21	§8-12-18a. Conveyance of property without auction.
22	(a) Notwithstanding section eighteen of this article, a
23	municipality may sell its real or personal property valued in

- 1 excess of \$1,000 for fair market value, and without public auction,
- 2 if the city council has made a factual determination that the
- 3 property is to be used to facilitate specific economic development
- 4 projects or to provide a specific necessary and convenient resource
- 5 for the benefit of the citizenry.
- 6 (b) A notice of a proposed conveyance of city property
- 7 pursuant to this section shall be published as a Class II legal
- 8 advertisement in compliance with the provisions of article three,
- 9 chapter fifty-nine of this code, in its area of publication.
- 10 (c) Prior to the approval by city council of any conveyance of
- 11 city property pursuant to this section, city council shall be
- 12 provided with documentation evidencing that:
- 13 (1) All project plans have been approved by all necessary and
- 14 relevant state or municipal committees and departments;
- 15 (2) All necessary and relevant state or municipal permits are
- 16 in place or are approved subject to purchase of the property; and
- 17 (3) Funding for the project is secured.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit a municipality to sell its property for fair market value, without a public auction, if the property is used for a public purpose.
