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10	A BILL to amend and reenact $$16-50-1$, $$16-50-2$, $$16-50-3$, $$16-50-4$,
11	§16-50-5, §16-50-6, §16-50-7, §16-50-8 and §16-50-10 of the
12	Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, all relating to
13	regulating the performance of health maintenance tasks by
14	unlicensed personnel in certain personal care facilities;
15	providing exceptions; identifying who may perform health
16	maintenance tasks; requiring record keeping; requiring the
17	administrative monitoring system to have input from registered
18	professional nurses; requiring liability insurance; changing
19	the short title; defining terms; and authorizing rule-making.
20	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
21	That §16-50-1, §16-50-2, §16-50-3, §16-50-4, §16-50-5,
22	\$16-50-6, \$16-50-7, \$16-50-8 and \$16-50-10 of the Code of West
23	Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted, all to read
24	as follows:
25	ARTICLE 50. MEDICATION ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION AND

 PERFORMANCE OF HEALTH MAINTENANCE TASKS BY

 UNLICENSED PERSONNEL.

 S16-50-1. Short title.

 This article may be cited as the "medication Administration by

 unlicensed Personnel act" "Ken Ervin Community Living Act."

 S16-50-2. Definitions.

7 As used in this article, unless a different meaning appears 8 from the context, the following definitions apply:

9 (a) "Administration of medication" means:

10 (1) Assisting a person in the ingestion, application or 11 inhalation of medications, including prescription drugs, or in the 12 use of universal precautions or rectal or vaginal insertion of 13 medication, according to the legibly written or printed directions 14 of the attending physician or authorized practitioner, or as 15 written on the prescription label; and

16 (2) Making a written record of such assistance with regard to 17 each medication administered, including the time, route and amount 18 taken. However, for purposes of this article, "administration" 19 does not include judgment, evaluation, assessments, injections of 20 medication, monitoring of medication or self-administration of 21 medications, including prescription drugs and self-injection of 22 medication by the resident.

23 (b) "Authorizing agency" means the department's office of

1 Health Facility Licensure and Certification.

2 (c) "Department" means the Department of Health and Human3 Resources.

4 (d) "Facility" means an ICF/ID, assisted living, behavioral
5 health group home, private residence in which health care services
6 <u>and health maintenance tasks</u> are provided under the supervision of
7 a registered nurse or an adult family care home that is licensed by
8 or approved by the department.

9 (e) "Facility staff member" means an individual employed by a 10 facility but does not include a health care professional acting 11 within the scope of a professional license or certificate.

12 (f) "Health care professional" means a medical doctor or 13 doctor of osteopathy, a podiatrist, registered nurse, practical 14 nurse, registered nurse practitioner, physician's assistant, 15 dentist, optometrist or respiratory care professional licensed 16 under chapter thirty of this code.

17 (g) "Health maintenance tasks" means performing the following 18 tasks according to the legibly written or printed directions of the 19 attending physician or authorized practitioner, or as written on 20 the prescription label, and making a written record of that 21 assistance with regard to each medication administered, including 22 the time, route and amount taken:

23 <u>(1) Administering glucometer tests;</u>

24 (2) Administering gastrostomy tube feedings;

1 (3) Administering enemas; 2 (4) Performing ostomy care (including skin care and changing 3 <u>appliances</u>); (5) Administering nebulizer treatment; 4 5 (6) Administering oxygen therapies; and (7) Performing ventilator and tracheostomy tube respiratory 6 7 care and suctioning. 8 However, for purposes of this article, "performing health 9 maintenance tasks" does not include judgment, evaluation, 10 assessments, injections of medication, monitoring of medication or 11 self-administration of medications, including prescription drugs 12 and self-injection of medication by the resident. (g) (h) "ICF/ID" means an intermediate care facility for 13 14 individuals with an intellectual disability which is certified by

15 the department.

16 (h) (i) "Location of medication administration <u>or location</u>
17 <u>where health maintenance tasks are performed</u>" means a facility or
18 location where the resident requires administration of medication
19 or assistance in taking medications <u>or the performance of health</u>
20 <u>maintenance tasks.</u>

(i) (j) "Medication" means a drug, as defined in section one hundred one, article one, chapter sixty-a of this code, which has been prescribed by a duly authorized health care professional to be ingested through the mouth, applied to the outer skin, eye or ear,

1 or applied through nose drops, vaginal or rectal suppositories
2 medications.

3 (j) (k) "Registered professional nurse" means a person who 4 holds a valid license pursuant to article seven, chapter thirty of 5 this code.

6 (k) (1) "Resident" means a resident of a facility, who for
7 purposes of this article is in a stable condition.

8 (1) (m) "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Department of 9 Health and Human Resources or his or her designee.

10 (m) (n) "Self-administration of medication" means the act of 11 a resident, who is independently capable of reading and 12 understanding the labels of drugs ordered by a physician, in 13 opening and accessing prepackaged drug containers, accurately 14 identifying and taking the correct dosage of the drugs as ordered 15 by the physician, at the correct time and under the correct 16 circumstances.

(n) (o) "Self-administration of medication with assistance"
18 means assisting residents who are otherwise able to self administer
19 their own medications except their physical disabilities prevent
20 them from completing one or more steps in the process.

21 <u>(p) "Stable" means the individual's medical condition is</u> 22 predictable and consistent as determined by the registered 23 professional nurse.

24 (o) (q) "Supervision of self-administration of medication"

1 means a personal service which includes reminding residents to take
2 medications, opening medication containers for residents, reading
3 the medication label to residents, observing residents while they
4 take medication, checking the self administered dosage against the
5 label on the container and reassuring residents that they have
6 obtained and are taking the dosage as prescribed.

7 §16-50-3. Administration of medications; in facilities performance
 of health maintenance tasks; maintenance of liability
 insurance in facilities.

10 (a) In order to safeguard the well-being and preserve the 11 dignity of people who need assistance to live in their community, 12 the secretary is authorized to establish and implement a program 13 for the administration of medications and performance of health 14 maintenance tasks in locations covered by this article in locations medication administration where 15 of the resident requires 16 administration of or assistance in taking medications or 17 performance of health maintenance tasks. The program shall be 18 developed and conducted in cooperation with the appropriate 19 agencies, advisory bodies and boards.

20 (b) Administration of medication <u>or performance of health</u> 21 <u>maintenance tasks</u> pursuant to this article shall be performed only 22 by:

23 (1) Registered professional nurses;

24 (2) Other licensed health care professionals; or

1 (3) Facility staff members who have been trained and retrained 2 every two years and who are subject to the supervision of and 3 approval by a registered professional nurse.

4 (c) Subsequent to assessing the health status of an individual 5 resident, a registered professional nurse, in collaboration with 6 the resident's attending physician and the facility staff member, 7 may recommend that the facility authorize a facility staff member 8 to administer medication <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> if the 9 staff member:

10 (1) Has been trained pursuant to the requirements of this 11 article;

12 (2) Is considered by the registered professional nurse to be 13 competent;

14 (3) Consults with the registered professional nurse or 15 attending physician on a regular basis; and

16 (4) Is monitored or supervised by the registered professional 17 nurse.

18 (d) Any agency or facility providing services covered by this
19 article shall maintain liability insurance for the registered
20 professional nurse, other licensed health care provider and any
21 facility staff member who has been trained and is employed to
22 administer medication or perform health maintenance tasks pursuant
23 to this article.

24 (d) (e) Nothing in this article may be construed to prohibit

1 any facility staff member from administering medications <u>or</u> 2 <u>performing health maintenance tasks</u> or providing any other prudent 3 emergency assistance to aid any person who is in acute physical 4 distress or requires emergency assistance.

5 (e) (f) Supervision of self-administration of medication by 6 facility staff members who are not licensed health care 7 professionals may be permitted in certain circumstances, when the 8 substantial purpose of the setting is other than the provision of 9 health care.

10 §16-50-4. Exemption from licensure; statutory construction.

11 (a) Any individual who is not otherwise authorized by law to 12 administer medication <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> may 13 administer medication <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> in 14 locations covered by this article if he or she meets the 15 requirements and provisions of this article. Any person who 16 administers medication <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> pursuant 17 to <u>the provisions of</u> this article shall be exempt from the 18 licensing requirements of chapter thirty of this code.

(b) All licensed health care professionals as defined in this 20 article remain subject to the provisions of their respective 21 licensing laws.

(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the 23 contrary, this article shall not be construed to violate or be in 24 conflict with any of the provisions of articles seven or seven-a,

1 chapter thirty of this code.

2 (d) Any parent or guardian may administer medication to, <u>or</u> 3 <u>perform health maintenance tasks for</u>, his or her adult or minor 4 child regardless of whether or not the parent or guardian receives 5 compensation for caring for said child.

6 §16-50-5. Instruction and training.

7 (a) The Office of Health Facility Licensure and Certification 8 shall establish a council of nurses to represent the facilities and 9 registered professional nurses affected by the provisions of this 10 article. The council of nurses shall prepare a procedural manual 11 and recommendations regarding a training course to the Secretary of 12 the Department of Health and Human Resources. The council shall 13 meet every two years to review the training curricula, competency 14 evaluation procedures and rules implemented by the secretary, and 15 shall make recommendations as deemed necessary.

16 (b) The department shall develop and approve training 17 curricula and competency evaluation procedures for facility staff 18 members who administer medication <u>or perform health maintenance</u> 19 <u>tasks</u> pursuant to the provisions of this article. The department 20 shall consider the recommendations of the council of nurses and 21 shall consult with the West Virginia Board of Examiners for 22 Registered Nurses in developing the training curricula and 23 competency evaluation procedures.

24 (c) The program developed by the department shall require that

1 any person who applies to act as a facility staff member authorized 2 to administer medications <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> 3 pursuant to the provisions of this article shall:

4 (1) Hold a high school diploma or general education diploma;
5 (2) Be trained or certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation
6 and first aid;

7 (3) Participate in the initial training program developed by8 the department;

9 (4) Pass a competency evaluation developed by the department; 10 and

11 (5) Subsequent to initial training and evaluation, participate 12 in a retraining program every two years.

(d) Any facility may offer the training and competency 4 evaluation program developed by the department to its facility 15 staff members. The training and competency programs shall be 16 provided by the facility through a registered professional nurse. 17 (e) A registered nurse who is authorized to train facility 18 staff members to administer medications <u>or perform health</u> 19 maintenance tasks in facilities shall:

20 (1) Possess a current active West Virginia license in good21 standing to practice as a registered nurse;

(2) Have practiced as a registered professional nurse in a 23 position or capacity requiring knowledge of medications <u>and the</u> 24 performance of health maintenance tasks for the immediate two years

1 prior to being authorized to train facility staff members; and 2 (3) Be familiar with the nursing care needs of residents of 3 facilities as described in this article.

4 §16-50-6. Availability of records; eligibility requirements of
5 facility staff.

6 (a) Any facility which authorizes unlicensed staff members to 7 administer medications <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> pursuant 8 to the provisions of this article shall make available to the 9 authorizing agency a list of the individual facility staff members 10 authorized to administer medications.

11 (b) A facility may permit a facility staff member to 12 administer medications <u>or perform health maintenance tasks</u> in a 13 single specific agency only after compliance with all of the 14 following:

(1) The staff member has successfully completed a training here and received a satisfactory competency evaluation as required by the provisions of this article;

18 (2) The facility determines there is no statement on the state 19 administered nurse aide registry indicating that the staff member 20 has been the subject of finding of abuse or neglect of a long-term 21 care facility resident or convicted of the misappropriation of such 22 a resident's property;

(3) The facility staff member has had a criminal background24 check or if applicable, a check of the State Police abuse registry,

1 establishing that the individual has been convicted of no crimes
2 against persons or drug related crimes;

3 (4) The medication to be administered is received and 4 maintained by the facility staff member in the original container 5 in which it was dispensed by a pharmacist or the prescribing health 6 care professional; and

7 (5) The facility staff member has complied with all other 8 applicable requirements of this article, the rules adopted pursuant 9 to this article and such other criteria, including minimum 10 competency requirements, as are specified by the authorizing 11 agency.

12 §16-50-7. Oversight of medication administration and performance

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of health maintenance tasks by unlicensed personnel.

(a) Each facility in which medication is administered or
<u>health maintenance tasks are performed</u> by unlicensed personnel
shall establish in policy an administrative monitoring system. The
specific requirements of the administrative policy shall be
established by the department, <u>in consultation with registered</u>
professional nurses supervising delegated tasks, through rules
proposed pursuant to section eleven of this article. <u>These rules</u>
shall include specific instructions on whom to contact should any
condition occur that might create a risk to the resident's health
or safety, and training on how to handle these situations.

24 (b) Monitoring of facility staff members authorized pursuant

1 to this article shall be performed by a registered professional 2 nurse employed or contracted by the facility.

3 §16-50-8. Withdrawal of authorization.

4 The registered professional nurse who monitors or supervises 5 the facility staff members authorized to administer medication <u>or</u> 6 <u>perform health maintenance tasks</u> pursuant to this article may 7 withdraw authorization for a facility staff member if the nurse 8 determines that the facility staff member is not performing 9 medication administration <u>or health maintenance tasks</u> in accordance 10 with the training and written instructions. The withdrawal of the 11 authorization shall be documented and shall be relayed to the 12 facility and the department in order to remove the facility staff 13 member from the list of authorized individuals.

14 §16-50-10. Limitations on medication administration or performance

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health maintenance tasks.

16 The following limitations apply to the administration of 17 medication <u>or performance of health maintenance tasks</u> by facility 18 staff members:

19 (a) Injections or any parenteral medications may not be 20 administered, <u>except that prefilled insulin or insulin pens may be</u> 21 administered;

(b) Irrigations or debriding agents used in the treatment of
a skin condition or minor abrasions may not be administered;
(c) No verbal medication orders may be accepted, no new

1 medication orders shall be transcribed and no drug dosages may be 2 converted and calculated; and

3 (d) No medications ordered by the physician or a health care 4 professional with legal prescriptive authority to be given "as 5 needed" may be administered unless the order is written with 6 specific parameters which preclude independent judgment.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to regulate the performance of health maintenance tasks by unlicensed personnel in certain personal care facilities. The bill changes the short title to the "Ken Ervin Community Living Act." The bill requires liability insurance in certain instances. The bill defines terms. The bill provides exceptions. The bill requires the administrative monitoring system to have input from registered professional nurses. The bill authorizes rule-making.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
