A BILL to amend and reenact §22-15A-3 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to
 amend said code by adding thereto a new section, designated §22-15A-3a, all relating to
 requiring the Department of Environmental Protection to create and implement an Adopt A-Stream Program; encouraging the removal of litter along West Virginia's rivers and
 streams by volunteers; and allowing the Litter Control Fund to be used to fund the
 program.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 15A. THE A. JAMES MANCHIN REHABILITATION ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION PLAN.

§22-15A-3. West Virginia litter control and recycling programs; transfer of programs and
 employees; additional duties of secretary; grants to counties and municipalities;
 and rules relating thereto.

4 (a) After July 1, 2005, the litter control and recycling programs heretofore operated and
5 managed by the Division of Natural Resources shall transfer to the Department of Environmental
6 Protection.

7 With the transfer of the West Virginia Litter Control and Recycling Programs from the 8 jurisdiction of the Division of Natural Resources to the jurisdiction of the Department of 9 Environmental Protection, all records, assets, and contracts, along with rights and obligations 10 thereunder, obtained or signed on behalf of the Litter Control and Recycling Programs are hereby 11 transferred and assigned to the Department of Environmental Protection.

(b) The Commissioner of the Division of Natural Resources and the Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection shall determine which employees of the Division of Natural Resources will be transferred to the Department of Environmental Protection. All employees including administrators of the litter control and recycling programs are subject to being transferred to the Department of Environmental Protection. Employees in the classified

17 service who have gained permanent status as of the effective date of this article, enacted during 18 the 2005 regular session of the Legislature, will not be subject to further qualifying examination in 19 their respective classifications by reason of the transfer required by the provisions of this section. 20 Nothing contained in this section may be construed to either abridge the rights of employees 21 within the classified service of the state to the procedures and protections set forth in §29-6-1 et 22 seq. of this code or to preclude the reclassification or reallocation of positions in accordance with 23 procedures set forth in said that article. The Division of Personnel shall work with the commission 24 and secretary to efficiently transfer employees from the Division of Natural Resources to the 25 Department of Environmental Protection.

(c) In addition to all other powers, duties, and responsibilities granted and assigned to the
Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection in this chapter and elsewhere by law,
the secretary, in the administration of the West Virginia Litter Control Program created by this
section, shall:

30 (1) Coordinate all industry and business organizations seeking to aid in the litter control
 31 and recycling effort;

32 (2) Cooperate with all local governments to accomplish coordination of local litter control
 33 and recycling efforts;

34 (3) Encourage, organize, coordinate, and increase public awareness of and participation
35 in all voluntary litter control and recycling campaigns, including citizen litter watch programs,
36 seeking to focus the attention of the public on the litter control and recycling programs of the state
37 and local governments and of private recycling centers;

38 (4) Recommend to local governing bodies that they adopt ordinances similar to the
 39 provisions of §22-15A-4 of this code;

40 (5) Investigate the methods and success of techniques of litter control, removal, and 41 disposal utilized in other states, and develop, encourage, organize, and coordinate local litter

42 control programs funded by grants awarded pursuant to subsection (d) of this section utilizing
43 such successful techniques;

44 (6) Investigate the availability of, and apply for, funds available from any and all private or
45 public sources to be used in the litter control program created by this section;

46 (7) Attract to the state persons or industries that purchase, process, or use recyclable47 materials;

(8) Contract for the development, production, and broadcast of radio and television
messages promoting the West Virginia Litter Control Program. The messages should increase
public awareness of and promote citizen responsibility toward the reduction of litter; and

51 (9) Encourage, organize, coordinate, and increase public awareness of, and participation
52 in, a volunteer litter reporting program statewide.

53 (d) All authority to promulgate rules pursuant to §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code establishing 54 criteria for awarding direct or matching grants for the study of available research and development 55 in the fields of litter control, removal, and disposal, methods for the implementation of such 56 research and development, and the development of public educational programs concerning litter 57 control is hereby transferred from the Division of Natural Resources to the Secretary of the 58 Department of Environmental Protection as of the effective date of enactment of this section and 59 article during the 2005 session of the Legislature: *Provided*. That any rule promulgated by the 60 Division of Natural Resources relating to such grants shall remain in force and effect as though 61 promulgated by the Department of Environmental Protection until the Secretary amends the rules 62 in accordance with the provisions of article three, §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code.

(e) All authority to promulgate rules pursuant to §29A-3-1 *et seq.* of this code designating
public areas where litter receptacles shall be placed and the minimum number of litter receptacles
in accordance with §22-15A-4(g) of this code is hereby transferred from the Division of Natural
Resources to the Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection as of the effective date
of enactment of this section and article during the 2005 session of the Legislature. Any rule

promulgated by the Division of Natural Resources relating to littering receptacles shall remain in
effect as if promulgated by the secretary until amended by the secretary.

(f) Commencing on July 1, 2005 2019, the secretary shall expend annually at least fifty 30
percent of the moneys credited to the Litter Control Fund in the previous fiscal year for matching
grants to counties and municipalities for the initiation and administration of litter control programs.
The secretary shall promulgate rules pursuant to §29A-3-1 *et seq.* of this code establishing criteria
for the awarding of matching grants.

75 (g) The Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection in cooperation with the 76 Commissioner of Highways, the Department of Commerce, the West Virginia State Police, the 77 United States Forestry Service, and other local, state, and federal law-enforcement agencies shall 78 be responsible for the administration and enforcement of all laws and rules relating to the 79 maintenance of cleanliness and improvement of appearances on and along highways, roads, 80 streets, alleys, streams, rivers, and any other private or public areas of the state. These other 81 agencies shall make recommendations to the secretary, from time to time, concerning means and 82 methods of accomplishing litter control consistent with the provisions of this chapter. Such The 83 cooperation shall include, but not be limited to, contracts with the Commissioner of Highways to 84 operate a litter control program.

(h) All other state agencies and local governments shall cooperate with the secretary ineffecting the purposes of the litter control program.

§22-15A-3a. Creation of Adopt-A-Stream Program required.

(a) The Adopt-A-Highway Program was established in the late 1980s to improve the
 guality of the state's environment by encouraging public involvement in the elimination of highway
 litter. That program is cosponsored by the Division of Highways and the Department of
 Environmental Protection, Rehabilitation Environmental Action Plan. Its objective is to save
 taxpayer money by increasing public awareness and to serve as an educational tool by focusing
 on the consequences of littering. The program offers volunteers the opportunity to take charge of

- their own environment by making a positive effort to create a cleaner, more aesthetic place in
 which to live.
- 9 In West Virginia there are currently 25,000 volunteers who regularly pick up litter on 4,000
 10 miles of highway. They have been responsible for removing more than 40 million pounds of litter
 11 since the program began.
- 12 (b) As with the Adopt-A-Highway Program, individuals, families, churches, businesses, schools, civic organizations, government agencies, scouting groups, fraternities, and 13 14 communities may participate in an Adopt-A-Stream Program, which the department shall create 15 and implement. Anyone who is at least 12 years old may participate. Any stream or river that is a 16 part of the West Virginia Stream Partners Program is eligible for adoption, with the exception of 17 streams or rivers considered unsafe. Volunteers may select a stream or river to adopt and then 18 have it approved by the department, or they may ask the department to suggest an adoptable 19 stream or river. Adopted streams must be at least one mile long. The Litter Control Fund may be 20 used to support the Adopt-A-Stream Program. 21 (c) Adoptions are for a period of one year, during which time three cleanups are required 22 per year. As volunteers pick up litter, bags that have been filled are placed on stream sides for 23 removal and disposal by the program. Garbage bags, safety vests, safety training, traffic warning 24 signs, and gloves are to be furnished by the program. 25 (d) Adopted streams may be identified by a sign at each end of the section bearing the 26 Adopt-A-Stream logo and the name of the adoptee. Volunteers who complete six required litter 27 pickups within the one-year contract period shall be awarded a certificate of accomplishment
- 28 signed by the secretary.
- 29 (e) The secretary shall promulgate rules to implement and manage the program pursuant
- 30 to §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to require the Department of Environmental Protection to

create and implement an Adopt-A-Stream Program, to encourage the removal of litter along West Virginia's rivers and streams by volunteers.
