home and never stopped being a leader in his community. He was member of Follansbee City Council, he was a commander of the Follansbee American Legion, he was the Brooke County Veterans Memorial Foundation Veteran of the Year, and the Follansbee Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year

He married his wife, Mary, and he raised his two sons of whom I have the pleasure of knowing. He was married to Mary for 65 years. Sadly, she passed away in 2019. And in his own words, "I miss her quite a bit."

As I said this past weekend, I had the opportunity to visit with Mr. Schwertfeger and I gave him a copy of our Senate Resolution today and some other items. But really the gift that put a smile on his face is . . . prior to this resolution I reached out to the 34th Infantry Division, which is now a unit of the Minnesota National Guard. And they were very excited about the opportunity, and they sent a couple of items that had the Red Bull logo on it for Mr. Schwertfeger, and had a note in there from their commanding general and he read it to us, we sat in his living room. Wasn't a dry eye in that house.

But, it really meant a lot to him. It really means a lot to me that we're able to do this today for a great man that, to me, symbolizes what the greatest generation was.

I urge adoption.

And, one of the people who signed it was Skylar Davidson who lives in Mullens, West Virginia, which is where I'm from. And we in Wyoming County often send students to Glenville State.

Designating February 15, 2024, as Angelman Syndrome Awareness Day (Adoption of Senate Resolution 40)

SENATOR NELSON: Yes, thank you, Mr. President.

Today, this February 15, we're designating as Angelman Syndrome Awareness Day here in the Legislature. And, just by chance, the same thing's occurring down in the Legislature in Florida today.

So, the purpose of Angelman Syndrome Awareness Day is to raise the awareness of this condition. Angelman Syndrome is a complex genetic disorder that primarily affects the nervous system. People born with this syndrome can have a normal lifespan but will require constant care for the remainder of their life.

Early identification and treatment . . . medical, sleep, seizure, and development issues associated with this syndrome may be managed. As of now, there is no cure for this syndrome.

Treatment can be made based upon an individual's needs and may include special education; physical, occupational, and speech therapy; and medication.

A little history on the Angelman Syndrome. It was in 1965 that Dr. Harry Angelman, a physician, wrote a research paper on this disease. It started to bring some attention to what we have facing us. Then in January of 1992, a foundation was created by a group of families that are affected by this syndrome. And one of those families was who I introduced the body to earlier up in our back gallery: Frank and Kathy McCullough. They're here in Kanawha County. And they have a daughter, Kate, that was born . . . in 1988 with this syndrome.

Sorry.

Anyway, the syndrome is a rare genetic disease and still relatively unknown. Raising awareness is key to helping folks... the families get proper diagnosis at a younger age and enable them to receive early intervention and therapies for the loved ones.

I think this resolution goes a long ways in recognizing a syndrome that very few have that we don't have a cure for.

Mr. President, I urge adoption.

I had the privilege last fall of going to that border of watching, and seeing, and meeting with officials first hand as to the challenges as to what's happening on that southern border. And the impact on this country will be felt for generations, perhaps perpetually, for the rest of our existence.

There's no question. Some would call this an invasion, others call this illegal entry.

But folks who come across that border are given their date to meet with the U.S. judge to determine whether they can stay. Those dates are five years and 10 years hence down the road.

So, I encourage that this body support this resolution. Send a strong statement to the nation and to Texas Governor Abbott, and to encourage and increase the morale of the Texas border patrol who are doing all they can under difficult circumstances to secure that border.

But, also, let's not forget the challenges of this administration, the Biden administration, fighting every single effort by Texas to try to secure that border.

This is a statement to increase morale in Texas. Let them know we're watching, we care. We want control of that border. We need to know who's coming into our country.

I want to take just a couple of minutes to address Senate Bill 813 (Allowing students to participate in non-school competitive activities) which is coming to us at some point from the Education committee.

In a prior life I was fortunate enough to coach two NBA lottery picks, sat on the bench for about 200 high school basketball games, took a couple of AAU basketball teams to the national tournaments, and . . . . So I rise just to raise some questions about Senate Bill 813.

I think we can all agree that the purest form of sport is interscholastic high school athletics.

The way basketball works, and has always worked, or, most recent memory has worked, our teams begin practice in early November and the state tournament ends around the thirteenth or so of March. So, during that time, the high

school coaches have sole custody over their players. And, there's such a thing as AAU basketball, or travel basketball, which occurs before or after that period. It's a dead period for these travel teams. 813 would open that up so that travel teams would be competing contemporaneously with the basketball season. Why does that matter? It seems insignificant. Well, I'll tell you why I think it matters.

The bill would permit AAU, or travel teams, to play games over the weekend. So, think about your high school kid who's being pulled in many directions, boy or girl, and they have a Tuesday night game against their county rival, and a Friday night game across the state, and then on Saturday and Sunday they're going to Charlotte, or Cincinnati, or Cleveland for travel tournaments.

Now, there's also basketball practice, of course, Monday through Saturday, ordinarily, for your high school team and there's going to be an AAU, or travel practice, sometime during that week. So, you can see how academics would suffer. Academics would suffer. Burnout would be increasing to my view.

I heard from Dr. Greg Elkins about Senate Bill 813. Dr. Elkins is the National Chair for Sports Medicine for the National Federation of High Schools. He's very concerned about Senate Bill 18 [sic] because of injuries and fatigue,

Such a thing as a pitch count for baseball. Quarters played for basketball. Of course, those things don't apply to AAU, or travel teams. And the bill would eliminate the restrictions that now exist.

So, what I'm asking you to do, if you don't mind—again, it's not the most important bill we're going to take up—but, please, reach out to, or listen to, your high school administrators, athletic directors, coaches to see if they think all this would be a good change or whether it would be counterproductive for the best interests of our young student athletes.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE RYAN W. WELD

SENATOR WELD: Thank you, Mr. President

It's sad for me to report that yesterday the State of West Virginia lost a true legend in the death of retired Army Brigadier General [John C.] "Doc" Bahnsen. Doc Bahnsen lived in Hancock County in the district that I share with the Senator from Ohio.

Doc was one of the most decorated officers in the history of the United States Army. The thirty-third most decorated officer in the history of the United States Army. Think of the thousands and thousands of people who have served as officers in the U.S. Army. The thirty-third

Doc was born in Georgia about 90 years ago and distinguished himself throughout a military career that began with a graduation from West Point in 1956. He served two tours in Vietnam as an attack helo pilot. And in his second tour is when he really distinguished himself as one of the true standouts of the United States Army at the time.

He typically flew in a Bell UH-1 attack helo, usually in the command flight and led a number of offensive operations.

I'm going to read the list of his awards and, again, the thirty-third most decorated officer in the history of the United States Army: The Distinguished Service Cross, which is the second highest award that someone in the military can receive; Five Silver Stars; three Distinguished Flying Crosses; four Legions of Merit; four Bronze Stars; 51 Air Medals; two Purple Hearts.

And he received that Distinguished Service Cross in January of 1969. And I'll read:

Bahnsen was involved in an action which included landing under fire to mark a landing zone, firing on the enemy with his rifle while he directed artillery [fire] from his low-flying command and control helicopter, evacuating his

crew members after they were wounded, and leading a subsequent infantry ground attack.

Firing from the helo with his rifle. I mean that's something you would make a movie out of

One of his commanders in Vietnam was the son of General George S. Patton. And Patton once said of Doc Bahnsen, "He is one of those rare professionals who truly enjoys fighting, taking risks, and sparring with a wily and slippery foe. He's utterly fearless and, because of this, demands the same from his unit. I cannot praise Major Bahnsen too highly for his fantastic performance in battle."

Another general called him, "The bravest solider I've ever seen."

Following Vietnam, he served in Korea, West Germany, Fort Benning, Fort Hood before he retired to come back to Hancock County where his wife was from. And I've gotten to know him very well over the past couple of years. I'm honored to call him a friend.

He would have a dove hunt on his property which many of us would attend each year in the fall, on Labor Day.

So, it's with great sadness that I report to this body, and to this state for many people, on the passing of General Doc Bahnsen.

You know, as school children and as parents of young children, many of us remember those days when there were school closings. And the school closings were often due to snow days. And those oftentimes became the best days of the year for children. I remember the fond memories of playing in the snow and making snowballs and snowmen, even sledding like my Senator from Marion always enjoyed as a child. Those were great days as children.

But, today, there was a school closing not for that type of reason. Today, the University of Georgia closed their classes because there was a second on-campus death in two days.

In one case a girl was jogging and didn't return to her dorm. She was later found dead. Foul play is suspected.

My heart aches for the families who have lost these students.

I, for one, don't want anything like that to happen on the campuses in West Virginia. And I want to ensure that we as senators are doing everything possible under this great dome to make sure that that doesn't happen.

And one of the things that can be done to help ensure that something like that doesn't happen is to have campus police departments that are well trained and well staffed. And our campus police departments on the campuses of West Virginia are having problems recruiting and retaining police officers. And one of the reasons why they're having that problem is because these campus police officers are the only people in West Virginia who work in law enforcement and carry a gun that don't have a pension. And so, in the coming year, I'm going to be reaching out to all of you asking for your help to find a way that we can establish a pension plan for our campus police officers to enable our colleges and universities to be able to hire and retain campus police officers to keep our college campuses as safe as humanly possible.

And that in the end is my goal to make these campuses a safe place where we'll be proud to send our students in the future for many years to come.

SENATOR TARR: Thank you, Mr. President.

You know, this is a big honor to get to do this because I think the chamber's gonna really be excited to be able to get this adopted.

This resolution seeks to honor Medal of Honor recipient Hershel "Woody" Williams by placing a statue of him in the National Statuary Hall

In 1864, National Statuary Hall was created and each state was given two slots to display a statue of a prominent native. Currently, West Virginia is represented by Francis Pierpont and John Kenna.

In 2000, Congress granted states the option to replace its statues.

This resolution would ask that the current statue of John Kenna be removed, displayed at

the Culture Center, and replaced with a statue of Woody Williams.

John Kenna was a one-term U.S. senator and served for six years. He was both preceded and followed as a U.S. senator by Henry Gassaway David [sic]. He was key in relocating the state capitol back to Charleston from Wheeling.

This resolution addressed the historic military career of Woody Williams. It cites his involvement in creating of Gold Star Families Program and speaks to his extraordinary courage. It provides for the appointment of a commission to select an artist, requires the Governor to provide funding for the design and creation of a statue, and requires the Governor to submit an official written request to remove the current statue and replace it with one of Hershel "Woody" Williams.

Mr. President, this is . . . . I've known Woody—or got to know Woody—for a long time as many of us did in this chamber. And every one of us, I think, have had a special story.

And one of the reasons that I think that we should swap these statues out—we bring John Kenna back home and we put Woody up there—there's been a whole lot of history that's happened since John Kenna was placed up there and recognized for moving the capitol.

And the statues in Statuary Hall, what they're designed for . . . for every state . . . when you go through Statuary Hall in D.C., every state has two statues. Those statues tell the story of your state. When you go through, you'll have people that as they're touring and they got a tour guide, and they'll tell about all these statues. And so, as they go through, and they know about every story when they're going through state to state, they've done this thing time, and time, and time again. And so, when you get through people recognize very early who Francis Pierpont is relative to West Virginia. And almost, indelibly, you're going to have a question about who's John Kenna. And the tour guide's got to pull out their notebook and say, "Well, hold on a second," and they're going to look.

And so, it's not a disrespect to John Kenna at all, it's just a matter of what Woody has been able to go out and demonstrate of who West Virginians are.

You know, we say it a lot in here but it bears saying a lot, is that the people of West Virginia sent more of their sons and daughters in service and to give their life for the country. Nobody's done that more than West Virginia across the country.

And Woody embodied that. He laid it all on the line in Iwo Jima to go out and, multiple times, put his self at risk for the service of this country, and for his families, and his state, and he comes back to make sure that we were all safe. And for that, he was recognized with a Medal of Honor from our country.

But Woody didn't stop there. All the way until his very last day—and I can say that with the stories from the members who were right at his bedside—from the very last day, Woody spent his life advocating for the families who've lost their loved ones in service to this country . . . putting monuments all across the country with the Gold Star Families.

So, in my mind, if you're a West Virginian and somebody asks you who's somebody I would recognize from West Virginia, Woody Williams is a very easy answer. And they immediately get an idea and a concept of what is important to West Virginians.

We would aspire for our children to have the character that this hero has had and that West Virginia produced.

So, I urge the adoption of the resolution and, before I sit down, I want to recognize, you know, one of the people I introduced in here. This is not my idea. My name's at the top of it. It's an incredible honor to advocate for it and get the research done from the team that did the research on this on what it takes. But I have to give some credit to a constituent, which is how this works. I represent a lot of people as every one of us do in here. And one of my constituents who's sitting in the back of the chamber, Tony Hodge, came and said, "You know, I think we should do this because this tells our story better."

And so, with that, Mr. President, I urge adoption of the resolution.

I want to especially thank the family for taking a moment to come down here and be with us on such an honorable ... an honorable occasion.

I've been with Woody many, many times throughout my career and they were all good... they were all good. And when he passed, it was a sad day for West Virginia.

But, you know, we'll always have the memory of all the good ... of all the good that he done and, hopefully, we'll get this done and people across the globe will know the name Woody Williams a little bit better because there's nobody, Mr. President, more deserving to be honored that I can think of than Woody Williams.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE RYAN W. WELD

SENATOR WELD: Thank you, Mr. President.

As one of the two senators who represents the city of Wheeling, I stand in strong support of this resolution.

John Kenna was the man who led the charge to remove the capitol from the city of Wheeling down to Charleston, and so, to remove his statue from the U.S. capitol....

But, all jokes aside, Mr. President, as the Chairman of the Military Committee here in the Senate, I had the opportunity to meet Woody Williams many times and got to ask him the question that I always ask older veterans when I get a chance to talk to them. And I said, "Woody, tell me about . . . " I said, "A lot of people probably ask you . . . tell me about the time . . . you know, the actions that led to your receiving the Medal of Honor or when you shipped out." But the question that I always like to ask older veterans is, "Tell me about the day you came home." Because those guys were gone for years.

And so, I was at dinner with him here in Charleston and I asked him that question. So, he said that he was still in the Pacific and he got called into his commander's office and he said. "Williams, you're getting the Medal of Honor. You've got to go back home." He said, "I really didn't understand the gravity of that. I didn't really know what that meant." He said. "So I got on a ship and I went back to San Diego. And as soon as I got off the ship, I got picked up by Shore Patrol because I didn't have the right uniform on because I was out of season. So then they found out that some guy who was going to get something called the Medal of Honor was locked up by Shore Patrol so they got me out and said you're getting on a train, you're going to DC"

He said, "Well, then I was going to have to ride this train all the way to Washington, D.C., and then come back to West Virginia." He said, "The whole time I'm thinking, man, I've got to go all the way to D.C. just to get back to West Virginia to see my mom." So, he said, "Around Columbus, Ohio, this guy wearing a full Civil War general's outfit of the Confederacy got on the train." Said, "He had the sword and all on him. And he was walking up and down the aisle and he was talking to all these people . . . so he started to talking to me and I told him, hey, I got to go all the way to D.C. just to come back to West Virginia, I'm getting something, the Medal of Honor." And he said, "The guy looked at me and he said we're going to fix this." So, he said, "He left and he went and talked to the conductor and he came back and he said, if we slow it down around Morgantown, can you jump off?" And he said. "I can do that."

So, then he said, "Well, now I'm going to Morgantown, I can just jump off this train. My mom moved while I've been gone and I didn't know where she lived. I didn't know where her new house was. Since I got off the train . . . And then I started thinking, I'm going to have to find somebody and, hopefully, will know where my mom lives now." And so, he got a ride with somebody to his mom's house and that's how he got home. And then he had to get on the train . . . a couple of days later, he and his mom . . . and they went to D.C. But he said that he really didn't understand the gravity of what was going on until he was at the White House with the President and all the people that were there. He said, "I just thought it was going to be something small."

And so, that, to me, that story, like . . . . Those stories just don't happen anymore when people come home . . . what those guys went through.

And so, that's the question that I always like to ask those guys. I am so lucky, and I am so fortunate to have been able to ask that question of Woody and hear that story.

So, I stand in strong support.

But I was on a plane flying back to West Virginia. I was somewhere—I can't remember exactly where it was—and I saw him walk down the aisle. And I said to the steward, "Will you tell that man I'll switch seats with him?" I was sitting toward the front and he was headed all the way to the back. And I heard a voice from behind me saying, "He likes to ride in the back. He likes to ride in the back." But what an American hero.

It was so many times I got to spend time with him toward the end. And I asked him once . . . . Because late into life . . . his ability late into life to continue to lead the charge . . . the things he did late in his years . . . I once said, "What's the secret? How do you stay so vibrant? Well, you're more vibrant than I am, many years younger." I think he said it was a jigger of apple cider vinegar in the morning and a jigger of lemon juice, if I remember . . . Honey . . . honey . . .

And so I was out one day and found what I called a "West Virginia jigger". It was a pint. And I offered that to him and he said, "You're trying to kill me, Stuart."

He was great. So many times . . . . He had an infectious enthusiasm of a young person.

I was at a political rally with him—and he had done such amazing things, such extraordinary bravery—that I was at this event . . . And he wasn't the tallest guy and he couldn't see from this VIP section that he was seated in. And dam it, if he didn't stand up on a folding chair. In his nineties. And I'm just sitting there thinking, cause I went over to him and helped him down off that chair, I said, "You've got to get off that chair. This is not the way your story can end. Can you imagine? All those things you did."

When I was sworn in as U.S. Attorney I invited him to join us to lead the Color Guard to give the National Anthem. How many of us have heard him say, "One nation under God"? It's not, "One nation . . . under God". He has taught, I'll bet you, tens of thousands of folks the way the Pledge of Allegiance should be said.

It's such an honor . . . all those times I was with him. I can't think of a greater honor, not necessarily for Woody Williams, but for our state. He represents the best of all of us. His bravery . . . . And when you were with him at those quiet times, he had a great sense of humor.

But he wore, I'm sure in the night in his dreams, in those moments where he'd speak with you, the pain of the visions of what he did to secure this country.

So, I stand in strong support of this motion, Mr. President.

And I thank his family and him for his contributions, not only to West Virginia but to all generations of West Virginians and Americans across this country. Thank you.

And I always just admired him. You know, in our community, our armory in Marion County is named the "Woody Williams Armory". Even one of the VFWs, as the Senator from Marion said, is named for Woody Williams. And it's one of the award-winning VFWs in the United States

But I just wanted to make a final point, Woody Williams lied in state in this capitol and he lied in state in our nation's capitol. And, if this resolution is passed, he will stand in the National Statuary Hall forever.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MIKE CAPUTO

Saturday, February 24, 2024

SENATOR CAPUTO: Thank you, Mr. President.

You stood with me today as we introduced this beautiful family that's here today for this bill. And I want to take a moment to thank the Education Chair for the interest that she has shown in this.

You know, it's a sheer tragedy that not many of us will experience but some of us have in this chamber.

On October 24, 2021, Mr. President, tragedy struck this beautiful family that I introduced early on in the session.

24-year-old Laken Morgan died of a fentanyl overdose. Morgan was a beautiful young lady. You can see that picture, she had a lot of life to live. Mr. President. Lot of life to live.

She left behind a beautiful little three-yearold. And she's with us today. I think she's five now. Five or six. She's with us today.

Death to Laken, Mr. President, was immediate. They said she had enough fentanyl in her system to kill six people. Six people. Can you imagine that much fentanyl in that beautiful young lady's system?

Well, her mother Diane, she wanted to turn that pain into power. She didn't know how to deal with this process as most citizens out there don't. But she knew she wanted to take that pain and help others so they didn't have to go through the tragedy that that family went through.

And on February 1, Mr. President, several of us, including me, received a letter from Ms. Barnett saying, if anybody will talk to me, I want to meet with you about this law.

I know that I personally responded to her and we set up a meeting, and she came to my office and she wanted to share her story. She wanted to share her tragedy as difficult as it was. She wanted to do that to help others. She wanted to save other families from going through the grief that they had to go through.

Quite frankly, Madam Chairwoman, she wanted to save lives. She wanted to save lives.

We talked, we cried, and we hugged. And she asked me to introduce this bill. And I did that . . . as the House did. And when the House bill got here, the most important thing that happened is the Chairwoman said yes to this bill and placed it on her agenda. I think her words to me was, "This must be done."

So here we are today voting on a bill that was the idea of a citizen of this state who suffered a terrible tragedy. But she didn't stay home and grieve. She didn't blame others. She wanted to find a way to help. That's what West Virginians are all about. That's why I love this state so much and I think that's why everyone of us in this chamber love this state so much.

But she told me that she did not want drugs to define her daughter. She did not want that. That will not define what she was all about.

What will define her is that beautiful little grandchild sitting up there with her grandmother, that beautiful little girl, Madison, and this piece of life-saving legislation because she really believes that if her daughter was educated a little more about the dangers of fentanyl, she would have never touched it and she would be here with us today.

So she wanted to make sure that every child in this state had some type of knowledge of how horrible this drug is and how it takes lives. Because her daughter would have never chose to leave that beautiful baby of hers and that beautiful family of hers. So maybe, maybe we can help the future of West Virginia.

You know, I've always said we teach our kids at a very early age not to play with matches. And it works. We've got to spend more time teaching 'em the harmful effects that drugs like fentanyl has done to our society.

So, Mr. President, I think this is a very, very important piece of legislation. And I want to thank that beautiful family for coming down here and sharing that heart-wrenching story that they had to share. But, you know what? You got results. And this will define Laken. And this will define your family. And this piece of legislation will save lives.

Thank you, Mr. President.

That's 54 people. Now, those aren't the ones that overdosed and survived, they were the ones that died out of that one batch of . . . you know, drugs that was brought into our communities.

So, most of these people that died from fentanyl poisoning have no idea that fentanyl was in what they're taking. They think it's something that's fairly, fairly harmless and something that you, potentially, find in their medicine cabinet.

But there's lots of counterfeits out there and this is a very real problem and our children certainly need to be aware of it.

I rise today in the place of some of my constituents. Two of my high school classmates, Michael Cole and Cherie Mullins, married and had a beautiful family. And on July 9, 2020, their daughter Lauren also died of fentanyl poisoning.

She was a tremendously talented young woman at 26. A high school graduate, a college graduate, a master's degree, a cheerleader, lacrosse player, and . . . she was exposed to fentanyl.

And... before she died, she had thought she had overcome her addiction. And she had told her father that what her wish was that there would be a place when somebody immediately recognized their desire to step away from that

culture, that there was a place they could go immediately.

And, upon her death, her family established Lauren's Wish. It's in the old Ramada Hotel in Morgantown, many of you know where that is. And it's a wonderful facility that is trying to help people through this recovery process.

And so, today, I stand in their place. I vote for them so that we don't have other West Virginia children in need of Lauren's Wish. That we instead have children learning the risks and not being exposed to fentanyl.

I wish to this day I did not know their moms and dads or their families because I got to know them through the misery and chaos of this scourge across our state, a scourge across our country that's wiping out our young people and destroying families.

I stand in strong support, Mr. President, and there's far, far more we need to do in this area.

But today, I know my colleague from the seventh he's going to ask for that because he's wanting to say a few words. But I always want to stand up and say something myself.

And just always remember that  $\dots$  of the 125 souls that got lost in Buffalo Creek Disaster  $\dots$  my home.

So, I want to yield the rest of my time over to my colleague from the seventh.

SENATOR STUART: Thank you, Mr. President.

Thanks for the remarks from the Senator from Logan.

You know, 52 years ago at this hour, there were tens of thousands of families all across Logan County and southern West Virginia that were in desperate crisis. Three dams had burst and that water flowed in a tidal wave down Buffalo Creek.

As he said, 125, at least, perished in that terrible event. Over a thousand injured. And think of this, 4,000 families made homeless from that terrible event that happened at 8 o'clock that morning . . . about 8 o'clock.

It decimated not only Man, but about 16 communities downstream. You think of the words of the folks who were involved and, just two years ago, we were all together in Man in remembrance of this event. And it was so personal. All the folks, the stories . . . . It's still . . . they live it every single day. They remember the story incredibly well.

Shirley Marcum said, "The only warning we had was just a neighbor woman had spotted it and just pulled in front of our house and hollered, 'Run, the dam has broke'! And then you could hear the roar . . . and you could see it. I saw my neighbors' houses leave. I watched them crumble. I seen trees, logs, cars, slate, slush, you name it and it was in that."

Mannix Porterfield—who many of us know—a reporter for many, many years wrote, he said, "It looked like a battlefield. As if some foreign enemy had flown in and nuked the place. Debris was everywhere. Bridges were smashed to bits. Homes were left in splinters. Railroad tracks yanked up and twisted. They looked like huge metallic pretzels." And then he talked about the makeshift morgues.

I just say this evening, Mr. President, with your blessing, that we offer a moment of silence for all those families who still sustain that loss, who still remember it as if it was yesterday.

The scars are real. And when you see the emotion on those folks who lived it as little kids, those kids think about being in those schools and seeing that tidal wave of water wash across everything you knew and wash it away. The stories of the bodies that lay in the mud... tough stories

So, Mr. President, a moment of silence, if you will, for all these victims and all their families.

Billy Wayne was ahead of his time. I think all of us today in the Senate place great value on our first responders. And a lot of that is . . . to the events of 9/11 that occurred in 2001. Billy Wayne was 10 years ahead of that. He was the most involved senator in his volunteer fire departments . . . worried about his EMS. He had been a sheriff and really just placed great value on our first responders and was always engaged on those kinds of issues.

He, of course, was engaged on the military issues and on the Military Committee.

And really, he just loved southern West Virginia. He told me that I became a better man the day I married a woman from Bluefield.

And he just . . . there was just an aspect of Billy Wayne that he was just a lot of fun to be around. Nobody has ever served in this Senate who loved being here more than Billy Wayne Bailey.

And . . . I miss my friend and I ask that you adopt this resolution.

And, you know, Billy Wayne and I were very good friends. Our families became good friends. When his children were growing up—I watched them grow up. You can talk about all the seriousness of how he was with family, but you do have to say some things about . . . because he was a jokester.

And I'm going to tell you a couple things that stand out in my mind. Sometimes when we were voting on bills, you know, you would be having a bill and something about . . . . And he would look at me and said, "Well, Bob, it's all about the numbers." I look at him and said, "There's no

fiscal note on this. What do you mean it's all about the numbers?" "Well, there's more of them for it then there are against it." He said, "It's all about the numbers. I'm with them."

So, he'd always say things like that.

You know, I recall that . . . you know, there used to be fundraisers that groups would do. And when you'd come in, for men, they would take off the tie and then they would raffle off the tie. Well, he was going to a fundraiser one time and, you know, Truman Chafin was known to have really nice ties, and he thought, "Well, shoot, this is a good way for me to get a nice tie." And I'm going to go in and when it comes up and he sees what Truman's tie is, he's going to bid on it. Well, Truman had gone to Kmart before the event. Bought a Kmart tie, went up in there, and Billy Wayne kept bidding on it, and bid on it real high, and got this Kmart tie and he went, "Gosh, I didn't see that coming."

So he was always a jokester. He was always a person that always had a laugh, always had something nice to say about people. He was serious about his service. He was serious about his family. So serious about his family. That was all that he talked about most of the time. And that's good.

I will miss him. I was sorry I wasn't able to go to the wake or anything but this is a way for us to say how much we loved him, how much we cared for him, and how much of a part of this body he was.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE DAVID STOVER

SENATOR STOVER: Thank you, Mr. President.

I'm going to go back a little further in time and speak of Billy Wayne.

I was three, or four, or five years older than him but we grew up together. He lived up toward Herndon and I lived just up from Mullens. And we ran into each other all the time. We were friends. Although we saw each other a lot less in the last 20 years of his life, we stayed in touch. And it was good always to see him.

He would always send, at least once a month, he'd send something to my son and his wife about my grandson and tell them to tell my grandson about what a special little man he is, that kind of thing.

But I'm going to go way back. Back when . . . Billy Wayne was a Democrat, as you all know. And I came out of high school a Democrat myself. I stayed that way for about eight years. I've been a Republican, I guess, for 45 now, or something like that. But we decided to organize the youth in Wyoming County and we formed a political organization and we had people . . . . We would take them to the Young Democrat organization meetings and things like that

But, we'd get people on a . . . we would handle . . . we would do a thing at the meeting called point-counterpoint. Billy Wayne was a bit more liberal than I on some things, but he was more conservative than you might know on others. You know, if you want to talk Second Amendment, he was the guy to talk to. But we did a point-counterpoint and we would argue so vehemently—not that we actually believed either side of the story we were doing—and people would come just to watch that. And they would join up and do things like that.

But being Democrats for a while, we went to a meeting one time up in Clarksburg. And I'm not going to say what kind of meeting—you'd probably figure out who we're talking about if I did that. But I went up with Billy Wayne. He took his car. And we were in a meeting there and one of the people was trying to become president of the Young Democrats in the State of West Virginia, and Billy Wayne was backing someone else. And these folks on the other side of who he wanted to be the president were obviously in control of the convention, I'll say, and one of them made a threat to Billy Wayne.

We were at table, several of us from Wyoming County, and he sat there and got angrier and angrier. I don't mean the kind of anger where you go . . . you know, shoot somebody or something like that but, you could tell, he was not going to let that rest. I said,

"Billy Wayne, don't go up there, please, cause I rode up here with you. Don't go up there and get something started that we can't finish." He said, "Oh, I'm going to be nice, but I'm going to tell him what is "

So, he went up there and the next thing you know, Billy Wayne comes back and said, "Man, that didn't go well." And then the door opens and this guy comes in. One guy, he was about 4'3", weighed about 80 pounds, he was Billy Wayne's strong arm guy there. I'm not kidding you. The guy didn't give me a lot of hope. But another big strong guy came in there and he was the other guy's guy. And they were going to . . . looked like they were going to fight. Billy Wayne said, "You guys take it out of the hall. Get out of here and close that door. We don't want to see this. This thing's a dignified thing."

So, they went out the door and suddenly you heard like someone was getting bounced off the wall and the door. The door was banging. And thought oh no, Billy Wayne's guy surely is not winning this tussle. Well, the door opened up and Billy Wayne's guy fell through the door . . . unconscious. And Billy Wayne said, "That's it. That's it. I'm going up there and tell him my mother will make the call." I said, "Billy Wayne, your mother's from Bud, man. She's not going to call anybody to handle something in Clarksburg."

Anyway, I just wanted to point out that Billy Wayne stayed and, obviously, lived through all that and did fine . . . and I thumbed home.

You know, that's the truth. That was a good story.

But I think the best story . . . the best story I could tell about my friend, the guy I've loved for all of his life and most of mine, one time—and I won't say how old we were, I was older than him, keep that in mind—but he said he had a jar of real good untaxed whiskey. And I said, "What do you mean by untaxed, does that mean it's illegal?" "Oh no, it's legal, Bugs. I wouldn't talk you into it." I didn't drink hardly ever and I still don't hardly ever. So, he said, "We got to . . . we got to do this. Really. I bought it. It's legitimate."

So, you know, we drank. In about four hours we drank most of a quart of clear as spring water moonshine. But he had a label on it from one of those companies that sell such things. And anyway, right at the end of it, he told me, he said, "Don't you dare tell my mom and dad." His mother was perhaps the finest woman that has

ever lived since the ancient biblical days anyway. And his dad, you know, had been the president of the commission and was connected and was friendly, but you didn't cross him. And I said, "Oh, I won't tell. But, how come?" He said-and I thought he don't want them to know that he might not be old enough to be doing this, you know, because I am old enough, I'm probably the guy that's going down if this went down—and he said, "Oh no, I just don't want them to know. I don't want them to feel badly toward you." I thought, "Yep, I'm set up here for sure." And then he said, "Bugs, it's really not legal. Okay. I bought it from Mr. Canada up on top of the mountain and he . . . . " I said, "I know who that is. I know him. He makes it right out behind his house. God, Billy Wayne." He said, "You got to do it. You got to do it. It's an honorable thing." And I said, "Okay, tell me why." And he said, "What we're doing is we're paying tribute to the Whiskey Rebellion." And I said, "Oh, is that what we're doing? That's great."

And I just want to point out that, to this day, once a year, I drink an ounce—I won't say if it's untaxed or not . . . okay, it's not—I drink an ounce of untaxed whiskey every year between Christmas and New Year's.

Senator from Marion's exactly correct, he never forgot where he came from and would often tell us he remembers where he came from.

We wanted to show you some arts from, you know, the State of West Virginia, the two choirs that we had here. We do sing that song a lot. I hope you all enjoyed it and sang along. They know the words better than some West Virginians, quite honestly. I really was amazed.

But, Taiwan and West Virginia has had a long-standing sisterhood partnership which has continued to grow and flourish through the decades.

And I will say that we are, and they are, one of our greatest strategic partners. We appreciate what they stand for and I think they appreciate what we stand for.

Last year, the West Virginia Department of Education signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Taiwan's Ministry of Education as part of the U.S.-Taiwan Education Initiative.

This year marks the forty-fifth anniversary of the Taiwan Relations Act. The United States and Taiwan have forged an even stronger economic relationship over the decades and West Virginia supports the U.S.-Taiwan Initiative on the 21st-Century Trade, Economic Prosperity Partnership Dialogue and Technology, Trade, and Investment Collaboration Framework.

The West Virginia Senate also congratulates Taiwan on smoothly completing its eighth presidential election on January 13, 2024.

We got e-mails, or texts, from Dennis throughout the evening late, and in the morning—our morning, your evening—we got news of the election.

And what I will tell you, we congratulate President-elect Lai Ching-te and Vice Presidentelect Hsiao Bi-khim. And she was here in West Virginia. And she is the first Vice President, I believe, that has been to West Virginia and she was recently elected.

West Virginia is committed to continuing to strengthen the sisterhood partnership with Taiwan and are thankful for the relationship we have with Taiwan.

One other thing I'll say is I think that our, you know, Mitch Carmichael and the group from Economic Development made a great choice in hiring Ricky Lee representing the State of West Virginia. # REMARKS OF HONORABLE JACK DAVID WOODRUM

Friday, March 8, 2024

SENATOR WOODRUM: Thank you, Mr. President

Dr. Edith Levy was a remarkable advocate for Holocaust education. She dedicated her life to ensuring that the horrors of the Holocaust would never be forgotten.

She was born in Vienna, Austria, in 1930. She witnessed the Nazi violence at the tender age of eight years. In 1938, her family fled Austria's Nazi rule and escaped to Belgium. While hiding in basements and attics, Edith, her mother, and two brothers evaded capture by the Nazis. Her father was apprehended and tragically died in Auschwitz, one of Germany's concentration and extermination camps.

Between 1.1 and 1.5 million people died at Auschwitz. Ninety percent of them were Jews. It is estimated that the Nazis used these death camps to kill approximately 11 million people.

I believe Dr. Levy's greatest accomplishment was spearheading the establishment of West Virginia's Commission on Holocaust Education which was created with Governor Cecil Underwood in 1998.

She crisscrossed the Mountain State to organize Holocaust commemorative programs and workshops for teachers. Her tireless efforts ensured that West Virginia students of all grades would hear the story as a Holocaust survivor.

To support her mission further, Dr. Levy authored one of the first textbooks on the Holocaust and prepared an accompanying teachers' guide.

Earlier in the session, we considered an education bill that included provisions requiring West Virginia students to learn about the Holocaust and other genocides worldwide. That legislation was part of an education bill that failed to pass the House of Delegates. Later today, an amendment will be offered to a House bill that will give new life to this important piece of legislation. By raising awareness of the attractive committed during the Holocaust, this legislation aims to prevent such crimes from happening again.

Dr. Levy's legacy will live on through legislation mandating Holocaust education at West Virginia schools.

It is an honor to contribute to Dr. Edith Levy's vision.

I urge adoption of the resolution.

### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. OLIVERIO II

SENATOR OLIVERIO: Thank you, Mr. President.

I, too, rise in support of the legislation.

Dr. Edith Levy showed up here about 1996 in the state capitol and she was advocating the creation of a Holocaust Commission. And one of her primary objectives was to establish a learning center where public school teachers across West Virginia would have the ability to access resources to teach about the Holocaust and to help children understand: (1) That it happened; and (2) that we needed to learn about things like that so that history doesn't repeat itself

She was an impassioned advocate for this cause, eventually convincing the Legislature and Governor Cecil Underwood to create the Holocaust Commission. It went for many years. It's been a little dormant now, and I hope we can get it reactivated . . . .

But a big part of her program was education. She operated a facility in Morgantown that collected resources to provide information to public school teachers. And just made quite a contribution to West Virginia.

Her son, Laurent, has come and joined us today.

She passed away recently, and, last fall, had a memorial service in Morgantown. A number of members of the Legislature attended he memorial service and we visited with the family and shared experiences as to her contributions that she's made to West Virginia and beyond.

So I ask my fellow senators to support this resolution. I also ask you to keep an open mind later today when an amendment comes asking to insert the language associated with the Holocaust Commission into another bill that is currently moving.

### To eliminate the vaccine requirements for public virtual schools

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL J. MARONEY

Saturday, March 9, 2024

SENATOR MARONEY: Thank you, Mr. President.

Mr. President, House Bill 5105 permits private and parochial schools to elect, in writing, to develop a policy that exempts private and parochial schools from the current mandatory vaccination requirements.

The bill provides there is no cause of action against any private or parochial school

administrator, employee, board, owner, or operator of the private or parochial school who maintains compliance with the mandatory vaccination requirements.

There's no cause of action for a private or parochial school that chooses to adopt a policy of exemption. There shall be no cause of action against any school, administrator, employee, board, owner, or operator of that private or parochial school provided the school provides upon enrollment, and annually thereafter, in writing to all parents or guardians of children attending the private or parochial school a notice of their election pursuant to subsection (j) in this bill and receive a signed acknowledgement. A copy of the signed acknowledgement shall be kept on file.

The bill requires that all students participating in any activities sponsored by the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission or any school-sponsored club activities which result in competition meet the requirements of this section which contain mandatory vaccination requirements or they have obtained a specified exemption.

Lastly, Mr. President, the bill provides an exemption for a full-time virtual public school student who does not physically attend the public school, is exempt from the mandatory vaccine requirements. This provision contains a proviso stating that students enrolled in virtual public school classes, and also attend private or parochial schools, shall be subject to the requirements mentioned in subsection (i).

Mr. President, I personally do not urge passage but your Health Committee urges passage of this bill. I reserve the right to close.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President.

I know some of my friends in the back are going to be in disagreement with me on this. Some of my friends in the chamber are. And I respect . . . I respect their opinions.

But I have a few things that I really need to say about this particular bill.

With respect to Dr. Jonas Salk, Mr. President, we could entitle this bill "Make Polio Great Again Act of 2024".

Sadly, what people have done in our state and in our country, the debacle that was the coronavirus vaccine . . . . All the horrible things that came along with that, and all the controversy that came along with that coronavirus, the novel coronavirus vaccine had been conflated with measles, and whooping cough, polio.

Mr. President, we've had these vaccinations for children for 60 years to protect them against measles, whooping cough, polio, etc.

My good friend, John, in Huntington who, Mr. President, who is a victim of polio . . . . His mother was a teacher. And they were lining kids up to get the polio vaccine. She put her kid at the end of the line . . . John. He didn't get the vaccine. "We'll get you next week." He got polio. He's dragged that leg around his whole life.

The irony of this bill, Mr. President, is the parents that want religious freedom. And I respect that. But on the other hand, their own healthy, innocent, vulnerable children may, I say may, pay the price by suffering severe injury or death, Mr. President. Death.

Now, we've learned a lot about travel ball this session. Travel ball. Heard about it for weeks. What we learned is kids go to other states year round, twelve months out of the year, and they compete on cheer, or softball, or whatever. And they go to South Carolina, and they go to Florida, and they go to the other places in the south, southeast. And what happens, Mr. President, as they're unvaccinated, as they will be if this passes, and they're going to interact with other unvaccinated children, Mr. President, they're going to bring back measles, they're going to bring back whooping cough to their religious school.

And it's no laughing matter. It's not an episode of *The Brady Bunch* where everybody gets the measles. Whoever made that comment early in the session needs a frontal lobotomy cause this is as serious as a heart attack.

I'm going to read a letter and I'll close, Mr. President. I'm going to read a letter from a constituent Dr Marie Frazier:

"Dear Senator Woelfel:

"I am a physician in the pediatric intensive care unit at Hoops Family Children's Hospital.

"There have been multiple outbreaks in other states of preventable diseases like measles.

"Our own PICU in Huntington has had children die from preventable diseases for which immunizations would provide immunity. Most recently, a child died in our PICU from whooping cough ... unvaccinated.

"West Virginia hospitals are already currently at capacity in treating children with respiratory infections. Let's not add to that unnecessarily.

"We must continue to protect our children and work to keep them healthy."

I urge a "no" vote.

SENATOR MARONEY: Yes, thank you, Mr. President.

Would anyone like to yield that's going to vote opposite of me?

Good choice.

Vaccines, Mr. President, are a victim of their own success. Without a doubt, they're a victim of their own success. We go from millions, tens of millions dying every year in the world to 700,000, which is where we're at today, that are preventable deaths from vaccines.

So the generation now that's promoting this type of legislation . . . they didn't have to be the moms that were scared to death of where their kids went, who their kids played with. They didn't have to fight to get in line for the vaccines.

Vaccines are their own worst enemy. They've been too good.

Mr. President, we lose herd immunity, or come close to losing herd immunity every day. When you see these people crossing our border, I mean do you really ...? And some of those are citizens that want to come and work and provide for their families and some of them are convicts and criminals. But, no matter who's coming across, do you really think they're stopping to

get their polio vaccine? They're not. Or their MMR? They're not. Okay.

So, here we have it, Mr. President. I'm going to give a few examples. I told you I'd be five minutes or less, and I will be.

I'm going to give one example that no one ever talks about: German Measles. I bet half the people in here don't even know what German Measles are. Well, that's Rubella. German Measles is Rubella. It's very much like the measles. Very contagious. Half of the kids that get German Measles have a very mild fever and a very mild rash. Nothingness. The other half have no symptoms at all, but they have active disease.

You say, "Well, why would we have a vaccine for that?" Well, because the last epidemic of German Measles in the United States, Mr. President—let me see if I can find it here—it caused 21,000 abortions, it caused 5,000 neonatal deaths, and 30,000 severely mentally and physically handicapped kids being horn

As a matter of fact, Rubella, German Measles, that epidemic that I just mentioned was in 1964-65. It was about 15 months, 12.5 million people had the disease in the United States.

It's such a threat to the pregnant lady that that disease itself was one of the leading causes that led to the legalization of abortion . . . because of its predilection for it being teratogenic and severely, severely teratogenic.

Mr. President . . . well, actually West Virginia, West Virginia, if you're a teacher and you have kids in your class or you're a mom and you have older siblings in the house, please, please, if this bill passes—which it's going to get your titers for Rubella checked. Because there's an 85 percent chance that you will have an in utero death, spontaneous abortion, elective abortion because your kid doesn't have a chance to live outside of the womb, or many other things. Eighty-five percent chance if you're exposed to a child that can be completely asymptomatic . . . that's why Rubella was so serious. It was the silent killer. So, please get your titers checked because there's going to be kids in your private school that aren't vaccinated and your baby is at risk. Big time at risk.

And if anyone doesn't believe that, look it up. Read about it. Because I'll tell you one thing, it's true. And I don't care what anyone in here says, there's not one person sitting in this room right this minute that knows more about this topic than I do even though you think you do.

And I won't say that about many things. This might be the only thing I say that about. And I'm not arrogant. I'm truthful.

Mr. President, it's a bad bill for West Virginia. It's a step backwards. There's no question, no question, there'll be negative effects to families, to children, immunocompromised adults, not to mention, not to mention, the cost... We don't have enough money for medicine right now. People can't afford their drugs, Mr. President. People can't afford the cost of insurance. What do you think insurance is going to do? I mean, when you add it... People that choose to not get vaccines and they're in our same insurance pool, guess what? We all get to pay higher insurance rates for them.

That is so, so, so far below, Mr. President, what we're about to do to the kids, to the adults of West Virginia. It's an embarrassment for me to be a part of it. It should be an embarrassment for everybody. Time will tell. Time will definitely tell, Mr. President.

And I could go through five more diseases like I just did with Rubella but I'll spare you because it won't change a mind and I know it won't change a mind.

So, Mr. President, as I said in Health Committee, in closing, I took an oath to do no harm. There's zero chance I could vote for this bill.

I'm a "no" vote.

Pursuant to the proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor, the Honorable Jim Justice, dated the seventeenth day of May, 2024, convening the eighty-sixth Legislature of West Virginia in extraordinary session today (Sunday, May 19, 2024), under the provisions of section seven, article seven of the Constitution of West Virginia, the Senate assembled in its chamber in the state capitol in the City of Charleston at 6:55 p.m., and was called to order by its President, the Honorable Craig Blair.

Prayer was offered by the Honorable Vince S. Deeds, a senator from the tenth district.

The Senate was then led in recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance by the Honorable Amy N. Grady, a senator from the fourth district.

On the call of the roll, the following answered to their names:

Senators Azinger, Boley, Chapman, Clements, Deeds, Grady, Hamilton, Hunt, Jeffries, Karnes, Martin, Maynard, Nelson, Oliverio, Phillips, Plymale, Queen, Roberts, Rucker, Smith, Stover, Stuart, Swope, Takubo, Tarr, Taylor, Trump, Weld, Woelfel, Woodrum, and Blair (Mr. President).

Thirty-one members having answered to their names, the President declared the presence of a quorum.

Senator Blair (Mr. President) laid before the Senate the following proclamation from His Excellency, the Governor, convening the Legislature in extraordinary session, which was read by the Clerk:

## STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

#### A PROCLAMATION

#### By the Governor

I, JIM JUSTICE, by virtue of the authority vested in the Governor by Section 7, Article VII, of the Constitution of West Virginia, do hereby call the West Virginia Legislature to convene in Extraordinary Session at 5:00 PM on Sunday, May 19, 2024, in its chambers in the State Capitol, the City of Charleston, for the limited purpose of considering and acting upon only the following matters:

FIRST: To restore the budgets of the Department of Human Services and the Department of Health, including the Office of Inspector General, provided that certain amounts will be held in reserve accounts that may be accessed by the Secretary of the Department of Health and the Secretary of the Department of Human Services as such amounts may be needed.

SECOND: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, fund 0620, fiscal year 2024, organization 0803, in the amount of \$150,000,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by increasing an existing item of appropriation.

THIRD: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Governor's Office – Civil Contingent Fund, fund 0105, fiscal year 2024, organization 0100, in the amount of \$50,000,000 for new State agricultural lab facilities, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by adding a new item of appropriation.

FOURTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Governor's Office, fund 0101, fiscal year 2024, organization 0100, in the amount of \$10,000,000 for the Posey Perry Emergency Food Bank Fund, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by adding a new item of appropriation.

FIFTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Education, State Board of Education – State Department of Education, fund 0313, fiscal year 2024, organization 0402, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, in the amounts of \$3,289,060 and \$27,321,613 to provide funds for increased enrollment and Hope Scholarship funding respectively, by increasing existing items of appropriation.

SIXTH: To supplement and amend the appropriation of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining unappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, to reduce the surplus section of the 2025 budget bill to reflect the anticipated passage of certain supplemental appropriations bills contemplated herein, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

SEVENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, Higher Education Policy Commission – Administration – Control Account, fund 0589, fiscal year 2024, organization 0441, by the total amount of \$83,215,351 to provide needed funds for the State's colleges and universities and our students in response to the issues with this year's Free Application for Federal Student Aid ("FAFSA") at the federal level, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by adding new items and increasing an existing item of appropriation.

EIGHTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Veterans' Assistance, fund 0456, fiscal year 2024, organization 0613, in the amount of \$2,000,000 for contract nursing expenses, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by increasing existing items of appropriation.

and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, by increasing existing items of appropriation.

NINTH: To supplement and amend Chapter 11, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 2024, known as the budget bill, in Title II from the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Education, State Board of Education – State Aid to Schools, fund 0317, fiscal year 2025, organization 0402, relating to the school aid formula, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025 by decreasing items of appropriation.

TENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriation of public moneys out of the Treasure from the balance of moneys remaining unappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, to the Department of Administration, Division of Information Services and Communication, fund 2220, fiscal year 2025, organization 0210, Department of Administration, Office of Technology Chief Technology Officer Administration Fund, fund 2531, organization 0231, to reflect the passage of House Bill 5432, which consolidated and reorganized funds under the Department of Administration's Division of Information Services and Communication and the Office of Technology, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending in June 30, 2025.

ELEVENTH: To expire funds to the unappropriated balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, in the amount of \$83,215,351.25 from the Department of Revenue, State Budget Office, PEIA Rainy Day Fund, fund 7402, fiscal year 2024, organization 0703.

TWELFTH: To expire funds to the balance of the Department of the Arts, Culture, and History, Cultural Facilities and Capitol Resource Match Grant Program Fund, fund 3537, fiscal year 2023, organization 0432, in the amount of \$2,877,636, from the balance of Lottery Net Profits, Division of Culture and History – Lottery Education Fund, fund 3534, organization 0432.

THIRTEENTH: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new section, designated § 9-5-29a, relating to residential substance use disorder treatment facilities, to prohibit payment to facilities that do not meet certain requirements, to require licensure, to require accreditation, to require the Bureau for Medical Services to make necessary filings, to set forth specific timeframe to obtain licensure and accreditation, to require residential substance use disorder treatment facility to obtain accreditation within one year of operation, to provide provisions for operation at a new site or new ownership, to require a report, to state that licensed treatment beds are subject to specific provisions, to provide for rulemaking, and to provide a sunset date.

FOURTEENTH: To amend and reenact § 3-5-21 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to political party nomination of presidential electors, to provide that presidential electors shall be nominated by each political party in a manner governed and prescribed by the rules of that state executive committee and not inconsistent with the rules of the national political party, and providing default rules if party rules do not provide procedures to nominate presidential electors.

FIFTEENTH: To amend and reenact § 11B-2-20 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to deposits to the Revenue Shortfall Reserve Fund and Revenue Shortfall Reserve Fund - Part B.

At the request of Senator Takubo, unanimous consent being granted, reference of the bill to a committee was dispensed with, and it was taken up for immediate consideration, read a first time, and ordered to second reading.

The weeks fly away from us, and the years . . . . It was 31 years ago when I first met Bob as a newly arrived member of the House of Delegates. Bob was a seasoned veteran at that point and he was a mentor to me. He taught me how to act as a legislator. Taught me so many things.

And just delightful to be around all the time. A person filled with great humor, a great love for the State of West Virginia. And, as I said, a political icon, not just for Roane County but for the entire State of West Virginia.

And as I stand here now, I can't . . . I can't believe . . . I can't get my mind around that he's gone.

He loved this state and his district deeply. Served with great distinction as Minority Leader in the House of Delegates, later, as a senator in this body.

I'm thinking back on times together. His father had been a member of the House of Delegates and, while his father was living, his father used to come occasionally to the floor of the House and receive a big round of applause and welcome from the House. And it seems in many ways just . . . just yesterday. Just yesterday.

I'm going to miss him terribly. He was . . . the resolution said devoted husband and father. There's no question about that, Mr. President. He loved Anita and talked about her all the time. And his boys, Ben and Sam, the same. He was so proud of his whole family and what his spouse, what his wife and his sons accomplished.

I'm going to miss . . . going to miss Bob terribly.

Thank you, Mr. President.

MR. PRESIDENT: Thank you, Mr. President.

I've got some stories I want to tell.

And it's tragic that we've lost—I was going to say this at the end but I'm going to say it at the beginning . . . now—a gentle giant. He was. Bob was tall and larger than life.

I never knew him at all until I was first elected to the House of Delegates in 2002. And Charles Trump knew, excuse me, Senator from Morgan knew that I was a little bit of a wild card and he had to put me next to somebody that I could learn from. And that I did. I was blessed by your decision to put me next to Bob Ashley. And we sat there together and he taught me the ins and outs on how to behave, how to respond. I didn't always listen, but he was always right.

He knew how to be a statesman. He knew how to be an effective legislator. He knew how to be a good husband and father. I watched these things and learned. And you don't forget when you find mentors like, at that point in time, Delegate Ashley, and then Senator Ashley. I was blessed.

Now, I've got a story that I'm dying to tell because I got seated next to him. And we were sitting there and I barely knew Bob, I barely knew anybody, and up front in the House of Delegates . . . that's where the press sat, up on the front row. And I was sitting there, I said, "Bob, who's this one guy sitting up there?" I said, "He looks like a Porterfield." He goes, "Well, that's Mannix Porterfield from the *Beckley Register* in Raleigh County." I go, "You got to be kidding me." I said, "He looks like a Porterfield." And Bob goes, "Well, why you say that?" And I said, "Well, my mom is a Porterfield." And I said, "I can't wait to get up and go over and talk to this guy and talk to . . . ." Little did I know that I was going to meet what I believe is . . . been one of the most fantastic, the best reporter that I've seen in my legislative experience, Mannix Porterfield. And Bob walked me up there to talk to him because I was a little nervous on what was going on.

But he knew how to manage people and how to make people feel like they were part of a team, of a group that worked together.

You guys were blessed and you carry it on. You will carry it on in your families because that's what we do.

The passing is a tragedy; but the life of accomplishments are not. It's what we build upon.

Thank you for sharing your family with our family, and I'm speaking of the people of West Virginia and those that we represent.

I can't say anymore except for . . . . I should have stopped at thank you. And Bob knew how I felt about him.

Wonderful man.

Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. President.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. WOELFEL

Monday, May 20, 2024

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President

I think this needs just a little bit further explanation . . . and I rise in support of the bill that we see before us.

I've had a couple of members ask me about how this fits into the recovery residence, sober living home situation that we've heard quite a bit about over the last three or four sessions. So, I wanted to explain that.

This bill does not address recovery residences or sober living homes. What it does is it applies strictly to residential substance use disorder treatment facilities which really in plain terms is what we would think of as a 30-day or 60-day treatment facility setting.

I like this bill because it requires accreditation of these facilities and it will eliminate fly-by-night or exploitive operations in my view. This accreditation gives all the players in this particular arena a long period of time to become compliant. It will give West Virginia really the best practices as we move forward into this residential recovery arena.

And for that reason, I urge passage.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE CHARLES H. CLEMENTS

Monday, May 20, 2024

SENATOR CLEMENTS: Thank you, Mr. President.

As I'm sure most of you know, the Senate lost a great person today. Wanda Casto, who had been my Administrative Assistant for the last, I guess, four years or so, passed away this morning at about 11:30.

She was a true individual of faith... a person who knew what she was facing, and made the decision.

You know, we spent many hours in the morning before caucus—we were both here early—and we talked and she always told me, "God has a plan and who are we to try to change it?"

Pursuant to the proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor, the Honorable Jim Justice, dated the twenty-eighth day of September, 2024, convening the eighty-sixth Legislature of West Virginia in extraordinary session today (Monday, September 30, 2024), under the provisions of section seven, article seven of the Constitution of West Virginia, the Senate assembled in its chamber in the state capitol in the City of Charleston at 11 a.m., and was called to order by its President, the Honorable Craig Blair.

Prayer was offered by the Honorable Vince S. Deeds, a senator from the tenth district.

The Senate was then led in recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance by the Honorable Eric J. Tarr, a senator from the fourth district.

On the call of the roll, the following answered to their names:

Thirty-two members having answered to their names, the President declared the presence of a quorum.

Senator Blair (Mr. President) laid before the Senate the following proclamation from His Excellency, the Governor, convening the Legislature in extraordinary session, which was read by the Clerk:

# STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

#### Charleston

#### A PROCLAMATION

#### By the Governor

I, JIM JUSTICE, by virtue of the authority vested in the Governor by Section 7, Article VII, of the Constitution of West Virginia, do hereby call the West Virginia Legislature to convene in Extraordinary Session at 11:00 AM on Monday, September 30, 2024, in its chambers in the State Capitol, the City of Charleston, for the limited purpose of considering and acting upon only the following matters:

FIRST: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to reduce the personal income tax by up to five percent and to provide for such other matters relating thereto as are determined necessary or advisable.

SECOND: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new section, designated §11-21-26, to provide for a child and dependent care credit against the personal income tax in the amount of 50 percent of the allowed federal tax credit provided under 26 U.S.C. §21.

THIRD: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to explicitly authorize application by public charter schools for funding by the School Building Authority from any monies specifically appropriated for the purpose of providing funds for public charter schools.

FOURTH: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to authorize West Virginia to be an agreement state with the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission; to establish a comprehensive regulatory system for the control of sources of radiation for the protection of the public; to create the Radiation Control Act; to provide for declaration of policy and purpose; to provide for certain definitions; to provide for exemptions; to provide that the Department of Health is to be designated as the state radiation control agency; to provide for the Department's duties, authorities, and requirements for consistency with federal law and regulations; to provide for comprehensive programs and procedures to control radiation through general and specific licensing of radioactive materials and equipment; to establish rule making

authority under the Department concerning radiation control; to establish licensing and registration requirements and procedures; to establish fee schedules, funding sources, and forms; to establish procedures and requirements regarding radioactive materials and sureties; to create the Radiation Site Closure and Reclamation Fund with requirements and funding sources; to create the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund with requirements and funding sources; to allow for impounding sources of ionizing radiation; to provide authority for the Governor and the Department to enter into agreements with the federal government, other states, or interstate agencies; to define effects on local ordinances; to define enforcement procedures regarding violations of law; to establish civil penalties; and to establish felonies with criminal penalties.

FIFTH: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to permit certain research activities, to provide that an opioid treatment program may be developed only if part of an approved clinical trial, to provide that an opioid treatment program must have institutional review board approval, to describe an opioid treatment program that may be developed, to require an opioid treatment program to be limited to the timeframe set forth in the clinical trial, to permit an advanced practice registered nurse who is participating in a clinical trial to exceed prescription limitations under the trial, and to require a clinical trial to be registered with the Board of Pharmacy.

SIXTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Education, State Board of Education, State Department of Education, fund 0313, fiscal year 2025, organization 0402, in the amount of \$10,000,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

SEVENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Executive, Governor's Office, Civil Contingent Fund, fund 0105, fiscal year 2025, organization 0100, in the amount of \$40,000,000 to provide funds for capital projects at rural hospitals in West Virginia, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

EIGHTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Executive, Governor's Office, Civil Contingent Fund, fund 0105, fiscal year 2025, organization 0100, in the amount of \$100,000,000 to provide matching funds for water, sewer, and other projects, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

NINTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, Higher Education Policy Commission, Administration, Control Account, fund 0589, fiscal year 2025, organization 0441, in the amounts of \$17,000,000 for nursing program enhancement support and \$5,000,000 for fire and EMS training program support, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TENTH: To supplement, amend, and increasing an existing item of appropriation from the State Road Fund to the Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, fund 9017, fiscal year 2025, organization 0803, to increase spending authority only, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

ELEVENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Economic Development, Department of Economic Development, Office of the Secretary, fund 0256, fiscal year 2025, organization 0307, for directed transfers to the Economic Enhancement Grant Fund in the amount of \$125,000,000 and to the West Virginia Jobs Investment Trust in the amount of \$10,000,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWELFTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Veterans' Assistance, Department of Veterans' Assistance, Veterans' Home, fund 0460, fiscal year 2025, organization 0618, in the amount of \$1,200,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025

THIRTEENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Health, Office of the Inspector General, fund 0437, fiscal year 2025, organization 0513, in the amount of \$2,000,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

FOURTEENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Homeland Security, West Virginia State Police, fund 0453, fiscal year 2025, organization 0612, in the amount of \$375,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

FIFTEENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Administration, Public Employees Insurance Agency, fund 0200, fiscal year 2025, organization 0225, in the amount of \$87,000,000, by supplementing and amending Chapter 11, Acts of the Legislature, Regular Session, 2024, known as the budget bill for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

SIXTEENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to Miscellaneous Boards and Commissions, Adjutant General, State Militia, fund 0433, fiscal year 2025, organization 0603, in the total amount of \$15,675,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

SEVENTEENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Environmental Protection, fund 0273, fiscal year 2025, organization 0313, in the amount of \$2,800,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTIETH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Arts, Culture, and History, Division of Culture and History, fund 0293, fiscal year 2025, organization 0432, in the amount of \$300,000 by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-FIRST: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Executive, West Virginia Conservation Agency, fund 0132, fiscal year 2025, organization 1400, in the amount of \$1,150,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-SECOND: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Administration, Public Defender Services, fund 0226, fiscal year 2025, organization 0221, in the amount of \$1,050,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-THIRD: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine, fund 0336, fiscal year 2025, organization 0476, in the amount of

\$13,600,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-FOURTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Education, State Board of Education, Aid for Exceptional Children, fund 0314, fiscal year 2025, organization 0402, in the total amount of \$379,468, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-FIFTH: To supplement and amend, in one or more supplemental appropriations bills, the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Homeland Security, Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation, to provide funding for personnel and positions and for operating costs and current expenses, in the total approximate amount of \$32,500,000, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-SIXTH: To make a supplementary appropriation of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining unappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, to the Department of Homeland Security, Division of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Regional Jail and Correctional Facility Authority, fund 6675, fiscal year 2025, organization 0608, to increase spending authority only, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

TWENTY-SEVENTH: To authorize and appropriate public funds sufficient to pay for the Extraordinary Session, as necessary.



#### A PROCLAMATION

#### By the Governor

1. JIM JUSTICE, by virtue of the authority vested in the Governor by Section 7, Article VII, of the Constitution of West Virginia, do hereby further AMEND the proclamation dated September 28, 2024, calling the West Virginia Legislature to convene in Extraordinary Session on Monday, September 30, 2024, in its chambers in the State Capitol, the City of Charleston, by amending and restating item 1 and adding items 32 through 40, as follows:

FIRST: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to reduce the personal income tax by two percent and to provide for such other matters relating thereto as are determined necessary or advisable.

THIRTY-SECOND: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Homeland Security, West Virginia State Police, fund 0453, fiscal year 2025, organization 0612, in the amount of \$175,000 for repairs and refurbishment of helicopters, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

THIRTY-THIRD: To resolve, by concarrent resolution, to honor Hershel "Woody" Williams as one of two West Virginia statues in the National Statuary Hall Collection and to provide for other matters relating thereto.

THIRTY-FOURTH: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to designate the State Treasurer as chairman of the Municipal Bond Commission, to require the chairman to appoint the chief administrative officer of the commission, to require the State Treasurer to provide office space and staff to support the commission, to increase the per diem rate for members of the commission, to allow commission members to be reimbursed for reasonable

expenses, to require the commission to produce quarterly financial statements, to require the commission to undergo an annual audit, to provide for an exemption from state purchasing, to permit the commission to conduct business via video conferencing, to authorize the commission to enter into any existing contracts or agreements with financial institutions, to remove obsolete language, and to make technical corrections.

THIRTY-FIFTH: To amend the Code of West Virginio, 1931, as amended, to require the recommendation from the State Treasurer prior to issuing refunding bonds beginning on a certain date; to authorize legislative rules related to refunding bonds, including emergency rules for a limited period; to set forth legislative intent and findings; to define terms; to clarify application of the new article; to specify when the Treasurer may issue general obligation bonds; to set forth the amount, form, and terms of general obligation bonds; to declare general obligation bonds to be covenants of the state and lawful investments; to provide for the manner of sale of general obligation bonds; to require the creation of a debt service fund for each general obligation bond series; to specify the permissible use of a debt service fund; to authorize the investment of a debt service fund; to authorize the Treasurer to issue certain refunding bonds; to require the Treasurer to determine the bond counsel and financial advisor for general obligation bonds; to exempt selection of bond-related services from certain state purchasing requirements; to authorize the Treasurer to pay general obligation bond issuance expenses from the debt service fund; to prohibit conflicts of interest; to create a criminal misdemeanor offense and providing penalties for violation on conflict of interest provisions; to authorize legislative rules related to general obligation bonds, including emergency rules; to relocate statutory language concerning the state's outstanding general obligation bonds to a single chapter of code; to declare legislative intent; to provide for statutory construction; and to make various technical corrections.

THIRTY-SIXTH: To amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, to provide funding sources from the West Virginia Economic Development Authority for certain federally-funded broadband expansion programs.

THIRTY-SEVENTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, West Virginia University, General Administrative Fund, fund 0344, fiscal year 2025, organization 0463, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, Marshall University, General Administration Fund, fund 0348, fiscal year 2025, organization 0471, to the Higher Education Policy Commission, Concord University, fund 0357, fiscal year 2025, organization 0483, and to the Higher Education Policy Commission, Shepherd University, fund 0366, fiscal year 2025, organization 0486, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025; and to supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the West Virginia Council for Community and Technical College Education, New River Community and Technical College, fund 0600, fiscal year 2025, organization 0445, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

THIRTY-EIGHTH: To amend and reenact §8-13-13 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to fees and charges for municipality provided fire services and placing a limited moratorium on new municipal fire fees imposed on non-municipal residents.

THIRTY-NINTH: To supplement and amend the appropriations of public moneys out of the Treasury from the balance of moneys remaining as an unappropriated surplus balance in the State Fund, General Revenue, to the Department of Health, Office.of Emergency Medical Services, fund 0434, fiscal year 2025, organization 0506, in the amount of \$5,000,000 for statewide EMS program support, by supplementing and amending the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

FORTIETH: To expire funds from the Office of the Treasurer, unclaimed property, and to then transfer such funds to the Civil Contingency Fund for additional funding for deferred maintenance at colleges and universities in this State. ### **ARTICLE 27B. RADIATION CONTROL ACT.**

## §16-27B-1. Declaration of policy.

It is the policy of the state in furtherance of its responsibility to protect the occupational and public health and safety and the environment:

(1) To institute and maintain a regulatory program for sources of ionizing radiation so as to provide for compatibility and

equivalency with the standards and regulatory programs of the federal government, a single effective system of regulation within the state, and a system consonant insofar as possible with those of other states.

- (2) To institute and maintain a program to permit development and use of sources of radiation for peaceful purposes consistent with the health and safety of the public.
- (3) To provide for the availability of capacity outside the state for the disposal of low-level radioactive waste generated within the state except for waste generated as a result of defense or federal research and development activities and to recognize that such radioactive waste can be most safely and efficiently managed on a regional basis.

#### §16-27B-2. Declaration of purpose.

This article is enacted to provide:

- (1) A program of effective regulation of sources of radiation for the protection of the occupational and public health and safety.
- (2) A program to promote an orderly regulatory pattern within the state, among the states, and between the federal government and the state and facilitate intergovernmental cooperation with respect to use and regulation of sources of radiation to the end that duplication of regulation may be minimized.
- (3) A program to establish procedures for assumption and performance of certain regulatory responsibilities with respect to byproduct, source and special nuclear materials, and radiation generating equipment.
- (4) A program to permit use of sources of radiation consistent with the health and safety of the public.

#### **§16-27B-3. Definitions.**

As used in this article unless the context requires a different meaning:

- (1) "By-product material" means:
- (A) Any radioactive material, except special nuclear material, yielded in or made radioactive by exposure to the radiation incident to the process of producing or utilizing special nuclear material;
- (B) Any discrete source of radium-226 that is produced, extracted, or converted after extraction for use for a commercial, medical, or research activity;
- (C) Any material that has been made radioactive by use of a particle accelerator and is produced, extracted, or converted after extraction for use for a commercial, medical, or research activity; and
- (D) Any discrete source of naturally occurring radioactive material (NORM), other than source material that the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission, in consultation with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Secretary of Energy, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the head of any other appropriate federal agency, determines would pose a threat similar to the threat posed by a discrete source of radium-226 to the public health and safety or the common defense and security including conversion to technologically enhanced naturally occurring radioactive material (TENORM) through extraction, or conversion after extraction, for use for a commercial, medical, or research activity.
- (2) "Civil penalty" means any monetary penalty levied on a licensee or registrant because of violations of statutes, regulations, licenses, or registration certificates, but does not include criminal penalties.
- (3) "Decommissioning" means final operational activities at a facility to dismantle site structures, to decontaminate site surfaces and remaining structures, to stabilize and contain residual radioactive material, and to carry out any other activities to prepare the site for post-operational care.
- (4) "Department" means the West Virginia Department of Health.

- (5) "General license" means a license effective under rules promulgated by the department without the filing of an application with the department or the issuance of licensing documents to particular persons to transfer, acquire, own, possess, or use quantities of, or devices or equipment utilizing, radioactive material.
  - (6) "High-level radioactive waste" means:
  - (A) Irradiated reactor fuel;
- (B) Liquid wastes resulting from the operation of the first cycle solvent extraction system, or equivalent, and the concentrated wastes from subsequent extraction cycles, or equivalent, in a facility for reprocessing irradiated reactor fuel; or
  - (C) Solids into which such liquid wastes have been converted.
- (7) "Ionizing radiation" means gamma rays and X-rays, alpha and beta particles, high-speed electrons, neutrons, protons, and other nuclear particles.
- (8) "Licensing" means licensing with the department in accordance with rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this article.
- (9) "Low-level radioactive waste" means radioactive waste not classified as high-level radioactive waste, transuranic waste, spent nuclear fuel, or byproduct material.
- (10) "Person" means any individual, corporation, LLC, partnership, firm, association, trust, estate, public or private institution, group, agency of this state, other than the Department of Health, political subdivision of this state, any other state or political subdivision or department thereof, and any legal successor, representative, agent, or department of the foregoing, but not including federal government agencies.
  - (11) "Radiation" means ionizing radiation.

- (12) "Radiation emergency" means any situation, excluding events resulting from nuclear warfare, which involves the possibility of accidental release of ionizing radiation that may pose a threat to public health and safety or the environment.
- (13) "Radiation generating equipment" means any manufactured product or device, or component part of such a product or device, or any machine or system which during operation can generate or emit radiation except those which emit radiation only from radioactive material.
- (14) "Radioactive material" means any material (solid, liquid, or gas) which emits ionizing radiation spontaneously. It includes accelerator-produced, byproduct, naturally occurring, and source and special nuclear materials.
- (15) "Registration" means registration with the department in accordance with rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this article.
- (16) "Secretary" means the secretary of the West Virginia Department of Health or his or her designee.
- (17) "Source material" means uranium or thorium, or any combination thereof, in any physical or chemical form; or ores that contain by weight one-twentieth of one percent (0.05 percent) or more of uranium, thorium, or any combination thereof. Source material does not include special nuclear material.
- (18) "Sources of radiation" means, collectively, radioactive material and radiation generating equipment.
- (19) "Special nuclear material" means (i) plutonium, uranium 233, uranium enriched in the isotope 233 or in the isotope 235, and any other material which the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission or any successor thereto has determined to be such but does not include source material; or (ii) any material artificially enriched by any of the foregoing but not including source material.
- (20) "Specific license" means a license, issued to a named person upon application filed under the rules promulgated pursuant

to this article, to use, manufacture, produce, transfer, receive, acquire, or possess quantities of, or devices utilizing, radioactive material.

- (21) "Spent nuclear fuel" means irradiated nuclear fuel that has undergone at least one year's decay since being used as a source of energy in a power reactor. Spent fuel includes the special nuclear material, byproduct material, source material, and other radioactive material associated with fuel assemblies.
- (22) "Transuranic waste" means radioactive waste containing alpha emitting transuranic elements, with radioactive half-lives greater than five years, in excess of 10 nanocuries per gram.

## §16-27B-4. Exemption.

The provisions of this article shall not apply to radioactive materials or facilities, including nuclear reactors, that are subject to exclusive licensing and regulation by the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

# §16-27B-5. Department designated state radiation control agency; powers and duties.

- (a) The Department of Health is hereby designated as the state radiation control agency.
- (b) The secretary shall designate the director of the state radiation control agency who shall perform the functions vested in the state radiation control agency under the provisions of this article.
- (c) In accordance with the laws of the state, the state radiation control agency may employ, compensate, and prescribe the powers and duties of such individuals as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this article.
- (d) The state radiation control agency, for the protection of the occupational and public health and safety, and the environment shall:

- (1) Develop programs for evaluation and control of hazards associated with use of sources of radiation.
- (2) Develop programs with due regard for compatibility with federal programs for regulation of byproduct, source, and special nuclear materials.
- (3) Develop programs with due regard for consistency with federal programs for regulation of radiation generating equipment.
- (4) Formulate, adopt, promulgate, and repeal rules and regulations, which may provide for licensing and/or registration, relating to control of sources of radiation with due regard for compatibility with the regulatory programs of the federal government.
- (5) Advise, consult, and cooperate with other agencies of the state, the federal government, other states and interstate agencies, political subdivisions, and other organizations concerned with the control of sources of radiation.
- (6) Have the authority to accept and administer loans, grants, or other funds or gifts, conditional or otherwise, in furtherance of its functions, from the federal government and from public or private sources.
- (7) Encourage, participate in, or conduct studies, investigations, training, research, and demonstrations relating to the control of sources of radiation.
- (8) Collect and disseminate information relating to the control of sources of radiation, including:
- (A) Establish and maintain a file of all license applications, issuances, denials, amendments, transfers, renewals, modifications, suspensions, and revocations;
- (B) Establish and maintain a file of registrants possessing sources of radiation requiring registration under the provisions of this article and any administrative or judicial action pertaining thereto; and

- (C) Establish and maintain a file of all agency rules related to regulation of sources of radiation, pending or promulgated, and proceedings thereon.
- (9) Establish a database of registered and certified radiation producing devices, which shall include but not be limited to the name of the owner or operator and the location of the machine.
- (10) Pursuant to its powers enumerated in §16-27B-6 of this code, provide for scheduled and random unannounced inspections of facilities that house radiation producing devices and radioactive sources and provide relevant services to ensure compliance with all applicable laws, rules, licenses, or conditions.
- (11) Establish all necessary forms, including periodic radiation inspection reports.
- (12) Develop programs for responding adequately to radiation emergencies and coordinate such programs with the emergency management agencies.
- (13) Publish and make available a list of qualified physicists and vendors of radiation producing devices, radioactive supplies, and those qualified to perform work related to the same.
- (14) Ensure compliance with all requirements under the Appalachian States Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact pursuant to §29-1H-1 et seq. of this code and all federal laws.
- (15) Promulgate all rules necessary under this article, in accordance with the provisions of §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code, related to (i) general or specific licenses necessary to use, store, dispose, manufacture, produce, transfer, receive, acquire, own, or possess quantities of, or devices or equipment utilizing, by-product, source, special nuclear materials, or other radioactive material occurring naturally or produced artificially, (ii) registration of the possession of a source of radiation and maintaining all related records, (iii) regulation of by-product, source and special nuclear material and (iv) compliance with Appalachian States Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact pursuant to §29-1H-1 et seq. of this code and all federal laws.

- (16) Issue such orders or modifications thereof as may be necessary in connection with proceedings under this article.
- (e) The department is authorized to require by rule, regulation, or order, the keeping of such records with respect to activities under licenses and registration certificates issued under this article as may be necessary to effectuate the purpose of this article. These records shall be made available for inspection by, or copies thereof shall be submitted to, the department on request.
- (f) The secretary shall establish fee schedules for licensures, registrations, inspections, and modifications thereto required pursuant to this article. All such fees collected shall be paid to the department for deposit in a special fund called the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund created pursuant to §16-27B-9 of this code.
- (g) The secretary shall provide compensation, office space, staff, and office equipment as may be necessary to discharge the responsibilities imposed by this article.

# §16-27B-6. Licensing of radioactive material.

- (a) All radioactive material not under the authority of the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and devices or equipment utilizing such material, shall be licensed by the department under the rules promulgated by the department. Rules promulgated under this article shall provide for recognition of other Agreement State or federal licenses.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to use, store, dispose, manufacture, produce, distribute, sell, transport, transfer, install, repair, receive, acquire, own, or possess any source of radiation unless licensed by or registered with the department in accordance with this article and with any rules promulgated by the department pursuant to this article. The disposal of radioactive waste material in a solid waste facility or in a commercial solid waste facility, as defined in §22-15-2 of this code, is prohibited.
- (c) The department shall provide by rule or regulation for general or specific licensing of radioactive material or devices or

- equipment utilizing such material. Such rule or regulation shall provide for the amendment, suspension, or revocation of licenses.
- (d) The department is authorized to require registration or licensing of other sources of radiation.
- (e) The department is authorized to exempt certain sources of radiation or kinds of uses or users from the licensing or registering requirements set forth in this section when the department makes a finding that the exemption of such sources of radiation or kinds of use or users will not constitute a significant risk to public health and safety or the environment.

#### §16-27B-7. Surety requirements.

- (a) For licensed activities the department may, establish by rule or regulation standards and procedures to ensure that the licensee will provide an adequate surety or other financial arrangement to permit the completion of all requirements established by the department for the decontamination, closure, decommissioning and reclamation of sites, structures, and equipment used in conjunction with such licensed activity, in the event that the licensee should default for any reason in performing such requirements.
- (b) All sureties or moneys made a part of any other financial arrangement required under subsection (a) which are forfeited shall be paid to the department for deposit in a special fund called the Radiation Site Closure and Reclamation Fund created pursuant to \$16-27B-8 of this code.
- (c) For licensed activities when radioactive material which will require surveillance or care is likely to remain at the site after the licensed activities cease, the department may, establish by rule or regulation standards and procedures to ensure that the licensee, before termination of the license, will make available such funding arrangements as may be necessary to provide for long-term site surveillance and care.
- (d) All funds collected from licensees under subsection (c) shall be paid to the department for deposit in a special fund called

Radiation Site Closure and Reclamation Fund created under §16-27B-8 of this code.

- (e) The sureties or other financial arrangements and funds required by subsections (a) and (c) shall be established in amounts sufficient to ensure compliance with those standards, if any, established by the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission pertaining to closure, decommissioning, reclamation, and long-term site surveillance and care of such facilities and sites.
- (f) In order to provide for the proper care and surveillance of sites subject to subsection (c) of this section, the department may acquire by gift or transfer from another government agency or private person any land and appurtenances necessary to fulfill the purposes of this section. Any such gift or transfer is subject to approval and acceptance by the department.
- (g) The department may by contract, agreement, lease, or license with any person, including another state or federal agency, provide for the decontamination, closure, decommissioning, reclamation, surveillance, or other care of a site subject to this section as needed to carry out the purposes of this section.
- (h) All federal, state, local, or other governmental agencies, shall be exempt from the requirements of subsection (a) and (c).

#### §16-27B-8. Radiation Site Closure and Reclamation Fund.

- (a) There is hereby created in the State Treasury a special revenue fund known as the Radiation Site Closure and Reclamation Fund. The fund shall be administered by and under the control of the Secretary of the Department of Health. Expenditures from the fund shall be solely for the purposes under this article of administration, acquisition, construction, decommission, decontamination, maintenance, surveillance, remediation, reclamation, closure, or other care on sites containing or associated with licensable radioactive material for the protection of public health and safety and the environment.
- (b) The fund shall consist of moneys appropriated by the Legislature, moneys received from the federal government,

moneys received from forfeited sureties, moneys received under §16-27B-7(a) or (d) of this code, and from private donations, grants, bequests, and all other moneys received from all sources for the purposes stated herein.

- (c) Any funds remaining in the Fund at the end of the fiscal year shall not revert to the general revenue but shall remain in the fund solely for the purposes stated in this article.
- (d) The moneys accrued in this fund, any earnings thereon, and yield from investments by the State Treasurer or West Virginia Investment Management Board are reserved solely and exclusively for the purposes set forth in this code section.

## §16-27B-9. Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund.

- (a) There is hereby created in the State Treasury a special revenue fund known as the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund. The fund shall be administered by and under the control of the Secretary of the Department of Health. Expenditures from the fund shall be solely for the purposes under this article of administration, registration, licensing, and inspection of radioactive materials facilities and equipment for the protection of public health and safety and the environment.
- (b) The fund shall consist of moneys appropriated by the Legislature, moneys received from the federal government, moneys received from licensing and registration fees, and from private donations, grants, bequests, and all other moneys received from all sources for the purposes stated herein. Moneys from forfeited sureties or which are part of other financial arrangements under §16-27B-7 of this code and any interest earned thereon shall not be deposited into this fund or used for normal operating expenses.
- (c) Any funds remaining in the Fund at the end of the fiscal year shall not revert to the general revenue but shall remain in the fund solely for the purposes stated in this article.
- (d) The moneys accrued in this fund, any earnings thereon, and yield from investments by the State Treasurer or West Virginia

<u>Investment Management Board are reserved solely and exclusively for the purposes set forth in this section.</u>

#### §16-27B-10. Impounding sources of ionizing radiation.

The department is authorized, in the event of an emergency or under other circumstances constituting a hazard to public health and safety or the environment, to impound or order the impounding of sources of ionizing radiation in the possession of any person who is not equipped to observe or fails to observe the provisions of this article, federal law, or any rules or regulations promulgated or issued thereunder.

# §16-27B-11. Authority of Governor to enter into agreements with federal government; effect on federal license.

- (a) The Governor is authorized to enter into agreements with the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission under Section 274b of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended, providing for discontinuance of certain licensing and related regulatory authority of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission with respect to byproduct, source and special nuclear materials, and the assumption of regulatory authority therefore by this state.
- (b) Any person who, on the effective date of an agreement under subsection (a) above, except those exempted under §16-27B-4 of this code, possesses a license issued by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission for radioactive materials subject to the agreement shall be deemed to possess a like license issued under this article, which shall expire either 90 days after receipt from the department of a notice of expiration of such license, or on the date of expiration specified in the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission license, whichever is earlier.

# §16-27B-12. Authority of department to enter into agreements with federal government, other states or interstate agencies; training programs for personnel.

(a) The department, with the prior approval of the Governor, is authorized to enter into an agreement or agreements with the federal government, other states or interstate agencies, whereby

this state will perform, on a cooperative basis with the federal government, other states or interstate agencies, inspections or other functions relating to control of sources of ionizing radiation.

- (b) The department, from funds provided by law, may institute programs for the purpose of training personnel to carry out the provisions of this article and, with the prior approval of the Governor, may make such personnel available for participation in any program or programs of the federal government, other states, or interstate agencies in furtherance of this article.
- (c) The West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP) shall, upon request from the Secretary of the Department of Health, provide technical guidance and support to the department to implement sound and scientific principles for the program based upon the WVDEP's expertise in the coal, oil, and gas industries. The WVDEP shall also provide technical guidance and support to the department on issues related to air and water pollution generated from radiation sources regulated by the department.

## §16-27B-13. Effect upon local ordinances, etc.

Ordinances, resolutions, or rules, now or hereafter in effect, of the governing body of a county, political subdivision, municipality, other state agencies, or other local government body relating to byproduct, source, and special nuclear materials shall not be superseded by this article, provided that such ordinances or rules are and continue to be consistent with the provisions of this article, amendments thereto and rules thereunder.

## §16-27B-14. Enforcement; civil penalties.

(a) Any person who violates any licensing or registration provision of this article or any rule, regulation, or order issued thereunder, or any term, condition, or limitation of any license or registration certificate issued thereunder or commits any violation for which a license or registration certificate may be revoked under rules or regulations issued under this article may be subject to a civil penalty, to be imposed by the department, not to exceed

- \$10,000. If any violation is a continuing one, each day of such violation shall constitute a separate and distinct violation for the purposes of computing the applicable civil penalty. The department shall have the power to compromise, mitigate, or remit such penalties.
- (b) Whenever the department proposes to subject a person to the imposition of a civil penalty under the provisions of this section, it shall notify such person in writing;
- (1) Setting forth the date, facts, and nature of each act or omission with which the person is charged;
- (2) Specifically identifying the particular provision or provisions of the article, rule, regulation, order, license, or registration certificate involved in the violation; and
- (3) Advising of each penalty which the department proposes to impose and its amount.

Such written notice shall be sent by registered or certified mail by the department to the last known address of such person. The person so notified shall be granted an opportunity to show in writing, within such reasonable period as the department shall by rule prescribe, why such penalty should not be imposed. The notice shall also advise such person that upon failure to pay the civil penalty subsequently determined by the department, if any, the penalty may be collected by civil action. Any person upon whom a civil penalty is imposed may appeal such action under §29A-1-1 et seq. of this code.

- (c) The department, or upon the request of the department, the Attorney General, is authorized in the name of the state to institute a civil action to collect a penalty imposed pursuant to this section. The department, or upon the request of the department, the Attorney General, shall have the exclusive power to compromise, mitigate, or remit such civil penalties as are referred for collection.
- (d) All moneys collected from civil penalties shall be deposited in the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund created pursuant to §16-27B-9 of this code.

(e) In addition to the provisions of §16-27B-5 of this code, the department shall have the power to enter at all reasonable times, or in cases of an emergency, upon any private or public property for the purpose of determining whether or not there is compliance with or violation of the provisions of this article and rules issued thereunder, except that entry into areas under the jurisdiction of the federal government shall be effected only with the concurrence of the federal government or its duly designated representative.

# §16-27B-15. Felony created; criminal penalties; injunctions; civil penalties; charges for violations.

- (a) Any person who willfully violates any of the provisions of the rules, regulations, or orders of the department or secretary or any provision under this article is guilty of a felony, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$25,000, for each day of such violation, or imprisoned not less than one nor more than five years, or both fined and imprisoned. Upon a second or subsequent conviction, the person shall be guilty of a felony, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$5,000 nor more than \$50,000 for each day of such violation, or imprisoned not less than two nor more than ten years, or both fined and imprisoned.
- (b) Any person who violates or intends to violate, or fails, neglects, or refuses to obey any law, lawful rule, or order of the department or secretary or any provision of this article may be compelled in a proceeding instituted in an appropriate court by the department or secretary to obey such rule, order or provision of this article and to comply therewith by injunction, mandamus, or other appropriate remedy.
- (c) Without limiting the remedies which may be obtained in subsection (b) of this section, any person violating or failing, neglecting or refusing to obey any injunction, mandamus or other remedy obtained pursuant to subsection (b) shall be subject, in the discretion of the court, to a civil penalty not to exceed \$25,000 for each violation, which shall be paid to the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund created pursuant to \$16-27B-8 of this code. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

(d) With the consent of any person who has violated or failed, neglected, or refused to obey any rule or order of the department or secretary or any provision of this article, the department or secretary may provide, in an order issued by the department or secretary against such person, for the payment of civil charges for past violations in specific sums, not to exceed the limits specified in §16-27B-14 of this code. Such civil charges shall be instead of any appropriate civil penalty which could be imposed under §16-27B-14 of this code.

#### §16-27B-16. Administrative procedure and judicial review.

- (a) In any proceeding for the denial of an application for license or for revocation, suspension, or modification or a license, the department shall provide to the applicant or licensee an opportunity for a hearing on the record.
- (b) Whenever the department finds that an emergency exists requiring immediate action to protect the environment and the public health and safety, the department may, without notice or hearing, issue a regulation or order reciting the existence of such emergency and requiring that such action be taken as is necessary to meet the emergency. Notwithstanding any provision of this article, such regulation or order shall be effective immediately. Any person to whom such regulation or order is directed shall comply therewith immediately, but on application to the department shall be afforded a hearing within five business days. On the basis of such hearing, the emergency regulation or order shall be continued, modified, or revoked within 30 days after such hearing.
- (c) Any final department action or order entered in any proceeding under subsections (a) or (b) of this section shall be subject to appeal to the Board of Review, set forth in §16B-2-2 of this code, within 30 days after receipt of written notice of a final action or order. The provisions of §29A-5-1 et seq. of this code shall apply to such appeals.

Engrossed House Bill 208, as just amended, was then put upon its passage.

Eng. House Bill 208—A Bill to repeal §16-27-1, §16-27-2, \$16-27-3, and \$16-27-4 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to amend said code by adding thereto a new article, designated §16-27B-1, §16-27B-2, §16-27B-3, §16-27B-4, §16-27B-5, §16-27B-6, §16-27B-7, §16-27B-8, §16-27B-9, §16-27B-10, §16-27B-11, §16-27B-12, §16-27B-13, §16-27B-14, §16-27B-15 and §16-27B-16, all relating to making West Virginia an agreement state with the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission; establishing a comprehensive regulatory system for the control of sources of radiation for the protection of the public; creating the Radiation Control Act; providing for declaration of policy and purpose; providing for certain definitions; providing for exemptions; providing that the Department of Health is to be designated as the state radiation control agency; providing for the department's duties, authorities, and requirements for consistency with federal law and regulations; providing for comprehensive programs and procedures to control radiation through general and specific licensing of radioactive materials and equipment;

establishing rule making authority under the department establishing concerning radiation control; licensing requirements and procedures; establishing registration schedules, funding sources, and forms; establishing procedures and requirements regarding radioactive materials and sureties; creating Site Closure and Reclamation Fund with Radiation requirements and funding sources; creating the Radiation Licensure and Inspection Fund with requirements and funding sources; allowing for impounding sources of ionizing radiation; providing authority for the Governor and the department to enter into agreements with the federal government, other states, or interstate agencies; defining effects on local ordinances; defining enforcement procedures regarding violations of law; establishing civil penalties; establishing felonies with criminal penalties; providing for administrative procedures; and authorizing judicial review

Senator Takubo moved that the bill take effect from passage.

I rise in support of the resolution. And I'll tell you, I've waited 12 years to give this speech . . . his farewell speech.

You know, I went in the House . . . I was elected in 2012 and was in the minority, and Mike . . . he was the Majority Whip. And, he denies this all the time, but this is one of my first, I guess, introductions into politics. Me and him had got into it, you know. Not him, he was laughing about it and I was mad, which is usually what happened because it didn't bother him. But boy, it bothered me. I can't even remember now. I think it was something, maybe, about President Obama at the time, if I remember right. And he was . . . he was straightening me out on some issues. That next . . . we was in interims and went home. And Thursday night I was driving home from the mines-you know, Mike was a coal miner also—Mike calls me and he said, "How you doing buddy?" And I'm thinking "buddy", me and him was just fighting the other day. And he said, "Hey, I got a problem." I said, "Okay, what is it?" You know, and I'm thinking why is he asking me? And he said, "I've got a member that is having some feet problems." I can't remember the delegate's name. When I got elected and went over there I was on a knee scooter because I had been in a roof fall and they put me on California Avenue about 300 feet from my office. And man, you know, everybody saying how did you get that, a freshman member? And I said, "Well, Randy's crippled, you know." And so Mike said, "I need your parking place." And I'm thinking that stinking dog. And I said, "Well, you're in charge. I guess if you want my parking place, you're going to take it." So, he said, "Well, nothing personal. I just . . . we need to get him closer." And I said, "Well, you know, that's fine with me." And I thought, you know, I guess he's not mad. And then they sent me my new parking place and I pulled in and it was the very last parking place at the Governor's mansion at that time before they put the fence up. It was the very last . . . . And I get out and there's about 10 parking places between me and the next car. But, he said, "Oh, nothing personal." So . . . . And he denies it, but he knows very well he did it so . . . .

He's the one . . . because, you know, I was fresh out of the coal mines country boy. And I wasn't near as refined as I am now. Right, Mike?

But he called me in the office. You know, I was in the minority at that time. It was my second year when he did this, called me in. He said, "Smitty," he caught me in the hallway. He said, "Smitty, come in here." He said, "We need to have a chat. So sit down and . . . . " And you know, I was ready to fight because I knew he was going to provoke me somehow. And he said, "You know, you got to quit being so angry." He said, "This is politics. It's business. You know, all you can do is fight as hard as you can and as passionate as you can for what you believe in and then walk away from it. Don't let it eat you alive. It's eating you alive. If you don't change your ways, this place is going to eat you alive and eat up your happiness." I never will forget this talk. And, you know, I mean I'm thinking yeah, yeah, yeah. But it was sinking in. And he said, "Smitty, you know, before long probably the way things are going" . . . because he, you know, is a smart man . . . he said, "You guys are going to be in control." And he said, "And then you're going to do what you want to do. You know, you're going to get bills passed that you want passed." He said, "But you can't let it eat you alive until that time." He said, "And you know, I'll be on the other end of the stick and, you know, we'll still be friends. It's just . . . it's politics."

You know, that was the best advice that I've got since I've been down here. And I've told this story several times. I've, you know, Mike, or Senator Caputo, I've thanked him many a times for giving that speech. And, you know, he made it clear. He said, "You fight with everything you got." And he said, "And as passionate as you can do it with." And I took lessons from him because he was a pretty good teacher when he got on the floor. So, he was right.

The following year we got control. He went to minority. I went to the majority, was Vice Chair of Energy. And I was running some coal bills and it was stuff that . . . or things that he was against . . . passionately against. And man, what a year. Probably the best year I've had down here. We was on Hoppy how many times? I mean Hoppy would get me and Mike on his show because his ratings went up because we would . . . we'd get passionate on Hoppy. And then Hoppy, he would, of course, provoke us a little bit or, you know, play us a little bit. But we did. And then, you know, when we was done, we'd go off, you know, friends . . . laughing.

But one thing I remember is a committee meeting on a coal bill—and he'll probably remember this. And I had three women on my

Energy Committee and we caucused and I told them, I said, "Listen, Caputo's going to get up here and he's going to scream, he's going to cry, he'll probably even cuss, and he'll probably even get on the floor a little bit." I said, "You can't fall for that. You know, this is a good bill . . . . " Okay. Okay. Felt good about it. We got in there and Mike started talking. He cried, he cussed, he stomped, and he had all three of those women on my committee crying. And it was on an amendment. He had an amendment on it, and I lost the amendment. And so, we walked out, you know, after the committee meeting. I was a little upset, you know. I mean, I'd forgot what he taught me by that time . . . or at that time. And he looked at me, and he grinned, and he said, "That's how it's done, Smitty." I never will forget that. But then I came back. The Senate saved me and sent the bill over, and we got it through. So, the Senate did save us that time.

But Mike's been a good friend since then. You know, we, like I said, we would fight with passion on the floor many a times. We would go at it because we don't agree on, probably 98.6 percent of the time, we don't agree on issues . . . political. But we both have a wonderful friendship. I think we do. And, you know, we have the same love for our family. We talk about grandkids. We talk about coal mining. We find all kinds of stuff to talk about. But we never talk about politics when we're, you know, together.

And, you know, when Mike ran for the Senate the lady that was running against . . . the Republican lady—Mike will remember this, too—I did a video to support her. You know, me and Mike, we're still friends there. But, you know, like he taught me, politics is politics. So I did a video supporting her. And, a couple of days later, I guess, it started playing. And Mike called me. He said, "Hey, I just seen your video and Tina said to tell you no more meatballs." And I haven't had a meatball since, so that was a bad decision by me. But, you know, he laughed about it.

And, like I said, you know, I never thought I'd ever say this about Mike Caputo, but I'm going to miss him. I'm going to miss his friendship. We've became good friends and, you know, had a lot of . . . we've pulled a lot of pranks on people down here. You know, one of the UMWA lobbyists, we set him up many a times, worked together on . . . . But we've had a good time.

And Mike, I mean this, I appreciate everything you taught me on politics. You know,

you taught me it's alright to be passionate but, you know, don't hold grudges. You know, don't let it suck your happiness out of you. And so, you know, I've tried to live up to that. I get passionate sometimes. People in here have seen it and experienced it many times. But I don't take it personal and I never, never go to bed mad at anybody. And, at the end of the day, I realize it's just politics and you do your best and come back tomorrow and try it again. And I appreciate that. And, like I said, you've taught me more about politics than anybody since I've been in politics. And I'm going to miss you here and I'm . . . you know, keep our friendship. And we'll text each other. And I would like to have meatballs one more time before you leave.

MR. PRESIDENT: Senator from Marion, I'm counting on this speech being one of the ones like you used to give over in the House.

SENATOR CAPUTO: Well, I don't know about that, Mr. President. I usually get pretty charged up when I get a microphone in my hand but, hearing from my friends across the aisle, particularly, my roommate here, it's just so humbling . . . it's really hard to get cranking. I will make one observation though, Mr. President. I see why a couple of people are senators instead of comedians, Jason and Robert. You would have never made it in that line of work. So, it's a good thing you're in the State Senate.

I guess I want to begin by saying some thank yous because it has been one hell of a run. I want to thank my family. First of all, my wife, Tina, who I think is watching. She's probably bored to tears right now after all that stuff you all just said about me. She's saying, "That's not the guy I know, he's not that nice of a guy." But, she's as lovely as they come and I couldn't have done 28 days rather than 28 years without her support.

When I first got into this game, my kids were about 12 and 13 years old. You know, I was working for the union, and I was traveling a lot for the union, and then I come down here and tacked on another 60–80 days to that. And there were several years that I spent over 200 nights in hotel rooms. And if you travel for a living, you know how tough that is. And you better have a damn good spouse if you're going to . . . if she or he is going to stick with you that long when you travel that much.

And, you know, my two children, Josh and Jess, were just amazing kids, thank goodness. You know, they never got in trouble. They were just wonderful kids. And Tina would run them back and forth to ball practice, and cheerleading, and whatever you do. And I'd try to get home on the weekends to get to watch all that stuff. So, that is the first group of folks that I owe my career to.

And secondly, all the wonderful staff that I have worked with throughout the years. You know, we have the most beautiful relationship you could ever imagine. Staff does all the work and we get all the credit. It doesn't get much better than that. And I've been blessed since I've come to the Senate with Brittany and Liz. But all the staff in front of us and all the staff for the minority and the majority, just countless hours . . . . We leave here at night, as you know all too well, Mr. President, and they stay here and they crank out the work so when we come in the next morning that machine runs as smooth as it possibly could run.

And, you know, I had a group of people who believed in me about 29 years ago . . . I guess when the campaign started. Just a group of friends, my union brothers and sisters who wanted to see me in Charleston. Something I never wanted. I kind of got recruited into this job. And, hell, I never thought I could win. I just thought we'll do the best we can. And my first campaign I won by 10 votes. I won by 10 votes. And the people of Marion and Monongalia counties have elected me and allowed me to be their representative for 28 years . . . 13 straight elections. And I'm humbled by that because I've always said this seat does not belong to me . . . that seat across the hall did not belong to me. And that's what each and every one of us should remember when we come in to these jobs, these are not our seats. They belong to the people that we represent. And that should always come first and foremost in our decision. That's what I based my whole career on. And that's what I would suggest we all do.

You know, when I first ran for office, I was campaigning, Mike, in Grant Town, West Virginia. And I stopped at a little establishment and there was an old, retired coal miner there. His name was "LaLa" Merico. And he was like the Kingpin of Grant Town, right? And I asked him for his support and he said, "I don't think you can win, but I'm going to support you." He said, "Cause I'm a union guy. You're a union guy. I'm going to support you." But, he said, "You got to make me one promise." And I said, "What's that, LaLa?" He said, "If you get elected, you can never ever forget where you came from." Of course I was on the campaign trail. Of course I said, "Well, absolutely." And I never thought much about that until I had to come down here and had to start pushing a button and make decisions for the State of West Virginia for what was good, what I believed was good, for the State of West Virginia. And every time I toiled with a decision, I would sit and think where did I come from, how was I raised? And I would let that guide my decision. They weren't always right, I'm sure. And we bring our values down here with

us. We all come from different backgrounds and we all come from different values and we can't ever lose sight of that. That's what brings this process, in my opinion, together. That's what makes it work

I've got a high school education. I went into coal mines right out of high school. I never thought I'd ever have a seat in this grand institution. But the people wanted me here, and I came here, and I tried to do the best that I possibly could.

Yes, when I came to the Senate, I was bored to death. You know, I come from organized chaos across the hall. And I loved the . . . . Charlie, as you know, man, it's just like . . . it's gets us crazy as it can get sometimes and I just fed off of that. You know, I could just, you know, the moment would strike me and I'd just grab that microphone and just feel like I was in the back of a pickup truck leading the coal strike somewhere. You know, I'd just lose sight of where I was. And I came over here, we're all congenial, we're nice, and we're soft. And that took me a while to get used to that. But I got to tell you, I love it. It's the best experience I've ever had in my life. I mean, I look across here and you know most of my colleagues, we disagree a lot. But I've really grown to love and be friends with each and every one of you. I just had to learn a little different way to do business. But every once in a while, you know, Mr. President, the mood would strike me and I'd have to, you know, charge my batteries up a little bit and kind of remember where I came from and remember how I got started. And I hope that I added a little bit to the Senate. I hope that I, you know, made the process a little, a little more bipartisan in some areas.

Mr. Chairman, I thank you so much for the courtesy that you gave me in the committee room. I've enjoyed, truly enjoyed, serving on the Judiciary Committee and to my junior senator, Michael ... and I tell people this and, you know, I'll tell anybody this ... Mike Oliverio was nicer to me than he ever had to be. He's in a 31 to 3 majority. He didn't have to give me the time of day, but he respected me as his colleague, he respected me as his senior senator, and we got along just great. And we've done a lot of good projects for Marion and Monongalia County working together.

So, you know, as I close, people ask me what I'm going to do? You know what, what are you going to do with all your free time? Well, first thing I say, whatever Tina wants me to do, that's

what I'm going to do. But I want to ride my motorcycle a little bit more. I want to travel a little bit more as we all do. But, most importantly, I want to be a full-time grandpa.

You know that family I talked about in the beginning of my remarks has grown. I now have a son-in-law. I now have a daughter-in-law. I've got three beautiful grandchildren. My grandson right now is . . . he'll be four and I know he's watching. Kiaan, I love you. You're my little buddy. I love you to the moon and back, and Pappy will be home tomorrow, and I'll take you to Five Below. That's where he likes to go, Five Below. And I told him he could buy two things when I get home, Mr. President, instead of one. And my one grandson just turned a year old last week and he is just a joy. And then my son and his wife, who are 40 and 41 years old, decided they wanted to give me a grandchild. So my granddaughter, Millie, now is three months old.

So my life is full. I couldn't ask for anything more than the good Lord has given me and my family. We are rich. Not in money, but we are rich in love. We are rich in compassion and we just love spending time with each other and we intend to do a whole lot more of that.

He wasn't Minority Leader at the time; he was two years later. But we quickly became friends. You know, every once in a while you just meet that person that you just instantly become friends.

And one thing I remember about Charlie—we were talking about Fairmont—and he said, "Is Colasessano's still open where they make those pepperoni buns?" And I said, "Yeah, yeah, they're still open." I said, "I'll have to bring you some sometime."

And I was doing some work, I think we was organizing a stone quarry in Virginia somewhere, and I was driving through Berkeley Springs, and I said, "I'm going to take Charlie some pepperoni rolls." And I stopped at Colasessano's and bought us lunch and drove through Berkeley Springs and stopped by his law office and we sat down and had a Fairmont lunch together in Berkeley Springs. And we just ... we just hit it off and we just became friends.

And then I got to serve with him throughout the years when he was Minority Leader and, when I came to the Senate, you know, everyone told me that one senator serves on Finance and one serves on Judiciary. So, I quickly called Senator Beach and said, "Hey, you know, Roman left if you want that Finance job, you can have it." He goes, "Oh, no, I'm staying on Judiciary." So, I thought, well, I'm going to, you know-no offense Mr. Chairman of Financebut I said, you know, I'm going to be stuck on Finance. I really loved Judiciary. That's where I served most of my career in the House. And somehow, Mr. President, you put me on . . . you put me on Judiciary. And Bob and I both served on there. And it's been . . . it was a humbling experience. And I got to say you gave me a fair shake. If I had an amendment that made sense, you gave me a fair shake. If I had something that we could put in a committee substitute that made sense and I went back and talked to you about it, you allowed me to do that. And that's humbling to me because you was always looking for what was the best policy. You didn't look at me as a super minority member of this caucus. You looked . . . if it made sense, I want to do it.

We've had some good discussions. I hope I added a little bit to your committee, Mr. Chairman, but it was truly an honor and a privilege to serve on your committee.

And now, Mr. Justice, I am looking forward to your next chapter. I think the Supreme Court has just really stepped it up a notch by having you on the bench.

It's been an honor.

Senate President was there, and Charlie was there, and a couple of other senators at the time, and I thought, "This is the team. This is the group of people who are getting it done. This is

the group of people who are really making the weighty decisions for the state." And I looked over at Charlie and he's using an empty wine bottle as a spittoon. And I thought, "Mmm . . . maybe it's . . . maybe it's not. I don't know." But then I got to the Senate and I've had the absolute honor and the absolute privilege to serve as his vice chair for the past eight years . . . the entire time that I've been here in the Senate. And when I say it's been an honor and a privilege, I mean that in the upmost sense. Other than serving in uniform, I can't think of a greater honor that I've had to be a part of throughout my lifetime.

And when I first came to the Senate, I hadn't been a lawyer very long. I'd been a lawyer for maybe 15 months. I graduated from law school and then got sworn into the bar, and 15 . . . and so, it was a little over a year and a half, I guess. And so I learned more about being a lawyer in that committee room and in our conference room from you, Charlie, than if I had spent six years in law school, if I had been a lawyer for 10 years. And, more importantly than the lessons I learned in law from Charlie was how to comport yourself as a senator and how to comport yourself as a chairman because I think, we can all agree, that there have been differences of opinion on policy and how a bill should be. I don't think any of us could ever argue the appropriateness of that committee.

And I remember early on we had a resolution discussing a constitutional amendment. And it was dragging. I mean it was hours' worth of debate and I thought we got to come to a finality here, some sort of conclusion. And I looked over at him and he was just leaning back in his chair, he's just watching everybody, and I thought, he loves this, my God, he loves this. As we're going on to hour three of the . . . I don't even know what it was . . . . And he does. Charlie, you love this process more than anyone that I have met since I've served in the Legislature. And . . . I wish at times that I had that same love of the lengthy process. But you were what we should all aspire to be. You were as no frills and as old school as you get in this building. You know the rule. Every day you wear the watch that your parents gave you when you graduated from Princeton. And that is you. To me, that is you . . . is that you are no frills, and you were here to do a job, and you know the rules, and you know the way that the law should be written and you know the process. And very few of us take the time to actually learn those things that, in my mind, would make us much more effective. But sometimes we just don't have the time to learn it all or to want to learn it all. And he does. And that has made this state so much better.

And sometimes we, you know, griped and we complained about that process in there, but he always made sure that everybody had their fair share to say. If they were at the committee table, or if they were in that committee room, or if they were in the hallway, or if they were in the lower rotunda, because that's the process and it's a fair process.

And I think the things that we do here . . . they have consequences and they have meaning. And it's up to law-enforcement officers, it's up to lawyers, it's up to judges to interpret the things that we do in this room. And every one of us who has a job to interpret those laws and figure out what they mean and make sure that there's clarity, we owe it to that man sitting right there, that it all makes sense. Because he makes sure that everything that comes out of that committee and that leaves this Senate is in the best shape possible, that the words that are on that paper mean what they're supposed to mean and they mean what they appear to mean. And sometimes it makes the process lengthier, but it's made this state better. For all the years that you've been in that committee room, you have made this state better.

And you're leaving us now and you're going to the Supreme Court. And I have no doubt, Charlie, that you will leave this body, and you will go to that Supreme Court, and you will become one of the most learned, one of the most read, and one of the best Supreme Court Justices that this state has ever had because you know the law, and you know how to apply the law, and you know what it means more than anyone that I've ever met in my life. And I think that over the next number of years as you serve on that court, opinions that you write will be of consequence, but will bring a lot of clarity to the law. SENATOR PLYMALE: Thank you.

I'm really humbled.

You know, I never was supposed to be here. I was told when I ran you don't have a chance. Yeah, you don't have a chance of winning. You don't have it. And I will have to say when I went home to talk to my wife about thinking about running she looked at me and she said, "Won't you run for city council or something like that? What do you want to run for Senate for?"

And I was part of a group from the Huntington Chamber that wanted to get people more involved in . . . particularly related to education

And I will say this, that . . . I have a great family. I ran because of my family and I'm leaving because of my family. My wife could not be here tonight. Our grandkids had a soccer game. So, that's sort of the way it happens. The rest of my family has other things that are going on, you know, you know how that goes. But I have a great family and a great support system

. . . from my parents all the way through, but, particularly my wife, Jennifer.

I do want to reflect a little bit back because, you know, when you stand here, you stand on a lot of people's shoulders. If you stand tall, you stand on the people that believed in you, that mentored you.

And I want to talk about one person, in particular. And I know that when you start talking about people sometimes things get lost in it. But I want to really focus on one and that's Mike Perry, Mike Perry, in our area, you know, if you've heard of Heritage Farms and different things . . . . But he was the chair of the banks in our area and Mike Perry took me under his wing when I first started and stuck with me the whole way through. And to this day . . . as he passed, Mike Perry passed away in 2015 . . . but I would like to say something that he does. You know, they talk to you after they're gone. But, he said, "God's promise for you, I was indeed fortunate to grow up during the time when not only at home and in Sunday school, but at public school as well, I learned that God created man, including me, with a purpose, and that he loved me and everyone in the world and that he wanted us to honor and love him by the way he created other people. We learn to respect our parents and not talk back to them, particularly our mothers, which was an extremely serious offense, instantly punished by our fathers. But I really want to talk about this, we learned to respect our elders and treat other people the way that we would want them to treat us." That has stuck with me. That's what I've tried to do here. That's what I've tried to do from, you know, my parents, my wife, from Mike Perry, is to treat people like I would want to be treated.

I do want to say that . . . I came here and in the first caucus meeting—and there's not anyone in here that was in that first caucus meeting, unfortunately—I mentioned we've got to do something with workers' comp. That was in 1993. You could have heard a pin drop. Many people sort of moved away from me and everything. But by 1995, we were doing something on that because it had become a pension system quite honestly. It was in bad shape. And, you know, I had started a business. When I got a letter, it wasn't I'm glad you started a business, it was, you owe these taxes and this is what you . . . you know. We needed to change that. So that's one of the things I tried to do.

I will have to say that Mitch Carmichael spoke at the June interims for Economic

Development and Tourism and he said these things: We have a superior financial status—this is why we're doing so well right now-we have superior financial status. Workers' compensation rates are the second lowest in the country. When I first started here, they were the worst in the country. We had just a \$10 billion plus unfunded liability. We have no unemployment debt. Our pension funding is secure. Charlie, it was six percent when we first arrived here in Teachers Retirement. Other Post-Employment Benefits . . . we are the only state in the country that has addressed that, your OPEB liability, we're the only state that has ever done that. And that is, you know, now . . . Granted, when you look at PEIA, you're still going to address some aspects of your Other Post-Employment Benefits, but that's part of the responsibility that you have here. And then starting Rainy Day Fund.

I'd like to close on something that my wife has talked to me a million times about. And, you know, you get used to being in here . . . some people calling you senator, some people calling you other things . . . but people sort of looking up to you and, probably, sometimes putting you on a pedestal. And I've got something here that my wife keeps reminding me, and you'll find out why I'm saying this. Simon Sinek, who is a leader, and a speaker, and a motivational speaker, talked about there was Undersecretary of Defense that went to speak at a conference. And when he went to speak at the conference, somebody arranged his flight, sent him business class. He went to check in, they had already checked him into the hotel. He went to go to speak, they already had somebody waiting there to take him to speak to the conference. He goes into the conference, they lead him into the green room where they take him right in and they said, "Here, General. Here's a ceramic cup." Ceramic mug. And he wanted coffee, so he got coffee. And the next year, he goes to speak. He's no longer the Undersecretary. He makes his own flight. He has to get a taxi over . . . . He checks himself in the hotel. Gets a taxi over to where he's speakingin the same room—and when he goes in to speak at that same room, he walks in and he goes through the door and he said, "Where can I get a cup of coffee?" And the guy said, "Well, back in that room." So somebody goes to the back of the room and they said, "Where can I get a cup of coffee?" "It's over there." With the ceramic cup. He said, "Right over there?" So he was speaking at this conference and he interrupted his speech and he said, "You know"—he explained that story and he said, "I've come here to speak. And last year, all these things happened and I finally realized it's the position that you hold. You know the position you hold is the one that has that ceramic mug. Don't forget the position you hold. I was made for a ceramic cup." So he had that ceramic cup and he started talking about it and he says, "Don't ever take for granted the position you hold."

And I'm going to read a couple things: It was for the position I held. As you gain fame, as you gain fortune, as you gain position or seniority, people will treat you better than you really need to be treated. It is meant for the position that you hold. Be grateful, but remember, you deserve a Styrofoam cup.

SENATOR TARR: Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator Craig Philip Blair has left an indelible impression upon my life and one of the first moments that that happened was in my first year of service up here. And we've had people talking about people being fiery and full of spit and vinegar when you come up and I was kind of that way.

And I was really, really frustrated coming up when Mitch Carmichael was Senate President and Craig Blair was Finance Chairman. And I was up here after Ryan Ferns had lost his Senate election. And Mitch Carmichael and Craig Blair went to Ryan and said, "Hey, do you think you can get Eric to come over and have an off-site dinner with us so we can have a conversation with him?" And the conversation was a kind of come to Jesus meeting that they needed to have come down.

And so, I went over to Recovery. And when Ryan called me, Ryan called me up and he said, "Hey," he said, "Eric, you don't have to go to this if you don't want to," he said, "... but, I'd like you to go if you would." And so, I was... we're

talking . . . . Senator from Tucker was talking about leaving things at home-I wasn't about to leave at home that how upset I was during that first session that I was up here. And so, when I went, I went with that reservation, hesitation, and angst going into this meeting at Recovery . . . in defense mode. And I know that Senator Blair would remember this well. And so, when I sat down, he and Mitch both were there really taking a mentor role saying, "Hey, you need to cool your jets a little bit. You've got a lot of time that you're going to serve in the Senate. You need to develop some relationships . . . need to go out and . . . " they said. Gave me this lesson in politics. And politics was the last thing I cared about when I came up here in my first session when I ran for Senate. It was the last thing I cared about. It was policy and policy was it. And so, you can't get the policy without the politics, I quickly learned.

But, during that discussion, I listened to them and then . . . but really didn't hear them. And stood up and told them what I thought, both, and where I thought they could stick their advice. And I left.

And I know the conversation we had went back to Ryan. I said, "Well, that went terrible. We crashed and burned on that. We really don't know what we're going to do with this now."

But I'll tell you what I think that Senator . . . President Craig Blair will go back and tell you now that I actually did hear it. And we became very, very fast friends. And the reason that we became such fast friends is because of how direct and how caring that that advice was.

And I think that one of the things that all of us would agree that, and it's certainly been in my experience with Senator Blair, is that to the point, with care, for your good is where he's been for just about any member in this body that's got to serve with him.

He . . . beyond anybody else under this dome, I have seen him be able to navigate five steps ahead of any one of us by the first move he makes and then tell you what you're going to do from what he did over here and it becomes true 98 percent of the time.

So, I appreciate your mentorship, both as a Finance chairman and also in your service for

this state for at least 20 years, I believe. And so, we're much better off for it.

So I strongly support this resolution.

You never know when you're going to change the direction of a child. Always put the effort in for that because they are our future. And I love it.

One of my greatest days in the Senate, if you remember, was when that child was in the wheelchair and was just itching to come down the center. And we stopped—and I didn't care whether Lee liked it or not—we let that kid go down through there. And I'm telling you what ... that was satisfying for the soul. Satisfying for the soul. And that's what we're in the business of doing, is changing the state for the people of West Virginia. They deserve that.

Now, I want to head onto some people.

Senator Swope, you're my hero because I've never seen anybody do what you did. And I've come down and spoke about it before. But, whenever you gave up your chairmanship of Economic Development for Glenn Jeffries to do it—who's out doing work right now, this is why he's not here, on Economic Development . . . . This is about putting the state first, the people first, rather than one's self for a committee chairmanship, or whatever it may be, and you continue to work. That's called selflessness. You're my hero. We should all aspire to be just like you.

I wanted to come down a while ago and say that but I figure I'm going to weave it all in here tonight and where I want to go.

Now, little buddy, not to . . . . I call you that because . . . not out of disrespect but for where I'm going. You and A. James Manchin, and that's what he used to call you, and whenever I was first elected, I served on Gov Org over in the House of Delegates. I was in the minority the whole time. Mike was there and so was A. James, And, I swear to God that A. James taught you how to give a speech, in how to turn the switch on and turn the switch off. And, to a greater degree, sometimes it's theater, and sometimes it's not, but the thing about it is, is being able to turn the switch off, leave it, go, walk away. And even when you were talking about Hoppy, you and I on there together, we weren't mad. It was more about pushing our agendas and trying to get the public to believe in where we're at. I'm just happy to be glad that I won. Well, because it was workers' comp and I

Bob—excuse me, Senior Senator from the Fifth—you talked about workers' comp earlier. That's the only reason I was here because it was ridiculous what we were paying.

And I was looking today—excuse me for one second—back in 2002, when I was first elected, the general revenue budget was \$2,809,000,000. Our workers' comp system was \$4.2 billion in debt at that point in time.

And to give you an example—and I've probably said it before on this floor, but I'll do it again—when I was first elected and the business I was running with the same amount of employees making at least half of what they do now, I was spending \$9,998 a year. My son has since bought the business and last year—he's got the same amount of employees making twice the

money and everything—it was \$1,500 and some odd dollars.

Now, let me tell you, Nucor wouldn't have been here if we would have stayed the trajectory that we were going. Procter & Gamble wouldn't be here. The list goes on and on and on. Most of the businesses that are here would have been gone. And it took some difficult votes to be able to get to where we're at today.

But that was one of the right ones. If I never accomplish anything else in this state, that was the most important thing to be able to change our trajectory.

Bob, you've become a close friend, you and your wife, both. But what I don't think anybody knows in here is that Donna Boley is the longest-serving member in the Senate's history. You are number two of the longest-serving members in the state's history.

And the reason I bring this up, it's about institutional knowledge. A lot of people talk about . . . they want term limits. Do you really want term limits in the House of Delegates-I've got to ask you that-when they have a 30 percent turnover rate every two years? The voters give that. You don't need that. What you need to have is institutional knowledge that goes along with it and it's a mix of the old and the new to have an understanding. There's been many times that Mike, Bob, Donna, let's see, Charlie, Charlie Trump . . . has come to me and said, "Craig, we did this back in . . . . This is why it failed", or why you wouldn't want to do this. It's a key component on being able to make the right decisions. You have such a huge turnover . . . that causes a problem.

My hat's off to you, my friend. You have helped us understand, regardless of party or anything like that, because we all care about West Virginia.

Charles Trump. You made me happy when you called me a brother because I feel exactly the same way. How I ended up becoming the Senate President . . . . I could care less about the title senator, delegate, or even president, my name is Craig—and I've said that over, and over—but what I wanted was the work, not the title. And I called Charles up when Mitch lost. Well, it wasn't right away, it was in the summertime, wasn't it? It was moving through. When I was first elected, Charles was the Minority Leader in the House of Delegates. And I'll go on to say one other thing, too, this is no

disrespect to any of the rest of you in this room, but there's only one person in this room that I would trust my salvation with if I would give it to him that I know that it would be waiting on me when it was time. It's that man right there. He's the most trustworthy person that I've ever met in my entire life. That makes it easy to have conversations. It makes it easy to trust your message that you give to me.

So, we sat down and talked. And you remember right? I know you'll handle Bob on this. I said, "You want to be the Senate President and you want me to support you for that, I'm happy to do it. You had earned it for a lot of the whippings that you took on the other end of the building. Some of them by this one sitting right next to me here. Yeah. Now, Bob wasn't involved in that, but Senator from Marion was a little bit. You thought you had it bad Randy when you didn't get a parking space that you wanted. You should have seen some of what I seen over there. But that's life. And the fact of the matter is, is things are different in the Senate.

But Charles, you're a man among men. And I can go on, and on, and on.

But I am going to tell one other little story. You know, I'm the only smoker left in this Senate . . . and I'll probably quit here before long because I'm going to not be here. But Charles, on the other hand, had not done any tobacco for . . . what was it? Ten years, nine years? We're out one night down here and I knew that he had told me before that . . . . He goes, "Sometimes I really crave a rub." And I went out-the devil that I am-and bought a can of Skoal. And he was sitting there that night and he said something about it and I slid it across the table to him. His wife hated my guts for at least a decade because of that. But the fact of the matter is, is that I'm telling this story because we're friends and I appreciate everything that we've been through together and what we've done for the state. And I only wish I could be as articulate as you.

Now, that goes through that portion of it.

Now, let's talk about . . . . I talked a little bit about the past and understanding where we come from to know where we're going. And I want to talk some numbers because these numbers are important. And I said whenever we created the flatline budget, that if we're successful, we'd be fighting over how to spend the money. That's exactly what we're doing.

But now, let's get smart. Let's spend the money where there's always a return on the investment because then our people reap the rewards. We don't want to forget that. Never, ever want to forget that.

I'm not going to be here any longer, but I want you to remember these words. You don't have to spend every dollar that's not nailed down. But you want to put the resources where you're going to get the return on that investment over, and over, and over.

We've reduced taxes in this state. Yesterday, it was \$1,321,000,000 since 2012. If you add in today, it's \$1,453,000,000. Now, that's with basically a \$5 billion budget at this point in time.

You're going to have the opportunity here to continue doing the flatline budget and earning these revenues, but I'm going to tell you two things that's going to need to be addressed. One of them is the personal property tax on equipment machinery. I don't want anybody to forget this. You need to get that across the finish line. You've got to get it across the finish line because if you do that, it's going to Katy bar the door. Businesses will be coming here even more so. If you have to [inaudible] \$400 million to bring a Nucor into this state, you'll spend \$100 million to be able to do that.

You don't have to throw . . . . For decades, and decades, and decades, we threw money at education, got the same results, and our best and brightest left the state because there was not gainful employment. You have gainful employment and then the two most mobile things is capital and population . . . the labor, the workforce. Then it gives you the money, the resources to invest in education and all the other infrastructures

This is important to understand because that's exactly what we've been doing. While we've still been . . . and it sounds like I'm beating up on education. I am not. We've got alternative educations here now that are going to work. We've given pay raises five out of six years. It's never been done in the state's history.

When you want to talk about the roads—and the Governor had a big event out here today where there was . . . looked like there was 2,000 state road workers out there talking about the roads. But you can't go anywhere and not see the huge improvement on that infrastructure.

And then the efforts that you made today to finally . . . we're going to have broadband fiber on every pole throughout the entire state which will increase the property values, the salability of that

Everybody wins. It's a winning, winning strategy if you choose to go that way.

Everybody's sick of me holding up this book. But it grows every year . . . what we did to make it so that businesses can be profitable again in the State of West Virginia. And when businesses are profitable, so are our people. Whether you're union or nonunion, it makes no difference.

All of the above energy state. I love coal. It behaves like a battery. I love natural gas. I like taking hot showers. Frankly, I don't care where the electricity comes from as long as our state in energy state. Why? Because businesses, especially in this economy, especially in the coming future, the demand for that energy is going to be there, whether it's data centers, whether it's steel mills, manufacturing . . . it doesn't make any difference. Make sure that West Virginia owns that because of our proximity on the East Coast to the population base. We get to own that.

I just talked about education.

In health care, we've done a tremendous amount of work for health care and we're a petri dish for the health care industry because our people, including myself, don't live the healthiest lifestyle. And that's what happens with poverty.

We're bringing them out of that. We're giving them the opportunity not to dream, but to dream big, to believe in themselves. This is one of the worst.... West Virginia people are some of the most wonderful people there are in the entire world. But lots of times they fail to believe in themselves. And they will give the shirt off their back to somebody in need while sacrificing themselves. And there's nothing wrong with that. But it's our job, it's our job to lift them up and give them those opportunities and make it so that each generation gets better in this state and they have the employment opportunities in this state.

This is therapy for me because I'm on my way out. But I'm painting the future that still needs to be done.

Don't be fearful of change. Don't be fearful of each other. It's the collective that works. The decisions that we make . . . . We are very much so diverse individuals in here. And it's not about winning an illusion, it's about finding the compromise. And this is one of the things, it's almost like compromise has become a dirty word. And that . . . . People will cloak themselves in the Constitution but fail to remember that our Constitution was a huge. great compromise. You don't always have to get your way 100 percent of the time. And whoever's going to be the next Senate President, I assure you that doesn't happen for you. Because I got to learn that. Back when I was in the minority, I thought everybody got everything they wanted. It's not the case. Usually if you do the job right, what you're doing is looking out for everybody else and trying to get the best results for everybody else.

Now, how do you get those results? I'm the weakest link in the chain. No question about that. In the back row . . . you can see the team that sets back there for Charles Trump, I see Education, some of my staff. That's because of the respect, because they know of the operation. But the work, the true work, you provide a little bit of leadership and the guidance and that comes from the reflection of what you want to do . . . filtered through me and my example.

And then you have rock stars like . . . sitting over here in the corner . . . with Sarah Stewart, and Casey Long, Jacque Bland . . . Jeff and Chris, are they still here? Jeff Johnson and Chris DeWitte, handpicked, by the way, for them . . . and they're still sitting there. These guys get the job done.

I want to go a little bit further. Marilyn Parsons, God rest her soul. I haven't replaced her, because she's irreplaceable, but my team filled in when she passed. Has done a phenomenal job.

I also had the blessing of having some great people in front of me to watch: Bob Kiss, in the House, Rick Thompson, Earl Ray Tomblin, Jeff Kessler, Bill Cole, and Mitch Carmichael. You keep your eyes open, you'll do the things that are good. And the things that are bad, you don't do those things. That applies to whatever you've seen me do. Got some things right, got some things wrong. Watch, learn, adapt, and push the ball forward.

The sky is the limit for this state. We're all going to come and go, but the fact is, is that this

body, this body, sets the tone. Has been before me

I'll say this real quick. When I was in the House and Mike got one of his union bills passed out, we'd be saying thank God for Earl Ray. Remember? You knew we were saying . . . . We said that a lot because he would stop some of the nonsense that'd come from the House. Told you I was going to be going after you a little bit. Hey, I've waited how many years? So . . . .

And I'm not joking. But it's part of the real history, at least from my perspective, on what I've seen and what took place. We're getting it right. We're getting it right for the people. And our state is climbing year, after year, after year. It's not perfect. Keep your eye on the destination. Slow down if you run off the road and bring it back onto the road and keep going. We've not made a whole lot of mistakes here and we can screw it up pretty quickly.

I want to go back and say once again, Lee, your team . . . . But there is no question in my mind . . . . There's Sarah Stewart and Casey, you guys, if I had you in the private sector, we'd all be millionaires. I've never seen anything like it Done yesterday, two out of three times I go to the office and I ask for something and it was done yesterday. That's unheard of. It's unheard of anywhere.

So, I feel better now. It's a little bit of therapy. And I ended a lot of speeches like that, too, back home . . . or used to. Not going to give speeches anymore, I don't think.

I'm going to end on this one note. Everybody knows I got Benjamin Franklin in my office. He's my favorite founding father. I had on the bottom of my stationery for a long, long time, "Well done is better than well said." That's a Benjamin Franklin quote that I believe in. And you don't have to run around, take credit for everything. In fact, I prefer not getting the credit. I'd much rather do the work behind the scenes and make everybody else look good and fix the problems of this state. We've been doing that. It's been an honor and a privilege to have served with you guys... with the members here. And the friendships never end here. Senate President's dinner proves that.

So, thank you for the opportunity, each and every one of you.

For those of you that needed to use the restroom, the end is near.

So, thank you.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MARK HUNT

### Providing for a child and dependent care credit against the personal income tax

REMARKS OF HONORABLE ERIC J. TARR Tuesday, October 8, 2024

SENATOR TARR: Thank you, Mr. President.

The purpose of this bill is to create a new, nonrefundable tax credit. It will allow taxpayers who pay for child and dependent care to take a credit against their personal income tax if they claimed a child care credit on their federal return. The state credit is capped at 50 percent of the allowable federal tax credit.

The bill would also make the credit effective on January 1, 2024.

The expected cost on this bill annually is \$4.2 million.

I urge passage of the bill.

REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. WOELFEL AND HONORABLE ERIC J. TARR

Tuesday, October 8, 2024

SENATOR WOELFEL: Thank you, Mr. President.

Will the chair yield?

MR. PRESIDENT: Senator yield?

SENATOR WOELFEL: We've had a lot of bills—I know I introduced three or four myself this past session—on child care. And I'm glad to see us starting to address this fundamental issue that's facing our state.

So, my understanding, when we . . . . Just, again, I'm not in the caucus so I'm trying to, maybe, get some of this out there for the people that are tuned in or that may not be aware of what we're doing specifically with this bill. My understanding is that previously, when we passed a credit for your personal property tax on

your personal vehicle, that when you file your taxes, even if you're getting a refund, that is you don't have any tax liability on your state income tax, you're going to get that money back in your pocket . . . refundable to you. Is that right?

SENATOR TARR: That's correct.

SENATOR WOELFEL: And there's a distinction between that type of tax credit and this bill. Am I right about that?

SENATOR TARR: That is correct.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Would you explain to us and to the people how that will work?

SENATOR TARR: Yes. If you owe taxes, this piece here, you have the state taxes on it and you're claiming a child care credit on your federal return ... so then you can go in, now, if this would go up and cap it at 50 percent, which you can do on federal, and, if you owe taxes up to whatever that 50 percent is, you can claim this against those taxes that you owe.

SENATOR WOELFEL: But if you're just a working person out here . . . that is really our most common resident who's working . . . most likely is not going to have a tax liability to the State of West Virginia on the state income tax or, at least frequently, that's not going to be the case. Will this benefit those people?

SENATOR TARR: Well, they're already subsidized through what we have right now with what's happened through the ARPA that came off of . . . the ARPA funds . . . over this past year. So, to make a fuller explanation because of you not being able to be in the caucus around these discussions, I'll kind of go through some of that if that's okay.

When the federal government came in and tried to stand up child care centers for fear that they might not be able to make it through because of children not coming to the day cares, they changed a couple of things. One of the things that they did in that, what was anticipated to be a temporary action, is that they went from attendance based to enrollment based. So, if you have a child that goes to that day care prior to that rule coming down relative to COVID, and the federal moneys that followed it, what would happen is if you went on Monday, the day care got paid for Monday but they did not get paid for Tuesday, Thursday, and then through Friday if they didn't show up. So now, it went to enrollment based.

And then . . . also what they did, is they took the means test that would have been applied around any of that entitlement and brought it up to just about anybody. And now, it was tiered, or progressive, as you would go up. But, you could have somebody who's making \$150,000 a year, or a couple that were, and they could get this entitlement just like anybody else.

And so, it went through . . . the ARPA funds expired. That put about, for four years, about \$60 million more per year than what was going into the child care system in West Virginia. Those ARPA funds are now exhausted. And so, what's happened since that point is that a means test has went back and been applied to that rule but we're still under this enrollment rule because the federal government says now states, you now have to do this if you're going to have this as part of your Medicaid system, then you have to do an enrollment based rather than attendance based. So, what that did is that elevated the cost to the State of West Virginia and, on a low ball park, about \$43 million more a year than we were paying pre-COVID from the state to that entitlement.

Presently, those people that would have now qualified under that means test are receiving that supplement more so even than they did pre-COVID because they can go and be paid on . . . or they can compensate the day care on enrollment based instead of attendance based.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Well, that's only applying if you're in a day care center, right? What if you're paying some person down the road to take care of your preschool children? How does any of that fit into this? Aren't those people left out?

SENATOR TARR: Yeah.

I believe that for the day care, if you're providing day care services there, you have to be an approved vendor through DHHR to be able to receive that, is the way I understand it.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. So, what are we doing to help the people that aren't in a day care setting with this bill, if anything?

SENATOR TARR: So, if the day care that you're paying for qualifies for the federal income tax credit, you're claiming that credit against your federal, then we're going to also ... whatever that stipulations are on that federal income tax credit, you're going to be able to

claim up to 50 percent of that at the state level as well.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Well, what if you don't have any income tax liability to the state? You're not going to get any help under this bill.

SENATOR TARR: You do not get the help under this bill. That's correct.

SENATOR WOELFEL: So we're not helping the people that . . . . We're only helping the people that have enough income to owe tax to the state under the state income tax. Is that right?

SENATOR TARR: There's many other ways that that population that you're describing is getting subsidized through the state on other venues. So it may not be directly with child care but there's still a lot of other assistance that they apply for ... or that they can ....

SENATOR WOELFEL: You mean like food stamps or something?

SENATOR TARR: It could be food stamps. It could be . . . . Yeah, that's an example.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay, but I'm talking about child care. I understand people might be disabled, or they might qualify for other benefits, but I'm talking about child care.

I mean I'm not trying to be argumentative. I'm just trying to lay out who we're helping and who we're not helping by this bill. Okay.

And so, would you agree with me that we're not helping with child care expenses anybody who doesn't owe the State of West Virginia with this bill? We're not owing . . . anybody that doesn't owe state income tax is not going to get a refund. Is that right? They're not going to get a refund from the state if they don't owe state income tax. Is that right?

SENATOR TARR: Yeah. If they don't owe state income tax . . . on this bill, this bill solely addresses the people who owe income tax return to the State of West Virginia.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. Would you agree with me that people that owe a state income tax are people that are making more money than minimum wage, for example?

SENATOR TARR: It's . . . I would imagine more than minimum wage.

If you're earning a living and paying into the tax system and you paid more taxes than you should have paid then you can go back and you can claim this . . . you can claim this credit.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Well, when you say taxes, just to be clear, you're not talking about the taxes a person pays, you're talking about the state income tax?

SENATOR TARR: State income tax, that's correct.

SENATOR WOELFEL: Okay. Alright.

#### REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. WOELFEL

SENATOR WOELFEL: So, I'm in agreement that we do this and I'm going to be a "yes" vote on the bill. But my attempt was to show how many folks that are being left out.

Again, our child poverty rate in West Virginia is 25 percent and rising. We're forty-ninth in poverty in this state. Child poverty rate's outrageous.

Our workforce participation—last time I checked—we're at 47, or 48, or 49. I don't call that a rocketship ride. And there are a lot of people that are being . . . want to work. They want to go into the workforce. Their spouse may be working but they've got these young children, they've got to stay home, and they can't find affordable health care. Health care is very, very expensive. It's like another car payment.

So, you know, I appreciate what we're doing here and I think it's a good step. Maybe we're going to take up some other bills that the House has come up with. But, it needs to be said in this chamber out loud that child care is what's holding us back. The lack of available child care, affordable child care, and our helping people with child care. In my view we have an obligation to help people with child care. I know there are those in this chamber that say, "Pull yourself up by your bootstraps. We're not helping you. You had these kids, you're going to take care of them, and that's that. We don't have an obligation to help you with your child care." These aren't people that want a handout. They want a handup so they can be productive. They get those kids into school, and they're out there working, but they need help.

And I'd say there are people in this chamber that have had that kind of help . . . that have had help with child care. Not everybody has a family member that can provide free child care.

So, the whole thing I've heard since I've gotten here was we want to have a better workforce participation rate. We want to suppress child poverty. We want to reverse the long-standing trend of child poverty in our state. And the way you do that is through helping folks with their child care.

It's like those of us that grew up on a farm—Senator from Greenbrier and I had this discussion—if you grew up on a farm, you primed the pump to get the water to come out of the well. And if you don't prime that pump, you're not getting any water. There's no switch you hit to get the water. We're priming the pump for these people that want to work. Once we prime that pump, they're going to be productive members of our state and they're going to be taxpayers.

REMARKS OF HONORABLE MICHAEL A. OLIVERIO II

Tuesday, October 8, 2024

SENATOR OLIVERIO: Thank you, Mr. President.

This bill, if we just simply do the math, will provide about 16,000 families roughly \$260. The math, could wiggle with that a little bit, but, basically, it's going to be about 16,000 families are going to get \$260 a year. And certainly that helps. I'd like to see us be able to do more.

And I just want to offer a challenge for our upcoming legislative session that we really dig into this issue.

And I want to ask each of you in this chamber, like me, do each of you have a cell phone? And I think the answer to that would be about 33 other yeses. And I want to ask you, are you enrolled in a cell phone plan or do you pay for your cell phone just on the days that you use it? My guess is most of you are enrolled in a plan in which you pay a monthly fee.

And I would guess most of the things in your life are the same way.

I have car insurance on my cars. I don't pay that car insurance bill on the days in which I drive my car, I pay that car insurance every month, regardless of which days I drive the car.

So, when child care providers come to us and say they want to be reimbursed on an enrollment basis, they can't control which days of the week or the month that families send a child. They have to have staffing such that maybe that child doesn't show up, but maybe a regulator does show up and says, "You're supposed to have this many staff members for this many children."

So, I hope we can—next year when we come back in session—I hope we can put to bed this issue of attendance versus enrollment and give these facilities an opportunity to operate financially in a feasible manner because we're seeing these facilities close and we're seeing a lot of challenges.

I'm one of those people who would love to see our workforce participation rate increase. And I think one of the things we can do to keep folks in the workforce is provide subsidies for child support.

New Mexico today offers child support to families who are four times the poverty level. I mean they're making a significant commitment to help working families receive subsidies so that their families can be in the workforce.

And we can structure co-pays for those families. We can do things with Tri-Share and other things to incorporate businesses into this as well

But this is a small first step in my mind, but I think, big picture, we need to really begin to think in the coming months what we can do to make it possible for families to have affordable, quality child care in these early years when we know the brain development is occurring the most and to prepare these kids to be successful in the future.

So, I'm a "yes" vote on this but I hope that we can do much more in the future.

REMARKS OF HONORABLE ERIC J. TARR

Tuesday, October 8, 2024

SENATOR TARR: Mr. President, I want to make sure that people are very, very clear on what the law of the land is now, from the federal government, is that for those people who have received the entitlement for child care, it is enrollment based. The state doesn't have an option to go to attendance based.

And so what happened is, is with that \$60 million a year that went in to enhance that entitlement, going from attendance based to enrollment based, in those four years, workforce participation went down. We poured almost a quarter billion dollars more than we were doing before in child care going from attendance to enrollment—which we're going to have to continue on enrollment—and workforce participation in West Virginia went down.

So, nationally, child care is an issue. Across this country it's even made it into presidential—vice presidential debates at this point where they're talking about across the country, how do you fix child care.

So what we, in my perception of that, what we did learn is that at \$60 million more a year, it

didn't affect workforce participation . . . at least not that it moved it up.

I would agree, child care is a concern for parents who are going to work. I'm an employer, I'm a father, I've got a wife who, her degree's in early childhood education and in special education, and so, I'm very attuned to what a family needs in order to be able to go in and have the support network to go to work.

I think West Virginia has had a challenge with our child care situation well before we ever got to this situation. And the reason is, is because when we started looking into . . . And I say we, it's a team of people we have looking at what do we do now with child care in West Virginia? And when you go in and you look at . . . for all the expense that's been applied, and then you ask for having done that, for asking a taxpayer to pay for somebody else's child care, what should society, what should the taxpayers expect for having done that? I would say you probably want a more educated population because that person can maybe go improve their education. I would say you want a family who can go earn more for having had that. What I can tell you that we do not and cannot measurably, objectively say for a fact so far with what we've looked into in West Virginia for what we're doing right now, we can't say what that impact is.

And so, what I would take, or how I would advise, Mr. President, that, as we move forward, that when we make decisions on things that are, to an end, that is critical to the population of West Virginia, we understand what we're doing and what the effect it has, has done.

So, what we do know, enrollment's law of the land. It's not attendance based. What we do know is that \$60 million more a year did not affect workforce participation. What we don't know is we don't know how affected the education side of our society....

And, it's my opinion, if we did \$100 million more a year, we probably wouldn't see a change at this point because we don't know exactly where we're throwing it.

So, yes, I would encourage this body to move forward more with investigation child care and effective legislation, not just throwing money at it.

I think this is a good first step because this one we know. These are people who are going to work. They had to go to work in order to be able to pay taxes. And if they got children and they're getting a federal tax credit, that's because they were having to pay for child care. You know exactly where this dollar's going.

This is a good bill. I urge adoption. It's a good first step.

SENATOR STOVER: Thank you, Mr. President.

And thank you to everyone who spoke and those who didn't. And, yes, all those stories are true. I guarantee you. I'm a politician, you know they're true.

It's been—I'm going to tell a story, too. I'm going to tell a little ghost story, by request, won't take long. But before that, I just want to say that as anyone in any Senate in any state, or in the United States Senate, will tell you, if you read about the great ones, it is usually—and I will not get emotional—it is usually the singular most honorable thing people say they can do . . . to sit in a Senate body. They are the great, deliberative bodies of democracy throughout the history of democracies and republics. It is an honor to be here. I've made friends. I've met honorable people. I've agreed and disagreed but we do so honorably. And that's the way it should be.

I won't get into all the folks here that I've grown to love and care for, but there are many. I really can't think of anyone I dislike in the Senate since I've been here. Ever.

I'll probably have another one or two sentences, but let me tell you a ghost story, Mr. President. First off, you guys come on down to Twin Falls, Wyoming County, or any state park. I tell stories off and on. And we all, I tell true stories, and we tell them really scary if there are no small kids there, and we tell them fairly scary if there are small kids. But here's the story that happened in Mullens and on what's called Bowers Ridge, which is the ridge where Twin Falls is mostly located. Here's the story. This is kind of the way I tell it up there.

There was an old man walking down the streets in Mullens. Down the main street. To his left there are three- or four-story brick buildings, old buildings, but they were new at this time. And you're walking down toward where the Guyandotte River receives the Slab Fork Creek. Slab Fork and Guyandotte are in Raleigh County and flow through Wyoming County to get down to Huntington.

The old man was walking, he was old. And it was in either August or late July and it was hot. It was so hot. He couldn't get that off his mind. And he had a handkerchief he kept in his back pocket—you know, now I might wrap a handkerchief around my head or . . . who knows—and, yeah, you blow your nose on a handkerchief, but they had a great big

handkerchief and they've used a little portion of it. You know, wadded it up and kept the rest of it for other things. And a lot of it was just wiping sweat when it was hot.

And he was walking down and there were meters, parking meters on the street then—they had just went in, they were new, they were there until about 20 years ago. But he was walking down and he kept thinking, "God, it sure is hot." And he wiped the sweat.

And he looked ahead and the three story building was becoming two and the sun was over there getting ready to clear the buildings. And it was already up near 100.

And right as he wiped the sweat one more time he took another step and the sun had cleared that building because he got into the two-story building. The sun hit directly on him. You know what that feels like. It's like opening an oven door and all that heat rushes out at you.

Anyway, "Oh, Lord, it sure is hot." And he staggered back and a parking meter caught him before he fell. And he thought he was going to pass out.

Poof, and just like that he wasn't in Mullens. He was looking around and he thought, "Lord, where am I? What's going on here?" He was in a big field surrounded by a forest. There were oak trees, and hemlocks, and chestnut trees, and a big field.

And off in the distance, he could see a gathering of people. And they were standing around in a semicircle, surrounded by the forest in this great big field atop a mountain on Bowers Ridge. He remembered that, "Lord, I remember this. I was a little boy. Oh, my Lord, my best friend. I remember mom come in at night and shook me. Get up, you got to go with your dad up to Slab Fork. There's a guy up there that can make caskets and we have to have one tomorrow. Your little friend who's been sick, he died overnight. I'm so sorry to tell you that, but you got to be a man. You got to go up there with your dad and get this casket and bring it back." And they did.

And he was a man even though he was six, or seven, or eight years old. And they walked to Slab Fork because his little buddy had died overnight. And man, it was hot. It was hot when he went up against that street in Mullens, and it was hot that day he was remembering.

And he was walking toward that group of people and he kept thinking, "Oh Lord, it was hot. I remember how hot it was that day." And he felt angry at himself a little bit. He remembered feeling bad back then, really bad because his little best friend had died, but also mad at himself because, despite the fact that all he should be is sad, he was angry at the same time

And he noticed that the preacher kept wiping sweat like this as he walked closer and the preacher's preaching, and the people are gathered, and it's sad, and there's a wooden casket that he helped them get. And the little boy's there. And the preacher, the third time, he says he keeps wiping that sweat. I remembered it was so hot I kept thinking, "Lord, preacher, please hurry. It sure is hot." And the preacher wiped his sweat again and he reached down and he wiped the sweat off that little boy, his friend in the casket. And he went, "Oh my God."

And he fell back and he was in Mullens again but he wasn't hot, he was freezing. And he was an old man. And he said, "Oh my Lord, it took 70 years for me to realize that little dead kids in the casket don't sweat. We buried him alive 70 years ago right out there where Twin Falls is now."

And they had. He's still buried there. Is that little boy a ghost?

Well, right out from where I tell the stories there's a cemetery. And I always tell them, "Feel free to go out there. He might let you know."

Anyway, that's the kind of stories I tell. That story's true. It was told to me by a guy named Todd Houck whose grandfather told him. Todd was the prosecutor in Wyoming County at the time and, you know, people who are prosecutors, they won't lie. I'm sure that story is true because I asked around before I did it.

Anyway, I thank you for the privilege to know you, to work with you, and to learn from you. And I'm going to be around. I hope to come to the next caucus in a kayak, pulling my canoe behind me because I need to bring some stuff with me. And I thank you for the chance to haul that thing in your truck because I can't carry them on a portage very much like I used to.

It's been an honor being here. You come to Wyoming County, Twin Falls, I promise you, we'll treat you like family.
