1 A BILL to amend and reenact §30-13A-11 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
2 relating to county surveyors; providing a definition; and requiring county surveyors to be
3 state residents.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 13A. LAND SURVEYORS.

§30-13A-11. Exemptions from licensing; residency requirements.

1 (a) The following persons are exempt from licensure under the provisions of this article:

2 (1) Any employee of a person or firm, when such employee is engaged in the practice of
3 land surveying exclusively for the person or firm, by which employed, or, if a corporation, its
4 parents, affiliates or subsidiaries, and such person, firm, association or corporation does not hold
5 himself, herself or itself out to the public as being engaged in the business of land surveying.

6 (2) Any employee or officer of the United States, this state or any political subdivision
7 thereof, or their agents, when such employee is engaged in the practice of land surveying
8 exclusively for such governmental unit: *Provided*, That each county surveyor of lands first elected
9 or first appointed after January 1, 2013, pursuant to section 1, article IX of the West Virginia
10 Constitution, shall be a surveyor licensed pursuant to the provisions of this article and such
11 licensee shall be in good standing: Provided, however, That each county surveyor of lands first
12 elected or first appointed after January 1, 2027, pursuant to section 1, article IX of the West
13 Virginia Constitution, shall be a state resident.

14 (b) For the purpose of this section, "state resident" means a person who is domiciled in the
15 state, which includes both physical residency (or presence) in the state, and a person who has an
16 intent to remain in the state. Facts that may demonstrate the domicile of a person in the state, but
17 are not limited to, the physical character of the person's residence(s); the person's time spent in
18 the state; the person's reasons for residency in the state; whether the person intends on returning
19 permanently to another residence outside of the state in the future; whether the person obtains a
20 license to operate a vehicle in the state; whether the person registers a vehicle(s) or other property

21 in the state; the address listed on the person's vehicle registration card; the address listed on the
22 person's driver's license; the address where the person receives state or federal benefits; and
23 whether the person pays property or income taxes in the state.

24 (c) A land surveyor who wishes to hold dual offices in the state may request an exemption
25 from the Ethics Commission pursuant to §6B-2-5 of this code. Exemptions may be granted by the
26 commission, on a case-by-case basis, when it is shown that:

27 (1) The public office held or the public employment engaged in is not such that it would
28 ordinarily be available or offered to a substantial number of the citizens of this state;

29 (2) The office held or the employment engaged in is such that it normally or specifically
30 requires a person who possesses personal prestige; and

31 (3) The person's employment contract or letter of appointment provides or anticipates that
32 the person will gain financially from activities which are not a part of his or her office or
33 employment.

34 (d) The minimum standards for surveys, established by the board, apply notwithstanding
35 the exemptions provided by this section.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to require county surveyors to be state residents and create an exemption to run for more than one county..
