## Senate Bill 595

[Introduced February 25, 2025; referred

to the Committee on the Judiciary]

A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new article,
designated §20-20-1, §20-20-2, §20-20-3, §20-20-4, §20-20-5, §20-20-6, §20-20-7, §2020-8, and §20-20-9, relating to creating the Mountain Bike Responsibility Act; stating a
legislative purpose; defining terms; providing for the duties and liabilities of trail system
operators, mountain bicyclists, and passengers on aerial passenger tramways; and
providing a release for minor participants.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

10	"Mountain Bike trails" means all mountain bike trails designated by the trail system					
11	operator to be used by mountain bicyclists for the purpose of participating in the sport of mountain					
12	biking including, but not limited, to downhill trails, cross-country trails, free ride trails, pump tracks					
13	and skills areas.					
14	"Passenger" means any person who is lawfully using an aerial passenger tramway, or is					
15	waiting to embark, or has recently disembarked from an aerial passenger tramway and is in its					
16	immediate vicinity.					
17	"Trail system area" means the property owned, leased, or authorized under a special use					
18	permit, and under the control of the trail system operator.					
19	"Trail system operator" means any person, partnership, corporation, or other commercia					
20	entity, its agents, officers, employees, or representatives, who has, as part of a commercial					
21	private, or for-profit endeavor, operational responsibility for mountain bicycling activities at any trail					
22	system area and the use of an aerial passenger tramway for such purpose. Trail system operato					
23	does not include any public or non-profit corporation, its agents, officers, employees, o					
24	representatives, who has operational responsibility of mountain bicycling activities at any tra					
25	system area.					
	<u>§20-20-3. Duties of trail system operators with respect to trail system.</u>					
1	Every trail system operator shall:					
2	(1) Maintain a trail board at a prominent location at the trail system area displaying that					
3	area's network of mountain bike trails;					
4	(2) Designate and mark conspicuously all mountain bike trails with a name and color, or					
5	symbol recognized in the mountain biking industry reflecting the relative degree of difficulty of the					
6	mountain bike trail. Such designation shall be at or near the top or entrance of the mountain bike					
7	trail. Any mountain bike trail which is closed shall be so marked at the trailhead;					
8	(3) Follow published operational industry standards and guidelines;

9	(4) Provide internal trained and dedicated emergency response personnel or enter into an				
10	adequate emergency response plan with a local fire or EMS agency, or post at the trail board				
11	maintained under subdivision (1) of this section, instructions on how to contact emergency				
12	response personnel;				
13	(5) Maintain the mountain bike trails in a reasonably safe condition, except that such trail				
14	system operator shall not be responsible for any injury, loss or damage caused by the following:				
15	uneven or slippery rail and feature conditions; varying slopes and terrain; bumps; stumps; trees;				
16	roots; forest growth; cliffs; rock and rock drops; loose gravel and dirt; wet surfaces; holes and				
17	potholes; downed timber; debris; depressions; other bicyclists; dark tunnels; jumps; bridges; dirt or				
18	wood features/jumps; elevated features; and other constructed features; lift loading and				
19	unloading; padded and nonpadded barriers; paved surfaces; collisions with vehicles, pedestrians,				
20	wildlife, heavy equipment that is identified as dangerous and/or a hazardous work zone; properly				
21	marked permanent structures, or other similar objects; and mechanical or other failure of rental or				
22	personal equipment;				
23	(6) Post at the trail board maintained under subdivision (1) of this section the following				
24	language:				
25	WARNING – ASSUMPTION OF RISKS:				
26	Under West Virginia law, every mountain bicyclist is considered to have accepted, and to				
27	have knowledge of, the risk of injury (including death) to the mountain bicyclist, as well as damage				
28	to property of the mountain bicyclist. Under West Virginia law, every mountain bicyclist has the				
29	duty to take the precautions that are necessary to avoid injury or death, as well as damage to				
30	property. West Virginia law sets forth certain limitations on the liability of trail system operators for				
31	injury or death to a bicyclist, as well as damage to property;				
32	(7) Post a sign at all aerial passenger tramways that advises the passengers to seek				
33	advice if not familiar with riding the aerial passenger tramway; and				
34	(8) Construct, operate, maintain, and repair any aerial passenger tramway in accordance

- 10 padded and nonpadded barriers; paved surfaces; collisions with vehicles, pedestrians, wildlife, 11 heavy equipment or other similar objects; and mechanical or other failure of rental or personal 12 equipment. 13 (c) Each mountain bicyclist shall have the sole individual responsibility for knowing the 14 range of his or her own ability to negotiate any trail. Further, it shall be the duty of each mountain 15 bicyclist to ride within the limits of the mountain bicyclist's own ability; to maintain reasonable 16 control of speed and course at all times while mountain bicycling; to heed all posted warnings; to 17 mountain bicycle only on a bike trail area designated by the trail system operator; to assess the 18 difficulty of mountain bike trails; to be able to stop or avoid other individuals and objects; and to 19 refrain from acting in a manner which may cause or contribute to the injury of anyone. 20 (d) If involved in a collision with another individual that results in injury, it shall be the duty of 21 a mountain bicyclist to remain in the vicinity of the collision until giving his or her name and current 22 address to a representative of the trail system operator or to all other parties to the collision except 23 to secure aid for a person injured in a collision. A mountain bicyclist who leaves the vicinity to 24 secure aid shall provide his or her name and current address after securing the aid. 25 (e) If while mountain bicycling any mountain bicyclist collides with any object or person, 26 except an obviously intoxicated person of whom the trail system operator is aware, the 27 responsibility for such collision shall be solely that of the mountain bicyclist or mountain bicyclists 28 involved and not that of the trail system operator. §20-20-6. Liability of trail system operator. 1 (a) A trail system operator may be liable for injury, loss, or damage caused by its failure to 2 follow the duties set forth in §20-20-4 of this code where the violation of duty is causally related to
  - 3 the injury, loss, or damage suffered.
  - 4 (b) A trail system operator is not liable for any injury, loss, or damage caused by the
    5 negligence of any person who is not an agent or employee of the trail system operator.
  - 6 (c) A trail system operator is not liable for any injury, loss, or damage caused by a mountain

- 7 <u>bicyclist or passenger's violation of any duty described in this article.</u>
- 8 (d) Every trail system operator shall carry public liability insurance in limits of no less than
- 9 \$100,000 per person, \$300,000 per occurrence, and \$10,000 for property damage.
  - §20-20-7. Liability of passengers.
- 1 <u>Any passenger may be liable for injury, loss, or damage resulting from violations of the</u>
- 2 <u>duties established in §20-20-4 of this code where the violation of duty is causally related to the</u>
- 3 injury, loss, or damage suffered.
  - §20-20-8. Liability of mountain bicyclist.
- 1 Any mountain bicyclist may be liable for injury, loss, or damage resulting from violations of
- 2 the duties established in §20-20-5 of this code where the violation of duty is causally related to the
- 3 injury, loss, or damage suffered.

## §20-20-9. Release of minor participant.

- 1 <u>A parent or guardian of a minor participant may execute a release assuming responsibility</u>
- 2 for the risks of the minor participant. The release must give notice to the minor participant, and the
- 3 parent or guardian, of the risks associated with the release.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to create the Mountain Bike Responsibility Act and provide for duties of trail system operators, mountain bicyclists, and passengers on aerial passenger tramways.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from a heading or the present law and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
