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A BILL to amend and reenact §62-6B-2 and §62-6B-3 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as
amended, relating to amending the definition of "child witness", also relating to allowing
testimony of child witnesses by closed-circuit television in matters that allege physical,
sexual, or psychological abuse to the child.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

# ARTICLE 6B. PROTECTION AND PRESERVATION OF STATEMENTS AND TESTIMONY OF CHILD WITNESS.

#### §62-6B-2.

#### Definitions.

For the purposes of this article, the words or terms defined in this section, and any variation of those words or terms required by the context, have the meanings ascribed to them in this section. These definitions are applicable unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context.

5 (1) "Child witness" means a person under the age of sixteen years of age who is or will be 6 called to testify in a criminal matter concerning an <u>any</u> alleged violation of the provisions of 7 sections three, four, five and seven, article eight-b, chapter sixty-one of this code in which the child 8 is the alleged victim.

9 (2) "Live, closed-circuit television" means a simultaneous transmission, by closed-circuit
10 television or other electronic means, between the courtroom and the testimonial room.

(3) "Operator" means the individual authorized by the court to operate the closed-circuit
 television equipment used in accordance with the provisions of this article.

(4) "Testimonial room" means a room within the courthouse other than the courtroom from
which the testimony of a child witness or the defendant is transmitted to the courtroom by means of
live, closed-circuit television.

(5) "Interviewed child" shall mean any person under the age of eighteen who has been
 interviewed by means of any type of recording equipment in connection with alleged criminal

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18 behavior or allegations of abuse or neglect of any child under the age of eighteen.

(6) "Recorded interview" means any electronic recording of the interview, and any 19 20 transcript thereof, of an interviewed child conducted by: (1) An employee or representative of a 21 child advocacy center as that term is defined in section one hundred one, article three, chapter 22 forty-nine §49-3-101 of this code; (2) any psychologist, psychiatrist, physician, nurse, social 23 worker or other person appointed by the court to interview the interviewed child as provided in 24 subsection (c), section three of this article §62-6B-3(c) of this code; or (3) a child protective 25 services worker, law-enforcement officer, prosecuting attorney or any representative of his or her 26 office, or any other person investigating allegations of criminal behavior or behavior alleged to 27 constitute abuse or neglect of a child.

# §62-6B-3. Findings of fact required for taking testimony of child witness by closed-circuit television; considerations for court.

(a) Upon a written motion filed by the prosecuting attorney, the child's attorney or the child's
 guardian ad litem, and upon findings of fact determined pursuant to subsection (b) of this section,
 a circuit court may order that the testimony of a child witness may be taken at a pretrial proceeding
 or at trial through the use of live, closed-circuit television.

5 (b) Prior to ordering that the testimony of a child witness may be taken through the use of 6 live, closed-circuit television, the circuit court must find by clear and convincing evidence, after 7 conducting an evidentiary hearing on this issue, that:

8 (1) The child is an otherwise competent witness;

9 (2) That, absent the use of live, closed-circuit television the child witness will be unable to
10 testify due solely to being required to be in the physical presence of the defendant while testifying;
(3) The child witness can only testify if live, two-way closed-circuit television is used in the

12 trial; and

(4) That the state's ability to proceed against the defendant without the child witness' live
testimony would be substantially impaired or precluded.

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- (c) The court shall consider the following factors in determining the necessity of allowing a
  child witness to testify by the use of live, closed-circuit television:
- 17 (1) The age and maturity of the child witness;
- 18 (2) The facts and circumstances of the alleged offense;

(3) The necessity of the child's live testimony to the prosecution's ability to proceed as well
as any prejudice to the defendant by allowing testimony through closed-circuit television;

(4) Whether or not the facts of the case involve the alleged <u>physical, sexual, or</u>
 <u>psychological abuse to the child witness</u>, infliction of bodily injury to the child witness or the threat
 of bodily injury to the child witness, or another; and

24 (5) Any mental or physical handicap of the child witness.

25 (d) In determining whether to allow a child witness to testify through live, closed-circuit 26 television the court shall appoint a psychiatrist or a licensed psychologist with at least five years 27 clinical experience who shall serve as an advisor or friend of the court to provide the court with an 28 expert opinion as to whether, to a reasonable degree of professional certainty, the child witness 29 will suffer severe emotional harm, be unable to testify based solely on being in the physical 30 presence of the defendant while testifying and that the child witness does not evidence signs of being subjected to undue influence or coercion. The opinion of the psychiatrist or licensed 31 32 psychologist shall be filed with the circuit court at least thirty days prior to the final hearing on the 33 use of live, closed-circuit television and the defendant shall be allowed to review the opinion and 34 present evidence on the issue by the use of an expert or experts or otherwise.

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
