## I. Introduction

The West Virginia legislative code requires every three -years an independent assessment of the Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP). The purpose of this report was to determine compliance according to the Authorizing Legislation Statute: **11-13J** – Senate Bill 293 for the period 2018-2023.

The Neighborhood Investment Program is a program administered through The West Virginia Development Office (WVDO) and is a state agency chartered by the state legislature since 1996. For the past 27 years their purpose has been to build stronger West Virginia neighborhoods by providing eligible non-profit organizations with state tax credit vouchers putting emphasis on Emergency Assistance and Direct Needs. Throughout the assessment period (2018-2023), there were \$3 million dollars in tax credits allocated annually to the Neighborhood Investment Programs (NIP).

The minimum donation eligible to receive a tax credit is \$500, and the maximum total annual NIP eligible donation for a donor is \$200,000.

Both businesses and individuals are eligible for NIP tax credits. Currently, donors may use NIP tax credit on the following WV State Taxes: Corporate Net Income Tax and Personal Income Tax.

Donors have the option of using the tax credit in one year or over a five-year period, with the year of donation being year one.

NIP credits cannot reduce total state tax liability by more than 50%.

The maximum tax credit allowed in any one year to any donor is \$100,000.

All donations remain eligible for the Charitable Contribution Deduction on their federal tax return.

The (WVDO) sends each organization individual detailed instructions about the NIP program, and they work closely with each non-profit. It is the responsibility of each organization to alert the (WVDO) of any staff changes and ensure each new hire has access to the following information: NIP records, NIP passwords, contact numbers, and the detailed instructions provided by the (WVDO).

The (WVDO) provides organizations with technical assistance and a clear description of the programs criteria, outlining what is exactly required to be a part of the Neighborhood Investment Program and the steps required to maintain eligibility.

## **II. NIP Program Developments**

Over the past 26 years there have been 3,891 neighborhood programs serving distressed communities in WV; and over \$115,800,331.83 in donations were produced to approved neighborhood programs. There has been over \$53,191,727.72 million in state tax credits given to donors allowing thousands of low-income individuals to benefit from neighborhood services and programs.

The maximum amount of NIP tax credits permitted for each organization is \$50,000 with a minimum of \$2,500.00 credits; any WV businesses or private donor can reduce up to 75% of their state tax liability by making a contribution of cash, personal property, in-kind donations, stock and real property.

For the past 19 years NIP has represented all 55 counties in WV. In FY-2023, the NIP once again achieved record success and remains a significant incentive for donors to contribute to local non-profit organizations. The growth of the program has been such that the demand for the credits outpaced the supply of credits by 204% in FY-2023. During FY-2023, 205 applicant organizations requested an average of \$29,884 in tax credit per project for a total requested amount of \$6,126,250.00. The NIP Advisory Board voted to approve 200 projects at an average award of \$15,000.00. A total of \$3,000,000 in NIP tax credit was allocated for FY-2023 and participant organizations again utilized a record-setting 100% of the available credit for the seventh year in a row. These credits leveraged \$7,071,746 in donations and helped to serve low-income West Virginia citizens. The request by organizations for additional credit is overwhelming. The program has not had an increase in tax credit since 2011. The program has used 100% of credits for the last seven years, with the request for more credits by the donors expressed to the organizations.

## **III. Assessment Process**

Various procedures were used to assess the organizations including interviews and surveys to determine if the NIP complies.

100 of the 284 (35%) neighborhood organizations that were approved during 2018-2023 were reviewed. The data populations included were 100 randomly selected approved organizations by the WVDO along with an additional study on 20 organizations that included reviewing applications and additional questions that were obtained via phone or e-mail.

## **IV. NIP Advisory Board Requirements-§145-7-4**

The program operates with an active Advisory Board structure as defined by §11-13J-4a.

- All Board members shall be appointed for three years, and no longer than three consecutive terms.
- The Board shall consist of 13 members: The Director of the Development office plus 12 members appointed by the Director.

- The Director shall serve as chair but shall not vote unless it is necessary to break a tie.
- Four members will be officers or members of boards of directors of unrelated corporations that are currently licensed to do business in West Virginia.
- Four members will be executive directors, officers, or members of boards of directors of unrelated not-for-profit organizations which currently hold charitable organization status under section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code, and which are currently licensed to do business in West Virginia.
- Four board members will be economically disadvantaged citizens of the State, with an annual gross income of not more than 125 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).
- No more than four of the 12 appointed members may be from the same Congressional District.
- No more than seven of the appointed members may be from the same political party.
- Members are eligible for re-appointment, but no member may serve more than three consecutive terms.
- Board members shall be appointed for three years. Board appointments shall begin the 1st day of July in the year of appointment and end the 30th day of June of the third calendar year in which the appointment took effect. Appointments to fill unexpired terms shall be for the duration of the term.

### **Advisory Board as of FY 2023**

The current board members during FY 2023 were the following:

- Three from the First Congressional District and one Low Income Citizen Vacant
- One from the Second Congressional District and three Vacant (two Low-income citizen & one Private Sector Positions)
- Two from the Third Congressional District and two Vacant (one Private-Sector & One Low-income Citizen)

### **NIP Advisory Board Key Findings FY (2018-2023)**

The NIP Advisory Board is in legislative compliance with meetings, required paperwork and allocation and supplemental credit process, the staff acknowledged that there are vacancies on the board and is working toward filling all vacancies.

The (NIP) advisory board has met twice every fiscal year during (2018-2023) to evaluate the projects applications and to meet for the reallocation process of tax credits. The following are the notes on the Advisory Board meetings for the most recent fiscal year 2023 that were obtained from the Annual Report.

- The Advisory Board met on August 31, 2022, to review project applications for FY-2023. A total of 205 applications were received requesting a total of \$6,126,250.00 in tax credit. A total of 200 applications were approved by the Board totaling \$3,000,000.00 with no


funds held in reserve. Of the total \$3,000,000 credit allocation, \$3,000,000 was issued during the year by organizations to eligible donors representing 100% of the credit issued for the seventh time in a row in the organization's 27-year history.

- The Advisory Board met again on March 29, 2023, addressing the issue of reallocation. The process of recapturing credit from projects and reallocating it to other organizations is outlined in NIP Procedural Rule §145-7-4.8.b as follows: “If the amount awarded by the Board is less than the full amount sought by the project transferee, the Board may also approve a supplemental amount of credits to become available on or after March 30 of the state fiscal year if sufficient credits remain unallocated as of that date or if credits have been returned from previously approved projects: Provided, that the project transferee receiving supplemental credit approval shall, on or before March 15 of the state fiscal year, have issued one hundred percent of the credits they were initially awarded.”
- The NIP Procedural Rule continues (regarding reallocation) in §145-7-4.8.d, stating, “Project transferees may return credits to the Development Office that they do not anticipate using in the fiscal year in which they were awarded. Project transferees that have issued less than seventy percent of their authorized credits prior to March 15 of that state fiscal year in which they were awarded may be directed by the Director of the Development Office to return any unused credits previously authorized by the Board.”
- At the March meeting, the Board approved the recapture of \$50,400 from various projects that had issued less than 70 percent of their awarded credit by March 15, 2023, which included the return of \$29,650 from one project, in which extenuating circumstances were involved. After reviewing the eligible NIP participant organizations, using pre-set formulas, the Board was able to approve supplemental credit awards to sixteen organizations for the entire amount that was available for redistribution (\$60,150). In FY 2023, we had \$9,750 in reserve, which was added into the reallocation amount. The charts on the following two pages provide statistical data for the reallocation process for the past 17 years on Table 1 & 2.

## V. NIP Program Statistics

- 134 non-profit organizations were still in existence for the duration of FY (2018-2023)
- During the assessment 200 organizations used NIP tax credits during FY 2018; 200 in the year 2019; 200 in the year 2020; 199 in the year 2021; 191 in the year 2022; 200 in the year 2023
- In 2023 (193) surveyed organizations used 100% of their NIP tax credits which is (96.5%) (7) organizations did not use all allotted credits, (3.5%)
- In 2022, (2) organizations were unable to use all awarded tax credits (1.05%)
- In 2021, (7) organizations were unable to use all awarded tax credits (3.52%)
- In 2020, (5) organizations were unable to use all awarded tax credits (2.5%)
- In 2019 (15) organizations were unable to use all awarded tax credits (7.5%)
- In 2018 (9) organizations were unable to use all awarded tax credits (4.5%)

### Supplemental Credit

More projects are becoming eligible for supplemental credit awards each year while the amount available for reallocation continues to decline significantly. This is due to an increased awareness of the tax credits by the public and more efficient use of the credits by the participating organizations.

Organizations, in order to be eligible for supplemental credits, are required to use 100% of their tax credits by March 15<sup>th</sup> each fiscal year, any organization may receive an award amount of tax credits, that was less than what they requested on their application, is eligible for additional tax credits according to the organization's rank and the availability of recaptured credits.

**QUESTION: 1**

**The Neighborhood Investment Program is well known to most organizations in the nonprofit industry.**

<b>Organization</b>	<b>Response from survey</b>
<b>1. Active Southern West Virginia</b>	We learned about this program through a financial advisor rather than another non-profit. However, it seems many WV non-profits are applying.
<b>2. Appalachian Children's Chorus</b>	Having been associated with several non-profit groups, as well as in my current position with the Appalachian Children's Chorus, NIP was either utilized or the groups had applied for NIP credits. In addition, several professional friends, who work with know.
<b>3. Appalachian Outreach, Inc.</b>	I know of several other providers that have accessed NIPS either in the past or currently do.
<b>4. ArtsLink Inc</b>	Going by how many organizations apply for credits, NIP must be fairly well known.
<b>5. Beckley Area Foundation</b>	Yes, it is apparent by the increase in the number of applications submitted each year to the WVDO. It has and continues to be a very competitive process. The number of tax credits allocated to individual organizations decrease each year.
<b>6. Berkeley Senior Services</b>	Most organizations in our area are familiar with the NIPs program.
<b>7. Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state</b>	All organizations I speak with know about the program
<b>8. Brian's Safehouse, Inc.</b>	The organizations we are associated with know about it.
<b>9. Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.</b>	I work with various nonprofit organizations; I feel as though there is a vast knowledge of this Program.
<b>10. Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.</b>	I don't know of any nonprofit leaders (of organizations of size and substance) that don't know about the program.
<b>11. Carnegie Hall, Inc</b>	Common knowledge.
<b>12. CASA of the Eastern Panhandle, Inc.</b>	Non-profits rely on funds from the Neighborhood Investment Program to encourage donors to donate more as well as attract new donors to our organization. Funds acquired through NIP donations help to better serve the needs in our community.
<b>13. Catholic Charities West Virginia</b>	I have not spoken with other non-profits about NIP and their knowledge of the program.
<b>14. Charleston Ballet, Inc.</b>	Most of the organizations that I know of are aware of this program.
<b>15. Children's Home Society</b>	I believe that most if not all non-profits do know about NIP, it has been in place for a very long time, and each year there are new applicants.
<b>16. Christ's Kitchen and Food Pantry, Inc.</b>	I've heard volunteers from several other non-profit organizations mention that they provide NIP tax credits.

<b>17. Clay Center for the Arts &amp; Sciences of WV</b>	The history of NIP, coupled with the benefits afforded to both nonprofit organizations and donors, make it a well-known program in the industry.
<b>18. Community Combined Ministries Inc</b>	I would agree that it is well known in our area of Berkeley and Jefferson County.
<b>19. Concord University Foundation</b>	I feel like NIP is a fairly well-known program among the WV non-profits.
<b>20. Connecting Link Inc.</b>	The Neighborhood Investment Program is very well known in the nonprofit industry.
<b>21. Cross Roads Pregnancy Care Center</b>	I have only been with Cross Roads since June, so I do not know how well known it is yet. All the nonprofit organizations in our area are aware and apply.

<b>32. Friends of WV Public Broadcasting</b>	The more mature non-profits surely do, that's why demand is so high. But I cannot say what new non-profits know about.
<b>33. Golden Girl Group Home</b>	Most of my friends in the industry know about it.
<b>34. Goodwill Industries of KYOWVA Area, Inc.</b>	The non-profits funded locally represent many of the organizations in our area and represent a cross section of the different needs to be served in the Huntington area.

<b>36. Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle</b>	I had heard of tax credits but was not familiar with NIP tax credits until just a few years ago. I am sure there are others in the same situation.

<b>9. Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.</b>	I will have donors contacting me, before we have even received award notification, requesting information in regard to the NIP.
<b>10. Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.</b>	Most people who are looking for tax credits know about it.
<b>11. Carnegie Hall, Inc</b>	Stable membership base who we've communicated to about this program.
<b>12. CASA of the Eastern Panhandle, Inc.</b>	At CASA, we have a good amount of donors who are aware of the NIP benefit, but we do have some donors that have never heard of it until we share the information.
<b>13. Catholic Charities West Virginia</b>	NIP well known to some, but not most of individual donors in the area.
<b>14. Charleston Ballet, Inc.</b>	We have many repeat donors each year and sometimes calls from individuals looking for organizations with available NIP credits.
<b>15. Children's Home Society</b>	Yes, I would agree that donors are well educated about NIP, which is why we have repeat donors and new donors. I love talking to new donors about NIP and they get excited about getting something in return for helping us do our work.
<b>16. Christ's Kitchen and Food Pantry, Inc.</b>	We continue to find new donors who are unaware of the NIP program.
<b>17. Clay Center for the Arts &amp; Sciences of WV</b>	The program is well known to most donors. However, it's uncertain if new donors and/or individuals who have recently moved to the area are familiar with NIP.
<b>18. Community Combined Ministries Inc</b>	I believe that our non-profits and the NIP organization get the information about the NIP out to the public, but it does take speaking to individuals for

	them to understand clearly how the program works. That is not a negative towards NIP but simply stating.
<b>19. Concord University Foundation</b>	I feel like the population of individuals in our area who know what NIP is about is fairly small so I wouldn't say "well known" applies here.
<b>20. Connecting Link Inc.</b>	Individual donors look forward to donating through the Neighborhood Investment Program.
<b>21. Cross Roads Pregnancy Care Center</b>	It appears to be very well known by our donors.
<b>22. Davis Stuart, Inc.</b>	There are savvy donors that make use of the NIP program every year, but I have also personally educated some donors about NIP who had not previously been aware.
<b>23. Daymark, Incorporated</b>	Most of OUR donors know about them because we have been involved in the program for so long, but many donors are unaware.
<b>24. East End Resource Center</b>	If you regularly donate to local nonprofits, you may be aware of the availability of NIP credits. However, most donors are usually not aware of the program until we tell them about it.
<b>25. Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center</b>	Most donors we notify about the program are learning of it for the first time.
<b>26. Ebenezer Medical Outreach, Inc.</b>	Yes, most of our individual donors know.
<b>27. Faith Health Appalachia</b>	Most people who are looking for tax credits know about it.
<b>28. Faith in Action Caregivers, Inc.</b>	Several agencies in our area publicize their award and that tax credits are available. We receive calls from out of our area asking for tax credits.
<b>29. Faith in Action of the Greater Kanawha Valley, Inc.</b>	Those who know about it are devoted to it; every year, we introduce it to several folks who have never heard of it before.
<b>30. Faith in Action of the River Cities</b>	Based on my personal connection with individual donors in our area, very few have ever heard of the Neighborhood Investment Program.
<b>31. Foundation for the Tri-State Community</b>	Since NIP has a minimum donation of \$500, many individual donors may not be aware of the program
<b>32. Friends of WV Public Broadcasting</b>	Yes, particularly the high-end donors. And with the tax credits in such demand, they make sure their tax credits are reserved for the next year.
<b>33. Golden Girl Group Home</b>	I got the word out. Most of my donors know about it.
<b>34. Goodwill Industries of KYOWVA Area, Inc.</b>	Many donors are aware of the program and seek out our organization to make donations.
<b>35. Greater Wheeling Coalition for the Homeless, Inc.</b>	

<b>36. Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle</b>	I know I do a lot of explaining as to what they are and how they benefit donors.
<b>37. Harmony House, Inc</b>	I would say that it is not widely known. Harmony House does network to get the word out. Majority of our NIP users are from previous years - they know the program.
<b>38. Harrison County Child Abuse Task Force, Inc.</b>	Most people in my area are aware.
<b>39. Heart + Hand Outreach Ministries</b>	It is becoming more known, but I still find lots of individuals who have never heard of it before.
<b>40. High Rocks Educational Corporation</b>	Our donor base is well aware of this program, but I am not certain that it is that well known.
<b>41. Hospice of Huntington, Inc.</b>	My donors are familiar with the Neighborhood Investment Program and contact me to find availability of our credits.
<b>42. Hospice of Southern WV</b>	I am not that familiar with donors and their knowledge of NIP.
<b>43. House of the Carpenter</b>	Individuals who know and participate are well aware of the program. It is more of a challenge helping donors who have not participated join the program. We share the information, but some people remain hesitant.
<b>44. Humane Society of Parkersburg WV</b>	Even after participating with this program, we find new donors who are not familiar with the program and how it works.
<b>45. JCCF, Inc.</b>	Smaller donors are not generally aware of the program because they are not donating enough to qualify.
<b>46. John W. Hereford Boys and Girls Clubs of Huntington</b>	All of our donors who qualify know about it, and we have had potential donors call and ask if we had and if they could receive NIP credits.
<b>47. King's Daughters Child Care Center</b>	N/A
<b>48. Laotong Yoga, Inc.</b>	A few people I have talked with about possibly donating and getting the NIP state tax credits were not aware of the program.
<b>49. Laurance Jones, III Childhood Language Center</b>	I educate many of my donors about the NIP program.
<b>50. Legal Aid of West Virginia, Inc.</b>	Our fundraiser believes there could be more knowledge about the program among donors, especially potential donors. Organizations are the only ones cultivating this knowledge now, and that presents its own challenges.
<b>51. Lily's Place</b>	We have many large donors in West Virginia who call around the time of NIP awards and ask if we have some left - some deciding if they will donate to us based on that.
<b>52. Marvel Center, Inc</b>	We were contacted by at least one individual donor prior to advertising that we had received the credits.
<b>53. Mason County Community Foundation, Inc.</b>	Need for more media publicity in our specific area.

<b>54. Milan Puskar Health Right</b>	We have a group of regular donors who are well aware of the program, and we have never not used all of our credits.
<b>55. Mountain Mission Inc.</b>	Most people are familiar with the NIP Program; however, we do occasionally meet people who either never heard of the program or do not understand it well enough to request credits. We do take the time to briefly explain how it works
<b>56. Mylan Park Foundation</b>	yes
<b>57. New River Community &amp; Technical College Foundation, Inc.</b>	We have a fairly solid group of regular donors that take advantage of the program, but we bring in very few new donors. We do our best to promote through press advisories when we receive our award and acknowledge donors publicly but very few new donors.
<b>58. Nicholas County Community Foundation</b>	Our donors love the NIP program and have come accustomed to waiting for NIP announcements before making donations for the year.

<b>74. Special Olympics West Virginia</b>	Individual donors are gradually becoming more aware of NIP. Nonprofit organizations have done a commendable job of educating individuals about the program.

<b>76. TEAM for West Virginia Children, Inc.</b>	Don't really have a way to gauge this. NIP credits are limited to the more generous donors.

<b>78. The Children's Home of Wheeling, Inc.</b>	I really don't know if donors are aware. We have our set group of donors every year.

2. Appalachian Children's Chorus	I'm uncertain how widespread the knowledge of NIPS is among business donors since our organization typically has the same donors each year interested in the benefits of donating through NIPS.
3. Appalachian Outreach, Inc.	We also let our board know to tell the business that they partner with or work with about our NIPS availability.
4. ArtsLink Inc	I must explain it every time I talk to donors.
5. Beckley Area Foundation	We have a few businesses that utilize NIP tax credits. I'm not sure why but I suspect they are not familiar with the opportunity or if the current economy is limiting their budgets.
6. Berkeley Senior Services	Many businesses other than non-profits are not familiar with the program.
7. Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state	Most donors I speak with know about the program, but not all.
8. Brian's Safehouse, Inc.	It's probably 50% of the business owners we contact do know about it if they have a tax problem.
9. Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.	I work more with individual donors in my role, versus business donors.
10. Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.	Hit or miss on this one. Most business leaders don't really know about it.

<b>7. Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state</b>	Yes, the NIP program has helped us increase charitable giving. More predictability in our allocated NIP credits would help us be more strategic with our donors.
<b>8. Brian's Safehouse, Inc.</b>	Absolutely. It's been a great blessing to our organization, and the community benefits from it.
<b>9. Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.</b>	With the exception of this year, our tax credits have always increased, thus increasing our donations.
<b>10. Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.</b>	Absolutely agree that we've increased giving.
<b>11. Carnegie Hall, Inc</b>	Yes, based on donor actions. They will increase to meet the threshold, and I have seen donors' double commitment to take advantage for the tax credits.
<b>12. CASA of the Eastern Panhandle, Inc.</b>	This adds a boost to our end-of-year giving and frequently "sell out" of our credits by then.
<b>13. Catholic Charities West Virginia</b>	I believe that the incentive to receive tax credits increases charitable giving from our donors.
<b>14. Charleston Ballet, Inc.</b>	This is definitely a positive in increasing our donations.
<b>15. Children's Home Society</b>	Yes, we have increased our contributions over the years due to NIP. We have also engaged our NIP donors to help us in other ways; volunteering, collecting in-kind contributions for us like food, clothing, school supplies, volunteering at fundraising events, ect.
<b>16. Christ's Kitchen and Food Pantry, Inc.</b>	We have a strong core of donors that are contacting us every September to get the NIP tax credit.
<b>17. Clay Center for the Arts &amp; Sciences of WV</b>	The Clay Center successfully uses NIP tax credits to secure increased donations, as well as renewed gifts, which, in today's giving climate, is extremely helpful in retaining donors.

<b>18. Community Combined Ministries Inc</b>	There is no doubt that the NIP has increased charitable giving to our nonprofit. It is a huge blessing
<b>19. Concord University Foundation</b>	NIP tax credits do help us get donations each year from certain donors.
<b>20. Connecting Link Inc.</b>	Yes
<b>21. Cross Roads Pregnancy Care Center</b>	I believe that NIP has contributed to increased giving, both in terms of dollars and number of donors.
<b>22. Davis Stuart, Inc.</b>	While there have been other mitigating economic factors over the past few years, NIP is a quality addition to our charitable giving program. Without NIP, I do believe we would see a potential decrease in our private giving.

<b>28. Faith in Action Caregivers, Inc.</b>	Combining tax credits with end of year campaign increases our end of year giving.
<b>29. Faith in Action of the Greater Kanawha Valley, Inc.</b>	We've added several new donors who contribute more than just at NIP time, and who have become consistent supporters of our program.
<b>30. Faith in Action of the River Cities</b>	Our organization has been able to increase charitable giving using NIP tax credits.
<b>31. Foundation for the Tri-State Community</b>	Absolutely! Our donors have become used to using NIP credits and the number of interested donors continues to increase.
<b>32. Friends of WV Public Broadcasting</b>	Absolutely but again, we don't get enough to really make a significant difference.
<b>33. Golden Girl Group Home</b>	Charitable giving increases with the credits.
<b>34. Goodwill Industries of KYOWVA Area, Inc.</b>	We are known accepting used items as a Goodwill, but this program has helped us solicit direct donations for other needed missions.

<b>36. Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle</b>	We are only in our second year of using NIP tax credits, but it has brought in several new donors.
<b>37. Harmony House, Inc</b>	Credit amount has been flat
<b>38. Harrison County Child Abuse Task Force, Inc.</b>	Yes, I believe we have some donors that give solely because we can offer the tax credits.
<b>39. Heart + Hand Outreach Ministries</b>	Without a doubt, NIP tax credits have been instrumental to increasing our contributions.
<b>40. High Rocks Educational Corporation</b>	We have seen a decrease in donations since COVID. This year we will depend on this program to continue to solicit donations.
<b>41. Hospice of Huntington, Inc.</b>	The NIP tax credits are generating donations to our organization.
<b>42. Hospice of Southern WV</b>	We have been able to receive donations for all allocated credits.
<b>43. House of the Carpenter</b>	As mentioned earlier, some of our donors only give during the NIP program. This has helped increase our donations during this time.
<b>44. Humane Society of Parkersburg WV</b>	While this program has not specifically increased our overall donations, it has led to increase in donations in the program the funds are solicited for with this program.
<b>45. JCCF, Inc.</b>	Charitable giving increases proportionately to the number of credits we are able to provide.
<b>46. John W. Hereford Boys and Girls Clubs of Huntington</b>	We see probably \$50,000-\$75,000 more a year due to NIP credits.
<b>47. King's Daughters Child Care Center</b>	We have regular donors to NIP each year. We also get one or two new donors each year. People would still donate with the credits as well - if I ran out.
<b>48. Laotong Yoga, Inc.</b>	Yes, in the first few years we existed NIP was vital to increase donations and fund our work.
<b>49. Laurance Jones, III Childhood Language Center</b>	The NIP tax credits have helped the CLC get through some tough times.
<b>50. Legal Aid of West Virginia, Inc.</b>	We have been able to almost double what would typically be low-dollar unsolicited or end-of-year gifts in some demographic groups of donors.
<b>51. Lily's Place</b>	In the past, yes. Some have based their giving on the amount of NIP credits they can receive.
<b>52. Marvel Center, Inc</b>	We have not fully begun advertising but feel it will increase giving.
<b>53. Mason County Community Foundation, Inc.</b>	New funds have been established because of the offering of NIP credits.
<b>54. Milan Puskar Health Right</b>	The amount of tax credits available based on the number of applicants has increased and every agency's amount has decreased. We have recently had

	two years of very minimal tax credits. We will be meeting with the NIP administrators to try and figure out what can be done.
<b>55. Mountain Mission Inc.</b>	The last two years the number of new donors requesting to purchase tax credits from our organization grew along with the dollar amount given from our existing donors.
<b>56. Mylan Park Foundation</b>	Yes, it brought new money into the organization

<b>58. Nicholas County Community Foundation</b>	I believe the use of the NIP credits has helped us to increase donor funds.

<b>95. Woman's Choice Inc.</b>	Yes, we have been able to use all our credits every year and I don't request more credits until I am secure with being able to use them.

**We have experienced the loss of a donor or donors due to not having enough credits to issue.**

<b>Organization</b>	<b>Response from survey</b>
<b>1. Active Southern West Virginia</b>	This being the 2nd year, we have not yet run in to this.
<b>2. Appalachian Children's Chorus</b>	We have definitely missed opportunities to gain new donors due to the limits of our current allotment.
<b>3. Appalachian Outreach, Inc.</b>	I don't feel that we have lost anyone. I believe that the amount that we receive is fair for our operation. Any more could be used, but any less would make it more difficult. I feel the right amount was given to us.
<b>4. ArtsLink Inc</b>	Not yet.
<b>5. Beckley Area Foundation</b>	When we run out of tax credits, we refer them to other NIP recipient organizations in our community.
<b>6. Berkeley Senior Services</b>	Our donors give faithfully regardless of the number of credits available.
<b>7. Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state</b>	I have requests for credits each year I am not able to fulfill.
<b>8. Brian's Safehouse, Inc.</b>	We have lost donations because we did not have credits, yes.
<b>9. Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.</b>	This year we were not able to offer as many credits, this dramatically affected our donations.
<b>10. Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.</b>	Yes - we turn people away every year because we do not get a lot of NIP credits.
<b>11. Carnegie Hall, Inc</b>	Not that I am aware of. However, their donation size may drop.
<b>12. CASA of the Eastern Panhandle, Inc.</b>	This past NIP year, we had several donors that requested NIP credits we were unable to fulfill, and they did not donate to our organization because of that.
<b>13. Catholic Charities West Virginia</b>	To my knowledge we have not lost a donor due to lack of credits, but donors have taken a donation they were going to send to us to another non-profit in order to get credit.
<b>14. Charleston Ballet, Inc.</b>	We lose some donors at the end when we do not have any additional credits left.
<b>15. Children's Home Society</b>	Yes, as mentioned in previous question we have had donors call after we have issued all of our tax credits.
<b>16. Christ's Kitchen and Food Pantry, Inc.</b>	A high majority of our donors continued to give during the year that our organization failed to complete the NIP application. Even in the two years following, when we had a limited amount of tax credits, our donations were strong.
<b>17. Clay Center for the Arts &amp; Sciences of WV</b>	Thankfully, the majority of our donor base understands that the tax credits awarded fluctuate each year and their gift is not dependent on the Clay Center's ability to issue credits. However, we have lost a donor due to not having enough credits.

<b>18. Community Combined Ministries Inc</b>	We have experienced this twice. We were fortunate and all our credits were given out quicker than normal and our donor sought another nonprofit. However, on the other side we have been on the receiving end where we gained a donor because another non profit joined.
<b>19. Concord University Foundation</b>	While this doesn't happen every year, it has happened to us previously.
<b>20. Connecting Link Inc.</b>	Yes-we have had to redirect donors to other agencies due to not having enough NIP credits
<b>21. Cross Roads Pregnancy Care Center</b>	I understand that this happened at the end of last year when we ran out of credits.
<b>22. Davis Stuart, Inc.</b>	This has not yet been our experience.
<b>23. Daymark, Incorporated</b>	We have always had enough.
<b>24. East End Resource Center</b>	We have not yet had to turn a donor away due to exhausting our available credits.
<b>25. Easter Seal Rehabilitation Center</b>	No, we typically have just enough credits.
<b>26. Ebenezer Medical Outreach, Inc.</b>	Not to our knowledge.
<b>27. Faith Health Appalachia</b>	Yes - we turn people away every year because we do not get a lot of NIP credits.
<b>28. Faith in Action Caregivers, Inc.</b>	Our donor base is committed to Faith in Action and our mission.
<b>29. Faith in Action of the Greater Kanawha Valley, Inc.</b>	Not the loss of existing donors, but loss of prospective new donors who were ready to write a check if we'd had more credits available.
<b>30. Faith in Action of the River Cities</b>	I am not aware of the loss of any donors due to not having enough credits to issue.
<b>31. Foundation for the Tri-State Community</b>	When we have used our credits, donors often go elsewhere to receive them.
<b>32. Friends of WV Public Broadcasting</b>	Our donors don't depend on the NIP to donate because they believe in our mission. However, it may increase their giving.
<b>33. Golden Girl Group Home</b>	I have had people not donate at all because I ran out.
<b>34. Goodwill Industries of KYOWVA Area, Inc.</b>	We have had donors who went to other non-profits after our credit allotment was
<b>35. Greater Wheeling Coalition for the Homeless, Inc.</b>	

<b>36. Habitat for Humanity of the Eastern Panhandle</b>	Not in the two years of working with NIP tax credits
<b>37. Harmony House, Inc</b>	See the response we gave for question 13.
<b>38. Harrison County Child Abuse Task Force, Inc.</b>	Unsure.
<b>39. Heart + Hand Outreach Ministries</b>	Yes. Usually, all of ours are issued within just a couple of days. I receive calls for months after that with individuals wanting NIP credits.
<b>40. High Rocks Educational Corporation</b>	We have had to turn away potential donors who specifically wanted NIP credits.
<b>41. Hospice of Huntington, Inc.</b>	I would love to have the credits requested, but I understand the number of non-profits applying vs. the available credits. I may miss an opportunity to be a donor, but I don't lose a donor. The donor gives because he has a heart for Hospice.
<b>42. Hospice of Southern WV</b>	There is no direct link between reduced donors and credits available.
<b>43. House of the Carpenter</b>	Our NIP credits have risen over the past few years. Consequently, we have not lost any donors. We have, however, picked up more donors because the funds are available.
<b>44. Humane Society of Parkersburg WV</b>	We have not experienced this.
<b>45. JCCF, Inc.</b>	We have not lost a donor, but we have lost a significant amount of what they were willing to donate due to not having more credits available.
<b>46. John W. Hereford Boys and Girls Clubs of Huntington</b>	I don't think we've lost any donors, but our donors have given less because they weren't able to get as much as they had in years prior.
<b>47. King's Daughters Child Care Center</b>	N/A
<b>48. Laotong Yoga, Inc.</b>	Last year our founders retired, and we did not participate in the NIP program, so we did have a few donors that did not contribute as much due to this.
<b>49. Laurance Jones, III Childhood Language Center</b>	We have had several donors not return during the years we aren't issued enough credits.
<b>50. Legal Aid of West Virginia, Inc.</b>	Last year, for the first time, we had to turn away multiple donors because we were able to distribute our credits so quickly. Though we got some reallocated in the spring, we were not able to recapture all the lost donors from the fall. More credits would allow more donors.
<b>51. Lily's Place</b>	This happened just a couple of weeks ago.
<b>52. Marvel Center, Inc</b>	This is our first year.
<b>53. Mason County Community Foundation, Inc.</b>	To date we have been able credits to all our donors that have wanted them.

<b>54. Milan Puskar Health Right</b>	Yes, I have had people tell me. "Sorry, we are going to find another agency that has credits left rather than give our yearly donation to Health Right."
<b>55. Mountain Mission Inc.</b>	Yes, we have.
<b>56. Mylan Park Foundation</b>	Have not had this occur
<b>57. New River Community &amp; Technical College Foundation, Inc.</b>	Yes.
<b>58. Nicholas County Community Foundation</b>	I do feel that we would not have the donation participation that we currently have without the NIP program
<b>59. Oglebay Institute</b>	Yes. We have had donors reduce their gift or not give at all as a result of the lack of credits.
<b>60. Parkersburg Area Community Foundation</b>	We have occasionally had donor who were upset and did not make a donation if tax credit was not available.
<b>61. Parkersburg Art Center</b>	We are always careful to make sure our regular donors learn that we have available credits. It may be that we have received smaller donations from some donors, but I do not believe we have ever actually lost one.
<b>62. PROACT, Inc.</b>	I have encountered no issues where this is concerned.
<b>63. Randolph County Children's Advocacy Cener</b>	Our donors see this as a benefit to their giving, 100%, however if we run out of credits, they still make the donation.

<b>68. Ronald McDonald House Charities of Southern West Virginia</b>	Yes, we have had donors want to make a donation but go elsewhere because we did not have credits to give.
<b>69. Scott's Run Settlement House</b>	Yes.
<b>70. Seeing Hand Association</b>	Yearly
<b>71. Shenandoah Community Health Foundation</b>	Because some donors delay in deciding to make a donation, we lost a donor previously when we had issued all credits by the time they knew their tax status for the year.

<b>80. The Education Alliance</b>	There have been times we could have used more.
<b>81. The Religious Coalition for Community Renewal</b>	Yes, this is why we encourage early donations, first come first serve.
<b>82. The Salvation Army of Parkersburg</b>	While it has not happened often it has occurred.
<b>83. United Way of Central West Virginia, Inc.</b>	Thankfully, we have not found ourselves in this position yet. Although it could happen.
<b>84. United Way of Monongalia and Preston Counties, Inc.</b>	This is our first receipt of the credits, so donations have not gone down.
<b>85. United Way of the River Cities</b>	We have not had that experience
<b>86. Upshur Cooperative Parish House, Inc.</b>	We have not lost donors because we have been awarded additional tax credits.

2. <b>Appalachian Children's Chorus</b>	Given the attractiveness of the tax credit incentive to our participating donors, we would no doubt lose donations if the NIPS program was not available. This loss would negatively impact our ability to offer our program to West Virginia youth.
3. <b>Appalachian Outreach, Inc.</b>	It would absolutely decline, and we would be without those donors.
4. <b>ArtsLink Inc</b>	Yes.
5. <b>Beckley Area Foundation</b>	I think the contribution amount would decrease.
6. <b>Berkeley Senior Services</b>	I cannot answer this one way or the other as we have not experienced this issue.
7. <b>Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Tri-state</b>	Our agency has some donors who only give through this incentive.
8. <b>Brian's Safehouse, Inc.</b>	Yes, the donations would be affected in a negative way.
9. <b>Burlington UM Family Services, Inc.</b>	Tax credits provide incentives to donors.
10. <b>Cabell Huntington Hospital Foundation, Inc.</b>	I don't think our donor base would decline because we have a lot of different ways to engage donors. I do think that we could recruit more donors if we had more credits.
11. <b>Carnegie Hall, Inc</b>	Donations would decline. I don't think donor base would decline, though.

#### **Project Description**

The counties AOI serves have large populations of ALICE residents – Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed workers who educate our children, keep us healthy and keep our community running smoothly and yet who do not earn enough to make ends meet. United for ALICE is a research movement initiated by the United Way of New Jersey and adopted nationwide, statistics gathered by which is now being used by organizations like AOI to assess and address community need. AOI has also gauged the need using data by local community assessments by the United Way of the Upper Ohio Valley and Ohio County Family Resource Network, the Marshall County Network and the Wetzel County Center for Children and Families. The ALICE Essentials Index has increased almost twice as fast as the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The two differ as the ALICE Essentials Index includes only essential household basics (housing, childcare, food, transportation, health care, and a smartphone plan), while CPI includes all consumer goods - including manufactured goods, from apparel to luxury vehicles. ALICE is reflective of the reality of the way of life of the people who form the backbone of the American workforce. These are the working poor.

According to the 2020 United for ALICE report, 28% of American households live in the ALICE profile. In the counties that AOI serves, the following are the rates for ALICE households: Ohio County – 43%, Marshall County – 44%, Wetzel County – 48%. To summarize, those percentages of our neighbors are struggling to make ends meet; they can't afford the basic to take care of their families. These – and those whose resources are even lower - are the residents AOI serves.

1. **What is your most successful program and why?**

Our most successful program would be our warehouse with furniture and hygiene items to give to those less fortunate to help 'Ease the Burden of Poverty' throughout the region.

2. **Where does most of your funding come from?**

Most of our funding comes from grants.

3. **What are your most urgent needs?**

Appliances and hygiene items for families.

4. **How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We request the number of people that are in the client's family, then give sufficiently for the amount of people.

5. **What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

It has allowed small business owners and individuals to help our organization a little bit more, while receiving a nice tax credit for their assistance. When most of the time the donation would have only been \$100, they are more apt to give \$500 for a tax credit. So, it makes our donations that we receive much higher than it would have been beforehand.

6. **What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

3,361 individuals have been helped by Appalachian Outreach this year so far.

7. **What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

I think that it is fast and efficient. I don't have any problem with it, and to be honest, I don't believe there are any issues or improvements to be made.

8. **Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

No Challenges

9. **Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

Perhaps at the top of the page we could put a tally of how much money has been donated to the organization, the amount of credit issued, and the amount of credit remaining. We keep a very good record of it, so it's not necessary for us, but it would still be very helpful.

10. **If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

We would not receive as much funding as we have been getting. Instead of small businesses or individuals donating \$500 they could possibly go back to donating \$100 because there would be nothing in it for them. We really love the program and are so grateful for the opportunity to be a part of it.

### **Project Description**

The Eastern West Virginia Community Foundation (EWVCF) uses West Virginia Neighborhood Investment Program Tax Credits to help many of the more than 31,900 households in Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, and Morgan counties who living at or below 125% of the Federal Poverty Level. With NIP-inspired contributions, we support dozens of programs that provide direct services to people with the greatest needs, and we build permanent endowments to provide a source of funding that will last forever. We do this with a three-pronged approach:

1. Emergency Assistance – Since COVID began in early 2020, EWVCF has experienced an unprecedented demand to provide resources to a wide variety of food programs, fund emergency shelters for the homeless, and support organizations serving victims of domestic abuse. With rising inflation, we anticipate even greater needs in the months ahead.
2. Community Service – Organizations that provide daycare, foster care, youth recreation, healthcare, transportation, sheltered workshops, and food pantries for low-income families will also be supported with NIP donations to EWVCF.
3. Job Training & Education – By awarding grants to schools for job training programs, mini-grants to teachers in Title 1 schools, and scholarships to students from low-income families, we address these needs in all five counties we serve.

EWVCF works with nonprofit organizations, donors, businesses, and private foundations to forge innovative, creative, and unique partnerships that fill an under-served population in the eastern region of West Virginia. We are good stewards, operating with a small budget and four full-time employees who serve hundreds of donors, dozens of other nonprofit organizations, scores of scholarship recipients, and the general public throughout five counties. Grant requests from nonprofit organizations are normally twice the amount of what we are able to award.

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

Our most successful program that benefits from NIP tax credits is funding for the Community Impact Funds for each of the five counties we serve (Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, and Morgan). NIP donations are added to the Community Impact Funds to address the most critical needs in our region.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

Most of our funding comes from individual donors who establish endowed Funds at the Community Foundation. As for the Neighborhood Investment Program, virtually all of the donors that make contributions for NIP tax credits are West Virginia residents who use the tax credits to offset WV Personal Income Tax.

**3. What are your most urgent needs?**

As a nonprofit Community Foundation, we support other nonprofit organizations that are providing direct services in our region. I'd say our most urgent needs include finding adequate resources to address homelessness and the cost of housing. Many who are at risk in our neighborhoods suffer from mental and physical health issues and find themselves homeless and without direction.

**4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We receive grant reports from the nonprofit organizations we serve. The reports contain hard numbers that provide a better understanding of the effectiveness of our grant funding.

**5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

Honestly, the Eastern Panhandle receives so few NIP tax credits that the impact isn't nearly as great as we would hope. Many of the nonprofit organizations we serve are still just barely getting by with our support. More resources are needed. Additional funding, counseling, healthcare, and housing are necessary to address the greater needs we've been experiencing the past couple of years.

**6. What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

This is a challenging question since community foundations don't provide direct services like other charities. We build endowments (so the benefits are everlasting) and we pass through funds to front line nonprofit organizations.

**7. What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

Chris has done an excellent job of streamlining the application process.

**8. Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

There simply aren't enough NIP tax credits to go around. The Eastern West Virginia Community Foundation (and I'm guessing the other Community Foundations in West Virginia) could easily place twice as many NIP tax credits each year if more were available.

**9. Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

Increase the amount of NIP tax credits by \$1 million dollars annually and allocate all those \$1 million in credits to Community Foundations in West Virginia for building endowments and for granting funds to front line nonprofit organizations in our communities. That would allow other nonprofit organizations the opportunity to access the full \$3 million in annual tax credits.

**10. If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

We would survive, but it would be challenging to make up the loss and it would have a much greater negative impact on the front-line charities that rely more heavily on the NIP tax credits.

## **Nicholas County Community Foundation - Interview questions and responses**

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### **Project Description**

The Nicholas County Community Foundation project is more than the sum of its parts. The work of the Nicholas County Community Foundation falls into three basic areas: (1) we raise funds from individuals, families, businesses and groups for all types of local charitable needs; (2) we invest funds for long-term sustainability and prudent growth; and (3) we distribute funds as grants and scholarships according to donor's wishes and in light of local needs. Our project is one that ebbs and flows with the changes of the local needs over time. We visualize Nicholas County as a vibrant, compassionate community without walls, where all people collaborate to build a prosperous community. Whether it be food, hygiene and household needs, education, town improvements, job training and collaboration, safety, drug rehabilitation and more, the NCCF is there, providing support and hope. The foundation is a leader in the development of this vision by providing expertise and inspiration for community members to participate in local charitable giving as a way to connect their personal values with long-term community impact. Through the ever-changing landscape and the adversity that we face in the challenges of today and tomorrow, the Nicholas County Community Foundation will be a steadfast support, "Like A Bridge Over Troubled Water".

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

We are a small foundation and provide grants to non-profit organizations and scholarships to students. I feel that both programs are equally successful. The grants provide funding for projects that help our community, especially those who need assistance the most. Our scholarships assist students with their higher education. All funding provided by the foundation is done with our fundholder wishes in mind.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

Most funding comes from our fundholders, who donate to endow their funds for a permanent legacy.

#### **3. What are your most urgent needs?**

Our most urgent needs are constantly changing, however, food, non-food essentials, safety and drug rehabilitation are some of the mainstay topics that typically lead the list.

#### **4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We provide a set point of numbers affected by our assistance in previous years and assess the current year based on those numbers to make sure we are meeting the needs.

**5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

The NIP tax credits have a wonderful impact economically. First, donors receive a tax credit, relieving some of the tax burden. They can provide more to their businesses, employees, and have more purchasing power. The Foundation overall fund continues to grow. This growth, in effect, increases the amount that we are able to feed into the economy through grant and scholarship funding. It is a win-win for the entire community.

**6. What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

The population of our county is over 24k. Our programs, although they target those with the greatest need, also provide improvements and updates that serve our entire community of 24k.

**7. What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

I like the NIP application process. I do not feel that any improvements are necessary for the application process.

**8. Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

Now that I am well versed in the application process, I have not recently had any issues with the application process.

**9. Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

The only suggestion I have for improvement is in the reporting process. The way we provide NIP credits is through a tier system to make sure we are transparent and fair when giving the NIP credits out. Some of the donors give regardless of the amount of NIP credits and want to give the donation straight away, while others will wait to see the total amount of credits they can receive prior to the donation. Allowing the reporting to be done within a few months will allow a smoother process.

**10. If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

The NIP credit program is wildly popular in Nicholas County. No matter how many credits we have received, we are able to quickly disburse them. The impact on our organization would be detrimental. Many of our regular annual donations come in during and through the NIP credit process. I would be happy to talk at the WV legislature regarding the effects of the program on Nicholas County.

### **Project Description**

Based locally in Wood County, West Virginia, PACF's proposed NIP project benefits low-income citizens who are vulnerable and in need in eight counties in central West Virginia within our Mid-Ohio Valley community foundation service region. We seek to use NIP credit to raise funds to supply current grants to help to meet essential basic human needs and to reduce the effects of poverty through our Give Local MOV, Community Action and Advised Grants programs. These crucial PACF grant programs provide essential funds to help children, adults and families through direct need and emergency assistance programs and with grants to community-based organizations that provide shelter, clothing, medical, dental support or supplies for needy citizens, relieve food insecurity, mitigate the impact of substance use disorders, and meet fundamental personal safety or hardship needs. Our proposal will also build PACF's regional "Safety Net" and "Hunger" funds, which are the core charitable funds from which annual grants are made to fund programs and services that aid children in need and other low-income vulnerable populations, and, in the case of adults, which emphasize building self-sufficiency and independence from government aid.

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

As a community foundation we fund a variety of nonprofits addressing many different issues. Probably the most important are projects related to basic human services such as those that address hunger and food access.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

Nearly all of our funding comes from individual donors. Last fiscal year we received donations from 800 different donors.

#### **3. What are your most urgent needs?**

Projects related to addressing the foster care crisis are probably our most urgent issue. Organizations dealing with substance use disorder and food access are high priorities.

#### **4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

Grantees are required to provide final reports on the use of grant funds. The number of people served is the most common measure.

#### **5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

Most of the donations we receive for NIP tax credits are to our Hunger Fund, Safety Net Fund, or the grantmaking fund in our rural, low-income counties. Providing funds, rental assistance, utility assistance, and clothing provide an economic impact by enabling low-income individuals to better participate in society.

6. **What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

We provide grants to well over 100 different nonprofits who each serve a varying number of individuals. Funding from our organization benefits several thousand people.

7. **What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

I am the new Executive Director at PACF. The previous Executive Director prepared the NIP Credit application. I do not, yet, have experience with the application.

8. **Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

I don't believe we experienced any significant challenges in the application process.

9. **Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

I don't have any suggested improvements.

10. **If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

We would have significantly less funding to provide to organizations providing basic human needs. In particular, our Hunger Fund and our Safety Net Fund would be substantially impacted.

## **Scott's Run Settlement House - Interview questions and responses**

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### **Project Description**

Locally based in Wood County, West Virginia, PACF's proposed NIP project benefits low-income children at Scott's Run Settlement House's (SRSH) Backpack Feeding Program provides food for the weekend to children who rely on school meals as their primary source of nutrition and experience food insecurity. Each week SRSH delivers bags containing two breakfast items, two lunch items, two dinner items, two snacks, and one fruit item to the schools who then distribute them to the children enrolled in the program. Beginning in 2011 with 100 children participating at one school, the program has grown to serve over 500 children at 11 schools.

The benefits of this program are quite substantial. Surveys from both parents and teachers indicate a positive impact in the children's mental, emotional, and physical health in addition to improved academic performance. Specifically, 78% of parents reported an improvement in their child's overall mood and behavior while 72% of teachers reported improved attention in class. The additional nourishment the program provides allows children to develop properly and decreases the stress associated with childhood food insecurity.

The cost of this program is roughly \$100 per child, per school year. This reflects food costs alone and does not include transportation or staff expenses. For the 2022 - 2023 school year, SRSH's food cost will be approximately \$50,000. Additional funding will not only allow SRSH to continue to provide for hundreds of children in need, but it will also allow healthier foods to be purchased. With your support our program will continue to evolve and expand to ensure no child goes hungry.

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

Our food pantry and student weekend backpack program.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

Grants, NIP, some private gifts

#### **3. What are your most urgent needs?**

Doubled size of backpack program this school year due to community need, so food and funds for that program.

#### **4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

Surveys, numbers served, administrator feedback.

#### **5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

A lot, we could not directly serve the amount of people we do without them.

6. **What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**  
Over 14,000 for pantry and 950 students every week for backpack. Thousands of others with other programs we provide.
7. **What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**  
No issues.
8. **Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**  
No issues.
9. **Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**  
No suggestions.
10. **If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**  
Massive. Every dollar goes towards food purchases.

**Union Mission Ministries - Interview questions and responses**

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### **Project Description**

Union Mission has identified three major issues affecting the quality of life for fellow West Virginians: Food Insecurity, Homelessness and Addiction. Our Basic Needs program addresses these three issues directly to not only provide emergency assistance but provide training, education, and services that can help remove barriers and improve quality of life for people. Our program helps break the cycle of these three issues. For food insecurity, we offer daily opportunities for people to visit our Charleston location and receive food for their families from our warehouse. We also distribute large quantities of food throughout the year by partnering with over 15 churches and organizations across central WV. We send food to them weekly. During the holiday season, we provide large food distribution events where thousands of people can receive food baskets for the holidays. For this issue of homelessness, we provide food and shelter for men at our Men's Shelter in downtown Charleston. Our shelter also offers the men services to retire fines, meet parole requirements, and help them apply for government assistance, ids, and other social services. For addiction issues, we offer our year-long, in-patient addiction recovery program for men and women. This residential program helps men and women overcome the struggle of addiction while helping them with behavior health services, life skill training, employment training, physical fitness, and housing.

**1. What is your most successful program and why?**

Our most successful program based upon results, is our yearlong addiction recovery program. Our rate of men and women sober after 5 years is higher than average. Our program that generates the most revenue from donations is our Family Services/Food Distribution.

**2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

Almost all funding comes from private donations of our constituents.

**3. What are your most urgent needs?**

General fund dollars to fix aging infrastructure.

**4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We track data for all our programs: Addition Recovery we track number of years still sober. Family Services we have software where we enter client information with regular updates. Men's Shelter we track each man that acquires housing, receives transportation to get to another town where family and friends are, or enters into an addiction recovery program. Thrift stores track sales.

**5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

NIP has had a huge impact as it allows us to explore expanded service opportunities for potential clients. It also motivates our base to give more.

**6. What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

That total data has not been compiled yet but would be in the thousands of people served

**7. What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

I would like to see NIP award credit based upon the longevity of an organization (be part of the coring system). Union Mission has been serving our area for 112 years. It has proven processes that help improve our communities.

**8. Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

It appears that scoring is better when a new program or service is introduced. Our proven programs need funding as they continue each year to show results. Starting new programs may look attractive but they don't always continue or prove to be inadequate.

**9. Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

No suggestions.

**10. If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

This could have a devastating effect on our ability to serve families in our area. Removal of NIP credits could cost us close to \$100K each year.

## Westminster at Wade DBA The Wade Center - Interview questions and responses

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### **Project Description**

The Wade Center's After-School Program is licensed for 50 at-risk students in grades 1-5. We do not charge a fee for this program and rely on donations for funding. Bluefield Elementary and Intermediate schools bus students to the Wade Center, where they do homework; practice reading, writing, math and computer skills; play in the gym or playground; have weekly devotionals and classes in art and music; and eat healthy snacks and dinner. They also take-home bags of weekend food with students on Thursdays. Three tutors and volunteers work with the children in 3 classrooms, the auditorium, cafeteria, and grounds.

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

We consider both our after-school and summer programs to be successful. Enrollment at each is at the licensed maximums of 50 and 70.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

The Wade Center is funded solely by grants and contributions. We do not charge a fee for attendance.

#### **3. What are your most urgent needs?**

Located in a 100-year-old school building, overhead expenses of utilities and maintenance are large and constant.

#### **4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We receive copies of students' report cards and provide extra help in areas where we see deficiencies. In the last round, approximately 90% of our students made the honor rolls in their schools. Interim cards showed a decline, so we are arranging the curriculum accordingly. We are in the process of developing an alumni database so we can determine Wade students' progress after they leave our program.

#### **5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

The NIP funds are essential to our daily operations. The children eat well and do their homework so they can succeed in school. The benefits extend to their families, who have an affordable, safe and creative place to send their children. Low-income working parents comprise most of those we serve.

#### **6. What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

The numbers we can validate are 50 and 70. We believe our services extend to the benefit of families and our community.

**7. What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

The application process works well. Instead of sitting through an entire presentation for the N-th year, I would prefer an updated version with changes as an option to the full presentation.

**8. Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

None

**9. Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

The State needs to fund NIP as a level closer to application amounts.

**10. If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

We would have a very difficult winter. NIP gets us through the giving drought, and we would be hard-pressed to replace it.

## **Youth Health Service, Inc. - Interview questions and responses**

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### **Project Description**

Youth Health Service provides behavioral/mental health counseling to children and adolescents throughout central WV. As a part of providing services to children and adolescents we recognize that the ability for families to access services is key in them actually attending and receiving the help they need to improve their overall well-being and quality of life; furthermore, we recognize that it is simply unrealistic for many families to transport their children for weekly appointments, time lost from work can be extremely impactful to many of our families and for others not possible at all. YHS has provided transportation services to children and adolescents accessing services for more than 12 years. Through our Safe, Reliable Access to Care transportation services, those in need of mental/behavioral health services are able to access them without the caregiver's burden of missing work on a routine basis. Our drivers are trained in safety procedures for transporting young people, including seat belt, car seat and booster seat safety, and pediatric First Aid/CPR. Additionally, our drivers are familiar with early childhood development standards and appropriate management of trauma symptoms. Funds raised through our participation in the NIP will go directly towards making this service available, completely free of charge, to families accessing our services. Our ability to provide Safe, Reliable Access to Care ensures that children receive the care they need to improve their management of mental/behavioral health diagnosis while not creating more stress for the family.

#### **1. What is your most successful program and why?**

It is difficult to say that one of our programs is more successful than another...is success defined by revenue, by the number of people assisted, by the offering of a service? We operate three core programs: Behavioral Health @ YHS, Home Ties Child Development Center, Strengthening Families Support Center @ YHS. Behavioral Health reaches the most clients and is the most revenue producing; Home Ties reaches the youngest population we serve and provides a valuable service to the community; the FSC assists families with getting their basic needs of food, clothing and household supplies met in addition to providing valuable parenting services.

#### **2. Where does most of your funding come from?**

The majority of our funding is generated from our Behavioral Health program in the form of payment for those services; we are credentialed with every MCO in the state (Medicaid) and are credentialed with most private insurance companies.

#### **3. What are your most urgent needs?**

Staffing is probably our most urgent need; we nearly always have a shortage of professional staff to provide services.

#### **4. How do you measure and report on the effectiveness of your program?**

We maintain data on the number of clients and families served for each of our programs.

**5. What Economic impacts has the NIP tax credits had on local communities being served?**

I can only speak to the economic impacts NIP tax credits have had on our community, and specifically the program for which we earmark our NIP tax credits. Our credits are applied to our agency's transportation services; services that we do not charge for and are not reimbursed for in any other way. Prior to our receiving of NIP credits, we budgeted for this service out of our general budget; since receiving NIP credits for this service, we have been able to keep more money in the general budget which has benefited us by allowing for creating ease in purchasing of equipment and items we may not have otherwise been able to purchase for our programs.

**6. What was the total amount of individuals served by your organization in FY 2023?**

We do not have our final numbers in for the year; however, as it currently stands, I would say, with confidence, more than 1,500 unique individuals have been served by our programs this year.

**7. What are your thoughts on the NIP Credit application process? What improvements, if any, would you suggest for the program?**

I don't currently have any suggestions for improvement; the NIP application process is one of the easier funding requests I complete for our agency.

**8. Please provide any challenges your organization encountered when applying for NIP tax credits.**

I don't believe we have had any challenges in applying for NIP tax credits.

**9. Please provide any suggestions and/or ideas that could improve the NIP?**

I don't have any suggestions or ideas for improving the NIP at this time.

**10. If the NIP legislation was not renewed in 2024? What impact could it have on your organization?**

Transportation services paid for through NIP donations would continue (we simply believe in the need of transportation services for clients and families we serve that strongly) with funding for it earmarked in our general budget; therefore, reducing the amount of funds for other programming needs such as therapy and classroom supplies.

## **X. Conclusion**

As required by the enacting legislation, the West Virginia Economic Development contracted Smith Accounting Services to perform an independent assessment on the Neighborhood Investment Program. The period covered by this Assessment included the FY 2018-2023. During the period covered, there were 284 organizations approved by the WVDO for the Credit and the assessment included reviewing one hundred of the 284. The procedures used for the assessment included surveys, inquiries, review of applications, annual reports, and sources available online.

The assessment report provided includes the results of the procedures performed along with the responses obtained from the organizations reviewed.

As a conclusion of performing this assessment, Smith Accounting Services validates that the West Virginia Development Office is following the governing legislature codes set forth in the enabling legislation Chapter 11-13J; including the one hundred neighborhood participants reviewed by Smith Accounting Services during the 2018-2023 assessment.
