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10	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by	
11	adding thereto a new article, designated §47-26-1, relating	
12	to regulation of firearms, firearms accessories and

14	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:	
15	That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended	
16	by adding thereto a new article, designated $\$47-26-1$ , to read as	
17	follows:	
18	ARTICLE 26. WEST VIRGINIA FIREARMS FREEDOM ACT.	
19	§47-26-1. Exemption of firearms, a firearm accessory or ammunition	
20	manufactured and retained in West Virginia, from	
21	federal regulation under the Commerce Clause of the	
22	Constitution of the United States.	
23	(a) Short title This article may be cited as the "West	
24	Virginia Firearms Freedom Act".	
25	(b) Legislative declarations of authority The Legislature	
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1 declares that the authority for this section is as follows: 2 (1) The tenth amendment to the United States Constitution 3 guarantees to the states and their people all powers not granted to 4 the federal government elsewhere in the Constitution and reserves 5 to the state and people of West Virginia certain powers as they 6 were understood at the time that West Virginia was admitted to 7 statehood in 1863. The guaranty of those powers is a matter of 8 contract between the state and people of West Virginia and the 9 United States as of the time that the compact with the United 10 States was agreed upon and adopted by West Virginia and the United 11 States in 1863. (2) The ninth amendment to the United States Constitution 12 guarantees to the people rights not granted in the Constitution and 13 14 reserves to the people of West Virginia certain rights as they were 15 understood at the time that West Virginia was admitted to statehood 16 in 1863. The guaranty of those rights is a matter of contract 17 between the state and people of West Virginia and the United States 18 as of the time that the compact with the United States was agreed 19 upon and adopted by West Virginia and the United States in 1863. 20 (3) The regulation of intrastate commerce is vested in the 21 states under the ninth and tenth amendments to the United States 22 Constitution. (4) Article I, section two, of the West Virginia Constitution, 23

24 states that "the government of the United States is a government of

1 enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor 2 inhibited to the states, are reserved to the states or to the 3 people thereof." Specifically enumerated among those "powers so 4 reserved to the states is the exclusive regulation of their own 5 internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty 6 of the several departments of government, created by this 7 Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this state from 8 all encroachments upon the rights so reserved."

9 <u>(5) The second amendment to the United States Constitution</u> 10 <u>reserves to the people the right to keep and bear arms as that</u> 11 <u>right was understood at the time that West Virginia was admitted to</u> 12 <u>statehood in 1863, and the guaranty of the right is a matter of</u> 13 <u>contract between the state and people of West Virginia and the</u> 14 <u>United States as of the time that the compact with the United</u> 15 <u>States was agreed upon and adopted by West Virginia and the United</u> 16 <u>States in 1863.</u>

17 (6) Article III, section twenty-two, of the West Virginia
18 Constitution clearly secures to West Virginia citizens, and
19 prohibits government interference with, the right of individual
20 West Virginia citizens to keep and bear arms.

21 (c) Definitions. -- As used in this chapter, the following 22 definitions apply:

(1) "Borders of West Virginia" means the boundaries of West
 24 Virginia described in Article II, section one, of the 1872 West

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## 1 Virginia Constitution.

2 (2) "Firearms accessories" means items that are used in 3 conjunction with or mounted upon a firearm but are not essential to 4 the basic function of a firearm, including, but not limited to, 5 telescopic or laser sights, magazines, flash or sound suppressors, 6 folding or aftermarket stocks and grips, speedloaders, ammunition 7 carriers, and lights for target illumination.

8 <u>(3) "Generic and insignificant parts" includes, but is not</u> 9 limited to, springs, screws, nuts and pins.

10 (4) "Manufactured" means that a firearm, a firearm accessory, 11 or ammunition has been created from basic materials for functional 12 usefulness, including, but not limited to, forging, casting, 13 machining, or other processes for working materials; or assembled 14 into a complete functional device from component parts.

15 (d) Prohibitions. -- A personal firearm, a firearm accessory, 16 or ammunition that is manufactured commercially or privately in 17 West Virginia and that remains within the borders of West Virginia 18 is not subject to federal law or federal regulation, including 19 registration, under the authority of Congress to regulate 20 interstate commerce. It is declared by the Legislature that those 21 items have not traveled in interstate commerce. This section 22 applies to a firearm, a firearm accessory, or ammunition that is 23 manufactured in West Virginia from basic materials and that can be 24 manufactured without the inclusion of any significant parts

1 imported from another state. Generic and insignificant parts that 2 have other manufacturing or consumer product applications are not 3 firearms, firearms accessories, or ammunition, and their 4 importation into West Virginia and incorporation into a firearm, a 5 firearm accessory, or ammunition manufactured in West Virginia does 6 not subject the firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition to 7 federal regulation. It is declared by the Legislature that basic 8 materials, such as unmachined steel and unshaped wood, are not 9 firearms, firearms accessories, or ammunition and are not subject 10 to congressional authority to regulate firearms, firearms 11 accessories, and ammunition under interstate commerce as if they 12 were actually firearms, firearms accessories, or ammunition. The 13 authority of Congress to regulate interstate commerce in basic 14 materials does not include authority to regulate firearms, firearms 15 accessories, and ammunition made in West Virginia from those 16 materials. Firearms accessories that are imported into West 17 Virginia from another state and that are subject to federal 18 regulation as being in interstate commerce do not subject a firearm 19 to federal regulation under interstate commerce because they are 20 attached to or used in conjunction with a firearm in West Virginia. 21 (e) Exceptions. -- <u>Section (d)</u> does not apply to: 22 (1) A firearm that cannot be carried and used by one person; 23 (2) A firearm that has a bore diameter greater than one and

24 one-half inches and that uses smokeless powder, not black powder,

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1 <u>as a propellant;</u>

2 <u>(3) Ammunition with a projectile that explodes using an</u> 3 <u>explosion of chemical energy after the projectile leaves the</u> 4 <u>firearm; or</u>

5 <u>(4) Excepting shotguns, a firearm that discharges two or more</u> 6 projectiles with one activation of the trigger or other firing 7 device.

8 <u>(f) Marketing of firearms. -- A firearm manufactured in West</u> 9 <u>Virginia under the provisions of this section must have the words</u> 10 <u>"Made in West Virginia" clearly stamped on a central metallic part,</u> 11 <u>such as the receiver or frame.</u>

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NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to exempt firearms, firearms accessories and ammunition from federal regulation if it is sold and maintained in the State of West Virginia.
