1 A BILL to amend and reenact §11-21-12 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating
2 to pension benefits exempt from income taxation; and providing that all first responders,
3 including those retiring to West Virginia, be exempt.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

ARTICLE 21. PERSONAL INCOME TAX.

§11-21-12. West Virginia adjusted gross income of resident individual.

1 (a) General. — The West Virginia adjusted gross income of a resident individual means his
2 or her federal adjusted gross income as defined in the laws of the United States for the taxable
3 year with the modifications specified in this section.

4 (b) Modifications increasing federal adjusted gross income. — There shall be added to
5 federal adjusted gross income, unless already included therein, the following items:

6 (1) Interest income on obligations of any state other than this state or of a political
7 subdivision of any other state unless created by compact or agreement to which this state is a
8 party;

9 (2) Interest or dividend income on obligations or securities of any authority, commission or
10 instrumentality of the United States, which the laws of the United States exempt from federal
11 income tax but not from state income taxes;

12 (3) Any deduction allowed when determining federal adjusted gross income for federal
13 income tax purposes for the taxable year that is not allowed as a deduction under this article for the
14 taxable year;

15 (4) Interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry obligations or
16 securities the income from which is exempt from tax under this article, to the extent deductible in
17 determining federal adjusted gross income;

18 (5) Interest on a depository institution tax-exempt savings certificate which is allowed as an
19 exclusion from federal gross income under Section 128 of the Internal Revenue Code, for the
20 federal taxable year;

21 (6) The amount of a lump sum distribution for which the taxpayer has elected under
22 Section 402(e) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, to be separately taxed for
23 federal income tax purposes; and

(7) Amounts withdrawn from a medical savings account established by or for an individual under §33-15-20 or §33-16-15 of this code that are used for a purpose other than payment of medical expenses, as defined in those sections.

27 (c) Modifications reducing federal adjusted gross income. — There shall be subtracted
28 from federal adjusted gross income to the extent included therein:

29 (1) Interest income on obligations of the United States and its possessions to the extent
30 includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes;

37 (3) Any amount included in federal adjusted gross income for federal income tax purposes
38 for the taxable year that is not included in federal adjusted gross income under this article for the
39 taxable year;

40 (4) The amount of any refund or credit for overpayment of income taxes imposed by this
41 state, or any other taxing jurisdiction, to the extent properly included in gross income for federal
42 income tax purposes;

43 (5) Annuities, retirement allowances, returns of contributions and any other benefit
44 received under the West Virginia Public Employees Retirement System, and the West Virginia
45 State Teachers Retirement System, including any survivorship annuities derived therefrom, to the
46 extent includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes: *Provided*, That notwithstanding

47 any provisions in this code to the contrary this modification shall be limited to the first \$2,000 of
48 benefits received under the West Virginia Public Employees Retirement System, the West Virginia
49 State Teachers Retirement System and, including any survivorship annuities derived therefrom, to
50 the extent includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes for taxable years beginning
51 after December 31, 1986; and the first \$2,000 of benefits received under any federal retirement
52 system to which 4 U.S.C. § 111 applies: *Provided, however,* That the total modification under this
53 paragraph shall not exceed \$2,000 per person receiving retirement benefits and this limitation
54 shall apply to all returns or amended returns filed after December 31, 1988;

55 ~~(6) Retirement income received in the form of pensions and annuities after December 31,~~

65 (7)(A) For taxable years beginning after December 31, 2000, and ending prior to January
66 1, 2003, an amount equal to two percent multiplied by the number of years of active duty in the
67 Armed Forces of the United States of America with the product thereof multiplied by the first
68 \$30,000 of military retirement income, including retirement income from the regular Armed Forces,
69 Reserves and National Guard paid by the United States or by this state after December 31, 2000,
70 including any survivorship annuities, to the extent included in gross income for federal income tax
71 purposes for the taxable year.

72 (B) For taxable years beginning after December 31, 2000, the first \$20,000 of military

73 retirement income, including retirement income from the regular Armed Forces, Reserves and
74 National Guard paid by the United States or by this state after December 31, 2002, including any
75 survivorship annuities, to the extent included in gross income for federal income tax purposes for
76 the taxable year.

77 (C) For taxable years beginning after December 31, 2017, military retirement income,
78 including retirement income from the regular Armed Forces, Reserves and National Guard paid by
79 the United States or by this state after December 31, 2017, including any survivorship annuities, to
80 the extent included in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year. For taxable years
81 beginning after December 31, 2018, retirement income from the uniformed services, including the
82 Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, Space Force, Coast Guard, Public Health Service, National
83 Oceanic Atmospheric Administration, reserves, and National Guard, paid by the United States or
84 by this state after December 31, 2018, including any survivorship annuities, to the extent included
85 in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year.

86 (D) In the event that any of the provisions of this subdivision are found by a court of
87 competent jurisdiction to violate either the Constitution of this state or of the United States, or is
88 held to be extended to persons other than specified in this subdivision, this subdivision shall
89 become null and void by operation of law.

90 (8) Decreasing modification for social security income.

91 (A) For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2022, 100 percent of the social
92 security benefits received pursuant to Chapter 7 of Title 42 of the United States Code, including,
93 but not limited to, social security benefits paid by the Social Security Administration as Old Age,
94 Survivors and Disability Insurance Benefits as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 401 *et. seq.* or as
95 Supplemental Security Income for the Aged, Blind, and Disabled as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 1381
96 *et. seq.*, included in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year shall be allowed as a
97 decreasing modification from federal adjusted gross income when determining West Virginia
98 taxable income subject to the tax imposed by this article, subject to the limitation in §11-21-

99 12(c)(8)(B) of this code.

100 (B) The deduction allowed by §11-21-12(c)(8)(A) of this code are allowable only when the
101 federal adjusted gross income of a married couple filing a joint return does not exceed \$100,000,
102 or \$50,000 in the case of a single individual or a married individual filing a separate return.

103 (C) For taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 2024, 35 percent of the amount of
104 social security benefits received pursuant to Chapter 7 of Title 42 of the United States Code,
105 including, but not limited to, social security benefits paid by the Social Security Administration as
106 Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance Benefits as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 401 *et. seq.* or as
107 Supplemental Security Income for the Aged, Blind, and Disabled as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 1381
108 *et. seq.*, included in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year shall be allowed as a
109 decreasing modification from federal adjusted gross income when determining West Virginia
110 taxable income subject to the tax imposed by this article, subject to the limitation in §11-21-
111 12(c)(8)(F) of this code.

112 (D) For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2025, 65 percent of the social
113 security benefits received pursuant to Chapter 7 of Title 42 of the United States Code, including,
114 but not limited to, social security benefits paid by the Social Security Administration as Old Age,
115 Survivors and Disability Insurance Benefits as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 401 *et. seq.* or as
116 Supplemental Security Income for the Aged, Blind, and Disabled as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 1381
117 *et. seq.*, included in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year shall be allowed as a
118 decreasing modification from federal adjusted gross income when determining West Virginia
119 taxable income subject to the tax imposed by this article, subject to the limitation in §11-21-
120 12(c)(8)(F) of this code.

121 (E) For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2026, 100 percent of the social
122 security benefits received pursuant to Chapter 7 of Title 42 of the United States Code, including,
123 but not limited to, social security benefits paid by the Social Security Administration as Old Age,
124 Survivors and Disability Insurance Benefits as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 401 *et. seq.* or as

125 Supplemental Security Income for the Aged, Blind, and Disabled as provided in 42 U.S.C. 1381 et.
126 seq., included in federal adjusted gross income for the taxable year shall be allowed as a
127 decreasing modification from federal adjusted gross income when determining West Virginia
128 taxable income subject to the tax imposed by this article, subject to the limitation in §11-21-
129 12(c)(8)(F) of this code.

130 (F) The deduction allowed by §11-21-12(c)(8)(C), §11-21-12(c)(8)(D), and §11-21-
131 12(c)(8)(E) of this code are allowable only when the federal adjusted gross income of a married
132 couple filing a joint return exceeds \$100,000, or \$50,000 in the case of a single individual or a
133 married individual filing a separate return.

134 (9) Federal adjusted gross income in the amount of \$8,000 received from any source after
135 December 31, 1986, by any person who has attained the age of 65 on or before the last day of the
136 taxable year, or by any person certified by proper authority as permanently and totally disabled,
137 regardless of age, on or before the last day of the taxable year, to the extent includable in federal
138 adjusted gross income for federal tax purposes: *Provided*, That if a person has a medical
139 certification from a prior year and he or she is still permanently and totally disabled, a copy of the
140 original certificate is acceptable as proof of disability. A copy of the form filed for the federal
141 disability income tax exclusion is acceptable: *Provided, however*, That:

142 (i) Where the total modification under subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this
143 subsection is \$8,000 per person or more, no deduction shall be allowed under this subdivision;
144 and

145 (ii) Where the total modification under subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this
146 subsection is less than \$8,000 per person, the total modification allowed under this subdivision for
147 all gross income received by that person shall be limited to the difference between \$8,000 and the
148 sum of modifications under subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this subsection;

149 (10) Federal adjusted gross income in the amount of \$8,000 received from any source after
150 December 31, 1986, by the surviving spouse of any person who had attained the age of 65 or who

151 had been certified as permanently and totally disabled, to the extent includable in federal adjusted
152 gross income for federal tax purposes: *Provided*, That:

153 (i) Where the total modification under subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this
154 subsection is \$8,000 or more, no deduction shall be allowed under this subdivision; and

155 (ii) Where the total modification under subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this
156 subsection is less than \$8,000 per person, the total modification allowed under this subdivision for
157 all gross income received by that person shall be limited to the difference between \$8,000 and the
158 sum of subdivisions (1), (2), (5), (6), (7), and (8) of this subsection;

159 (11) Contributions from any source to a medical savings account established by or for the
160 individual pursuant to §33-15-20 or §33-16-15 of this code, plus interest earned on the account, to
161 the extent includable in federal adjusted gross income for federal tax purposes: *Provided*, That the
162 amount subtracted pursuant to this subdivision for any one taxable year may not exceed \$2,000
163 plus interest earned on the account. For married individuals filing a joint return, the maximum
164 deduction is computed separately for each individual; and

165 (12) Any other income which this state is prohibited from taxing under the laws of the
166 United States including, but not limited to, tier I retirement benefits as defined in Section 86(d)(4) of
167 the Internal Revenue Code.

168 (d) Modification for West Virginia fiduciary adjustment. — There shall be added to or
169 subtracted from federal adjusted gross income, as the case may be, the taxpayer's share, as
170 beneficiary of an estate or trust, of the West Virginia fiduciary adjustment determined under §11-
171 21-19 of this code.

172 (e) Partners and S corporation shareholders. — The amounts of modifications required to
173 be made under this section by a partner or an S corporation shareholder, which relate to items of
174 income, gain, loss or deduction of a partnership or an S corporation, shall be determined under
175 §11-21-17 of this code.

176 (f) Husband and wife. — If husband and wife determine their federal income tax on a joint

177 return but determine their West Virginia income taxes separately, they shall determine their West
178 Virginia adjusted gross incomes separately as if their federal adjusted gross incomes had been
179 determined separately.

180 (g) Effective date. –

181 (1) Changes in the language of this section enacted in the year 2000 shall apply to taxable
182 years beginning after December 31, 2000.

183 (2) Changes in the language of this section enacted in the year 2002 shall apply to taxable
184 years beginning after December 31, 2002.

185 (3) Changes in the language of this section enacted in the year 2019 shall apply to taxable
186 years beginning after December 31, 2018.

187 (4) Changes in the language of this section enacted in the year 2024 shall apply
188 retroactively to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2023.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to provide that all first responders, including those retiring to West Virginia, be exempt, from taxes.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from a heading or the present law and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
