A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article, designated §16-2S-1, §16-2S-2, §16-2S-3, §16-2S-4, §16-2S-5, §16-2S-6, and §16-2S-7, §16-2S-8, §16-2S-9, §16-2S-10, §16-2S-11, §16-2S-12, and §16-2S-13, all relating to creating The Mobile Food-Vendor Freedom Act; providing a short title; listing purposes; presenting legislative findings; providing definitions; listing licensing requirements that permit the vendor to sell food anywhere in the state; prohibiting local authorities from barring a mobile food vendor from selling in that jurisdiction if it holds the mobile food vending license and complies with all other state and local laws; establishing a process for obtaining a license; requirements for mobile-food vending; providing rulemaking authority; setting food safety and health inspection requirements; setting the parameters for regulations by local authorities; establishing investigation authority; setting standards for license denial, suspension, or revocation and setting penalties and the right to appeal; and stating preemption limitations.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 2S. THE MOBILE FOOD-VENDOR FREEDOM ACT.

§16-2S-1. Short title.

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This Act shall be known as the "Mobile Food-Vendor Freedom Act."

§16-2S-2.

The purposes of this act are to:

- 2 (a) Legalize mobile food vending across the state;
- 3 (b) Promote agriculture and expand economic development;
- 4 (c) Foster opportunities for small businesses and stimulate innovation;
- 5 (d) Increase consumer access to desired local foods;
- 6 (e) Simplify and standardize mobile food vending regulations; and
- 7 (f) Protect public health and safety by ensuring mobile food vendors follow clear, narrowly
- 8 <u>tailored regulations that address demonstrable health and safety risks.</u>

	§16-2S-3. Legislative findings					
1	The Legislature finds and declares the following:					
2	(a) Mobile food vending provides opportunities for employment, entrepreneurship, and					
3	upward mobility;					
4	(b) Mobile food vendors make significant contributions to local economies;					
5	(c) Consumers desire foods produced by mobile food vendors;					
6	(d) Mobile food vending contributes to a safe and dynamic public space;					
7	(e) Public health and safety are best ensured by local authorities regulating mobile food					
8	vending proportionally to its risks; and					
9	(f) It is a matter of statewide concern to create a uniform approach to regulating mobile					
10	food vendors and to remove unnecessary barriers to mobile food vending.					
	§16-2S-4. Definitions					
1	(a) "Applicant" means a person applying to the department to conduct business as a					
2	mobile food vendor.					
3	(b) "Customer" means any person with whom a mobile food vendor conducts business.					
4	(c) "Department" means the county health department for the county in which the					
5	business's address for the business license is registered.					
6	(d) "Food vending vehicle" means any motorized vehicle, trailer, or tent and equipment					
7	used to sell food and beverages by a mobile food vendor.					
8	(e) "Local authority" means any local government, including any city, or county.					
9	(f) "Mobile food vendor" means any person who dispenses food or beverages from a food					
10	vending vehicle for immediate service and/or consumption.					
11	(g) "Person" means any individual, group of individuals, firm, partnership, company,					
12	corporation, trustee, association, or any public or private entity and includes the individual or					
13	entity's employees or agents.					
14	(h) "Prepackaged food" means any commercially labeled and processed food that is					

15	prepackaged to prevent direct human contact with the food product upon distribution from the						
16	manufacturer, a food facility, or other approved source.						
17	(i) "Private property" means all property that is not public property.						
18	(j) "Public property" means any property owned by the state or local authority and includes						
19	all rights-of-way except public sidewalks and rights-of-way in state parks or locally-owned parks.						
20	(k) "Sell" means to transfer or exchange for value, to expose, display or offer for sale or						
21	exchange, or to procure, store or have in one's possession or control for the purpose of selling.						
	§16-2S-5. Mobile food vending permitted; license required.						
1	(a) No person may operate as a mobile food vendor in this state without obtaining a mobile						
2	food vending license from the department. A separate mobile food vending license shall be						
3	required for every food vending vehicle used by a mobile food vendor.						
4	(b) No local authority may bar a mobile food vendor from operating in its jurisdiction if the						
5	vendor holds a mobile food vending license and complies with all other state and local laws not in						
6	conflict with this Act.						
	§16-2S-6. License process.						
1	(a) Application. The department shall prepare an application for a statewide mobile food						
2	vending license. The department shall make the mobile food vending license application available						
3	to applicants in person and on the department's website.						
4	(b) Application requirements. The department shall require an applicant to provide the						
5	following information, under oath, before issuing a license:						
6	(1) The applicant's name, address, and telephone number;						
7	(2) The name, address, and telephone number of any associated entities or organizations						
8	that the applicant is representing and copies of documents verifying that relationship;						
9	(3) The applicant's primary residences and/or business address;						
10	(4) The nature of the food or beverages that the applicant will sell for the purpose of the						
11	department establishing the applicant's food type classification; and						

12	(5) Whether the applicant was denied a license to operate as a mobile food vendor or					
13	whether the applicant had a mobile food vending license suspended or revoked in any state or					
14	local jurisdiction and, if so, the reasons for the denial, suspension, or revocation.					
15	(c) Requirements for each food vending vehicle. In addition to the written application, the					
16	department shall require an applicant to provide the following information for each food vending					
17	vehicle:					
18	(1) A list of all vehicle license numbers, vehicle descriptions, vehicle identification					
19	numbers, and vehicle registration for the food vending vehicle(s) in this state;					
20	(2) Proof of vehicle insurance for the food vending vehicle(s); a mobile food truck license,					
21	proof of registration with the Tax Department and a copy or proof of a business license issued by					
22	the Secretary of State;					
23	(d) Requirements for food vending vehicle drivers. Any person who drives a food vending					
24	vehicle shall hold a current class E driver's license;					
25	(e) Any other requirements necessary. The applicant shall submit one application for all					
26	vehicles which require a license. Failure to submit a complete application may result in denial of a					
27	license;					
28	(f) Health inspection. Within 14 days of receiving a complete application, the department,					
29	or a local authority acting under a collaborative agreement pursuant to Section 8, shall conduct a					
30	health inspection of the applicant's food vending vehicle prior to issuing a mobile food vending					
31	license. The purpose of the inspection is to ensure the applicant's food vending vehicle is safe for					
32	preparing, handling, and selling food and the applicant follows all county health department					
33	regulations;					
34	(g) Fees. The department may establish a reasonable schedule and classification of fees					
35	not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200) for a mobile food vending license or for a license					
36	renewal. The department may also establish an inspection fee that covers the average cost of					
37	conducting health inspections for the vendor and charge that fee in conjunction with the fee for a					

38	mobile food vending license or renewal.						
39	(h) Issuance of license. The department shall issue a mobile food vending license to the						
40	applicant upon receipt of a complete application and the applicant's food vending vehicle(s)						
41	passing an initial inspection. Licenses shall be valid for one year.						
42	(i) Substitution of licensed food vending vehicles. Licenses are not transferable, nor shall a						
43	license authorize the activities of any person other than the licensee.						
44	(j) Transfer of assets. If a mobile food vendor transfers its mobile food vending business						
45	assets, the recipient of the assets shall, before operating in this state, apply for and obtain a new						
46	mobile food vending license.						
47	(k) Renewal. Licenses shall be renewed annually. The department shall send notice to the						
48	licensee. The licensee shall submit the renewal annually, prior to the license's expiration date. A						
49	licensee may continue mobile food vending operations while an application for renewal is pending						
50	with the department.						
51	(I) Unlawful conduct. It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally provide false						
52	information or to intentionally omit requested information on an application for a license governed						
53	by this Act.						
54	(m) Application guide. The department shall prepare a guide for applicants. The guide shall						
55	include instructions for obtaining, maintaining, and renewing a mobile food vending license and						
56	shall describe the standards used to inspect food vending vehicles. The application shall be made						
57	available to applicants at the local health department's office and on the department's website.						
	§16-2S-7. Mobile Food Vending Operations.						
1	(a) Compliance with state and local law. Mobile food vendors shall follow all state and local						
2	laws governing operations in the jurisdiction where the vendor operates, including without						
3	limitation all fire codes, zoning codes, and any other applicable state or local code provisions not in						
4	conflict with this Act.						
5	(b) Location of operations. A mobile food vendor may operate in the following locations:						

6	(1) Public property. A mobile food vendor may operate on public property, so long as the					
7	vending vehicle is not parked within 20 feet of an intersection. A mobile food vendor may operate					
8	from legal parking spaces, including metered spaces upon payment of appropriate fees, on the					
9	public right-of-way. When operating on public property, a mobile food vendor is subject to the same					
10	parking rules and restrictions as a commercial vehicle.					
11	(2) Private property. A mobile food vendor may operate on private property under the					
12	following circumstances:					
13	(A) The property is in a zoning district where food service establishments are permitted,					
14	and the vendor has permission of the property owner and/or his or her designee.					
15	(B) The property is in a Residential Zoning District, and the mobile food vendor has been					
16	invited by a resident in that district to operate on their property for the purpose of serving food to					
17	that resident or their guests.					
18	(3) No interference with pedestrians or vehicles. A mobile food vendor shall not obstruct					
19	the passage of pedestrians or vehicles along any street, sidewalk or parkway.					
20	(c) Operational standards.					
21	(1) When operating, a mobile food vendor shall:					
22	(A) Maintain a food vending vehicle in good operating order;					
23	(B) Park so that its service window faces the sidewalk when operating on public property;					
24	(C) Provide a waste receptacle for customers which is clearly marked and request its use					
25	by customers;					
26	(D) Pick up, remove, and dispose of all refuse within twenty-five (25) feet of the vendor's					
27	operating area at the conclusion of service;					
28	(E) Submit to and pass any required health inspections pursuant to §16-2S-8 of this code;					
29	<u>and</u>					
30	(F) Display its mobile food vendor license and inspection certificate in a conspicuous					
31	location for public view.					

32	(2) A mobile food vendor operating at a temporary mass gathering that occurs over					
33	multiple days may operate in a stationary manner for the duration of the temporary mass					
34	gathering, not to exceed fourteen consecutive days, without moving or changing location if the					
35	mobile food vendor maintains sanitary conditions.					
36	(d) Rulemaking authority.					
37	(1) The department may promulgate administrative rules regulating mobile food vendors to					
38	implement this Act. Any rule adopted by the department must be narrowly tailored to address a					
39	demonstrable health or safety risk.					
40	(2) Rules adopted pursuant to this section may not:					
41	(A) Require a mobile food vendor to operate a specific distance from the perimeter of an					
42	existing commercial establishment or restaurant;					
43	(B) Require a mobile food vendor to obtain licenses, permits or background checks for the					
44	vendor's employees;					
45	(C) Require a mobile food vendor to enter into any agreement with a commercial					
46	establishment or restaurant;					
47	(D) Address the operating hours of a mobile food vendor;					
48	(E) Require a mobile food vendor that sells only prepackaged food to have a handwashing					
49	sink in the vendor's food vending vehicle;					
50	(F) Require a mobile food vendor to associate with a commissary if the vendor carries the					
51	equipment necessary to comply with the regulations of the county health department;					
52	(G) Restrict a mobile food vendor's propane capacity below the capacity allowed by state					
53	law for commercial vehicles.					
54	(H) Limit the number of mobile food vendor licenses issued;					
55	(I) Require a mobile food vendor to obtain any additional permits from a local authority,					
56	unless the mobile food vendor seeks to operate in a local, public park;					
57	(J) Require a mobile food vendor to be fingerprinted;					

58	(K) Require a mobile food vendor to install a GPS tracking device on the vendor's vehicle;						
59	(L) Require a mobile food vendor to stay in constant motion except for when serving

31	(M) Require a mobile food vendor to maintain insurance that names a local authority as an						
62	additional insured unless the vendor is attending an event sponsored by the local authority or						
63	operating in a public park;						
64	(N) Require a mobile food vendor to obtain a bond that names a local authority as a						
65	beneficiary unless the vendor is attending an event sponsored by the local authority or operating in						
66	a public park;						
67	(O) Require a food vending vehicle to receive a fire inspection if the vehicle can						
88	demonstrate that it has passed a state or local fire inspection within the previous year; and						
69	(P) Require a mobile food vendor to submit to health inspections beyond those conducted						
70	by the department or by a local authority under a collaborative agreement, unless the department						
71	is investigating a reported foodborne illness.						
	§16-2S-8. Food safety; health inspections for mobile food vendors.						
1	(a) Food hygiene standards. Mobile food vendors shall follow the regulations of the County						
2	Health Department for the county in which the food truck lists on its business license.						
3	(b) Recordkeeping. The department shall establish and maintain a statewide database for						
4	the department and local authorities to use to record the names of licensees, inspections,						
5	inspection reports, and public complaints. The database shall also permit mobile food vendors to						
6	provide periodic itineraries to the department.						
7	(c) Inspection certificate. Upon completion of an inspection, the department, or local						
8	authority operating under a collaborative agreement, shall issue a certificate to the mobile food						
9	vendor displaying the vendor's letter grade or achievement of excellence and record the grade in						
10	the state's database. The mobile food vender shall display its cortificate indicating its letter grade						
	the state's database. The mobile food vendor shall display its certificate indicating its letter grade						

12	(e) Frequency of Inspections. Health inspections shall occur on a randomized basis,						
13	pursuant to the following frequency, based on the mobile food vendor's classification: A Mobile						
14	Food Vendor shall be inspected once per calendar year						
	§16-2S-9. Regulation by Local Authority						
1	Limitation on local regulation. In relation to the operations of a state-licensed mobile food						
2	vendor, a local authority may not:						
3	(1) Prohibit or restrict a mobile food vendor from operating in a lawful manner provided for						
4	in this Act;						
5	(2) Address the operating hours of a mobile food vendor;						
6	(3) Require a mobile food vendor to receive any special permit from the local authority in						
7	addition to a state mobile food vending license or permit to operate as a commercial vehicle,						
8	unless the mobile food vendor seeks to operate in a local, public park;						
9	(4) Require a mobile food vendor to pay an additional fee to the local authority to operate						
10	on private property or require a private property owner to submit a zoning plan to the local authority						
11	as a condition of allowing vending on the owner's property;						
12	(5) Require a mobile food vendor to obtain licenses, permits or background checks for the						
13	vendor's employees;						
14	(6) Require a food vending vehicle to receive a fire inspection if the vehicle car						
15	demonstrate that it has passed a state or local fire inspection within the previous year;						
16	(7) Restrict the duration of time a mobile food vendor may operate on private property in						
17	zoning districts where food service establishments operate;						
18	(8) Require a mobile food vendor to operate a specific distance from restaurants o						
19	commercial establishments;						
20	(9) Require a mobile food vendor to enter into any agreement with a commercial						
21	establishment or restaurant;						
22	(10) Regulate the equipment requirements for a food vending vehicle;						

23	(11) Restrict a mobile food vendor's propane capacity below the capacity allowed by state					
24	law for commercial vehicles.					
25	(12) Require a mobile food vendor to associate with a commissary;					
26	(13) Require a mobile food vendor to be fingerprinted;					
27	(14) Require a mobile food vendor to install a GPS tracking device on its vehicle;					
28	(15) Require a mobile food vendor to stay in constant motion except for when serving					
29	<u>customers;</u>					
30	(16) Require a mobile food vendor to maintain an insurance policy that names the local					
31	authority as an additional insured unless the vendor is attending an event sponsored by the local					
32	authority or operating in a local, public park.					
33	(17) Require a mobile food vendor to obtain a bond that names the local authority as a					
34	beneficiary unless the vendor is attending an event sponsored by the local authority or operating in					
35	a local, public park; and					
36	(18) Require a mobile food vendor to submit to inspections beyond health inspections					
37	conducted under a collaborative agreement with the department, unless the local authority is					
38	investigating a reported foodborne illness.					
	§16-2S-10. Investigation.					
1	(a) The department or a local authority may investigate a mobile food vendor upon					
2	reasonable suspicion the vendor is violating the law or upon receipt of a health or safety complaint.					
3	Any complaint shall be recorded in the state's mobile food vending database. The local authority					
4	shall report suspected violations of state law to the department and may recommend the					
5	department suspend or revoke a mobile food vending license.					
6	(b) The mobile food vendor shall cooperate with the department or local authority during an					
7	investigation. Failure to cooperate with the department or local authority may result in suspension					
8	or revocation of a license.					
9	(c) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to impede the department or local authority in any					

10 <u>investigation of a reported foodborne illness.</u>

§16-2S-12. Right to appeal.

§16-2S-13. Preemption.

- This Act preempts local authorities from prohibiting mobile food vending and regulating
- 2 mobile food vending in conflict with this Act.
