23 ARTICLE 11. UNFAIR TRADE PRACTICES.

1 \$33-11-11. Willful or intentional violations; cause of action;

- 2 elements; damages; procedure.
- Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter to the contrary,

 4 a third-party claimant who sustains damages as a consequence of the

 5 willful or intentional violation of this article, may bring an

 6 action against the person or entity committing the willful or

 7 intentional violation and may recover all damages and pursue all

 8 legal and equitable remedies available under the law. The

 9 individual or entity shall bring the action in a court of competent

 10 jurisdiction and shall be required, in order to recover any of the

 11 damages and remedies provided by this section, to establish by

 12 competent proof by clear and convincing evidence: (1) That the

 13 violation did in fact occur; (2) the violation was willful or

 14 intentional; and (3) that damages resulted from the violation.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit a third-party claimant to collect damages from an insurance company that has intentionally engaged in an unfair trade practice. The bill sets forth the requirements that must be met in order that damages may be awarded.

This section is new; therefore, strike-throughs and underscoring have been omitted.
