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L 4	A BILL to repeal §55-7-19 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as
L 5	amended; to amend said code by adding thereto a new section,
L 6	designated $\$18-2-25a$; and to amend and reenact $\$29-12-5a$ of
L 7	said code, all relating to establishing protocols and
L 8	protections to limit and treat injury to youth athletes and
L 9	students; making legislative findings with respect to
20	concussions; defining certain terms; requiring certain rules;
21	setting forth certain minimum provisions of rules; requiring
22	Board of Risk and Insurance Management to provide insurance
23	coverage for certain additional individuals; clarifying Board
24	of Risk and Insurance Management shall provide insurance

- 1 coverage for licensed health care professional; limiting civil
- 2 liability in certain circumstances; and making certain
- 3 technical changes.
- 4 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
- 5 That §55-7-19 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
- 6 be repealed; that said code be amended by adding thereto a new
- 7 section, designated \$18-2-25a; and that \$29-12-5a of said code be
- 8 amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:
- 9 CHAPTER 18. EDUCATION.
- 10 ARTICLE 2. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.
- 11 §18-2-25a. Management of concussions and head injuries in
- 12 athletics at West Virginia Secondary School
- Activities Commission member high school or middle
- 14 school.
- 15 (a) The Legislature makes the following findings:
- 16 (1) Concussions are one of the most commonly reported injuries
- 17 in children and adolescents who participate in sports and
- 18 recreational activities. The Centers for Disease Control and
- 19 Prevention estimates that as many as 3.9 million sports-related and
- 20 recreation-related concussions occur in the United States each
- 21 year;
- 22 (2) A concussion is caused by a blow or motion to the head or
- 23 body that causes the brain to move rapidly inside the skull. The
- 24 risk of catastrophic injuries or death is significant when a

- 1 concussion or head injury is not properly evaluated and managed;
- 2 (3) Concussions are a type of brain injury that can range from
- 3 mild to severe and can disrupt the way the brain normally
- 4 functions;
- 5 (4) Concussions can occur in any organized or unorganized
- 6 sport or recreational activity and can result from a fall or from
- 7 players colliding with each other or with obstacles;
- 8 (5) Concussions occur with or without loss of consciousness,
- 9 but the vast majority occur without loss of consciousness;
- 10 (6) The interscholastic athlete who continues to play or
- 11 practice with a concussion or symptoms of head injury is especially
- 12 vulnerable to greater injury and even death; and
- 13 (7) Even with generally recognized return-to-play-and-practice
- 14 standards for concussion and head injury, some affected
- 15 interscholastic athletes are prematurely returned to play or
- 16 practice resulting in increased risk of physical injury or death to
- 17 the athletes in the State of West Virginia.
- 18 (b) For the purposes of this section, "interscholastic
- 19 athlete" means any athlete who is participating in interscholastic
- 20 athletics at a high school or middle school that is a member of the
- 21 West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission. "Licensed
- 22 health care professional" means a health care provider whose
- 23 licensed scope of practice includes the ability to diagnose and
- 24 treat an injury or disease.

- (c) The West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission shall promulgate rules pursuant to section twenty-five of this article that address concussions and head injuries in interscholastic athletes: *Provided*, That prior to state board approval and notwithstanding the exemption provided in section three, article one, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, the state board shall submit the rule to the Legislative Oversight Commission on Education Accountability pursuant to section nine, article three-b, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.
- 10 (d) The rules required by this section shall include, but are 11 not limited to, the following:
- (1) Guidelines and other pertinent information to inform and deducate appropriate school administrators, coaches, interscholastic athletes and their parents or guardians of the nature and risk of concussion and head injury including the risks of continuing to play or practice after a concussion or head injury;
- (2) A concussion and head injury information sheet that shall 18 be signed and returned by the interscholastic athlete and the 19 athlete's parent or guardian on an annual basis before the 20 interscholastic athlete begins practice or competition;
- 21 (3) A requirement that each head coach of an interscholastic 22 sport at a high school or middle school who is a member of the West 23 Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission complete a 24 commission-approved concussion and head injury recognition and

1 return-to-play protocol course annually;

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- 2 (4) A requirement that an interscholastic athlete who is 3 suspected by a licensed health care professional or by his or her 4 head coach or athletic trainer of having sustained a concussion or 5 head injury in a practice or game shall be removed from competition 6 at that time;
- 7 (5) A requirement that an interscholastic athlete who has been 8 removed from play or practice may not return to play or practice 9 until the athlete is evaluated by a licensed health care 10 professional trained in the evaluation and management of 11 concussions and receives written clearance to return to play and 12 practice from the licensed health care professional;

(6) A list of the respective categories of licensed health

14 care professionals who, if properly trained in the evaluation and
15 management of concussions, are authorized to provide written
16 clearance for the interscholastic athlete to return to play; and
17 (7) A requirement that all member schools must submit a report
18 to the West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission within
19 thirty days of an interscholastic athlete suffering or being
20 suspected of suffering a concussion or head injury in a practice or
21 game. The report must state whether an evaluation by a licensed
22 health care professional verified that a concussion or head injury
23 was actually suffered, whether the athlete received written
24 clearance to return to play or practice and, if written clearance

- was given, the number of days between the incident and the actual return to play or practice. If written clearance to return to play is given after thirty days of the incident, a report update shall be submitted. The West Virginia Secondary School Activities Commission shall compile and submit the reports to the appropriate state and national organization or agencies to analyze and make determinations on whether the rule required by this section needs to be amended or if equipment worn by interscholastic athlete needs to be changed accordingly.
- 10 CHAPTER 29. MISCELLANEOUS BOARDS AND OFFICERS.
- 11 ARTICLE 12. STATE INSURANCE.
- 12 §29-12-5a. Liability insurance for county boards of education,

 13 their employees and members, the county

 14 superintendent of schools and for employees and

 15 officers of the State Department of Corrections.
- (a) In accordance with the provisions of this article, the 16 17 State Board of Risk and Insurance Management shall provide 18 appropriate professional or other liability insurance for all boards of education, teachers, supervisory 19 county and 20 administrative staff members, service personnel, 21 superintendents of schools, and school board members, volunteer 22 workers and student teachers, and for all employees and officers of 23 the State Department of Corrections: Provided, That the Board of 24 Risk and Insurance Management is not required to provide insurance

- 1 for every property, activity or responsibility of county boards of
- 2 education, teachers, supervisory and administrative staff members,
- 3 service personnel, county superintendents of schools, and school
- 4 board members, volunteer workers and student teachers, and for all
- 5 employees and officers of the State Department of Corrections:
- 6 Provided, however, That the Board of Risk and Insurance Management
- 7 <u>shall provide insurance for a licensed health care professional as</u>
- 8 <u>defined in section twenty-five-a</u>, article two, chapter eighteen of
- 9 this code.
- (b) Insurance provided by the Board of Risk and Insurance 10 11 Management pursuant to the provisions of subsection (a) of this 12 section shall cover claims, demands, actions, suits or judgments by 13 reason of alleged negligence or other acts resulting in bodily 14 injury or property damage to any person within or without any 15 school building or correctional institution if, at the time of the 16 alleged injury, the teacher, supervisor, administrator, service 17 personnel employee, county superintendent, school board member, 18 volunteer worker or student teacher, or employee or officer of the 19 Department of Corrections, was acting in the discharge of his or 20 her duties, within the scope of his or her office, position or 21 employment, under the direction of the Board of Education or 22 Commissioner of Corrections or in an official capacity as a county 23 superintendent or as a school board member or as Commissioner of 24 Corrections.

- 1 (c) Insurance coverage provided by the Board of Risk and
 2 Insurance Management pursuant to subsection (a) of this section
 3 shall be in an amount to be determined by the State Board of Risk
 4 and Insurance Management, but in no event less than \$1 million for
 5 each occurrence. In addition, each county board of education shall
 6 purchase, through the Board of Risk and Insurance Management,
 7 excess coverage of at least \$5 million for each occurrence. The
 8 cost of this excess coverage will be paid by the respective county
 9 boards of education. Any insurance purchased under this section
 10 shall be obtained from a company licensed to do business in this
 11 state.
- (d) The insurance policy provided by the Board of Risk and Insurance Management pursuant to subsection (a) of this section the shall include comprehensive coverage, personal injury coverage, malpractice coverage, corporal punishment coverage, legal liability coverage as well as a provision for the payment of the cost of attorney's fees in connection with any claim, demand, action, suit or judgment arising from such alleged negligence or other act resulting in bodily injury under the conditions specified in this section.
- (e) The county superintendent and other school personnel, 22 volunteer worker and student teacher shall be defended by the 23 county board or an insurer in the case of suit, unless the act or 24 omission shall not have been within the course or scope of

- 1 employment or official responsibility or was motivated by malicious
 2 or criminal intent.
- (f) For the purposes of this section, "volunteer worker"

 includes, but is not limited to, a licensed health care

 professional as defined in section twenty-five-a, article two,

 chapter eighteen of this code. A licensed health care professional

 is not liable for any civil damages as a result of rendering

 diagnostic or treatment services for an injury or disease, or as a

 result of any act or failure to act in providing or arranging

 further medical treatment, in accordance with acceptable standards

 for care, to an extent greater than the applicable limits of the

 professional liability insurance provided by the State Board of

 Risk and Insurance Management pursuant to this section and in

 effect at the time.
