A BILL to amend and reenact §5B-11-1, §5B-11-2, §5B-11-3, and §5B-11-4 of the Code of West
 Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to the King Coal Highway Economic Advisory Board
 Act; renaming the West Virginia Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor Authority the
 King Coal Highway Economic Advisory Board; modifying legislative findings for creation of
 advisory board; reducing membership of advisory board to 11 members; modifying
 requirements for members of advisory board; and modifying powers and duties of the
 advisory board.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 11. WEST VIRGINIA ADVANCED ENERGY AND ECONOMIC CORRIDOR AUTHORITY KING COAL HIGHWAY ECONOMIC ADVISORY BOARD ACT.

§5B-11-1. Legislative findings.

1 The Legislature finds that the Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor counties along the 2 King Coal Highway, once known as Tug-Ohio-Levisa-Sandy Improvement Association (TOLSIA) 3 and the King Coal Highway which runs through the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Wayne, 4 and Wyoming has have undergone significant challenges economic damages owing to 5 widespread changes in the national and global economies harmful federal environmental policies 6 and regulations which drastically impacted the domestic market for coal-fired power generation 7 and severely injured the economies of the counties along the King Coal Highway; and every effort 8 should be made to assist the transformation recovery of these injured regional economies by 9 providing guidance to local governments, businesses, and industries to maximize-reduce 10 unnecessary regulatory obstacles to organic economic development growth and diversification of 11 those economies leverage our abundant natural energy and material resources, encourage 12 entrepreneurship, and support business creation within the region. As part of the National 13 Highway System's I-73/74 corridor from northern Michigan to eastern South Carolina, the 14 Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor King Coal Highway will not only foster greater

transportation efficiencies, but will also provide vital connectivity to bourgeoning markets, resulting
in both job creation and economic expansion in southern West Virginia.

The economic development agencies <u>county commissions</u> along this corridor are aligning efforts to embrace the expansion of the energy and economic development policies adopted by the West Virginia Legislature as a tool for economic development and are focused on efforts to transform and revitalize <u>opportunities presented by our abundant natural resources and our</u> skilled, creative, and hard-working people to <u>support</u> the region by fostering partnerships and initiatives which are complementary and supportive of existing successful industries in West Virginia.

The Legislature, by enactment of this article, intends to facilitate implementation of critical and time-sensitive opportunities for economic development along the Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor the King Coal Highway by establishing an authority advisory board, known as the West Virginia Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor Authority (authority) King Coal Highway Economic Advisory Board, to facilitate assistance to these local entities comprised of the economic development agencies of McDowell, Mercer, Mingo, Wayne, and Wyoming counties.

§5B-11-2. Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor Authority King Coal Highway <u>Economic Advisory Board</u> created; membership; terms; meetings; quorum; compensation and expenses; assistance from Department of Economic Development.

(a) The Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor Authority (authority) <u>King Coal Highway</u>
 <u>Economic Advisory Board</u> is hereby created as an independent body corporate. It shall consist of
 the following 13 <u>11 original</u> members who are involved in economic, commercial, or industrial
 development in the geographic region of the authority:

38	(b) Each member shall serve a term of five years. Members may be reappointed to
39	additional terms and, upon expiration of their respective terms, shall continue to serve until their
40	successor has been appointed. The chair, vice-chair, and officers shall be selected annually by
41	majority vote of the members. The chair shall schedule meetings and set the agenda for each
42	meeting.
43	(c) A majority of members, in person or by real-time electronic communication, constitutes
44	a quorum to conduct business at a meeting.
45	(d) If a member of the authority must recuse himself or herself because of a perceived or
46	actual conflict of interest, a majority of the remaining members of the authority without a conflict
47	shall be sufficient for the conduct of authority business.
48	(e) Members are not entitled to compensation for services performed as members.
	§5B-11-3. Powers and duties of the authority.
1	(a) The authority shall have, but not be limited to, the following powers and duties:
2	(1) Set specific tactical goals and demonstrable objectives via input from member counties
3	and communities;
4	(2) Maintain an inclusive, rather than constraining, a geographic focus on economic

5 development in the counties contained within the King Coal Highway;

6 (3) Seek out private-public partnerships Create and coordinate related RFPs when
 7 necessary to achieve specific objectives related to multi-county projects critical to its vision;

8 (4) Foster partnerships with groups in other states that follow the I-73/74 King Coal
9 <u>Highway corridor</u> to help build broad support for the economic development and infrastructure
10 projects undertaken;

11	(5) Communicate with legislators to discuss Propose legislation for bonding and tax credits
12	to facilitate economic development along the corridor improving the business environment in West
13	Virginia to boost overall competitiveness with other states;
14	(6) Seek governmental engagement for guidance on local <u>or</u> state regional or national
15	initiatives to achieve economic development objectives;
16	(7) Utilize cutting-edge appropriate technologies and innovation platforms where their
17	applications will be most beneficial;
18	(8) Propose Discuss effects of potential legislation to allow regulatory flexibility along
19	corridor expanded boundaries toward the goals and objectives of the advisory board;
20	(9) Develop a memorandum of understanding with the Appalachian Regional Commission
21	in areas of economic development, transportation, tourism, infrastructure, technology, and other
22	areas beneficial to the member counties and communities, and the state; and
23	(10) Develop (9) Identify economic and tourism asset portfolios opportunities for inclusion
24	of the authority's advisory board's vision; and
25	(11) (10) Apply for tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue
26	Code.
27	(b) The authority may also exercise all powers necessary or appropriate to carry out the
28	purposes of this article including, but not limited to, the following:
29	(1) Acquire, own, hold, and dispose of property, real and personal, tangible and intangible;
30	(2) Lease property, whether as lessee or lessor, and to acquire or grant through easement,
31	license, or other appropriate legal form, the right to develop and use property and open it to the use
32	of the public;
33	(3) Mortgage or otherwise grant security interests on its property;
34	(4) Procure insurance against any losses in connection with its property, license or
35	easements, contracts, including hold-harmless agreements, operations, or assets in such
36	amounts and from such insurers as the authority considers desirable;

37 (5) Maintain such sinking funds and reserves as the authority determines appropriate for
 38 the purposes of meeting future monetary obligations and needs of the Authority;

39 (11) Seek advice and expertise from members of the Regional Councils, state or local
 40 economic development agencies, or other governmental, nongovernmental, or private entities as
 41 needed.

42 (6) (12) Contract for the provision of legal services by private counsel and, notwithstanding 43 any other provision of the code to the contrary, the counsel may, in addition to the provisions of 44 other legal services, represent the authority advisory board in court, negotiate contracts and other 45 agreements on behalf of the authority, render advice to the authority advisory board on any matter 46 relating to the authority advisory board, prepare contracts and other agreements, and provide 47 such other legal services as may be requested by the authority advisory board, provided that such 48 expenses are paid out of a dedicated fund established within the advisory board with contributions 49 allocated from participating county commissions;

50 (7) (13) Appoint officers, agents, and employees and to Contract for and engage the 51 services of consultants, provided that such expenses are paid out of a dedicated fund established 52 within the advisory board with contributions allocated from participating county commissions;

(8) (14) Make contracts of every kind and nature and to execute all instruments necessary
or convenient for carrying on its business, including contracts with any other governmental agency
of this state or of the federal government or with any person, individual, partnership, or corporation
to effect any or all of the purposes of this article <u>Coordinate contracts when necessary to complete</u>
multi-county projects critical to achieving the vision of the advisory board;

(9) (15) Without in any way limiting any other provision of this section, accept grants and
 loans from, and enter into contracts and other transactions with, any federal agency; and <u>Seek</u>
 guidance for participating counties in applying for relevant and timely loans and grants from state
 or federal sources; and

62	(10) (16) Accept Coordinate applications and direct gifts or grants of property, funds,
63	security interests, money, materials, labor, supplies, or services from the federal government or
64	from any governmental unit or any person, firm, or corporation and to carry out the terms or
65	provisions of or make agreements with respect to or pledge any gifts or grants and to do any and
66	all things necessary, useful, desirable, or convenient in connection with the procuring, acceptance,
67	or disposition of gifts or grants toward the participating counties.

(c) No liability or obligation is incurred by the authority advisory board-beyond the extent to
which money is awarded for grant acquisition facilitation.

§5B-11-4. the Legislature. Report to 1 On or before December 1, 2024, and annually thereafter, the authority advisory board shall 2 prepare and submit to the Joint Committee on Government and Finance a written report, which 3 may be transmitted electronically, detailing its undertakings for the past year, including, but not 4 limited to, all projects and any private-public partnerships entered into, as well as any 5 recommended legislation or policy actions needed to facilitate greater economic development 6 along the Advanced Energy and Economic Corridor King Coal Highway.
