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| 2 | designated §61-11-20, relating to providing enhanced criminal penalties for offenses |
| 3 | committed against law-enforcement officers or first responders; and defining first |
| 4 | responders. |
| | Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia: |
| | ARTICLE 11. GENERAL PROVISIONS CONCERNING CRIMES. |
| | §61-11-20. Enhanced penalties for offenses committed against law-enforcement officers; |
| | first responders. |
| 1 | (a) The Legislature finds and declares the following: |
| 2 | (1) It is the right of every person employed as a law-enforcement officer or first responder, |
| 3 | to be secure and protected from threats of reasonable fear, intimidation, harassment, and physical |
| 4 | harm caused by activities of groups and individuals. |
| 5 | (2) It is not the intent, by enactment of this section, to interfere with the exercise of rights |
| 6 | protected by the Constitution of the State of West Virginia or the United States. |
| 7 | (b) The purpose of this section is to impose additional penalties where it is shown that a |
| 8 | perpetrator committing the underlying offense was motivated by the victim's employment as a |
| 9 | law-enforcement officer or first responder. For the purposes of this section, the term "first |
| 10 | responder" means a person with specialized training who is among the first to arrive and aid at |
| 11 | the scene of an emergency, such as an accident, natural disaster, or terrorism. First responders |
| 12 | typically include law-enforcement officers, Paramedics, EMT's and firefighters. |
| 13 | (c) A person who has been found guilty of a crime, the commission of which was shown |
| 14 | beyond a reasonable doubt to have been motivated by the victim's employment as a law- |
| 15 | enforcement officer or first responder, shall be punished as follows: |
| 16 | (1) Imprisoned in a state correctional facility for not less than 18 months nor more than 15 |
| 17 | years. |

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| 18 | (2) For purposes of this subdivision, a criminal defendant who has been previously |
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| 19 | convicted of any felony and receives an enhanced sentence pursuant to this section is also |
| 20 | subject to enhanced punishment under §61-11-18 of this code, specifically §61-11-18(b), §61-11- |
| 21 | 18(c), and §61-11-18(d) of this code. |
| 22 | (d) A person, who has been found guilty of a misdemeanor crime the commission of which |
| 23 | was shown beyond a reasonable doubt to have been motivated by the victim's employment as a |
| 24 | law-enforcement officer or first responder, shall be punished as follows: Fined not more than |
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- 25 \$1000 or confined in jail not less than three months nor more than one year, or both fined and
- 26 <u>confined.</u>

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to provide enhanced criminal penalties for offenses committed against law-enforcement officers or first responders and to define "first responders".

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from a heading or the present law and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
