A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding a new section,
designated §9-5-34, relating to the creation of the West Virginia Child First Advisory
Committee and the West Virginia Child First Fund; creating advisory committee; setting
forth composition of advisory committee; providing duties of advisory committee; providing
for minimum number of meetings; requiring annual findings and report; providing authority
to create subcommittees and working groups; establishing West Virginia Child First Fund;
providing for promulgation of rules; and providing for management of moneys within fund.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 5. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

§9-5-34. Creation of the West Virginia Child First Advisory Committee and the West Virginia Child First Fund.

- (a) There is hereby created the West Virginia Child First Advisory Committee, which shall
 be administered by the Department of Human Services.
- 3 (b) The West Virginia Child First Advisory Committee is comprised of the following 4 members:
- (1) The Cabinet Secretary for the Department of Human Services, or his or her designee,
 who shall also serve as the Chair of the Committee;
- 7 (2) The Foster Care Ombudsman, or his or her designee;
- 8 (3) Two individuals appointed by the Governor who have a background in child welfare
 9 issues, including, but not limited to, the following:
- 10 (A) Child abuse and neglect proceedings in West Virginia;
- 11 (B) Child welfare laws, rules, and regulations;
- 12 (C) The structure and workflow of the components of the child welfare system, including,
 13 but not limited to, abuse and neglect case intake, investigations into abuse and neglect

14	allegations, case management, court processes, placement, reunification, and child permanency
15	plannings; and
16	(D) The permanent and temporary child placement system, including the child foster care
17	system, child placement process, and child adoption process;
18	(4) Two members of the West Virginia House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of
19	the House of Delegates;
20	(5) Two members of the West Virginia Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate;
21	(6) The Speaker of the House of Delegates, or his or her designee;
22	(7) The President of the Senate, or his or her designee; and
23	(8) The Administrative Director of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or his or her designee.
24	(c) The West Virginia Child First Committee shall:
25	(1) Evaluate child welfare outcomes in the state of West Virginia;
26	(2) Evaluate the potential improvement of child welfare outcomes in the state of West
27	<u>Virginia;</u>

19	(6) Any other opportunities for legislative or executive action that could address, resolve,
50	or otherwise improve upon any problem identified including, but not limited to, the following:
51	(A) Mapping the structure and workflow of all major components of the child welfare
52	system, including intake, investigation, case management, court processes, placement,
53	reunification, and permanency plannings;
54	(B) Identifying duplication of efforts, unnecessary complexity, communication
55	breakdowns, and other operational inefficiencies across agencies and stakeholder groups;
56	(C) Evaluating the alignment of information systems and data infrastructure to support
57	efficient service delivery and accountability;
58	(D) Analyzing the system's ability to provide predictable, timely, and high-quality services
59	to children and families, using metrics such as decision timelines, placement stability, and
60	reunification rates;
51	(E) Assessing opportunities for cross-agency coordination, integration of services, and
62	modernization of workflows through technology or policy innovation; and
63	(F) Providing a framework for continuous quality improvement using principles of systems
64	design, performance feedback, and organizational development.

65	(e) The West Virginia Child First Advisory Committee shall deliver its annual report
66	containing the required findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Joint Committee
67	on the Judiciary on or before January 1 of each year, beginning January 2026.
68	(f) The West Virginia Child First Advisory Committee may create subcommittees and
69	working groups it considers appropriate.
70	(g) The West Virginia Child First Fund is hereby established and shall be administered by
71	the Department of Human Services. The Department of Human Services shall promulgate rules
72	for purposes of administering this fund.
73	(1) Expenditures from the West Virginia Child First Fund shall be used for the sole purpose
74	of improving child welfare outcomes in the state of West Virginia.
75	(2) The West Virginia Child First Fund shall consist of moneys that may be appropriated
76	by the Legislature, moneys received from the federal government, and moneys received from
77	private donations, grants, bequests, and all other moneys received from all sources. The
78	Department of Human Services, political subdivisions, and any private entity may engage in
79	fundraising efforts to solicit donations to the West Virginia Child First Fund.
80	(3) Any moneys remaining in the West Virginia Child First Fund at the end of the fiscal
81	year shall not revert to the General Revenue Fund but shall remain in the fund solely for the
82	purpose stated in this article.
83	(4) The moneys accrued in the West Virginia Child First Fund, any earnings thereon, and
84	any yields from investments by the Treasurer or West Virginia Investment Management Board
85	are reserved solely and exclusively for the purposes set forth in this subsection.
