§3-1C-3.Electionobserversqualification.1(a) Qualifications of Observers.

2 (1) A letter of appointment by the political party, third-party organization, or candidate may

3 serve as the written credential necessary to conduct observation at a voting or ballot-reviewing

- 4 and ballot-counting location.
- 5 (2) The observer shall present the letter of appointment to the appropriate election official
- 6 <u>upon entering the voting or ballot-reviewing and ballot-counting location and be prepared to show</u>
- 7 identification if requested.
- 8 (b) Observer Access and Identification:

9 (1) Badges: The appropriate election official shall furnish to each election observer a

10 badge containing the words "Official Observer," the name of the observer, and the primary or

11 <u>election in which the observer may serve. The observer shall wear his or her badge at all times</u>

12	while he or she is serving as an observer at any voting or ballot-reviewing and ballot-counting
13	location.
14	(2) Observation at a Voting Location: Subject to rules promulgated by the Secretary of
15	State, observers may have complete access to all activities at each location, except for actual
16	observation of the votes being cast by individuals so as to maintain confidentiality of individual
17	votes. At a minimum, observers may be provided access to the following:
18	(A) Opening of election offices and voting locations;
19	(B) Closing of election offices and voting location;
20	(C) Transport of ballots from the voting location to a receiving site (using a separate
21	vehicle); and
22	(D) Any other significant voting or processing activities at the voting location that does not
23	interfere with or impede the election procedures or staff or compromise the secret nature of a
24	voter's ballot.
25	(3) Observation at a Ballot-Reviewing or Ballot-Counting Location: Subject to rules
26	promulgated by the Secretary of State observers may be permitted to observe each point where
27	ballots are handled or transferred from one election official to another including, but not limited to,
28	areas where the following activities take place:
29	(A) Receiving the ballots at an election office;
30	(B) Verifying voter registration information and signatures and inspecting and reviewing the
31	ballots;
32	(C) Duplicating defective or other ballots;
33	(D) Adjudicating ballots including provisional ballots;
34	(E) Receiving electronic media or processing voting results;
35	(F) Tabulation of ballots; and
36	(G) Any other significant tabulation or processing activities at an election office that does
37	not interfere with or impede the election procedures or staff except that the observation of these

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39 (4) Recording Devices: Subject to rules promulgated by the Secretary of State observers

40 may also be allowed to take handwritten notes and have recording devices of any kind at each

- 41 polling and ballot-reviewing or ballot-counting location to record all actions occurring there, except
- 42 for completion of ballots by individual voters.
- 43 (5) Cameras: Election officials may welcome observation, and cameras shall be stationed

44 in all polling and ballot-reviewing and ballot-counting locations so that the public can watch

- 45 <u>elections and the canvassing and tabulation of ballots as these events are transpiring.</u>
- 46 (6) Full Access: Election officials may not station observers so that they cannot fully
- 47 <u>observe in the same manner as election officials the voting process including such procedures as</u>
- 48 the opening of absentee ballots and the verification process. The failure of an election official to
- 49 comply with this requirement may subject the official to sanctions, up to and including suspension
- 50 and termination.
- 51 (7) Open to the Public: The testing of voting equipment shall be open to public observation.
- 52 Post-election audits and recounts shall also be open to public observation.

§3-1C-4.	Secretary	of	State	to	propose	rules.

1 The Secretary of State shall propose rules for legislative approval in accordance with the

2 provisions of §29A-3-1 et seq. of this code as may be necessary to standardize and make effective

3 the provisions of this article.
