1 A BILL to amend and reenact §3-9-9 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to 2 clarifying the definition of electioneering; describing certain prohibited electioneering 3 information or activity; exempting from the definition of "electioneering" certain activity and 4 materials; permitting voters to use cellular phones within the electioneering prohibition 5 zone under certain circumstances; prohibiting taking photos or videos in and around a 6 place where voting is conducted; providing exceptions to prohibition on photographs and 7 videos; permitting a voter's use of candidate list and public questions in polling place; 8 permitting certain persons to enforce election laws and maintain law and order inside the 9 prohibited zone; and permitting certain persons to seek assistance from law-enforcement 10 officer.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

### **ARTICLE 9. OFFENSES AND PENALITIES.**

#### §3-9-9. Electioneering defined; unlawful acts at polling places; exceptions; penalties.

1	(a) As used in this section, "electioneering" means the displaying of signs or other
2	campaign paraphernalia, the distribution of campaign literature, cards, or handbills, the soliciting
3	of signatures to any petition, or the solicitation of votes for or against any bona fide candidate or
4	ballot question in a manner which expressly advocates the election or defeat of the candidate or
5	expressly advocates the passage or defeat of the ballot question. visible display or audible
6	dissemination of information that advocates for or against any candidate or ballot question.
7	(b) Prohibited electioneering information or activity includes, but is not limited to, any of
8	the following:
9	(1) A display of a candidate or candidate's committee name, likeness, or logo;
10	(2) A display of a ballot question's number, title, subject, or logo;
11	(3) Buttons, hats, pencils, pens, shirts, pins, signs, stickers, and similar items that contain
12	electioneering information;

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13 (4) The distribution of campaign literature, cards, or handbills containing electioneering

14 <u>information;</u>

- 15 (5) The soliciting of signatures to any petition; and
- 16 (6) The verbal or electronic soliciting of votes for or against any bona fide candidate or
- 17 <u>ballot question in a manner which expressly advocates the election or defeat of the candidate or</u>

18 expressly advocates the passage or defeat of the ballot question.

19 (c) "Electioneering" does not include:

20 (1) A representative of the news media conducting exit polling, so as long as persons
 21 conducting exit polling are not otherwise engaging in electioneering activities described above in
 22 subsection (b) of this section;

- (2) <u>bumper Bumper</u> stickers or signs affixed to a person's vehicle which is parked within
  or passing through a distance of 100 feet of the entrance to a polling place while such <u>that</u> person
  is voting or transporting any voter to the polls<u>: and</u>
- 26 (3) Educational materials or information pertaining to a ballot question, number, title,

27 <u>subject, or logo, in a manner that permits a reasonable interpretation other than express advocacy</u>

28 for or against its passage or defeat.

(b) (d) No An officer of election may not disclose to any person the name of any candidate
 for whom a voter has voted. No An officer of election may not do any electioneering on election
 day.

32 (c) (e) No <u>A</u> person may <u>not</u> do any electioneering on election day within any polling place, 33 or within 100 feet of the outside entrance to the building housing the polling place. No <u>A</u> person 34 may <u>not</u> do any electioneering in the polling place or within 100 feet of the outside entrance of 35 any polling place where early voting is conducted during the period in which early voting is offered 36 during the hours while <del>such</del> early voting is actually taking place. Nothing in this subsection <del>shall</del> 37 <del>prohibit</del> <u>prohibits</u> a citizen from doing any electioneering upon his or her own private property,

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regardless of distance from the polling place, so <u>as</u> long as that electioneering conforms to other
 existing laws and ordinances.

40 (d) (f) Voters may use cellular telephones or other electronic devices within 100 feet of 41 any entrance to the building in which voting is conducted, while voting is taking place, as long as 42 electioneering or loud or disruptive conversations do not occur. 43 (1) A person may not take photographs or videos within 100 feet of any entrance to the 44 building in which voting is conducted, nor may a person take photographs inside the building or 45 room where voting is conducted, while voting is taking place: Provided, That photographs or videos of potential violations of law may be taken if provided to the Office of the Secretary of State 46 47 or law enforcement for investigative purposes.

48 (2) A voter may bring into the polling place a list of candidates and public questions for the
 49 voter's use including, but not limited to, a list stored on a cellular telephone or similar electronic
 50 device, as long as electioneering does not occur.

51 (e) (g) No A person may not apply for or receive any ballot in any polling place, other than 52 that in which the person is entitled to vote, nor may any person examine a ballot which any voter 53 has prepared for voting, or solicit the voter to show the same, nor ask, nor make any arrangement, 54 directly or indirectly, with any voter, to vote an open ballot. No A person, except a commissioner 55 of election, may not receive from any voter a ballot prepared by him or her for voting. No A voter 56 may not receive a ballot from any person other than one of the poll clerks; nor may any person 57 other than a poll clerk deliver a ballot to a commissioner of election to be voted by such the 58 commissioner. No A voter may not deliver any ballot to a commissioner of election to be voted, except the one he or she receives from the poll clerk. No A voter may not place any mark upon 59 60 his or her ballot or suffer or permit any other person to do so, by which it may be afterward 61 identified as the ballot voted by him or her.

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- 62 (f) (h) Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be is guilty of a misdemeanor 63 and, on upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000, or 64 confined in jail for not more than one year, or both fined and confined.
- 65 (i) Any precinct election official, county clerk, deputy county clerk, municipal election
  66 official, or any law-enforcement official may enforce the election laws and maintain law and order
- 67 at the polling place and within 100 feet of any entrance to the building in which voting is conducted.
- 68 (j) Any precinct election official, county clerk, deputy county clerk, or municipal election
- 69 official may request the assistance of any law-enforcement officer.
