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10	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by
11	adding thereto a new article, designated §16-46-1, §16-46-2,

13	patient access to healthcare services, improving quality of
14	care and reducing costs through the use of telemedicine.
15	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
16	That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended
17	by adding thereto a new article, designated §16-46-1, §16-46-2,
18	\$16-46-3, $$16-46-4$ and $$16-46-5$, all to read as follows:
19	ARTICLE 46. TELEMEDICINE FOR QUALITY IMPROVEMENT AND HEALTHCARE
20	MODERNIZATION ACT.
21	<u>§16-46-1. Legislative Intent.</u>
22	The Legislature finds that telemedicine can efficiently
23	improve access and quality of care for under served patients by
24	providing consultations and specialty care. Remote monitoring and
25	home telehealth can help the chronically ill stay at home and out

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1 of hospitals and emergency rooms, dramatically reducing costs.
2 Patients are mobile and expect access to their care provider from
3 wherever and whenever needed. Today, more and more people are
4 taking advantage of telemedicine and e-health opportunities. But
5 these services are not available for everyone and action is needed
6 to assure that all citizens of West Virginia receive the benefits
7 available through telemedicine.

8 §16-46-2. Definitions.

9 <u>"Telemedicine services" means the use of synchronous video</u> 10 <u>conferencing, remote patient monitoring, and asynchronous health</u> 11 <u>images or other health transmissions supported by mobile devices</u> 12 <u>(m-Health) or other telecommunications technology by a health care</u> 13 <u>provider to deliver health care services at a site other than the</u> 14 <u>site where the provider is located relating to the health care</u> 15 <u>diagnosis or treatment of a patient.</u>

16 §16-46-3. Application of provisions of this article.

This article applies to all insurance policies, contracts and plans delivered, issued for delivery, reissued or at any time thereafter when any term of the policy, contract or plan is changed or any premium adjustment is made. This article does not apply to short-term travel, accident-only, limited or specified disease or individual conversion policies or contracts or to policies or contracts designed for issuance to persons eligible for coverage under Medicare or any other similar coverage under state or federal

1 governmental plans.

2 §16-46-4. Required reimbursement.

3 Health insurers, health care subscription plans, and health 4 maintenance organizations shall provide appropriate reimbursement 5 for care delivered through an in person or electronic visit. The 6 state's Medicaid plan and state employee plans may not deny 7 coverage on the basis that coverage is provided through 8 telemedicine if the health care service would be covered were it 9 provided through in-person consultation between the recipient and 10 a health care provider. Coverage for health care services provided 11 through telemedicine must be determined in a manner consistent with 12 coverage for health care services provided through in-person 13 consultation. Specifically included is statewide coverage, 14 services originating from a recipients home or wherever else they 15 may be, all health professionals authorized to provide services by 16 a telehealth method to the extent otherwise covered in the state's 17 plan, and timely asynchronous telehealth services.

18 <u>Decisions denying coverage of services provided via</u> 19 telemedicine are subject to utilization review procedures.

20 §16-46-5. Required reporting; initiatives; and plans.

21 <u>The Secretary of the State Department of Health and Human</u> 22 <u>Resources shall lead an interagency study and report to the</u> 23 <u>Legislature within twelve months from the passage of this article</u> 24 <u>on comprehensive plans to encourage the adoption and use of</u> 1 <u>telemedicine services as part of interoperable care delivery system</u>
2 <u>within the state. The report shall include initiatives where</u>
3 <u>health technology is engaging patients in managing their own care,</u>
4 <u>expanding access to care providers, reducing costs, and improving</u>
5 <u>population health outcomes. The report shall also include plans</u>
6 <u>for the implementation of a statewide medical assistance benefit of</u>
7 <u>a health home for individuals with chronic conditions (defined</u>
8 under 42 U. S. C 1396a).

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to expand patient access to healthcare services, improving quality of care and reducing costs through the use of telemedicine. The bill requires all health insurers, health care subscription plans, and health maintenance organizations to provide appropriate reimbursement for care delivered through an in person or electronic visit.
