1 A BILL amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article,
2 designated §31A-2C-1, §31A-2C-2, §31A-2C-3, §31A-2C-4, §31A-2C-5, §31A-2C-6, and
3 §31A-2C-7, relating to enacting the Banking and Financial Services Provider Protections
4 for Eligible Adults from Financial Exploitation; providing findings, purpose, and intent to
5 provide immunities to certain persons for government disclosure of information when
6 financial exploitation of an eligible adult is suspected; providing definitions; permitting
7 disclosure of eligible persons financial information to certain third parties and designated
8 government agencies; authorizing depository institutions, broker-dealers, and investment
9 advisors to delay, refuse, or prevent certain activities and transactions to prevent financial
10 exploitation of an eligible adult; and proscribing immunities for depository institutions,
11 broker-dealers, and investment advisors.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 2C. BANKING AND FINANCIAL SERVICES PROVIDER PROTECTIONS
FOR ELIGIBLE ADULTS FROM FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION.

§31A-2C-1. Short title.

1 This article may be cited as "Banking and Financial Services Provider Protections for
2 Eligible Adults from Financial Exploitation".

§31A-2C-2. Legislative findings, purpose and intent.

1 (1) The Legislature recognizes that depository institutions, broker-dealers, and investment
2 advisers have duties imposed by law and by contract to conduct customer-directed transactions in
3 a timely manner, and in accordance with their customers' instructions.

4 (2) The Legislature recognizes that customers are increasingly being induced to authorize
5 transactions that are not in their interest.

6 (3) It is the intent of the Legislature to:

7 (a) Ensure that eligible adults have ready access to their funds;

8 (b) Provide depository institutions, broker-dealers, and investment advisers with the tools
9 and protections to intervene in customer-directed transactions when, in their discretion, the
10 transaction presents potential significant risk of harm to the customer; and

11 (c) Provide designated state agencies with the tools and information to investigate
12 potential financial exploitation.

13 (4) The Legislature does not intend to create a duty for depository institutions, broker-
14 dealers, and investment advisers to contravene the valid instructions of their customers and
15 nothing in this chapter creates such a duty.

§31A-2C-3.

Definitions

1 As used in this article, the following terms and phrases have the following meanings:

2 "Associated third-party" means an individual:

3 (1) Who is a parent, spouse, adult child, sibling, or other family member of an eligible adult
4 whom a depository institution, broker-dealer, and/or investment adviser believes is closely
5 associated with the eligible adult;

6 (2) Whom an eligible adult authorizes the depository institution, broker dealer, and/or
7 investment adviser to contact;

8 (3) Who is a co-owner, additional authorized signatory, or beneficiary on an eligible adult's
9 account or an agent under a power of attorney; or

10 (4) Who is an attorney, trustee, conservator, or other fiduciary whom a court or a
11 government agency selects to manage some or all of the financial affairs of the eligible adult.

12 "Account" means any of the following:

13 (1) A contract of deposit of funds between the depositor and a Depository Institution and:

14 (A) The account is a consumer account owned by an eligible adult, whether individually or
15 with one or more other persons; or

16 (B) An eligible adult is a beneficiary of a conservatorship account or guardianship account;

17 or

18 (C) The account is a line of credit owned by an eligible adult, whether individually or with
19 one or more other persons.

20 (2) Any account of a broker-dealer or investment adviser for which a client or customer has
21 the authority to transact business.

22 "Broker-dealer" shall have the same meaning as defined in §32-4-401 of this code.

23 "Depository institution" shall have the same meaning as §31-17A-2 of this code.

24 "Designated state agency" means the entity responsible for receiving reports of alleged or
25 suspected maltreatment or financial exploitation of an eligible adult including the West Virginia
26 Department of Human Services Bureau for Social Services and the West Virginia Attorney
27 General.

28 "Eligible adult" means:

29 (1) A person 65 years of age or older or a person subject to §9-6-1 et seq. of this code; or

30 (2) A person 18 years or older who

31 (A) Has a substantial mental or functional impairment that significantly interferes with his or
32 her ability to make financial decisions or for whom a conservator has been appointed under state
33 law; and

34 (B) The depository institution, broker-dealer, and/or investment adviser has actual
35 knowledge that the person has an appointed guardian under state law.

36 "Financial exploitation" means:

37 (1) The wrongful or unauthorized taking, withholding, appropriation, expenditure, or use of
38 money, assets, or property owned by an eligible adult; or

39 (2) An act or omission taken by a person, including through the use of a power of attorney,
40 guardianship, trustee, or conservatorship of an eligible adult, to:

41 (A) Obtain control, through deception, intimidation, or undue influence, over the eligible
42 adult's money, assets, or property to deprive the eligible adult of the ownership, use, benefit, or
43 possession of the eligible adult's money, assets, or property; or

44 (B) Convert money, assets, or property of the eligible adult to deprive the eligible adult of
45 the ownership, use, benefit, or possession of the eligible adult's money, assets, or property.

46 "Investment adviser" has the same meaning as defined in §32-4-401 of this code.

§31A-2C-4. Government disclosures.

1 A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s) who
2 believe that financial exploitation of an eligible adult has occurred, may have been attempted, or is
3 being attempted, the depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their
4 employee(s) shall promptly notify a designated state agency.

§31A-2C-5. Authority to delay, refuse, or prevent certain activities.

1 (a) When, based on information they have individually observed or information they have
2 received from a government agency or a law-enforcement agency, a depository institution, broker-
3 dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s) believe that financial exploitation of an
4 eligible adult may have occurred, has been attempted, is occurring, or is being attempted, the
5 depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s) may, but are
6 not required to:

7 (1) Delay or refuse one or more transactions with or involving the eligible adult;

8 (2) Delay or refuse to permit the withdrawal or disbursement of funds contained in the
9 eligible adult's account;

10 (3) Prevent a change in ownership of the eligible adult's account;

11 (4) Prevent a transfer of funds from the eligible adult's account to an account owned wholly
12 or partially by another person;

13 (5) Refuse to comply with instructions given to the depository institution, broker-dealer, or
14 investment adviser by an agent or a person acting for or with an agent under a power of attorney
15 signed or purported to have been signed by the eligible adult; or

16 (6) Prevent the designation or change the designation of beneficiaries to receive any
17 property, benefit, or contract rights for an eligible adult at death.

18 (b) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s)
19 are not required to act under subsection (a) of this section when provided with information alleging
20 that financial exploitation may have occurred, may have been attempted, is occurring, or is being
21 attempted, but may use their sole discretion to determine whether or not to act under subsection
22 (a) of this section based on the information available to them at the time.

23 (c) The authority to delay a transaction set forth in subsection (a) of this section expires:

24 (1) Fifteen business days after the date on which the depository institution, broker-dealer,
25 and/or investment adviser first acted under subsection (a) of this section;

26 (2) When the depository institution, broker-dealer, and/or investment adviser is satisfied in
27 its sole discretion that the transaction or act will not likely result in financial exploitation of the
28 eligible adult; or

29 (3) Upon an order of a court of competent jurisdiction directing the release of funds.

30 (d) Unless otherwise directed by order of a court of competent jurisdiction, a depository
31 institution, broker-dealer, and/or investment adviser may extend the duration of a delay under
32 subsection (c) of this section based on a reasonable belief that the financial exploitation of an
33 eligible adult may continue to occur or continue to be attempted.

34 (e) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the refusal to engage in a transaction as
35 authorized under subsection (a) of this section may not constitute the wrongful dishonor of an item
36 under §46-4-101 *et seq.* of this code.

37 (f) A reasonable belief that payment of a check will facilitate the financial exploitation of an
38 eligible adult shall constitute reasonable grounds to doubt the collectability of the item for
39 purposes of the federal Check Clearing for the 21st Century Act, 12 U.S.C. § 5001 *et seq.*, the
40 federal Expedited Funds Availability Act, 12 U.S.C. § 4001 *et seq.*, and 12 C.F.R. part 229. Nothing
41 herein, however, requires depository institutions, broker-dealers, investment advisers, and/or their
42 employee(s), to review the checks of eligible adults.

43 (g) A delay or refusal to complete a funds transfer request as authorized under subsection

44 (a) of this section does not violate §46-4A- 1 et seq. of this code: *Provided*, That if a transaction is
45 delayed under subsection (a) of this section, the payment order is not considered as received until
46 the hold is removed and the depository institution and/or broker dealer submits the payment order
47 for processing. Funds transfer and payment order shall have the same meaning as defined in
48 §46-4A-1 et seq. of this code.

§31A-2C-6. Third Party Notifications

1 (a) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s)
2 may notify an associated third-party, if any, if the depository institution, broker-dealer, investment
3 adviser, or their employee(s) believe that the financial exploitation of the eligible adult is occurring,
4 has or may have occurred, is being attempted, or has been or may have been attempted.

5 (b) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s),
6 may choose not to notify an associated third-party as described in subsection (a) of this section, if
7 the depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, or employee(s) believe that the
8 associated third party is, may be, or may have been engaged in the financial exploitation of the
9 eligible adult.

10 (c) When providing information under subsection (a) of this section, a depository
11 institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s) may limit the information
12 provided to disclosing their suspicion that the eligible adult may be a victim or target of financial
13 exploitation.

14 (d) Any disclosure under subsection (a) of this section is exempt from coverage by state
15 privacy laws and/or requirements.

§31A-2C-7. Immunities

1 (a) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, or their employee(s) who
2 makes, or chooses not to make a disclosure pursuant to §31A-2C-4 of this code, notify an
3 associated third-party pursuant to §31A-2C-6 of this code, or participate in a judicial proceeding,
4 administrative proceeding, or investigation arising from a notification or report, are immune from

5 any civil, criminal, or administrative liability arising from the disclosure, non-disclosure, notification,
6 or participation, unless the depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, or their
7 employee(s) had actual knowledge of financial exploitation and acted with a malicious purpose.

8 (b) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employee(s)
9 delays, refuses, or prevents a transaction pursuant to §31A-2C-5 of this code, or decides not to
10 delay, refuse, or prevent a transaction pursuant to §31A-2C-5 of this code, are immune from any
11 civil, criminal, or administrative liability resulting from that action or inaction, unless the depository
12 institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, or their employee(s) acted with actual knowledge of
13 the financial exploitation and with intent to assist in the furtherance of such financial exploitation.

14 (c) A depository institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employees who
15 accepts from the eligible adult the designation of an associated third-party, the depository
16 institution, broker-dealer, investment adviser, and/or their employees are immune from any civil,
17 criminal, or administrative liability resulting from an assertion that the information provided by the
18 eligible adult regarding the associated third-party was not validated by the depository, broker-
19 dealer, investment adviser, and or their employees.
