A BILL to amend and reenact §61-6-25 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to
prohibiting evidence of accusations of committing false allegations of child abuse in Family
Court proceedings unless an individual has been convicted of that crime.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
