West Virginia Law Enforcement Training



# Annual Report

§30-29-3, sub-part (j) of the West Virginia Code stipulates:

...Upon recommendation of the subcommittee, the governor's committee shall...submit, on or before the thirtieth day of September of each year, to the governor, and upon request to individual members of the Legislature, a report on its activities during the previous year and an accounting of funds paid into and disbursed from the special revenue account establish[ed] pursuant to section four of this article.

In furtherance of this directive, the West Virginia Division of Justice and Community Services (DJCS) is submitting the following information concerning the **3,600** plus individuals who are working as sworn law enforcement officers within the State of West Virginia as certified by the Law Enforcement Professional Standards (LEPS) Subcommittee of the Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency and Correction (GCCDC).

During the 2015 Training Year reporting period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015 the LEPS Subcommittee met eleven (11) times as per its regular annual schedule for monthly meetings, with no meeting held during the month of November. One (1) additional meeting was held during April 2015 to conduct a legislative rules review retreat immediately prior to the regularly scheduled April meeting. Each meeting was conducted as prescribed by the West Virginia Secretary of State Office guidelines concerning public meetings.

Retired Chief Steve Stephens, the Public-at-Large member on the LEPS Subcommittee, served as the Chair for the LEPS Subcommittee during this training year period. The eleven positions, as set by statute, on the LEPS Subcommittee were fully filled during the course of the training year through the action of Department of Military Affairs (DMAPS) Secretary Joe Thornton.

#### Additionally:

- 25 Six (6) grant awards were recommended for approval to the Governor's Office and were subsequently awarded totaling **\$819,168** from the LEPS Fund. The following awards were recommended in support of the law enforcement training effort.
  - A. **\$116,443** for the operation of the 160<sup>th</sup> Basic Class.
  - B. **\$117,696** for the operation of the 161<sup>st</sup> Basis Class.
  - C. **\$119,172** for the operation of the 162<sup>nd</sup> Basic Class
  - D. **\$124,841** for the operation of the 163<sup>rd</sup> Basic Class
  - E. **\$115,466** for the bulk purchase of ammunition to use during entry level training classes (161<sup>st</sup> to 164<sup>th</sup>) to maximize availability of ammunition while minimizing the cost.
  - F. **\$225,550** for the salaries of five (5) civilian support staff personnel at the West Virginia State Police Academy.
- 26 Worked with the staff of the Division of Justice and Community Services (DJCS) to receive funding from Purdue Pharma asset forfeiture funds to allow for the legislative rules review held during April 2015.
- 27 Identified officers not in compliance as to required in-service completion for the 2014 Training Year, July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014. These officers were brought before the Subcommittee members during the Subcommittee's August 2014 meeting. Requirements were set for them to complete to bring their certification current as to training requirements. Followed up to verify that required training and/or firearms qualifications were completed.
- 28 Continued to address funding levels within the LEPS Fund by seeking to identify new funding sources. The fund levels continue to require that only requests for funding relating to the entry level training programs receive priority for approval. An interim study resolution passed during the 2014 legislative session was completed and approved during the 2015 legislative session. The report did indicate that the funding mechanism was insufficient to meet the full demands of the training program, but stated that in the current economic environment within the state that no legislative funds could be allotted to address the shortfall. Any funding increase would have to come from new funding sources.
- 29 Subcommittee members, representing the Subcommittee and their associations and organizations, worked with members of the West Virginia Legislature during their 2015 session concerning revisions to CSR 149-1, et. al. and 149-2 et al. that had been developed by the Subcommittee during a legislative rule retreat in the spring of 2014. The approved changes took effect following the 2015 legislative session.
- 30 Completed a rules review during the spring of 2015 of Legislative Rules Series 149, Title 2, by identifying proposed changes to rules to best continue the training and certification of officers and to address and clarify the medical application process for entry into the entry level training program and to examine the setting of set course of fire for firearms qualifications. Applicable steps to be completed to have these proposed changes addressed during the 2016 session of the West Virginia Legislature.
- 31 Revised and updated the procedural guide for officer appearances before the LEPS Subcommittee on matters involving potential officer certification matters.

- 32 Revised and updated the LEPS Subcommittee By-Laws.
- 33 Revised the scoring standards for the Physical Abilities Test (PAT) used for officer's entry into the Academy's entry level training programs as required to bring them in line with national fitness standards set by The Cooper Institute as set forth in the legislative rule. New scoring standards took effect on January 5, 2015.
- 34 Worked with the Director of Division of Justice and Community Services (DJCS) as to the revisions prepared and passed during the 2015 legislative session concerning the restructuring of the Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency and Correction (GCCDC) and applicable sections of 30-29, et. al. of the State Code relating to that restructuring.
- 35 Worked with associations, organizations, training entities and individuals to ensure that West Virginia law enforcement officers received instruction and training in subject areas to allow them to continue to perform the job skills/tasks of a law enforcement officer in this state.
- 36 Worked with the staff of the West Virginia State Police Academy concerning program and schedule changes for the entry level training program relating to the Basic Class Program.
- 37 Continued the implementation of the Law Enforcement Professional Standards Information System (LEPSIS) through awareness and education programs to officers and administrators within the state.
- 38 Responded to two (2) Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests and one (1) subpoena for officer training records by providing the requested information.
