A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new section,
designated §18-1-5, relating to school curricular standards and assessments;
discontinuing the use of common core standards and assessments in the state; requiring
the department of education to promulgate new standards for academic curriculum and
assessment; and allowing school districts to develop academic standards that exceed
statewide standards.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a new

section, designated §18-1-5, to read as follows:

## ARTICLE 1. DEFINITIONS; LIMITATIONS OF CHAPTER; GOALS FOR EDUCATION.

#### §18-1-5. Public school curricular standards and assessments.

1 (a) For purposes of this section:

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- (1) "Assessments" means the Smarter Balanced Assessments or any other student
   assessments intended to measure student achievement in the common core standards.
- 4 (2) "Common Core" means the academic standards published by the Common Core State
   5 Standards Initiative or the Next Generation Science Standards Initiative and adopted by the West
   6 Virginia Board of Education, including the West Virginia Next Generation Standards or any related
   7 program.
- 8 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this code, effective July 1, 2015, the State Board
   9 of Education may not:
  - (1) Continue to implement the academic content standards for English, language arts, mathematics or any other subject developed by the Common Core State Standards Initiative or any assessments currently implemented as part of the initiative;

13	(2) Implement the science standards developed by the Next Generation Science
14	Standards Initiative led by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences;

16	(3) Use the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for Colleges and Careers, the
17	Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium, or any other assessment based on the Common
18	Core Standards or Next Generation Science Standards.
19	(b) As of the effective date of this section, any actions taken to adopt or implement the
20	Common Core Standards or the Next Generation Science Standards are void.
21	(c) On or before July 1, 2015, the State Board of Education shall develop statewide
22	academic content standards to replace any Common Core or Next Generation Standards
23	currently in use.
24	(d) The state board shall post for a minimum of ninety days public notice any proposed
25	revision of academic content standards on the department's website and shall invite comments
26	on the proposed changes from the general public, including parents, teachers, experts on college
27	and career readiness standards, representatives of nonpartisan institutes and political,
28	educational, and faith-based organizations.
29	(e) A local board of education may adopt for use by the school district academic content
30	standards that exceed those approved by the state board.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to discontinue the use of Common Core Standards and assessments in the state; require the department of education to promulgate new standards for academic curriculum and assessment; and allow school districts to develop academic standards that exceed statewide standards.
